1st Day of Booth Sales for **Westbury Residents ONLY** March 22 9AM—2PM 5PM-7PM

Booth space will go on sale at 9AM on on a first come, first serve basis. The Tuesday, March 22, for individual Westbury residents ONLY *. The WCC office will be open early at 9AM on March 22 only and close at 2PM. The office will also be open from 5-7PM on March 22 for booth space purchase. Booths may be purchased during normal office hours of 9:30AM to 1:30PM starting on March 23.

You must be a paid current member of the Westbury Civic Club to purchase a booth. This means you must have paid your 2016 WCC membership dues of \$50. If you have not paid your 2016 dues, you may do so at the same time that you purchase your booth space. The booth price for individual Westbury residents will be \$20-\$25. Booths will go on sale to non-residents and groups/non-profit organizations on April 5, if space permits,

booth price for non-residents is \$70-75.

The Westbury White Elephant Sale allows residents the opportunity to sell unwanted household items at a highly visible central location with security provided. The WCC provides location, security, bathrooms and publicity for the sale. The Civic Club does NOT provide tables, chairs or shade.

Garage, Estate, yard, moving sales, etc. are not permitted at Westbury residences by long standing policy of the Westbury Civic Club and the deed restrictions. Next month, we will publish the official policy.

No individual may purchase a booth for a group or organization unless doing so under that organization's name.

President's Message

What a busy year this has started out to be! I am excited about all the celebrations we have planned this year as we celebrate the Westbury Civic Club's 60th year. Perhaps because my dad will turn 90 on March 1, this passage of time is really on my mind. Or, maybe it's because I just became eligible for early Social Security. But whatever the reason, milestones are cause for both celebrations of the past as well as looking forward to the future.

It is my honor to serve as the 37th president of the Westbury Civic Club. Each president has had their challenges and successes and left their marks on our neighborhood. I never realized what a huge undertaking being president of the second largest neighborhood in Houston would be. With 5.000 homes. 7 miles of esplanades, 3 city parks and the Willow Waterhole, a city community center, 4 Harris County Flood Control District drainage ditches and the Willow Waterhole bayou, a high school, two main elementary schools and two middle schools, and miles of aging city infrastructure both above and below ground, there is always something that needs watchin' or fixin'! Thankfully the Civic Club is made up of many members!

We work with the City, County, State, and Federal government to get things done. Right now the focus is on the city as the Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) meetings are coming up in March. This is where we ask for all those big tickets items that need fixing, like our storm water drainage, our streets, and park improvements. I urge as many of you who can to come to the meeting on March 10th to show the city that Westbury has a long list of things that need "fixin".

I have had the honor these past few weeks to sit on one of Mayor Turner's transition committees. I was on the committee that looked at the Public Works and Engineering Department (PWE). It was an enlightening experience. My interest, especially after hundreds of flooded Westbury residents had to get city permits, was in representing the community at large who interact with the PWE permits department. Another problem that came into focus after the flooding in 2015 was the issue of having to look to both the city and the county for flooding solutions. Westbury residents whose homes have flooded often felt left in limbo between the city pointing to the county and the county pointing to the city. This needs a solution. It was also gratifying to see that this transition committee was looking at issues that were raised on the campaign trail like flooding and road conditions. Mayor Turner has added a new position, Director of Education, and named Juliet Stipeche to his administration, seeking greater collaboration between the city and area schools, community colleges, and universities. We look forward to working with her.

The Los Vaqueros Rio Grande Trail Ride make their last stop before Memorial Park at Westbury Little League. The campfire on Thursday night was a lot of fun with entertainment and good food. This was my first year riding in the Trail Ride. I had the pleasure of joining the ride from Westbury Little League to Anderson Elementary then to St. Thomas More. What a fun experience for all these modern city children to have!

Spring has arrived! Westbury Little League (WLL) celebrated opening day on February 27th. Hundreds of Westbury area children were on hand to kickoff the WLL's 54th season. The same fields are where my dad once watched his children and grandchildren play baseball. On opening day, my dad attended his great grandson's game. To me, that is the beauty and the story of Westbury. Decade after decade young professionals have moved into Westbury and found a neighborhood that they could call home. Did you know the WLL team in 1966 won the Little League World Series? They will be honored at The Friends of Westbury High School (FWHS) gala in April. The Friends are another prime example of what makes Westbury so special. Since 1994, FWHS has provided 211 student scholarships valued at \$316,500 to deserving WHS youth.

