Westbury Area Patrol Deputies Reduced

The Westbury Area Patrol with Precinct 5 Constables is a key service provided by the Westbury Civic Club. Starting on March 1, the number of Constable Deputies in the Westbury Area Patrol contract has been REDUCED from 4 deputies to 3.

Why the change? The WCC has never received enough financial support to fully pay for the 4-deputy contract. Over the past 3 years, we depleted our security reserve funds to pay for the 4th deputy, but we can no longer do this. The 2019 contract was signed with just 3 deputies to patrol Westbury. The goal is to raise enough funds to fully pay for the 2019 Precinct 5 Constable contract by June. If we receive additional support, the board may consider adding the 4th deputy back to the contract. Please support the Westbury Civic Club and the Westbury Area Patrol. The dues form is on page 17.

Spring White Elephant Garage Sale on April 27

Do you need to have a garage sale, yard sale or estate sale?

The Westbury Civic Club (WCC) provides fall and spring community garage sale events to our members. The Spring White Elephant Sale will be on Saturday, April 27, from 8AM to Noon at Westbury United Methodist Church. The rain date is May 4.

Booth space will go on sale at 9AM on Wednesday, March 20, for individual Westbury residents ONLY *. The WCC office will be open at 9AM on March 20 and close at 2PM. The office will also be open from 5-6PM on March 20 for booth space purchase. Booths may be purchased during normal office hours of 9:30AM to 2PM starting on March 21.

You must be a <u>paid</u> current member of the Westbury Civic Club to purchase a booth. This means you must have paid your 2019 WCC membership dues of \$50. If you have not paid your 2019 dues, you may do so at the same time that you purchase your booth space. The booth price for individual Westbury residents will be \$20-\$25. Booths will go on sale to non-residents

and groups/non-profit organizations on April 3, if space permits, on a first come, first serve basis. The booth price for non-residents is \$70-75.

The Westbury White Elephant Sale allows residents the opportunity to sell unwanted household items at a highly visible central location with security provided. The WCC provides location, security, bathrooms, and publicity for the sale. The Civic Club does NOT provide tables, chairs, or shade.

Garage, Estate, yard, moving sales, etc. are not permitted at Westbury residences by long standing policy of the Westbury Civic Club and the deed restrictions. The official policy is printed on page 19.

*Due to limited space and increased interest by homeowners, only individual homeowners may purchase booth space in March. No individual may purchase a booth for a group or organization unless doing so under that organization's name.

A Message from the Westbury Civic Club President

Howdy, Westbury residents!

It's rodeo time in Houston! The 3+ weeks of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo events are amazing: trail rides, rodeo events, concerts, and farm animal competitions. I remember when I first moved to Houston, I'd see bumper stickers saying, "I wasn't born in Texas, but I got here as fast as I could!" I didn't know what to think about such a message. But over time, I've learned. Texas, Houston, in particular, is like no other place. As the rodeo begins, azaleas across the city come into bloom. They are joined by dozens of other plants bursting forth with flowers. The Mexican plums, pear trees, and red buds... could the flowering trees of Spring in Houston be more lovely, inspiring, or glorious? And the native Texas Bluebonnets will be blooming soon. I think of friends living up North. It's still snowing in the North, possibly through mid-April. Houston is a great place to live, especially in March.

March is "VegOut!" month at the Westbury Community Garden to celebrate exploring new foods. Events will be held on March 9 and 16. Details are on page 23. Bring the whole family or even a scout troop.

The Willow Waterhole is a great social space located in Westbury. You will read on page 21 how the Willow Waterhole Conservancy is looking for volunteers to help. This group advocates for amenities at the greenspace and hosts regular workdays, Scout projects, an annual MusicFest, and more. Be sure to mark

your calendar for the weekend of April 13-14 for the MusicFest. The Willow Waterhole is more than a social gathering space. The number one purpose is to reduce flooding in the Brays Bayou watershed, and the lovely "lakes" are a bonus, especially when the bluebonnets bloom on the banksides of the lakes. The WCC is still advocating for more to be done to alleviate flooding along the Willow Waterhole Bayou.

