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President's Message

My president's message is always written a few weeks before the end of the month, so as I write this March message, I am still feeling the glow and love of Valentine's Day. The disappointed and annoyed president who wrote February's message is much happier this month. As my dad would say "Progress is being made".

The contract for the 125 townhomes at Westbury Square has fallen through, but demolition permits have been applied for and the dilapidated burned out building should be down "shortly".

Some progress was made on Westbury High School (WHS) and the HISD board voted to allocate up to \$8 million dollars for athletic fields and to shore up the oldest remaining building. It is a start, but not near what we were promised. I remain impressed with the WHS's administration team, the teachers I have met and especially with the students. These children, our children, deserve a better educational facility. I hope you will join in the fight for what is right for WHS.

On the Southern Crushed Concrete issue, the Administrative Judge ruled that two parties would be allowed to contest the air quality permit for the concrete batching operation and hopefully that will move along to finalization.

In 2000, I joined the WCC board as Section Director for Parkwest 2. Why? Because I hated how the Willowbend-Hillcroft entrance and esplanade into Westbury looked in comparison to Maplewood's across the street. In the past 14 years much work has been done on the esplanades: tree planting, watering, tree trimming, mulching, replacing the subdivisions markers, and planting around the markers. In 2000, Westbury applied for a matching grant through the city and added irrigation to the Chimney Rock-West Bellfort esplanade. It is by far the prettiest corner in Westbury. I am so happy to announce that irrigation will be added to the Willowbend-Hillcroft esplanade sometime this month, thanks to a city matching grant. It is a reminder of the patience needed as it took 15 years to accomplish this goal.

And speaking of accomplishments, the Westbury Community garden will celebrate its 5th birthday on March 28th. I hope many of you will join in this celebration. To me it is tangible proof of what an awesome neighborhood Westbury truly is. It also proves the words of Margaret Mead: "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed, citizens can change the world. Indeed, it is the only thing that ever has." We took an ugly 7 acres that sat unused for 30 years and created an oasis through hard work, sweat and, yes, even tears. You can read more about

this Westbury treasure in this month's *Crier*.

January left me really annoyed and disappointed, but February reminded me again of why it is so important to work for the common good. Much of what annoys us is out of our direct control and that means working with whatever system is in place to correct those things. Often these processes take a while. If you have a neighbor running a business, letting their property fall into disrepair or violating other deed restrictions or city ordinances, please email or write the WCC office and let us know how we can help your part of Westbury be the best it can be. Together we can and do make a difference.

Spring is here. Hope to see you at one of the many events or green venues happening around Westbury. It's a great time to visit the Westbury Community Garden, the Willow Waterhole, Westbury or Hager Park, or catch an activity at the Platou Center. There is even a coffee truck coming to Westbury Square!

Zoning Boundaries for Tinsley & Anderson Elementary

Boundaries Changing

Residents of Westbury are zoned to six different elementary schools, but only Parker and Anderson are physically located in Westbury. Halpin Early Childhood Center and Tinsley Elementary are overcrowded and have a cap on attendance. The attendance cap means that new students who move into that zone during the year are not allowed to attend and must go to a school that has capacity available. HISD has proposed adjusting the boundaries between these two schools and Anderson Elementary.

The public and families at Halpin, Tinsley, and Anderson were invited to attend a meeting on February 19. Additionally, HISD Trustee Wanda Adams and representatives from HISD came to the Westbury SuperNeighborhood meeting on

February 18 to discuss the proposed boundary changes. We thank Trustee Wanda Adams for making sure that we knew about these proposed boundary changes in time to make comments.


HISD had not realized that Parkwest 3 is part of the Westbury neighborhood. As we discussed the proposed boundary maps around the table, HISD agreed to revise the proposed boundary so that ALL Westbury residents who live between W. Bellfort and W. Airport and west of Hillcroft will again be zoned to Anderson Elementary School. The draft map is pending approval by the HISD board of Trustees on March 12.

Affected students who are already at Tinsley may continue to stay, but new students will go to Anderson.

