After holding our Westbury Civic Club board meetings online via Zoom for two years, it was a delight to hold our March meeting in person again! Thank you to Westbury Baptist Church for graciously providing the meeting space and for working with us so patiently while we were trying to figure out when to start meeting in person again. A big thanks to our March meeting sponsors: Susan Brock for providing delicious Girl Scout cookies and Weichert Realtors for providing bottled water. And, of course, our WCC board members deserve much credit for their volunteer efforts to make our Westbury neighborhood the safest, greenest, best neighborhood in Houston. I look forward to our next meeting on April 20! I hope to see many of you there as community engagement and involvement in so very important.

We appreciate the effort of our many guest speakers and delegates from various organizations who traveled to Westbury to attend our board meeting and to answer a wide range of questions. It was a very informative meeting. We also appreciate all the Westbury residents that came to the meeting and provided thoughtful comments and questions.

District K Councilmember Martha Castex-Tatum answered many questions from the audience about District K and introduced two representatives from Public Works, whom she had invited to talk about a traffic-slowing plan for part of W. Bellfort. The eastbound side of W. Bellfort from Hillcroft to Atwell has many traffic accidents, including several fatalities. The speeding and condition of the roadway are big concerns for the community. I want to personally thank the residents of the 5500 to 5800 blocks of W. Bellfort who came to meeting armed with questions, data, and photos. They have persevered to document the dangerous consequences from excessive speeding in that area and became steadfast advocates for safety improvements. A picture can be worth a thousand words. Pick-up is EVERY Thursday. Regular household trash goes into the black trash can.

Yard Waste

Pick-up is EVERY week either on Thursday or Saturday or any day the City decides to come by. Yard Waste MUST be placed in the correct City bio-degradable bags.

All of Westbury recycles on Schedule A. Recycling is every other week. Recycling goes into the green trash can.

Why Support the WCC?

Westbury is a unique neighborhood. While all 5,000 homes in our Westbury neighborhood have active deed restrictions, only 463 have mandatory assessments. This means the Westbury Civic Club heavily relies on voluntary financial contributions from residents.

Westbury has historically had strong voluntary support because residents understood the great benefits of the WCC and our programs. The past several years' contributions to the Westbury Civic Club and to the Westbury Area Patrol have been down. By working together, we can meet the challenges head on and keep our neighborhood the jewel that it is. We all want a safe, flood free neighborhood with great schools and nice neighbors.

The total amount for the **2022 Voluntary Dues is \$365**. That is well worth a dollar a day! The Westbury Civic Club dues are \$60 for the year. The WCC suggests a contribution of \$305 for the Westbury Area Patrol (a paid contract with Precinct 5 Constables).

Westbury Civic Club Meetings are Back

WCC board meets in-person for first time in 2 years.

After meeting online via Zoom for the past two years, the Westbury Civic Club finally held an in-person board meeting in March 2022. It was wonderful to see residents, board members, and local representatives again. The March WCC Meeting was very informative. We had several guest speakers that spoke and answered audience questions about important topics such as speeding on W. Bellfort, new HISD funding, crime, and local City issues.

Our District K City Councilmember, Martha Castex-Tatum introduced two representatives from Public Works, whom she had invited to talk about a traffic-slowing plan for part of W. Bellfort. The eastbound side of W. Bellfort from Hillcroft to Atwell has had many traffic accidents, including several fatalities. The speeding and condition of the roadway are big concerns for the community. More about Public Works traffic plan below and how you can help. CM Martha Castex-Tatum also held a very informative Q & A session with the audience and board.

HISD Trustee Myrna Guidry spoke briefly about the new HISD strategic plan. Guidry will be holding a Community town hall meeting on April 23. She will also attend the next WCC board meting on April 20 to discuss the new plan and 2022-23 HISD budget. More information on page 10.

Sergeant Derkowski of the Westbury Area Patrol spoke about speeding concerns on W. Bellfort and Willowbend (especially at Chimney Rock). He cautioned that extra motorcycle patrol units would be out in Westbury ticketing speeders.

The WCC board meets again on April 20 at Westbury Baptist Church. The meeting will be live streamed on our Facebook page, Westbury Houston.

Proposed Traffic Plan-W. Bellfort

Residents in the 5500 to 5800 blocks of West Bellfort have experienced a high number of severe or deadly accidents from excessive speeding. After years of advocating for relief, Westbury resident Dr. McSwain and several of his neighbors reached out to the District K office and Vice-Mayor Pro Tem Martha Castex-Tatum for assistance. She was able get Public Works to look at the problems in that section of West Bellfort and then to propose interim solutions.

