April Event Rewind Westbury Pool Opens May 27

The Westbury neighborhood pool, operated by the City of Houston, opens Saturday, May 27, for the Memorial Day Weekend. The pool WILL be open on Memorial Day, Monday, May 29, from 1-8PM. The pool is typically open Tuesday—Sunday 1-8PM and closed on Mondays. For the full summer pool schedule, see page 6.

IMPORTANT NOTICES ON SPEEDING AND STRAY ANIMALS

The Westbury Civic Club office receives hundred of calls and emails each week from residents and real estate agents. Most of these are about trash dates, deed restriction inquiries, dues/assessments, and general questions. Lately, we have received an increased number of communications from residents about speeding on our major thoroughfares AND neighborhood streets. Multiple wrecks and cut through traffic are becoming more and more prevalent throughout all of Westbury. For more information about action that can be taken and what you can do, see page 9.

Another hot topic is stray animals. The WCC office has received numerous emails and calls regarding a wild pack of dogs roaming the neighborhood and stray cats. A Message from the Westbury Civic Club President

April and May are two of my favorite months. Things are greening up, gardens are growing, flowers are blooming, and those gray days of winter are behind us. Spring means many of our favorite neighborhood events are taking place like the Spring White Elephant Sale, Keep Westbury Beautiful Day, and the Willow Waterhole Music Fest. I know many of you joined us at these events because I had the pleasure of seeing and meeting many of you.

Beyond the reason behind these gatherings and the social impact of these gatherings, there is one important common denominator...volunteers. None of these events would take place without volunteers. Westbury is blessed to have so many volunteers, some of whom come from other neighborhoods! You will read about our Keep Westbury Beautiful day with dozens of volunteers, many from Meyerland Middle School, Westbury HS, and Sharpstown High School. The Music Fest was another incredible event that needed dozens and dozens of volunteers to make it the success that it was.

After 5 years the Music Fest has really come into its own. Of course, the perfect weather was an added bonus. The new Artist Village added this year added a whole new dimension of enjoyment. We celebrated music and art in a beautiful outdoor setting. Volunteers from Westbury Care, Westbury Community Garden and their partner the Houston Heath museum, Westbury Civic Club, Neighborhood to Trails SW, and Bike Houston all brought their messages to the festival.

I love the Willow Waterhole and all that it brings our neighborhood. Isn't it amazing that over 200 bird species have been catalogued during the monthly Audubon bird survey? How can you bring some of nature's diversity into your own backyard? You can have your backyard certified as a Wildlife Habitat by the National Wildlife Federation. Read how to do this on page 22. I just had some work done in our backyard and added a pond and some native plants. Within a matter of days the "critters" had found us: a hummingbird at my plumbago, a monarch butterfly at my milkweed, a giant swallowtail at my citrus tree, and in my pond thousands of tadpoles! A rose-breasted grosbeak stopped at my feeder one morning on his way from Mexico to Canada. With so much habitat disappearing, just a little oasis of habitat can make all the difference. Several years ago, 5 of us from Westbury took a course called "Habitat Highway" that stressed the importance of having habitat not just in a big place but with small areas in between that join habitats together.

One feature of a good habitat is being organic and avoiding the use of chemicals and pesticides. A Westbury One resident found her driveway covered with hundreds of dead bees this past month. Beekeepers we checked with surmised that the bees had been sprayed with a pesticide. If you have bees, there are services which will relocate the hive for you. Let's protect our helpful insects by not spraying pesticides.

And while we are on the subject of saving lives.....please slow down on our Westbury streets! This past month I know of two cars that left the roadway, one ended up in a house and the other against a tree. Last year in a 13 month period, 8 people died on Westbury streets; all were speeding. Let's get a reputation for not tolerating speeding. It's easy to go with the flow of traffic and look down and be surprised at our own speed. Let's All of us consciously remember that the speed limit in Westbury is 30 MPH except on Chimney Rock, West Bellfort, West Airport and Hillcroft.

Be safe, Westbury!





Flood Gauge Signs on N. Braeswood

Did you see the new flood gauge signs on North Braeswood? The City of Houston recently installed a series of flood level signs in residential areas along North Braeswood, which immediately caused an uproar and controversy. The city will soon remove the signs along Braeswood residential streets.

Our streets are designed to hold stormwater, but those new flood level signs along Brasewood were not located in areas of unusually high risk. The city said a request had been received for the signs to be placed, so the request was added to an existing project in the area; however, the contractor placed the signs before a change order could properly be processed. The city now says the signs will be removed after admitting that proper notification had not been made to the affected neighborhoods.

