A Message from the Westbury Civic Club President

Before I became active in the Westbury Civic Club, I'm not sure I could tell you who my city council person was. I thought of city government as something that didn't have much to do with me. Thankfully there have always been people who were willing to "mind the store" while the rest of us do whatever it is that fills our time. I have thoroughly enjoyed my time being civically engaged. It has given me a whole new appreciation for those who choose to serve us. Public service and public servants have become much maligned in the press and in social media and sometimes rightfully so. But my experience has shown me that, for the majority, that is just not true. The city employees and elected officials, whom I have worked with, are a fine group of people.

On May 5, "WE" will choose who will represent us for the remainder of CM Larry Green's District K term. The question is who "WE" will be. Will "WE" be just 10% of us; 25%; 30%? Are you content to let someone else choose who gets to represent you on City Council? Do you believe that it doesn't make a difference? Trust me, it does make a difference! It makes a difference when our polling numbers are high. It matters if Westbury is seen as an engaged neighborhood.

Every month in the *Crier* we try to bring you the news that affects you as tax-paying Houstonians, whether the news is from the City, County, State, or HISD. Both Cindy Chapman and I appeared several times before City

Council and at the Transportation, Technology, and Infrastructure (TTI) Committee to speak on behalf of the Westbury Super Neighborhood about proposed changes to the Chapter 19 Floodplain Ordinance. Other than representatives from the different Super Neighborhoods and the Super Neighborhood Alliance, almost everyone else who spoke on this topic were lobbyists, builders, developers, and realtors. Unfettered development both upstream and downstream of us is one cause of our flooding (of course, coupled with aging inadequate infrastructure) and that is what the developers still seemed to want. The proposed changes to Chapter 19 were approved and you can read on page 11 how they will affect you.

The District K Town Hall Meeting was held on March 29. Due to the matching costs associated with Hurricane Harvey for federal funding, the usual city Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) that we normally advocate for were not addressed. In fact, all outstanding CIP projects have been delayed by at least a year. What this means for our Westbury street reconstruction CIP projects is that they will need to be addressed again once we have representation for District K at City Council. The Mayor, as well as several At-Large City Council Members, took the time to assure me that they were there for us. District K CM Larry Green was much loved by his colleagues, and many said they were looking out for us until his vacant position is filled by the District K Special Election.

Mayor Sylvester Turner was in Westbury in April to kick off the city-wide "Adopt a Drain" program. You can read on page 9 how you, too, can be a part of this important program to help keep all 115,000 of the city's storm drains clear of debris. It is a major complaint we hear from residents that their neighbors do not sweep street gutter lines free of debris. Now you can "Adopt a Drain" and be part of the solution. I know that many of you already do this. I met one of my neighbors during the press conference, and he regularly clears the storm drains in a commercial area nearby. Go online, claim your drain and let's show the city that residents of Westbury are doing their part. Likewise, we need the City to do its part by coming in and as quickly as possible replacing all of our aging infrastructure. I adopted a drain. How about you? Please sign up at www.houstonadoptadrain.org.

You will read about all the great April spring events that have been taking place from Keep Westbury Beautiful Day to the Willow Waterhole Music Fest. I hope all of you had as much fun as I did. If you missed some of these great events this year, mark your calendar for 2019!

District K Candidates Forum - April 24

The Super Neighborhoods of District K along with the Brays Oaks and Five Corners Management and three non-profits Neighborhood to Trails SW, South Central Concerned Citizens, Southwest Houston 2000 hosted a well-attended candidates forum to meet the nine candidates vying to be our District K council person. The leadership at Westbury High School did a GREAT job preparing for the event, and the ROTC students were fantastic as they helped with parking, the flag ceremony, and assisted the 9 candidates. The candidate forum Planning Team was AMAZING planning the event, spreading the word about the event far and wide, preparing the questions (both preliminary for written responses and the questions for the event), soliciting and organizing the candidate information, working as greeters and timekeepers and assisting as needed during the event. And, finally the forum had the vital financial support from the Brays

Oaks and the Five Corners Management Districts who provided the resources to print our event flyers and candidate bios/question responses, helped with audio and filmography, brought cookies and water tonight, and did a fantastic job spreading the word about our event.

