The Westbury Civic Club is interested in YOUR thoughts on the topic of Deed Restrictions. A community town hall meeting for ALL of Westbury is scheduled for Thursday, June 23, 6-7:30PM. The meeting is tentatively scheduled at Westbury Baptist Church. Check on the WCC website or Westbury Houston Facebook page closer to the meeting date to confirm location.

The meeting will consist of several speakers to help educate people on what deed restrictions are and why they are so important in the City of Houston. We will also have an open session for residents to speak and voice their opinions and concerns. We will limit the speakers time if need be.

Why is the WCC hosting this meeting? The WCC Board wants to hear from Westbury residents as we start the arduous process of updating the deed restrictions. Most sections have the original deed restrictions written in the 1950s and 1960s, and even the most recently revised sets for Parkwest 1 and Parkwest 2 are almost 30 years old. Times are constantly changing. Legal terms and what things meant in 1957 are not the same in 2022. As our world evolves, our Westbury deed restrictions should reflect these changes so Westbury can maintain what our neighborhood means to US.

HURRICANE SEASON STARTS JUNE 1

The Atlantic hurricane season starts on June 1. Being prepared and knowing what to do are key. There is no need to panic if you are prepared and have a plan. Pages 8-10 contain many helpful articles about storm prep, flood insurance, weather resources, and more.

It has been over a decade since the Galveston-Houston region has experienced a true hurricane. The damage from a direct hit of a major hurricane is very different than Harvey flooding. Hurricanes in Houston are typically major wind events that can cause long power outages.

We live in a huge city close to the coast, so there is different advice for certain areas. It is important to know where you live. Westbury is NOT in an evacuation zone. A long-time hurricane saying is, "Run from the surge, hide from the wind". This means that the average Westbury homeowner should remain at home, inside sheltered in place, during the event. See page 10 for tips on what to do if a hurricane is coming.

When there is an active storm in the Gulf of Mexico, you should always pay close attention to a trusted weather source on what is happening with the storm. Page 8 has a list of weather sources.

Flooding is still a concern with hurricanes, just like any time it rains in Houston. Hurricanes can bring localized flash flooding with heavy rain bands. Properties that regularly flood during high rain events could flood, depending on the rate of rainfall. Page 9 gives the links to the flood gages and how to look up that information and how the Westbury gage and weirs work.

The National Hurricane Center predicts 2022 will be another active season. We hope you find these resources helpful. Make a plan, be prepared, and stay safe.

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A Message from the Westbury Civic Club President

Summer may be the least popular time of year in Houston, due to its humidity and high temperatures, but it may be the favorite time of year for students as school ends. The last day for HISD is June 7. Keep in mind that summer school sessions may still be in progress, so please continue to follow speed limits in school zones. Be on the alert for children playing in yards or biking in the street, and drive SLOWLY on our neighborhood streets. A child playing in a yard has the potential to dart into a street at any time.

Westbury has a city swimming pool open to the public, located at the corner of Willowbend at Mullins, in Westbury Park. A popular FREE water fitness class will again be offered at the Westbury pool for adults. I have participated in this water fitness class for several summers, and, from personal experience, I can attest that it is popular for all fitness levels and all ages of adults. You will need to sign up online or at the swimming pool to provide your info and emergency contact information before participating. Sometimes the fitness class will be listed as "Full" online, but typically so many people travel or have alternate activities, that it is common for space to be available during a class time. I encourage you to give it a try! One reason that this class continues to be offered at the Westbury Pool is because the class always has a large number of participants signed up. Westbury is only one of several pools with a fitness class this year.

On a recent walk through the neighborhood, I greatly appreciated the shade from our many large and beautiful trees. As shady as our streets may be, they were once even shadier 30+ years ago when I moved into my Westbury home. My street once was almost entirely shady from sidewalk to sidewalk due to enormous ash trees. The original developers were wise to require trees to be planted when each house was built, but

they were mistaken to list the required trees as ash trees. It turns out, that specific type of ash tree was selected because it was a fast grower; alas, that fast growth meant that the trees had a short lifespan. Almost all of those ash trees have died and been removed. Did you know that SHADE from yard trees is linked with wealth? Wealthier neighborhoods have more trees, more shade, and more plants in their yards; and thus have cooler temperatures during the summer heat.

