Preserving the Character of Westbury

The Westbury Civic Club is made up of YOUR neighbors. They volunteer their time and deeply care about Westbury and want to see its continued success. The WCC has been active for over 65 years and is the main reason Westbury is still a desirable neighborhood today. We are a highly respected organization by the City and County. Other civic clubs try to mirror our successes. Over 65 years, we have developed a deep history, knowledge and respect for how neighborhoods work, and how to advocate.

The vision and mission of the WCC is the same today as it was 65 years ago, to "improve the appearance of the Westbury area and promote the civic, cultural, educational, health, and general welfare of the residents of the Westbury and Parkwest subdivisions". Westbury is located within the 4th largest city in the US and we have to fight for our fair share of projects and funding. If no one advocates for you, nothing will ever get done in your neighborhood. The WCC advocates for everything— flood control, street repairs, HISD issues, and much more.

Part of living in Houston means no zoning and neighborhoods whose main protection is strong deed restrictions. The WCC often refers to the importance of deed restrictions in maintaining the character of our neighborhood. Other neighborhoods around us such as Maplewood SN and Meyerland have recently updated their deed restrictions to be stronger and offer more protections. All sections of Westbury have active deed restrictions but most have never been updated. The documents, while still valid, are in need of updating to reflect the current 2022 legal meanings and our ever-changing world. This is NOT an attempt to create an Mandatory HOA. The purpose of this is solely to protect what we value in Westbury.

Updating the deed restrictions can be an arduous task but is incredibly important to retain the character and charm of our neighborhood. MAJOR Traffic Warning 610 W Loop S Exit off 59 South CLOSED for TWO Years

The ongoing reconstruction of the 610 West Loop and the 59 Southwest Freeway started a new phase on April 29. The southbound connector from the 59 SW Freeway heading to 610 West Loop South toward Bellaire and Westbury is now closed for approximately TWO YEARS.

TxDoT recommends that drivers coming south on 59 SW Freeway continue to the Fountain View exit, make a U-turn at Fountain View, get back onto the SW Freeway headed north, then exit onto 610 W Loop S.



Why is Trash Collection ALWAYS Late?

The City Solid Waste Department is at its lowest level of workers in decades. It is extremely understaffed. The City is required by State law to collect the regular (black) bins every week, so it often

pulls drivers off their recycling or heavy trash routes to cover the regular trash. This creates a chronic backlog. Read more about the Citywide trash issues on page 11.

A Message from the Westbury Civic Club President

Deed restrictions have been a recent hot topic, so I'll mention my own experiences. Like many of you, when my husband and I moved to Houston we were clueless about certain topics. We didn't consider flooding history or flood zones because we moved from a place where flooding wasn't an issue. And certainly, we had only a vague idea that Houston had no zoning and didn't understand what deed restrictions were. At that time in 1988, the economy was in a recession, the mortgage interest rate was higher than 10%, and the Houston economy was in terrible shape. Many people had lost their jobs and numerous houses and businesses in foreclosure. While we were house-hunting, we noticed that some neighborhoods had declined more than others, but we didn't realize why and we were pleased that the home we purchased was in an area of town that had stayed fairly stable. Our new neighborhood was named Westbury. We loved the large yards, the mature trees, and the convenient location that was a short drive to my husband's new job here in Texas. We were delighted that other young couples had also recently moved onto our street. I was 28 years old and my "new" house was the same age I was.

I served as the Section Director for Westbury 5E for a few years as a busy, working mom. After I stepped down from the board, years went by before I was contacted by the WCC inquiring about my willingness to fill the vacant Deed Restriction position on the board. Frankly, I was very reluctant, but I agreed to give it a try, and thus began an education that continues today about using the tools of deed restrictions, City ordinances, and advocacy to resolve problems and to keep our neighborhood stable and desirable.

I began to better understand how and why my Westbury neighborhood had been in better shape than many other neighborhoods during those dark days of the 1980s the answer was active deed restrictions and the very dedicated volunteers of the Westbury Civic Club. I began to better appreciate and understand the hard work that homeowners in Parkwest I and Parkwest 2 had undertaken in the early 1990s to revise their deed restrictions to allow 2-story homes. I had already known that they had changed their rules to allow 2-story houses, but now I realized the care they had taken to look at a wide range of issues and to implement what were high-quality documents for the era.