Each candidate submitted a bio and answers to 12 submitted questions which were printed and available at the event in hard copy and are

available at www.westburycrier.com. All nine candidates attended the forum and gave thoughtful answers to the 6 additional questions for the live forum. The live topics were public safety, infrastructure, community responsiveness, city ordinances and neighborhood violations, and flooding.

Principal Susan Monaghan welcomed the crowd as the Westbury Jazz Band entertained in the foyer. The event opened with the WHS ROTC presentation of the colors, the Pledge of Allegiance, and a prayer by Ray Washington from SN39/40. Cindy Chapman introduced the Moderator Larry Seward of KHOU tonight and the next hour and half went by quickly as each candidate had 1 or 2 minutes to answer the questions posed.

The auditorium was full and I think speaks to the importance of this election. Be sure to cast your vote on May 5!



Flooding and Floodplains in the Houston Area: Past, Present, and Future

an Informational Workshop sponsored by the *Houston Geological Society*

Where: Bayland Community Center,6400 Bissonnet

When: Friday, May 18, 6:30-8:30PM

Presenter: Dr. William R. Dupre', Dept. of Earth and Atmospheric Sciences, University of Houston

Flooding in the Houston area over the last three years has caused residents and professionals alike to reconsider how we evaluate and respond to flood hazards in the region.

Dr. Dupre' will discuss how watersheds and floodplains are defined and mapped, and how individuals can obtain (and understand) information on local watersheds and floodplain maps of interest. He will also discuss recent floods, including how floods are measured and how flood frequency is calculated (including critical assumptions). Of particular importance is how and why floods and floodplains in Houston have changed in the past, and are likely to change in the future. Lastly, he will review some of the possible approaches to reducing flood risk in the future.

Work on HCFCD Easement

Have you seen the mountain of dirt being excavated along the Harris County Flood Control District (HCFCD) easement that runs from Chimney Rock and West Belfort back to the Willow Waterhole Bayou between Kingfisher and Sanford? The piles of dirt are there as a result of culvert boxes being installed in the drainage easement. The dirt is being moved to other places on the project site. The vast majority will be relocated in the next month. They will finish installing the boxing near the end of July.

Due to a number of calls into the WCC office we reached out to the always accessible HCFCD who had this to say: "We will speak with the contractor about sweeping the area better to decrease the mud onto the streets. The contractor is also digging swales away from the fences to facilitate drainage. Thank you for letting us know the residents' concerns. They will be addressed. Let us know if you have any questions or need more information. "

When this piece of the project is completed in August, the Willow Waterhole part of Project Brays will be complete. As to the work on Brays Bayou itself, the last leg of Project Brays itself from Rice to Fondren will begin in August.







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Kickoff in Westbury for a New "Adopt-A-**Drain**" **Program**

Mayor Turner and Amy Reed, the new executive director of Keep Houston Beautiful, announced the launch of the City's new "Adopt-A-Drain" Program. which is a partnership between Houston Public Works, Keep Houston Beautiful, and community partners. This program hopes to help prevent future flooding, save taxpayer money and keep our neighborhood storm drains clean and litter free. The site of the announcement was a Westbury street corner with 4 storm drains. Thank you Chen family for your children (below) and your corner!

The city is addressing its flooding challenges on many levels, and spends \$13 million each year on storm drain maintenance, inspection, and repairs. As it plans for regional detention and large-scale drainage improvement projects to make our city more flood resilient, it also recognizes that all Houstonians can individually contribute in the efforts to reduce local street flooding.

"Anyone in the community can help by adopting a drain and promising to keep it free from leaves and trash, especially

before it rains," said Mayor Turner, "these are just small actions that can add up to make a big difference for our entire City".