During that same walk, I also noticed that many yard sprinklers were running. Have you considered how much water your yard might actually need? The City suspects that many homeowners are watering too much – too often or too long or both. Earlier this year, I saw people watering their yards, just one day after Westbury had received 3" of rain. That was a huge amount of rain, and I assure you that their yards did not need nor did they want to be watered after that much rain.

If you have an irrigation watering system, don't necessarily assume that the technician has it set it up best. More likely, the technician is going to set up the irrigation system so that they don't get complaints for under-watering and thus they are going to lean toward over-watering. For example, when my home irrigation system was originally set up, it was scheduled to water some areas 5 days a week and some others 3 days a week. Frankly, that was much more often than my yard or my established landscaped hosting a Community Town Hall meeting beds needed during normal conditions, but at the time I trusted the irrigation company to know how to set up the system for the Houston climate. And of course, back then water was much, much cheaper than it is today!

For those of you who are recent arrivals to Houston, I will mention that there is one important reason why you might want to consider watering your yard on an

occasional basis – to keep your house foundation stable. The soil here in Houston is primarily clay, which expands and contracts based on water content. During an extended dry period or drought, the soil will shrink. Personally, I monitor the rain monitors operated by the Harris County Flood Control District and I rarely water my established yard except during an extended dry period in the hot weather. In my yard, only new plants get pampered and only until they get established with a good root system.

Please consider that our neighborhood is a desirable neighborhood because it has nice looking yards and an attractive appearance. I am seeing too many people who are putting out their heavy trash at the curb at the wrong time. Nobody wants to look at your heavy trash any second longer than they have to! Junk Waste is only collected during EVEN months (Feb., Apr., June, August, Oct., and Dec.) - "in EVEN months they EVEN collect Junk Waste". Contractors are supposed to haul off their construction debris or their tree limbs after a major tree pruning. Let us all do our part to keep Westbury the attractive and desirable neighborhood that it is.

Another reason Westbury remains a desirable neighborhood after 65 years is our strong, active deed restrictions. In Houston, a city of no zoning, it is imperative for neighborhoods to protect themselves. It is time to update the 1950s and 1960s deed restrictions. The WCC is on deed restrictions on Thursday, June 23, from 6-7:30PM at Westbury Baptist. See page 1 and 12 for more information. I hope to see many of you there!

Pick-up is EVERY week either on Thursday or Saturday or any day the City decides to come by. Yard Waste MUST be placed in the correct City bio-degradable bags.

Why Support the WCC?

Westbury is a unique neighborhood. While all 5,000 homes in our Westbury neighborhood have active deed restrictions, only 463 have mandatory assessments. This means the Westbury Civic Club heavily relies on voluntary financial contributions from residents.

Westbury has historically had strong voluntary support because residents understood the great benefits of the WCC and our programs. The past several years' contributions to the Westbury Civic Club and to the Westbury Area Patrol have been down. By working together, we can meet the challenges head on and keep our neighborhood the jewel that it is. We all want a safe, flood free neighborhood with great schools and nice neighbors.

The total amount for the **2022 Voluntary Dues is \$365**. That is well worth a dollar a day! The Westbury Civic Club dues are \$60 for the year. The WCC suggests a contribution of \$305 for the Westbury Area Patrol (a paid contract with Precinct 5 Constables).

Weather Wary in Westbury

Does rain make you nervous? Are you unsure on the weather forecasts? Does listening to the news weather reports make you panic? You are not alone. Houston weather over the past couple years has made us all very wary, if not scared, of storms.



Houston gets rain. The trick is to know where and how much. There are many good websites and apps available that can help guide you before rain events or during them. One good piece of advice is to look for warnings and alerts from the actual source, for example the National Hurricane Center. This is not a complete list but just one meant to help guide you and add to your storm preparations.

