If sufficient additional funding is received, then the board will consider whether to add back our 4th deputy.

The Spring Break timeframe in March can be hectic for families, so if you put aside that dues letter to handle later, then this is a reminder to send your dues now. If you have misplaced your letter, the dues form is on page 17.

The Westbury Civic Club (WCC) provides fall and spring community garage sale events for our members. The Spring White Elephant Sale will be on Saturday, April 27, from 8AM to Noon at Westbury United Methodist Church. The rain date is May 4.

Booths may be purchased during normal office hours of 9:30AM to 2PM, Monday thru Thursday at the WCC Office. You must be a paid current member of the Westbury Civic Club to purchase a booth. This means you must have paid your 2019 WCC membership dues of \$50. If you have not paid your 2019 dues, you may do so at the same time that you purchase your booth space. The booth price for individual Westbury residents will be \$20-\$25. Booths will go on sale to non-residents and groups/non-profit organizations on April 3, if space permits, on a first come, first serve basis. The booth price for non-residents is \$70-75.

The Westbury White Elephant Sale allows residents the opportunity to sell unwanted household items at a highly visible central location with security provided. The WCC provides location, security, bathrooms, and publicity for the sale. The Civic Club does NOT provide tables, chairs or shade.

Garage, estate, yard, moving sales, etc. are not permitted at Westbury residences by long standing policy of the Westbury Civic Club and the deed restrictions. So why not have fun, make money, be safe, and be a good neighbor.

*Due to limited space and increased interest by homeowners, only individual homeowners may purchase booth space in March. Non-residents and ALL non-profit organizations and groups (including Westbury resident run) must wait until April 3. No individual may purchase a booth for a group or organization unless doing so under that organization's name.

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Parker Elementary Grand Opening

HISD held the long awaited dedication event of Parker Elementary and the adjoining Spark Park on February 28. The new auditorium was full of proud parents, teachers, administrators, dignitaries, students, and alumni. The performances by the choir, strings, jazz and brass were excellent and amazed all those in attendance with their talents. The Westbury High School Color Guard presented the colors. Fifth graders Nevaeh Brooks and Eli Ellery acted as Masters of Ceremony (emcees).

Guest speakers included: HISD Trustee Wanda Adams, Councilmember Martha Castex-Tatum (a Parker alumna), HISD interim Superintendent Dr. Grenita Lathan, and Kathleen Ownby, Executive Director of the SPARK Park program. Principal Lori Frodine was thanked for her persistence and determination getting our new state-of-the-art Parker Elementary-Music Magnet building completed. Additionally, current and past teachers, administrators, design team members, and members of the class of 1965 were asked to stand and

received applause. After the ribbon cutting, Parker students led tours of the building, while music instructor Al Campbell led the jazz band as they entertained during the reception.

Parker is certainly the 21st century school that HISD promised our community!

"This is a 21st century school and it inspires confidence and pride not only in the students and staff but everyone who lives around it because a school is the heart of a neighborhood," HISD Trustee Wanda Adams said. The \$33 million project, which was specifically designed to house the school's renowned fine arts magnet program, is a part of HISD's voter approved 2012 Bond Program. The two story, 113,000-square-foot building includes an auditorium with collapsible bleacher-style seating, band, orchestra, vocal, and multipurpose rooms, and flexible learning spaces for 850 students.

Pre-K, Kinder, first and second grade classrooms are on the ground level and third through fifth grades are on the second floor. A new cafeteria also features a separate seating area for parents visiting their children for lunch.

The Spark Park at Parker Elementary features a walking path decorated with images of musicians. The Spark Park will be open on weekends and when school is not in session for the community to use.

"While Parker has always been an outstanding school, this new building will provide students with everything they need to achieve their dreams," said HISD Interim Superintendent Grenita Lathan.


The program started with a welcome from CM Martha Castex-Tatum; this was her first CIP meeting as Councilmember. She introduced Mayor Sylvester Turner as Houston's 62nd mayor. He first spoke of the re-branding of ReBuild Houston to become Building Houston Forward. The emphasis is that, rather than rebuilding, we are building for the future. To that end he highlighted all the CIP projects completed in District K this past year including: the new Southwest Police station, the Buffalo Speedway Bridge, Linkwood Park and Street reconstruction project. As to what would be coming to our area in the future, the Mayor said that negotiations were moving forward to acquire the Shell property adjacent to the Willow Waterhole greenway. He spoke to the need to access the State of Texas' Rainy Day Fund to use as local matching dollars on federal projects related to Harvey flooding recovery. He talked of the need to be stronger and more resilient.

