Remodeling your home? Adding On? Do you know your deed restrictions?

FEBRUARY 2014

Did you know that the Westbury Civic Club can look over your proposed plans for free before you start construction?

We want to avoid deed restriction violations before they happen. Did you know that Westbury 2, Westbury 3, and Westbury 5 have a 25 foot rear setback for the main structure? Did you know that there is a minimum percentage of brick that must be on your home? Did you know that you can't build in front of your building line? We want to help you! We want you to find out about possible violations before it costs you money and time. Several homeowners in the past couple years have had to tear down and/or modify their construction due to deed restriction violations.

The City of Houston does not review deed restrictions when issuing permits. They require a signed affidavit acknowledging that the plans comply with your deed restrictions. This holds YOU, the homeowner, accountable for knowing and complying with your deed restrictions. We are here to help you. All deed restrictions are available online at westburycrier.com.

Westbury Square Update

According to the District K staff, the pending demolition of several buildings at Westbury Square is still on target to be completed by February 15th as required. They have had the secondary environmental testing done and expect the results shortly. Demolition contractors have been giving bids. In the interim they have a demolition company removing exterior brick.





WAIC Board Notes

The Westbury Area Improvement Corp (WAIC) board met on Jan. 15. Highlights of the meeting include:

Financial: Donations to save the Westbury Community Garden land have passed \$46,000. In December, Target donated \$1,000 in gift cards to the Westbury HPD Storefront for a youth program, via the WAIC. Walmart donated 1,000 toward more improvements at Westbury Park. Volunteers signed up for the Financial Oversight and the Grants/Funding Committees.

Technology: A preliminary website has been set up for free on Google Sites, since it was needed as part of the online donation page for the Westbury Community Garden Land Acquisition Project, and a domain name will be set up.

Neighborhood Protection Issues:

Trina Tillman, an inspector from the COH Dept. of Neighborhoods, is now working in our area and introduced herself. There was a general discussion about an upcoming City Planning Commission variance hearing on February 6 related to the canopy built at the convenience store at 5415 W. Airport, and

updates about the Westbury Square and the "Westbury Centerette" commercial sites.

Schools: Anderson Elementary reported that HISD is implementing a school wide Dual Language program for the 2014-2015 school year. The WAIC/WCC will request a community meeting on this topic. Parker Elementary is considering adding another kindergarten class and will be adding a new magnet option of Music Technology. The JMS orchestra will be playing at Carnegie Hall this spring.

Community Partners: The
Willow Waterhole Greenspace
Conservancy said that a \$300,000+
grant cannot be spent until a design
consultant has been approved by
City Council, and the WWGC does
not want to waste money duplicating
plans already done by Flood Control.
Friends of WHS Foundation is
planning its gala and will have a
scholarship honoring Rita
Woodward. Westbury Little League
is enrolling now for Spring and is trying to get a fence built between their
fields and the Willow Waterhole.

Next meeting will be February 19 at 8:30AM at Salem Lutheran Church.

Bi-Monthly Breakfast: Westbury residents Van Austell and Trey Velasco are sitting with WCC President Becky Edmondson at the Westbury Civic Club table with Russell Schexnayder, Virginia Livingston, Wayne Slaikeu, and Cindy Chapman on Jan 14. The WCC sponsors a table at each Bi-Monthly Breakfast event (hosted by SWHouston 2000 / Brays Oaks Management District at Houston Baptist University).

Garden Beds Available at WCG

Have you been thinking about joining the Westbury Community Garden? Good news. There are currently 6 beds available for lease. We look forward to new gardeners joining this wonderful community. If you have ever wanted to know how to grow food sustainably, then there is no better place in Houston to do so. Our soil is healthy. Our gardeners are knowledgeable, and it is wonderful eating your own homegrown veggies. Homegrown food tastes great because it is fresh, plus you can grow varieties that are not

commonly offered in stores.

Consider gathering together a group of friends and neighbors to share the experience and the food. Sharing a garden bed is encouraged, for newcomers. Many of us in Westbury have shady yards or pesky squirrels, and the sunny, squirrelfree Westbury Community Garden awaits you.

