White Elephant Garage Sale on April 29

Do you need to have a garage sale, yard sale or estate sale?

The Westbury Civic Club (WCC) provides fall and spring community garage sale events for our members. The Spring White Elephant Sale will be on Saturday, April 29, from 8AM to Noon at Westbury United Methodist Church. The rain date is May 6.

Booth space will go on sale at 9AM on Wednesday, March 22, for individual Westbury residents ONLY *

The WCC office will be open at 9AM on March 22 and close at 2PM. The office will also be open from 5-7PM on March 22 for booth space purchase. Booths may be purchased during normal office hours of 9AM to 1PM starting on March 23.

You must be a paid current member of the Garage, estate, yard, moving sales, etc. Westbury Civic Club to purchase a booth. This means you must have paid your 2017 WCC membership dues of \$50. If you

have not paid your 2017 dues, you may do so at the same time that you purchase your booth space. The booth price for individual Westbury residents will be \$20-\$25. Booths will go on sale to non-residents and groups/non-profit organizations on April 5, if space permits, on a first come, first serve basis. The booth price for non-residents is \$70-75.

The Westbury White Elephant Sale allows residents the opportunity to sell unwanted household items at a highly visible central location with security provided. The WCC provides location, security, bathrooms, and publicity for the sale. The Civic Club does NOT provide tables, chairs or shade.

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A Message from the Westbury Civic Club President

February was a month-long love fest -loving our new WCC office space, loving new partnerships, loving the Super Bowl, and loving that spring will soon be here!

On page 23 you will read about a new and exciting partnership that the Westbury Community Garden has with the Houston Museum of Health. The collaboration between The Health Museum, Westbury Community Garden, and Plant it Forward will focus on nutrition, health education & awareness, sustainability, gardening, healthy lifestyles, and outdoor activities as means of supporting a healthy community. Don't all of us want to be healthy and learn ways to have a healthier, happier life? Well, Westbury residents will have a hands-on, in-ourneighborhood opportunity to do just that every Saturday in March. March is Nutrition Month. With an organic farm stand at the WCG and classes at the WCG, now is your chance to learn or tweak those healthy habits.

If you read my message last month, I talked about the power of showing up. My thanks to those of you who showed up for the Westbury High school community meeting. Tough questions were asked of HISD and we, as a community, will continue to press for answers. You can read about it on page 9.

Schools were on our radar in February and there are articles on the ongoing construction at Parker Elementary and Westbury HS, the Westbury PTO, and the District as a whole. See pages 8-11.

On March 9, Westbury needs YOU!

Westbury needs you to attend the District K CIP meeting. This is the meeting where we advocate for big ticket items and we hear what the City has planned for our area. Do you want new streets and new drainage? Do you want less flooding? Then YOU need to show up on March 9! Won't you give a few hours of your time to just show up and be seen? Wouldn't new streets, new drainage, and less flooding be wonderful? Page 7 has the details.

Did you know that, in ALL of Westbury, parking a vehicle in your front or side yard is prohibited? District K Councilman Larry Green hosted a Neighborhood 101 Workshop on this ordinance in February. We are lucky to have such a community oriented Council person representing us. His monthly neighborhood workshops are open to everyone. His chief of staff, Donald Perkins, was our guest speaker at the February WCC monthly board meeting. The focus in that meeting was the upcoming CIP meeting.

In addition to our district council member, we are also represented on City Council by five at-large council members. Mike Knox, At-Large 1, visited the Westbury Civic Club office and then took a tour of Westbury. Cindy Chapman and I took him to see the good (Willow Waterhole), the bad (our streets) and the ugly (Westbury Square). We showed him the new ball fields at WHS, but we couldn't park at the ball field because all 27 of the parking places were taken. We showed him the apartments that HISD promised to acquire

as part of the Westbury HS campus. At the community meeting, it was reported that there was never any plan for that property. That is blatantly untrue. For decades, a regional sports facility for all of HISD had been proposed, including a natatorium. With these two new ball fields, cross country meets at the Willow Waterhole and the proposed tennis courts at WHS, those plans are already underway.

