Flooding Revisited

Both the 2015 and 2016 June *Criers* featured multiple stories and pictures of flood events. 2017 has been a year without structural flooding and at least one rain event that could have caused flooding. On Wednesday, January 18, the City of Houston experienced another major rain event and *NO* Westbury homes reported any structural flooding.

What has helped make the differences in the 2017 rain events that has helped the Westbury homes? Many different factors played a role in keeping water out of Westbury homes. Repairs on outfall pipes, continuing work on Project Brays, local drainage projects, de-silting of our ditches, and more. To read more about these reasons, see page 8.

A Message from the Westbury Civic Club President

Mayor Turner gave his State of the City address last month and I always like to review the State of Westbury. Flooding is always a hot topic and Mayor Turner reiterated his commitment to flood mitigation. On June 21, the Brays Bayou Association is hosting a meeting the same night as the Westbury Civic Club meeting with HCFCD Director Russ Poppe and Steve Costello to discuss reducing the risk of flooding in the Brays Bayou watershed. If your home flooded or if you are generally interested in the subject, you will want to attend this meeting.

The Westbury Civic Club meeting on June 21 will have Judge Ed Emmett as our guest speaker. You can read about him on page 9. I am excited to have the head of Harris County Commissioners Court come to Westbury for a visit. We often feature City of Houston speakers and City of Houston issues, but Harris County is also an important partner.

At the Super Neighborhood Alliance meeting in May, there was a discussion of Mayor Turner's Complete Communities Plan. The plan calls for the City to focus assets on five specific communities. It reminded me of when Westbury was chosen by the City Planning Department to be "revitalized". Back in 1998, after two years of working with dozens and dozens of Westbury residents and the

Westbury Area Improvement Corporation, the City of Houston Planning Department published the "Westbury Revitalization Strategies". The purpose of the plan was to serve as a guide for residents, civic clubs, churches, businesses and others seeking to preserve, stabilize and revitalize the general Westbury area. We have been using this plan as a guide for almost twenty years now. If you worked on this plan back in the 90s and would like to work on the twenty year review, please email me. Beginning in July we will be starting a 5-part series on Westbury's revitalization.

In addition to looking at the strides we've made in the past 20 years, we will be evaluating and looking at what we need to focus on for the next twenty years. There was a survey for residents done bank in 1996/97. We will have a new survey later this summer for residents to give their input. I hope you will participate!

And speaking of participation, there was the HISD election in May. A dismal 4% of the voters showed up at the polls. But not here in Westbury where we voted at twice that rate as a whole. And in Pct. 14, almost 13% of the registered voters cast their votes. 83.8% of the city voters approved the proposition while 89% in Westbury voted yes. A chart on page 13 will give you the precinct level detail.

Summer is upon us and there is usually an uptick in crime. If you travel this summer and have paid your constable dues, be sure to request a vacation watch. Make sure your house doesn't look vacant when you are gone. Have a neighbor keep an eye on things. Summer also means weekly yard work! Be sure and check out the Yard of the month winners as we have some really beautiful yards in Westbury.



Common Water Safety Rules

Tragically already this season, a two year old child drowned in the pool of a home in a nearby subdivision. Twenty five kids have drowned in Texas so far in 2017. Water is a great way to beat the heat but summer is also when children are most likely to drown. Drowning is a leading cause of accidental death for kids under the age of five and toddlers are especially at risk. Drowning can happen in almost any amount of water, indoors or outdoors.

- Never leave a child unsupervised around water, inside or outside of the house. It only takes a few minutes for a child to drown.
- Never leave children alone around with water whether it is in a pool, wading pool, drainage ditch, etc.
- Constantly watch children who are swimming or playing in water. They need an adult or certified lifeguard watching and within reach.
- Secure access to swimming pools. Use fences, self-closing and latching gates, and water surface alarms.
- Completely remove pool covers when the pool is in use.
- Store water toys away from the water when not in use so they don't attract a small child.
- Don't assume young children will use good judgment and caution around water.
- Be ready for emergencies. Keep emergency telephone numbers handy and learn CPR.
- Find out if your child's friends or neighbors have home pools.

Pool Safety and Violations

The summer heat has arrived! We want everyone in Westbury to have a safe summer. Back in 2013, the Westbury Civic Club's Environmental Committee met with the City of Houston's Health and Human Services pool inspectors to discuss swimming pools and safety. The WCC office has received numerous phone calls regarding unmaintained pools. All residential pools must be fenced. The fence must be at least 4 ft. high and in good condition (no gaps over 4 inches) with a self-latching gate. The pool water must be maintained.

Report a violation as soon as possible if,

- There is a house, occupied or unoccupied, with a pool or spa that has not been properly maintained. This can result in green or black water that may breed mosquitoes.
- There are any slats broken or missing from a fence surrounding a pool or a spa. This also includes both vacant and occupied houses.
- If a house or property has any type of outside above-ground pool or spa that is not enclosed by a secure fence.