Show Your Roses Some Love!

Roses thrive in Houston. Valentine's Day is the traditional day for pruning roses here (barring any predicted heavy freezes, of course). And while different types of roses respond to different types of pruning, all of them will benefit from the removal of dead wood and branches, and a general "cleaning up" to reshape them if necessary.

Hybrid tea, floribunda, and grandiflora roses (what we usually think of as "bush" roses). Cut at least 1 inch below the damaged area, using a 45-degree angle cut and a sharp blade. (This encourages water to flow off the stem, rather than sitting on a flat surface.) Keep in mind that the best shape for most of these bushes is an open vase shape, so prune them to encourage this type of growth. Remove limbs that cross over other limbs in the center of the bush. If two limbs are rubbing against each other, remove the smaller one. Cut a branch just above an outward-facing leaf bud. Ideally the plant should grow up and out, to encourage good air flow through the center of the bush, because this helps to control mildew issues later in the season and insures equal sunlight reaches all areas of the plant. Once you have pruned your roses, apply a fertilizer such as Earth Essentials or Microlife.

What is the Value of the **Westbury Community Garden** to Westbury and Nearby **Neighborhoods?**

According to an article from Agriburbia, developments that include a farming component have seen their property values rise as much as 25%.

When developers create master planned communities they often include swimming pools, club houses, and shopping centers. Now days something new is being added across the country: the specialty farm. Thanks to the local food movement coupled with more farmers markets and the need for organic foods, having a community garden is seen as a desirable thing in a community.

We are lucky to have access to the 7 acres of greenspace that is home to the WCG.

To bring you up to date, our year end fundraising campaign raised over \$46,000. We are well on our way to securing the WCG's seven acres as permanent greenspace. Thanks to all of you who have donated to this cause. Our fund raising efforts are ongoing and there is a donation form on page 9.

There are big plans underway at the garden. Two Plant it Forward graduate farmers are breaking ground now on acre plots. This is the beginning of an exciting partnership that we hope will culminate in a Farmers Market for Westbury. We will have a community celebration for the gardens 4th year anniversary. There are gardening spaces available and I hope some of you will join us this

It is exciting to be a part of something so unique. What could have become an unnecessary 250 unit housing project instead is an award winning community garden. Save the 7-Acre Westbury Community Garden

Security Alert: Break-Ins in Parkwest 2

Recently Sgt. Mitch Hutter met with a concerned group of Parkwest 2 residents after there were 2 daytime break-ins. Alert neighbors saw two Hispanic men and two Hispanic women, whom they did not recognize, knocking on neighbors' doors on Creekbend and Bankside. In checking further, one resident saw that the back door of a neighbor's home had been kicked in and called the Pct. 5 dispatch. The men were apprehended but, shockingly, the women fled and later broke into another home.

There are several good takeaways from this:



If you see anyone you do not recognize or that seems suspicious, then call the police or Precinct 5, or both.



f you have security concerns, Precinct 5 will meet with homeowners as well as provide a security evaluation of your home.



If you call for the police/Pct. 5 deputies and an officer doesn't respond, then call back.



If a situation changes from a suspicious person to a crime in progress, then call back to let the police/Pct 5 know. Call 911 for a crime in progress or a situation that requires immediate assistance from the police, fire department or ambulance.

Political signs are already starting to show up in yards. Please remember to post political signs between your house and the city sidewalk. It is the polite way to post your political signs and it is also a legally accepted way to post your political signs. It is a violation of city ordinance to post signs on city property or easements, and the narrow strip of land between the street and sidewalk is part of the city easement.

Jaime Gonzalez, Conservation Education Director, Katy Prairie Conservancy, will present "The Role of Prairies in Flood Reduction". He also serves as President of the Coastal Prairie Partnership and as a member of the Texas Children in Nature Coalition Steering Committee. Where nature can reduce the risk of flooding, it is always better than what we humans can do. Thus we need to know what nature can do and how to help it along.

