ReBuild Houston is Coming to Westbury

The Westbury area was chosen for a Storm Drain Reconstruction project through ReBuild Houston and the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) in 2015. The Westbury Area Drainage project is broken into SIX sub-projects. This project is estimated to be roughly a 100 million dollar investment into Westbury's infrastructure. Sub-project 1 is Westbury 4 East. This area is roughly bordered by Ludington on the north, Atwell on the east, Ettrick on the south, and Landsdowne on the west. NEW Harvey Recovery Assistance

The City of Houston has launched a new program to help Houstonians who flooded during Harvey. The new Homeowner Assistance Program (HOAP) is funded by federal aid money the City is receiving for Harvey. If your home flooded during Harvey, you may be eligible for assistance. Anyone who may be eligible must first complete a survey. There is approximately \$400 million allocated to this program.

Recycling and Heavy Trash Delays

The City of Houston is having major trash pick-up delays throughout the entire city. The City was late picking up Westbury's recycling on December 20 due to a sick driver. This caused a 3-day delay. Then Solid Waste had 3 holidays at the end of year, add this to too many broken trucks and not enough drivers, and you have a major problem. Westbury's next normal scheduled day for recycling on January 3 was actually picked up on January 12, 8 days late. The delays were not just in Westbury, this was happening all over the City in every neighborhood.

As City Council members and the mayor received more and more trash complaints, on January 16, City Council passed an emergency spending item to outsource some of the City's recycling routes and to rent extra trucks. The plan calls for spending \$4.56 million to outsource 10 daily recycling routes to Texas Pride Disposal Solutions, LLC, starting February 1. The other portion of money, \$450,000, is to rent five heavy trucks from Big Truck Rentals, LLC, to help with recycling and yard waste pick-up. Both of these contracts are for a year. The \$5 million is coming from the city's fund reserve.

By August, the City expects to have received 69 new trucks, 25 of which will be ready by mid-February. The city also held a job fair in January for new truck drivers, so hopefully they will hire more employees. As for the current pick-up status, please check the Westbury Houston Facebook page for updates or call 311. The operators can tell you the most recent update from Solid Waste. As of print time, the City is saying that the January 31 Recycling pick-up will be on Saturday, February 2. No other updates have been provided.

The Westbury Civic Club advises that if the City is late picking up your trash or recycling cans, leave them on the street as the City is coming. It is just delayed. Heavy trash has also been delayed. As of January 23, the Westbury Tree Waste pick-up from January 10 is still sitting out on people's curbs. Unfortunately, the City has not updated the heavy trash schedule. The City is also saying that Yard Waste pick-up will be intermittent until they get caught up. Please remain patient and remember to wave and smile at the drivers, as they really are working hard to get everyone's trash picked up.

A Message from the Westbury Civic Club President

February is one of my favorite months in Houston due to its mild, yet brisk, weather. It is easy to feel optimistic and happy when the sun is shining, flowers are blooming, and chocolates are on sale for Valentine's Day!

I am very pleased to say that we have TWO announcements in this newsletter edition which are fantastic news for our Westbury neighborhood and homes. First, there is a NEW pot of funds which has been announced for houses which flooded during Hurricane Harvey, and we think that more of our residents could qualify for these new funds than for the previous Harvey Recovery programs. I urge all affected residents to apply to the program, which is discussed in more detail on page 7.

Our streets and storm drainage piping are about 60 years old and badly need to be updated, which brings me to the next announcement of fantastic news — Westbury is getting its first project to make our streets and drainage better, with the lovely name of WESTBURY DRAINAGE & PAVING IMPROVEMENTS, SUB-PROJECT 1. This is the first of several drainage and road projects which will be

implemented in Westbury in the future. More info is on page 8-9.

This streets and drainage project is a perfect example about why our Westbury Civic Club is an important and vital partner to keeping Westbury the great neighborhood that it is. The Westbury Civic Club submitted the capital improvement requests to the city for streets and drainage projects and continued to advocate for the project each year in discussions with the city. Our Director of Infrastructure & Flood Control, Jennifer Edmondson, has developed expertise and collected data which have been key in these discussions with the City and Public Works.

