Thank You Westbury!

Thank you to the many donors who have generously contributed to the "Save the 7-Acre \$500,000 Westbury Community Garden" capital campaign! By December 16 (press time), more than \$450,000 \$30,000 had already been donated by our fantastic Westbury residents and our friends around Houston and across the nation. We have even had donations from Oregon and \$400,000 Kerrville! Donations have ranged in amount from \$10 up to \$5,000. Thank you! Thank you! Thank you! \$350,000 Negotiations are ongoing to secure the property. We thank the property owner (the \$300,000 Houston Housing Authority), the Houston Parks Board, Mayor Annise Parker, City \$250,000

Councilmember Larry Green, and Joe Turner, Director of the Houston Parks and Recreation Department, for their willingness to move forward to save this 7 acres and to keep it as a public greenspace, as it has been for the last 30 years. As previously announced, we have

started a capital campaign to raise \$500,000 to facilitate the purchase of the land to become a park.

President's Message

Happy New Year! I picked up the January 1968 Crier to see what that president had to say, and not surprisingly, I can repeat the January 1968 message from Jim Harper because what he wrote then is just as applicable 46 years later: Being president of your Civic Club for the past year and being re-elected for another year has been the greatest thrill of my life. I would like to thank each and every one of you dues paying members and business contributors for making possible the publication of the Crier and maintaining our beautiful community. Without your financial support, Westbury could be another South Park area very soon. Specifically I would like to thank the officers and directors who worked many hours just because they love this community enough to want to keep it the best in Harris County. I hope this month all of you will show your confidence in your community by sending in your annual dues to help keep Westbury the best subdivision in Houston in which to raise your children and to maintain your property values."

Well said, Jim! Forty-six years later, Westbury is still full of wonderful volunteers who give their time, talent, and treasure just because they love this community and want to keep it the best that it can be. I joined the board 12 years ago because I was worried about the future of Westbury. I'm not worried anymore. Sure we

have challenges, but there are solutions. We have a responsive city government and I am hopeful and confident that we will start to see some improvements made to our aging infrastructure. This will take some time, but it will happen.

Our homes values are on the rise and Westbury once again is seen as a very desirable place to live. Location, location, location! This has helped keep abandoned and boarded up homes from marring our neighborhood. We have a handful of homes which are perpetually under-maintained, but in a community of 5,000 homes that percentage is miniscule. Deed restriction enforcement and deed restriction revision remain high priority items for the WCC.

Our esplanades and parks have been receiving TLC every year and our Working on Westbury effort has morphed into our Keep Westbury Beautiful campaign. In 2014 we will seek funds to complete the plans for a safety fence amenity near the playground at Westbury Park. We will then turn our focus to Hager Park, while continuing to upgrade our esplanades.

And speaking of parks, our biggest commitment of 2014 will be the preservation of the seven acre site on Dunlap as greenspace. I am humbled by the outpouring of donations

to this effort and as I write this message your donations now total over \$30,000! To me this park will stand as a monument and tangible proof of what concerned citizens can do. We thank all of you who have donated. With 5,000 homes, Westbury benefits from the theory of the sum of large numbers. If every household donated \$100 we would raise \$500,000.

You can't have a good neighborhood without feeling safe and secure. To that end we are working with Precinct 5 to hire a fourth deputy for our contract. We need ALL of you to pay your dues to insure that we can successfully add more deputies. Meyerland has half the number of homes that we do and they have 8 deputies. Come on Westbury, we can do better!

I like the idea of new beginnings and starting fresh. The new year gives us that opportunity. I hope you will join us this year by cutting out the "dues" form in this issue and mailing in a check or go online and pay using paypal. I hope you will get involved; there are lots of ways to participate. Check out this issue for different Westbury groups that you might be interested in joining.





Deputy David Addison: 1961-2013

In Memory of Deputy David Addison

David Addison, longtime Westbury deputy constable, passed away peacefully in his home on December 5, 2013, in Kingwood, TX. David was well liked and highly respected in Westbury. All of us will miss his friendship and his smiling face. For many Westbury residents David was the face of the Westbury Area Patrol. We had just recently asked Precinct 5 to promote him to sergeant due to his excellent service. In the eight years David patrolled our streets he made many friends. He knew many of us by name and knew the neighborhood. David grew up in Westbury and graduated from Westbury High School in 1980. His parents still live in Westbury. Below are excerpts from the program from his funeral service and you will see what a great man David was in all facets of his life. He truly exemplified the meaning of the word service. Our thoughts and prayers are with the Addison family. Rest in peace, good and faithful servant.

