Glass Curbside Recycling Is BACK!

Good News Westbury! Glass Recycling is NOW ACCEPTED again in your green recycle bin for bi-weekly recycle collection. Yay! Two years ago the City of Houston stopped accepting glass in our green recycling bins. The change means that Westbury residents can now conveniently once again place their clean glass items (clear, green, or brown glass) into their green recycle bins instead of driving elsewhere to recycle glass.

The City of Houston is able to collect glass for recycle again due to a new contract with recycling contractor, Fomento de Construcciones y Contratas, Inc. (FCC), which built a new recycling facility in northeast Houston. This new facility accepts recycling for the entire city, including Westbury. In 2018, Houston City Council selected FCC after considering several proposals from competing recycling companies. The FCC agreement saves taxpayers millions in recycling costs and expands the type of materials the City's Solid Waste Department can collect curbside.

The FCC facility opened in March and has a 145,000 ton per year capacity, which is more than double the current needs of the City. The City's partnership with FCC also represents a reduction in the cost of Houston's recycling program. The new contract shares the financial risk between the City and FCC, so that the City can limit its liability when the value of recyclables declines and share in revenue when the value rises. The entire facility and plant ownership are transferred to the City; however, FCC will be responsible for operations and maintenance and the liability of the entire plant for the duration of the contract.

A Message from the Westbury Civic Club President

I remember how scruffy those two places looked ten years ago, and I know how much toil and sweat and devoted care have been spent improving these two places by volunteers who have a vision and are willing to work hard. If you read children's books, "The Lorax" by Dr. Suess has a famous quote, "Unless someone like you cares a whole awful lot, Nothing is going to get better. It's not." I see Westbury as a community where people care enough to get involved, and where we actively work to make Westbury a better place. We are so fortunate that these unique places are located here in Westbury.

Westbury is known to be a friendly neighborhood. As the days get longer, consider spending more time outside, either in your own yard or in our many parks. Take the time to say hello. Perhaps many of you were able to participate at our well-known, twice yearly White Elephant Sale event. This Westbury tradition may seem quaint, but it is lots of fun and a great way to mix and mingle with your neighbors. Regarding safety, there has been an upswing in vehicle crimes recently. Please remove valuables from your vehicles and park in the garage if possible. Report all crime, including minor property crime, to the constables at 281-463-6666 or call 911 during emergencies. Pct 5 Constables are aware of the situation with vehicle crime in Westbury. Working together, let's make sure that these criminals get arrested or they decide that it is too risky to be criminals here in Westbury!

Another way to make Westbury a better place is to promptly pay your voluntary dues for Civic Club operations and the Westbury Area Patrol. We have already been seeing a good response in payments received, but it takes \$\$\$ to run an office, pay our staff, pay utility bills, and pay for security patrols. Our goal is to raise enough funds to fully pay for our operating costs and our current 3 deputies by June. We will send a second mailout in June, so your prompt payment will help reduce our mailing costs. Please be aware that your escrow payments do NOT include payments for Westbury Civic Club dues or to the Westbury Area Patrol (WAP) by Precinct 5 constables. You will need to pay the dues directly to the WCC. The WCC budget is on a calendar basis, so it is better to pay your dues earlier in the year. If you have misplaced your dues letter, the dues form is on page 7.

Summer Enrichment Program at the Platou Center

The City of Houston offers a 10-week day-camp style Summer Enrichment Program (SEP) for youth ages 6 - 13. SEP is available at all 54 city community centers including the Platou Center right here in Westbury. The program runs from Monday, June 3 to August 9. Program activities include: crafts, nutrition, fun fitness, track and field, soccer, swimming, nature exploration, computer literacy programs, recycling awareness, kayaking, bird watching, fishing and hiking excursions and youth entrepreneur experiences. Parents are required to attend a program orientation at their registered community center. Transportation to and from community center is the parents responsibility. Student to staff ratio is 1 to 25 with qualified professional recreation staff. The cost is \$30.00 per child per week. Online registration is available at www. houstonparks.org click on the SEP registration link. (NOTE: Any scheduled field trip costs are not a part of the registration fee).

As a result of the Summer Enrichment Program, all adult programs currently scheduled at the Platou Center will either suspend activity for 10 weeks or relocate. Check with your group/class for status.