The District K CIP (Capital Improvement Plan) meeting will be held on March 20. This is where we ask for those BIG ticket items like replacement storm drainage projects. I urge all of you to attend and advocate for Westbury. We want ALL of our streets and storm drains replaced, our roads repaired, our park amenities improved, a new library opened in Westbury, and our community center updated or replaced.

The Westbury Civic Club is always striving to improve our response time to residents. We have decided to hire a 2nd part time employee to help alleviate the work load at the office, and the board approved the additional part-time employee in the 2019 budget. You will read more about this new position on page 7. You have likely noticed that this newsletter was delivered later than normal. The WCC tries to get the Crier newsletter delivered as close to the 1st of the month as possible. Unfortunately, sometimes circumstances beyond our control delay the delivery. February found the office hard hit by the flu and then Spring Break hindered the

delivery timing since the *Crier* is delivered by Westbury High School baseball team. The *Crier* is typically posted online at www.westburycrier.com and on our Facebook page (Westbury Houston) well before it is delivered to homes. You can also read past editions online.

On March 1, the new annual contract for the Precinct 5 Constable Westbury Area Patrol (WAP) went into effect, which means that we will DECREASE the number of officers from 4 to 3. Why? Because the WCC no longer has any security reserve funds remaining, so the board must be fiscally prudent to match our contracted payments with historical income. Our homeowners with voluntary dues will be receiving a dues letter in March. I encourage each of you to swiftly send in a WAP security patrol payment and your dues. You can opt to divide it into multiple payments. Income to date from mandatory assessments, WCC board members, and proactive residents who have already sent in their dues totals about \$150,000 out of the \$389,000 anticipated income for 2019. I want to emphasize that the regular civic club dues (\$50) and the WAP security patrol payments are both important.

Working together, let's make OUR neighborhood the safest, greenest, cleanest, and best that it can be!

District K Capital Improvement Plan Community Meeting

Wednesday, March 20, 6:30PM-8PM The Fountain Life Center, 14083 S. Main (at Hillcroft)

Mayor Sylvester Turner invites the community to participate in the annual spring meetings in each council district to discuss capital improvement projects and hurricane recovery programs. The mayor will also explain a reframed approach to improving neighborhood drainage and streets.

The City of Houston's Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) is a 5-year plan that lists projects that the City of Houston intends to construct. Information and experts will be available at tables before and after the community meetings to answer questions and provide resources.

Westbury residents are encouraged to attend this public meeting. There are several PENDING capital projects for the Westbury area, including: a New Library Building located in Westbury, Street and Drainage Projects, and Hager Park Improvements. Drop by the informational booths and ask questions about the scope and timing of these important projects.

These meetings provide citizens the opportunity to participate in the budget process by contributing comments and suggestions about needed services and improvements. In the past, Westbury has been very successful at lobbying the City at these meetings for much needed capital improvements for our streets, drainage, and parks.

Safe Sidewalk Project

The City of Houston Public Works Sidewalk Program constructs new sidewalks and ramps along streets leading to schools, major thoroughfares and improves accessibility for people with disabilities. Project WBS No. N-320610-0127-4 in

Westbury 5 and Westbury 3 is to remove and replace concrete sidewalks, ramps and driveways along Spellman Rd. (south side) from Renwick Dr. to Spellman Ct. The construction is anticipated to be complete by mid May 2019.

Solid Waste Working in Westbury

There have been many frustrations recently with inconsistencies in our recycling trash collection and then the January heavy trash collection was never picked up in most of Westbury. However, in February, Solid Waste trucks were rolling through Westbury to collect heavy trash and recycling. All solid waste pickup has resumed its normal collection





cycle! There was so much heavy trash that it took several days to collect all of it in the Westbury area. The Solid Waste Department has implemented temporary solutions to keep heavy trash and recycle collection on schedule until more new trucks arrive to replace the old, unreliable equipment. Also, they are hiring more drivers and maintenance workers to keep the trucks rolling.

When the WCC notified Solid Waste that they had missed a specific address of a new Westbury homeowner in February, Solid Waste sent out a truck to collect the trash later that very afternoon!