These two announcements of good news are a great start for 2019. The city and the federal government are investing in Houston and in Westbury. But, Westbury also needs love and care and investment of \$\$\$\$ from our residents.

I am asking all of our residents, who have voluntary payments, to support the Westbury Civic Club and the Westbury Area Patrol (constables) with your payments EARLY in 2019 and to be

generous. I have paid my money to the WCC and WAP for 2019, and I invite you to join me. The WCC Board of Directors voted to drop one of our 4 constable deputies to be prudent, since we no longer have a reserve fund to draw on for WAP this year, but I strongly believe that our community needs to have more than 3 constables. We deserve to have 4 constables, and we can HAVE 4 constables if we all contribute toward the goal of 4 constables and then to rebuild our security reserve fund! Letters were mailed out in January to our mandatory and voluntary residents. All voluntary contributions are greatly appreciated. Track our fundraising progress on Facebook. As February unfolds, with Valentine's mid-month, know your WCC Board appreciates all of its residents and will continue working to maintain and improve Westbury.

Call 311 - Be The "Squeaky Wheel" - Complaining has its Benefits!

There is an old adage that "the squeaky wheel gets the grease", meaning that those who complain are more likely to get a response than those who do not. When working with the city to advocate for projects, it is exceedingly helpful to have many voices who have expressed concerns about a problem to the city via 311. The city Public Works Department needs DATA (proof of problems) to demonstrate that it is working on the appropriate projects. Please report problems to 311 to build the documentation to get your problems worked on!

Structural flooding? Call 311. Obstructed, slow-draining stormwater drains? Call 311. Toilets don't drain well during rainy weather? Call 311. Toilet paper bubbling out of manholes? Call 311. Sand in vour water? Call 311. Funny taste to your water? Call 311.

For example, HOW did the WCC advocate to the city and county to do flooding and drainage projects in Westbury? When told that there had been few complaints to 311 about structural flooding and drainage issues, the WCC encouraged our residents to contact 311 about these problems. Also, the WCC did driving surveys to document approximately which blocks flooded during Hurricane Harvey and other high rainfall events.

In January, Jennifer Edmondson and Cindy Chapman met with a room full of engineers and departmental representatives discussing the upcoming Westbury Drainage and Streets Sub-Project 1. The use of 311 data was discussed during this meeting for 3 different topics.

- * Extent of drainage problems in the target area? The engineers showed a map with every 311 complaint about structural flooding in that general area in Westbury. A discussion ensued that there had not been very many 311 complaints (despite this being a known problem area to residents for drainage problems), so we also discussed the data collected by the WCC.
- * Should the water lines be replaced? The engineers discussed that the old cast-iron water piping on these streets was replaced in the 1980s and 1990s with PVC, some segments may have newer PVC, and that the old cast-iron piping has been left in place. Only 4 complaints have been made to 311 about water quality, and there was discussion whether this is sufficient justification to replace the water lines now or to defer later to do the water lines.
- * Should the sewer lines be moved? The old sewer lines from the 1950s have been rehabbed and there have been few 311 complaints about sewer service. The newer design is to put sewer lines in the public right of way, in front of the house.

Broken Trash & Recycling Cans

If the City trash truck takes or damages your trash cans, please report it to 311. After you get your service number, call the WCC office to let us know the SR number so we can help expedite your trash can issue. This has proven to be very successful method for most residents.

Many residents have called the office in the past 2 months with their SR numbers for missing trash cans. Some have been calling the City since July! If you have reported a damaged or missing trash can to the City in the past several months but have not received a replacement can, please call 311 and re-report.

Make sure to write down your Service Request (SR) number. Then call the WCC office with your SR number

If you have called the WCC office in the past 2-3 months with your SR number but you still do not have a trash can, please call the WCC office and let Jennifer know. There was a short time frame that the City did not have cans in stock.

Homeowner Assistance Program - Harvey Recovery

The City of Houston has announced a new program, Homeowner Assistance Program (HOAP) to help Houstonians whose homes were damaged by Hurricane Harvey. Tom McCasland, Director of the City Housing and Community Development Dept., emphasized that the City has moved quickly to ensure recovery was launched as soon as federal funds became available. McCasland said. "The contract for the money was signed on the 4th, today is the 14th - it's ten days later and we're rolling out programs." The City will receive the \$1.17 billion for housing recovery through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and the State of Texas General Land Office. The City has taken a critical step forward with the opening of four Housing Resource Centers, one in each quadrant of the city, to help assist homeowners.