We see this as a positive change for our community and for Anderson Elementary. Good neighborhood schools are important and can help build community spirit. Having more Westbury homes zoned to a Westbury school is great. During the meeting on February 18, we also discussed our concerns that the residents of Westbury 5West (west of Hillcroft and north of West Bellfort) are zoned to 3 different schools in a crazy pattern. HISD said that they will evaluate this concern, and agreed that it is less desirable for school zones to split neighborhood streets as in Westbury 5West.

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Anderson Elementary Updates

Possible Future Magnet School Status

Congratulations to Anderson Elementary for a great implementation of a new dual-language program this year. Four classrooms of kindergarten students are in the new dual-language program. Every student and every parent in the program has been provided FREE access to the well-known, online Rosetta Stone software, both in English and Spanish. The HISD language department was at Anderson in February and was very impressed with the high quality of instruction. The participating families are excited about the program. Next year the program will include both kindergarten and first grade students.

In other news, on the last Monday each month, a group of 20 - 25men come to the school to read with students. This group is called "M.A.L.E" (Men And Literacy Evolving). If you would like to participate, contact the school at (713) 726-3600.

Additionally, Anderson has been nominated to become a magnet school and is evaluating possible magnet focus areas. The HISD Board would need to approve the school becoming a magnet school, but this possibility is very encouraging. Anderson has a great location in the heart of our great neighborhood, and has been making steady progress. Can you imagine how great Anderson can be as of our families decide to "learn local" and stay in our neighborhood schools? Then, our Anderson Panthers will really roar.



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WHS— Mentoring and PTO

WHAT CAN YOU DO TO HELP the STUDENTS at Westbury High School?

Every school in HISD has a Shared Decision Making Committee (SDMC) for campus level planning and decision making to review the district's educational goals, objectives, and major district wide classroom instructional programs. Becky Edmondson serves on the SDMC for Westbury High School (WHS).

At the WHS January SDMC meeting, the principal shared the challenges of having the seniors pass all the required STAAR End of Course tests necessary for graduation, which are English I and II, Algebra, Biology and American History. WHS has tutorials scheduled for almost every weekend through the end of the school to help the hundreds of students who still have not passed all the tests.

I asked, what can we do as a community to help? He wants us in the school! He has set aside a special room for the PTO and Friends of WHS. It could be as simple as coming in once a week; attending a sporting event, mentoring, tutoring, etc.

How do I do this? Go online to HISD to register for the VIPS program. Fill out the very simple form and hit submit. Then all you have to do is go up to WHS and present your Driver's license to Mrs. Clemons.



Challenge? I told Mr. Catchings that I thought we could enlist 50 volunteers. We have many empty nesters and retired

people in our community. I signed up today and now I am just looking for 49 other people who care about today's youth enough to do something other than pay lip service (or social media comments) to the problem. Won't you join me?

New committee. A new committee has formed under Community Relations in the Westbury Civic Club to explore more ways that we as a community can help not only Westbury but all other area schools as well. If you've got some extra time to help our students and school, we'd love to have you.

HISD State of the Schools

Commentary by Becky Edmondson

Thanks to an invitation from Westbury High School, I attended the 2015 HISD State of the Schools luncheon on February 11th. First, I have to commend the teachers, administrators and HISD support staff for working to make HISD the best urban big city school district. Is it a challenge to meet the educational needs of a district where 64% of the students are economically disadvantaged and 92% are minority from 113 countries with one hundred native tongues? I'm sure it is. Dr. Grier said today that this isn't your grandparents' school. HISD is educating students for today's world with new techniques and focus. They are adding a Hindi and an Arabic Immersion school and have 52 dual language schools. The focus of physical education is moving toward healthy lifestyles.

HISD is gearing up for more rigorous study and higher expectations for everyone, not just those labelled gifted and talented. Last year 300 students graduated from high school with an associate's degree. A goal is for 2,000 to do so in the future. More AP classes are being offered and more AP testing is being done. Last year \$255 million in scholarships were offered, compared to \$50 million in 2009. There are programs like "Power Up", which will give every high school student a laptop; "Emerge", which targets bright minority kids for admission into Ivy League schools; a \$30 million grant for Link Learning; and two new grants from the Houston Endowment for college preparation. To address literacy issues, there is "Read Houston Read", where you can spend 20 minutes a week reading with a child via your computer. In K thorough 3rd grade, 90 minutes of daily classroom reading of books is being required.

