

WCC Board Notes - January 2022

- → The WCC board approved the 2022 Budget, see page 8.
- → The WCC board voted to fill two vacant board positions: Andrew Jefferson as Section Director for Westbury 5 and Stephen Deavult as Director of Security.
- → Harris County Flood Control District talked about the status of bridge construction and will work with WCC to hold a meeting to discuss area HCFCD flood mitigation projects. Other attendees represented City Solid Waste Dept, US Rep. Lizzie Fletcher's office, and 4 City Council districts.
- → The board discussed a tax-credit apartment complex proposed near Glenshire subdivision on Riceville School Road. The board voted for the WCC to send a letter against the proposed site. The WAIC and the Westbury Super Neighborhood will also send a letter.
- The next Westbury Civic Club board meeting will be held via zoom on Wednesday, February 16 at 7PM.










Map of Westbury by Section

All About Trash

Trash, yard waste, recycling, and heavy trash are picked up by the City of Houston.

Regular Household Trash

Pick-up is EVERY Thursday. Regular household trash goes into the black trash can.

Yard Waste

Pick-up is EVERY week either on Thursday or Saturday or any day the City decides to come by. Yard Waste MUST be placed in the correct City bio-degradable bags.



Recycling in Westbury

All of Westbury recycles on Schedule A. Recycling is every other week. Recycling goes into the green trash can.

Why Support the WCC?

Westbury is a unique neighborhood. While all 5,000 homes in our Westbury neighborhood have active deed restrictions, only 463 have mandatory assessments. This means the Westbury Civic Club heavily relies on voluntary financial contributions from residents.

Westbury has historically had strong voluntary support because residents understood the great benefits of the WCC and our programs. The past several years' contributions to the Westbury Civic Club and to the Westbury Area Patrol have been down. By working together, we can meet the challenges head on and keep our neighborhood the jewel that it is. We all want a safe, flood free neighborhood with great schools and nice neighbors.

The total amount for the **2022 Voluntary Dues is \$365**. That is well worth a dollar a day! The Westbury Civic Club dues are \$60 for the year. The WCC suggests a contribution of \$305 for the Westbury Area Patrol (a paid contract with Precinct 5 Constables).

Cindy has been the president of the Westbury SuperNeighborhood for many years. She was the guest speaker at the WAIC's (Westbury Area Improvement Corporation) January meeting and talked about topics of interest at the January SNA meeting where


Mayor Turner fielded questions from the SNA members. Looking forward in 2022, the Noise ordinance as well as the Sidewalk ordinance are hot topics as is the Solid Waste Department. All of these issues are important to the quality of life across the City as well as in Westbury.



Becky Edmondson was selected as Vice Chair of Keep Houston Beautiful (KHB). Becky has served on the Houston Clean City commission as the Council District representative for District K since 2015. Keep Houston Beautiful has been an important partner to the Westbury area. In 2005, Westbury received a Green Thumb grant and worked on the two miles of Hillcroft: planting 100 trees, removing the invasive Chinese tallow, creating a raingarden, creating a demonstration mulch trail and mulching all the existing trees. In 2010, Westbury received a grant through KHB from Scotts Miracle Gro to create the Westbury

Community Garden. For two decades, Westbury has hosted a Keep Houston Beautiful Day event. Mark your calendars for this year's event on April 2.

There is a lot of good news coming out of Westbury High School even though COVID has challenged attendance for both students and teachers.

In the January Battle of the Bands competition, held in Arlington, both the Westbury Marching Band and the Blue Diamonds took first place! Congratulations!



Our condolences go out to the family and friends of Theresa Pollard Burkart. She passed away on January 20 leaving behind her husband, Ernest, and son, Orion. Theresa was a lifelong Westbury resident, graduating from Westbury High School in 1983.

Over a span of more than 30 years, hundreds of Westbury youngsters were introduced to the sport of swimming by Theresa. Theresa Pollard was only a teenager when she started coaching the Westbury Swim Team at the City Pool at Westbury Park. "The city started up a free swimming program and the lifeguards weren't crazy about doing it, so I volunteered," she said in an interview back in 2007. Little did she know that nearly 30 years later, she'd still be team coach. Even though the City of Houston discontinued its free summer swim league program around 2004, Pollard and some dedicated parent volunteers took it upon themselves to make sure Westbury's swim team didn't dissolve. In 2006, when the City wanted to fill in the swimming pool at Westbury Park and replace it with a splash pad, Theresa was one of the voices who successfully insisted that having a public swimming pool and teaching children to swim was important. The swimming pool at Westbury Park was kept and improved.