Illegal Dumping in Westbury

A shocking thing has been happening on an INTERIOR street in Westbury: illegal dumping of trash! Illegal dumping has long plagued out-of-the-way areas throughout Houston. In our neighborhood, dumping often occurs at dead ends near the Willow Waterhole. WCC Director Becky Edmondson had a meeting downtown to discuss this problem with Director Francis from the Department of Neighborhoods. The pervasive problem of dumping and littering throughout our city was discussed at length. In fact, the problem is so bad in our region that the Brays Oaks Management District has a budget of over a \$100,000 just for litter pickup on major thoroughfares (including those in Westbury), and they collect between 400 and 2,000 pounds of trash each day!

Many thanks to the Solid Waste Dept. for collecting our illegal dumping twice within a two-week period. Thanks also to CM Martha Castex-Tatum who took Darrel the Barrel from TxDot to see the trash and then requested a camera for our problem areas. We need a new mindset about trash here in Houston. Let's work to make Westbury the cleanest, greenest neighborhood in Houston and District K the cleanest District. Show us your efforts to clean and beautify our area and be sure to tag your posts with #cleanstateofmind!

Sometimes it is easy to become complacent with weather alerts, but emails, texts, and phone calls sent from the City Alert System definitely were accurate this time. If you haven't signed up to receive City alerts, you may do so with Alert Houston. Timely information during emergencies is important. AlertHouston delivers critical information to Houston residents regarding current conditions, expected impacts, and protective actions to keep themselves and their loved ones safe.

These alerts are issued by City of Houston Office of Emergency Management (OEM). Messages are issued for citywide and neighborhood level emergencies. They are sent through email and social media (Facebook, Twitter and Nextdoor). You must opt-in to receive these alerts.

Register for emergency alerts through email, text message, voice call, or mobile app push notification. You may download the Everbridge app free of charge from the Apple or Andoid app store. Most alerts are geo-targeted; subscribers with loved ones around the city may register up to five physical addresses per contact record.

UPDATES for FLOOD WARNING SYSTEM WEBSITE

The Harris County Commissioners Court approved a State Award letter to allow the Harris County Flood Control District to begin work to construct a new public Flood Warning System Website. The new website will include enhanced functionality and viewing capabilities, updated and modernized graphics, and features that allow residents to sign up for specific information to be delivered via e-mail, text message, and automated calls. Additionally, critical mapping features such as channel status and near real time inundation mapping will be built in more prominent locations of the new website to maximize user interaction. The new website will take a more regional approach, allowing residents in nearby counties to easily view rainfall and water level information for their respective jurisdictions where available.

The grant approved for \$1,751,961.35 (Federal \$1,313,971.01 / Local \$437,990.34) from the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) will provide the necessary funding from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to build this new Flood Warning System Website that will allow residents to take action and help protect life and property.

"We want the people of Harris County to have access to critical information in a timely, accessible format that allows them to prepare and take necessary actions in flood situations or possible flood situations," said Harris County Judge Lina Hidalgo. HCFCD encourages county residents to bookmark the website URL (www.harriscountyfws.org), for simplified access to timely information during potential flooding events.

In addition to building a new website, the grant will fund an internal flood informational dashboard that will give HCFCD staff and selected partner agencies access to current and forecasted flooding conditions throughout the county. The dashboard will provide a common user interface that displays the county bayou and stream network and flood forecasted model data, such as future water levels and flooding extents.

"Our current Flood Warning System website is ten years old, and this grant will allow us the ability to provide the residents of Harris and surrounding counties a more modern and user friendly experience," stated Jeff Lindner, Director of Hydraulic Operations and Meteorologist for the Flood Control District.

Project Brays Bridge Update

Below are updates from Harris County Flood Control District for bridge projects related to Project Brays.

- Hillcroft Bridge is currently in design and to begin construction in July, 2019
- Chimney Rock and South Rice Bridges are close to completing design and bidding for construction will begin in June 2019. These adjacent bridges will not be shut down at the same time.
- Buffalo Speedway Bridge design is complete and currently working on utility relocation with construction starting in December, 2019
- Almeda, Lawndale, South 75th, and Telephone Bridges are to complete design in August, 2019 and to begin bidding for construction in September 2019
- Forest Hill Bridge is currently in construction and to be completed in September, 2019
- Calhoun Bridge, being managed by TxDOT, is currently in design
- Greenbriar Bridge is beginning construction starting in May 2019
- Ardmore and Stella Link Bridges are beginning construction in May 2019




HCFCD Acquired Land Along the WWB

On April 12, the Harris County Flood Control District (HCFCD) closed on a deal purchasing 4.37 acres of land which abuts the Willow Waterhole Bayou (WWB) near South Post Oak. The site will be used by HCFCD to add about 15 acre-feet of new detention along WWB. The land had been cleared for a new townhome development near the intersection of South Willow at South Post Oak when it was purchased for detention by HCFCD. Part of the site is in the floodway and part is in the current 500 year flood plain. A

new gasoline station planned for that intersection will still be built, but the 56 proposed townhomes will not be built.