And speaking of sports, didn't Houston host an incredible Super Bowl? At-Large 3, CM Michael Kubosh, hosted a "Super" luncheon for the Super Neighborhood presidents during Super Bowl week. He has shown a lot of interest in matters related to Brays Bayou and we appreciate his attention. I had a chance to work with the NFL Environmental Team wearing both my Community Garden hat and my Keep Houston Beautiful hat. Westbury likes to recycle and it was fascinating and amazing to see all of the materials that were made available to Houston area nonprofits. Almost everything that was brought in to host the Super Bowl that wasn't being taken back was available to recycle, reuse, repurpose: 500,000 square feet of carpeting, 5 miles of fencing scrim, office supplies, banners, etc. For 25 years, the NFL has had a commitment to recycle rather than fill the landfills with all its Super Bowl trappings.

Thanks to everyone who has been helping to keep the Westbury United Methodist Church parking lot paper and glass recycling areas cleaner.



Questions about Houston? Need a service request? 311 can help!

Need to report a pothole or traffic signal outage? Was your trash pick-up skipped? Have questions about a municipal court date or how to resolve a parking ticket? Want to check when libraries, parks, and city facilities are open?

Houston's 311 Help and Information System is the City's official information and non-emergency service center that operates as the central point of contact for a broad variety of city services and resources. 311 lets you contact the Houston City government with the touch of a button-via phone, email, website, or app-to answer questions, find the right department, or file a service request.

311 is a 24/7 operation, handling approximately 2.1 million contacts per year, covering a wide range of issues from responding to requests for general information, submitting requests for specific city services.

Examples of the variety of 311 requests citizens can make:

- Report a pothole
- Report traffic signal problems
- Municipal court questions including your court date or closures
- How to resolve a parking ticket
- Check hours of operation of our libraries, parks, and other city facilities

311 agents handle over 142 different types of service requests that are forwarded to the appropriate department for handling. These requests can be

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Know Your Deed Restrictions

Do you know where your front property line is located?

Did you know that the city right-of-way/property line extends well into your front yard, and also into your side yard if you live on a corner lot? The city owns that land, not you, although you are required to maintain the land and sidewalk per city ordinance. Here is a photo of a house which recently sold in Westbury. The property surveyors have marked the "front

property line" with a little orange flag. The sidewalk and the city water meter are located in the city right-of-way.

Why does this matter? Every home in Westbury has a front and a side "setback distance" (and some also have a rear setback distance). Your



deed restrictions will list various items and how far they must be from the front, side, and back property lines. The front setback is NOT measured from the street curb; it is measured from the surveyor marks.

House Numbers

Take a look at your house numbers today. Do you have house numbers on your house and are the numbers readily visible from the street? Did you know that the city requires EVERY home to have a visible house number, so that emergency vehicles can respond quickly to the correct address. A house number painted on the curb is helpful, but it can be obscured by a parked car. The ordinance says a house number should be placed either on the primary door or within 18 inches from that door. If your house was built before 1979, then the numbers have to be at least 2" tall. If your house was built between 1979 and 2010, then the numbers have to be at least 3" tall. If your house was built after January 2010, then the numbers should be at least 4" tall.

District K Capital Improvement Plan Community Meeting Thursday, March 9, 6:30 PM – 8 PM Hiram Clarke Multi-Service Center 3810 Fugua. 77045

The City of Houston's Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) is a 5-year plan that list projects the City of Houston intends to construct. City representatives from the Public Works Dept., General Services Dept., and Parks & Recreation Dept. will attend the CIP meeting. The Mayor is scheduled to attend. Also, an update will be given of the ReBuild Houston initiative within District K.

These CIP meetings provide citizens the opportunity to participate in the budget process by contributing comments and suggestions about CIP-related needed services and improvements. In the past, Westbury has been very successful at lobbying the City at these meetings for much needed improvements to our streets, drainage, and parks.

Westbury residents are encouraged to attend this public meeting. If possible, please wear a shirt to the meeting that references the Westbury area.

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Construction Updates for WHS and Parker Bond

Westbury High School Groundbreaking

In February, Westbury High School held a celebratory groundbreaking ceremony to mark the start of construction as part of the voter-approved 2012 Bond Program. Westbury High School is programmed for a \$40 million addition and renovation that will feature 26 new classrooms, replace current portable buildings, add flexible learning centers, a commons area designed to serve a dual purpose as both a dining and gathering space, and two gymnasiums. Last month, WHS held a grand opening of the new baseball and softball fields that were included in an early phase of the overall school renovation project.

HISD sponsored a community meeting to address final design plans and provide an overview of what students, staff, and constituents can expect during the construction phase of this project. Read more about this meeting on the next page.