Brays Oaks Management District (BOMD) News

Cindy Chapman, WCC director and a member of the BOMD board, has been named chair of the BOMD Business and Economic Development Committee. This committee seeks to bring attractive new developments, support and retain existing businesses, create jobs, and bring additional spending power to the district. The committee meets monthly on the 1st Thursday at 9AM at the BOMD office located 10103 Fondren, Suite 300.

District K Councilmember Larry Green will be working with BOMD and the Five Corners Management District to organize several economic development tours in 2014. The tentative schedule includes one tour to focus on restaurants and another to focus on grocery stores/commercial businesses. Other tours will look at sites suitable for single-family residential development or potential multi-family/mixed use development.

Help Keep Westbury Storm Sewers Clean

Yard men with blowers can be seen almost every day in Westbury. In the "olden" days, yard crews came with a broom and swept up your clippings and leaves. Now a preferred method seems to be just blowing everything out into the street. This stuff doesn't disappear by magic and can end up plugging up storm sewers or blocking storm drain inlets, which means that YOUR home or your neighbor's home or a car you have parked at the street might get flooded during a heavy downpour.

This common practice of blowing yard debris into the street is against city ordinance, and tickets can be given and fines levied. If you employ a yard service, ask them to sweep up your clippings and yard debris and put it into an approved disposal bag. Did you know that any time you employ a contractor they are required by city ordinance to take their trash away with them? This means bags of leaves, tree limbs, appliances, construction debris, etc. Call 311 to report illegal dumping.



Shell Gasmer Facility

Not many people realize that Shell has a technology prototype facility located right here in Westbury. In December 2013, WCC President Becky Edmondson and Westbury Area Improvement Corporation (WAIC) President Cindy Chapman participated in a group tour of the Shell Gasmer facility. The Gasmer Technology Center sits on 30 acres of land on Gasmer near Westbury High School and employs more than 100 Shell staff and contractors. When the future campus expansion for WHS is completed, the high school property will adjoin the Shell Gasmer technology center. The Gasmer facility is also adjacent to the Willow Waterhole Conservation Reserve.



The Gasmer facility is part of the Shell Projects and Technology group. Worldwide, this department has more than 14,000 employees, and more than 1,000 of these employees have PhDs. The Gasmer facility is integrated with the Shell Technology Center Houston located on the west side of Houston. Shell has about 87,000 employees worldwide.

The Gasmer facility has been in operation since 1960 and more than \$250 million has been invested at the facility in support of research and development activities. Originally the land was part of

the Shell pipeline group, but that building is now used for welding and a machine shop.

These days, the Gasmer Technology Center constructs and operates prototype equipment and pilot plants for testing and analysis in the exploration and production of oil and gas. Gasmer project teams specialize in drilling and heavy oil upgrading technology. They have the ability to test and evaluate large-scale lab experiments and pilot plant demonstrations, which help reduce risk prior to full-scale, field implementation.

Visitors to the Willow Waterhole Conservation Reserve may have noticed huge spools at the Gasmer site. These spools hold heater component assemblies up to 5,000 feet long. The heaters are used to warm up conditions underground at drilling locations so that crude oil flows easier. Due to their large size, these spools are not transported from the facility using Gasmer Drive. Instead they are transported via Dryad (the road behind the facility) and then are driven south on Chimney Rock for easy access to the highway system. They try to minimize the impact to the community when moving large items into or out of the facility via Dryad, so they need to know when events are scheduled that affect Dryad Drive – such as events at Willow Waterhole, Westbury High School, or Westbury Little League.

Back in the early days of offshore oil platforms, workers practiced welding underwater in a deep pool at the Gasmer facility. This same pool has been used to test equipment and techniques to cap underwater wells. After the Deepwater Horizon oil spill in 2010 in the Gulf of Mexico, the US government required all offshore drilling companies to document their ability to cap underwater wells, and

Shell used equipment tested at the Gasmer facility to get permission to resume operations.

