## **New District K CM Martha Castex-Tatum**

On May 5, the City of Houston held a Special Election in District K to replace the recently deceased Larry Green. Martha Castex-Tatum won with 60% of the vote. There will be no run-off election since one candidate received over 50% of the vote. CM Castex-Tatum was sworn in to office on May 16, 2018. Read all about it on page 11. Martha will serve the remainder of the term. The next election is in Nov. 2019.

Voter turnout was abysmally low with 6,213 of the 106,410 eligible voters in District K for a total of 5.8%, but it was much higher in Westbury. If you think that you have no voice and nothing ever happens, you are wrong. The best way to get anything done is to be a part of the process. Having good communications with our City Council office is an

important part of this. Sometimes our expectations exceed the reality of what can happen in terms of projects or fixes to chronic problems; however, that doesn't mean they aren't being worked on.

The WCC looks forward to working with CM Castex-Tatum to continue to bring Westbury's long standing projects to fruition. The District K staff is remaining as well. Donald Perkins will be the Chief of Staff and Barbara Hite will still be our awesome constituent rep! Vivian Harris and Joe Gaston also will remain.

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# A Message from the Westbury Civic Club President

After 2 months without representation in the seat for City Council District K, on May 5, the citizens of District K elected in Martha Castex-Tatum. You can learn all about Martha and the election results on pages 10 & 11. The Westbury turnout for the election was about twice that of the average turnout. Across the board in non-national election years, it is hard to get identify who to approach for a solution. I much more than 5% of the electorate out. In Westbury, that means about 10-12% of us vote. A big thank you to the approximately 1,000 Westbury voters who went to the polls to cast their votes.

I don't really understand the apathy nor the "by not voting, I am voting mentality". But we voters are definitely in the minority. If you want to join an elite group who gets to decide who serves us, vote in the next election! I want you to imagine how much power a neighborhood would have if 80% of their voters went to the polls. At one polling location in District K with 580 registered voters, 8 people voted. In my opinion, we have more power to effect change at the local level than we do at the national level. The men and women who serve us on City Council, in the State Legislature, on the School Board, and the judges in our courts affect us more than those who sit in Washington. They are accessible! We will have another chance to go to the polls in November of 2019.

I'm very happy to have someone who already knows the job representing us in District K. There are so many ongoing and pending City projects. All of Westbury needs street and drainage reconstruction projects. We need more storm water detention added to the west of us; and we need to help get people back in their homes and make their homes safer. We need that new library that was in the 2012 bond. We need the bridge on Hillcroft

over the Willow Waterhole replaced. We need the plans for the new Hager Park. We need a trail hike and bike system throughout Westbury. We need traffic studies done throughout Westbury to make our neighborhood streets safer.

Part of getting things done is trying to often brag about our neighborhood, and people always ask, how we were able to get things done. I told them our secret: Show up! It's simple, just showing up will put you on the path to getting things done.

I hope some of you will think about joining the WCC board in August as we take nominations for 2019. What is your passion? There are so many areas that could use your expertise.

Summer is here and school is out. Please slow down on our streets. Please don't drive distracted. It only takes a moment for a child to dash into the street unexpectedly. A 6 year old child was hit by a car on a Sunday morning in Westbury 2 and had to be hospitalized. Like the signs say: Drive like your child lives here.

#### Three more summer caveats:

- → Be sure to request a vacation watch when you take your summer vacation.
- → Ask your lawn crews to stop blowing your grass clippings into the street. They just end up going down the drain.
- → Adopt a storm drain near you and keep the gutters clean and clear.

Fourteen years ago, in June of 2004, I attended my first Brays Oaks Super Neighborhood meeting to learn about storm drain marking. I realized that the Super Neighborhood concept was important. The Westbury Super Neighborhood became recognized in March 2005. The formation of District K and flooding issues led us to work more closely with our adjoining neighborhoods to the north like Maplewood and Meyerland and to the east Willow Meadows and Willowbend. They, too, saw the benefit of the Super Neighborhood setup and the Near Southwest Super Neighborhood and the Greater Meyerland Super Neighborhood were both recognized in 2017.

Here we all are working together at the Mid-Brays Workshop. The night before this, all of the Super Neighborhoods of District K hosted a voter's forum to introduce the NINE candidates vying for the District K seat in the May 5th Special Election. These two events really proved how we are "Better Together" and that by working together, we are stronger and more effective.