Times change, and both Parkwest 1 & 2 changed with them by updating their Deed Restrictions. (About 30 years have gone by since those changes, so Parkwest 1 and Parkwest 2 could actually benefit from another round of updates!) Meanwhile, all other sets of Westbury Deed Restrictions still date back to the 1950s and 1960s, from a time when the developers expected modern affluent families to use a clothes dryer and worried that it looked low-class if someone used a backyard clothes line.

Today there are new challenges and issues, and it is sensible to consider how to update old deed restrictions for today's times. I have heard that some people think the Westbury deed restrictions should be loosened and we should instead rely on City ordinances. Based on my experiences, that approach would be a big mistake. In fact, the nearby subdivisions of Maplewood SN and Meyerland have made their deed restrictions MORE Detailed, have added definitions and modernized wording. and have tried to make their deed restrictions clearer to understand.

I have learned over the years that the City can sometimes be a helpful partner, but other times, relying on the City can be frustrating or fruitless. The City sometimes will implement rules and ordinances, but then not provide the resources needed to enforce those rules and ordinances.

The City is constantly "updating" and changing its rules. Our Westbury Deed Restrictions, even as old as they are, have protected our neighborhood from those dramatic changes to the City rules. For example, the City has modified its development ordinances, so Westbury is now classified as an "Urban" area instead of a "Suburban" area. However, the character of our neighborhood still feels suburban, because our Deed Restrictions had detailed requirements that still must be followed and our deed restriction requirements over-ride the City ordinance. It is much better to have written requirements in our Deed Restrictions rather than to try to rely on unreliable City ordinances or policies.

In the coming weeks and months you will be hearing more about deed restriction topics and issues. I encourage you to participate in community meetings or surveys to discuss what changes or updates are desired and valued. It is not my choice, nor is it the choice of the WCC to decide what changes should be made, or if any changes are made. Instead, any possible changes require discussion and consensus, because a majority of homeowners must approve any changes to a set of deed restrictions. The role of the WCC is to help homeowners understand options, choices, and consequences (good or bad) and to help ensure that any changes are done in a fair and organized manner, consistent with good practices, expert advice, and relevant laws and requirements.

WCC Board Notes - April 2022

- → HISD Trustee, District 9, Myrna Guidry was invited as a speaker to the WCC Meeting as the White Elephant Sale conflicted with her District 9 Community Meeting. Guidry noted that the proposed HISD Strategic Plan has been changed back to campus budgeting as opposed to the centralized budget that was being proposed. The compromise will see required positions at every HISD campus (Nurse, Librarian, and social worker/counselor).
- → Sgt. Derkowski reminded that the Precinct 5 Constables have a 24/7 Dispatcher system. If a Westbury Constable is not available, then the nearest available officer will be sent by the dispatcher. 281-463-6666. Crime stats were discussed. For property crimes, response time is typically much faster if call the Constable Dispatcher rather than reporting to HPD
- → District K Field Services Director Melvin Hopkins gave updates for District K. The construction on the West Bellfort Traffic Slowing Plan is scheduled to start on May 2.
- → The WCC board approved filling 3 vacant board positions— Susan Brock was elected to move to Secretary, Becky Pate was elected for Westbury 4, and Bob Droubi was elected for Parkwest 2.

Regular Household Trash

Yard Waste

Pick-up is EVERY week either on Thursday or Saturday or any day the City decides to come by. Yard Waste MUST be placed in the correct City bio-degradable bags.



Recycling in Westbury

All of Westbury recycles on Schedule A. Recycling is every other week. Recycling goes into the green trash can.

Why Support the WCC?

Westbury is a unique neighborhood. While all 5,000 homes in our Westbury neighborhood have active deed restrictions, only 463 have mandatory assessments. This means the Westbury Civic Club heavily relies on voluntary financial contributions from residents.

Westbury has historically had strong voluntary support because residents understood the great benefits of the WCC and our programs. The past several years' contributions to the Westbury Civic Club and to the Westbury Area Patrol have been down. By working together, we can meet the challenges head on and keep our neighborhood the jewel that it is. We all want a safe, flood free neighborhood with great schools and nice neighbors.

The total amount for the **2022 Voluntary Dues is \$365**. That is well worth a dollar a day! The Westbury Civic Club dues are \$60 for the year. The WCC suggests a contribution of \$305 for the Westbury Area Patrol (a paid contract with Precinct 5 Constables).

