WCC Board Notes - January 2021

- Guests: Sgt. Nick Derkowski, Westbury Area Patrol; At-Large 5 CM Sallie Alcorn; Didi Chavis, Chief of Staff for District K; Allure Anoma for TX Rep Shawn Thierry; Richard Nguyen, Solid Waste Dept
- CM Alcorn discussed status of COVID vaccinations in Houston and urged eligible residents to sign up.
- Sgt. Derkowski, WAP Precinct 5 Constables, noted that there have been a lot of burglaries in garages or in vacant houses during the night. Additional patrols are being deployed to Westbury area.
- The WCC ended the year with a loss, even after taking steps to cut expenses. Additionally, the income for the Constable Westbury Area Patrol (WAP) was short. The WCC dipped into its reserves to cover both losses. In 2021, we need to focus of fundraising. The WCC is still transitioning to our new software system. A generous resident has offered to match \$5,000 of donations by residents above the basic "ask" for the Patrol Program.






→ NEW Library Update

All About Trash

Trash, yard waste, recycling, and heavy trash are picked up by the City of Houston.

Regular Household Trash

Pick-up is EVERY Thursday. Regular household trash goes into the black trash can.

Yard Waste

Pick-up is EVERY week either on Thursday or Saturday or any day the City decides to come by. Yard Waste MUST be placed in the correct City bio-degradable bags.



Recycling in Westbury

All of Westbury recycles on Schedule A. Recycling is every other week. Recycling goes into the green trash can.

In the 1980s, Westbury had a very active Flood Action Group that was instrumental in getting changes and action. The WCC board reactivated this group at the October WCC board meeting. Why Support the WCC?

Westbury is a unique neighborhood. While all 5,000 homes in our Westbury neighborhood have active deed restrictions, only 463 have mandatory assessments. This means the Westbury Civic Club heavily relies on voluntary financial contributions from residents.

Westbury has historically had strong voluntary support because residents understood the great benefits of the WCC and our programs. The past several years contributions to the Westbury Civic Club and Westbury Area Patrol have been down. By working together, we can meet the challenges head on and keep our neighborhood the jewel that it is. We all want a safe, flood free neighborhood with great schools and nice neighbors!

The total amount for the **2021 Voluntary dues** are \$360. That is less than a dollar a day! The Westbury Civic Club dues are \$60 for the year. The WCC suggests a contribution of \$300 for the Westbury Area Patrol (a paid contract with Precinct 5 Constables).

Why are Westbury Dues Mailed to a Dallas Address?

You are mailing your payments directly to our bank's processing center in Dallas. This allows your payments to be processed immediately. You may also drop off the payment directly to the WCC Office or pay online at www.westburycrier.com

You may choose any amount to

pay in any increment throughout

the year.

Here are a few examples:

2 payments of \$180 is \$360/yr

3 payments of \$120 is \$360/yr

4 payments of \$90 is \$360/yr

NEW ONLINE RESIDENT PORTAL COMING SOON

We have heard from our residents that they would like to have better options for communications with and payments to the Westbury Civic Club. We agree! We are excited to announce that the WCC is transitioning to a new property management software which adds some features that you residents have been requesting.

We will have a single portal where homeowners can make online payments, view payment history, view important documents, submit requests, and update contact information. The new system will make it easier for you to contact us, and for us to contact you and to be able to track your requests or concerns. There will be more payment options available, including the ability to set up auto-pay scheduled payments.

The office is currently working on the transfer of data and we should have the new system up and running for you early in 2021, Future Criers will have detailed instructions on how to access and use the new system.

In the meantime for those of you that like to pay your dues early, please continue to use the dues form below or paypal.com. You can still pay your dues through our website, www.westburycrier.com.

Go to westburycrier.com then to the Dues and Assessments page.

The available payment options on the selection menu are:

- → WCC Dues \$60
- → WCC Constable \$300
- → WCC Dues + Constable \$60 + \$300 = \$360
- → Additional Donation of \$100 or more


Bandit Sign Update from District K Keeping Westbury Clean

People who staple signs to telephone poles and crowd them at intersections, sidewalks, and esplanades aren't only creating eyesores in neighborhoods, they're breaking the law. These signs are called "bandit signs".