If your home flooded during Harvey, you may be eligible for assistance. Anyone who may be eligible must first complete a survey. The City has several ways to complete the survey.

- → By phone at 832-393-0550 (Monday Friday, 9am 5pm
- → In person at any of the new centers, the closest one to Westbury is the Southwest location at 6464 Savoy Drive, Suite 110, Houston 77036. Free parking.
- → Mobile outreach teams are also available to serve home-bound residents and others.

After you fill out the survey, you will be notified if you qualify and then start the application process. This money is from the federal government, so it has stipulations. The majority of the funds will be prioritized to seniors, disabled, and families whose income is less than 80% of the AMI (average median income). If there is money remaining, there are funds available even for those at 120% of AMI and higher. If you suffered a loss for which you were not reimbursed, fill out the survey. If you still have needs, fill out the survey. Whether your needs are physical or mental, there are resources.

Mayor Turner stated, "Our goal is to reach and serve as many of the affected homeowners as possible, especially those who are hardest to reach – our disadvantaged, senior citizens, those with limited English proficiency and those with special needs. We will not leave anyone behind."

To give you an idea of 80% income limits by family size according to one source:

Family Size	Income
1	\$41,950
2	\$47,950
3	53,950
4	59,900
5	\$64,700

HOAP has five program options that you may be eligible to participate in if you qualify after taking the survey. There is roughly \$400 million available for HOAP.

Reimbursement: You may be eligible for reimbursement of some expenses if you've completed repairs.

Acquisition: If your home was substantially damaged, you may be eligible to have your property purchased by the City. You may also be eligible to apply for additional assistance to purchase a new home.

City Managed Rehabilitation and Reconstruction: The City will use a pool of contractors to rehabilitate or reconstruct storm-damaged homes. The City will manage and complete the construction process on your behalf.

Homeowner Managed Rehabilitation:

This option is only available if you have already started construction on your home and are under contract at the time of application but need financial assistance and technical expertise to complete repairs.

Interim mortgage assistance: If you are making both a mortgage payment on your storm-damaged home and making a rental payment for a temporary home, you may be eligible to receive up to 20 months of mortgage assistance.

ReBuild Westbury

The City of Houston's infamous ReBuild Houston projects are finally coming to Westbury. The WCC often hears comments like "We pay all this money into the drainage fee but nothing ever happens here in Westbury." Well, this is IT! Our ReBuild Houston projects are finally starting! In 2015 and early 2016, Westbury was selected to receive a multi-phase, \$100 million, storm drain reconstruction project. This project was delayed due to Harvey but is finally coming back onto the books. The first sub-project of six in Westbury is located in Westbury 4 East. This section is roughly bordered by Landsdowne to the West, Ludington to the North, Atwell to the East, and Ettrick to the South. There is a map located to the right.

The WCC was notified in early January 2019 that the City was once again actively working on the Westbury Drainage Reconstruction plan. On January 17, WCC President Cindy Chapman and Director of Infrastructure and Flooding, Jennifer Edmondson, attended the Technical Review Committee meeting hosted by the City of Houston Public Works. This meeting was for the City departments to discuss different alternatives to the plan before it is submitted for final design. There will be an opportunity very soon, likely in March, for public comment and a

public meeting. The technical meeting was a very high level meeting, but the WCC was glad to be included at this early stage. It is exciting to see this new project in Westbury that could alleviate some of our flooding issues.

The storm drainage reconstruction project includes new streets, new curbs, new storm drains, new street lights, and possibly new water and sewer lines. Westbury has an old, antiquated storm drain system that is no longer up to standards. Some storm drains are only 18 inches wide, the current minimum is 24 inches and even that is not adequate for Westbury's needs. The new proposed storm drain plan would increase the amount of

underground storage immensely by adding much larger storm drains and possibly additional lines where there are currently none. One important factor is that the City cannot increase the amount of water or rate of flow into the Willow Waterhole Bayou to more than currently enters the channel now. This means the outfall pipe into the bayou will remain the current size. Until Harris County Flood Control District (HCFCD) adds more detention or does channel improvements, nothing can change about the amount of water entering the bayou. The WCC is still advocating to HCFCD for channel improvements on the Willow Waterhole Bayou in Westbury. This includes many options such as de-silting the bayou, widening the bayou, adding detention upstream of Westbury, and possible buy-outs.

