### Stay Home, Work Safe Order Extended to April 30 Schools Closed til May 4

All of Harris County, including Houston, is under a Stay Home, Work Safe Order issued by Harris County Judge Lina Hidalgo. The order was originally placed on March 24 and was recently extended until April 30.

The order requires all individuals anywhere in Harris County to stay at home—except for certain Essential activities and work to provide Essential Business and Essential Government services or perform essential infrastructure construction, including housing. The Governor of Texas issued a similar order for the entire state of Texas. Governor Abbott also closed schools until May 4. Travel is limited from several states including Louisiana.

- → Residents may leave home: to engage in work if in essential service field; to obtain necessary services or supplies such as food or pet supplies; to engage in outdoor activities such as walking or biking; to care for a family member.
- → Playgrounds, basketball courts, and soccer fields are CLOSED.
- → 6 Ft Social Distancing in all places including grocery stores
- → Restaurants are take out or delivery only.
- → Bars, gyms, movie theaters, stadiums, malls, museums, nail salons, hair salons and more are CLOSED.

### A Message from the Westbury Civic Club President

So much has changed during the past few weeks. Our March newsletter was full of announcements of fun events scheduled for this spring. Since then, the COVID-19 pandemic, which once seemed so far away from Houston, is now a worldwide pandemic and is impacting the USA and Houston. Events have been canceled through the end of April (and perhaps longer), and we are under a STAY HOME, WORK SAFE order issued by the City of Houston and Harris County. The Stav Home order is intended to slow the spread of the illness, so that the infection rate stays lower than it would be otherwise. The goal is to "flatten the curve" significantly, so that our hospitals and medical providers will be able to keep up with the medical needs of infected patients and others who have severe needs requiring hospital care.

In these challenging times, it is important to comply with the Stay Home, Work Safe orders. "Cheating" may seem minor, but the orders work best if each of us take steps to reduce our exposure to others outside our immediate family group as much and as often as possible. Take good care of yourselves. Eat healthy. Exercise safely. Stay in contact with friends and family by phone or video. Help others as you are able. Be smart about doing your essential activities.

The Westbury Civic Club is complying with the Stay Home order, while continuing to serve our Westbury residents. Our office manager is able to check WCC email and voicemail while working at home and is responding to questions and requests. Mail is being checked periodically, but might not be collected every day. Requests by title companies for home sales and refinancing continue to be processed. House plans will continue to be reviewed.

I regret that this April newsletter will be a digital newsletter instead of the usual printed newsletter delivered to the doorstep of every Westbury home. The monthly Westbury Crier newsletter has been a communications staple of our neighborhood for 65 years. The last time we had such difficulties was after Hurricane Ike in 2008, when the Westbury area had no electricity for 10 or more days, and some places were out of power for 2 to 3 weeks. We hope to have a printed newsletter for May and are working on an alternate delivery plan. Usually we use the Westbury High School baseball team and booster club to deliver, but school is out due to COVID-19.

Our paid Westbury Area Patrol (WAP) Constables from Harris County Precinct Five continue to patrol the streets of Westbury. Our Constables are licensed law enforcement officers and are able to make arrests and to enforce laws. The very last event I attended in March was to speak before the Harris County Commissioner's Court on behalf of the Constable program. Both Becky Edmondson and I and many, many others from across the county waited for hours to speak in favor of the Constable program. We noted how

important the contract Constable services are to supplement the manpower of the Houston Police Dept. and the Harris County Sheriff's Office, both of which are sorely in need of more law enforcement officers. The Sheriff and all 8 of the elected Constables spoke forcefully and persuasively about the importance of the patrol services provided by the Constables.

The COVID19 pandemic is expected to last for many more weeks. I am concerned that crime will go up as the days and weeks go by. The Constables are the front-line law enforcement officers here in Westbury and they provide an important service. I hate to mention money during times like this, but the fact is that we need to raise more money to pay for our Constable program. If you have already paid your annual fees, please consider an additional contribution. If you have not yet paid, please consider either a full or a partial contribution for the Constable program. If you are fortunate enough to still have a job and income, please consider contributing more than usual because some of our families will not be able to contribute as they would like. Our website has been modified so that we can now accept credit card payments in addition to payments via a PayPal account. See pages 6-7 for more information about donating.