Bandit signs are typically small and placed in large quantities along public spaces such as esplanades. These signs include political, real estate, developer, and garage sale signs, etc. and are placed upon a public street, public sidewalk, public right-ofway, on any public building, or on any structure of any kind belonging to the city (such as street light poles, telephone or power poles, street signs).

Perhaps looking around Westbury you don't think that there is much of a problem with bandit signs, but that is only because much effort is devoted every month to collecting these illegal signs. Bandit signs are collected by Westbury Civic Club volunteers, the District K "Hot Team" clean up crew, and by the Brays Oaks Management District. For example, the Brays Oaks District collected 1,728 illegal signs during the year 2020 along major roads in BOMD, which includes all of Westbury. BOMD also collected 1,869 large bags of trash in the district. Several members of the Westbury Civic Club board participate in monthly BOMD committees to help provide input and oversight into this program, which helps keep our major Westbury streets looking attractive.

District K Council Representative Martha Castex-Tatum notes: "When I kicked off our #CleanStateofMind campaign two years ago, our District K Hot Team and management districts were routinely picking up over 600 bandit signs a month from our community. These nuisance signs were posted on telephone poles, traffic signs, in the city esplanades and on every corner of every intersection. This visual spam contributes to the debris in our drains and litter on our roadways.



amendment that allowed the city legal department to file a law suit against repeat offenders, who continued to plaster their predatory signs in our communities, and fine them up to \$1000 per sign.



Today I'm happy to report Senator Borris Miles has filed a bandit sign bill that would increase the civil penalty even more. Protecting our neighborhoods and removing unnecessary blight takes a lot of effort and costs thousands of dollars a month. Help us keep our community clean and beautiful. I'll keep you posted on the bill. Inbox me if you want the info to follow the bill this legislative session. We are committed to making our community one we can all be proud of."

Work Coming Soon: Hillcroft Bridge over Willow Waterhole Bayou

The southbound bridge on Hillcroft that goes over the Willow Waterhole is one step closer to being replaced. This bridge is deficient and had temporary emergency repairs made several years ago so traffic could continue to use it.

In January of 2021, the Westbury Civic Club was informed that Houston City Council voted to appropriate funds for an agreement between the City and TXDOT to acquire Flood Plain Permits for the replacement or rehabilitation of 10 structurally deficient bridges in Houston. One of these bridges in Westbury along Hillcroft at the Willow Waterhole

City of Houston has plans to improve the southbound bridge on Hillcroft which goes over the Willow Waterhole Bayou. The Westbury Civic Club does not yet know when the bridge project will begin.

Chimney Rock Waterline Replacement Inspection

On January 7, Jennifer Edmondson, Beckv Edmondson, and Cindy Chapman, from the WCC, met outside along Chimney Rock with Melvin Hopkins (Director of Constituent Services for District K), District K CouncilMember Martha Castex -Tatum, and Nancy Serag-Eldin, an assistant project manager with Houston Public Works. The purpose of the meeting was to review the work the city had done (replaced a major water line along Chimney Rock) and to review the status before the contractor warranty was going to expire. The group first reviewed the project scope and work completed on paper. After this talk, Becky Edmondson joined Nancy Serag-Eldin and Melvin Hopkins as they walked the work area and noted issues that possibly warranted some concrete repair work.





As we complete projects in our district, we are also checking them again prior to their warranty expiring. There are so many moving parts in the district and I appreciate residents who make time to learn about projects and what to look for when projects are complete. Today we walked the water line replacement project along Chimney Rock with the project inspector."

This project meeting was very informative and we thank CM Martha Castex-Tatum for setting up the meeting. Nancy Serag-Eldin, the project manager, said that she will be working on the upcoming Street and Drainage project in Westbury, so it was great timing to meet her and establish a working relationship for the future.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEARING WITH TCEQ

As reported in the January 2021 Westbury Crier newsletter, Solugen Chemicals (located at 14539 Minetta, to the west of the Westbury Community Garden), has made an application to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for an environmental air permit (permit #160902). The WCC was made aware of this air permit request in the Spring of 2020. Concerned about the safety of the nearby community, we asked our elected officials to request a hearing. Both Senator Borris Miles and State Rep. Shawn Thierry requested a public hearing.