The WCC greatly appreciates that Solid Waste Department Managers Janice Simmons and Ed Zilton have been responsive to our concerns and have taken action to fix problems. Many thanks to Director Hayes and Mayor Turner for doing what it takes to get the job done. Solid Waste is one hard working department! They have been working very long hours and on weekends to get back on schedule. Can you imagine navigating our streets with this big equipment while cars are parked on the street? Give them a wave and a thumbs-up, and let them know we are happy to see them. And remember, if you hire someone for interior remodel work or landscape trimming, make sure they take the trash with them.

Now that the Solid Waste Department is back on schedule, please help KEEP WESTBURY CLEAN by putting your heavy trash out for collection at the correct time. It is a city violation to store your trash in a visible location, so a pile of debris is a violation whether it

is at the curb waiting for heavy trash collection at the wrong time, or if it is visible elsewhere in your yard at any time.

The weekly trash and monthly heavy trash and tree waste schedule is always posted in the Crier for easy reference.

Broken Trash & Recycling Cans

Many residents have contacted the WCC office in the past 3 months requesting help to get their trash or recycling cans fixed or replaced. If your cans are in need of repairing or replacing, please contact 311 and get a Service Request (SR) number. Once you have your SR number, report it to the WCC office at 713-723-5437 or westburycc@sbcglobal.net.

At this time, the City of Houston is out of green recycling lids. They have ordered 1,000 more but the delivery date is unknown at this time.

If you have reported a damaged or missing trash can to the City in the past several months but have not received a replacement can, please call 311 and re-report. Make sure to write down your Service Request (SR) number. Then call the WCC office with your SR number.



Homeowner Assistance Program - Harvey Recovery

The City of Houston has announced a new program, Homeowner Assistance Program (HOAP) to help Houstonians whose homes were damaged by Hurricane Harvey. Tom McCasland, Director of the City Housing and Community Development Dept., emphasized that the City has moved quickly to ensure recovery was launched as soon as federal funds became available. McCasland said, "The contract for the money was signed on the 4th, today is the 14th – it's ten days later and we're rolling out programs." The City will receive the \$1.17 billion for housing recovery through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and the State of Texas General Land Office. The City has taken a critical step forward with the opening of four Housing Resource Centers, one in each quadrant of the city, to help assist homeowners.

If your home flooded during Harvey, you may be eligible for assistance. Anyone who may be eligible must first complete a survey. The City has several ways to complete the survey.

- → By phone at 832-393-0550 (Monday Friday, 9am 5pm
- →In person at any of the new centers, the closest one to Westbury is the Southwest location at 6464 Savoy Drive, Suite 110, Houston 77036. Free parking.
- → Mobile outreach teams are also available to serve home-bound residents and others.

After you fill out the survey, you will be notified if you qualify and then start the application process. This money is from the federal government, so it has stipulations. The majority of the funds will be prioritized to seniors, disabled, and families whose income is less than 80% of the AMI (average median income). If there is money remaining, there are funds available even for those at 120% of AMI and higher. If you suffered a loss for which you were not reimbursed, fill out the survey. If you still have needs, fill out the survey. Whether your needs are physical or mental, there are resources.

Mayor Turner stated, "Our goal is to reach and serve as many of the affected homeowners as possible, especially those who are hardest to reach – our disadvantaged, senior citizens, those with limited English proficiency and those with special needs. We will not leave anyone behind."

To give you an idea of 80% income limits by family size according to one source:

HOAP has five program options that you may be eligible to participate in if you qualify after taking the survey. There is roughly \$400 million available for HOAP.

Reimbursement: You may be eligible for reimbursement of some expenses if you've completed repairs.

Acquisition: If your home was substantially damaged, you may be eligible to have your property purchased by the City. You may also be eligible to apply for additional assistance to purchase a new home.

City Managed Rehabilitation and Reconstruction: The City will use a pool of contractors to rehabilitate or reconstruct storm-damaged homes. The City will manage and complete the construction process on your behalf.

Homeowner Managed Rehabilitation: This option is only available if you have already started construction on your home and are under contract at the time of application but need financial assistance and technical expertise to complete repairs.

Interim mortgage assistance: If you are making both a mortgage payment on your storm-damaged home and making a rental payment for a temporary home, you may be eligible to receive up to 20 months of mortgage assistance.

Traffic Warning for Hillcroft and Project Brays Update

You may have seen a lot of news lately full of conjecture about the current status of Project Brays, a project to reduce flooding along the Brays Bayou Watershed. What parts of the project are moving ahead and what parts may be delayed?