However, this episode serves as a reminder that flood waters can be very dangerous when driving, especially at night when headlights reflect off the water and make it harder to see where the road ends and the water starts. **DO NOT DRIVE**

THROUGH FLOODED STREETS. Park at a high elevation location and wait until the streets are safer for driving. Remember: If you drive headlong into several

inches of water, then your brakes may not work to stop you from driving further into high water. Your car may start floating away with the flood currents or start sinking deeper into the water. In particular, be extremely wary of underpasses, which sometimes flood quickly during heavy rains.

Another reason to not drive through flooded streets – your waves could cause water damage to parked cars or push water into homes. Also, it is exasperating when inconsiderate drivers damage yards or esplanades trying to avoid flooded streets.

PLEASE DO NOT DRIVE THROUGH FLOODED STREETS.

Participants in the Adopt-a-Stop or Adopt-a-Shelter program volunteer to pick up litter in the area between METRO's designated trash collection days, and have the option to make general improvements to the grounds. The volunteer or organization receives: six free round-trip passes per month, an Adopt-a Stop sign recognizing the neighborhood or organization affixed to the pole with the bus route sign, an "Adoption Certificate" signed by METRO's President & CEO and Chief of Police.

An unspoken benefit is the opportunity to improve the aesthetic appeal of the community. The Adopt-A-Shelter program phone number is (713) 739-6095. Or for METRO's Facilities Maintenance at FM Care Team, call (713) 615-6195 or call FM Afterhours at (281)960-7131.

Stray Animals in Westbury

Stray animals are a big problem throughout the City. Westbury has been seeing an increase in reports of stray dogs and cats. Last year BARC and their 24 employees received over 50,000 calls and took in 26,000 animals. They prioritize the calls. Dogs that attack people get priority. "Hey, I just saw a dog running down my street" is not a priority.

Westbury is a pet friendly neighborhood. There is a local non-profit, Westbury CARE (Compassionate Animal Rescue Efforts) that facilitates adoptions and finds homes for lost and abandoned pets. "NextDoor Westbury" is another venue that has reunited many an escaped dog with their owners. Occasionally, packs of dogs have formed and hunted together and professional help needed to restore safety. Several years ago, the WCC and Pct. 5 partnered with BARC to removed a pack of dogs.

There have been several recent reports of packs of dogs roaming. The reports are in several sections, suggesting multiple groups of dogs. The WCC office has also received reports of cats being mauled and found dead in several sections of Westbury. If you see a pack of dogs roaming, take a picture, note the date, time, and location. Report it to BARC via 311. Be willing to sign an affidavit.

WCC President, Becky Edmondson, spoke with BARC in early May and was told to share the following tips.

- If you feed feral cats you need to register with BARC.

 Trap the cats and have them neutered and their ear will be clipped to show they have been neutered.
- If you have a problem with feral cats: Trap the feral cat and take it to BARC. They will spay and neuter and return it to the same area.
- All cats and dogs are supposed to be secured in our homes or yards or on a leash.
- The reality is that dogs make great escape artists.

 Even the most vigilant owners have pets that get out.

 Be sure your pets are chipped and have tags.
- Register your pets with the city.

Please remember to have your pets spayed or neutered. Get them chipped. Keep them secured. Dog walkers, keep your dogs leashed. Pick up their poop! And be respectful of your neighbors right to peace and quiet if you have a barker. Barking dogs are still one of the top complaints from homeowners.

Thanks to all the caring people who help make Westbury a safe haven for our furry four-legged friends!

Traffic and Speeding Concerns on Westbury Streets

30 MPH is the maximum speed limit throughout the streets of Westbury. The only exceptions are on Hillcroft, West Bellfort, Chimney Rock and West Airport where 35 MPH is allowed. **PLEASE OBEY THE SPEED LIMIT!**

It is not only cut-through traffic that is barreling down our streets; it is Westbury residents, too. This is a safety issue! There are children playing, seniors walking for exercise, joggers running, parents pushing baby strollers, teens walking with their eyes glued to their cellphone screens, all of these activities and more happening on the streets of Westbury on any given day. All drivers need to make a conscious effort to SLOW DOWN and obey the speed limit.

It is easy to drive distracted and be in a hurry. School will be out later this month and more of our children will be outside playing and riding their bicycles.

Last month a car drove into a home on West Bellfort after two cars jockeyed for position in what appears to have been a road rage incident. Thankfully no one was injured in the home or walking by on the sidewalk.