Harris County Flood Warning System www.harriscountyfws.org

This website is extremely helpful <u>during</u> a rain event. It shows real time bayou levels and rainfall amounts at gages that have been installed along the bayous. **Gage 445** is located in Westbury on the Willow Waterhole Bayou at the Landsdowne bridge. Gage 440 is located on Brays Bayou at S. Rice. A new tool just introduced is the ability to sign up for Flood Alerts by gage. Another tool available on the website is a Flood Inundation real time map that can help residents make critical decisions regarding life and property during events. If you are ever curious about the rainfall amounts and rate, you can also look up historical data.

National Hurricane Center www.nhc.noaa.gov

If there is a chance of a named storm or there is a current named storm, the National Hurricane Center is your go-to source. During an active named storm, there will be multiple updates issued along with many different maps. These include the wind probability, the storm track cone, storm surge, tides, and many more.

Do You Have Flood Insurance?


While the majority of Westbury is not in the 100 or 500 year flood plains, floods can happen anywhere given the right circumstances. Anywhere it can rain, it can flood. There is no such thing as a no flood zone. Only 15% of the structures that flooded during Harvey had flood insurance. Did you know the record for rainfall in a 24-hour period is held in nearby Alvin, Texas? 44 inches! The good news is that, if you are not in a flood plain, then you can buy peace of mind for just a few hundred dollars a year.

The Harris County Flood Control District advises that EVERY HOME in Harris County should have flood insurance, whether or not you live in a mapped flood plain. The current flood plain maps do not fully warn where flooding might occur. Homeowner's policies do not include flood coverage, and, because no insurance company wanted to write an unprofitable line of business, the federal government stepped in. In 1968, Congress created the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), which offers flood insurance to homeowners, renters, and business owners.

As you shop for a flood policy, you may be confused, as many are, about whether the policy is through FEMA or an insurance company. In 1983, the Write Your Own (WYO) Program began and is a cooperative undertaking between the private insurance industry and FEMA. The WYO Program allows participating property and casualty insurance companies to write and service the Standard Flood Insurance Policy in their own names. The companies receive an expense allowance (approx. 30% of premium) for policies written and claims processed, while the federal government retains responsibility for underwriting losses. The WYO Program operates as part of the NFIP and is subject to its rules and regulations.

If you don't have flood insurance, ask your insurance agent for a quote. Make sure that you check the coverages and understand EXACTLY what you are purchasing. If you don't have an insurance agent, then look for one online at the FEMA site. Put in your address and it will give you a local agent. https://www.floodsmart.gov/flood-insurance-provider

PLEASE NOTE— You cannot purchase flood insurance when a named storm is in the Gulf of Mexico. Once purchased, there is a 30 day waiting period before coverage takes effect.

Sign Up for Alerts from The City



Sometimes it is easy to become complacent with weather alerts, but emails, texts, and phone calls sent from the City Alert System can be extremely helpful. If you haven't signed up to receive City alerts, you may do so with AlertHouston. Timely information during emergencies is important. AlertHouston delivers critical information to Houston residents regarding current conditions, expected impacts, and protective actions to keep themselves and their loved ones safe.

These alerts are issued by City of Houston Office of Emergency Management (OEM). Messages are issued for citywide and neighborhood level emergencies. They are sent through email and social media (Facebook, Twitter and Nextdoor). You must opt-in to receive these alerts.

Register for emergency alerts through email, text message, voice call, or mobile app push notification. You may download the Everbridge app free of charge from the Apple or Andoid app store. Most alerts are geo-targeted; subscribers with loved ones around the city may register up to five physical addresses per contact record.

When it Rains in Houston

If you would like to understand Houston's flooding problem, there is a 15 minute film produced back in 1979 that is as timely today as it was 41 years ago. The film is part of the Texas Archive of the Moving Image.