- → Channel Widening of Brays Bayou This is funded and the work continues up to the Fondren area.
- → Elevating the Hillcroft Bridge This is funded and the final construction details are being worked out. The bridge will be kept, but will be ELEVATED by about 18 inches, which means that the Hillcroft bridge will be closing soon, perhaps as soon as April. Please consider the alternate routes which you might need to use when the Hillcroft Bridge is closed. FYI, the City of Houston has been asked to consider paying an "enhancement cost" to change the lane striping on the Hillcroft bridge to allow more width for pedestrians and bicycles.
- → Other Bridges to the east of Hillcroft. This timing of these bridge replacement projects is now less clear. In some cases, it has been discovered that there are conflicts with utility or communication lines buried underground which will take more effort and time to re-do than had been anticipated. Additionally, some concerns have been expressed about how many bridges might be closed at the same time along Brays Bayou and problems with neighborhood in-out access at specific locations. At this time, it is not known how long it will take for these traffic considerations to be reviewed and whether a detailed traffic study will be done or a simpler traffic plan.

Regarding the impact to Westbury residents, MOST of the flood reduction efforts for Brays Bayou have already been implemented. Additionally, most homes in Westbury which are in a 100 or 500 year flood zone are in the Willow Waterhole Bayou flood zone, and the work being done on Brays Bayou has limited effect reducing the Willow Waterhole Bayou flood zones.

It's very important that you prevent debris from blocking the flow of water to the storm drain inlet. It is vital to keep the water flowing in the storm drain pipes.

All you have to do is drive through Westbury during or after a storm and see all the leaves pilling up and/or flowing into the storm sewers. Solid debris takes up space in the storm drain pipes making them less effective in transporting storm water to our ditches and bayous. Small sticks, leaves, newspapers, and other trash become wrapped together and could clog and slow the draining on your street. Our storm drains in Westbury are old. They are original to the neighborhood and should be treated with care. Only rain in the drain!

Here are some things YOU should be doing every week and especially before a storm.

- → Sweep & BAG the leaves out of the street.
- → Clean the storm drain inlet in front of your home (if you have one)

→ Street gutters are city property. If your neighbor doesn't sweep, do it yourself. It's worth protecting your own home with a little extra street sweeping. Maybe it will shame them into action.

Adopt a Drain

The City of Houston knows how important it is to keep our storm drains clean. They spend millions of dollars each year clearing them of debris. The City of Houston has a residential Adopt a Drain program. By pledging to keep your drain free of leaves and debris, you will be joining your neighbors in helping to protect the environment, manage stormwater, and minimize flooding. Westbury Area Improvement Corporation

What is the Westbury Area Improvement Corporation?

The Westbury Area Improvement Corporation (WAIC) is a 501c3 nonprofit founded in 1991 and is now defined to serve the geographical area of the Westbury Super Neighborhood. The WAIC board includes representatives from local civic organizations (including the WCC), schools (Westbury High, Meyerland Middle, Anderson Elementary, and Parker Elementary), businesses, and area nonprofits. The WAIC board meets monthly at 9:30AM on the 3rd Wednesday. This meeting also functions as the "Westbury Super Neighborhood" meeting and is thus also attended by representatives from METRO, the Mayor's Office, District K, HPD, Solid Waste, and others.

February Meeting Notes

The February joint meeting of the WAIC & the Westbury Super Neighborhood Council was held on February 20. The board of the WAIC approved purchasing 3 flags for about \$153 to replace stolen flags. These flags are flown on Westbury public esplanades during official flag days, and are posted by the Westbury High School ROTC students. The board also approved hiring a contractor, Elite Power Wash, to clean landscaping beds and power wash the Westbury signs at 7 locations.

Budget and Fundraising— Want to create an operating budget and get income. Do business outreach. Consider a capital campaign to raise significant funds to improve the Westbury area.



Awards

MPVA students continue to shine having recently gone to UIL academic competition and bringing back medals in Oral Reading, Art History, Editorial Writing and Calculator Skills. These students are products of the rigorous academic program at MPVA that helps stretch students academically and creatively.