Flooding Revisited

Over the past several years, some parts of Westbury have seen multiple flooding events. SW Houston had enough rain on January 18, 2017, to flood Westbury homes, yet none reported damage or water in their homes. Why was this the case? Several important jobs and projects have been completed since the big 2015 Memorial Day Flood. A lower rainfall amount was also an important factor as Brays Bayou did not overflow in 2017.

The City did a local drainage project to repair four collapsed outfalls on the Willow Waterhole Bayou. This project helped residents east of Hillcroft. One resident on Cartagena reported "the street drained much better than in the past. It seems the repair work helped out." Another resident on Ludington, who has experienced flooding multiple times, had NO water in his home in January 2017.

Gary Zika of Project Brays reported that even though Project Brays is not yet complete, it is further along than it was since we experienced water in some of our homes during the 2016 Tax Day Flood. Project Brays helps all of Westbury because it will help Brays Bayou stay within its banks. Water from Willow Waterhole Bayou was able to directly drain into two of the basins at the Willow Waterhole.

Harris County Commissioner's Court approved the de-silting of Westbury drainage ditches in 2015 and that work (with the exception of some ongoing work on the southern end of the Braewick ditch) is now complete. This work benefitted all areas of Westbury.

The Willowbend asphalting project also included curbs and gutters and repairs to a drainage line. Two residents on Willowbend, one of whom who had experienced structural flooding in the past, both reported that the water drained more quickly.

Our streets are designed to hold water and we had serious STREET flooding. It is important that unless you absolutely have to be somewhere, don't drive through flooded Westbury streets. The State of the City, the State of Westbury

Mayor Turner gave his State of the City address in May and it is interesting to see how Westbury fits into the Mayor's vision for the City. He started off thanking Steve Costello, the flood czar, the chief resilience officer, for working on Houston's drainage and flooding issues and said flooding would remain a priority. That's good news for Westbury as about 5% of Westbury homes have had water enter into them. On June 21, the Brays Bayou Association is hosting a meeting with HCFCD Director Russ Poppe and Steve Costello to discuss reducing the risk of flooding in the Brays Bayou watershed. This is an important issue for Westbury.

Turner thanked Public Works for the pothole work. Westbury had streets repaired last year and Willowbend was resurfaced. There seem to be far fewer potholes.

He talked about his plan to fix the Pension Plan that is bankrupting our city. He also wants to remove the revenue cap that voters put in place back in 2004. Voters will have a chance to vote on this issue in

November, so expect to see articles in the coming months about the pros and cons of removing the revenue cap.

Homelessness is another issue Mayor Turner is having the city tackle. He has heard from community after community, including Westbury, that we don't want aggressive panhandling, public urination, drug use or people passed out under our freeways. He has a 6-point plan, part of which is asking the public not to give to panhandlers. Meaningful change, not spare change.

Mayor Turner ended with the things that the City of Houston 2017 has never had more of and they are true for Westbury also

More people. That could be true as more homes are being built in the area.

More diversity. True as our demographics are fairly consistent with the whole city.

More parks and greenspace. The Willow Waterhole continues to grow, Westbury Park had more improvements added, Hager Park had the trail resurfaced and Chimney Rock Park benefited from a grant.

More connectivity. We are getting there; the new Neighborhood to Trails Southwest (NTT SW) continues its awesome outreach with help from the National Park Service. Allen Potvin and Kevin O'Brien continue to mow the demonstration trails we have on the drainage easements and bayou.

More artists, musicians, and talented individuals. If you attended the Willow Waterhole music fest and saw the depth of talent you know this is true for Westbury!

A more dedicated police force, fire dept. & municipal workers. New HPD Chief Acevedo has attended neighborhood meetings in to our area twice.

A broad, robust and diverse development and business community. Westbury benefits from the city's robust economy, but there is not much commercially happening in Westbury although the prior Discount Tire building will become the home of Willowbend Crossfit.

Home sales remained robust in 2016 and the price per square foot was up from 2014. See chart below.

Westbury approved at 89% and the City of Houston at 84%.

Public Safety is one of their areas of service for their commercial tax paying constituents. Each month the BOMD Public Safety Committee has a meeting. May was a very informative meeting.

The first speaker was Julie Stroup from the City of Houston and Homeland security. It was interesting to learn how the City is working to keep us safe with cameras in public spaces, where having a scalable and robust system to improve the security posture of populated areas with critical infrastructure is important. These cameras are for situational awareness not monitoring. They are for incident management and response.

A representative from Genetec Community Connect told how other cities were having businesses and possibly even neighborhoods install and pay for cameras that could become part of this grid. They are looking at ways of connecting law enforcement and citizens for safer communities. Cameras are installed privately and then law enforcement opts in so when things, like gunshots, are reported they can use cameras from all over to pull up license plates, etc.