Water fitness is a great exercise for any age, any fitness level and any body type. Wear appropriate swimwear, aquatic shoes are advised, and always bring a bottle of water for hydration.

## Adult Circuit Water Fitness Class Tuesday and Thursday, 9-10AM

A combination of cardio, strength training, and flexibility that takes you through a series of stations using effective circuit training principles and the latest aquatic equipment for a total body workout. The intensity is light to moderate.

## Hydro Fitness Training Class Tuesday and Thursday, 6:30PM - 7:30PM

An athletic approach to water fitness training with sports-specific drills, intense cardiovascular work, intervals, balance/core training, martial arts, and plyometrics. It's a great way to improve your cardiovascular conditioning and muscular strength with minimal stress on your joints. Loud, rocking music is part of the workout. Recommended as a great form of cross training. Intensity: moderate to hard.

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# Do You Have Flood Insurance? You Should.

The majority of Westbury is not in the 100 year flood plain. However, with the amount of rainfall that is possible in any one storm, you don't have to be in a flood plain to experience water entering your home. Did you know the record for rainfall in a 24 hour period is held in nearby Alvin, Texas? 44 inches! The good news is that, if you are not in a flood plain, then you can buy peace of mind for just a few hundred dollars a year.

The Harris County Flood Control District advises that EVERY HOME in Harris County should have flood insurance, whether or not you live in a 100-year flood plain. The 100-year flood maps do not fully warn where flooding might occur. They show the risk of rising water from a bayou. The maps do not show where homes might flood due to street flooding from ditches or stormwater drains. The maps may not show where water will flow over land trying to get to a bayou. The maps do not show where houses may flood if the rainfall is higher than that predicted for a 500 year rainfall.

Because your homeowner's policy does not include flood coverage and because no insurance company wants to write an unprofitable line of business, the federal government stepped in. In 1968, Congress created the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), which offers flood insurance to homeowners, renters, and business owners.

As you shop for a flood policy, you may be confused, as many are, about whether the policy is through FEMA or an insurance company. In 1983, the Write Your Own (WYO) Program began and is a cooperative undertaking between the private insurance industry and FEMA. The WYO Program allows participating property and casualty insurance companies to write and service the Standard Flood Insurance Policy in their own names. The companies receive an expense allowance (approx. 30% of premium) for policies written and claims processed, while the federal government retains responsibility for underwriting losses. The WYO Program operates as part of the NFIP and is subject to its rules and regulations.

As of October 2015, there were 79 companies participating in the WYO program and handling the majority of flood insurance policies under the program. FEMA's NFIP Direct2 program administers a small number of policies. For flood events occurring between October 2012 and December 2014, the WYO companies received 162,500 claims and paid out 7.8 billion dollars. The cost of a flood insurance policy varies due to the: deductible chosen, insured value, Replacement Cost or Actual Cost, location in the flood plain, elevation of your home, and whether you choose to have both your home and your contents covered. Some Westbury homeowners were caught unaware that they did not have contents coverage. If you don't have flood insurance, ask your insurance agent for a quote. Make sure that you check the coverages and understand EXACTLY what you are purchasing. If you don't have an insurance agent, then look for one online at the FEMA site. Put in your address and it will give you a local agent. https://www.floodsmart.gov/ floodsmart

**Please note:** You cannot purchase flood insurance when a named storm is in the Gulf of Mexico. Once purchased, there is a 30 day waiting period before it takes effect.

## **Flood Insurance Workshop**

WCC Office Manager, Jennifer Edmondson, attended a full day conference about Flood insurance mapping and rates. It was an interesting topic with many layers of information. Since 2015, the WCC has become quite the experts on flooding and terminology and the procedures involved with insurance.

The workshop was held at the North Houston HCFCD location. On her way home, Jennifer stopped by the old Woodland Oaks neighborhood off Fairbanks N Houston (pictures below). It is a mind blowing sight to see in person if you haven't been in awhile.

After multiple floods from White Oak Bayou in the late 1990s, Harris County Flood Control did a voluntary buyout of the neighborhood. This was a fully developed middle class neighborhood built out in the early 1980s. Today, driving the streets was a picturesque setting of huge greenspaces full of grass and trees and only a few homes remain. It was a shocking sight if you knew what had been there previously. There are no signs of the old homes, no slabs or driveways. Solid curbs surround the huge open greenspaces. Most streets have no homes but some have only one or two left. Makes you wonder if this is what Houston was like before dense neighborhoods.