Public Works used traffic data to find out how fast vehicles are going. The speed limit is 35 mph, but the average (mean) speed was 41 mph. On the day of the traffic study: 14 cars were driving faster than 75 mph, 33 cars were driving faster than 65 mph, 390 cars were driving faster than 55 mph, and 23% of all cars were driving at least 45 mph (10 miles faster than the speed limit).

As a result of their study, Public Works came to the meeting to introduce a plan to slow traffic down. The rationale is that slower traffic speeds would reduce the frequency and the severity of auto accidents in that location that has a big bump in the road. The eastbound lane in the 5500-5800 blocks of West Bellfort will receive reflective paving markings to create narrower street lanes (from 12 feet to 10 feet), a "Bump Ahead" custom sign painted on the street, chevrons with raised pavement markings in the street, and more.

There was robust input and questioning from residents attending the meeting. It was a poignant reminder that speeding does kill, as residents talked about holding the hand of a dying teenager or holding a stranger as they took their last breath in their front yards.

As Martha Castex-Tatum said, "Let's all make a commitment to leave a little earlier and slow down on our streets." We thank CM Martha Castex-Tatum for paying attention to constituent concerns about this problem location and using her district funds to help implement interim solutions.

What Can You Do? Slow Down! We should all take a minute and just slow down when we are driving down Westbury streets. If you live on W. Bellfort, please keep a log of all accidents and take as many photos as you can. We understand the sensitive nature of these accidents so only photograph if you are comfortable doing so. The more documentation and proof we can provide to the City, the better.

W. Bellfort, along with Hillcroft, Chimney Rock and Willowbend are RESIDENTIAL streets. Westbury needs to reclaim these streets and make them safe again. The City might have made them major throughfares, but they are still streets with residential homes facing them. It is not commercial properties or the sides of homes, these accidents happen right in people's front yards, in their homes, in their driveways. It is unacceptable and must be stopped. Do your part and slow down!

Ruffino Hills – Possible Storm Water Detention and Economic Development

"Ruffino Hills" is located to the west of Westbury, on W. Bellfort near Beltway 8 and adjacent to Keegan's Bayou that feeds into Brays Bayou. The 143-acre site is a former landfill for the cities of West University and Bellaire and was a former golf course. Most of the land is



currently undeveloped. The site is large enough and in a good location for future stormwater detention, but a challenge is the added high costs to remove the household waste that is stored underground in the retired landfill. One proposal is to seek federal funding for a project that could combine a stormwater detention project with an economic development project for a mixed-use, walkable site near the West Bellfort METRO Park and Ride.

Sylvester "Skip" Reeder, of Houston One Voice, made presentations to both the WAIC and the WCC at our March meetings about its plan to redevelop the Ruffino Hills landfill site that could be eligible for federal funding. Both entities passed a motion, which then made it a SuperNeighbhood motion, "to support the collaborative effort to create added detention, recreation, and economic activity for Keegans Bayou and the adjacent communities by redeveloping the Ruffino Hills landfill site." Letters of support were sent by both organizations.

Here in Westbury, we recognize the opportunity to redevelop the Ruffino Landfill site as a principal stormwater facility and catalyst for reinvestment in southwest Houston communities impacted by flooding in the Brays and Keegans Bayou watersheds. As the Westbury area has been negatively impacted by multiple flooding events in the last decade, we support this effort to detain water before it reaches us. Beyond that need for detention, our very diverse area needs economic redevelopment.


Meyergrove Detention Basin


Congresswoman Lizzie Fletcher announced on March 23 that Congress has authorized, and President Biden has signed into law, a grant for the Meyergrove Detention Basin as part of the Funding for the People Act.

The bipartisan funding bill includes \$9,950,000 for the Meyergrove Detention Basin, which will be used to design and construct a 7.5-acre stormwater detention basin. She said, "I am glad to bring these dollars back to Houston for this important work and to partner with our community in this effort."

Harris County Flood Control District (HCFCD) Executive Director Tina Peterson said that the basin will hold more than 21 million gallons of water when completed. Construction is expected to begin this autumn and will finish in mid-2023. Some of the funding will be provided from the HCFCD bond program approved by voters in 2018.