Crime is up in Southwest Houston. Property crimes and burglaries of motor vehicles were on the rise this past month. One thing the Brays Oaks Management District has done to help curb crime is to enter into a retail ambassador program with Seal Security. This service provides Seal officers to answer trespass/vagrancy calls, alarm calls, trespass affidavits, and any other calls for service by the commercial businesses within the BOMD. They will have both marked and unmarked cars. The control center for SEAL has access to over 200 languages. Look for the special decal in the window. If you are at a commercial business in the BOMD and have safety concerns, please call this number that is dedicated to the Brays Oaks District.

The surrounding management districts are already using SEAL Security and perhaps the increase in vagrants we see in the BOMD has come from their efforts to remove them from their areas. No one likes to try to enter a store and be accosted by a vagrant asking for something. This program will help bring an end to that. Keeping our retail and commercial establishments safe is good for business and good for us as consumers.



June is National Safety Awareness Month

Observed annually in June, National Safety Month focuses on reducing leading causes of injury and death at work, on the road and in our homes and communities.

On the roads: Slow down and save a life! A Westbury resident was hit by a car and killed one morning in February of 2016 as he crossed at Hillcroft and West Bellfort. A Meyerland resident was struck and killed while crossing West Bellfort at Runnymeade this past month. Neither of the drivers in these two cases were ticketed, but cars do speed up and down West Bellfort and Hillcroft with complete disregard for other peoples' lives and property.

At home: Update your first aid kit. 95% of emergency assistance is given by bystanders or the victims themselves. Are you ready? Take a CPR class.

Emergency Registry (2-1-1 Registry)

The State of Texas Emergency Assistance Registry (STEAR) is a FREE registry that provides local emergency planners and emergency responders with additional information on the needs of residents in their community. Registering yourself in the STEAR Registry at 2-1-1 DOES NOT guarantee that you will receive a specific service during an emergency; however, you are more likely to receive services if you're registered. It also provides responders with info so that they can reach out to you after events.

who Should Register? People with Disabilities.
People with access and functional needs such as: People who have limited mobility, People who have communication barriers, People who require transportation assistance, People who require personal care assistance.

How do you register? Call 2-1-1 and let them know that you want to register for STEAR. Registration is VOLUNTARY. Required information is: Name, address, phone number, and primary language. Additional questions include: Emergency contact information, caregiver information, pets, transportation assistance for home evacuation, communication barriers, Disability or Functional or Medical Needs.

- How long will my information be kept? Your information will be kept for 1 year. You should re-register after that time period.
- What if I move or do not need assistance?
 Contact 2-1-1
- **Will I be evacuated during an emergency such as a hurricane?** No. Each local government uses the information in different ways.

Remodeling your home? Adding On? Do you know your deed restrictions? Did you know that the Westbury Civic Club can look over your proposed plans for free before you start con**struction?** We want to avoid deed restriction violations before they happen. Did you know that Westbury 2, Westbury 3, and Westbury 5 have a 25 foot rear setback for the main structure? Did you know that there is a minimum percentage of brick that must be on your home? Did you know that you can't build in front of your building line? We want to help you! We want you to find out about possible violations be fore it costs you money and time. Several homeowners in the past couple years have had to tear down and/or modify their construction due to deed restriction violations. The City of Houston does not review deed restrictions when issuing permits. They require a signed affidavit acknowledging that the plans comply with your deed restrictions. This holds YOU, the homeowner, accountable for knowing and complying with your deed restrictions. We are here to help you. All deed restrictions are available online at www.westburycrier.com. 

Trails In and Through Westbury

The subject of trails in Westbury isn't a new one. The 1998 Westbury Revitalization strategy called for a linear park on Hillcroft. Al Potvin and Kevin O'Brien have been mowing the ditch and bayou right of ways for over two years now giving residents a place to walk off road. The group was awarded grants that provided "Demonstration" trail signs that can been seen along trails in Westbury. Two years ago, a new trail initiative that included multiple southwest Houston neighborhoods came into being: Neighborhood to Trails, Southwest. Neighborhoods to Trails Southwest (NTTSW) is dedicated to developing hike and bike trails to provide safe, economical, and environmentally friendly transportation from and to the Brays Bayou trail system and destinations in Southwest Houston such as Willow Waterhole Greenspace. NTTSW is a newly established all-volunteer nonprofit organization founded in 2015 by local neighborhood walkers, runners, and bikers, who have come together with a common interest of working together to provide better off-street trails that connect to local destinations. Southwest Houston neighborhoods participating thus far are Braeburn Valley West, Maplewood West, Maplewood North/ South, Meyerland, Marilyn Estates, Westbury, and Willow Meadows.

With a grant from the National Park Service the group has been working to draft their organizational goals. One of those goals is community outreach and they have been participating in events all over SW Houston spreading the word about trails. After all these years of dreaming about trails, they are becoming a reality! Look for meeting notices if you are interested in joining this effort.