The Public Hearing was held online on Thursday, January 21, 2021. Information about this meeting was published in the January Westbury Crier newsletter and on the WCC Facebook page, Westbury Houston.

representation at its best. TX Senator Borris Miles, TX Rep. Shawn Thierry, and District K City Councilmember Martha Castex-Tatum were all at the meeting asking important questions. Melvin Hopkins, Field Services Director for District K, had even visited the plant to see it firsthand. In the informal part of the hearing, many questions were asked by those in the virtual audience relating to safety issues and emissions of Volatile Organic Compounds (VOCs) to the air. Representing the local Super Neighborhood Councils #36 (Brays Oaks SNC) and #37 (Westbury SNC) were: Sylvia Rivas, Cindy Chapman, and Becky Edmondson. Associate Professor of Environmental Management, Dr. Lisa Gossett, who lives nearby, was also on hand to ask questions.

With Haviland Park, Foerster Elementary, homes, apartments, and a community garden nearby, it is important to know the long term effects of any air emissions from VOCs (Volatile Organic Compounds). It's also important to have safety protocols in place to be able to notify the surrounding community IF there is an accident. The previous chemical plant in this location had a violent explosion in 2004. The Houston Chronicle just reported another cluster of childhood leukemia cases in an industrial area in east Houston. We want to make sure that this new chemical facility won't be harming the people who live and work and go to school nearby.

At the end of the informal session, there were still unanswered questions. Senator Miles, in his formal comments, requested a thirty day extension to get those answers. We are happy to report a 30 day extension was granted by the TCEQ.

Westbury Area Patrol Crime Report

Sgt. Nick Derkowski of the Precinct 5 WAP Constable's Patrol provided an update to the Westbury Civic Club board meeting in January. He said crime is up, not just in Westbury, but across the city. The jail is a revolving door and one recent arrest was the same man whom they had arrested just six months earlier. Extra patrol units from Precinct 5 Constables have been allocated, along with a drone unit that makes looking for fleeing suspects easier. The majority of the break-ins have been of garages and in unoccupied homes that are for sale or lease or under renovation.

Precinct 5 is continuing its motorcycle traffic patrols on Willowbend and other areas. The other trend has been an increase in calls related to domestic violence.

Community Partner in Focus

Westbury SuperNeighborhood

Westbury became a recognized SuperNeighborhood in March of 2005. SuperNeighbhorhoods (SN) are geographically designated areas where residents, civic organizations, institutions and businesses work together to identify, plan, and set priorities to address the needs and concerns of their community. Activated SNs are recognized entities of the City of Houston. The City created this program to be the mechanism by which they disseminate information to neighborhoods, businesses, etc. There are over 900 individual HOAs, civic club, and property association groups in the City of Houston, the SNs make it easier to all groups to have access to information.

Each SN has its own bylaws, and Westbury is a very unique SN since we are such a large neighborhood. Here is a overview of how Westbury SN works. We have a two-part council, one part is the Westbury Area Improvement Corporation (WAIC) and the other is the Westbury Civic Club (WCC). Official SN proclamations are approved by the boards of both organizations – the WAIC and the WCC, both of which meet on the 3rd Wednesday.

The WAIC, a non-profit 501c3, meets at 9:30am on the 3rd Wednesday. This meeting is currently being held via Zoom and live streamed on the WAIC Houston Facebook page. The WAIC meeting is regularly attended by representatives from the local businesses, schools, churches, and community organizations. Schools are an important part of our neighborhood and the Principal or Assistant principals from Parker Elementary, Anderson Elementary, Meyerland Middle, and Westbury High bring updates about their schools. Most months City representatives also attend the WAIC meeting. District K City Council office as well as Mayor's Assistance Office send reps each month. This is a direct line to the City. Other City Departments have visited in the past or given presentations. They included the Department of Neighborhoods, Public Works, Parks Dept., and Solid Waste, and others. The Sergeant for the Westbury Area Patrol also attends the WAIC meeting.