All of that is good, but Dr. Grier notes that our neighborhood schools continue to suffer. We know that to be true for


Westbury High School, too. He said that the list of unacceptable schools, schools you wouldn't want to send your children to, is longer than the list of good schools.

Westbury High School students deserve better. The time has come to make Westbury High School a neighborhood school of choice, a flagship high school. We have great kids, great teachers, and a great administrative team. We insist that

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HISD Ignores Voters from 2012 Bond

WHS Bond Update

As you may recall, the January 2015 edition of the newsletter had blistering commentary regarding the vote by HISD Trustees to not fund the campus expansion for Westbury High School that had been promised, planned, and budgeted as part of the 2012 bond program.

We now have good and bad news to report. The good news is that in February the HISD Trustees voted to allocate for use at WHS \$8 million of the \$11.2 million that had been formerly designated for the WHS campus expansion. The bad news is that there is \$3.2 million dollars remaining of those funds which has not yet been designated for a purpose, and that money is desired by other factions. Obviously, we strongly believe that this money should be allocated for WHS, and Trustee Wanda Adams agrees with

You may hear some people say that WHS has gotten more construction money from HISD. It is true that almost \$4 million additional funding has been added to the construction budget recently; however, this is money that had always been designated for WHS in the project budget and has now been released for use by the WHS project. That \$4 million is 100% of the inflation adjustment money in the budget, plus half of the contingency in the budget for WHS. Every other school in the HISD bond project also had these inflation and contingency funds released for use. It is not new money; it is simply money that had been held back.

Sometime in the future, HISD will be holding a public meeting about the scope of work for WHS. It will be very important that members of the community attend that meeting and insist that WHS get the infrastructure that it needs. HISD continues to insist that no school can exceed the budget originally designated in the bond. If a school project is completed and funds are leftover, then that money can be moved over to projects which are still in progress. We wonder whether any funds will be leftover by the time that WHS is being worked on, since HISD has underestimated the scope of work needed for WHS, in our opinion.

3 Minute Speech by Cindy Chapman at Feb 2015 HISD Trustee Meeting

Good evening. My name is Cindy Chapman, and I am Co-President of the Westbury Super Neighborhood.

For the past 30 years, advocates have been seeking improvements for Westbury High School. We want Westbury to become a "school of choice", on par with the best schools in HISD. We are not satisfied with the pattern of years of NEGLECT and BROKEN PROMISES by HISD.

Tonight the board considers allocating 8 million dollars for Westbury High School. As a community, we have not had time to review these plans. We do support additional funding to benefit the students of Westbury, but support for additional funding does not mean that we are satisfied with the scope proposed.

We are NOT satisfied with how HISD has treated Westbury High School.

We are NOT satisfied with the funding that HISD has proposed for Westbury High School. The proposed 8 million dollars is only a STEP toward appropriate funding for Westbury, and is only a portion of the 11.2 million dollars allocated for Westbury High School that was canceled LAST MONTH.

Let me remind you of the long history of neglect and broken promises made by HISD.

HISD has broken its PROMISES for adequate facilities for Westbury.

Example 1: In 2001, a 3-story building at Westbury with 75 classrooms was condemned as unsafe. Despite community objections, HISD insisted on a much smaller replacement with fewer classrooms. From the very first day, that replacement was undersized and there has been a shanty-town of shacks at Westbury ever since.

Example 2: Within the past few months, TWO different people have fallen through the floors in those decrepit shacks.

Example 3: The school was placed in the last tier for construction despite known structural deficiencies.

Example 4: Until now, HISD apparently did not allocate funds for improved athletic facilities, despite inadequate facilities and known Title 9 violations.

Furthermore, HISD has broken its PROMISES for a campus expansion for Westbury High School made in the 2012 bond, despite strong support by local voters.