Carol Haddock, Director of Houston Public Works, had an interesting presentation on the city assets in District K:

Trash on West Bellfort

Chances are if you have driven down W. Bellfort this past month, you've seen the large trash pile that fills a



Our liaison with the City told us that DON would be abating the trash last week but that their grappler was broken and would be hiring a contractor. As we go to print we are awaiting a response as to when it will be picked up.

190,267 residents, 420 miles of ditches, 1,380 miles of street, 25 parks, and more. She said in addition to the larger CIP projects, which are delayed due to Harvey, they would be doing smaller projects. Although there was only one marked on their map for Westbury.

Chief Recovery Director Steve Costello described the monies coming in for Harvey recovery. He asked us to reach out to our representatives in the Texas legislature, and ask them to support two bills. Senate Bill 500, which has passed through the Senate and is now in the Texas House for consideration, provides more than \$3 billion for Harvey-related expenses. Senate Bill 7 would establish the "Texas Infrastructure Resiliency Fund" to pay for expenses like floodplain management and projects related to Hurricane Harvey.

Last, but not least, Tom McCasland, Director of the Houston Housing and Community Development Department, who is administering the 1.3 billion dollars Homeowners Assistance Program (HoAP), brought welcome news that reimbursement

money for out-of-pocket Harvey repairs are eligible for reimbursement. Do you know about the City of Houston's recovery programs for homes damaged in Hurricane Harvey? Even if you've already finished repairs, there's funding available to reimburse homeowners for some expenses (\$20,000 to \$80,000, depending on income). To see if you're eligible, call 832-393-0550 or go to recovery.houstontx.gov/survey to get started. @HoustonHCDD

Some Westbury area CIP projects were not discussed during the presentations, but the WCC continues to advocate for them. All CIP projects have been delayed due to resources needed for Harvey flooding. A new library building was approved in a bond by city voters, and the proposed location is in Westbury on the site of the "old post office", near the Chimney Rock fire station. Voters also approved bonds to improve Hager Park, next to Anderson Elementary. Additionally, there are drainage projects for Westbury in the CIP.



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Climate Action Plan Meetings

Mayor Sylvester Turner and the Office of Sustainability are in the process of developing Houston's first community-wide Climate Action Plan. A Climate Action Plan provides evidenced-based measures to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and preventative measures to address the negative outcomes of climate change. After three 500-year floods in as many years culminating with the largest rain event in North American history, climate change is an unprecedented challenge for Houston.

Developing a Climate Action Plan allows the City to develop strategies that will not only help minimize the City's carbon footprint but can help save money and improve the quality of life of residents. The Plan will demonstrate how the City will adapt and improve its resilience to climate hazards that impact the city today as well as risks that may increase in the coming years. Co-benefits associated with climate action planning include decreased traffic and congestion, improved air quality, better access to parks and green spaces, and cost savings through energy efficiency projects.

Houston has one of the highest per capita greenhouse gas emissions in the country, largely due to high emissions from transportation. For more information and to see how Houston compares to other cities, visit: https://www.c40.org/other/gpc-dashboard.

Trash Can Woes

Kudos to WCC Office Manager, Jennifer Edmondson, who figured out that there was a significant 311 problem related to broken trash bin lids. If a resident reported online to 311 that they had a problem with a broken trash bin lid, then the 311 system was mistakenly classifying the complaint as "missed recycle collection" and the system kept closing out the complaint. Some residents had their complaint closed over and over. This does not appear to be an issue for

residents who reported the problem by telephone or 311 app. The City fixed that mapping error the same day the WCC notified them and they are now checking all of the Solid Waste Dept. 311 codes to see if there are any other codes which are not "mapping" correctly.





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An Interview with Matt Zeve

HCFCD Deputy Executive Director

Becky Edmondson, president of the WAIC, is serving on a Harris County Flood Control joint task force looking at the new rainfall criteria in light of reports released by the NOAA Atlas 14. (You can check it out



yourself at https://hdsc.nws.noaa.gov/hdsc/pfds/pfds_map_cont.html) Becky had an opportunity on March 4 to interview Deputy Executive Director of Harris County Flood Control (HCFCD), Matt Zeve. As always the Westbury area is so appreciative of HCFCD's willingness to answer our questions. With 700 flooded homes in Harvey and many that have flooded multiple times, flooding issues are a top concern of the Westbury Civic Club and WAIC.