This film, narrated by

actor Carle Bensen, presents Houstonians with a comprehensive look at their city's flood control infrastructure, put in place to deal with the heavy rains typical to the area. Due to natural factors such as a flat, low-lying topography and high clay content in the soil, as well as rapid urbanization, Houston has a history of flooding, and flood control projects, dating back as far as 1908. The film educates viewers about flood control systems in place, discussing strengths and weaknesses of the flood drain, storm sewer, bayou, channel, and pond system. It also recounts the physical and economic damage caused by flooding in the 1970s. the consequence of failure to continue to implement flood control improvements. In the end, the film is a plea to get back to the plan, urging the public to take action by voting on bond and tax allocations for drainage projects, and contacting their public officials to support the issues. Sign up for Flood Gage Warning Alerts


The regional Flood Warning System measures rainfall and monitors water levels in bayous, creeks, and rivers on a real-time basis to inform area residents of potential flooding conditions. This system relies on a network of 250 gage stations that have been strategically placed throughout a Harris and surrounding

counties. Westbury has one of these gages located on the Willow Waterhole Bayou (#445). This information is available at

www.harriscountyfws.org.

You can now sign up for alerts on a specific gages near your home or work. You can receive default rainfall and water level alerts or create custom water alerts.

The Willow Waterhole Bayou at Landsdowne rises quickly and it's imperative for surrounding homeowners to know what is happening. It is important to remember that this gage will likely stay at a certain level (approximately 51-52ft) when flood waters are going over the weirs downstream at the Willow Waterhole detention basins.

Westbury Flood Gage Explained

Westbury has a flood gage located on the Willow Waterhole Bayou at Landsdowne (gage 445). The gage can be accessed here, https://www.harriscountyfws.org/GageDetail/Index/445.

Once the Willow Waterhole Bayou reaches a certain level, the water will overflow the weirs into the basins at the Willow Waterhole complex. The Westbury flood gage (which is upstream of the basins) will read steady at this point, typically around 51.2-51.5ft. It is also at this same level, that the flood control system will show that flooding is possible in Westbury and the news will start reporting it as such. While this is technically true and flooding can happen anywhere, it is important to remember that we have the basins downstream. Watch the gage levels to really know. If the gage holds steady, it is likely water is flowing into the basins not homes. If the gage were to start rising again, flooding would be very likely in Westbury homes. The unknown factor is how full the basins are or will get once it starts raining. There is no gage or camera at the basins.

The gage in Westbury is set to only update when there is a change in water level. If we are in the middle of a rain event and the gage stops updating, while at a level of 51.2-51.5ft, it is likely the water is overflowing the weirs downstream.

Hurricane Preparation Tips

No one likes to hear that there is a possible direct hit of a major hurricane coming, but it is the reality of living so close to the coast. Knowing what to do and having a plan is extremely helpful. There is a chance every year that our storm will come, we just hope not. If a major hurricane is predicted to hit Houston, you need to prepare for the wind and rain during the storm itself and for the aftermath of no power for 2-3 weeks.

Should I stay or should I go now? The first decision ultimately is when to stay and at what point, if ever, do you leave. A longtime hurricane saying is "run from the surge, hide from the wind". If you are medically dependent on electricity and do not have a generator, you need to have a plan for a place to stay during and after the storm. Most residents can stay in their Westbury homes during a major hurricane. You hunker down and prepare for the wind (discussed to the right). Houston residents do not need to be on the roadways as those will be needed for coastal evacuations. The question is: do you stay in your home with no power after the storm, or do you leave town at that point? This decision will help with how you plan for buying food, water, gas, charcoal, etc. Some needs are for the storm itself and others are for the aftermath of no electricity for weeks.

The two lists on this page were created by Westbury residents and are meant to be a helpful guide. There are official hurricane prep lists available on all the major news channels websites, which are also helpful tools to help plan. Be prepared and be safe.