2022 Primary Elections

We take great pride that voters in Westbury are engaged and vote at a higher rate than is typical in Houston and Texas. The 2022 Texas primary elections for the Democratic and Republican parties are Tuesday, March 1. We encourage you to research the candidates and select your choices in the 2022 primary elections. The League of Women Voters Houston is non-partisan and publishes a Candidate Guide which displays info provided by candidates.

During the 2022 primary elections, Republicans and Democrats will choose which of their candidates will run in the main November election. This primary election will focus on primary candidates for federal, state, and county contests.

VOTE VOTE

What primary do I vote in?

Texas is an open primary state, so registered voters may vote in either primary without declaring a party affiliation until you arrive at the voting center.

Can I vote in both primaries?

No, you may only vote in one party's primary. If there is a primary runoff election, you can only vote in the runoff for the party you voted in during the primary. So if you voted in the Republican primary election, you cannot then vote in a Democratic primary runoff or vice versa.

Can I vote in a runoff election if I did not vote in the primary election? Yes, you can.

What is on the Primary Ballot?

Federal primary races are for US Representatives.

Statewide primary races include Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Commissioner of the General Land Office (GLO), Commissioner of Agriculture, Railroad Commissioner, State Senators, State Representatives, many judicial positions, and more.

County primary races include County Judge, District Clerk, County Clerk, County Treasure, and many judicial positions.

Go to harrisvotes.com to see a copy of your sample ballot.

How do I know which elections I vote in?

Some contests are statewide, such as Governor. But for local representation races, your address determines which races you will vote in. The State of Texas and Harris County have redrawn the political maps used in elections, so most Westbury residents are now in different districts than in the past. Maps and information will be available at the Harris County Elections website at www.HarrisVotes.com.

What do I need to bring to vote?

State law requires registered voters to present one of 7 forms of identification in order to vote in person at a polling location. They include: Texas driver's license issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety, Texas Election Identification Certificate issued by DPS, Texas personal identification card issued by DPS, Texas license to carry a handgun issued by DPS, US military ID card containing person's photograph, US citizenship certificate containing the person's photograph, US passport.

Who can vote via mail?

The State of Texas only allows registered voters to cast a mail-in ballot in certain circumstances. To be able to vote by mail in Texas you must meet one of the following requirements: be 65 years or older; be sick or disabled; be out of the county on election day and during the period for early voting by personal appearance; be expected to give birth within three weeks before or after Election Day (this is new change to State law). Please be aware that State law has changed about ID to request a mail in ballot and to return your ballot – you must provide either your Driver's License Number or the last 4 digits of your Social Security number, and the information you provide must match information already on file. Consider providing both.

Where are the primary polling locations?

This information was not available when the Crier went to print. You can vote at any polling location in Harris County for Early Voting or for Election Day. This means you can vote near home, near work, near school, or anywhere in Harris County. As we learn more details about locations, we will post the information on the WCC Facebook page. You can also check www.harrisvotes.com for the most up to date information from the Harris County Election.

Important Dates

January 31

Last day to register to vote.

February 14—February 25

Early voting in person at any early polling location in Harris County

February 18

Last day to apply for a request for ballot by mail to be RECEIVED (not postmarked, but RECEIVED by Harris County election). To qualify for Ballot by Mail, you need to be over 65 or qualify for certain specific reasons.

March 1

Election Day. You can vote at any valid polling location within Harris County.

March 1

Last day for mail-in ballots to be postmarked. If they are postmarked by March 1, they need to be received by the county by March 3.

Polling Machine Information

Harris County is using new voting machines. Voting is now a 2-step process. First you will select your choices on a touchscreen and print out a copy of your vote. Then for step 2, you will take your printed ballot to the machine where the vote will be recorded. This process is a bit more time consuming than using the previous machines and more issues were reported at the last election. Bring your patience to the polls!

Animal Regulation Changes in Houston

In good news for our furry friends, city council in January unanimously approved changes to Houston animal regulations. "For the most part, all of these changes were really supported by the animal welfare community," said At-Large Council Member Sallie Alcorn, who led the committee which crafted the revisions. This was the first revision since 2014. Here is a summary of the changes.