Matt, I've been hearing rumors that Project Brays is at a standstill and may even be cancelled? This is not true. HCFCD is considering canceling two contracts awarded earlier this year for the reconstruction of the Buffalo Speedway bridge (contract 1) and the Ardmore Bridge over Brays Bayou as well as the extension of the Stella Link Bridge (contract 2). The bridge improvement projects will still be completed, but some delays around utility conflicts could push the start of construction back until later in 2019.

In addition HCFCD plans to develop a watershed wide community outreach program to meet with and inform all neighborhoods involved in the completion of Project Brays. Lastly HCFCD must be sensitive to mobility impacts caused by bridge closures and are going to undertake a mobility study to provide bridge closure sequencing in order to minimize delays.

What about the rumor that Project Brays is shutting down?

Absolutely not. There are four (4) projects currently underway. The Channel improvements from Fondren to South Rice are ongoing in your area. The raising of the Hillcroft Bridge will begin in April, 2019. The Forest Hill Bridge is currently under construction and is expected to be completed August 2019. The Greenbriar Bridge contract has been awarded and that bridge replacement will start in May 2019.

There are 12 bridge replacements or modifications that remain to be completed and to reach the full benefits of Project Brays. Design is complete for Hillcroft, Greenbriar, Stella Link, Ardmore, and Buffalo Speedway. The following bridges are currently under design: South 75th, Lawndale, Telephone, S. Rice, Chimney Rock, and Calhoun TxDOT project). On March 12th, HCFCD hopes to gain approval from Commissioners Court to start design on the Almeda Bridge. Following final design, we should be able to bid all remaining bridges out for construction in August 2019 with construction beginning in Jan. 2020.

I'm not sure why there are so many negative rumors around, but what about all the Harris County bond money voter approved? Those projects are moving forward. Citizens can track progress here: https://www.hcfcd.org/2018-bond-program/recent-action-on-bond-projects/

Can we still expect some buyouts for properties that have flooded 6, 7, 8 and more times? There is money for buyouts. We can look at specific addresses together. Atlas 14 Rainfall Report


The City of Houston often creates a task force or working group to study a variety of City issues. While these groups are made up of professionals in whatever discipline is being studied, the City also includes members of the community at large. Both Cindy Chapman and Becky Edmondson of the Westbury Civic Club have been privileged to serve on these groups, especially those that deal with flooding.

Becky Edmondson is a member of the Atlas 14 Working Group. This group is looking at a unified approach by the City, County, and the flood control district due to rainfall changes proposed in "Atlas 14" and is considering how this new data will affect stormwater detention and storm sewer design requirements.

What is Atlas 14? The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Association (NOAA) collected historic rainfall data and has released a report, published as NOAA Atlas 14, Volume 11 Precipitation-Frequency Atlas of the US, TX.

The study found increased rainfall values in Texas that will result in changes to the rainfall amounts that define 100-year events (a one percent chance of happening in any given year). The 100-year estimates for the Houston area increased from 13 inches to 18 inches of rain, and values previously classified as 100-year rain events are now considered to be much more frequent 25-year events.

NOAA Atlas 14 rainfall values are used for infrastructure design and planning activities under federal, state and local regulations. They also help delineate flood risks, manage development in floodplains for FEMA's National Flood Insurance Program, and are used to monitor precipitation observations and forecasts that can indicate flooding threats by NOAA's National Weather Service.



Brays Bayou Association: Project

The Brays Bayou Association was founded after widespread flooding in the Brays Bayou watershed in 1984. They advocate for flood control and hold monthly meetings. US Representative Lizzie Fletcher, the Mayor and City Manger from West University, and Gary Zika from the Harris County Flood Control District were the speakers at the March meeting.

Much of the meeting discussion regarded "Ruffino Hills," a former landfill and golf course, which is jointly owned by the cities of West University and Bellaire. The site directly abuts Keegan's Bayou, a major tributary of Brays Bayou, and it is one of the few large tracts of undeveloped land in the Brays Bayou Watershed. There are two other large tracts, but those are golf courses which want to remain as golf courses, although the Westwood Golf Course may have 10 acres available for a stormwater project. The cities of Houston, West University, and Bellaire are jointly discussing using Ruffino Hills for a regional stormwater detention facility, but the project costs and funding sources are unclear. The Mayor of West University mentioned that they are getting an appraisal of the property value because they have also received inquiries of interest for commercial uses.