NEW Portable Fingerprint Identification Units (AFIS)

The nonprofit Westbury Area Improvement Corporation (WAIC) board voted last year to purchase two portable AFIS fingerprint units for use by our local Southwest Houston Police Department station. After a long delivery period, the two new AFIS units have been received and are already in service by HPD. Thank you, WAIC!

What is an AFIS unit? The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) says, "One of the latest innovations in crime analysis is the Automated Fingerprint Identification System (AFIS), which is a computerized system that stores the identifying characteristics of more than 4.8 million individuals currently on file in the DPS Crime Records Service. The AFIS Section also performs systematic computer searches of unknown fingerprints by optically scanning a print and comparing it with those on file. Prior to AFIS, fingerprint searches had to be done manually, making it an impractical, time-consuming process to compare an unknown print to the millions of known prints on file."

Additionally, our WAP Precinct 5 Constables team also has an AFIS unit - provided by the Constables Office. When an AFIS unit is available, then suspects don't have to be transported elsewhere to be identified and suspects are more likely to provide a correct name from the start.

House Numbers

Take a look at your house numbers today. Do you have house numbers on your house and are the numbers readily visible from the street? Did you know that the city requires EVERY home to have a visible house number, so that emergency vehicles can respond quickly to the correct address. A house number painted on the curb is helpful, but it can be obscured by a parked car. The ordinance says a house number should be placed either on the primary door or within 18 inches from that door. If your house was built before 1979, then the numbers have to be at least 2" tall. If your house was built between 1979 and 2010, then the numbers have to be at least 3" tall. If your house was built after January 2010, then the numbers should be at least 4" tall.



Burglary of Motor Vehicle Leads to Arrest

An alert driver witnessed a burglary of a motor vehicle (BMV) on the morning of January 28 and took a photo of the getaway vehicle used by the suspect. The witness flagged down a Precinct 5 Constable vehicle patrolling in and around the Westbury area. After some investigation and with a description of the suspect's vehicle, the Constables were able to track down the suspect to an apartment complex. After a short foot chase through the complex, the suspect was apprehended and arrested. The Precinct 5 Constable Deputies found items taken from the vehicle in his possession and he led them to a bag stolen in the burglary. The suspect was arrested by Precinct 5 Constables. The Suspect was charged with the BMV offense and taken into custody for this and several other warrants. The stolen property was returned to the Complainant.

Elder Scam Alert

Recently, an elderly victim of a scam in Westbury waited until the next day to report the scam because the victim spoke limited English. Our Westbury security works best when crime victims report immediately, so that law enforcement can search for the vehicles and perpetrators. In this elder scam, a male driving a new red truck knocked on a door and claimed he was doing contractor work nearby and

needed to go into the backyard. The victim accompanied the man into the backyard, and while distracted, an accomplice entered the home to search for valuables. The man left the backyard quickly after the truck horn sounded.

Translation Services by Constables

Our Westbury Area Patrol Constables have asked us to help spread the word that the Constables have **translation services**. If you have family or friends in Westbury who need translation services, please let them know that our Westbury Area Patrol Constables say that they "will make every effort to accommodate any and all needs." Our Westbury Area Patrol constable program works best when EVERYONE reports crimes or suspicious activities. Obviously, this is written in English, so please help spread the word to friends and family!

Constable Activity Report

During the 18 days from February 1 to February 18, our Westbury constables have reported 388 activities, which averages to about 22 activities per day, in addition to routine patrols. The most common activity is a "Contract Check", where they responded 150 times to service requests. The next most common activity is "Meet the Citizen" where they introduced themselves to citizens 89 times. There were 44 Traffic Stops

resulting in 9 citations, one referred to HPD, and the rest were warnings. They performed 2 Welfare Checks, and in one case the resident was discovered deceased after an employer was concerned that an employee had missed several days of work. They responded to 11 calls about suspicious persons, 13 calls about suspicious vehicles, reported 3 cases of Open Windows, and made 23 calls to check activity at local Parks or Schools or Religious locations in Westbury. They investigated 3 Burglaries of Motor Vehicles and also responded to various car accidents, reports of discharged firearms, disturbances, mental health, domestic problems, etc. We encourage Westbury residents who are paid supporters of the Westbury Area Patrol to also use the constables for Vacation Watches and also for home security alarms.