David Addison was born February 12, 1961 in Longview, TX, to George and Ruthie Addison. David graduated from Westbury High School in 1980. After graduation he attended Houston Community College. He worked for Houston Shell & Concrete and then American Bank before deciding that law enforcement was his true calling. In May 1990, David graduated third in his class at HCC Law Enforcement Academy and received the Top Gun award. In July 1990 David was sworn in as a Deputy for the Harris County Constable Department, Precinct 5, where he served for over 23 years.

David was also called to serve God and attended the College of Biblical studies in Houston. He served as a volunteer Chaplain for Precinct 5 and was a member of their Honor Guard. He was ordained as a Minister on May 5, 2013. He loved singing and was a tenor in the choir at Woodridge Baptist Church. For the past 13 years, he used his vacation time to go with students to summer youth camp or mission trips. This had become the highlight his year. He lived his life as a fully devoted follower of Christ, being



on mission daily. He was a Mason. He loved to hunt, fish, and spend time with his family. Above all that David did, he was most known to be a loving and caring husband to his wife of 31 years, Teresa, and father to his daughter, Lauren. David and Teresa were high school sweethearts since July of 1979 and married in September 1982. Lauren is a senior in high school and will be attending college in the fall of 2014. In addition to his wife and daughter, he is survived by his parents, George and Ruthie Addison, and his brother John and his twin brother, Joseph, along with a host of other family members.


More than just a Garden...

The Westbury Community Garden Raises More Than Just Vegetables

The story of Missy and her pups as told by Gardener and Pet Trainer Kathy Elder

Missy appeared at the garden in August 2013 as another stray, abandoned dog wandering in and out of the garden looking for help. She stayed and soon had a larger black and white companion. No one was feeding either dog, but she'd hang around watching us working, often cooling off under the pavilion. She could not be approached and would quickly run away if approached. She appeared to be a young dog. When we realized she was pregnant, I called City of Houston BARC at least 3 times to come to capture her, and get her to their shelter before her pups were born. BARC did NOT come.

On Sunday, Nov. 3, 2013 Missy had her puppies and made her den underneath the large garden shed. She was totally dependent on us for her and her puppies survival, so we began feeding her. We agreed that we need to contain her and the puppies to enable us to catch them all and get her and all of her pups to a shelter, or into adoptive homes and free from a life on the streets. We have given her worming medicine and have been feeding her 3x daily to provide the nutrition she needs for herself and to nurse her pups. Her condition is improving and very slowly she is beginning to trust, though not allowing touching. She remains fearful of men. One of the gardeners placed barriers for a wind block around the shed to protect the family through the



recent nights of cold and wind. We could see and hear at least 5 fat puppies just starting to be active. We built a containment around the sheds to keep the puppies contained. We late discovered that Missy had NINE pups under the shed. All seemly healthy and frisky.

On December 8th: Early this COLD morning several gardeners and I removed 5 of Missy's most assertive puppies. We moved the pups to their pen/den in the garage of the garden president, Marcia Hartman. I took a fecal sample to vet and the pups were wormed for roundworms. I think the black pups are black Labrador Retriever mixes and the others are possible Black Mouth Cur mixes. One has a longer shepherd coat. I am finally able to hand feed Missy with her pups under the shed lip. Later the same day, she ate her food

and hot dog pieces right next to me while she was on the shed lip although she is still not wanting to be touched. I think she is a brindle Black Mouth Cur mix (hunting dog) and is NOT a Pit Bull and is young, possibly a puppy herself with her 1st litter.

THANKS to those of you who are offering or working on networking Missy and pups for adoption, or offering donations for their continued care and probable shelter fees.

December 15th update: Many thanks to Marcia Hartman for housing the puppies while the pictures circulated for adoption. I am happy to report that all 5 puppies have found good homes. The remaining 4 puppies are still looking for their forever homes.