City of Houston Redistricting

The City is hosting meetings in each City Council district about the City redistricting process and to receive an update on planned capital improvement projects (CIP). The meeting for District K will be held on May 4, 6 to 8PM, at the Fountain Life Center, 14083 S. Main at Hillcroft.

The City of Houston looks at redistricting needs after each Census. Since the 2020 census data was just completed, it is time for this process to begin again. Each city council district is supposed to have approximately the same population. Redistricting was last done back in 2010 and two new districts (District J and District K) were added at that time. Most residents of Westbury were moved from District C into the new District K. Hopefully we will not be moved again.



How Do Harris County Precincts Work?

Harris County is led by the Harris County Judge (Lina Hidalgo) and Commissioners Court. There are four Commissioners and they each represent a Precinct. Westbury used to be primarily in Precinct 1 under Commissioner Rodney Ellis; however, with the new redistricting, some of Westbury is now located within Harris County Precinct 4 under Jack Cagle. While most of Westbury remained in Precinct 1, a big section North of W. Bellfort moved to Precinct 4. See the map below that shows the old map overlayed with the new, so you can clearly see the sections of Westbury that changed to Precinct 4.

These are NOT the same Precincts as the Harris County Constables precincts. While the Constables are part of Harris County, they have their own Precincts and elected leaders. The boundaries of the 8 Harris County Constable Precincts has not changed. Westbury geographically falls in two Constable precincts, but our legal contract for security patrol services includes the entire neighborhood regardless of which precinct they live in. DISTRICT K UPDATES

Westbury is lucky to be in a very responsive City Council District. District K always sends representatives with good information to our monthly meetings. Our District K Councilmember, Martha Castex-Tatum often attends, if her schedule allows. At the April 2022 WCC board meeting, Melvin Hopkins spoke for District K and provided several important updates.

W. Bellfort Traffic Slowing Plan Construction Starts May

District K office is providing the funds to construct several traffic slowing measures along W. Bellfort to try and slow down traffic and lessen the accidents. Smaller lanes, better signage, and painted street markings. Construction is scheduled to start on May 2.

Hillcroft Concrete Panel Replacements Segments of concrete panels will be replaced on the northbound side of Hillcroft, between West Bellfort and

Hillcroft, between West Bellfort and Willowbend.

Westbury 2 Sidewalk Repair

District K has submitted a section of sidewalks in Westbury 2 for modifications to improve mobility for those with disabilities. The Mayor's Office for People with Disabilities reviewed the sidewalk for eligibility. Thank you Susan Brock with the WCC for reporting this dangerous sidewalk.

Spring Village Apartment Buyout Update

On April 6, Martha Castex-Tatum gave an update to Houston City Council on the progress of the Spring Village Apartments Multifamily Voluntary Buyout project in Westbury. This property, consisting of approximately 6.45 acres of land at the corner of Chimney Rock and Ludington, will be used for an additional 53-57 acre-feet of flood detention.

As of March 31st, 73 of the 132 tenants still remain at the property. Occupancy is slowly going down as residents are relocating. Everyone should be adequately relocated by the end of 2022. Demolition should happen within a month or two after Spring Village Apartments are fully vacated. The Spring Village Apartments have flooded MANY times.



Red circled area is the Spring Village Apartment. This land will be used for detention or greenspace after demolition. The property is located at the corner of Ludington and Chimney Rock and abuts the Willow Waterhole Bayou (blue line). The new Westbury Library will be built North of the bayou (yellow area).

This property will be dedicated and maintained in perpetuity for open space, recreational or floodplain and wetlands management. No new structure will be erected on this property.

This project will have a tremendous impact on improving the overall drainage in this area of the district that has suffered from repetitive flooding over the recent years. Progress is being made!

City Trash Delays

Why is my Trash Pick-up ALWAYS late?

Trash issues are the number one reason for calls to the WCC and our City Council office. Residents are very frustrated that recycling and heavy trash are always late and the weekly yard waste never picked up. The Houston Chronicle recently ran a great article answering many questions that people all over Houston want to know, key points are summarized below.

Why is Trash Service Unreliable?


The City Solid Waste department has reached its lowest amount of workers in decades. The department is rarely able to assign drivers to all the routes throughout the City. It often has to pull drivers off recycling, heavy trash and yard waste to pick up the regular trash bins, which must be collected weekly, per state law. The constant maneuvering of the workforce leads to extensive and chronic backlogs in the recycling and heavy trash collections. The drivers have been required to work six-day schedules since 2018 and drivers often work over 60 hours in a week.