The mayor encourages Houstonians to adopt at least one of the 115.000 available storm drains. As Adopt-A-Drain partners, program participants are asked to keep their drain clear of leaves and trash by cleaning it at least four times a year (especially before it

rains), clean 10 feet on both sides of the drain, and compost or dispose of leaves and trash properly.

"The Adopt-A-Drain program is one that neighbors, and families, civic groups and businesses can all take part in to make their community a better place to live, work and play," said Amy Reed, executive director of Keep Houston Beautiful. "Thanks to the help of our generous sponsors, Keep Houston Beautiful will host five events as a part of this program to distribute supplies and create educational materials for the Adopt-A-Drain program."

"We know that there will be another storm and this program will make a daily difference in the lives of our residents by

> making sure that your storm drainage system is ready for the next storm," said Carol Haddock, director Houston Public Works. "Houstonians are our eves and ears and only you can help us know if an inlet top is broken or if a grade cover is missing. Please help us, help you by reporting these items to 3-1-1."

Becky Edmondson, WCC President, was at the press announcement held here in Westbury and noted, "Keeping our undersized and aging storm drains as clear as possible by routinely checking that water drains away quickly is just one piece of making our neighborhood more resilient. Westbury residents are hyper aware of flooding concerns and many already do this on an informal basis."

To adopt-a-drain on your street, go to www.HoustonAdoptaDrain.org. By adopting a drain, partners will receive information and tips from the City of Houston and Keep Houston Beautiful and notification of upcoming Houston Adopt-a-Drain events. For some added fun, you get to name your drain!





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New Sewer Lines

Do You Have Flood Insurance? You Should.

The majority of Westbury is not in the 100 year flood plain. However, with the amount of rainfall that is possible in any one storm, you don't have to be in a flood plain to experience water entering your home. Did you know the record for rainfall in a 24 hour period is held in nearby Alvin, Texas? 44 inches! The good news is that, if you are not in a flood plain, then you can buy peace of mind for just a few hundred dollars a year.

The Harris County Flood Control District advises that EVERY HOME in Harris County should have flood insurance, whether or not you live in a 100-year flood plain. The 100-year flood maps do not fully warn where flooding might occur. They show the risk of rising water from a bayou. The maps do not show where homes might flood due to street flooding from ditches or stormwater drains. The maps may not show where water will flow over land trying to get to a bayou. The maps do not show where houses may flood if the rainfall is higher than that predicted for a 500 year rainfall.

Only 15% of the structures that flooded during Hurricane Harvey had flood insurance.

Because your homeowner's policy does not include flood coverage and because no insurance company wants to write an unprofitable line of business, the federal government stepped in. In 1968, Congress created the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), which offers flood insurance to homeowners, renters, and business owners.



As you shop for a flood policy, you may be confused, as many are, about whether the policy is through FEMA or an insurance company. In 1983, the Write Your Own (WYO) Program began and is a cooperative undertaking between the private insurance industry and FEMA. The WYO Program allows participating property and casualty insurance companies to write and service the Standard Flood Insurance Policy in their own names. The companies receive an expense allowance (approx. 30% of premium) for policies written and claims processed, while the federal government retains responsibility for underwriting losses. The WYO Program operates as part of the NFIP and is subject to its rules and regulations.

As of October 2015, there were 79 companies participating in the WYO program and handling the majority of flood insurance policies under the program. FEMA's NFIP Direct2 program administers a small number of policies. For flood events occurring between October 2012 and December 2014, the WYO companies received 162,500 claims and paid out 7.8 billion dollars. The cost of a flood insurance policy varies

due to the: deductible chosen, insured value, Replacement Cost or Actual Cost, location in the flood plain, elevation of your home, and whether you choose to have both your home and your contents covered. Some Westbury homeowners were caught unaware that they did not have contents coverage. If you don't have flood insurance, ask your insurance agent for a quote. Make sure that you check the coverages and understand EXACTLY what you are purchasing. If you don't have an insurance agent, then look for one online at the FEMA site. Put in your address and it will give you a local agent. https://www.floodsmart.gov/floodsmart