Westbury is among 40 schools, including 29 high schools, being renovated or rebuilt as part of the 2012 Bond program. Active construction is currently underway on roughly three dozen projects - more activity than at any other time in district history. Parker Elementary Construction Update New School Opening Delayed Until January 2018

The somber truth has been revealed and the HISD Bond team admits now that it was overly optimistic to say that the new Parker Elementary building would be ready for move-in by the start of school in August of 2017. The HISD construction team discussed that there have already been 95 rain-delay days on the Parker project. Even though it might be possible to move in for start of school in August 2017, while still finalizing construction, it is not recommended or desirable based on experiences at other schools. The new schedule is that the move will be made over the school break in December of 2017, and that students will start in the new building in January of 2018.

The Project Advisory Team (PAT) for the Parker Elementary School project met on February 15 to discuss the current construction status. School Principal Lori Frodine questioned why so little progress has been made. Construction was released in April 2016 for the new building, and the structural framing went up in October 2016. The owner for Patriot Construction and the site construction manager discussed that the rain delays have been significant. The slowest and most critical part of the project will be the completion of the utilities, mechanical, and heating/ventilation in "part C" of the building (the wing closest to the city park). The heating and ventilation systems must be working to do the sheetrock work.

Once the roof is completed and the mechanical systems are working, then progress will go much faster.





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Westbury High School Community Meeting: HISD Bond 2012

Westbury Community Raises Many Concerns about WHS Bond Construction with Houston ISD

A concerned and dissatisfied audience filled the meeting room at Westbury High School (WHS) on February 8, 2017, to hear an update about the Westbury High School bond project. WHS Principal Susan Monaghan greeted everyone, and architect Scott Brady, from Joiner Architects, gave an overview of the ongoing WHS project.

Phase 1 has recently been completed and provides new baseball and softball facilities for the school. Phase 2 is in progress and provides site stormwater detention, a new school entry, two new gyms with locker rooms, new kitchen and dining area, and new classrooms to replace the 26 "temporary" buildings which have blighted the campus for years. Phase 3 will be selective interior renovations, for example, to create a fire training area and teacher workrooms. Phase 4 will build new tennis courts where the 26 temporary buildings are currently located. Approximate move-in for the new building will be March 2018.

The audience raised numerous concerns and questions about the WHS project scope and funding. Safety is a major concern.

The audience was very frustrated that HISD has reneged on its Bond scope to acquire two apartment

complexes, which separate the main campus from the new ball fields. HISD allocated more than \$11 million to expand the WHS campus as part of the 2012 Bond, and the Board of Trustees voted to acquire the properties; however, the project team and board later opted not to proceed with the WHS campus expansion. It was noted that a guiding principle for the WHS project is safety; however the current ballfield design "is unsafe" because students must walk about 75 feet from the main campus along a narrow sidewalk that crosses two busy apartment driveways. Also, the school has been on lockdown

several times this year due to shootings or for those fields, especially since HISD was major crime at those two apartment complexes. The situation was described as facilities and programs at WHS and other "a time bomb", and that a "student is going to be killed or injured". It was pointed out that HISD had acquired several other apartment complexes next to other high schools in HISD as part of the 2012 bond project, yet HISD had not fulfilled the Bond promise to expand the WHS campus.

The audience was also frustrated that the WHS bond project does not currently plan to improve or

build new Fine Arts facilities at WHS, despite the fact that WHS now has a Fine Arts magnet and the current Fine Arts facilities are subpar. For many years, the Westbury Community and supporters of WHS have advocated for a superior Fine Arts programs and facilities for WHS. Why? Because nearby Parker Elementary and Meyerland Middle School have Music or Fine Arts magnet programs and are feeder schools to WHS.

Furthermore, music is becoming a well-known attraction at the adiacent Willow Waterhole Greenspace, which features an annual 2-day MusicFest. A future Levitt Pavillion outdoor performing center will soon start construction.

There were many questions about the WHS project funding

situation. If HISD had appropriated more than \$11 million to expand the WHS campus and then reneged on the promise, then why didn't WHS receive the full \$11 million for other improvements? Instead, WHS supposedly received 8 of that \$11 million to construct the new baseball and softball fields. Why didn't HISD already have money allocated

in litigation regarding Title IX disparities in schools in HISD? Where did the other \$3 million go? Why didn't HISD allocate enough funding to complete the tasks needed to bring WHS up to standard compared to the many new high schools being built as part of the 2012 bond?



Several parents stated that new sports facilities for WHS are good, but their higher priority is safety.

Concerns were also expressed regarding the student capacity for the new building wing. Will there be enough classrooms? The new wing is based on the current student population, but WHS anticipates an additional 150 students next year and we anticipate attendance to keep rising as the magnet

program continues to excel and expand.