US Representative Lizzie Fletcher is on the Congressional Infrastructure Committee. At all levels there is frustration that it is taking so long to deliver funding from HUD in Washington DC to Texas and Houston. HUD is still drafting rules on how the funds can be used. A bipartisan letter has been sent to HUD which was signed by all Houston area Representatives, both




Senators, and the Governor. The Texas delegation also sent a letter to the President saying that Harvey recovery funding should not be diverted for border wall funding.

Gary Zika with Harris County Flood Control, gave an update on Project Brays. The detention at Willow Waterhole is complete, and they are working with the contractor to get the final punch list of items completed. The channel work from Fondren east to 610 continues, and the work west from Buffalo Speedway to 610 is finished except for punch list items. Regarding the Hillcroft bridge, the contractor is working on installing retaining walls along the channel before the bridge is elevated. The elevation itself will be fast, but then several months will be needed to redo the intersections of Hillcroft at North and South Braeswood. This work is estimated to begin in the summer.



Public Safety Information from the Westbury Area Patrol

Motor Vehicle Burglaries Update

Sgt. Derkowski attended the March meeting of the WCC to provide a security update. He noted that there is typically an uptick in petty property crime during school Spring Break, with motor vehicle burglaries or rifling through unlocked vehicles leading the way. He reminded residents to call in for a vacation watch or even just a special watch, such as when there is a death in a family.

Sgt. Derkowski explained why it is important to try to keep a crime scene untouched, if possible. He advised that if your vehicle has been burglarized, if at all possible, please wait until the Westbury Area Patrol constables arrive and have finished obtaining any evidence (fingerprints) before moving or touching the vehicle. "Whenever possible, we need the vehicle that was burglarized to not be further touched by the Complainant and we need the vehicle to stay in the same location that it was found when burglarized, that way we can accurately process the crime scene."

Constable Activity Report

For the first 20 days of March, from March 1 to March 20, our Westbury constables have reported 298 activities, which averages to about 15 activities per day. WAP investigated 5 Motor Vehicle Burglaries during Spring Break. They responded to 18 reports of suspicious

persons or vehicles. There were 24 traffic stops – with 6 citations and 18 warnings. There were 56 "meet the citizen" interactions where they introduced themselves to residents while they were patrolling, and 30 calls for information. Residents requested them to check a Park/School location 21 times (Hager Park and Westbury Park). There were 26 Vacation Watches performed.

Constables At Work in Westbury

To the right is a slightly edited incident report showing the great response by one of our Westbury Area Patrol (WAP) deputies after a recent burglary of a motor vehicle (BMV). In this case, the stolen goods were returned to the crime victim due to the actions of our WAP deputy! Also, note that our constables were able to obtain a good palm print. Remember that all of our WAP deputies are law-enforcement officers licensed by the state of Texas. If you haven't contributed yet to our WAP patrol, then please do so as soon as possible. We are still raising funds to pay for our 2019 Westbury Area Patrol program.



BMV on Ludington

A Westbury deputy was working patrol and noticed a white sedan parked facing the wrong direction next to a (description of victim's car). As he prepared to turn around, the vehicle sped off quickly and turned down a side street. As deputy (name) drove past the (model of victim's car), he noticed the passenger side rear door window was broken out. He then checked the area and could not locate the Suspect or the white sedan.

He then made contact with the Complainant. The Complainant's book bag with books and a laptop was stolen. The deputy was able to locate the book bag in the roadway a few streets down on Cerritos. All property was recovered and returned to the Complainant. The Complainant signed a Pct5 property release form.

The deputy dusted for prints and obtained a nice palm print. After lifting the print, it was tagged at HPD property room. No video cameras were observed in the area.

WAIC and Westbury SN Meeting

Incorporated in 1991, the purpose of the 501c3 non-profit WAIC (Westbury Area Improvement Corporation) is to "improve the quality of life for those who live, work, learn, or play in the Westbury community. The WAIC meets monthly on the 3rd Wednesday at 9:30 AM, at St. John's Presbyterian at 5020 W. Bellfort. Meetings are public and the Westbury Super Neighborhood Council meeting is held at the same time. Attendees include: local nonprofits, schools, businesses, representatives from government departments, representatives from elected officials, and other interested parties.