Please note: You cannot purchase flood insurance when a named storm is in the Gulf of Mexico. Once purchased, there is a 30 day waiting period before it takes

Chapter 19 "Floodplain Ordinance Changes APPROVED

The following was taken from a special announcement email from At-Large Council Member Amanda Edwards

On April 4, 2018, by a vote of 9-7, the City Council approved new measures for Chapter 19, otherwise known as the floodplain ordinance. The previous code only applied to properties in the 100-year floodplain, but the new ordinance applies to both the 100-year and 500-year floodplains. However, there are some important distinctions between the two different floodplains. In order to clarify, we have separately discussed the new ordinance's effects on the respective floodplain areas.

The new ordinance does not expressly regulate foundations for elevation, but many people may end up utilizing pier and beams to elevate a home.

These changes to the floodplain ordinance were controversial. However, the Mayor felt that going beyond the 100-year floodplain paradigm was necessary due to the numerous areas of the city outside of the 100-year floodplain that were severely impacted by Hurricane Harvey. In fact, Houston Public Works cites 33% of single family homes, multifamily homes and commercial structures within the 500-year floodplains flooded after Harvey. Studies show that 84% of the structures in the 100 and 500-year floodplains would not have flooded if the proposed changes were in place prior to Harvey.[3]

Council Member Edwards said, "We cannot continue down the exact same path, knowing that these 500-year flooding events are now occurring every year. These reforms contribute to creating a Houston community more resilient to future floods that will inevitably occur."

Most Westbury homes are not in the floodplains, however, about 20% of the neighborhood is. The majority of these homes are along the Willow Waterhole Bayou, however, there are some homes that are located in the flood plain for Brays Bayou. It is important to know where your home is located and what rules pertain to you.

[1] Net fill is the amount of solid building materials, such as soil dirt or concrete added to a property as compared to the amount of building materials removed. Zero net fill is important, because it protects the area in the floodplain available to store flood water and maintains neighborhood drainage patterns. This will help prevent run-off from new property to existing property.

[2] Sheet flow is the natural runoff or drainage of rainfall over the ground. https://definedterm.com/a/definition/50835

Changes to the 100-Year Floodplain

- ⇒ New homes will be required to be built to the 500-year floodplain level plus 2 feet.
- ⇒ Existing homes where a planned addition increases the footprint by over 1/3 of the existing square foot space will be required to elevate only the addition to the 500-year flood plan level plus 2 feet (not the entire home).
- ⇒ This change does not apply to existing homes where the planned addition will be less than 1/3 the current floor space.
- ⇒ Note: the existing rule of an elevated level of 100-year floodplain level plus 1 foot still applies.
- ⇒ Existing homes that engage in "substantial improvements" that increase the value of the home by 50% or more will be required to elevate the entire home to the 500-year floodplain level plus 2 feet or more.
- ⇒ The current rule of "zero net fill" will remain in place.[1]

Changes to the 500-Year Floodplain

- ⇒ New homes will be required to be built at the 500-year floodplain level plus 2 feet.
- ⇒ Existing homes where a planned addition increases the footprint by over 1/3 of the existing square foot space will be required to elevate only the addition to the 500-year flood plan level plus 2 feet (not the entire home).
- ⇒ This does not apply to existing homes where the planned addition will be less than 1/3 the current floor space.
- ⇒ The "substantial improvement" rule for 100year floodplain does not apply.
- ⇒ "Minimal net fill" is allowed for homes in the 500-year floodplain areas, as long as there is no interference with the "sheet flow" of potential flood waters.[2]

MAY 15 PROTEST HARRIS COUNTY TAX DEADLINE

District K held an informative Neighborhood 101 workshop on Property tax.

The deadline to file a property value protest is Tuesday, May 15. If you have not received your property value notice, you will still have 30 days from when the notice was sent to file a protest. Your protest deadline will be printed on your property value notice. As we went to press, none of our areas appraisals have been sent.