Flooding might seem like a hot new topic, but in reality this story has been repeated over and over again throughout Houston throughout our history. Flood memories are short. People move away. Rain falls elsewhere across our huge city. This doesn't mean we are safe from flooding just lucky. It's all about where the rain falls! There is a historic chart that lists all the foods in Houston since the mid-1800s. It's a long long list, because we flood. The floods change over the years and some areas get better because of mitigation projects or buyouts.

Jennifer's biggest take away from the workshop was WHEREVER IT CAN RAIN, IT CAN FLOOD. This is so true in Houston. If you don't have flood insurance, get it! There is no such thing as a no flood zone. Yes, some of us are in flood plains but we can all flood given the right circumstances.





## **Common Water Safety Rules**

Tragically already this season, 22 kids have drowned in Texas so far in 2018. Last year, 78 kids drowned in Texas. Water is a great way to beat the heat, but summer is also when children are most likely to drown. Drowning is a leading cause of accidental death for kids under the age of five and toddlers are especially at risk. Drowning can happen in almost any amount of water, indoors or outdoors.

- Never leave a child unsupervised around water, inside or outside of the house. It only takes a few minutes for a child to drown.
- ⇒ Never leave children alone around with water whether it is in a pool, wading pool, drainage ditch, etc.
- Constantly watch children who are swimming or playing in water. They need an adult or certified lifeguard watching and within reach.
- ⇒ Secure access to swimming pools. Use fences, self-closing and latching gates, and water surface alarms.
- ⇒ Completely remove pool covers when the pool is in use.
- Store water toys away from the water when not in use so they don't attract a small child.
- Don't assume young children will use good judgment and caution around water.
- ⇒ Be ready for emergencies. Keep emergency telephone numbers handy and learn CPR.

## **Pool Safety and Violations**

The summer heat has arrived! We want everyone in Westbury to have a safe summer. Back in 2013, the Westbury Civic Club's Environmental Committee met with the City of Houston's Health and Human Services pool inspectors to discuss swimming pools and safety. The WCC office has received numerous phone calls regarding unmaintained pools. All residential pools must be fenced. The fence must be at least 4 ft. high and in good condition (no gaps over 4 inches) with a self-latching gate. The pool water must be maintained.

Report a violation as soon as possible if:

- There is a house, occupied or unoccupied, with a pool or spa that has not been properly maintained. This can result in green or black water that may breed mosquitoes.
- There are any slats broken or missing from a fence surrounding a pool or a spa. This also includes both vacant and occupied houses.
- If a house or property has any type of outside above-ground pool or spathat is not enclosed by a secure fence.

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## Do I Have to Mow THAT too?

Did you know that city ordinance requires you to maintain not only your own lot but adjacent property?

City of Houston Municipal Code Section 10-451.10 describes yard maintenance responsibilities. In simplified terms, Residents are responsible for maintaining your entire yard within your property boundaries. Residents are also responsible for maintaining your yard out to the curbline of the street adjacent to your yard (for example, if your house is on a corner, then maintain out to the curb for both your front and side streets). If an adjacent property does not have a curbline (for example, a drainage easement), then residents are responsible for maintaining the adjacent property for 14 feet beyond their property line. This is why homeowners are responsible for maintaining the area between the sidewalk and the street. A big thank you to all who mow a portion of the easements.

**Common Trash Placement Woes** 

**Heavy Trash**— Blocked. The tree or junk waste on the curb must be accessible to the automated collection truck. If there are obstacles or parked cars in the way, the trash cannot be picked up.

Do not place your heavy trash up against a tree, light pole, or wires.



Heavy Trash—Place too early or in wrong month.

The Crier always has the heavy trash schedule on the front page and on page 5. Junk Waste is collected in the even months of the year and tree waste only on the odd months. Westbury's pick up is the 2nd Thursday of each month. Trash can be placed on the curb starting on the Saturday AM before our pickup day.

Trash Cans—Too Close. The recycling and regular trash cans must be at least 3 feet apart from each other.

## **How to Make a 311 Report**

Call 311, email 311@houstontx.gov, use the 311 mobile app, or go online to City website.

Those three numbers, 311, are the first line for getting things done in the City. The city representative will take your information and the issue you a service request (SR) number. Make sure to save the SR number for your records. You can call 311 back at anytime and request an update with your SR number. If your situation needs to be escalated, send your SR number to the WCC office for further action.