There are several other projects at the site, but the newest pilot plant at Gasmer is a heavy viscous oil (HVO) prototype pilot plant. It is used to test processing of heavy Canadian tar sand oils using techniques which were developed in labs at the Shell Technology Center Houston. The samples arrive in drums and are converted to more valuable products. Testing is anticipated to last several years to evaluate challenges for commercial applications. The pilot plant is mounted on a skid so that it can easily be removed when testing is completed.

Shell is working on a site master plan for the Gasmer facility. Although the master plan has not yet been approved, a new control room for the site was built for the recent HOV pilot plant project. This new, consolidated control room will provide more amenities for users and will make cross-training easier once other control rooms at Gasmer are transferred over to the new control room.

Other new upgrades at the facility include projects to reduce noise at the site. In particular, Shell had been shutting down loud blowers located in the corner near the Willow Waterhole "South Gazebo" on weekends when events were scheduled. Westbury's good friend, Rita Marie Woodward, 86, passed away on December 31, 2013.


Her funeral service was wonderful and uplifting. Her family and friends spoke eloquently. George Nwanguma, the Fondren Fiesta store manager and ardent supporter of the Friends of WHS spoke; Donald Perkins presented a Proclamation from the City of Houston; her daughter and granddaughters gave moving tributes; and US Congressman Al Green spoke and presented flags to the family. There were tears and laughter and mourning and celebration for a life well lived. It was a perfect send-off for a woman who was a much loved mother, grandmother, great-grandmother and a trailblazing community activist. The world, especially Westbury, is a better place because you loved us, Rita. Rest in peace, good and faithful servant.

We featured Rita in the December *Crier* honoring her with a "Power of One" award. She worked tirelessly on behalf of Westbury High School. Her passion was supporting her community in any way she could. Rita served on the boards of the Friends of Westbury High School Foundation, the Westbury Area Improvement Corporation, and Southwest Houston 2000.

Rita was born in Houston, Texas, and went to Milby High School where she was a cheerleader. After having four children, Rita went back to work in 1964 as a secretary for the City of Houston and in 1982 she went to work for City Council Member Eleanor Tinsley. Rita retired from the City of Houston in 1987. From 1990-1993, Rita served as Westbury High School's PTO President/Vice President. In 1992, Rita founded the Friends of Westbury High School Foundation, a non-profit organization providing grants to outstanding seniors, teacher support and special school projects. To date, the Foundation has awarded 188 scholarships and raised \$236,000. From 1983-2013, Rita Woodward was awarded several honors including an Honorary Degree from Houston Community College, Mayor's Proclamation -Rita Woodward Day, a Park dedicated in her name (The Rita Woodward Environmental Nature Park), a Certificate of Special Congressional Recognition and the George Washington Honor Award by the Freedom Foundation-Houston Chapter. Rita was also an honorary member of Beta Omicron Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma Society International, a professional organization of women educators.

Rita also served an important role in bringing the 9th Grade Academy to the WHS, and was a strong supporter to make WHS a premier campus once again. Tests scores and attendance are improving, the Fine Arts programs continue to expand, and WHS is scheduled to have parts of the campus rebuilt in 2017.





Tentative Tree Planting Event February 8th: As we go to press this event is still tentative as working with multiple entities is often a challenge. There will be an update on the Facebook page of both the WCC and the WWGC as the date approaches. Volunteers are needed to plant trees and spread mulch at Willow Waterhole on Saturday February 8th. Registration begins at 9 AM at The Gathering Place parking lot, 5310 South Willow at Ricecrest. Tree planting events are a great way for families with children in the 6 to 14 year old range to accomplish something meaningful together. The holes will be pre-dug to the correct size. A shovel will be required to remove the remaining loose dirt from the hole. A family working together should be able to plant four or more trees in a couple of hours. Everyone should wear sensible shoes and long pants. Bring your own gloves, but they will also be provided, if you don't.

Everyone will need to have a signed waiver to participate. The waiver must be signed by a parent or guardian for those under 18. A PDF copy of the waiver can be downloaded from the WWGC's website at http://www.wwgc.org/. Copies of the waiver will be available at the registration desk.