### **Meyer Library News**


### → Meyer Library CLOSED Indefinitely

### Why Support the WCC and WAP?

Westbury is a unique neighborhood in Southwest Houston. While all 5,000 homes in our Westbury neighborhood have active deed restrictions, only 463 have mandatory assessments. This means the Westbury Civic Club heavily relies on financial contributions from residents like you. Westbury has historically had strong voluntary support because residents understood the great benefits of the WCC and our programs. However, contributions to the Westbury Civic Club and to the Westbury Area Patrol were down in 2019. By working together, we can meet the challenges head on and keep our neighborhood the jewel that it is. The total amount for the 2020 Voluntary Dues is \$335. That is less than a dollar a day! The Westbury Civic Club dues are \$50 for the year. The WCC suggests a contribution of \$285 for the Westbury Area Patrol (a paid contract with Precinct 5 Constables).

### Why do my dues go to Dallas? Is this correct?

Yes, this is correct! Mailing your payments directly to our bank's processing center in Dallas, allows them to be processed immediately. You may also drop off the payment directly to the WCC Office or pay online at www.westburycrier.com

## Why should you pay your Westbury Civic Club dues? (\$50)

The Westbury Civic Club (WCC) works on: reducing neighborhood blight, enforcing deed restrictions, improving economic development, and advocating for our fair share of the City's budget. We hold two semi-annual White Elephant Sales and host neighborhood events such as Keep Westbury Beautiful Day. We publish the award-winning Westbury Crier monthly. The WCC has one employee who works closely with our City Council Office and city departments to ensure timely responses to residents' complaints, like Solid Waste problems. We also continue to work diligently with the City and the County to find real solutions to flooding along Willow Waterhole Bayou. The WCC is a strong advocate for the City to continue on schedule with storm drain reconstruction projects in Westbury with ReBuild Houston. This project was to start in 2020 but has been delayed a year due to Harvey. Please pay your Westbury Civic Club dues.

## Why should you support the Westbury Area Patrol? (\$285)

The largest program and biggest expenditure for the WCC is for the Westbury Area Patrol (WAP). The WCC has had a contract with Harris County Precinct 5 deputies since 1984. The WAP offers 24 hour coverage, vacation watches, home security checks, and alarm monitoring. The program provides high visibility, rapid response to emergency and non-emergency calls. Daily patrolling enables the deputies assigned to Westbury to become familiar with the neighborhood, thereby alerting them to "out of the ordinary" situations and ability to respond better and faster. WAP officers were instrumental in recently catching young criminals in Westbury South who were attacking and robbing elderly residents. Harris County Pct. 5 has a dedicated investigative unit that can be available if needed. The WCC has had to lower the number of deputies from 4 to 3 in 2019, and we could be in danger of losing the program if participation in this important program does not improve. Please support the Westbury Area Patrol.

### We LOVE Our Constables

### Contract Program Threatened

In the days before a looming COVID-19 pandemic, the Westbury Civic Club was notified of an agenda item added to the March 10, 2020 Harris County Commissioner's Court meeting. This agenda item was to initiate a study of the contract deputy program to prohibit the Constables from being able to sign contracts to do neighborhood patrols. This item was added by Pct. 2 County Commission Adrian Garcia. Westbury contracts with Harris County Precinct 5 Constables to patrol our neighborhood.

WCC Board Members Cindy Chapman and Becky Edmondson both spoke on behalf of the Constable Patrol program at the March 10 Harris County Commissioner's Court meeting. Over 175 people signed up to speak in favor of the Constable Patrol Program including Harris





County Sheriff Ed Gonzalez and all 8 of the elected Constables.

Constable Ted Heap, from Precinct 5 (Westbury contracts with Precinct 5), said that his constables see their work as a calling for community service. He warned that crime will go up if the constable patrols are ended. He noted that the private constable patrol contracts serve the greater public good by providing an additional 1,115 law enforcement officers patrolling in Precinct 5. The officers with Precinct 5 responded to 59,000 calls last year not in a contracted area, which greatly reduced the workload on the Houston Police Department (HPD) or the Harris County Sheriff's Office.

Sheriff Ed Gonzalez said that the contract Constable Patrol program is a "force multiplier" and is successful at reducing crime. He said that the constables work collaboratively both with HPD and his Harris County Sheriff's Office. Houston City Councilmember Mike Knox, a retired HPD officer, spoke in favor of the Constable Patrol contracts. He said that the Constable contract patrols allow other



law enforcement departments to deploy resources elsewhere when needed.

After hearing from hundreds of citizens and officials affirming and supporting the Constable Deputy program, the Court voted against the controversial proposal by Commissioner Garcia. The Court instead voted to affirm the contract program and not to study to eliminate or terminate the Constable or Sheriff deputy program.