Benefits of Paying Your Dues

It's time to pay your civic club dues for 2014!

To all of you who pay the dues, we thank you. You know why they are important and year after year you put your check in the mail (or nowadays go online to pay). Please encourage your neighbors to pay.

To those of you who do not pay, I would ask you to reconsider that decision. The dues are \$295 a year or just \$25 a month. What does that \$25 a month accomplish?

- 1) Protects your investment in your home by keeping Westbury a strong and vibrant neighborhood. Our price per square foot for homes currently for sale averages well over \$100 a square foot. A neighboring zip code has values of \$60 to \$70. What if your home value suddenly was cut in half?
- 2) Keeps the doors to your Civic Club office open and staffed. The WCC has an office and records and historical data dating back to 1956. The Westbury Crier has been bringing news to your doorstep EVERY month since July of 1956. Right now the WCC has one employee working less than full time hours. As an example Meyerland, with half the homes, has 3 employees and they outsource their quarterly publication. We would love to

see enough participation to hire another employee. The office provides free notary service to members and works as a liaison for residents on issues with the city.

- 3) Protects your home and family with the Westbury Area Patrol through Constable Precinct 5. We currently have 3 deputies and are adding a fourth deputy as our ratio of homes to deputies was insufficient according to Precinct 5. They cited Meyerland's 8 deputies as an example. We need YOUR participation to be able to fund this 4th deputy.

- 5) Advocates for City services and infrastructure improvements
- 6) Enforces deed restrictions
- 7) Hosts two White Elephant Community Garage Sale events each year! This is the most popular event we host each year!

At \$25 a month, this membership is a bargain and a great way for you to invest in the neighborhood. Won't you join us in making Westbury the very best neighborhood it can be?

Remember, please let the Westbury Civic Club office look over your proposed plans before you start construction.

We want to avoid deed restriction violations before they happen. Did you know that Westbury 2 and Westbury 3 have a 25 foot rear setback for the main structure? Did you know that there is a minimum percentage of brick that must be on your home? Did you know that you can't build in front of your building line? We want to help you! We want you to find out about possible violations before it costs you money and time. Several homeowners in the past couple years have had to tear down and/or modify their construction due to deed restriction violations.

Obtaining a city construction permit requires your written acknowledgment that the plans comply with your deed restrictions.

SECURITY ALERT: STOLEN PACKAGES FROM FRONT PORCHES

Thieves have been plaguing our neighborhood looking for packages left on front porches to steal for the past several months. *CRIME ALERT: Deputy Joy George with Pct. 5 in her first week in the Westbury Area Patrol was part of an operation that led to the arrest of a young man who was charged with possession of drugs, an aggravated robbery in September and another aggravated robbery in December. Thanks to the observant person who flagged her down with a suspicious vehicle report.

2013 WCC Accomplishments

Our purpose, as set out by our bylaws is: to improve the appearance of the Westbury area and promote the civic, cultural, educational, health, and general welfare of the residents of the Westbury and Parkwest subdivisions. With the exception of our part-time office manager, the rest of us are volunteers.

We accomplished quite a bit this year and hope you have noticed that Westbury is a greener, cleaner, friendlier neighborhood as we continue our "Working on Westbury and Keep Westbury Beautiful" campaign. If you are interested in the "Working on Westbury" effort, we would love to have you join us. Contact the WCC office to join in. Here are 2013 highlights.

Security: We renewed our contract to continue the Westbury Area Patrol (WAP) for 2014. The WCC Board approved adding a 4th patrol deputy in 2014.

Communications: Our monthly newsletter, The Westbury Crier, won a national award from Neighborhoods USA and was increased from 16 to 24 pages. The Westbury High School baseball booster club continues to do an awesome job with delivery. We gained additional fans on Facebook and now have over 800 fans. We kept our residents aware of issues relevant to Westbury through our website, Facebook, and the newsletter. New in 2013 was NextDoor.com, which is a popular site where neighbors exchange information between each other. (Note-NextDoor.com is NOT maintained by the WCC, although some crime prevention information is passed along via this site.)