This site is the former Meyergrove Apartment Complex located on the north side of Brays Bayou. It had flooded multiple times before the land was purchased by the Harris County Flood Control District in 2019. It is near the Enterprise car rental place located at the intersection of North Braeswood and the 610 frontage road. See map below.

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NEW HISD Strategic Plan for 2022-23

The new superintendent for HISD is proposing a new centralized/FTE funding model for this upcoming school year. See the box to the right for a better description of what that means as this would drastically change how funds will be allocated to schools. This will impact ALL schools in HISD. It is important that you are aware and actively weighing in on this matter.

The majority of your property taxes go to HISD, so whether or not you have children in an HISD school, what happens in HISD matters. The status of our local schools and HISD affects your property values; good schools keep property values up. We all are affected by the quality of the education of students who attend HISD public schools.

Many children recently applied to schools where, should this funding model shift take place, there may be significant changes that may negatively impact magnet and other school programs. While there may be good things about the funding proposal (e.g. some schools may gain a librarian or nurse), there are other schools (fine arts, STEM, and secondary schools in particular) facing huge teacher/staff cuts (10%-20% teacher cuts at certain schools), but no change in total students.

As a starting point in understanding what is being proposed, individual school staffing models have now been shared showing the net loss or gain of staffing/teachers per school. Go to **www.houstonisd.org/Page/193161**, and scroll to the bottom, you can search for your school in HISD to see how it stands to be funded by the new proposed model. We encourage you to not just look at your current school, but also your zoned schools or any future schools you think your children may attend.

How are Westbury School effected by the proposed staffing changes?
Meyerland MS would lose 12.13 teachers and 7 staff, total net loss of 18.13
Anderson Elementary would lose 3 teachers and gain 1 staff, total net loss of 2
Parker Elementary would lose 2.21 teachers and gain 4 staff, total net gain 1.79
Westbury HS would gain 6 teachers and lose 5 staff, total net gain of 1

It is important to note that these staffing changes above are baseline requirements and offer no flexibility. So while it appears WHS is gaining 6 teachers, they are losing the ability to have Teacher Specialists in that category which could negatively impact the school and their ability to retain good teachers. It is important to look at these documents yourself and ask your Trustee questions and voice your opinions and concerns.

HISD Community Town Hall Meetings

HISD trustees are hosting community town halls to discuss the 2022-2023 budgets and the effect on schools.

District 9 - Myrna Guidry— Sat., April 23 (Location and Time TBD) Check the Westbury Houston Facebook page for updates.

Centralized/FTE model OR De-Centralized/Weighted model?

HISD currently has a de-centralized/weighted model that allows principals to oversee their school's budget, giving them flexibility to meet the needs they see within their own school community, and uses weighted funding to allocate how much money a school receives.

The new plan calls for a centralized/FTE model, meaning all the money goes to the district and they will distribute it to schools in a set manner and when appropriate requests are made. It would remove the bulk of oversight from campuses and move it back to the district. This model uses FTE which outlines base staffing requirements for all school equally.

It is important to note that the total budget dollars in HISD as a whole is not changing, the change is in the oversight of school budgets and how that money is utilized at each school.

HISD would be the first and largest district to move back to a centralized funding model.

Which is better? There are pros and cons on both sides but more information is needed especially in regards to magnet funding. This proposed change may be warranted, but why is this change being implanted so quickly?

Who is my HISD Trustee? Who Should I Contact?

You vote for the HISD Trustee in the District that your property is located in. Maps are available on the HISD website. Westbury homes are located in either District 5 or District 9.

This is not always the same districts as our zoned schools. For example, Meyerland Middle School is located in District 5 and the majority of Westbury is zoned there, yet much of Westbury votes for District 9. The schools located in Westbury are in District 9 - Parker ES, Anderson ES, and Westbury HS. If your child attends a school outside our neighborhood, it is likely located in another HISD district.

The WCC encourages you to contact the HISD Trustee that you vote for, but also the one who represents the school your child attends.


The Gasmer Redevelopment Plan is ready for the public to view. The Brays Oaks Management District (BOMD) is hosting an information meeting for the community to learn more about the exciting ideas being proposed for this site.

In the fall of 2021, the City of Houston requested that the BOMD commission a Redevelopment Master Plan for the 29 acres at the former Shell Research Facility located at 5521 Gasmer Dr. next to the Willow Waterhole. To accomplish this, BOMD retained the architectural design services of Lionheart and Natalye Appel + Associates. The design team, along with community stakeholders, have been meeting the last few months, working faithfully on the design. The Master Plan is now ready to be presented to the community during an information meeting open to the public.