Long-term Hurricane Preparation Tips

- → Keep your trees trimmed. Wind is the biggest threat to Westbury in a major hurricane. Keeping your branches off your home, garage, fences, and power line is important.
- → Buy a portable gas generator. It is easy to get a generator when there isn't a storm aimed straight at us. They quickly become hot items. Plan ahead.
- → Measure your windows and have plywood stored in the garage to place over your windows when needed. Some new windows are hurricane strength but the original Westbury home windows are not.
- → Make a hurricane prep box containing flashlights, batteries, battery operated radio, candle, lighters, matches, etc., so it's already on hand.
- → Save a stash of empty water bottles to fill up for your freezer to make ice or cold water.
- → Copy important documents, place in sealable plastic bag, ready to take with you quickly.



Immediate Hurricane Preparation Tips

(This would ideally be done ove	r several days l	leading up to	landfall)
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- ☐ Fill all vehicles with gas.
- ☐ Buy gas for your generator if you have one. Fill up any extra tanks.
- ☐ Get extra cash.
- ☐ Make sure to have at least 2 weeks worth of all medicines. Get prescriptions filled if needed.
- ☐ Secure all items outside that can blow in the wind. Move patio furniture inside garage. Move potted plants to secure location. Secure or place your grills inside.
- ☐ Don't forget the kids items. Take off swings from swing set. Flip, disassemble, secure trampolines as they can fly. Lay basketball goals down on sides. Move all toys and bikes inside.
- ☐ Move your trash cans to your garage or secure them very well to a tree or post. Duct tape the lids shut.
- ☐ For major storms, put plywood over your windows. It is not recommended to tape your windows, as this can cause more dangerous shards of glass than if it were to break naturally.
- ☐ Freeze bottles of water to make ice that will extend life of your freezer or refrigerator. Make as many as possible as they can be used in an ice chest as well.
- ☐ Have flashlights and batteries. Buy extra batteries if needed. Having a battery operated lantern for main room or head flashlights for each person are handy. Kids might enjoy glow sticks.
- ☐ Have candles or oil lamps ready
- ☐ Get matches or lighters for candles, grill, or your gas stove.
- ☐ Have a battery operated radio so you can listen to alerts. Some new models have charging ports and special NOAA channel.
- ☐ Buy at least one week's worth of non-perishable foods. Suggested items include peanut butter crackers, bread, muffins, fruit with longer shelf life such as apples and oranges, snack bars, granola, beef jerky, trail mixes, applesauce, fruit cups and canned goods.
- ☐ Ensure you have enough pet food and supplies such as kitty litter for at least 2 weeks.
- ☐ Buy charcoal or propane for your grill so you can cook outside if power goes out.
- ☐ Get extra water. (And wine!)
- ☐ Charge all devices and keep fully charged until power goes out. You can sit in your car later for some AC and charge your phone.
- ☐ Do all laundry. Wash sheets. Start with clean slate to minimize problems with heat and sweat.
- Wash all dishes.
- ☐ Fill bathtub or large buckets with water. If there is no City water available, you can use the stored water in your toilet to flush.
- ☐ Have a secure place in your house already planned and ready with a blanket and pillow and radio/phone. Ideally away from any windows. In many Westbury homes, that is likely your hallway, even if it has no doors, you can shut the individual bedroom doors that have windows so hallway is more secure.
- ☐ If you have kids, have them help with preparations and explain why you are preparing. It helps with anxiety to have a plan and be a part of it. Have them grab a book and a lovey if they have one.
- ☐ Clean storm drains and gutters in front of your home.

Where is the "Dam" in Westbury?

The "dam" in the Willow Waterhole Bayou (WWB) is often mentioned in Crier articles when we discuss flooding. It cannot be seen from the road and is often envisioned incorrectly. The dam is an earthen structure that looks more like a big hill of grass. After the floods in 1975, the WCC Flood Action Committee had several proposals for an upcoming bond. One of them was to "install a barrier to the flow in the Willow Waterhole Bayou Channel immediately east of the Fondren Ditch to prevent floods in Westbury from rainstorms in Fort Bend County and Western Harris County". (Westbury Crier, August 1975, President John C. Severance).