During the March 20 meeting, the WAIC agreed to donate \$500 to be a sponsor of the Willow Waterhole MusicFest. School representatives from Parker Elementary, Anderson Elementary, Meyerland Middle School, and Westbury High School brought us up to date on school happenings. The Meyerland MS orchestra is heading to Carnegie Hall and has programs coming up that the public can attend. There are currently 1,600 students at Meyerland Middle. Parker's FunFest carnival will be held on April 13. Anderson has an enjoyable evening math event late in March. Westbury and all the schools reported STAAR testing will begin in April.

Money Matters - WCC Income

Westbury homes with Mandatory Assessments had a due date of February 1, so contact the Westbury Civic Club office if you are late and need to set up a payment plan. Most homes in Westbury do not have mandatory assessments, and dues letters were sent in March to those homes. Dues payments are being received at a brisk pace. We are thankful for our civic minded neighbors who faithfully pay their dues every year and who often contribute extra. If you are a new resident, please be aware that your mortgage escrow account often does not pay your Westbury Civic Club mandatory assessments and never pays your dues. Many new residents get confused on this point. Our goal is to collect all funds for the 2019 budget by June.

Total Income received by the Westbury Civic Club through March 19, 2019 is \$230,670. The WCC projected income and approved budget for 2019 is \$389,000, based on having 3 constable deputies instead of the 4 we had last year. At this time, we need about \$160,000 to meet our budget for 2019.

Why did the WCC drop one of its constable deputies? Last year the constable fees increased by 3%, while our WCC income was down due to the impact of Harvey flooding in Westbury. Due to so many vacant houses and so much construction, the WCC opted to maintain a 4th deputy during 2018, even though the WCC had to dip into our security patrol reserves and has depleted the security reserve fund accumulated over many years. Historically, the WCC has collected more money than needed to pay for 3 deputies, so after sufficient funds have been collected to pay for the deputies for the year, then the board will consider the steps to re-establish our security reserves and the path to add back a 4th deputy.

Homeowner Assistance Program - Harvey Recovery

The City of Houston has announced a new program, Homeowner Assistance Program (HOAP) to help Houstonians whose homes were damaged by Hurricane Harvey. Tom McCasland, Director of the City Housing and Community Development Dept., emphasized that the City has moved quickly to ensure recovery was launched as soon as federal funds became available. McCasland said, "The contract for the money was signed on the 4th, today is the 14th – it's ten days later and we're rolling out programs." The City will receive the \$1.17 billion for housing recovery through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and the State of Texas General Land Office. The City has taken a critical step forward with the opening of four Housing Resource Centers, one in each quadrant of the city, to help assist homeowners.

If your home flooded during Harvey, you may be eligible for assistance. **Anyone who may be eligible must first complete a survey.** The City has several ways to complete the survey.

- → Mobile outreach teams are also available to serve home-bound residents

After you fill out the survey, you will be notified if you qualify and then start the application process. This money is from the federal government, so it has stipulations. The majority of the funds will be prioritized to seniors, disabled, and families whose income is less than 80% of the AMI (average median income). If there is money remaining, there are funds available even for those at 120% of AMI and higher. If you suffered a loss for which you were not reimbursed, fill out the survey. If you still have needs, fill out the survey. Whether your needs are physical or mental, there are resources.

Mayor Turner stated, "Our goal is to reach and serve as many of the affected homeowners as possible, especially those who are hardest to reach – our disadvantaged, senior citizens, those with limited English proficiency and those with special needs. We will not leave anyone behind."

To give you an idea of 80% income limits by family size according to one source:

HOAP has five program options that you may be eligible to participate in if you qualify after taking the survey. There is roughly \$400 million available for HOAP.

Reimbursement: You may be eligible for reimbursement of some expenses if you've completed repairs.

Acquisition: If your home was substantially damaged, you may be eligible to have your property purchased by the City. You may also be eligible to apply for additional assistance to purchase a new home.

City Managed Rehabilitation and Reconstruction: The City will use a pool of contractors to rehabilitate or reconstruct storm-damaged homes. The City will manage and complete the construction process on your behalf.

Homeowner Managed Rehabilitation:

This option is only available if you have already started construction on your home and are under contract at the time of application but need financial assistance and technical expertise to complete repairs.

Interim mortgage assistance: If you are making both a mortgage payment on your storm-damaged home and making a rental payment for a temporary home, you may be eligible to receive up to 20 months of mortgage assistance.