Finally, HISD PROMISED to implement programs to attract zoned students back to Westbury. After many years of requests, HISD finally implemented a FINE ARTS magnet at Westbury High School to match the FINE Arts programs at the elementary and middle school feeders. Even though that fledgling Fine Arts program had already proven that it was effective at bringing zoned kids to Westbury, it was CANCELED by HISD in 2013 in yet another broken promise.

As a community, we are NOT satisfied and we are NOT going away. Instead, we are working to become even better advocates for Westbury. Westbury High School needs your support.

HISD District Advisory Committee

Westbury resident, Cindy Chapman, has been appointed by HISD District IX Trustee Wanda Adams to serve on the 2015 HISD District Advisory Committee (DAC). The Texas Education Code requires each school district and each school campus to establish a planning and decision-making process that will involve professional staff of the district, parents, and community members. According to the HISD policy, the DAC shall assist the Superintendent with the annual review, development, and revision of the district improvement plan; analyze information related to dropout prevention; review an evaluation of the dropout prevention program; and review information related to retention rates, disciplinary alternative programs, and expulsions.

The DAC must have at least 2 parents, 2 business representatives, 2 community members, and members elected to represent campus and district professional staff. Meetings are held monthly.

Fondren Middle School at Bi-Monthly Breakfast



HISD Project Advisory Teams (PAT) Westbury High School PAT

The HISD 2012 bond advertised "a new Westbury". Overcoming perceptions of safety issues, coupled with creating an appealing campus, is paramount to pushing Westbury High School to the next level to become a school of choice for HISD students. Cindy Chapman, Becky Edmondson and Kathleen Ownby are community members on the Project Advisory Team (PAT) for Westbury High School. The February PAT meeting brought conceptual drawings of how the additional monies allocated by HISD might be used for athletic fields. The drawings included the addition of a softball field and tennis courts. The baseball field would also be relocated to make way for the new building, necessary to replace all the temporary buildings on campus. The architects attended this meeting and the next meeting in March should further define just what the scope of the work will be. At Ms. Ownby's suggestion, the architects toured the portion of the original building that is not currently slated for demolition, as we had originally been led to believe. The PAT team is working hard to insure that WHS gets what it needs.

Parker Elementary PAT

The Parker PAT team met in late January. The news from HISD is that construction costs have escalated beyond their predictions and reserves. HISD may push the timetable back a few months to allow construction costs to fall in light of falling oil prices.





Westbury Civic Club Policy: Garage Sales, Estate Sales, Yard Sales, Moving Sales

Purpose: The intent of this policy is to clearly convey the Westbury Civic Club restriction on garage sales, estate sales, yard sales or any other independent action of the kind.

Definition: Garage, Estate, Yard or Moving Sale: The sale of personal property in, at, or upon any residential lot or home. This includes, with limitation, sales of personal property from the garage, driveway, yard, patio or house area of such premises.

Policy: Garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like are not permitted in Westbury.

All sections of Westbury and Parkwest have deed restrictions that state "no noxious or offensive trade or activity shall be carried on upon any lot nor shall anything be done thereon which may be or become an annoyance or nuisance to the neighborhood". Garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like draw substantial traffic and contribute to: hindering the flow of traffic on major thoroughfares; impeding access to homes by emergency vehicles or residents due to parking congestion; parking violations on city streets or esplanades; parking violations from vehicles parked on front yards; and, parking violations from blocking public right-of-way on sidewalks. Furthermore, advertising materials for garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like contribute to: visual blight, trash along public streets, and violations of the city sign ordinance. The Westbury Civic Club considers garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like to be "an annoyance or nuisance to the neighborhood".

All sections of Westbury and Parkwest have deed restrictions that state the lots are to be used for single family or family residential purposes. The Westbury Civic Club considers garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like to be commercial use of residential property.

From the start of 40 garden beds, a butterfly garden and pavilion, the garden has grown to 61 beds, an orchard of fruit trees, with more trees being added every year, two large storage sheds, two large compost areas, Purple Martin houses, kiosk, wash station, and many committees of gardeners working together to not only keep the garden looking beautiful but thriving and expanding. I am delighted. The sign of a strong community garden is when the originators can step back and the garden continues to thrive, and that is what we have at the Westbury Community Garden. Many of the original gardeners are still with the garden, some have moved and some passed away. New gardeners have come, some stayed and some moved on, as is with life. We are fortunate in the support we have had from those in the Westbury community, from businesses and organizations outside our community, and appreciate them all.