Becky Edmondson and Cindy Chapman waited so many hours, in uncomfortable seats, to be able to speak on behalf of the Constable Patrol contracts because they know the importance of the Westbury Area Patrol. Houston CM Mike Knox knows how important it is. Sheriff Ed Gonzalez knows how important it is. We hope that all of our residents also know how important it is, and that you appreciate that the Westbury Area Patrol by the constables is an important factor to keeping Westbury as a desirable, safe community. Read below why we need your support for the Westbury Area Patrol Constable program!

# Food Distribution Sites in Westbury during COVID-19

Platou Community Center 11655 Chimney Rock

A free meal (lunch and a snack) for children 1-18 years old is being distributed by the City of Houston at City community centers. Child must be present to receive a meal. Monday through Friday from 1PM to 3PM.

### Westbury High School 11911 Chimney Rock

The Houston Independent School District will relaunch food distribution efforts with a streamlined process that will implement increased safety measures. Each site will distribute 500 boxes per day.

As families arrive at the site, staff members will fill out an Emergency Food Assistance Program Form for them, minimizing interpersonal contact, and place boxes in car trunks. Participants who walk up to the sites must also adhere to social distancing requirements.

The distribution in the Westbury area will be at Westbury High School at 3PM on Friday, April 10.



### City and State Road Construction Projects Continuing During Pandemic

One small bright spot during the COVID19 epidemic is that road traffic in the Houston area is significantly lower than usual. If you watch the daily traffic reports, you probably have noticed the main Houston highways lately show "green" during commuting hours instead of the typical yellow or red warning colors of slow traffic. The Houston Chronicle noted that on Wednesday afternoon of 3/18/2020, Houston TranStar data indicated that it took only 17 minutes (about 63 miles per hour) to drive west on I-10 from I-45 to Texas 6. It typically takes twice as long.

The state Department of Transportation is taking advantage of the lower road traffic counts. The cancellation of the Houston Rodeo means that TxDOT projects in the vicinity, which had been postponed during the event, have now resumed. Also, state contractors have moved up work to place some connector beams at the interchange of the West Loop and Interstate 69 (often locally called "59").

Additionally, work crews for Houston Public Works and city contractors are continuing to work on city road projects.

Angela Blanchard, one of Houston's leading experts on disasters, wrote this list of things that everyone should remember during large-scale emergencies several years ago. It's especially relevant now. **Angela Blanchard**, president emerita of Baker Ripley, has been a player in helping Houston recover from multiple disasters. Still based in Houston, she now teaches Brown University graduate-level public-policy courses on Disaster and Displacement.

- 1. No one is coming. We must move at the speed of need.
- 2. You may not be at fault, but you are responsible. This disaster chose us. We must own it.
- 3. You can't build on broken. Pay attention to the strengths, skills and aspirations of those around you. Build on those.
- 4. Do what you can with what you have where you are. Right now.
- 5. There is nothing more powerful than a family, company, community in touch with its own aspirations and principles.
- 6. Allow everything that is not destructive. Especially art, music and dance. Even in disasters, people need joy.
- 7. Isolation is a breeding ground for rage and despair. We may be physically distant, but we must remain spiritually, emotionally, socially connected. Connect today.
- 8. At every milestone there will be gratitude and grief in equal measure. Even as we recover, we will also see what has been lost. Allow gratitude and grief to reside in your heart together.
- 9. Practice loving detachment. Others may not behave as we would want. We learn not to react to panic & fear, even as we manage our own.
- 10. There is enough to go around. Act as if it's true.
- 11. When you come to the fork in the road, between resignation and acceptance, take the path of acceptance. No whining.
- 12. People can survive individually, but they thrive collectively. Place your faith beyond survival.
- 13. Leaders practice "when I know it, you know it." People can handle the truth. We unravel when we are forced to play detective in a disaster. If you want people to follow you, you don't have to be certain, but you must be transparent.

### **New CDC Mask Recommendation for Covid-19**

The Center for Disease Control (CDC) recently reversed their previous advice on masks. They are now recommending that the general public to wear some form of a mask/covering in public settings where other social distancing measures are difficult to maintain such as the grocery store and pharmacy, especially in areas of significant community based transmission.