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HISD: State of the Schools Address

Speaking before a sold-out crowd of more than two thousand guests at HISD's "State of the Schools" address, HISD Superintendent Richard Carranza and HISD Board of Education President/ District IX Trustee Wanda Adams urged business professionals and state lawmakers to see public education as an investment to ensure the future success of every student who walks through a school's doors.

"I am here to tell you that we must invest in every child," Carranza said, "regardless of where they live, where they were born, the color of their skin, their religion, or the language they speak. Every child at every school deserves a high-quality education that prepares them for a successful future ... They are our future leaders, teachers, engineers, entrepreneurs, computer programmers. They are the fulfillment of Houston's enormous potential."

The idea of investing was reiterated by Adams, who said, "Our investment in our students is this board's top priority. We set goals to improve student achievement in under-performing schools; to ensure that magnet programs are available for all students who wish to attend our specialty schools; and most importantly, to ensure that all children will be reading on grade level."

The program highlighted students, teachers, and schools from across the district. A combined Jazz Band from Parker ES, Meyerland MS (formerly known as Johnston), and Westbury HS under the direction of Al Campbell and Kyle Turner entertained the crowd during lunch. We are proud that our local schools have such excellent music students to be featured during the event.

Carranza addressed some of HISD's greatest challenges, including the state's school finance system, which has led HISD to being in "recapture" status.

Carranza called "recapture" today's most pressing issue for HISD. Although HISD serves 76 percent economically disadvantaged students, HISD is considered "property-wealthy" and is required to send millions of its local property taxes to the state to offset funds distributed to poorer school districts. However, in November 2016, Houston voters declined to authorize HISD to send \$162 million in local property taxes to the state of Texas. In May there will be another election to vote on recapture questions again.

The presidents of the WCC and WAIC, respectively Becky Edmondson and Cindy Chapman, attended as guests of Westbury High School. Edmondson said, "Supt. Carranza spoke about the need to BE ENGAGED in our public school system. For the majority of homeowners in Westbury, more than half of the property tax we pay each year goes to HISD. Shouldn't it stay in Houston? At our February WCC board meeting, a motion was passed to encourage the State legislature to look into school finance reform." Chapman said, "We, as the WAIC, believe supporting WHS is an important mission. During the February 2017 WAIC meeting, a motion was approved to pay more than \$3,000 to purchase outfits for the WHS Choir to wear during performances." Both Edmondson and Chapman had a chance to meet Supt. Carranza after the luncheon and told him that the Westbury community supports Westbury High School.


The Maplewood Marlins are members of the Southwest Houston Recreational Swim League. The team consists of 200 children on the meet and practice teams.

Keep Westbury Beautiful



Only RAIN in the DRAIN!

It's very important that you prevent debris from blocking the flow of water to the storm drain inlet. It is vital to keep the water flowing in the storm drain pipes.

Solid debris takes up space in the storm drain pipes making them less effective in transporting storm water to our ditches and bayous. Small sticks, leaves, newspapers, and other trash become wrapped together and could clog and slow the draining on your street. Our storm drains in Westbury are old.



They are original to the neighborhood and should be treated with care.

Only rain in the drain!!!

Here are some things you can do to help.

- ⇒ Sweep & BAG your leaves out of the street.
- ⇒ Clean the storm drain inlet in front of your home (if you have one)
- Street gutters are city property. If your neighbor doesn't sweep, do it yourself. It's worth protecting your own home with a little street sweeping.

Illegal Dumping in Local Ditches and Bayous *If you see it, REPORT it.*

Illegal dumping along our area waterways can cause flooding. If you see anything like this trashy mess, which was placed on the banks and down into the Braewick ditch, then please report it to 311 and to the WCC office.

Jennifer Edmondson, WCC Office Manager, saw this mess on February 8 during her weekly drive through Westbury. The WCC notified both HCFCD and the City of Houston Solid Waste department. The city sent out a crew to pull it to the curb for heavy trash pickup that next day. Thank you!

Westbury Area Improvement Corporation Meeting

March 15, 8:30AM, Salem Lutheran

The Board of the 501c3 nonprofit Westbury Area Improvement Corporation (WAIC) approved the following donations at the February Meeting: \$500 to the upcoming MusicFest at Willow Waterhole, \$500 to community theater group Company On Stage, and \$3,136 will be used to purchase performing clothes for the Westbury High School Choir. Additionally, the board approved the purchase of up to \$1,000 from the Westbury HPD Storefront account for a refrigerator to replace the broken one.