What is the Solution?

Mayor Turner has added cash bonuses for new drivers and plans in bring salary raises before City Council soon. Mayor Turner has also been speaking about the need for a garage fee on residents. He voted against such fee in 2019 but says it is now needed to increase the budget. Other major Cities in Texas and the US have trash fees.

How can you help the truck drivers?

- → Make sure your bins are at least 3 feet apart.
- → Make sure lids close completely on bins. Technically, you can be skipped, but most drivers will still attempt collection. Be respectful and do not overload your bins.
- → Do not place bins or heavy trash next to light poles, trees or other obstructions that would make it difficult for the truck arm to grab the bin. Also, pay attention to tree branches and placement of bins and heavy trash.





Texas and Run-off Elections 2022

There are TWO separate elections for the month of May. The first election is to vote on two proposed Amendments to the Texas constitution related to taxes. The other election is for party runoff elections to select who will be on the ballot in November if no candidates received a majority vote during a primary election.



NOTE - if you voted during the primary in March for one political party, then you cannot switch to a different political party to vote in the runoff election. If you did not vote during the primary election, then you can opt to vote in any runoff elections for either political party.

Amendments to the Texas Constitution Early Voting is April 25 to May 3. Election Day is May 7.

The two proposed amendments are related to taxes and are described as:

- → A measure that would authorize the state legislature to reduce the limit on property taxes imposed on the homesteads of elderly or disabled residents to reflect any tax rate reduction enacted by law from the preceding tax year.
- →A measure to increase the homestead exemption for school district property taxes from \$25,000 to \$40,000.

Run-off Elections—Democratic and Republican Early Voting is May 16 to May 20 Election Day is May 24.

There are both statewide and local races.

Preserving the Character of Westbury

Times are constantly changing. Legal terms and what things meant in 1957 are not the same in 2022. Things that once concerned homeowners in 1960s are not a problem anymore, gone are the days of visible clotheslines being an issue or open garage doors. The original developers of Westbury never accounted for elevating homes and the need for rules around that process. As legal meanings have evolved, our Westbury deed restrictions should reflect these changes so Westbury can maintain what our neighborhood means to US not what it now means to the City or State based off some legal precedence or definition.

Westbury has over 30 sets of deed restrictions for 5,000 homes. There are some common clauses in all sections but there are also some differences as well. One thought is to streamline the restrictions and make them more cohesive throughout all of Westbury. It can be confusing for residents on one side of a street to have different rules than the other side. For example, Mullins divides Parkwest 2 and Westbury 5. In Parkwest, they amended their restrictions in the early 90s to allow 2 story homes and 3 car garages. Meanwhile, Westbury 5 still has their original deed restrictions which do not allow for 2 story homes and only allow for a 2 car garage.

Texas State property code dictates how and by whom deed restrictions can be amended or altered. The WCC will help facilitate the process of updating and amending the deed restrictions. The WCC is consulting with our attorney on the first steps we need to take in this process to ensure it is done openly, honestly, and correctly. We expect surveys, several community meetings, break out groups, and more. This process can be arduous, but is incredibly important to retain the character and charm of our neighborhood. 

HISD Funding Update

Last month we wrote about the new Houston ISD strategic plan. The original HISD plan had sweeping changes, including centralizing the funding of certain positions and programs. This would have taken away the ability of principals to make the decisions for what their school actually needed and the District would tell them what they could have. As we go to print, the proposal to centralize has been pulled back for reconsideration after push back. HISD says it will still allow principals control of their budgets but will still mandate several positions at all schools such as librarians and nurses.

The new strategic plan will affect every school. Whether you have children in HISD or not, this is an important topic. The majority of our property taxes go to HISD and our house values are intrinsically tied to how our neighborhood schools are perceived. Westbury schools fall into two trustee districts. Both of our HISD Trustees held community meetings on this topic and HISD budget, and we thank everyone who took the time to reach out to their Trustees. Keep Westbury Beautiful Day

Do you love watching butterflies flitting about? We encourage Westbury residents to visit the Butterfly Garden at Westbury Park to see various butterfly species at work. Another great place to see butterflies is at the Westbury Community Garden. Both sites have designed their butterfly gardens to support



butterflies across their life cycle: egg, caterpillar, pupa, through adult butterfly. If you want to see more butterflies in your garden, then your habitat should support the needs of butterflies during all four stages.