The CDC advises the use of simple cloth face coverings to slow the spread of the virus and help people who may have the virus but do not know it, from transmitting it to others. The virus that causes COVID-19 can spread from a person before they have symptoms. Cloth face coverings should not be placed on young children under the age of 2, anyone who has trouble breathing, or is unconscious, incapacitated or otherwise unable to remove the cloth face covering without assistance. The cloth face coverings recommended are not surgical masks or N-95 respirators as these items are critical supplies that must continue to be reserved for front line workers.

The CDC issued a template for an easy basic sew mask and a no-sew mask option. Many Facebook groups are dedicated to making cloth masks for front line workers as well as the general public. There are many templates available online, see below for some websites.

### **How to Wear Cloth Face Coverings**

- → Fit snuggly but comfortably against the side of the face
- → Be secured with ties or ear loops
- → Include multiple layers of fabric
- → Allow for breathing without restriction
- → Be able to be laundered and machine dried without damage or change to shape

### It's Time to be Counted! **US Census 2020**

How many people live here in the Westbury neighborhood? How do we find out? The government does a population count every ten years, called a "census", and this is a census year. Every residence should have received an official Census Bureau census request by mail in mid-March with detailed information on how to respond to the 2020 Census. There are three ways to respond to the 2020 Census.

- → Online
- By phone
- By mail

The first deadline was April 1, 2020.

Why respond? It's important that the count be correct because it affects funding, schools, voting districts, developers and others who rely on the data to make decisions.

Ten years ago, it is estimated that zip code 77035 was "under reported" by 24%. Zip code 77096 was "under reported" at 12%. When people do not get counted, then they are invisible. It is very important for Westbury, the City of Houston, and our state that as many people as possible here in Westbury get COUNTED.

### Only RAIN in the DRAIN!

As it rains in Westbury, water begins to build up along the street edges and gutters. It's here that it begins its long journey to the sea. The first destination on this journey is to the storm drain inlet on your street. Clearing the path to the storm drains is essential. Once it reaches the inlet, it flows into the storm drains and eventually ends up in one of the drainage ditches or Willow Waterhole Bayou, then off to Brays Bayou, then the Houston Ship Channel and ultimately to the Gulf of Mexico.

It's very important that you prevent debris from blocking the flow of the water to the storm drain inlet. It is vital to keep the water flowing in the storm drain pipes under the streets that we don't see.

Solid debris takes up space in the storm drain pipes making them less effective in transporting storm water to our ditches and bayous. Small sticks, leaves, newspapers, and other trash become wrapped together and could clog and slow the draining on your street. Our storm drains in Westbury are old. They are original to the neighborhood and should be treated with care. **Only rain in the drain!!!** Our trees are old and have huge roots that are bound to have popped through, combine this with leaves and other debris, and water just can't flow at the rate it should. If the rain is falling very rapidly (as it has many times in the past several years), our water on the streets needs to flow as fast as it can to the bayous.

### Here are some things you can do to help.

- → Sweep & BAG your leaves out of the street.
- Ask your yard crew to NOT blow the leaves and grass

clippings down the street or into the storm drains.

- → Clean the storm drain inlet in front of your home
- → Pick up the newspapers that are thrown in your yard. Pick it up, read it or not, and throw it in the recycling can.

### **IHCFCD Demolishes Three Westbury Homes**

In March, the Harris County Flood Control District (HCFCD) demolished three homes along the Willow Waterhole Bayou in Westbury. The purchased properties had been for sale on the open market.

The land will be used to create swales (long sloping channels to collect excess storm water to direct it into the bayou). This project will complement the City of Houston's upcoming capital improvement efforts in Westbury to reduce street flooding by upgrading the neighborhood drainage system.

"The soon-to-be-installed swales will minimize street flooding in the neighborhood and help to improve local drainage during heavy rainfall events," said Matt Zeve, Deputy Executive Director for the Harris County Flood Control District. "The properties will be transformed into environmentally-friendly flood risk mitigation projects for the benefit of the entire neighborhood."

The properties where the new swales will be installed are adjacent to the Willow Waterhole Bayou at:

- → 5747 Cartagena Street
- → 5638 Ludington Drive
- → 5730 Ludington Drive

"This project, funded by 2018 flood bond, is an important step in helping Westbury and Harris County become more resilient communities," said Commissioner Rodney Ellis. "Every neighborhood should have the same level of protection during severe weather and Precinct One will continue to advocate for projects that reduce flooding and keep families safe."



### Questions & Answers from HCFCD

HCFCD had been invited to speak at the March WCC meeting, which was canceled due to COVID-19 pandemic. Here are the answers to some questions by the WCC.