ReBuild Houston Committee

Cindy Chapman, WCC President and newly elected Chair of the Houston Super Neighborhood Alliance, is participating on a small committee to improve the information provided on the ReBuild Houston website. The committee includes: Carol Haddock, Director of Houston Public Works; Steve Costello, Chief Recovery Officer; and six representatives from neighborhoods and organizations in Houston. The team looked at the current website information. The initial comments were that the map is not working, there are too many numbers and details on the initial pages, and that it would be better to initially provide overview information graphically and then let users select more details deeper and deeper.

Why is Westbury 4 East the FIRST project?

Westbury 4 East has historically experienced the most repetitive flooding. This is due to many issues, but a big issue is inadequate storm drains. The drains are too small, too old, and too few. Some homes in this section of Westbury have flooded over 12 times since 1968. ReBuild Houston's original tag line was "Worst First." In Westbury, Section 4 East is the worst. When the WCC first started advocating heavily for a Storm Drain reconstruction project, our main area of concern was the East side of Hillcroft. This Sub-project 1 was awarded before the Memorial Day Flood that affected Parkwest 3 and the subsequent Tax Day Flood and Harvey Flood.

Everyone wants their section fixed, but the City has to start somewhere. Westbury has SIX sub-projects. We have included a rough map of the sections and the current order of planned projects. (See page to the right) At this time, the only project funded and scheduled is Sub-Project 1. Since 2015, the project order and scope has changed several times. It is likely that some changes will happen in the future as the projects start and get mapped out.


History of the Westbury Storm Drainage Reconstruction Project

The Westbury Civic Club has been advocating for new storm drains in Westbury for over 10 years. In April 2013, Westbury experienced a flood event in which over 150 homes flooded. In 2014, the City of Houston asked for public input for the "Draft 5+5 Year' ReBuild Houston Plan, FY 2015 – FY 2024. The Westbury Civic Club printed the form in the Crier and requested for residents who flooded anytime in the past to please fill it out. At the 2014 District K Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) meeting, the WCC presented the "Public Input" forms to Public Works from residents to substantiate flooding issues. From the data gathered, we were able to put together a map to show where the floodwaters have entered houses in Westbury. The WCC requested that the City initiate an engineering study of this problem area - specifically the area West of Chimney Rock along the Willow Waterhole Bayou. Some sections of Westbury had flooded 7 or more times by this time in 2014. This does not include the Memorial Day Flood (2015), Halloween Flood (2015), Tax Day Flood (2016), or Harvey Flood (2017).

At the 2015 District K Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) meeting, it was announced that Westbury had been chosen for a pre-engineering study and that in the 2020 CIP year, we were scheduled to have a street drainage and reconstruction project. This was decided before the Memorial Day Flood and subsequent floods. Almost the entire Westbury neighborhood was pre-engineered in December of 2015. In April 2016, the City held a public meeting at Westbury High School for the upcoming ReBuild Houston projects. This meeting was well attended as it occurred only 3 days after the "Tax Day" flood and residents were frustrated. At the time of the public meeting, the phases of the drainage project had not been finalized.

The Westbury area drainage project was put on hold after Harvey. By this point, work had already begun on the plans for sub-project 1 by the engineering company selected by the City. In late 2018, work started again on the plans. In January 2019, the Westbury Civic Club was contacted by the engineering firm that is working on the Westbury drainage project. We were invited to attend a Technical Review Meeting about the project. This is the first of many meetings regarding this exciting big project.

The Westbury Civic Club (WCC) Board has approved the 2019 Budget at the January WCC board meeting. This year's budget is similar to last year's budget, but with one large change related to public safety (constable patrol program). The WCC operates on a calendar year budget. We estimate our income for the coming year (based on prior history), and then we budget proposed expenditures based on the projected income. This year our projected income and expense is \$389,000.