Speeding has become one of the major complaints received by the WCC office. Residents are sick of cars speeding down their residential streets. We have asked HPD and Pct. 5 to ticket speeding drivers. If you witness a recurring speeding problem, please report it to the WCC office at westburycc@sbcglobal.net. Include the time, day of week, and hundred block or crossing streets, and specific vehicles (if known).

30 MPH is the maximum speed on unposted residential streets. It's the law, NOT a suggestion!







Parker Elementary Project Design Details & Update

On April 4, the Project Advisory Team took a tour of the ongoing construction project to build a new building for Parker Elementary. Project Manager Steve Redmond said that the project was 35% complete and is "gaining momentum".

Some special touches are incorporated in the music magnet school design to echo the theme of music. If you look carefully, you will notice that the windows are not symmetrically aligned. Instead, they are arranged to suggest a piano keyboard or notes on a musical scale. Also, the cover shading the front door (facing Stillbrooke) will cast shadows of musical notes.

The new two-story building is larger than the existing school building. Each new classroom will be typically about 100 square feet larger than existing rooms. The school will feature a 500 seat performing hall with sloped seating, which is not typical for an elementary school, but was a key design component requested for the magnet school by the project team and school supporters.

New School Opening Delayed Until Jan 2018

The somber truth has been revealed and the HISD Bond team admits now that it was overly optimistic to say that the new Parker Elementary building would be ready for move-in by the start of school in August of 2017. The HISD construction team explained that there have already been 95 rain-delay days on the Parker project. Even though it might be possible to move in for start of school in August 2017, while still finalizing construction, it is not recommended or desirable based on experiences at other schools. The new schedule is that the move will be made over the school break in December of 2017, and that students will start in the new building in January of 2018.

The Project Advisory Team (PAT) for the Parker Elementary School Project met on February 15 to discuss the current construction status. School Principal Lori Frodine questioned why so little progress has been made. Construction was released in April 2016 for the new building, and the structural framing went up in October 2016. The owner for Patriot Construction and the site construction manager discussed that the rain delays have been significant. The slowest and most critical part of the project will be the completion of the utilities, mechanical, and heating/ventilation in "part C" of the building (the wing closest to the city park). The heating and ventilation systems must be working to do the sheetrock work. Once the roof is completed and the mechanical systems are working, then progress will go much faster.

The PAT had a chance to tour the new school in April. See box to left for design details learned during the tour.

It is very exciting to see the new school coming together! January 2018 will be here before we know it.



HISD "ReCapture" Vote: May 6

HISD District IX Trustee and Board President Wanda Adams hosted a meeting at Tinsley Elementary to explain the upcoming May 6 "RECAPTURE" ballot proposition.

Trustee Adams welcomed the crowd and introduced HISD Superintendent Richard Carranza, who stressed the importance of viewing education as an investment and not as an expense. An educated public is important and that is why the status of our HISD schools is so important, not just to us in Westbury, but throughout the City. Education is an investment in our community and for our future. HISD is stressing the Global Graduate Profile of working in teams and working collaboratively. Competition is global and there are skills beyond reading, writing, and arithmetic.

The topic of RECAPTURE is complicated. Basically, the State of Texas does not provide sufficient funding for education, especially for students who require more resources. This means that school districts in Texas rely heavily on local property taxes. The state has devised a complicated process where so-called "property rich" school districts send payments back to the state (sometimes called Robin Hood funding). Amazingly and disappointingly, when the number of students in HISD are considered who have limited English skills or must overcome deprivations of poverty, the State of Texas

has somehow determined that HISD is now a "property rich" school district.

What does it mean for HISD to be "property rich"? The state offers two choices. HISD can send cash back to the state general fund where the state will distribute some of it to poorer districts. Or, HISD can have certain expensive properties "detached" from HISD and assigned to other school districts. These are both bad options. For the first time ever in Texas, Houston voters in Nov. 2016 refused to participate in the process and voted no. That caught the attention of the state legislature, which then massaged the funding equations so that Houston (and other school districts in a similar situation) would owe much less money to the state. However, the November election result also set up a situation where HISD would have to have property "detached" and assigned to other school districts, which is a less attractive financial alternative. Therefore, the HISD school board has set up another election on May 6 to allow voters an opportunity to vote again on HOW to send the required payments. For more information on this topic, go to www.houstonisd.org/recapture.

On May 6 voters face two options. The ballot wording is mandated by state law.

"Authorizing the board of trustees of Houston Independent School District to purchase attendance credits from the State of Texas with local tax revenues."