Support for our Residents: The Civic Club office handled hundreds of calls or emails from residents and many problems were solved. We worked closely

with the Mayor's Assistance Office and the District K office when issues were not resolved through 311. Office Hours were expanded around the White Elephant Sale time to accommodate the schedules of working residents who wished to purchase booth space. We held two successful White Elephant Sales.

Awards: The Westbury Civic Club, the WAIC, and the Westbury Super Neighborhood were joint winners of a Keep Houston Beautiful "Mayor's Proud Partner" award for our Keep Westbury Beautiful project. The Westbury Crier newsletter won an award from Neighborhoods USA. WCC President Becky Edmondson was honored with a Westbury Star award from the Friends of Westbury High School Foundation.

Parks: The city replaced the playground at Westbury Park. Donations from the community provided large shade toppers for the new playground and a fantastic grand-opening celebration, ably led by the Friends of Westbury Greenspaces committee. The Houston Housing Authority (HHA) agreed, in principle, to sell the leased 7-acre site of the Westbury Community Garden to keep it public and green forever, and the WCC and WAIC initiated a campaign to raise funds for this effort late in 2013. The WCC contributed to the JazzFest at Willow Waterhole with a financial donation.

Beautification: New trees were planted and mulched on West Bellfort and at Westbury Park. During the summer drought, landscape beds and young trees were watered by a watering contractor. Our landscaping contractor fertilized, mulched, and de-littered the esplanade decorative landscape beds on a regular basis, and also mowed and maintained the major intersection of West Bellfort

and Chimney Rock. The contractor also mowed areas which do not get frequently mowed (such as pipeline or flood control easements). A tree service contractor was hired to prune trees on West Bellfort -- this work is still in progress.

Solid Waste: Single stream recycling came to all of Westbury! The Solid Waste Department sent out extra trucks for several weeks to collect water damaged items when some homes flooded in April.

Advocacy: We strongly advocate on behalf of all of Westbury and have directors who serve on important boards such as the Westbury Community Garden, the Westbury Area Improvement Corporation, the Friends of Westbury High School Foundation, the Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy, Southwest Houston 2000, the Braes Oaks Management District, the Brays Bayou Association, and the Super Neighborhood Alliance. We meet with city and county officials on a regular basis. We continue to strongly advocate on behalf of the Westbury Community Garden in order to keep those 7 acres as permanent greenspace rather than a low income housing project.

Administrative & Training: We updated our bylaws and approved several new policies. We joined the Greater Houston Neighborhood Association and several directors attended training. Also, several directors attended a Neighborhood 101 training workshop sponsored by District K.

Neighborhood Protection:

We met monthly with the city's Department of Neighborhoods to review outstanding 311 items and to track their progress. We worked with City Legal on cases where deed restrictions were being violated.

WHS Mascot to Change

Here is a letter from WHS Principal Tim Wainright about the WHS Mascot. At the December 2013 HISD Board meeting, the board of trustees took the first step in approving a measure that would prohibit offensive or culturally insensitive mascots. The proposed policy affects four HISD schools — Lamar High School Redskins, Westbury High School Rebels, Hamilton Middle School Indians and Welch Middle School Warriors. If the policy is approved by the board at the January 2014 meeting, then the policy would go into effect at the beginning of the 2014-2015 school year.

Letter from WHS Principal

Dec. 9, 2013

Attention Westbury Community, This week, Superintendent Grier will recommend to the Houston Independent School District Board of Education that they adopt a new policy prohibiting potentially offensive or culturally insensitive mascots.

We are one of four schools — Lamar High School Redskins, Westbury High Schools Rebels, Hamilton Middle School Indians and the Welch Middle School Warriors — that will be affected by this proposed policy update, which, if approved, would go into effect at the beginning of the 2014-2015 school year. Change is always hard, especially when it involves longstanding symbols of community pride. In a district as large and diverse as HISD, we must lead by example. While traditions are important, they aren't as important as kindness and respect, which we owe not just to all of our students, but to the community at large.

I want to stress that this proposed policy doesn't mean that our traditions and history will be forgotten. I plan to work with district officials to ensure that our mascot is respectfully retired and honored appropriately on our campus.