Sometime in the early 1980s, the Willow Waterhole Bayou was dammed to separate Westbury from the Fondren water. This dam was funded through a County bond election in 1982. The earthen dam is located on the edge of Westbury behind Beaudry/ Braewick and Lattimer/Braewick homes. It is the "beginning" of the WWB. While the earthen structure holds water back during an average rain storm, during heavy rains such as Memorial Day and Harvey, the dam is overtopped with water flowing from the Braewick ditches and the other side of the WWB coming from the Fondren area and the Fondren Diversion Channel, which sit at a higher elevation than Westbury. The developers of the Fondren area tinkered mightily with the natural flow of WWB, which once meandered lazily through Western Harris County and in Ft. Bend County. Now there are narrow channels with 90 degree turns upstream of Westbury and this small

"dam" at the entrance of the WWB into Westbury.

The Westbury Civic Club strongly believes that the "dam" is outdated and in need of repairs. HCFCD is currently studying mitigation needs west of Westbury along the Fondren Diversion Channel. HCFCD will be the speaker at the June Westbury Civic Club meeting on Wed., June

15, 7PM, Westbury

Baptist, Game Room.



Harris County Flood Control District to Speak at June WCC Meeting Wed., June 15, 7PM Westbury Baptist, Game Room

The Harris County Flood Control District (HCFCD) will be the guest speaker at the June 15 Westbury Civic Club board meeting. HCFCD has been evaluating the watershed of the "Fondren Diversion Channel" D-140, which is located immediately upstream of the Westbury section of the Willow Waterhole Bayou.

HCFCD is ready to share a project progress report before they share a general public update later this Fall. The overall project planning stage should be wrapped up this Fall, after which it will begin Preliminary Engineering, then Design and Construction (start dates yet to be determined).

The status of the Fondren Diversion Channel (D-140) is important to flooding issues here in Westbury. The Fondren Diversion Channel collects stormwater upstream of the Westbury area and is intended to route stormwater into Brays Bayou. If this vital channel cannot handle the stormwater in its watershed, then water will overflow into Westbury via the Willow Waterhole Bayou and across our lots and neighborhood streets.

Deed Restriction Town Hall Meeting Thurs., June 23, 6-7:30PM Westbury Baptist, Game Room*

The WCC wants to hear from YOU about deed restrictions! We are hosting a community town hall meeting on Thursday, June 23, from 6—7:30PM. The meeting is tentatively scheduled at Westbury Baptist Church. Check on the Westbury Civic Club website closer to the meeting date to confirm meeting location.

There are more than 30 different sets of deed restrictions here in Westbury for 5,000 homes, some with slightly different wording and some with major differences in wording. For example, the 150 homes in Westbury 5E are the only homes that are not allowed to have 2 story homes.

Most sections of Westbury still have their original deed restrictions written in the 1950s and 1960s, and even the most recently revised sets of deed restrictions for Parkwest 1 and Parkwest 2 are about 30 years old.

In some cases, details in the deed restrictions are outdated. For example, the deed restrictions require that 2 trees be planted when a new home is built, but one of the allowable trees is an Arizona Ash. Ash trees are no longer advised to be planted in Houston because they have a short lifespan and have brittle limbs. Did you know that some sections of Westbury forbid outdoor clothes lines, because in the 1950s and 1960s, the developers assumed that affluent families would use a modern clothes dryer and were worried that outdoor clothes lines would look low-class.

The deed restrictions can be difficult to read and understand. Providing definitions of words and terms can help clarify the meaning of the deed restrictions. It would also help strengthen them against the ever changing legal meanings.

If you would like to make your concerns or issues known, or if you would like to learn more about Deed Restrictions, come to the town hall meeting on June 23. Summer can be a challenging time to hold meetings in Houston since so many people travel during the summertime, so we envision additional meetings in the future. Look for a survey coming soon on this topic.


Vacation Watch is a great service that is included in our contract. A deputy will check out your property at least once a day to make sure it is secured and nothing suspicious is going on.

During the meeting, the Public Works Department gave an update on Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) in District K. See column to the right for projects relevant to the Westbury area.