## Yard Parking is NOT ALLOWED in Westbury

REMINDER - "Yard Parking" is not allowed in Westbury. The City Prohibited Yard Parking ordinance states that it is an offense for any person to park or to cause, suffer or permit the parking of a vehicle or equipment on any surface that is not an improved surface, within any front or side yard of a single-family residence in a residential area subject to this section. This ordinance applies to neighborhoods, such as Westbury, that have signed up for the Prohibited Yard Parking ordinance. In Westbury, the board and president of the WCC submitted an application for inclusion under the ordinance, a public hearing was conducted, and the application by Westbury was then approved by Houston City Council. All homes in the Westbury / Parkwest subdivision are prohibited from having "yard parking" violations in their front or side yards.

## Visible House Numbers

Take a look at your house numbers today. Do you have house numbers on your house and are the numbers readily visible from the street? Did you know that the city requires EVERY home to have a visible house number, so that emergency vehicles can respond quickly to the correct address. A house number painted on the curb is helpful, but it can be obscured by a parked car.

The ordinance says a house number should be placed either on the primary door or within 18 inches from that door. If your house was built before 1979, then the numbers have to be at least 2" tall. If your house was built between 1979 and 2010, then the numbers have to be at least 3" tall. If your house was built after January 2010, then the numbers should be at least 4" tall.

## **District K Special Election Results**

The special election to replace Council Member Larry Green was held May 5, 2018. Voter turnout was abysmally low with 5,091 of the 85,450 eligible voters in Harris County for a total of 5.96%. Did you know part of District K is in Fort Bend County? 1,163 of their 20,960 voters turned out to vote with a rate of 5.54%. In total District K has 106,410 voters and 6,213 cast their votes.

Close to 1,000 voters showed up to vote at the Westbury polling locations. Westbury precincts again were among the highest in voting percentage! Voters in Westbury voted at almost twice the rate as other precincts. Congratulations to our Westbury residents for displaying their civic engagement as voters! Elected officials respect that Westbury votes.

Only 5 precincts broke single digits. The top precinct this election was in Linkwood/Woodshire with 12.85%. Precinct 14 in Westbury always places in the top few precincts year after year, coming in second at 11.74%. Pct. 146 and 293 In Westbury are also tops in Harris County with 10.85% and 9.17%. Pct. 293 was a little lower, but with so many flooded homes in that precinct, it is understandable. Hiram Clarke had 10.85%. The Westbury average for our 4 main precincts was 10.15%.

There was no TV advertising and very little information about the election in the newspaper. This election was really driven by mailouts, robo phone calls, and door to door canvasing. The Westbury Civic Club posted information about the election in our monthly newsletter and on our Facebook page.

The Super Neighborhoods of District K hosted a voter's forum at Westbury High School and solicited written questions and bios from all 9 candidates. The League of Women Voters often does this during other elections, but did not during this election, so the Super Neighborhoods helped fill the gap. The SNs felt it was important to give voters an opportunity to hear from the candidates and read their responses. The Westbury Civic Club made this candidate information available on Facebook and on NextDoor.

Martha was a graduate of Leadership San Marcos in 1996. After she moved to Houston, she was a member of Leadership Houston Class XXXVI of 2018.

In 2004, Martha returned to Houston and became a residential realtor. In addition to her career in real estate, Martha has worked for District K with other District K staff members to address concerns of constituents while advocating for seniors, small business owners, extracurricular and after school activities for youth, economic development, beautification projects, among other issues.

She oversaw the progress of the new Southwest HPD police station in District K, the CASE afterschool grant process, the monthly Fort Bend and Hiram Clarke "Bridging the Divide" community meetings, and numerous sidewalk, waterline and street repair projects throughout the district. Martha represented the District K office monthly at the TIRZ 9 and TIRZ 25 meetings, as well as the Five Corners Management District meetings.

Martha currently resides in Brays Oaks and is a member of Windsor Village United Methodist Church. When she is not working or serving the community, she enjoys spending time with her son and her parents, who are District K residents, and other family members and friends.

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

Westbury board member Dan Vega noticed that trucks and 18-wheelers were making left hand turns onto Chimney Rock from the second lane on West Bellfort, and actively blocking the green light while doing so.

Back in 2016 he reported the problem to 311 when he was almost involved in an accident with someone making an illegal left turn.


Public Works sent someone out to look at the intersection, but no action was taken other than forwarding the information to the Signal Department.