I'm committed to keeping you informed throughout this process, and I will provide you more information as I have it. If you have any questions in the meantime, please contact our school office at 713-723-6015.

Westbury Square Update

As we reported last month, the City's litigation over the dilapidated buildings at Westbury Square is now at an end. The Texas Supreme Court ruled that the City's Building to Standard Commission orders against the dilapidated buildings, buildings 1 and 5, are final and can be demolished. The owner has until February 10, 2014, to completely demolish both buildings.

We are keeping in close contact with our District K representatives on the progress. Because of concerns over asbestos, Mr. Antonini, current property owner, had to hire a licensed asbestos abatement surveyor to prepare a report for the state. They are now awaiting state approval to begin demolition.

Even though the owner will seek an extension of the repair order entered against the theatre building, once an extension is granted, an inspector from the City's Public Works and Engineering Dept. will perform the requisite inspections to determine what repairs are needed. After all repairs are made, the owner can request a Certificate of Compliance to have the repair order released. The City Legal Dept. will check for permits and continue to monitor progress to ensure demolition progresses relative to the timetable discussed with the owner

The District K office will continue to keep us posted on this evolving development.

Joy Hester & the Willow Waterhole Bird Survey

Back in the summer of 2007, Westbury resident Joy Hester, who is a past president of the Houston Audubon Society and currently a national board member of the Audubon, started a monthly bird survey at the Willow Waterhole. Living near the Willow Waterhole Bayou, Joy realized the abundance of bird species she would see in her Westbury neighborhood. Once the Willow Waterhole Greenspace was in place she knew the words "if you build it, they will come' would apply to the 300 acre Conservation Reserve.

She scheduled a monthly bird survey for the third Saturday and reported the findings to Texas eBird. Her hope was to establish a good database to track changes in the bird populations as the park develops and changes over time. For a list of the species seen to date, go to ebird hotspots. To date 178 species have been seen!

Before identifying 44 species during the November Willow Waterhole bird survey, the group honored the survey's founder, Joy Hester, with a plaque in recognition of her outstanding leadership. She was the leader of the survey during its formative years. Mark Meyers is the leader of that survey now. The Willow Waterhole is indebted to Joy for her foresight, guidance, and encouragement.

A record 33 participants were on hand for the November Willow Waterhole Bird Survey. Of note during this survey were sightings of five species of wintering sparrows on the property to the east of South Post Oak Road.






New HISD Trustee

While at UF, Dr. Rocha was a cello instructor and Orchestra Director in the String Preparatory Program at the University. Trash Explained

2014 Monthly "Junk Waste" or "Tree Waste"

Unlike many cities, the City of Houston provides residents with FREE curbside monthly heavy trash collection, alternating "TREE WASTE" collection months with "JUNK WASTE" collection months. The collection cycle is the same every year, as shown below. ALL of Westbury is picked up on the 2nd Thursday of each month.



We all want Westbury to look as attractive as possible, so it is important to pay attention to when you may legally place your heavy trash at the curb. If you are not sure, you may call the WCC office or "like" the WCC Facebook page to get trash updates. ALL of Westbury is picked up on the 2nd Thursday of each month.

Trash Can Placement

Household garbage must be put inside the city-provided container which should be placed at the curb between 6PM Wednesday evening and 7AM Thursday morning. The container must be accessible to the automated collection truck and not blocked by obstacles, including parked cars. Homeowners with multiple trashcans MUST place trashcans three (3) feet apart. Do not place cans next to light poles or trees. The city has started tagging cans that are placed incorrectly. Homes on corners must place their trash cans on the front street (not side). Trash cans must be removed from the curb by 10PM Thursday.

What is "Junk Waste"?

"Junk Waste" includes furniture, appliances, lumber, fencing, and other bulky items (including tree waste, but the tree waste would then be sent to landfill rather than mulched). The city will NOT collect bagged yard waste placed in improper bags during a Junk Waste month.



"Tree Waste" consists of tree limbs, shrubbery limbs, or branches of trees and shrubs. If the Tree Waste has other types of materials mixed in with it, then it is no longer Tree Waste. Lumber, fencing and similar materials are NOT considered Tree Waste. During a Tree Waste month, only Tree Waste materials will be collected by the city.

What is "Yard Waste"?