WHS Community Meeting—2012 Bond

HISD Community Meeting: Dissatisfaction with Proposed WHS Improvements

In February, HISD hosted a second community meeting to unveil designs for Westbury High School improvements that are to be funded by the 2012 Bond program. The room was full! There were many unhappy people at the meeting asking HISD tough questions. Why? There was widespread feeling that the scope of work that is proposed for WHS is fine, as far as it goes, but, the proposed scope is not enough. Members of the audience brought up serious issues that are not being addressed by the current scope for WHS.

What is in the current scope?

- * A new building wing on the Dryad side of campus to replace 25 classrooms now located in decrepit temporary buildings isolated from the main campus, with new kitchen and cafeteria, new gym and locker rooms, and new bus drop off area.
- * A new baseball field and new softball field with stands and field house (because the new building wing is going to be built on top of the old baseball field). New tennis courts.
- * New stormwater detention area (to offset the new construction) that will double as a practice field.
- * New administrative offices and school entrance. Revised traffic flow in the parking lot on the Chimney Rock side of the campus.

What are the serious issues?

1. Flooding: WHS experienced structural flooding in both May and October last year, as did the Shell Research center adjacent to the new ball fields. HISD did not have answers as to how this flooding problem at WHS would be addressed or remedied.

- **2. Building Capacity:** Will the new building wing provide sufficient capacity? Concerns were expressed that the building capacity will be undersized since WHS has newly been granted a magnet program for the Performing and Visual Arts, which will bring higher enrollment. We have not forgotten that the previous time HISD "improved" WHS, HISD greatly under-estimated future enrollment and opted to replace a 3-story building with a 2-story building, so that the "temporary" classrooms used for construction never left the campus.
- 3. Fine Arts: The Fine Arts area of WHS has been a major concern for many years due to many problems (moisture control, flooding, inadequate facilities, etc). These rooms used to be an office area in the original school wing. Parents and alumni and community leaders had been asking HISD to upgrade the Fine Arts area of WHS for a long time. Former HISD Trustee Larry Marshall promised us before the 2012 bond vote that the Westbury community would be pleased with the Fine Arts facilities at the improved WHS. Instead, the proposed WHS scope does not propose any upgrades or revisions or replacements for the WHS Fine Arts areas. This seems to be a major omission, especially for a school that has a magnet program in the Fine Arts.

4. Campus Expansion and Safety:

HISD Trustees previously approved expanding the WHS campus via acquisition of two properties that stand between the school and new ball fields, and money was allocated in the 2012 bond for this WHS campus expansion. After the 2012 bond was approved by voters and overwhelming approved by Westbury area voters, then the HISD Trustees reversed their vote and voted 5 to 4 to NOT acquire the two properties. Questions from the audience centered on being misled by HISD and what happened to the money that had been allocated for WHS campus expansion. Safety concerns were expressed for students who will be walking to the new ball fields. Acquiring these properties as promised would make for a safer campus and could provide additional detention to offset flooding in the area.

5. Funding: Repeated concerns were expressed that adequate funding has not been provided for WHS and that more funding is needed. Concerns were also expressed that WHS has not received the full allotment of funds that was originally promised, when the unused land acquisition funds are considered.

It is clear that serious concerns have been raised about the proposed WHS scope of work. We urge all Westbury residents to

stay involved in this issue. Look in future *Criers* for more information.

Johnston Middle School Beautification Day will be on March 5 from 8:30-3PM. This is an event where the entire JMS community will work together for a common goal that will provide a tremendous opportunity for collaboration, creativity and fun.

The purpose of this beautification project is to improve, renew and upgrade the appearance of JMS, specifically the front of the school and courtyards.

Johnston Middle School

In a controversial move, the HISD Board of Trustees voted 5 to 4 to change the name of Albert Sidney Johnston Middle School (JMS) at the HISD Board Meeting on February 11, 2016. This decision has been made and it is final. The Trustees felt it was inappropriate for the school to be named in honor of a general who died in service of the Confederacy during the US Civil War.

The principal of JMS has circulated a survey to get input about three proposed names: Meyerland Middle School, Meyerland Middle School for the Performing and Visual Arts, or the Middle School for the Performing and Visual Arts. We do not know if these are the only names that are under consideration. We also do not know the timing of the name change.