The Board approved creating a committee to work with the WCC regarding CIP requests on behalf of the Westbury SuperNeighborhood.

Public Safety – Officer Vick said that the Westbury HPD Storefront officers are getting bike certified to be able to patrol bayous. Almost every day HPD is contacting local panhandlers with Homeless Outreach to see who needs services. Most are panhandlers. Do not give cash.

Westbury Community Garden Project -Master Plan is finished; engineering drawings are being prepared for site drainage. The Garden is partnering with the Health Museum, starting with a 30 day "VegOut" challenge every weekend in March.

The security issues happening in one section of Westbury can be quite different than one several miles away. In addition to the Constable Precinct 5 program offering security checks on your home, they are also available to host meetings for a group of homeowners. Several streets in Parkwest 2



came together to hear Lt. Mitch Hutter, a Crime Prevention specialist with Pct 5, speak and answer questions.

Ted Heap, the newly elected Pct 5 Constable, has already improved services by adding an investigation division to complement their undercover teams. He had the following tips:

- ★ Do not let age, race or gender cause you to lower your guard. More females are committing crime.
- ★ If you are home, answer through the door if someone knocks so they know you are home. DO NOT open the door unless you know them. If you have children/grandchildren, teach them to answer and say, "My dad (or mom) can't come to the door." Give them the Constable number and program it into their phone.
- ★ As to door to door salesman, if no one buys anything they will stop coming. If you call them in as suspicious and the constables stop them, Westbury will get the reputation as a security conscious neighborhood. Lt. Hutter reminded us, that with the internet, there is so much personal information available online that someone could use your name or a neighbor's name as a ruse.
- ★ Most home break-ins occur weekdays between 10 AM and 2PM. Set the alarm when you leave. Set alarm when you are home. When you have workers, keep valuables out of sight. Your alarm is like a stopwatch. The thieves have to get in and out quickly. Heap said Pct 5 response time for non-emergency is 5 minutes and 2 minutes for emergencies.
- ★ Call anything suspicious in to dispatch and to put their number in your phone: 281-463-6666.

Don't forget Vacation Watch!

For residents who pay the WAP patrol dues, a special Vacation Watch may be requested from Pct 5. The form is available online. Sign up at www.constablepct5.com/vacation-watch/ If you want to request a Vacation Watch, but do not have access to a computer or internet, please call 281-463-6666 for assistance.

As part of the service provided by your Civic Club and the Super Neighborhood, we monitor the monthly 311 service calls submitted for the Westbury area. The WCC receives a monthly report which helps us monitor trends in missing trash pickups, broken water mains, nuisance properties and other items.

Houston Police Department News

The January PIP meeting generated some questions about the new police station for our area. Officer Amber Vick of the Westbury HPD storefront responded to the concerns about police response time in our District 15 when the station moves. She said, "Rest assured that HPD's response time will in NO WAY be negatively impacted by the physical move of Southwest patrol to the Nitida location. There may be a misconception that the police sit at the station until we get a call (similar to the Fire Department); however, this is NOT the case.

Southwest is broken into two districts, 15 and 16, and each district is broken into 4 beats. Each beat has units assigned to them and those units stay in those beats or adjacent beats the entire shift, thus allowing for quick response by patrol units within their respective beats. The Police Station is mainly for administrative work, handling walk-in reports, and where officers begin their shift, attend roll call, and pick up their vehicles and equipment. The Southwest Division will continue to provide quality customer service and police response to all of you."

Becky Edmondson, president of the WCC, had an opportunity to meet the new Chief of Police Art Acevedo. After visiting the current Beechnut Station, Chief Acevedo said he knew why



everyone is looking forward to moving to a newer, larger, modern, and more pleasant environment for officers and citizens alike. Additionally, a free community room (capacity of approximately 120 people) will be available for use by community groups for meetings, trainings, etc.

Prohibited Yard Parking

In 2009, Houston City Council passed an ordinance enabling neighborhoods to petition to prohibit parking in yards. Parking in yards is defined as parking a vehicle on an



unimproved surface in the front or side yard (for example, parking in the grass). The ordinance creates a criminal offense and a penalty of \$150 for any person who parks a vehicle in a front or side yard. Westbury successfully petitioned the City in 2009 and all of Westbury is now in a prohibited yard parking area. The deed restrictions in several sections of Westbury specifically prohibit the practice, as well.