We want to thank the Harris County Flood Control District, Harris County Commissioners Court, the City of Houston, District K Councilmember Martha Castex-Tatum, District K Chief of Staff Janae Winfield, and City



Due to its location and size, this new detention site will not have a significant impact in reducing the flooding that is a problem in Westbury (because Westbury is located upstream of this new detention), but it will help our neighbors to our east and it will eliminate a source of new stormwater runoff into our local bayou. The Westbury Civic Club continues to advocate for new detention located UPSTREAM of Westbury, and for priority implementation of the county bond flood reduction project for the Fondren Diversion Channel and Willow Waterhole Bayou.





Do You Have Flood Insurance? You Should.

The majority of Westbury is not in the 100 year flood plain. However, with the amount of rainfall that is possible in any one storm, you don't have to be in a flood plain to experience water entering your home. Did you know the record for rainfall in a 24 hour period is held in nearby Alvin, Texas? 44 inches! The good news is that if you are not in a flood plain, then you can buy peace of mind for just a few hundred dollars a year.

The Harris County Flood Control District advises that EVERY HOME in Harris County should have flood insurance, whether or not you live in a 100-year flood plain. The 100-year flood maps do not fully warn where flooding might occur. They show the risk of rising water from a bayou. The maps do not show where homes might flood due to street flooding from ditches or stormwater drains. The maps may not show where water will flow over land trying to get to a bayou. The maps do not show where houses may flood if the rainfall is higher than that predicted for a 500 year rainfall.

Only 15% of the structures that flooded during Hurricane Harvey had flood insurance.

Because your homeowner's policy does not include flood coverage, and because no insurance company wants to write an unprofitable line of business, the federal government stepped in. In 1968, Congress created the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), which offers flood insurance to homeowners, renters, and business owners.


As you shop for a flood policy, you may be confused, as many are, about whether the policy is through FEMA or an insurance company. In 1983, the Write Your Own (WYO) Program began and is a cooperative undertaking between the private insurance industry and FEMA. The WYO Program allows participating property and casualty insurance companies to write and service the Standard Flood Insurance Policy in their own names. The companies receive an expense allowance (approx. 30% of premium) for policies written and claims processed, while the federal government retains responsibility for underwriting losses. The WYO Program operates as part of the NFIP and

is subject to its rules and regulations.

As of October 2015, there were 79 companies participating in the WYO program and handling the majority of flood insurance policies under the program. FEMA's NFIP Direct2 program administers a small number of policies. For flood events occurring between October 2012 and December 2014, the WYO companies received 162,500 claims and paid out 7.8 billion dollars. The cost of a flood insurance policy varies

due to the: deductible chosen, insured value, Replacement Cost or ACV, location in the flood plain, elevation of your home, and whether you choose to have both your home and your contents covered. Some Westbury homeowners were caught unaware that they did not have contents coverage. If you don't have flood insurance, ask your insurance agent for a quote. Make sure that you check the coverages and understand EXACTLY what you are purchasing. If you don't have an insurance agent, then look for one online at the FEMA site. Put in your address and it will give you a local agent. https:// www.floodsmart.gov/floodsmart

Please note: You cannot purchase flood insurance when a named storm in the Gulf of Mexico. Once purchased, there is a 30 day waiting period before it takes effect.

Public Safety Information from the Westbury Area Patrol

High Amount of BMVs

The week of April 10—April 17 had an unusually high amount of property crimes related to vehicles. On April 10 there were 3 BMVs (Burglary of Motor Vehicle) and on April 12 there were 10 vehicles which were burglarized. Additionally, there were 2 vehicles stolen during the week. Most of these BMV's were forced entry by glass break. The suspects are 3 young adult males. Much of the crime has happened either in Westbury 1 (near Willowbend /W. Bellfort) or in Westbury 4 (west of Hillcroft and south of W. Bellfort). On 04/18 Pct. 5 constables arrested two suspects who were believed to responsible for at least 5 BMVs in Maplewood overnight. They were arrested just a block north of Westbury off of Hillcroft.