Budget Crisis in HISD

Who in their right mind would think that the Houston Independent School District (HISD) is a "wealthy" school district? HISD is the largest school district in the state of Texas. For the 2014-2015 school year, HISD had about 215,000 students. Of these, about 76% were economically disadvantaged (poor) and 72% were considered to be "at-risk". About 30% had limited English skills.

For the first time ever, HISD will have to return money (more than \$160 million!) to the state for re-distribution to other parts of Texas, per the so-called "Robin Hood" system of using rich school districts to help pay for the poor districts. The state legislature does not meet this year, so there is not an option for relief from the legislature. The courts declared in 2014 that the system used by Texas to fund schools is unconstitutional, and the Texas Supreme Court is considering an appeal by the state.

EVERY school in HISD will have a reduced budget for the 2016-17 school year. The plan is to cut more than \$100 million from operating expenses. Every school will lose at least \$197 per student. Funding for gifted students will also decrease. For example, JMS is anticipating a budget cut of approximately \$458,000 according to our sources.



Taxes and HISD

Why should I care what happens at HISD?

Why should I care about HISD and what is happening at our local HISD schools? That is the question we sometimes hear along with these statements: "HISD doesn't affect me or interest me. My kids are grown. My kids go to private school. I don't have children."

As property owners, we are the tax base supporting HISD. Local revenue collected from property tax makes up about 72.6% of HISD's budget according to their website. Approximately 40% of your property taxes go to HISD.

In 2015, a home appraised at \$225,000 with a homestead exemption, had taxes levied at \$4,300 with HISD getting \$1,850 (43%) and the City of Houston gets \$1,075 (25%). If you have an over-65 exemption, some entities tax levels are frozen, but not HISD. A home valued at \$220,000 with an over-65 exemption, had a tax bill in 2015 for \$1,393 with \$1,116 going to HISD. **The City of Houston ONLY received \$96.18.**

The children of Houston deserve the best educational system possible. We as taxpayers fund this system and should take an active part in it. A well-educated population is imperative for the future of our city.

My Tax Dollars at Work

Now that you know that a large chunk of your property tax dollars go to HISD, do you wonder how the City of Houston spends your tax dollars? Sherry Weesner, former Chief of Staff for City Council District At Large 3, sent an article and a link to website where you can see how your City of Houston property taxes are spent. Check out hfdapp.houstontx.gov/MyTaxDollar/default.aspx

According to this website, the City's approximately \$2 billion General Fund is its largest fund and supports the majority of the basic services of the City, such as police and fire protection, health and human services, and garbage collection. The largest sources of revenue for the General Fund are property and sales taxes, which together make up

approximately 70% of the General Fund.

The current property tax rate for the City of Houston is 63.875 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation. The sales tax rate for the City is 1 cent, METRO's is 1 cent and the State of Texas' tax rate is 6.25 cents per dollar for

taxable items purchased. Obviously, most of the sales tax you pay ends up in the State's budget.

We also pay the Drainage Utility Charge (ReBuild Houston) (on your water bill). The fee is either 3.2 or 2.6 cents per year per sq. ft. of impervious surface depending on the type of road you live on (curb and gutter or open ditch). This fee pays for street and drainage improvements within the city.

The City created a website in 2013 to show us how our property taxes are spent. The My Tax Dollars at Work website on the City of Houston's webpage allows each of us to analyze how our Property Taxes are spent. It is enlightening to see that, with a tax bill of \$4,756 on a house appraised at \$248,000, that the City of Houston gets \$1,193 of which about \$700 goes to the Fire and Police Department.

Update on Hillcroft Bridge

City of Houston Pubic Works (PWE) has prepared plans and is working with the Harris County Flood Control District to get them approved. The assigned contractor will begin repairs once approval is obtained. Repairs will include adding helical piles, which will reinforce the bridge and allow both lanes to be open for traffic until the bridge replacement occurs in 2020. PWE currently does not have a timeframe for the Harris County Flood Control District approval; however, once the repairs do start, they should be completed in approximately 90 days, weather permitting.