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Homeowner Assistance Program (HoAP) Reimbursement Program

ARE YOU WORKING ON REPAIRS FOR YOUR HARVEY-DAMAGED HOME?
YOU MAY BE ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE REIMBURSEMENT FOR YOUR EXPENSES.









The City of Houston is offering assistance to homeowners, which includes reimbursement for completed repairs to homes damaged by Hurricane Harvey. If you are a homeowner, and you spent personal money to repair your home damaged by Harvey, please keep in mind the following:

- Reimbursement is only for expenses associated with repairing storm damage from Hurricane Harvey for homes within the City of Houston (verify your tax jurisdiction at www.hcad.org).
- All costs must be reasonable, which means appropriate and typical for modest housing in Houston. Luxury items like marble countertops, Jacuzzis, pools, or high-end appliances are not eligible for reimbursement.
- "Soft costs" like architectural, engineering, planning, and permit approval services are reimbursable, as long as there is a receipt or invoice. Costs for storage may also be eligible.
- If you did the repair yourself (sweat equity), your labor costs are **not** eligible for reimbursement.
- The City will review all repairs for cost reasonableness and eligibility, and will perform inspections to verify work. You may be asked to provide invoices and photographs to document evidence of the repairs.
- An official City site inspection and Certificate of Compliance from the Houston Permitting Center are required before expenses can be reimbursed.

- Participants in the Reimbursement Program who live in the floodplain will be required to maintain flood insurance after receiving assistance. Failure to maintain flood insurance in a floodplain may result in being denied future federal assistance.
- An Elevation Certificate issued by a licensed engineer may be required if your home is located in the 100-year flood plain and was substantially damaged by Harvey.



Kroger Using NURO Automated Delivery The Scoop on Poop

The Kroger grocery store located at South Post Oak is working with robotics company NURO to test automated delivery vehicles. Westbury residents who live in zip code 77096 may already be seeing NURO vehicles doing test drives, and automated



deliveries are anticipated to start before the startof summer. The Kroger store on SPO is one of two in Houston which have been selected for the NURO test, and our local Kroger store will only deliver to zip codes 77401 (Bellaire) and 77096 (which includes part of Westbury). There is a flat delivery fee of \$5.95.

After the customer places an order, the store will load the groceries into the vehicle, notify the customer that the order is on its way, and then NURO dispatchers will monitor the vehicle on its way. Eventually, NURO plans to use all-electric vehicles. Dave Ferguson, co-founder of NURO says, "Texas has been a leader in encouraging self-driving innovation, and we're excited to help deliver that future for Houston — a dynamic, diverse and welcoming metropolitan city that we're excited to soon explore and serve with this autonomous delivery service."

Houston is the second location in the USA to be tested, after Phoenix. Texas law allows autonomous vehicles if the company is insured, obeys all traffic laws, and has a visual recording device.

Dog owners: Please do your part. Help stop storm water pollution by picking up after your pet. Here's how it works. Your dog poops on the grass. That poop contains bacteria that pose a health risk to people. When it rains or storms, the poop feces gets washed into the



streets and flows down the storm drain into area bayous and waterways where people may come into contact with it.

Tips on picking up your pet waste and disposing of it properly.

- →Clean up after your dog daily.
- → Pick up pet waste if rain is in the forecast, even if you don't do it on a regular basis.
- → Consider buying a handy pooper scooper to make task easier.
- → Pick up your dog's waste when walking your dog.
- →Throw pet waste in the trash, using a grocery or newspaper bag and tying it off to seal it. (You may also purchase special biodegradable bags at pet stores.)
- → Hire a poop collection service to do the dirty work for you. A quick Web search will turn up local companies that serve all areas of Harris County.
- → Flush dog poop down the toilet. Unlike runoff after a rain, sewage from your toilet is treated to destroy bacteria.
- → Bury pet waste in your yard at least five inches deep and away from vegetable gardens, streams, ditches or wells.
- → Consider installing an underground pet waste disposal system, also known as a "doggy dooley."
- →DON'T leave pet waste on your lawn. Pathogens are dangerous to kids playing in the yard, and they can contaminate anything edible growing in your garden.
- →DON'T add pet waste to your compost. The compost won't generate enough heat to kill the pathogens.
- →DON'T leave pet waste near a curb. It's bad manners, and it can get washed into local waterways through the storm drain.

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
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