District K's Larry Green held a "Neighborhood 101" workshop in February about yard parking issues. WCC Board members Cindy Chapman and Eugene Sirls attended on behalf of Westbury. At this time, only HPD officers can write a ticket for this offense and they must ticket the person parking the vehicle (or the property owner or home occupant where the illegal parking has happened). State Representative Gene Wu is sponsoring a bill (House Bill 714) in the Texas Legislature to allow this offense to be handled like any other parking offense, so that the vehicle may be ticketed rather than the person violating the ordinance. Also, the change would allow

ticketing by civilian parking enforcement. In the meantime, continue to report yard parking to the Westbury HPD Storefront.





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
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Flood Mitigation and Greenspace: A Three Part Series

This is the first in a series of three articles about how the Brays Bayou Association, the Willow Waterhole Project (March) and the Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy (April) came to be and how they have impacted life in Westbury.

Willow Waterhole Project Source: an article by Bob Schwartz

In late 1996, Russell Schexnayder made a proposal to the Westbury Area Improvement Corp. and the Brays Bayou Association that a stormwater detention site be constructed adjacent to the Willow Waterhole Bayou. There had been flooding in parts of Westbury along the WWB. This site would help revitalize the unrestricted commercial/light industrial area of the Westbury Super Neighborhood, and it would reduce the risk of flooding in the entire watershed.

The Brays Bayou Association was sold on the idea and voted to fund a technical and economic feasibility study with a local engineering firm. When brought to Harris County Flood Control District's attention, Director Art Storey said he would fund the study with some of his discretionary funds. Stormwater detention facilities were viewed at that time as "a hole in the ground with a fence around it". Since detention facilities are dry most of the time, Schexnayder also suggested emplacing a park on the facility. Kevin Shanley of the SWA Group, who had been advocating this dual-use concept for several years, was engaged by the BBA to prepare sketches illustrating how the concept could be implemented in the unrestricted part of Westbury. These sketches would soon prove very valuable

For the purposes of the study, the 31 miles of Brays were broken into some 15 "reaches". Each was evaluated with

scenarios to determine the best plan. The detailed cost/benefit analysis showed that a large detention facility on the Westbury site, along with channel-widening and bridge replacements from the mouth of Brays west to Fondren Road, produced the best results for the downstream part of Project Brays. When the Corps of Engineers approved the resulting Project Brays, it became eligible for federal reimbursement. In May 2000, Commissioner's Court approved Project Brays.

Project Brays consists of more than 75 individual projects throughout the entire 31 miles of Brays Bayou. The three major techniques being used are channel modifications, bridge modifications, and the construction of regional stormwater detention basins. Each component contributes to reducing flood levels and the risk of flooding; together they form the strategy for Project Brays. As one of Project Brays' four large stormwater detention basins, the Willow Waterhole Stormwater Detention Basin is designed to reduce flooding and bring much needed greenspace to area residents and businesses in southwest Houston.

HCFCD began construction on the Willow Waterhole Stormwater Detention Basin in May 2004, and construction of the basins is now complete. The control structures are the final piece, and construction will begin second quarter of 2017 and will be completed by third quarter 2018. The basins will hold a lot of storm water: 600 million gallons; 5,478,282 cubic yards or 1,865 acre-feet of stormwater storage.

The Willow Waterhole consists of 6 separate compartments that will be connected together to provide stormwater detention. The true effect that the Willow Waterhole basins will have on Westbury and the Willow Waterhole Bayou aren't fully felt yet. We got a glimpse during the 2016 Tax Day flooding. Westbury saw significantly less flooding during the Tax Day flood and subsequent rain events that would have normally flooded the homes along the east side of Hillcroft. The biggest reason for the decreased flooding is that compartments 1 and 6, which abut the Willow Waterhole Bayou and have a spill over wall, were partly excavated and held a great deal of water. The expectation is that once all the basins are connected, even more water will be stored in the basins during large flooding events.

Project Brays tag line is "Reduce the risk, rediscover the beauty". In March 2000, Texas Parks and Wildlife published an urban parks initiative, indicating it wanted to move quickly to award grants. City of **Houston Parks and Recreation Department** grants-writer Karen Cullar incorporated Shanley's plans into a grant application and, just five months after the program was announced, a \$750,000 grant was formally accepted by Houston City Council in August 2000. So in addition to the detention purpose, the Willow Waterhole became an urban destination for walking, bird watching and festivals. Next month, we will continue the series as the Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy forms in 2001.