CITY OF HOUSTON CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLAN

District K Meeting: March 10
District C Meeting: March 9

Every year the Westbury Civic Club prepares a list of Westbury issues for the city to look at when the city prepares its plans for capital spending. This list is then formally presented to the city during a public CIP meeting. The WCC works closely with the office of District K Councilmember Larry Green to prepare for this public meeting, so that his office is aware in advance of what our requests will be. The WCC also strives to bring a large group of supporters to the CIP meeting to demonstrate to the various city department heads that our residents care about these issues.

The highest priority is the unaddressed flooding problem that continues to plague Westbury 3. The WCC successfully lobbied for Storm Drain Reconstruction two years ago but the hardest hit area was not chosen by the City. Parkwest 3 is slated to have a storm reconstruction project courtesy of last year's CIP Meeting. The WCC continues to lobby for the entire neighborhood to get new infra structure.

Other requests include major street repair on Hillcroft and Ludington, multiple items at Hager, Chimney Rock, and Westbuy Park, new library, and a new community center.

The City of Houston invites residents to participate in the annual Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) process at public meetings in each City Council district. The meetings afford residents an opportunity to hear from city officials about CIP projects in their districts, voice questions and concerns and provide input regarding needed community improvements and services. Flood Control

New Gauge for Rainfall & Water Level along the Willow Waterhole Bayou

We are very pleased to announce the Harris County Flood Control District (HCFCD) has added a new measurement location in the Westbury community. This is the first gauge to actually be located in Westbury. Other nearby gauges are on Brays Bayou (at Gessner or at S.Rice) and on Willow Waterhole Bayou at Willowbend (near the Popeye's Lousiana Kitchen on the far side of S. Post Oak).

The recently installed Westbury gauge is located on the Willow Waterhole Bayou near Lansdowne. This is near Anderson Elementary / Hager Park and Westbury High School. Information from this gauge can be found at www.harriscountyfws.org/. The name of the new gauge is: Gauge 445 (the full name is "D112_445 Willow Water Hole @ Landsdowne Drive"). If you are looking at the map at the HCFCD website, then our new gauge is the one located near the word "Westbury". Hover the cursor over the gauge location until you can select "More Information" (or the Information icon if on a mobile device). Toggle back and forth between "Rainfall" and "Stream Elevation" as desired.

This new gauge will report rainfall amounts every 15 minutes when raining and will also report the water level in Willow Waterhole Bayou. There is a "Near Top of Bank" and "Out of Bank" feature on the overall map.

Reminder to Residents that Abut an Easement:

- 1. You are required to mow and clean the easement next to your property (this may include a sidewalk next to the bayou)
- 2. Any improvements you have placed in the easement or right of way is at risk of being removed. This is not your private property.


Update on the Willow Waterhole Detention Lakes

The last two detention compartments of the Willow Waterhole Project are undergoing construction along South Willow. "Compartment 6" (between The Gathering Place and a storage unit facility) is nearing completion. "Compartment 1" (across the street from the Westbury Place nursing home) is now being excavated and should be completed within three months.

HCFCD has a consultant working on the final design of the two "weirs" to be built on the banks of Willow Waterhole Bayou in Westbury. Each weir will be made of concrete and will be a low place in the bank of the bayou to allow high water to overflow from the bayou into the Willow Waterhole detention lakes. The size and shape of the weir controls how much water can overflow from the bayou. If you are aware of The Gathering Place building located on S. Willow, then you will be able to envision that a weir will be on located on each side of it. The consultant is tasked to produce the final construction package for the in-flow weirs, control structure, connecting drainage boxes, and channel improvements from South Post Oak to the control structure. If you want to understand more about how these systems work, go to https://www.hcfcd.org/learning-center/stormwater-detention-how-it-works/.

This work, coupled with the improvements that will be made as part of Project Brays between 610 to Fondren, is one more step toward alleviating structural flooding in Westbury. Another piece of the puzzle to be completed is the installation of new stormwater drainage piping in Parkwest 3, where structural flooding occurred in 2015 & 2013.

If you are concerned about area flooding, you should attend the CIP meeting on March 10. (pg 12)

Crime In Westbury – Putting It Into Perspective

Houston Police Chief Charles A. McClelland, Jr. recently released Uniformed Crime Report (UCR) statistics revealing a 3.2% *decrease* in crime in the city for 2015 compared to the previous year. If you are on social media, such as Next Door or a neighborhood Facebook page, you could get the impression that crime is rampant. Crime does occur all over the city. In Westbury our crime numbers are fairly constant year after year.