In addition be sure you are getting all the tax exemptions you are qualified to receive. Exemptions reduce the value of your property before the tax rate is applied and are not automatically granted. You have to apply for the exemption. In addition to the well-known Homestead Exemption there are exemptions for the disabled, the over 65, over 55 surviving spouse, disabled veterans and their survivors as well as surviving spouses of first responders killed in the line of duty.

Several homeowners in the past couple years have had to tear down and/or modify their construction due to deed restriction violations. The City of Houston does not review deed restrictions when issuing permits. They require a signed affidavit acknowledging that the plans comply with your deed restrictions. This holds YOU, the homeowner, accountable for knowing and complying with your deed restrictions. We are here to help you. All deed restrictions are available online at www.westburycrier.com. 



New Pumper Truck for Westbury Fire Station #48

On April 18, the Houston Fire Department introduced four new Fire Engines, also known as "pumpers" in front of City Hall. One of these new pumpers is coming to Westbury! The decision of assignment was based on call volume, age of current apparatus and annual maintenance cost. These new units were funded through the 2017 Fiscal Year Operating budget and follows another introduction of new engines in January of this year.

The new Spartan Engines are equipped with many safety features to include David Clark intercom headset communication system/hearing protection, backup camera with microphone transmitting sound inside the cab for the E.O., frontal collision airbag system, full

curtain impact side airbag system, seatbelt pre-tensioner system to keep the firefightsers locked into their seats, if involved in a collision, anti-theft door lock system, in-cab tool brackets complying with NFPA safety requirements and IFS, Independent Front Suspension, providing improved ride quality and safety and long term health for our firefighters.

Westbury 3 Yard of the Month—5715 Burlinghall

Yard Parking is NOT ALLOWED in Westbury

REMINDER - "Yard Parking" is not allowed in Westbury. The city Prohibited Yard Parking ordinance states that it is an offense for any person to park or to cause, suffer or permit the parking of a vehicle or equipment on any surface that is not an improved surface, within any front or side yard of a single-family residence in a residential area subject to this section. This ordinance applies to neighborhoods, such as Westbury, that have signed up for the Prohibited Yard Parking ordinance. In Westbury, the board and president of the WCC submitted an application for inclusion under the ordinance, a public hearing was conducted, and the application by Westbury was then approved by Houston City Council. All homes in the Westbury / Parkwest subdivision are prohibited from having "yard parking" violations in their front or side yards.

Westbury Community Garden News

5th Annual Tomato Tasting

Saturday, June 2, 10AM - 11:30AM

It's Tomato Tasting Time again! For the fifth year running, Westbury Community Garden will be showcasing heirloom and hybrid tomatoes of all shapes and colors in our annual Tomato Tasting fundraiser event. Tasters can purchase a tasting scorecard for a small donation and, like at a wine tasting, do a blind taste test of 25-30 varieties of tomatoes in the Slicer, Salad, Paste, and Cherry categories. Tomatoes are scored on color, texture, sweetness, acidity, traditional tomato flavor, and other traits. At the end of the event, we vote on the favorite in each of the four categories. The names and growing information are revealed on each variety. Growers will be on hand to answer questions about different varieties.

The final list of varieties will be assembled just before the event date and depends on the productivity, weather and generosity of WCG gardeners and other tomato aficionados.

Do you have the best tasting tomatoes around? The WCG is opening up the tomato submissions to home growers and other community gardeners this year. Will you have around 2 lbs. of tomatoes or about 50 cherry tomatoes of the same variety? If you enter your tomatoes in the tasting, you get a free tasting scorecard! You must be absolutely sure of the variety name and have about 4-5 large tomatoes, 8-12 salad tomatoes or 50 cherries to donate. We ask that you pick as close to the event date as possible and don't refrigerate the tomatoes. Get your entry on the list by contacting the Tomato committee by May 25 (before



Memorial Day weekend) and then bring them to the garden pavilion in a labeled bag or container at 9:00 AM on Saturday, June 2 (one hour before the event starts).