The plants purchased for the Butterfly Garden at Westbury Park were purchased at Buchanan's Garden Center. Here is some advice gleaned from their website. "Plant flowers to attract butterflies by providing nectar, and provide host plants where the adults can lay their eggs. These plants are not the same. Do not use insecticides in the garden. All insecticides, including Bt are toxic to insects and butterflies are insects, too. After the eggs hatch, the larvae will begin to eat the leaves of the host plant. Don't worry if the host plant is defoliated; it will recover. Butterfly larvae usually prefer native "unimproved" varieties of plants."

Some of the butterfly-nurturing plants, which have been planted at the Butterfly Gardens at Westbury Park and at the Westbury Community Garden, are:

Host Plants: Milkweed, Dutchman's pipe vine, Ruellia/Mexican Petunia, Fennel, Cassia and others

Nectar Plants: Phlox, Ruellia, Lantana, Cassia, Sages, Salvias, Zinnia, Milkweed, Purple Coneflower, and others

Help Needed Along Westbury Trails

There are several trails throughout Westbury along our drainage easements that run through the neighborhood. Have you seen the Westbury Trail signs? These trails are maintained by Westbury volunteers and we need you!

Willow Waterhole Bayou Trail— This trail is along the banks of the Willow Waterhole Bayou all the way through Westbury to the Willow Waterhole detention basins.

Hummingbird/Bankside Ditch Trail— This trail runs along the Hummingbird/Bankside Ditch all the way to the Chimney Rock/W. Bellfort intersection, where you can take the pipeline easement to the Willow Waterhole complex.

Atwell/Burdine Easement Trail— This trail runs along the drainage easement behind Atwell and Burdine homes. It easily connects Parkwest to the Hummingbird Trail or you can walk along the trail to W. Bellfort near Burdine.

These trails are unimproved with grass that needs to be mowed and cleared of trash/brush periodically. This type of maintenance requires volunteers, but right now, there is only one man, Allen Potvin, and he would love to find others interested in helping him mow.

The current mowing distance along the trails amounts to 1.6 miles, which can be easily broken down into sections ranging from 1/3 to 3/4 mile segments. There is also a need for volunteers to pick up trash and branches/twigs prior to mowing.

Pocket Prairie at the Westbury Community Garden

Right now the prairie is alive with blooming Green Milkweed and many other spring wildflowers like wine cups, prairie parsley, tickseed coreopsis, and many more. There are no bluebonnets, but there is a patch of Indian paintbrush. These spring blooming plants will soon be followed by liatris, giant coneflower, and other types of milkweeds.

The best time to visit is on a Sunday, because the auto repair businesses on Greencraig are closed and there is plenty of curbside parking. Visitors are encouraged to drop by if they are interested in the native plants of Texas. Take pictures and enjoy what you see.

Benefits of a Pocket Prairie

There are many benefits of a pocket prairie when compared to conventional lawns. Here is a quick list of ways that re-establishing prairie habitats can help the local community.

Mitigates Flood Water—Prairie grasses absorb flood water far faster and filter storm water runoff.

Decreases Soil Erosion—While conventional turf grass root only penetrate a few inches into the soil, prairie grass roots go feet deep into the soil. This greatly reduces soil erosion.

Habitat Conservation—Many Texas native species of birds and pollinators depend on prairie habitat for their homes and food. Pocket Prairies help keep these species healthy.

Psychological Benefit—Walking in natural spaces greatly improves people's mental and physical health. Pocket prairies can be used to install sustainable green space in the city.

The Pier is Near!

Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy is planning to build a pier on Westbury Lake in 2022. The pier was designed by Cobb Fendley and Associates in Houston.

The pier will be used for fishing and kayak/canoe launching, as well as environmental sampling by local schools. The pier will be built using the PermaTrak system, which allows the water level to cover the pier during rain events. The pier will extend 46 feet from the edge of the lake and then make a 90 degree turn and extend another 32 feet. The surface width is 8 feet and the entire structure will be surrounded by a safety railing. It will be ADA compliant with a concrete path from the top of the bank down to the water's edge.

This is a \$200,000 - 250,000 capital expenditure and WWGC has raised over 80% of the funds required. This is very good news but they also need your financial support now. No donation is too small and since they are very close to their goal, every dollar will have an impact. The money raised for this project will be matched by The Kinder Foundation.