Our biggest expense is the Westbury Area Patrol (WAP) security control contract with the Precinct 5 constable office. The WAP Patrol had consisted of three deputies for years. In 2014, Pct 5 asked us to increase to 4 deputies. Historically we have not collected sufficient funds to cover the cost of a 4th deputy, which is why we had 3 deputies for years. The civic club has had to dip into our security patrol reserves to pay the added costs of that 4th deputy. The WAP Patrol contract increased 3% in 2018. We did not reduce to 3 deputies in 2018 and were able to cover the cost by depleting the patrol reserve fund we had built up over the last few years. With so much construction and empty homes due to Hurricane Harvey we felt it was important to keep the status quo. The budget for 2019 is for three deputies. This still gives us coverage in the morning, afternoon and night shift. However, if we collect an additional \$81,000 we can add another deputy.

The \$389,000 income and expenses are projected as follows: Westbury Area Patrol— \$246,660 3 deputies

Greenspace— \$25,000 This is taking care of the areas the WCC has adopted and other areas that are not mowed frequently.

WCC Operating Expenses —\$96,840 The General Expense category includes all of the items that go into operating the Civic Club printing and distribution of the Crier, operating an office and staffing it, insurance, professional fees (financial reviews, legal expenses), doing projects and programs, and deed restriction enforcement. Advertising in the monthly news-letter offsets its printing costs.

Year after year our income is about the same. However, if you consider that Westbury has 5,000 homes raising 389,000 should not be a difficult thing to do. We are thankful for those civic minded folks who every year pay their dues and protect their neighborhood. If you've never paid, won't you consider sending in at least \$50.00.

Brays Bayou Association (BBA)

The Brays Bayou Association meets monthly on the 3rd Monday at 7:30 PM at Willow Meadows Baptist. The topic in January was Project Brays, by Gary Zika from the Harris County Flood Control District. Becky Edmondson and Cindy Chapman attended from the Westbury Civic Club.

Brays Bayou extends 31 miles and the total cost of Project Brays will be \$480 million.

Status Update: Detention projects are 100% complete; ten of the 12 Channel improvement segments are complete at 83%; and six of the 12 bridges are completed at 50%. During Hurricane Harvey, the system was functioning, although not fully complete, and it is estimated that the work prevented about 10,000 structures from flooding.

Q: Project Completion? End of 2021

Q: Hillcroft Bridge at Braeswood? Existing bridge will be elevated and a retaining wall added to add channel capacity

Q: Chimney Rock Bridges at Braeswood: Will be replaced. There are discussions to change the traffic lights to be similar to the intersection of Beechnut at S. Rice.

Q: South Rice? Bridges will be replaced.

Q: What is status of the Harris County Flood Reduction Bond work for the Fondren Diversion Channel and Willow Waterhole Bayou (the D140 and the D112 channels)? Gary Zika said that they have completed a detailed study of water levels in that area and that Harris County Commissioner's Court has already approved doing a project, but that Project Brays needs to be completed before they can start work on these tributaries to Brays Bayou. The work is complicated in that projects by different organizations involving multiple engineering studies are planned for this middle section of Brays Bayou, Fondren Diversion Channel, and the Willow Waterhole Bayou which will need to be coordinated. The next steps are: Hire consultants to gather and review the various engineering reports from the different drainage projects planned in the affected areas, decide on a path forward, and then do outreach meetings to discuss the initial recommendations with the public.

SuperNeighborhood Alliance

The Super Neighborhood Alliance (SNA) is an organization comprised of the Presidents or Chairs of Super Neighborhood Councils and serves as a formal advisory board to the Mayor and city government on community matters. City departments often discuss pending ordinances or programs with the SNA to get feedback from the delegates, who tend to be knowledgeable and experienced community activists. We are pleased to announce that Westbury's own Cindy Chapman was voted in as Chair of this organization at the January 2019 meeting. She served on the SNA board as Secretary from 2013-2017.

What is a SuperNeighborhood? The City of Houston identified 88 geographic areas called SuperNeighborhoods where residents, civic organizations, institutions and businesses work together to address the needs and concerns of their community. The Westbury SuperNeighborhood (SN) is bounded by S. Post Oak,

South Main/US 90A, the utility easement located north of Willowbend, and the flood control easement west of Braewick. The Westbury SN meets monthly, hosted by our 501c3 non-profit partner, the Westbury Area Improvement Corporation.

