Yard sales, garage sales, estate sales, moving sales, etc. are NOT ALLOWED at residential properties in Westbury. This applies to ALL sections of Westbury and Parkwest. The Civic Club provides fall and spring community garage sale events to our members. The Civic Club will provide security and publicity for the sale. The Civic Club does NOT provide tables, chairs or shade.

Booth space will go on sale Monday, March 19, for Westbury residents ONLY. Booths will be on sale during the normal Civic Club office hours 9:30AM to 1:30PM. The WCC office will be open late on Mon. March 19 and Wed. March 21, from 6PM to 8PM for booth space purchase. You must be a paid current member of the Westbury Civic Club to purchase a booth. The means you had to have paid your WCC membership dues of \$40. The booth price for Westbury residents will be \$20-\$25. Booths will go on sale to non-residents on March 27. The booth price for non-residents is \$60-\$65.

The Westbury White Elephant Sale allows residents the opportunity to sell unwanted items at a highly visible central location with security provided. Most crimes are crimes of opportunity, so the fewer non-residents that we invite down our streets on the weekends, the fewer weekday crime problems we have to contend with.

President's Message

Where do you see Westbury in the next 30 years? This was the question posed at the Houston Galveston Regional Plan session I attended in February. Our region is expected to see 4 million new residents in the next 30 years. Yikes! How will this affect our quality of life? Look on page 15 of the *Crier* for information on how you can give YOUR input through the month of March.

Thinking back to 1956 and the beginnings of our neighborhood 56 years ago, I'm proud that we are still a viable, safe, secure neighborhood where property values are on the increase, yet homes are affordable. Did you see Lisa Gray's column in the Houston Chronicle on February 19th about mid-century modern architecture in Houston? She gave a shout out to Westbury that our "ranch house neighborhoods were coming back into fashion." We have to work diligently to protect our neighborhood to keep it thriving. We enforce deed restrictions and city ordinances, but there are a few people who violate the rules and drive their neighbors crazy and threaten property values. Every day, people at their wits end call the WCC office for assistance with their neighbors. We keep all complaints made to the WCC confidential. However, we do not act on anonymous complaints.

I address those residents who violate city ordinances and deed restrictions and think it's no big deal because no-one has the right to tell them what to do: Please take a moment and think about your neighbors. It is against city ordinance and/or your deed restrictions to operate a business or other noxious activity on your property; to park cars in the yard; to let dogs run loose; to have visible trash prior to collection day; and to allow your yard to have growth over 9 inches. Maybe y'all haven't thought about how these practices affect your neighbors. Believe me, they do.

We see so little of our neighbors nowadays that it's easy to forget them. I ran across a picture from 1962 and I know why we knew our neighbors back then; there were no trees, no bushes, and no fences. We have plenty of stress in our lives today, please don't needlessly add to it. Please be a good neighbor and ask yourself, "Am I a good neighbor?"

It is time for a big THANK YOU to all of you who have sent in your dues. They were printed for all Westbury households before the January payments were applied. If you received a bill, but had already sent your check, then know they crossed in the mail.

Thanks to all who attended the METRO meeting or sent comments as we prevailed and the Chimney Rock 49 bus line remains unchanged. (see letter on page 15).

Spring arrives this month and I think I speak for many of us that our yards need some TLC (see page 13 for some help). Let's make Westbury sparkle green!



Faces Around Westbury



Gene Elston, a long time Parkwest resident, was recently honored by the Westbury Little League with a sign at its ball field. Elston's baseball broadcasting career spanned 47 years. He delivered baseball to Houston fans as the lead voice of the Houston Astros for 25 years, from their beginnings as the 1962 Colt .45s, through their 1986 National League West Division championship. He was the voice of the Houston Astros. In 2006, Elston was awarded the Ford C. Frick Award from the Baseball Hall of Fame. The award is given annually to a baseball announcer who has given major contributions to the game. Elston also created a unique scorebook, Gene Elston's Stati-Score Baseball Scorebook, and has authored two books, including the 2001 release, A Stitch in Time: A Baseball Chronology, 1845-2000.

Dabney Kennedy, a Westbury resident since 1965 who serves as President of the Westbury Area Improvement Corporation and Vice-President of the Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy, received the 2012 National Eagle Scout Association (NESA) Outstanding Eagle Scout Award on February 29th. The recognition is granted to Eagle Scout Alumni who have demonstrated outstanding achievement and service at the local, state, or regional level. Dabney Kennedy has spent sixty-five years committed to Scouting and its ideals and in 2006 the Order of the Arrow presented him with the third-ever Legacy of Servant Leadership Lifetime Achievement Award. Over his impressive career as an adult in the Order. Kennedy spent 22 years as a Section Adviser, 20 years as a Lodge Adviser, and 40 years on the National OA Committee in numerous capacities. Dabney and his wife of 52 years, Peggy, are proud of their two Eagle Scout sons, who both graduated from Westbury High School. Son David, his wife, Silena, and three daughters live in Westbury. Second son Mark, his wife, Tammie, and their two children live nearby in Bellaire. Peggy and Dabney are members of Westbury Baptist Church. They also volunteer at the Hobby Center and the Alley Theater as ushers. Kennedy retired from Dow Chemical in 1993 after 30 years of service.