CIP Undate

The City Public Works Department gave an update on City Capital Improvement Projects for District K during the District K Re-districting meeting in May. Here is a summary of key projects relevant to Westbury.

Spellman Drainage Tract

This is a detention project planned to be built by the City of Houston upstream (west) of Westbury along the banks of the Fondren Diversion Channel (D-140) at West Bellfort. The scope of work will include demolishing the existing buildings and creating detention for stormwater. The estimated cost is 13.6 million dollars. The project is currently still in design. Work will start in 2023 and finish in 2025.

Westbury Street and Drainage - Phase 1

This project will provide new streets, sidewalks, and drainage in an area approximately bounded by Chimney Rock, Landsdowne, and Willow Waterhole Bayou. The Spring Village apartment complex has been purchased for future demolition. The estimated project cost is 13.8 million. Work will start in 2024 and be completed in 2026.

New Library in Westbury

Cost is 16 million dollars. Work is estimated to begin later in 2022 and be completed in the fall of 2023.

Chimney Rock Rd. at Fort Bend County Toll Road

Scope is to improve connections at Chimney Rock and the Ft Bend County Toll Road at an estimated cost of 4.3 million dollars. Work will start in 2023 and be completed in 2024.



Willow Garden Tour

The Willow Garden tour is held in May when homes in Westbury, Willow Meadows and the Willowbend neighborhoods host visitors to their front yards.

Although they began working independently, the gardeners in this area slowly discovered each other and started sharing ideas. Other neighbors noticed the evolving yards and began asking for tips. To promote more 'yard' gardens in the area, and to answer an increasing number of questions from neighbors, several homeowners in different neighborhoods offered garden tours. In 2020, a small community of southwest Houston neighborhood gardeners organized a more coordinated tour, launched a website and created the name Willow Garden Trail. Westbury had 4 locations on the Willow Garden trail this year: Two Westbury homes, as well as the Willow Waterhole Native Prairie Plant Garden, and the Westbury Community Garden.

Gasmer Site Master Plan

The Master Plan for the "Gasmer Site", the 29-acre former Shell Research Center located on Gasmer next to Willow Waterhole Greenspace, was revealed in a public meeting held at Westbury HS on April 30. The Master Plan effort was led by the Brays Oaks Management District at the request of the City of Houston, which is the owner of the site. The design team of specialists was led by Lionheart Places and Natalye Appel + Associates, both of which have had award-winning projects.

It is important to note that the Master Plan is "aspirational", which means that it depicts what could be placed on the site and where it would go. At this point in time, two facts are known. Levitt Pavilion Houston, has selected the site for a future outdoor performing venue, and they are working with their own design team, in combination with the Master Plan team, to finalize their project details and to continue their fundraising efforts. The other known fact is that the City of Houston purchased the 29-acre site with the intent to provide sorely needed additional stormwater detention for City stormwater projects. The City has required that the site Master Plan provide 60 acre-feet of stormwater detention, plus

any additional detention required to offset additional impervious surfaces associated with the plan (an estimated additional 15 acre-feet, for a total of 75 acre-feet of detention on the site). Detention is a major design factor for the site. The Master Plan proposes that some services be seamlessly shared with the adjacent Willow Waterhole Greenway – public restrooms, children's play areas, food services, etc.

The Pier is Near!

Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy is planning to build a pier on Westbury Lake in 2022. The pier was designed by Cobb Fendley and Associates in Houston.

The pier will be used for fishing and kayak/canoe launching, as well as environmental sampling by local schools. The pier will be built using the PermaTrak system which allows the water level to cover the pier during rain events. The pier will extend 46 feet from the edge of the lake and then make a 90 degree turn and extend another 32 feet. The surface width is 8 feet and the entire structure will be surrounded by a safety railing. It will be ADA compliant with a concrete path from the top of the bank down to the water's edge.

This is a \$200,000 - 250,000 capital expenditure and WWGC has raised over 80% of the funds required. This is very good news but they also need your financial support now. No donation is too small and since they are very close to their goal, every dollar will have an impact. The money raised for this project will be matched by The Kinder Foundation.