### Q: This project funded from the 2018 Bond is the purchasing of the homes and demo, does it include the swales?

Yes, HCFCD will fund the buyout, demolition, and installation of the swales for the 3 homes (including the potential of 3 additional homes which are still in the negotiation process). The City of Houston (COH) will follow this project with a major Capital Improvement Project (CIP) to replace all the neighborhood drainage in Westbury in the coming years. We defer to COH on the details and schedule of their follow on CIP work.

### Q. When are the swales being installed?

The entire project from home demo to shallow swale installation takes about 3-4 days each - with the entire effort expected to be complete within 2-3 weeks (weather permitting) beginning the week of March

### Q. The City of Houston is a partner, when will their work be done?

While this is listed as a "partnership" effort, the City of Houston's work and financial contribution will come at a later date upon completion of their CIP (Capital Improvement Project), after which they will take over the ownership and maintenance of these swales (which they also plan to enlarge/enhance as part of their CIP).

# Westbury is a Deed Restricted Neighborhood

ALL homes in Westbury have active deed restrictions. There are over 30 sets for the 9 sections and 5,000 homes in Westbury. Why do we have deed restrictions? To protect and maintain our neighborhood for the benefit of all residents. The City of Houston does not have any zoning or rules on where commercial business can be located. Deed restrictions help maintain our neighborhood as a neighborhood. All lots in Westbury must be residential usage.

When you bought your home, you should have received a copy of your deed restrictions. Certified copies of the deed restrictions can be obtained at the County Clerk office downtown for a fee. The WCC office has copies of the deed restrictions by section online at

www.westburycrier.com. You will need to know your legal address to know which set applies to you. An easy way to find your legal address is to look up your property on Harris County Appraisal District (HCAD) website, www.hcad.org.



## **Updating Westbury Deed Restrictions**

Covid-19 Update— We are still collecting names and information from

interested residents who would like to be part of the Deed Restriction Revision Action Group. Depending on how long the Stay Home order lasts, we might do a zoom meeting with interested parties.

Westbury's deed restrictions are old and need to be updated. While they are still active and still have validity, they are slowing losing their original meaning in today's legal climate. There are many reasons to update the deed restrictions. It is no longer 1958. How people live and use their homes is different in 2020. While it is nice that no one can hang a visible clothes line in their front yard, I am sure the residents of Westbury 5 East of Hillcroft would like the option to build a 2 story home. They are the ONLY section that cannot. With the elevations and new home construction on the rise, a better set of deed restrictions and guidelines are needed.

The Westbury Civic Club worked with residents in Parkwest 1 and 2 in the 1990s and successfully updated and modernized their deed restrictions with changes such as allowing two story homes, three car garages, and mandatory assessments. This process can be long and frustrating. Later deed restrictions revisions over the years have stalled, failed, and fizzled out.

It is time to seriously think of Westbury's future. 2020 is the time to move Westbury forward and update our aging deed restrictions. The first step is to get a group of active residents who are dedicated to seeing the process all the way through. This group will first meet to get their bearings, then start to break down the choices of how to tackle a massive deed restrictions revision for 5,000 homes. Even Parkwest 1 and 2 need to be updated, despite the changes made in the 90s. We will do surveys, in the *Crier* and online, and hold several public meetings to get feedback from residents.

### **Visit the Westbury Pocket Prairie**

Westbury Pocket Prairie is located on the south side of the Westbury Community Garden property along Greencraig Drive. Park on the prairie side of the street. It's recommended you visit on Sunday when the auto repair shops are closed and there is plenty of parking. Take the walkway loop to look at a wide variety of Texas wildflowers coming into bloom. You can also walk anywhere to investigate a plant.

**Flowers to look for in the prairie garden.** (Some are big and showy. Others are tiny and low growing. Some close-up in the afternoon.)

- Tiny white morning glory
- Corpus Christi fleabane, very short version of fleabane
- Prairie parsley, look for a very interesting lobed leaf.

Flowers are in bud.

- Spiderwort, showy purple flower
- Milkweed, Asclepias vividis and Asclepias oenotheroides
- Herbertia, tiny iris
- Wine cups
- Bluets, four petaled and white. Not tall (see photo to right)
- Thistle
- Flax, short yellow orange flower
- Verbena halei, Texas vervain —

delicate multi-branched lavender colored flower

Lots of other things will begin to show as the weeks pass.

Try to see the earliest flowers on the list now.