Mandatory Microchipping: Currently, the City of Houston requires all pets to be licensed. Now pet owners will have to microchip pet dogs and cats. This change will make it easier to return lost pets to their owners and eliminate the need to bring rescued pets to the shelter for intake and care. While the ordinance changes will be effective immediately, the Bureau of Animal Regulation and Care (BARC) is committed to a year-long education effort on the new requirement. Federal funds are being requested to host several free microchipping events citywide. For more information on how to microchip your pet, consult your vet or the BARC website.

Updating "Adequate Shelter" Standards: In line with recent changes to state law, this requires that outdoor animals always have access to clean drinking water and a shelter that is clean, sturdy, and provides protection from the weather.

Puppy Mill Retail Sales: This revision will require all pet stores within city limits to sell only dogs and cats sourced from a humane organization or municipal/county animal shelter. City officials and advocates said most reputable breeders do not sell their animals to pet stores, which means they will not be affected by the changes.

Aggressive and Dangerous Dogs: By updating this ordinance to mirror changes in state law, the procedure to designate a "dangerous dog" will be streamlined, strengthening the response to animals that attack other animals and keeping Houston neighborhoods safe.

Stray Animals: This revision reduces the hold time on strays at BARC from 72 to 48 hours to allow for adoptions or transfers for animals without microchips. Also, all animals will be required to be spayed or neutered before leaving BARC's possession.

More money has been allocated to help reduce the pet population. In December, City Council approved an additional \$500,000 to BARC for expanded spay and neuter services across the city. In January, Mayor Turner announced plans to allocate an additional \$1 million (from federal funds) to spay and neuter 10,000 more pets. Given the sheer size of Houston and the fact that thousands of stray animals roam the streets each day, a strategic approach is critical to ensuring a true reduction in pet overpopulation across the community over time.





Westbury MailBag

The Westbury Civic Club gets hundreds of emails and calls a month and many people have the same questions. This monthly feature will contain current hot topic and questions!



Q: What is going on with trash collection? Why is the City always late?

A: The City Solid Waste Department is extremely understaffed. They do not have enough drivers to handle all the routes and collection days. In order to still collect all of our trash, the City consolidated some of the schedules temporarily. It is unclear how long this staffing shortage will affect them. Westbury's scheduled recycling collection day is Thursday. Due to the City driver shortage, Thursday recycling is currently being collected on Saturdays or Sundays. The WCC recommends that you still place you recycling can on the curb for Thursday collection, but be aware that the City is likely going to be late.

Q: Why did my recycling get picked up by a blue truck?

A: The color of trash truck does NOT indicate what type of trash is being collected. Many years ago, the recycling trucks were all green, but that has not been the case for several years. If a blue truck collects your recycling can, it does NOT mean it is not being recycled. It just means that is the truck the City is using to collect the recycling that day. If you ever see a City trash truck collect your black and green can in the same truck at the same time, then you should assume it is not being recycled, but the color of truck no longer indicates the type of trash being collected.

Message from Ted Heap, Pct. 5 Constable

Constable Ted Heap and the entire Precinct 5 family mourn the loss of one of their own, Corporal Charles Galloway, who was shot and killed in January in Southwest Houston. Corporal Galloway joined the Precinct 5 family in 2009, serving the residents of Harris County for more than 12 years, most recently in the Toll Road Division, where he served as a Field Training Officer. He was 47 years old.

"Corporal Galloway did not have an opportunity to defend himself in this brutal attack," said Constable Heap. "We cannot have people like this on our streets. I do not want to raise my family, my grandchildren, in a county where this type of crime is running rampant."

"Corporal Galloway was very much loved by the men and women he served with," said Constable Heap. "There's a lot of broken up officers who he meant a lot to in their lives."

The Houston Police Department is investigating. The suspect has not been apprehended as of print time.

How do I contact the Constables?

Call the Precinct 5 Constables Dispatcher at 281.463.6666. When you call dispatch, be sure they get the correct name and spelling of your street. Have them repeat it back to you. Many streets have similar sounding names. Be sure to tell them you are in the Westbury contract.

Request a Vacation Watch

Going on a vacation? Well, if you pay your Westbury Area Patrol dues, make sure you request a vacation watch by the Constables. This is a great service that is included in our contract. A deputy will check out your property at least once a day to make sure it is secured and nothing suspicious is going on.