- * FOR means HISD will write a check to the state.
- * AGAINST means commercial properties will be permanently detached from HISD and assigned to other school districts. HISD will permanently lose those tax collections for district operations and also lose the debt service tax collections used to pay back bonds.

Texas State Representative Alma Allen sent her son Terrence Allen to the meeting and recommended that voters vote "FOR" in order "to keep control of our own checkbook" at HISD. She said she never wanted to see detachment of property happen.

HISD Trustee Wanda Adams noted that HISD wanted voters to vote "No" in November 2016 and that ours was the first school district to say no to the state. She said HISD won concessions from the state as a result of the 2016 vote, and had the bill dropped from \$162 to \$77 million (the bill has been further reduced in April 2017 due to changes in state funding formulas). Trustee Adams advises voters to vote "FOR" in the May 6 ballot.

The Greater Houston Partnership (GHP) supports voting "FOR". The GHP is a place for community-minded business leaders who want to be involved in the positive growth of Houston, and the GHP serves over 1200 member companies in the 11-county Houston region.



Westbury Resident is Award Winning Writer

Did you know we have an award-winning writer of young adult novels living right here in Westbury? And one of her books may even hit local movie screens at some point in the future!

Jennifer Blessington, who writes under the name Jennifer Mathieu, has been a Westbury resident since she and her husband bought their home here in 2006. Jennifer is the author of three books for young adults, *The Truth About Alice, Devoted, and Afterward*. Her next book, *Moxie*, which comes out in September, has already been optioned for film by the production company run by Amy Poehler, best known for her work on the television programs Saturday Night Live and Parks and Recreation.

"The entire experience has been a whirlwind," says Jennifer, who taught at Meyerland Middle School from 2005 until 2011 and who is currently an English teacher at Bellaire High School. HPD Chief Acevedo announced the new HPD Command Staff. The audience met new Assistant Chief Wendy Baimbridge, new Executive Assistant Chief of Operations Troy Finner, and new Captain Belinda Null. Captain Null is assigned to Southwest (Beechnut) Patrol Division, which provides patrol services for the Westbury area. Captain Craig Bellamy is the new Captain for the South Gessner Patrol Division.

Over the course of the 2016 Fall season, the Greater South Post Oak/West Bellfort Coalition, which consist of businesses, churches, and residents of Willow Meadows, Willowbend, Westwood, Westbury, and Meyerland, collectively coordinated a petition drive regarding the City of Houston ordinance amendment of Chapter 40. This amendment, which was approved by City Council, extends provisions of the existing civility ordinance to include the area defined by the Greater South Post Oak/West Bellfort Coalition.

"The Coalition's hard work paid off," states Council Member Green. "I, along with my council colleagues, passed this civility ordinance unanimously."

The City of Houston civility ordinance prohibits certain conduct on sidewalks (lying, sitting or storing personal possessions) during the 7AM to 11PM timeframe. Prior to the passage, the civility ordinance was only applicable to the Central Business District, Midtown, Old Sixth Ward, Avondale, Hyde Park, East Downtown Management District and the Historic Near-Northside.

"This was a great community collaboration. It was good to see adjoining communities come together to address a holistic issue in a grassroots manner," states Council Member Green. As part of Mayors campaign to end homelessness and aggressive panhandling, please remember:

The application process includes a medical screening, a psychological screening, and a polygraph test. Then a background check is performed. Emergency Registry (2-1-1 Registry)

The State of Texas Emergency Assistance Registry (STEAR) is a FREE registry that provides local emergency planners and emergency responders with additional information on the needs of residents in their community. Registering yourself in the STEAR Registry at 2-1-1 DOES NOT guarantee that you will receive a specific service during an emergency; however, you are more likely to receive services if you're registered. It also provides responders with info so that they can reach out to you after events.

Who Should Register? People with Disabilities.

People with access and functional needs such as: People who have limited mobility, People who have communication barriers, People who require transportation assistance, People who require personal care assistance.

How do you register? Call 2-1-1 and let them know that you want to register for STEAR. Registration is VOLUNTARY. Required information is: Name, address, phone number, and primary language. Additional questions include: Emergency contact information, caregiver information, pets, transportation assistance for home evacuation, communication barriers, Disability or Functional or Medical Needs.

- How long will my information be kept? Your information will be kept for 1 year. You should re-register after that time period.
- What if I move or do not need assistance?
 Contact 2-1-1
- **Will I be evacuated during an emergency such as a hurricane?** No. Each local government uses the information in different ways.