"Yard Waste" consists of leaves, grass clippings, small yard trimmings or branches. Yard Waste must be in a city-approved bag, or small branches bundled (tied) into a pile less than 4 feet long, less than 18 inches in diameter, and less than 50 pounds in weight. "Yard Waste" is picked up every Thursday.







What goes in the large green bin? Recyclables such as steel or aluminum cans. Paper. Certain plastics, not # 6. Glass IS allowed in the large recyclable bins. Recycling is picked up every other Thursday.

What goes in the large black trash bins? Household garbage such as personal trash and food preparation waste are to be placed in the large black trash bins. Household garbage day is Thursday. No yard waste, dead animals, household hazardous waste, or electronics.

Too much trash this week? Buy "tags for bags" from Fiesta, HEB and participating Kroger stores so city will pick up your extra bags of trash. Cost is \$ 2 per tag, plus tax.



Trash Explained

Environmental Service Center – South

(Recycle and Household Hazardous Waste)

11500 South Post Oak - between Gasmer and South Main

The Environmental Service Center accepts household hazardous waste such as anti-freeze, batteries, fuel, oil, paint, paint thinner, pesticides, herbicides and household cleaners. Residential electronic scrap items will also be accepted (monitors, televisions, printers, keyboards, mice, scanners, fax machines, telephone handsets, VCRs, CPUs, cellular phones and other small consumer electronics). These items should not be placed on the curb with or in your container for collection with garbage or heavy trash pick-up. The center is open every Tues. and Wed. from 9AM to 3PM and the 2nd Saturday of the month from 9 AM- 1 PM.





Items that can be taken to the Environmental Service Center

Reuse Chemical Take Away (FREE)

The City of Houston's Environmental Service Center South offers free paint and household chemicals. Located at 11500 South Post Oak Road, the Center is open for reuse chemical distribution on Fridays from 9AM to Noon. First come, first served.

ReStore (Craft Items, Books, Post Consumer & Industrial Scrap - FREE)

The ReStore, which acts as a book swap, recycling info library, as well as a repository for craft items and post consumer and post industrial scrap (useful for art projects). Located at 11500 South Post Oak, items can be taken away from 9AM - Noon every Friday during the Reuse Chemical Take-Away.

Trash Violations

Violation of any provision of the solid waste ordinance is punishable upon first conviction by a fine of no less than \$50 nor more than \$2,000. Each subsequent conviction is punishable by a fine of no less than \$250 nor more than \$2,000. Each day that any violation continues may be punishable as a separate offense. **To report a violation or to file a complaint, call 311.** Solid Waste Management Department Supervisors can write citations.

You must provide a Texas Driver's License or ID and a current utility bill or city property tax receipt. **The depositories will accept the following items:** Furniture, Tree limbs, Stoves, Refrigerators, etc., 10 auto tires (Rims Not Accepted)
Open Wednesday - Sunday, 10AM to 7PM.

Westpark Recycling Center 5900 Westpark

This facility is a drive through operation so you do not have to unload your vehicle. **The center accepts:** aluminum and tin cans, batteries, oil filters, used tires, computers, #1-7 plastic containers, GLASS bottles and jars, telephone books, office paper, cardboard, magazines, and used motor oil. Newspapers placed in a brown bag will also be accepted. Open Monday—Saturday from 8AM to 5PM.

Reuse Warehouse

9003 N. Main St.

The facility accepts material from individuals, supply companies, and builders, and makes it freely available for reuse by any non-profit organization.

Open Tuesday thru Friday from 8:30AM to 4:30PM and every 2nd and 4th Saturday of the month from 8:30AM to 12:30PM

Christmas Tree Recycling

The City of Houston encourages residents to recycle Christmas trees. The recycled trees will be converted into mulch, which will help save landfill space and help preserve the environment.

Trees WITHOUT Artificial Snow, Tinsel, or stands: In Westbury, these trees will be collected for recycling by the city during the January "Tree Waste Heavy Trash" pickup. They may be placed at the curb starting Saturday January 4, for collection on **January 9** for ALL of Westbury. Trees for recycling may be taken to our Southwest Neighborhood Depository at 10785 Southwest Freeway.