GUN SAFETY by Westbury resident Ross Asher

The February 2012 newsletter mentioned that a Westbury 2 resident had found a bullet in a bedroom wall, which the police reported happened after a neighbor fired a weapon to deter an attempted motor vehicle burglary. I've had a lifetime of interaction with firearms. I've been an Army Infantry officer, recreational shooter, licensed concealed handgun instructor, and I have carried a concealed handgun every day for many years.

The law gives us a right to defend ourselves against aggression, and to protect ourselves against attack. But the mere possession of a gun does not mean that we are prepared to exercise these rights. It is also the duty of each armed citizen to learn to use a gun in a safe, responsible, effective manner should the day ever come when such becomes necessary. While it may sound cold and calculating, this, in part, means learning to know your target and to effectively engage ONLY your target, and not endanger innocent persons nearby. Always remember that even in a self defense situation, you are still responsible for HOW you protect yourself, and whether you inadvertently injure an innocent person in the process.

It also means keeping weapons in a safe manner in the home. What is safe? That depends upon your situation. A home with only adults present may safely keep guns in a manner which may be unsafe for a home with small children. Each of us must assess our own situation, as the law, as well as common sense, makes us responsible if a minor has access to a firearm in our home and causes injury with the gun.

Fortunately, there are numerous resources available to provide training and guidelines for the safe, effective ownership, possession and use of firearms, both for recreational and self defense purposes. Seek out an experienced instructor who can assist you not only in the safe, effective use of your gun, but in safe, effective storage techniques.

City of Houston Code of Ordinances regarding Pets

Sec. 6-2. - Owner's responsibility for animals at large.

An owner or any other person having the right of possession of an animal shall ensure that such animal does not run at large in violation of this chapter and shall be subject to punishment under this chapter without regard to whether he was acting with a culpable mental state.

Sec. 6-3. - Running at large of domestic animals or fowl prohibited.

(a) The running at large of domestic animals or domestic fowl, within the city limits is hereby declared to be a nuisance and it shall be unlawful for the owner or keeper of any such animal or fowl to permit the same to run at large within the city.

(b) It shall be a defense to prosecution under subsection (a) above that the animal was: **(1)** A dog in an off-leash site established under section 32-11 of this Code; or **(2)** A feral cat that has been subjected to a trap, neuter, and return program approved by the director.

Sec. 6-86. - License required.

(a) No person shall own, keep, possess, or have control over any dog or cat within the city unless such person has a current city license

Sec. 6-87. - Tag to be worn.

(a) It shall be the duty of each person having ownership of a dog or cat for which a license is required to be issued under this article to ensure that the license tag furnished by the licensing authority in conjunction with the issuance of the animal's license is worn by the animal at all times. It is a defense to prosecution hereunder that the dog or cat was confined within a building or other totally enclosed structure under the ownership, possession or control of the person having possession of the animal at the time that the animal was not wearing a license tag.

Sec. 6-101. - Running at large prohibited.

(a) It shall be unlawful for any person owning or having in his possession any dog to allow such dog to be at large without the owner or person in charge thereof having direct physical control over such dog. An owner or person having in his possession a dog may allow the dog to be at large on property that does not provide the animal with access to a sidewalk or street.

(b) It is a defense to prosecution under subsection (a) of this section that the dog was in an off-leash site established under section 32-11 of this Code.

(c) It shall be unlawful for any person owning or having in his possession a dangerous dog, as defined in section 6-151 of this Code, to allow that dog to be at large. A person who violates this subsection shall, upon conviction, be assessed a fine of not less than \$500.00 nor more than \$2,000.00. Each day that any violation of this subsection continues shall constitute and be punishable as a separate offense.

Responsible Pet Ownership Begins With the "4 L's". LICENSE, LEASH, LATCH, LOVE. The "4 L's" are the basis of responsible pet ownership and the key to creating a safe, secure environments for your pets to live in. License your pet. Leash your pet. Latch your gate. Last, but certainly not least, give your pet lots of love and attention.

Please report pet killings, dangerous animals, or packs of stray dogs both to BARC (the City of Houston's Animal Shelter and Adoption Facility) and to our City CouncilMember (CM) Larry Green's District K office. CM Green is concerned about reports of dangerous animals from across District K. Contact District K via districtk@houstontx.gov or 832-393-3016. Contact BARC at 713-229-7300. The city allocates resources based on number of complaints received and only one BARC inspector serves the entire city for stray dog reports.