Remodeling your home? Adding On? Do you know your deed restrictions? Did you know that the Westbury Civic Club can look over your proposed plans for free before you start con**struction?** We want to avoid deed restriction violations before they happen. Did you know that Westbury 2, Westbury 3, and Westbury 5 have a 25 foot rear setback for the main structure? Did you know that there is a minimum percentage of brick that must be on your home? Did you know that you can't build in front of your building line? We want to help you! We want you to find out about possible violations be fore it costs you money and time. Several homeowners in the past couple years have had to tear down and/or modify their construction due to deed restriction violations. The City of Houston does not review deed restrictions when issuing permits. They require a signed affidavit acknowledging that the plans comply with your deed restrictions. This holds YOU, the homeowner, accountable for knowing and complying with your deed restrictions. We are here to help you. All deed restrictions are available online at www.westburycrier.com. 



Wildlife Habitat Day

Houston celebrated its newly achieved status as the 100th community to certify through the National Wildlife Federation's Community Wildlife Habitat™ program. Houston Mayor Sylvester Turner recognized this accomplishment by proclaiming April 18, 2017, as Wildlife Habitat Day in the City of Houston during City Council. This certification was made possible through a combination of public and private efforts. In addition to the nearly 1,000 citizens' homes, schools and common areas in Houston that have been certified as wildlife habitats, the Houston Parks and Recreation Department (HPARD) has identified 80 parks with 16,000 acres of land as having natural areas.

WCC board member Virginia Livingston (circled in green below) attended this ceremony wearing both her Texas Master Naturalist hat and as president of the Westbury Community Garden. The garden has a certified butterfly area and a pocket prairie.

Is your backyard a wildlife habitat? The Westbury Civic

The Westbury Civic Club would like to challenge Westbury residents to get their backyards certified through the National



Wildlife Federation's Community Wildlife Habitat™ program. Many Westbury yards already have this designation and we think it would be wonderful to have our whole neighborhood become a certified habitat. Wildlife needs our help. Human activity has changed and eliminated habitat, locally, and on the global scale, and birds, butterflies and other wildlife are pushed into ever-shrinking wilderness areas. You can make a difference. You can invite wildlife back to your own yard and neighborhood by planting a simple garden that provides habitat. Imagine your garden teeming with singing songbirds, colorful butterflies, flitting hummingbirds, and other small wildlife.

Getting started is easier than you might think. Here is what your wildlife garden should include:

<u>Food:</u> Native plants provide nectar, seeds, nuts, fruits, berries, foliage, pollen and insects eaten by an exciting variety of wildlife. Feeders can supplement natural food sources.

<u>Water:</u> All animals need water to survive and some need it for bathing or breeding as well.

<u>Cover:</u> Wildlife needs places to find shelter from bad weather and places to hide from predators or stalk prey.

<u>Places to Raise Young:</u> Wildlife needs resources to reproduce and keep their species going. Some species have totally different habitat needs in their juvenile phase than they do as adults.

Sustainable Practices: How you manage your garden can have an effect on the health of the soil, air, water and habitat for native wildlife as well as the human community.


Trees and Habitat

Here in Westbury, trees are important to our quality of life. Our beautiful tree lined streets are often mentioned as a selling point. Beyond the aesthetics, trees provide us with shade, increase our property values, hold storm water, lower our power bills, and provide food and habitat for wildlife.

In 2004, Westbury created a "community tree print" proposal, which is a forestry plan for our neighborhood. We realized that trees die and trees get removed for many different reasons. We needed a plan to replace our aging and disappearing tree canopy. Most of the trees planted in our neighborhood are 50-60 years old and some types are past their prime, some are dangerous, and some are invasive. Through that community initiative, more than 5,000 trees have been planted or given away to residents.

In 2006, the Westbury Civic Club (WCC) asked the city to remove the invasive Chinese Tallow trees on Hillcroft between W. Bellfort and Portal. The WCC replanted over 100 trees along that section of Hillcroft, working with many volunteers and organizations such as the City of Houston Forestry Department and Trees for Houston. Now, 10 years later, the trees are prospering and the esplanade is healthy and abundant with city wildlife like birds and squirrels. Several WCC members attended a "Highway Habitat" course to learn how to provide improved wildlife habitat along roadways. As a result, the WCC "Green Team" and volunteers have added several groupings of native shrubs along Hillcroft which have been lovingly cared for over the past 10 years.

When developers arrived here in the 1950s, this whole area was originally coastal prairie and rice fields. The trees you see today throughout Westbury were all planted either by the original home builders, residents, or by volunteers who have improved our public areas. We urge all Westbury residents to continue to plant trees for the future. An old saying recommends, "The best time to plant a tree was 20 years ago. The second best time is now."