Precinct 5 (Constables) is aware of the recent criminal activity and is implementing a plan of action.

What can you do to help?

If at all possible, park vehicles in your garage or behind a locked gate. If you must park vehicles in your driveway or on the street, please remove valuables from your vehicles – every time, regardless of the time of day. If you are a victim of property crime, please REPORT the CRIME to the constables at 281-463-6666, no matter how small or trivial you think the crime might be.

Why bother to report a small crime or an attempted crime? It is very important to REPORT CRIME to the Constables at 281-463-6666 as soon as possible, even if it is a small amount that has been stolen or even if a crime was only attempted. We have noticed some situations where people are discussing a crime on social media, but have not reported the crime to the Constables or to HPD. Keep in mind that we are PAYING Precinct 5 Constables to be in Westbury. You are not bothering them by reporting a small crime. Instead, you are helping them to solve crimes by providing them with information about WHEN and WHERE crime is happening in Westbury and WHO is doing it. Thieves tend to be prolific at stealing, so if you have had something stolen then it is likely that others will soon be victims, too. Also, you will not have to wait hours to report a property crime to the constables as you might if you called HPD. The constables excel in these type situations because they are here patrolling on a routine basis in Westbury and they can communicate with other Constable patrols in nearby neighborhoods, too. The constables are licensed law enforcement officers and can process crime scenes and fingerprints (if conditions allow). The constables forward their crime information to HPD, so by contacting the constables both HPD and the constables have the crime information available. (On the other hand, if you

report to HPD, the constables may not know about the crime.)

What if I am at work and I observe a crime on my home security camera system? REPORT CRIME as soon as possible to the Constables at 281-463-6666 — even while you are still at work, especially if you can describe what the suspect(s) looks like. The constables can take a preliminary crime report and a description of the suspect immediately and then take a more detailed report later on, but meanwhile constable patrols in Westbury and nearby neighborhoods can be on the lookout for the suspect(s).

Constables Helping Clear Debris



Westbury Area Improvement Corp. What is the WAIC?

The Westbury Area Improvement Corporation is a 501c3 nonprofit founded in 1991 serving the geographical area of the Westbury Super Neighborhood. The WAIC board includes representatives from local civic organizations (including the Westbury Civic Club), schools (Westbury High, Meyerland Middle, Anderson Elementary, and Parker Elementary), businesses, and area nonprofits. The WAIC board meets monthly at 9:30 AM on the 3rd Wednesday. This meeting also functions as the "Westbury Super Neighborhood" meeting and is thus also attended by representatives from METRO, the Mayor's Office, District K, HPD, Solid Waste, and others.

The focus of the April 2019 meeting was to discuss revitalizing the Westbury Revitalization Strategies that were developed back in 1998 by the WAIC in partnership with the City of Houston planning and development department. It's been twenty years since hundreds of volunteers came together to create a list of goals and actions to revitalize the area. Twenty years ago the action plan had five sets of recommendations on



6th Annual Tomato Tasting

Saturday, June 1, 10AM - 12PM

It's Tomato Tasting Time again! For the sixth year running, Westbury Community Garden will be showcasing heirloom and hybrid tomatoes of all shapes and colors in our annual Tomato Tasting fundraiser event. Tasters can purchase a tasting scorecard for a small donation and, like a wine tasting, do a blind taste test of 25-30 varieties of tomatoes in the Slicer, Salad, Paste, and Cherry categories. Tomatoes are scored on color, texture, sweetness, acidity, traditional tomato flavor, and other traits. At the end of the event, we vote on the favorite in each of the four categories. The names and growing information are revealed on each variety. Growers will be on hand to answer questions about different varieties.

The final list of varieties will be assembled just before the event date and depends on the productivity, weather and generosity of WCG gardeners and other tomato aficionados. We are opening up the tomato submissions to home growers and other community gardeners this year. Enter Your Homegrown Tomatoes

Will you have around 2 lbs of tomatoes or about 50 cherry tomatoes of the same variety? If you enter your tomatoes in the tasting, you get a free tasting scorecard! You must be absolutely sure of the variety name and have about 4-5 large tomatoes, 8-12 salad tomatoes or 50 cherries to donate. We ask that you pick as close to the event date as possible and don't refrigerate the tomatoes. Get your entry on the list by contacting the Tomato committee by May 24 (before Memorial Day weekend) and then bring them to the garden pavilion in a labeled bag or container at 8:30 AM on Saturday, June 1 (1 1/2 hours before the event starts.)