Sewer Line Replacement in Westbury 4 and Westbury South

After all the input at last year's CIP meeting and the numerous 311 calls about sewer problems in Westbury, the City of Houston contracted to have all the sewer lines in Westbury inspected.

Under REbuild Houston's worst first policy, the lines in the attached map are being replaced. On February 11, District K hosted a meeting at the Platou center for residents affected by the current waste water (sewer) project ongoing in Westbury 4 and Westbury South. Representatives from Public Works and the contractor were on hand to answer questions and explain the process.

Flyers/letters have been posted on the affected homes doors. The new pipes are placed by first bursting the old piping and then forcing the new pipe into the old one. If access is needed to the utility easement, every effort will be made to contact the homeowner. This project is to replace the sewer lines due to critical overflow in these areas. This is NOT a street or storm water project. The projected completion date is early May 2015.

Harris County Flood Control Update


Just a reminder that Harris County Flood Control is working in our area. The project is well under way and should finish on schedule.

Commercial Property Update

Update - Southern Crushed Concrete Environmental Permit Application

Southern Crushed Concrete (SCC) has applied for an air permit for a concrete batch plant at 5001 Gasmer next to the Willow Waterhole Conservation Reserve.

The Administrative law judge ruled that both the Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy representing a homeowner living within the 440 yd circle as well as Joseph Shahda, the owner of the Ranchwood Apartments representing two tenants within the circle were affected parties affected under Texas Health & Safety Code § 382.058(c), and that pursuant to I Texas Administrative Code § I55.201(b) and 30 Texas Administrative Code § 80.1 13(a), they may appear as a protesting party at the hearing for Southern Crushed Concrete's air quality permit.

The WCC, the WAIC, and the Westbury Super Neighborhood Council will continue to monitor and stay involved in the process since the proposed site will affect Westbury area residents, local students, and visitors to the Willow Waterhole Conservation Reserve.

Westbury Square

WCC President, Becky Edmondson, spoke to the owner of the Westbury Square property for an update. The contract with the firm that wanted to build 125 townhomes on the property has fallen through. Mr. Antonini is in the process of applying for permits to complete the demolition of the two buildings that have the condemnation orders on them. District K and the WCC are monitoring the progress of this long overdue demolition. According to Mr. Antonini, once the permits are obtained, demolition should begin "shortly".

WAIC / Westbury Super Neighborhood Meeting **Board Notes**

HPD Storefront Update

Sgt. Sutton and Officer Ly, both from the Westbury Storefront, gave an update about crime in the Westbury area. There was a discussion that truants are leaving WHS and walking down Dryad to Willow Waterhole and nearby apartments.

HISD—WHS and Boundary Changes

HISD Trustee Wanda Adams, HISD Chief School Officer Mark Smith, and HISD Demographer Justin Silhavy discussed the proposed boundary changes for Anderson and Tinsley Elementary Schools (see article on page 6). It was suggested that the draft map be revised to include Parkwest 3 in the Anderson boundary. A concern about the boundary maps in Westbury 5 West was also discussed. Trustee Adams said that new WHS Principal Jason Catchings found many challenges when he arrived at WHS, but that he continues to make steady progress. HISD has brought in trainers from College Board for teachers for Advanced Placement classes, and more AP classes are being offered. The scope of the WHS bond project was extensively discussed during the meeting. The WAIC board voted to donate \$50 for a WHS PTO corporate membership and also approved purchasing \$200 worth of gift cards for use as prizes awarded in drawings for WHS students attending tutoring sessions on Saturday.

Commercial Update

The boarded up buildings at the Westbury Centerette commercial center (West Bellfort at Chimney Rock) have been vandalized. HPD Sgt. Sutton said he would contact the property owner to secure the property. New graffiti at Westbury Manor Apartments has been reported, but the owner has cleaned up the high brush behind the apartments near the Westbury Little League fields. Phone calls about a commercial development sign on Hillcroft have not been returned.

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
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