Westbury became a recognized Super-Neighborhood (SN) in March of 2005. This is the mechanism by which the City of Houston disseminates information on many of their programs. Each SN has its own bylaws, but here is an overview of how the Westbury SN works. We have a two-part council, and official SN proclamations are approved by the boards of both organizations - the Westbury Area Improvement Corporation and the Westbury Civic Club, both of which meet on the 3rd Wednesday.

Our non-profit 501c3 partner, the Westbury Area Improvement Corporation (WAIC) hosts the morning Westbury SN meeting at 9:30 AM at St John's Presbyterian Church on the 3rd

Wednesday each month. Since this meeting occurs during business hours, this is the meeting attended by representatives from the local businesses, apartments, schools, churches, and community organizations. Schools are an important part of our neighborhood and the Principal or Assistant Principals from Parker Elementary, Anderson Elementary, Meyerland Middle, and Westbury High bring updates about their schools. Most months we also have constituent representatives at the meeting on behalf



of local politicians: District K Council Member Martha Castex-Tatum (Barbara Hite), Texas Senator Borris Miles (Mary Seymore), and the Mayor's assistance office (Veronica Hernandez). The Department of Neighborhoods (DoN) often sends an inspector so that we can discuss long-standing nuisance problems. We have had METRO, Public Works, the Parks Department, Solid Waste and others visit in the past. Community people at the meeting represent different organizations in the neighborhood such as: Friends of Chimney Rock Park; Westbury Little League; the Westbury Community Garden; Willow Waterhole; Levitt Pavilion Houston; SWHouston 2000; nearby SNs; the Brays Oaks Management District; and the Brays Bayou Association. The second half of the SN meeting takes place on the 3rd Wednesday at 7PM at Westbury Baptist Church at the monthly WCC meeting. The members of the WCC board attend and all residents are invited to come

Since the injured officer is unable to receive a regular paycheck or pursue any overtime pay, or additional income from working a second job, his or her family is at risk of not meeting its needs. This is where this organization, the Houston Police Family Support Unit, provides assistance. The Family Support Unit helps these officers by providing materials and support during such difficult times. Many of the officers and their family members need emotional as well as day-to-day support. The members of the Family Support Unit are prepared and willing to step up and assist the family with some of their basic needs.

Along with helping an officer and his family in a time of need, another goal is to bring together the families of the Houston Police Department and the members of the community in order to support the officers of The Houston Police Department. By hosting the inaugural Back the Blue 5K, we hope to do just that. We hope that the community will come together to show the Houston Police Department how

important it is to our city. Consider participating on February 9, 2019, as either an event sponsor or runner/walker. Along with a 5K race, there will be a one-mile fun run and other community activities.



Public Safety Information from Westbury Area Patrol

Here is a summary of the report made by our Westbury Area Patrol (WAP) lead constable, Sgt. Derkowski, during the January 2019 Westbury Civic Club meeting. His report is available in a video posted of the January meeting on the Westbury Houston Facebook page, starting near the 19:00 minute point and extending to about the 27:30 minute point of the video.

Sgt. Derkowski noted that crime in January had been slow, but that there had been a lot of property crime in December, much of it suspected to be linked to a team of 3 criminals doing car break-ins across Houston. These suspects are driving a light-colored or silver Impala, and fingerprints have been obtained. In January, the constables were called to do a welfare check on a resident and it was determined that the resident had passed away. The constables handled a family dispute and also an abandoned vehicle on a roadway. Sgt. Derkowski provides frequent written reports to the WCC office and the WCC President regarding issues and criminal activity.

He continues to develop a spreadsheet of residents who have video cameras and who are willing to share video for investigations.

In the period since Constable Ted Heap was elected, the Precinct 5 Constable program continues to improve. Precinct 5 now has a Criminal Investigations Division, Strategic Response Units, a Narcotics unit, and a Major Offenders Unit. The constables are being issued vests which will resist rifle shots and body cameras will be coming. Sgt. Derkowski is trained, and has the equipment, to take fingerprints. He also has had an AFIS unit (a portable fingerprint scanner) for 5

years. During the board meeting, it was discussed that having an AFIS unit available keeps our constables in Westbury longer since they can verify identification without having to leave the area.