Is Westbury Urban or Suburban? **Chapter 42 Changes Coming**

Most people in Houston have never heard of Chapter 42, but the City plans to make changes in the near future which could have a dramatic impact on Westbury and similar communities. Right now, Westbury is defined as a SUBURBAN area when developers create new developments or properties. The City proposes to reclassify all areas between Loop 610 and Beltway 8 as URBAN, including our own Westbury community.

What does this mean to you? The population of Houston is expected to increase in the future, so the Planning Department proposes to define more areas in Houston as URBAN so that higher housing density can be implemented. Although our Westbury homes have a minimum square footage requirement per lot, there are many properties in the area which are not protected by deed restrictions. The URBAN classification will allow up to 62 single-family townhome properties on one acre of land. Developers will not have to provide on-site parking if new townhomes have less than six units and do not face a major thoroughfare. For example, the 900 foot by 60 foot flood control easement property on Burdine across from Westbury Square had been appraised at 1 dollar, but recently went on the market for \$45,000.

Security Tips by long-time Westbury Residents

Very recently a new young neighbor asked some of us seasoned Westbury folk how to be safe in our homes. While we cannot guarantee safety, we can offer some tips.

House: Are the locks a good quality? Can you see out of your peephole? Do you have an alarm system and do you use it? Never open your door unless you can identify the person outside. **Do** respond to the person to let them know the house is not empty. If they do not go away, you should call the constable or the police.

Being away: Make your house seem occupied. Light timers for lamps are a good investment. A timer to play a radio or the TV can help. Make sure newspapers and the mail are collected by a trusted neighbor when you are away for a long period of time.

Emergency Numbers: Have the constable number in your cell phone as **AConstable** which makes it immediately accessible in the phone directory. People who work in your home should have the emergency numbers too and should be instructed to use them without hesitation.

Children: Talk to your children, even young children, about always calling a parent to answer the door. Explain about the constable, police and fire department and that they help us in emergencies. Talk to a housekeeper or baby sitter to be sure they know what to do if someone comes to the door.

Neighbors: Get to know your neighbors and share phone numbers with those you trust and who have been helpful. Share email addresses so you can give each other advance notice of being away or having repair work done. Open shades in the daytime, at least partially. Look out your windows. Look at your neighbors homes. Get used to the routines of the street. Take walks and talk to people on the street.

Vehicles: Park your car(s) in the garage. Know the VIN numbers and know your license plate number. Never leave valuables in cars and especially your purse not matter how quick you think you will be away from the car.

If the Worst Happens: Cooperate with the intruder(s) and give them the money and valuables wanted in order to protect yourself and your family.

Westbury is a good place to live. But every resident should take steps to be personally secure in their homes. Part of security is to know people around us. We need people to turn to and others need us. Neighborliness enriches and makes life safer in Westbury.

Greenspace

Restoring Our Yards

Many yards have suffered badly from the drought last summer. March is the month to start working on your lawn to promote good growth through the summer. You may be tempted to use an herbicide to get rid of weeds. Not all herbicides will take care of the weeds we are seeing. Many weeds are typical springtime visitors but, because of lots of bare ground, we have a big production of tall spiky things known as sow thistle. If sow thistle is allowed to bloom, then seeds will spread the weeds more widely in your yard. Cutting them down and bagging them is one way to get them under control. A better way, but more labor intensive, is to dig weeds out at the root, bag them, and dispose of them with yard waste. This is a good job for kids. Give them a narrow trowel and show them how to go to the base of the plant to dig down to remove the carrot-like tap root.

If you have any St. Augustine grass left in your lawn, it needs fertilizer but it also needs places to grow. Raking off weeds and dead grass will make space for St. Augustine runners to reach out and gradually take over from the weeds. If that is too slow a process, you can turn to having your whole lawn re-sodded either by yourself or by a landscaper.

Whatever you do, there is a lot of work and expense ahead to get back weed-free green lawns. Try not to overuse fertilizer or herbicides. Be patient. St. Augustine is a hot weather grass which will perform well as we get into the summer months. Let's hope that more rain will fall this year!

Westbury Community Garden

This month marks the 2nd birthday of the garden. It's hard to believe that in two years the garden has grown from 40 raised beds, to 61, and more important, from a group of people who were just meeting each other, to a vibrant community of gardeners and friends, supporting each other in many ways.

The garden now includes a beautiful pavilion with an 'in-memory-of' and 'in-honor-of' walk, a 1,500 gallon cistern, a sturdy information kiosk, a series of compost bins, a fruit tree orchard, a blackberry orchard, a shed and a native habitat garden. There are many teams working on various garden tasks and plans for expansion. Stay tuned as we may be offering interesting opportunities for those of you who are not necessarily gardeners but interested in community building and continuing to make Westbury a desirable place to live and play.