Frustrated by the lack of action, Dan turned to the

District K Council office in 2018 and sent Chief of Staff Donald Perkins an email and pictures thoroughly explaining the problem and offering a suggestion to improve the intersection for safety. Here is the reply Dan received: "Based on images being reviewed by the PWE Traffic Operations Division at this approach, and in general of the intersection, missing left turn markings (arrows and "only" symbols) are missing to clarify to drivers the purpose of the far-left lane. PWE will reopen this case and as determined needed, these left turn markings and complementary signs (single for turning lane only) will be installed."

So that is good news! Thanks to Dan Vega for bringing an unsafe situation to the City's attention. And, more importantly, for not giving up in frustration when nothing happened! The wheels of progress move slowly; but they do eventually get somewhere!







## **Westbury Park Gets New Mulch**

Within several hours, WCC President Becky Edmondson, received text message pictures from two different people that had been at Westbury Park. ## **National Safety Awareness Month**

June is National Safety Awareness month. Here are some tips for the road, home and the outdoors.

On the roads: Slow down and save a life! Last month, a six year old Westbury child was struck by a car. She had to be hospitalized, but she will survive. Two adult pedestrians were struck by cars and killed on our streets – one in 2016 and another in 2017. It is summer and more children will be outside.

**NOTE:** The speed limit on our streets is 30 MPH including Willowbend. Just the major streets of Hillcroft, Chimney Rock, West Bellfort and West Airport are 35 MPH. Please make a conscious effort to keep your speed at the speed **LIMIT.** 

**At home:** Update your first aid kit. Refresh your hurricane preparedness kit. Have a family plan about what to do in case of an emergency. Hurricane Harvey reminded all of us that it is important to be prepared.

**Outside:** Mosquitoes, some carrying infectious diseases are here. It is summer and they live to eat and breed. Remember to **not** leave standing water, including in the trays under your potted plants or other receptacles. That water is a key breeding situation for mosquitoes.

## **Brays Bayou Flooding Workshop**

A team of researchers from Rice University, the University of Houston and Texas Southern University are creating a comprehensive plan to mitigate the impact of flooding along the southwest Mid-Brays Bayou neighborhoods. The team, led by Dr. Lester King from Rice and Dr. Bruce Race from the University of Houston, held a workshop for community members at the end of April.

Sustainability researchers King and Race have organized a group to develop the first community-level flooding resilience plan in the Houston region. Dr. King, a sustainability planner and expert at Rice, has developed the Houston Sustainability Indicators Project. Dr. Race is the director of the Center for Sustainability and Resilience at the University of Houston. Race is assisted by other scientists from the School of Science and Technology at UH. The School of Public Affairs at Texas Southern University and the TSU Law School also and collaborating on the project.

Attendees from Meyerland, Westbury, Willow Meadows and Brays Oaks broke down into discussion groups to discuss issues and opportunities. Questions posed to the groups: Who will be living in this Mid Brays community in 20 years? What will it look like? Will the strong family orientation, traditional institutions all remain? Will this area be reimagined for the 21st century?

"We hope the community really takes ownership of this project. We want to maximize community contribution. The final product needs to be fully reflective of the community's vision. Our job is simply to help to facilitate and articulate the possibilities and the costs" said Dr. King.

The Mid-Brays communities have been worn down by the repeated flooding events. These workshops cover topics ranging from transportation, housing, retail and commercial business spaces, water retention options, green and open spaces, water recycling systems and landscaping.

Watch for an opportunity to attend the next workshop and put your input into the future of our area.



## **Connecting Schools to Community Resources**

With support from the City of Houston and with funding from the Houston Endowment, HISD has developed Every Community, Every School, a comprehensive initiative to connect schools to non-academic supports needed to improve the well-being and academic achievement of all students.

As Houstonians we have read the recent news about the low performing schools in HISD. It's fairly obvious that more needs to be done to meet the needs of today's students. Often called wraparound services, these non-academic supports address critical issues such as mental health and physical health needs, food insecurity, lack of stable housing, violence, incarceration of a parent, and many other challenges that can have adverse effects on a student's readiness and ability to learn. When wraparound services are provided in tandem with strong academics and high-quality teaching, schools can truly meet the needs of the whole child and graduate students who are college and career ready.

The Westbury Civic Club and the Westbury Super Neighborhood are represented on this new Advisory Council that was formed in April for Westbury High School. The first meeting brought together about 40 individuals representing a diverse group of support ranging from mentoring, health services, language services, mental health services, refugees services, parents, teachers, and more. We learned about Westbury the campus and watched a powerful video about 4 students and the challenges they had faced and how Westbury provided them a safe haven.