Vacation Watch If you pay your Westbury Area Patrol dues, make sure you request a vacation watch by the Constables. This is a great service that is included in our contract. WCC Mail Bag: Constable Program

We asked on the WCC Facebook page (Westbury Houston) for your questions about the Westbury Area Patrol (constables). Here are several excellent questions submitted by resident Annie Bradford.

- → How do other neighborhoods finance/supplement their local area patrols? Can we learn from the examples of other communities?

 Maplewood SN, Marilyn Estates, Barkley Square and Meyerland also hire Precinct 5 Constables. Unlike Westbury, these other 4 neighborhoods have Mandatory Assessments, ranging from \$240 to \$275 per home for the Constables.
- → Consider modernizing the payment system with a monthly EFT draft option. One recommendation from the 2019 Budget committee was to review payment options. Residents would like to pay with a credit card in the office or on the phone. EFT drafts are another option. A new committee just formed at the January WCC board meeting to look at this along with other ways to encourage payment of the WCC dues.
- → What are some ways to gradually phase in mandatory dues for other sections? Mandatory Assessments must be approved as a revision to the deed restrictions by a majority of the property owners. Even under the best of conditions, this can be a challenging endeavor. As a first step, it is important to encourage residents who have voluntary dues to understand the importance of these payments. For example, it would theoretically be easier to move to mandatory assessments in an area of Westbury that already has more than 50% of the property owners paying voluntary dues. As can be seen in the examples above, when EVERYONE is paying, then the shared cost is less per household.

Conclusions: Westbury should have more constables than we do, and is limited by majority of the homes having Voluntary dues instead of Mandatory Assessments. Ideally, Westbury would have between 6 to 8 constables, to provide better coverage 24/7/365. The WCC board approved a 2019 budget which reduces the number of constables from 4 to 3. The WCC has spent all its security reserves and the WCC must be prudent based on historical financial support of the constable program.

District K Training Class "ENGAGE. LEARN. LEAD"

District K sponsored a training class for community leaders and volunteers on Saturday, January 19, as the first seminar in their "ENGAGE. LEARN. LEAD" series. WCC President Cindy Chapman attended for the Westbury Civic Club. The seminar was taught by attorney Jane Cahill West, a past President of the Super Neighborhood Alliance (SNA) and current Secretary of the SNA, on the topic of "Effective Civic Association Structure and Strategies". The class discussed the purposes of civic organizations, bylaws, committees, finances, recruiting, running meetings, records, and emerging issues.

Civic associations are "integral to creating safe and healthy communities where residents can effectively address issues" and are useful to:

- * Build community
- * Build relationships with elected officials, administrators, and others
- * Improve quality of life: abate crime, address traffic issues, promote beautification, attract and achieve public improvements

Possible Changes to Fire Department

Houston Fire Department Chief Pena was the invited speaker for the January 8, 2019, breakfast hosted by community organization SWHouston2000 and the Brays Oaks Management District at Houston Baptist University.

Chief Pena noted that the Houston Fire Department is the 3rd largest in the USA. Resources are needed for equipment, training, and for firefighter pay. Proposition B, approved by voters in 2018, is estimated to require about 100 million in additional pay costs every year for fire department personnel.

A ladder truck costs about one million dollars and a fully stocked ambulance costs about \$200,000. It is very costly to respond to 911 emergency calls using large fire trucks. The department is evaluating how to re-allocate Emergency Medical Services by adding more ambulances, since 10% of calls are due to fire and the other 90% are EMS response. Currently there are 21 districts, so there might be some consolidation of districts.

The fire department is considering ways to provide similar level of service by changing the design of work shifts. Currently the fire department has 4 shifts of 24 hours, with about 850 positions per shift. Houston has more shifts than is typical at other cities because other cities follow federal law of 53 hours before overtime is paid. In Houston, firefighters receive overtime pay after 47.5 hours on the job. The department is considering an option to change to 3 shifts and to keep within overtime requirements by scheduling.