Vacation Watch

Going on a Spring Break Vacation? Leaving for a week long getaway? Well, if you pay your Westbury Area Patrol dues, make sure you request a vacation watch by the Constables. This is a great service that is included in our contract. A deputy will check out your property at least once a day to make sure it is secured and nothing suspicious going on.

Birds, Birds, Birds

If you build it, they will come -- especially when you are talking habitat and birds. The Willow Waterhole Bird Survey was started in June 2007 and is held on the third Saturday of each month (but no survey in December). During the 2-hour count, the number of species identified can range from around 30 in summer to over 50 in the winter.

The January WWH Bird Survey identified 35 species. It turned out to be a good day for raptors despite the wind and falling temperatures. Playing in the winds that day were 2 Caracaras, an

Osprey, a Red-shouldered Hawk, 2 Red-tailed Hawks, a Sharp-shinned Hawk, a Coopers Hawk, an American Kestrel, and both vultures. Twenty-six (26) Killdeer camouflaged in with big chunks of mud were spotted on the side of one of the more recently dug up ponds. The birds were so well camouflaged that they were not spotted until they put a scope on the area! A very special thanks to Mark Meyer & David Crabtree who joined Mary Ann Beauchemin in leading the individual survey area groups this morning.

The monthly survey begins in the parking lot of the Gathering Place at 5310 South Willow Drive. Our usual starting time is 8 AM, but we begin at 7 AM from April through September. Bird watchers split up into three or four groups to cover the park thoroughly, and as of mid-2015, nearly 200 species had been reported to eBird. Fire Safety

Use common sense in the kitchen. Limit distractions when cooking and don't leave a hot oven or stovetop unattended.


Blow out candles before you leave a room and/or before you go to sleep.

Garage Sales in Westbury...Explained

For many years the Westbury Civic Club has had a policy that garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like are not permitted in Westbury. This long-standing policy has been announced in the monthly newsletter many times. In 2014, the board of directors of the Westbury Civic Club reviewed and approved a policy document regarding these sales to formalize the wording. (See policy in box to the right)

You will notice that the policy focuses on the deed restriction aspect of garage sales – nuisances (parking violations, traffic obstructions, and illegal advertising) and non-residential use of property. Many hundreds of homes in Westbury face major thoroughfares. This poses particular challenges related to parking and traffic if garage sales are conducted. In other Houston neighborhoods, it is sometimes common for homes on major thoroughfares to be used for ongoing sales; indeed, those highly visible homes are sometimes sought after by those who want to run a retail sales business from their home or yard. Over the years the WCC has shut down people selling Easter baskets, Mother's Day flowers, appliances, and other sales from highly visible Westbury yards. The City Legal Department has helped shut down certain garage sale businesses in Westbury.

Both the city and the state have rules which make it illegal to post signs on public right-of-way. These illegal signs are considered to be trash and visual blight. The city, the Brays Oaks Management District, and volunteers in Westbury all collect illegal signs. Last month WCC volunteers collected more than 30 illegal signs related to garage or estate sales.

Another important consideration regarding garage sales is Crime Prevention. A garage sale allows passersby to know whether you have children and the approximate age of your children. If residents open their garage doors for shade during a garage sale, then they allow passers by to see what is stored in the garage: tools, exercise equipment, and other valuable items. An estate sale or garage sale allows visitors to leisurely examine your security systems and those of those of your neighbors.

Reserve your space for the 2019 Spring White Elephant Sale, starting on March 20.

Don't violate the deed restrictions or be a nuisance to your neighbors. Consider taking part in the next White Elephant Sale on Saturday, April 27.

WCC POLICY

Garage Sales, Estate Sales, Yard Sales, and Moving Sales, etc.

Westbury Civic Club Policy: Garage Sales, Estate Sales, Yard Sales, Moving Sales

Purpose: The intent of this policy is to clearly convey the Westbury Civic Club restriction on garage sales, estate sales, yard sales or any other independent action of the kind.

Definition: Garage, Estate, Yard or Moving Sale: The sale of personal property in, at, or upon any residential lot or home. This includes, with limitation, sales of personal property from the garage, driveway, yard, patio or house area of such premises.