Recycle your unused Recycling Bin: The WWGC needs some of the old-style, rectangular curbside recycling bins. If you have one of the new rolling, single-stream bins, and are not using your old one for other purposes, it can be dropped off at the Platou Center at Chimney Rock Park, 11655 Chimney Rock on Wednesday's between noon and 7 PM. We have multiple uses for them now and for years to come.

Pocket Prairie Coming to Willow Waterhole: The WWGC is

working on a plan with the City of Houston Parks and Recreation Department, Flood Control District and various prairie organizations to plant a one-fourth-acre pocket prairie on South Willow between the hospital and The Gathering Place. We will be rescuing native coastal prairie plants in March and April for transplanting in the South Willow Pocket Prairie.



Mardi Grass: Flora of the Famous Cajun Prairie in Deer

Park Texas: "Mardi Grass: Flora of the Famous Cajun Prairie in Deer Park Texas" will be presented by botanist and author Jason Singhurst of the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department on February 27 at 3015 Richmond Ave., 77057. All are welcome to grab your Krewe and some beads and join us at 6:30 p.m. for refreshments & 7:00 p.m. for "Mardi Grass". This Cajun prairie in Deer Park is a 54-acre virgin prairie that was purchased last year at \$4 million with privately raised donations and saved from being a housing subdivision. Many of the plants found there are also found on the Prairie Management Area at Willow Waterhole!



Barbed Wire Controversy


The WCC notes that there is a controversy in progress regarding the Praire area on the East side on S. Post Oak regarding barbed wire fencing. Residents neighboring the site are very upset about placement of a barbed wire fence surrounding the future prairie site. The Harris County Flood Control District feels they are justified in the placement and construction of the fencing. This issue is currently in City Legal Review.

Bird Survey Results

With the weather clear and cold, the Willow Waterhole Bird Survey recorded 44 species on Saturday, January 18. Of note was the flyover of an Anhinga, a first-time sighting for this count. Nice flocks of American Pipits were seen, as was a Tufted Titmouse, a bird not often found in the park. A turnout of 36 participants enjoyed the morning of birding. The next Willow Waterhole Bird Survey will be on Saturday February 15.

STATUS UPDATE - January 2014

This is the first in a series of regular updates the Harris County Flood Control District will provide to residents, public officials and other stakeholders about activities related to the Willow Waterhole Prairie Management Area. The Flood Control District is committed to keeping you informed as we progress through the plans to establish a 15-acre native coastal prairie management area in the Willow Waterhole Stormwater Detention Basin's Compartment 3 located northeast of the intersection of South Post Oak Road and South Main Street.

PRAIRIE MANAGEMENT PLAN - ACTIVITY UPDATE/NEXT STEPS

As of January 2014, the Flood Control District is continuing with the second phase of the plan to create the Willow Waterhole Prairie Management Area:

- 1. **Vegetation Removal Activities:** The District continues with the removal of identified shrubs, saplings, small trees, and exotic, or non-native, vegetation in the Prairie Management Area's North Sector (south of the forested buffer between the Prairie Management Area and the Willowbrook and Post Oak Manor neighborhoods). Remaining work in the North Sector includes the removal of mulch, brush piles, non-native vegetation, select trees, vines and shrubs from the prairie habitat. Work continues on clearing shrubs, saplings, small trees, and exotic, or non-native, vegetation and debris piles targeted for removal in the South Sector near Gasmer Drive.
- 2. **Tree Evaluation:** This week (Jan. 13), the project team conducted a tree inventory in the Prairie Management Area's North Sector (south of the forested buffer between the Prairie Management Area and the Willowbrook and Post Oak Manor neighborhoods). Each tree was mapped with a GPS location, and information was collected about species, size, diameter, general health and unique characteristics. Flood Control District biologists and foresters will evaluate the condition, location, number and species of these trees to determine which of them should be included as mottes, which are groupings of trees, and which should be removed. Prior to any large tree removal, Flood Control District project staff will meet on site with local experts and a community spokesperson to discuss proposed upcoming steps for prairie restoration in the North Sector. Community input will be taken into consideration.


WHS Baseball Team Gives Back to Community