The WCC meets at 7PM on the 3rd Wednesday. The WCC meeting is currently being held via Zoom and live streamed on the Westbury Houston Facebook page. The meeting is regularly attended by City Council members or their employees. District K and At-Large 5 are common visitors. Solid Waste sends a rep to the monthly WCC meeting as well. The WCC meeting is considered

Westbury Volunteer Spotlight Local Westbury Girl Scout Al and Hazel Potvin Creates Nature Trail

Volunteers are the lifeblood of non-profit organizations. And, Westbury is blessed with so many incredible volunteers. This February we would like to show some special love to two in particular, Allen and Hazel Potvin. The Westbury Civic Club salutes you and wants you to know just how grateful our neighborhood is for your many years of service.

Back in 2010, Hazel Potvin hosted a meeting around her kitchen table where the "Working on Westbury" (WOW) initiative was born. As a Master Gardener and lover of all things green and growing, Hazel has left the evidence of her green thumb all over Westbury. She was a member of the WCC Green Team that measured and cataloged our esplanades and worked on plans to improve them with more trees and plants. She was instrumental in starting the first wildflower garden, which was originally at Chimney Rock and West Bellfort, and later was relocated to the Westbury Community Garden. She is the force behind the native plant demonstration area at the Willow Waterhole along South Willow. As President of the Friends of Chimney Rock Park, she and her friends planted the wildflowers and other native plants which grace those grounds. Hazel has been a member of the Westbury Community Garden since its inception in 2010. Her passion at the garden is the Pocket Prairie (a small prairie) where she and Noreen Heard have identified many prairie species and set up a walk to introduce people to the importance of prairies. Hazel, thank you for all your efforts to keep Westbury green and native and educated about prairies.

Her husband of over 50 years, Allen Potvin, is Westbury's trail advocate. For many years, Allen has mowed trails along the bayou that runs between Hummingbird and Bankside: the Burdine easement from Willowbend to West Bellfort; and the banks along the Willow Waterhole Bayou. Allen donates hundreds of hours a year maintaining those areas and keeping our waterways cleaner by making sure debris, that could cause flooding, is removed. Some people are happy just to throw their trash and limbs and other debris over their fences and onto the flood control easements. Allen either moves this debris or works with the Harris County Flood Control District to get it removed. In 2020, Allen was the person who was able to get the Hummingbird/ Bankside trail opened by working with the owners whose fences blocked the access, and he then removed undergrowth and trash trees that had filled some of that area. Thanks to Allen, residents can now walk the entire length of this unimproved trail all the way from the city water tower at Braewick to the Willow Waterhole complex. His nickname "Boots on the Ground Potvin" is one he has definitely earned. But it's not just his labors, as a retiree of Exxon, his volunteer hours earn real dollars for the nonprofits that he volunteers for! His volunteer hours have benefited the WAIC, the Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy, and the Westbury Community Garden.

Volunteers Help Plant New Pollinator Garden at the WCG

On Wednesday, January 20, a group of gardeners and volunteers from KIPP-MOSAIC planted 16 trees and 9 shrubs for a new pollinator garden along the east side and north side of the 7-acre garden site. Trees For Houston donated the trees for the garden, and taught the volunteers how to properly plant the trees.

KIPP-MOSAIC is a new campus of the KIPP charter school system. It is located at the corner of S. Main (HWY 90) and Hillcroft. School principal Ryan Pressley and other staff from KIPP-MOSAIC volunteered during the January work-day at the garden.



As these trees and shrubs develop, they should help shield the

garden from the lights of the gas station near the garden. But more importantly, these newly planted native trees will be good for all kinds of birds and pollinators. Shumard Oaks grow straight and tall and will drop their leaves in the fall after turning red. Drummond Red Maples will also turn red in the fall and drop leaves. Two Southern Magnolias will keep their shiny green leaves, as will the seven Loblolly pines that were planted. In between the trees, you will notice Wax Myrtle shrubs have been planted. Wax Myrtles also keep their shiny green leaves all year, and their berries are popular with birds.