Looking at the March Criers for the last 3 years of crimes reported in Westbury: 52 in 2013; 38 in 2014; 39 in 2015; 36 in 2016. The majority of these crimes happen in commercial areas, the apartments or public areas. If you look at crime at our single family residences here are those same numbers: 26 in 2013; 12 in 2014; 20 in 2015; 15 in 2016. Fifteen crimes among 5,000 homes is a fraction, but not if you are one of those unlucky few.

Reducing Crime

Sadly, a young employee was killed during a robbery of a restaurant in nearby Bellaire in late February. We cannot fix the whole city, but we can work together to make Westbury safer. The visibility of the Precinct 5 Constables Westbury Area Patrol (WAP) helps keep away criminals with its rapid response to calls of suspicious behavior. The WAP is the most expensive program that the civic club operates, so it is vital that residents pay their dues to be able to continue this excellent patrol service! "Good neighbors watching out for one another" (a neighborhood watch program) is another key way to reduce crime. The WCC Security Director, Kevin O'Brien, and several residents interested in public safety issues have recently formed a committee to discuss issues and make action plans related to security issues. They are discussing the Precinct 5 Constable Office Neighborhood Watch training program for residents and how to improve participation in the WAP program.

Commercial Property Updates

Westbury Square - On February 2, one more building was demolished at Westbury Square. This was the former pizza restaurant building (601 Westbury Square) that had been vacant for years and was damaged by a fire in June 2010. It is unknown, at this time, when the demolition debris will be removed. Becky Edmondson and Cindy Chapman were on hand with sledge hammers and hard hats.

Bellfort Plaza – The vacant land across West Bellfort from Westbury Square is in the process of being re-platted to combine the several lots (formerly townhomes that were demolished



years ago) into a single lot. The building is proposed to host a mix of specialty retail and professional offices and will be called "Bellfort Plaza".

Westbury Estates –

In early February, all the buildings of the former St. Nicholas School at 10425 Mullins were demolished. The plan calls for a new subdivision to be called Westbury Estates and consist of 44 single family patio homes. It will be a



planned, deed restricted community with homes going for over \$500K. It is being developed by David Weekley Homes. The WCC is working with Chris Weekely of David Weekley homes to make sure neighborhood concerns are heard.

Westbury Centerette — There is no new update on this property. We have not heard anything from the owner. The construction trucks seen on the property were for the cell phone tower.

Willow Waterhole – One of the Top 10 Hidden Gems in Houston

"Sometimes the hidden gems in Houston are sitting right in the middle of Westbury. WCC Mailbag

Neighborhood 101 Workshop Recap

District K sponsors periodic training workshops to improve skills of civic leaders in our part of town. WCC Directors Rocio Lara, Becky Edmondson, and Cindy Chapman devoted a Saturday morning to attend the February 2016 training session called "Neighborhood 101: Legal Aspects of Running an Effective Civic Board".

This workshop discussed the federal and state laws governing civic associations, recent changes to applicable laws, what are dedicatory instruments, HOA governance, HOA communications, and Knowing and Understanding the Risks of Being a Volunteer. The WCC Board Members in attendance were very eager to share their new knowledge with the rest of the board at the February WCC Meeting. The WCC will be implementing several of the items discussed at the workshop, such as updating policies that are filed with the County and creating new policies that will help guide us.

Q: Can I recycle my shredded paper in my recycle bin?

No, do not put your shredded paper in your recycle bin. Here is what city Waste Management told us: Shredded paper does not belong in the recycling bin for two reasons. Because of its size and elasticity, it does not separate easily from other materials, i.e. it cross-contaminates bottles and cans. It also blinds many of the technologies from working correctly and lessens glass quality. Also, paper fibers lose length as they are recycled. Shredded paper is a special item that only certain folks want because of its length. Keeping paper whole is the best way to recycle it.

Q: Why doesn't the Westbury Civic Club use NextDoor as a tool for communications?

The official means of communication for the Westbury Civic Club are: the monthly WCC newsletter, the monthly WCC meetings, the WCC website, and the WCC Facebook page (Westbury Houston), which is used for late-breaking announcements. The WCC does not monitor NextDoor for complaints or questions, so please directly contact the WCC. Although an occasional informal announcement about community events or activities may be posted by individuals who are on the WCC board, the WCC as an organization does NOT make announcements via NextDoor.