According to Ben Brewer, of the Brays Oaks District, "The four key components of this plan will be to honor the past history of the site; to serve as a detention area for flood waters; to place the Levitt Pavilion Houston, an outdoor music pavilion, in this location; and to reuse and re-purpose the rest of the area." Eventually, the fences separating Willow Waterhole Greenway and the Gasmer Redevelopment Project will be removed, resulting in one contiguous green space.

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Nuisance Dogs

What should I do about a dog that has attacked a person? Call 911 for emergency response. Contact city Animal Control (BARC) for a high priority investigation.

What should I do about a dog that has attacked other animals? The City has a process and procedures to complain to Animal Control (BARC) about "Dangerous Dogs", "Aggressive Dogs", and "Public Nuisance Dogs. "Dangerous Dogs" are a danger to people and those situations get higher priority by the city Animal Control Department (BARC). As animal lovers, it can be distressing that injury or death to another animal does not get that same priority by Animal Control. There can be valid fears that a dog, which has injured another animal, may eventually hurt a person. Here is a link to the documentation needed and processes required for the different types of dog problems to be handled by the city Animal Control Department (BARC). https://www.houstontx.gov/barc/enforcement_info.html

What should I expect if I call the Precinct 5 Constables about a neighbor's dog that has attacked other animals or a person?

Typically, the Constables do not have the tools or the training to handle a dog that is acting in a way that is dangerous, aggressive, or a public nuisance. The tool available to a Constable is a gun, and since dogs are private property, a Constable would not typically use a gun on a dog unless there was an imminent threat to life or injury to a person. Since dogs are private property, there is a documentation process and a procedure by city Animal Control (BARC) to make sure that complaints are valid, can be proven with documentation, and that the correct dogs have been identified. The Constables can create a report, contact Animal Control, and can submit their report to city Animal Control (BARC) to help provide documentation that a dog has injured or killed an animal, but BARC does the investigation and the follow-up. Please go to the BARC website to learn about the process and procedures to more effectively complain and get better results about dog problems.

What can I do to help get more resources and funding for dog issues?

- → Contact District K and the 5 At-Large city council members, and the Mayor to request more funding for BARC in the City budget
- → Consider donating to or volunteering for organizations which assist BARC or organizations which assist with animal issues (spay/neutering pets, finding fosters or permanent homes for animals, etc.)

Message from Westbury Sergeant Derkowski

Sgt. Nick Derkowski from our Precinct 5 Constable Patrol spoke at the March WCC meeting. The extra overtime used by Pct. 5 has brought about a reduction in property crimes. There have been very few break-ins of vehicles or buildings. The bad news was that domestic calls and assault calls were up. The night shift has been making a lot of DUI (driving under the influence) arrests on our streets.

Sgt. Derkowski reminded everyone to watch out for their neighbors and to call if you see anything suspicious. The Constables work 24/7, so don't delay in calling the constables about suspicious activity or if a non-emergency crime has been committed.

He noted that some violent crimes have been committed from firearms that have been stolen from cars or houses; he advised to consider gun locks and to not leave firearms in vehicles. Homes being remodeled and vacant homes are often targets of break-ins. Also, remind workers to keep their tools locked up.

And remember to slow down....

Request a Vacation Watch

Going on a vacation? Well, if you pay your Westbury Area Patrol dues, make sure you request a vacation watch by the Constables. This is a great service that is included in our contract. A deputy will check out your property at least once a day to make sure it is secured and nothing suspicious is going on.

Annual Adjustment of Water and Wastewater Rates

An automatic annual water and wastewater rate increase of 5.6% will go into effect on April 1, 2022, for Houston residents. In 2010, city council approved an automatic annual rate adjustment effective April 1st each year, based on inflation and population growth.

Additionally, in 2021, Houston City Council voted to increase the water and wastewater rates every year for 5 years, first starting in September 2021 and then afterwards the adjustments will be made on April 1 at the same time as the automatic rate increase. The higher rates are intended to pay for infrastructure upgrades to prevent large water line breaks and to prevent sewer overflows under a legal settlement between the city and the EPA (Environmental Protection Agency).

We encourage Westbury residents to repair dripping faucets and leaky toilets and to monitor their water usage to reduce their water bills.

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




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