Policy: Garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like are not permitted in Westbury.

All sections of Westbury and Parkwest have deed restrictions that state "no noxious or offensive trade or activity shall be carried on upon any lot nor shall anything be done thereon which may be or become an annoyance or nuisance to the neighborhood". Garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like draw substantial traffic and contribute to: hindering the flow of traffic on major thoroughfares; impeding access to homes by emergency vehicles or residents due to parking congestion; parking violations on city streets or esplanades; parking violations from vehicles parked on front yards; and, parking violations from blocking public right-of-way on sidewalks. Furthermore, advertising materials for garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like contribute to: visual blight, trash along public streets, and violations of the city sign ordinance. The Westbury Civic Club considers garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like to be "an annoyance or nuisance to the neighborhood".

All sections of Westbury and Parkwest have deed restrictions that state the lots are to be used for single family or family residential purposes. The Westbury Civic Club considers garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like to be commercial use of residential property.

Since the officer is unable to receive a regular paycheck or pursue any overtime pay, or additional income from working a second job, his or her family is at risk of not



meeting its needs. The Houston Police Family Support Unit helps these officers by providing materials and support during those difficult times.

Willow Waterhole Monthly Bird Surveys

Nature-lovers of Westbury, did you know that the Houston Audubon Society conducts a monthly bird survey at Willow Waterhole and that the public is invited to participate? Since the study area is so large, the effort is divided into several teams, each headed by an experienced leader. The next bird survey will be held on March 16 at 8 AM. Meet in the parking lot of The Gathering Place at 5310 S. Willow.

During the January survey, 35 different species of birds were identified, including 2 Caracara, an Osprey, a Red-shouldered Hawk, 2 Red-tailed Hawks (both a Sharp-shinned Hask and a Coopers Hawk), an American Kestrel, and both Black and Turkey vultures. Call 311 - Be The "Squeaky Wheel" - Complaining has its Benefits!

There is an old adage that "the squeaky wheel gets the grease", meaning that those who complain are more likely to get a response than those who do not. When working with the city to advocate for projects, it is exceedingly helpful to have many voices who have expressed concerns about a problem to the city via 311. The city Public Works Department needs DATA (proof of problems) to demonstrate that it is working on the appropriate projects. Please report problems to 311 to build the documentation to get your problems worked on!

Structural flooding? Call 311.

Obstructed, slow-draining stormwater drains? Call 311. Toilets don't drain well during rainy weather? Call 311. Toilet paper bubbling out of manholes? Call 311. Sand in your water? Call 311.

Funny taste to your water? Call 311.

For example, HOW did the WCC advocate to the city and county to do flooding and drainage projects in Westbury? When told that there had been few complaints to 311 about structural flooding and drainage issues, the WCC encouraged our residents to contact 311 about these problems. Also, the WCC did driving surveys to document approximately which blocks flooded during Harvey and other high rainfall events.

In January, Jennifer Edmondson and Cindy Chapman met with a room full of engineers and departmental representatives discussing the upcoming Westbury Drainage and Streets Sub-Project 1. The use of 311 data was discussed during this meeting for 3 different topics.



- * Extent of drainage problems in the target area? The engineers showed a map with every 311 complaint about structural flooding in that general area in Westbury. A discussion ensued that there had not been very many 311 complaints (despite this being a known problem area to residents for drainage problems), so we also discussed the data collected by the WCC.
- * Should the water lines be replaced? The engineers discussed that the old cast-iron water piping on these streets was replaced in the 1980s and 1990s with PVC, some segments may have newer PVC, and that the old cast-iron piping has been left in place. Only 4 complaints have been made to 311 about water quality, and there was discussion whether this is sufficient justification to replace the water lines now or to defer later to do the water lines.
- * Should the sewer lines be moved? The old sewer lines from the 1950s have been rehabbed and there have been few 311 complaints about sewer service. The newer design is to put sewer lines in the public right of way, in front of the house.

Feeding Stray Cats

Westbury is known as an animal loving neighborhood. BUT for some residents too much love is not a good thing. The Civic Club has received numerous complaints about neighbors feeding stray cats. It is against City ordinance to feed stray cats unless you trap them and have them neutered.