One consideration, is that it is a violation of NextDoor policy for the WCC to be a member as neighbors are asked to "Join as an individual not as a couple, family, or organization." Furthermore, by state law, a civic club / HOA is required to maintain privacy about individual homeowners who may be in violation. So, the WCC cannot make comments when debate is ongoing on NextDoor about possible violations of ordinances or state laws. Finally, for the most human of reasons, NextDoor is just too tempting to slip in personal opinions, so rather than confuse the matter of personal versus official statements, any opinion expressed on NextDoor is a personal opinion, no matter who is it in Westbury that is making the comment!

Help Keep Westbury **Beautiful Home by Home**

Spring has sprung! It's a great time to get outside and start those projects that were put off due to the winter weather.

Home Maintenance

Please take note of your property. Is your sidewalk a trip hazard? Is the paint on your home peeling? Are portions of wood on your home rotting? Is your fence in need of replacement? Does your lawn have large bald spots? These expenditures are necessary to the upkeep of your home.

*Dirt/Mold- Please take a long look at your home and remove any dirt and mold build up on the gables, fascia boards, brick, window casings, gutters, and sidewalks.

*Sidewalks, Driveways & Curbs- Please remember according to the City of Houston, it is the responsibility of the homeowner to construct, reconstruct/ repair, or bring to grade the sidewalks, driveways, curbs or gutters adjacent to their property. We appreciate your assistance in helping to make Westbury safe.

Yard Maintenance

*Yard Work- It is time again to get your yard work done on a regular basis. During the winter it may not have been necessary to cut your grass on a weekly

or bi-weekly basis. The spring weather will help the grass grow much faster and require more upkeep.

*Leaves- Properties should be kept in a neat and attractive condition. Please collect and remove all leaves that have fallen on and in front of your property. The piles of leaves in the street are clogging up the street drainage system, causing drainage to be delayed or blocked.

*Yard clippings— Bagged yard clippings may not be left at the curb before trash day. They must be put out of sight until the 6pm the evening before a trash collection day. If your clippings are missed by the city on collection day, call 311 and report it.

Trash and Recycling

*Black Trash Bags- Do not use black trash bags for lawn waste. The city will not pick them up. Please use only the cities approved recyclable bags.

*Trash Receptacles- All trash & recycling receptacles must remain hidden from view until 6pm Wednesday night before our Thursday trash day.

Mosquito Control

It's that time of year again. The mosquitoes are out full force! Mosquitoes are not only annoying but they can carry dangerous illnesses. The best way to keep down the number of mosquitoes is to not let them breed.

Mosquitoes can breed anywhere that water is left to stand or collect. If you look in the standing water, you may see little wiggling things. Those are baby mosquitoes (larvae). Some examples of where water may be left standing include: pet water bowls, bird baths, low puddle areas, saggy gutters, and plant container saucers. What can each of us do to reduce the numbers of mosauitoes?

- Tip over all the water collectors in your vard and leave them turned over to discourage mosquitoes
- Don't allow standing water in saucers under a
- Rinse and refresh bird baths and pet water bowls daily.
- If you collect rainwater to water your plants, be sure the container has a good screen cover to keep mosquitoes out of the water.
- If you have a decorative pond in your backvard, check it for mosquito larvae. Small fish called Gambusia (Mosquito Fish) can be added to eat the mosquito larvae.
- Keep gutters in good repair.
- Get rid of old tires.

Grants and Master Plan

The Westbury Community Garden, a project of the non-profit Westbury Area Improvement Corporation (WAIC), will be celebrating its 6th Anniversary in March! Despite its short history, it is looking to the future and intends to develop a Master Plan. Phase 1 of the Master Plan process will be based on site analysis and consensus building. Phase 2 will provide construction drawings to address the priority issues of grading, drainage, and hardscape improvements at the garden site.

The costs for this Master Plan are being paid by 4 entities: \$10,000 from the Westbury Community Garden, a \$10,000 Community Building grant from the

United Way, and the remaining costs are being split between **Brays Oaks Management** District (BOMD), and Council District Funds sponsored by District K CM Larry Green. The Westbury Community Garden is honored that the United Way. BOMD, and CM Larry Green see the value of conducting this master planning effort. District K has previously assisted the garden by funding a sidewalk along Dunlap, BOMD, the leaseholder for the garden site, also recently contributed \$5,000 for a gravel driveway.