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Commercial Updates

Hobby Lobby - The Hobby Lobby craft store on the West Loop frontage road near Meyerland Plaza closed in January. Rumors continue that this will become an Academy Sporting Goods store.

JoAnn's Fabrics Store – A future JoAnn's Fabric and Craft store is depicted on the map of Meyerland Plaza by the shopping center owner Fidelis, lease pending. The site is shown where the former SteinMart was located next to the Office Depot, across from Target. JoAnn's is a fabric and craft store.

Spec's – The Spec's store, near Stella Link and Braeswood, is the last tenant remaining at that shopping center before the center is torn down. Rumors continue that it will be moving into the old Best Buy store location at Meyerland Plaza, across from the Target.

Dick's Sporting Goods – Dick's is currently remodeling the former Bed Bath and Beyond space facing Beechnut. March 2022 is the projected opening.

Car Wash on SPO - A sign is posted that a CarWash is coming at the site of the former CiCi's Pizza, located on South Post Oak near Willowbend.

Gas Stations/ Convenience Stores – There are 3 in progress in Westbury. The store at the corner of West Airport/Hillcroft is nearing the completion of its expansion/ remodel and looks like it may open soon. The building at the corner of West Bellfort near the Autozone is in progress and the pad for its future car wash was recently poured. This building will have a convenience store, a deli, and a Sonic drive thru. The building on West Bellfort across from the Home Depot driveway is progressing, it will be a gas station and convenience store.

FREE COVID N95 Masks

The US government will distribute 400 million "N95" masks from the national strategic stockpile. These masks will be free, while supplies last. The masks will be shipped to pharmacies and community health centers. Pharmacies which have agreed to distribute the free masks include: CVS, Target, Walgreens, and WalMart. The masks distributed will be masks designed for adult faces. The White House said that, "to ensure broad access for all Americans, there will be three masks available per person."



Free COVID Testing Kits

The federal government has launched COVIDTests.gov, the website for Americans to order free COVID test kits. Each household can request four at-home COVID-19 tests, with orders expected to ship beginning at the end of January via the US Postal Service. Order your tests now so you will have them when you need them. These are rapid antigen at-home tests, also referred to as self-tests or over-the-counter tests. Go to the website to order the testing kits: www.COVIDtests.gov

Health insurance providers became responsible for covering eight at-home COVID tests per month per individual. Customers can be reimbursed for COVID kits up to \$12 per test, or receive free tests at no cost from participating in-network pharmacies.

Levitt Pavilion Houston Update

Brays Oaks Management District (BOMD), with Lionheart Places and Natalye Appel + Associates Architects, is leading the master planning for the 29-acre "Gasmer Redevelopment Site", formerly Shell Technical Center @ 5521 Gasmer Road. Lionheart held a kickoff meeting in December with a steering team assembled by BOMD. Additional steering team meetings and two public open houses are scheduled for first half of 2022. The District has already completed a survey of the site. See page 1 for Open House Tour on February 12.

"We see this being repurposed as a lifestyle center," said Ben Brewer, retiring Executive Director of the District. "The four key components of this plan will be to honor the past history of the site; to serve as a detention area for flood waters; to place the Levitt Pavilion Houston, an outdoor music pavilion, in this location; and to reuse and re-purpose the rest of the area." Eventually, the fences separating Willow Waterhole Greenway and the Gasmer Redevelopment Project will be removed, resulting in one contiguous green space.

Concurrent with master planning, the Levitt Pavilion Houston Board continues to develop the Pavilion's design with Studio Red Architects. "We plan to open in 2024 on two to three acres and share parking, restrooms, and other amenities with the redeveloped Gasmer site," said Howard Sacks, Levitt Pavilion Houston Board Chair.

As planning continues, finding funding sources is paramount. The recently announced Kinder Foundation Gift to Willow Waterhole Greenway of up to \$4M is transformative for its financial impact

and serves as a catalyst for other donors to consider the full vision:

Willow Waterhole Greenway, Levitt Pavilion Houston, and Gasmer Redevelopment Project.

In January, 30 scouts and their parents worked through blustery conditions to remove a huge volume of brush, rake the trail, and apply sealant to tree ID posts. This should allow native plants that have been crowded out by the invasive plants to now flourish.

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