Watch future Criers for ways you can become involved in our neighborhood community schools. Representatives from our area schools are invited each month to the WAIC/Super Neighborhood meeting. It's a way for us to find out what's happening and how we as a community can help support our schools. The Westbury community is zoned to many schools: Westbury High, Meyerland and Fondren Middle Schools, Anderson, Parker, Kolter, Foerster, Elrod, and Tinsley Elementary Schools.







## **Westbury High School Gala**

The 26<sup>th</sup> annual Friends gala was held in May and ten \$3,000 scholarships were awarded to deserving seniors. Each recipient had time at the podium and thanked their families and their teachers. In addition, community leaders are recognized each year and this year's celebrants were Outstanding Alumni - Shawn Thierry, Outstanding Teacher - Reginald Washington, and Community Leader - Scott McCleskey, posthumously.

The gala theme this year was the Derby since it coincided with the date of the Kentucky Derby race. Event Co-chairs Elisa Namee and Barbara Freilich coordinated a great event.

The Friends of Westbury High School Foundation, an all-volunteer, non-profit, tax exempt organization, was founded in 1992. Thanks to the generous support of Westbury alumni, friends, and business partners, since 1994 the Foundation has raised over \$350,000 and awarded over 200 scholarships for Westbury students.

In addition, the organization supports school projects; such as campus landscaping, mentoring, serving on school committees, and maintaining the Foundation website.


of Chimney Rock Park, Neighborhood to Well as



## **Keep Storm Drains Clear**

Did you read last month about the city's new Adopt a Drain program? To adopt-a-drain in your neighborhood,

This program does not replace any job that City is supposed to be doing. This is a unique way to remind homeowners and residents to keep the gutters and drains clear of debris. This debris will otherwise clog the drains and slow the water flow.

## **Mosquito Control**

are out full force! Mosquitoes are not only annoying but they can carry dangerous illnesses. The best way to keep down the number of mosquitos is to not let them breed.

Mosquitos can breed anywhere that water is left to stand or collect. If you look in the standing water, you may see little wiggling things. Those are baby mosquitoes (larvae). Some examples of where water may be left standing include: pet water bowls, bird baths, low puddle areas, saggy gutters, and plant container saucers. What can each of us do to reduce the numbers of mosquitos?

- Tip over all the water collectors in your yard and leave them turned over to discourage mosquitoes
- Don't allow standing water in saucers under a pot.
- Rinse and refresh bird baths and pet water bowls daily.
- If you collect rainwater to water your plants, be sure the container has a good screen cover to keep the mosquitos out.
- If you have a decorative pond in your backyard, check it for mosquito larvae. Small fish called Gambusia (Mosquito Fish) can be added to eat the mosquito larvae.
- Keep gutters in good repair.
- Get rid of old tires.

## 5th Annual Tomato Tasting

Saturday, June 2, 10AM - 11:30AM

It's Tomato Tasting Time again! For the fifth year running, Westbury Community Garden will be showcasing heirloom and hybrid tomatoes of all shapes and colors in our annual Tomato Tasting fundraiser event. Tasters can purchase a tasting scorecard for a small donation and, like at a wine tasting, do a blind taste test of 25-30 varieties of tomatoes in the Slicer, Salad, Paste, and Cherry categories. Tomatoes are scored on color, texture, sweetness, acidity, traditional tomato flavor, and other traits. At the end of the event, we vote on the favorite in each of the four categories. The names and growing information are revealed on each variety. Growers will be on hand to answer questions about different varieties.

The final list of varieties will be assembled just before the event date and depends on the productivity, weather and generosity of WCG gardeners and other tomato aficionados.

Do you have the best tasting tomatoes around? The WCG is opening up the tomato submissions to home growers and other community gardeners this year. Will you have around 2 lbs. of tomatoes or about 50 cherry tomatoes of the same variety? If you enter your tomatoes in the tasting, you get a free tasting scorecard! You must be absolutely sure of the variety name and have about 4-5 large tomatoes, 8-12 salad tomatoes or 50 cherries to donate. We ask that you pick as close to the event date as possible and don't refrigerate the tomatoes. Get your entry on the list by contacting the Tomato committee by May 25 (before



Memorial Day weekend) and then bring them to the garden pavilion in a labeled bag or container at 9:00 AM on Saturday, June 2 (one hour before the event starts).
