# Platou Community Center will be open for the summer!

A \$350,000 donation from two Houston energy companies has saved eight city pools and seven community centers from closing for the summer. Most importantly to us, it saved OUR community center in Westbury!

At the end of May, the Platou Center, our community center since 1957, was chosen by Houston Parks & Recreation Department as one of the seven community centers to be closed. We, the Westbury Civic Club, fought and are still fighting to keep this vital part of our community open. Over 600 people have signed an online petition (<a href="www.westburycrier.com">www.westburycrier.com</a> for the link). On June 3<sup>rd</sup>, about 40 Westbury residents rallied at the Platou Center to protest its closing. Five Westbury residents and board members spoke before City Council at the first budget hearing on June 14. A large group of Westbury residents also attended the second budget meeting to support the amendments drafted by CM Clutterbuck and CM Costello.

Congresswoman Sheila Jackson Lee of the 18<sup>th</sup> Congressional District reached out to Houston's generous corporate community to see what could be done for the community centers and pools. On June 20<sup>th</sup>, the Congresswoman held a press conference announcing a \$350,000 donation from Marathon Oil and Conoco Philips to help keep the pools and community centers open. On hand to hear the announcement were WCC Board members Becky Edmondson, Cindy Chapman, and Janie Schexnayder. Mayor Parker has pledged to find the additional funding needed to keep the community centers open for the rest of the year.

We, as a community, will need to work diligently on a plan to ensure that the Platou Center's doors remain open.

## President's Message

Is it just me or do you feel we are under siege? First we had redistricting, then the METRO 90A rail line, then the City had slated the Platou Center for closing on June 30<sup>th</sup>. Inside Westbury we are under siege from residents who operate noxious businesses out of their homes; absentee owners who rent to scofflaws; residents who have garage sales that clog our streets and increase crime; let their dogs bark for hours and run loose through the neighborhood; park their cars in their yards; keep annoying roosters; put out their heavy trash out at the curb weeks ahead of time; and just generally don't know how to be good neighbors. Our pocketbooks are under siege with higher utility costs, higher water bills and now the City drainage fee. Goodness we are even under siege from Mother Nature.

But it's not all bad news, because we are not powerless. Countless hours have been spent working with the city and METRO for solutions. Congresswoman Lee said that the reason she lobbied for all the centers and pools to stay open for the summer was due to the civic engagement of the neighborhoods protesting the closures. Your section directors and civic board work tirelessly to put a stop to the internal siege from bad neighbors and to promote Westbury in a positive way. Cindy Chapman and I attend meetings as often as 3 or 4 times a week. We recently took the City's new Director of Neighborhoods on a tour to see the good things in Westbury as well as the things that challenge us. This month's Crier has articles about all of these topics.

Join with us as we fight the good fight for Westbury, for our neighborhood, for our investment in our homes, for our families, and for our peace of mind.

## The Faces of the Westbury Civic Club



**Becky Edmondson** graduated from Leadership Houston Class XXIX in June. It was an intense ten month journey, but her love of Houston grew tenfold. Many issues facing Westbury were front and center: An Economics class day with the City Controller working theoretically on the budget; an Infrastructure and Urban Planning day discussing transportation; a lunch with city officials discussing important issues; an Education day stressing the needs and challenges facing our neighborhood schools. Becky visited Fondren Middle School and was Principal for a Day at Foerster Elementary. Arts Day was inspiring and she is looking into what it will take to bring one of those big movie screens or a musical performance to a Westbury park for a movie or music night. After completing the Leadership Houston process, Becky concludes, "Yes, we have challenges and much to do, but, when I look at Houston and Westbury, I am reminded that it only takes a handful of committed people to come together to make a difference."

**Phyllis Frye** has shared the last 37 years of her very interesting life with us as a resident of Westbury. An Eagle Scout, Aggie, army veteran, licensed engineer and lawyer, she has lent her talents and education to Westbury -- most notably as civic club Secretary since 2004 (Becky Edmondson is the fourth president she has aided), as leader in the correct placement of the South Main sound wall, as designer of what will probably soon become the installations for the railroad Quiet Zone, and as a strong voice of reason in how the METRO rail will impact our neighborhood. She and her wife of 38 years live in Westbury South where Phyllis, along with Tommie Allen, Linda Leger and many others have spent a decade cleaning up our one-time, but no longer, "seediest" section. Phyllis has been a renowned national leader in LGBT rights movement since the early 1990's. She has a law firm with her name on the door, which is comprised of eight lawyers who cover most aspects of the law. Last year Mayor Parker, with the approval of city council, appointed Phyllis, as an Associate Municipal Judge, who has authority to sign arrest warrants as a Texas Magistrate, as well as marry folks who have a license. Phyllis admits, "I have been honored with having more than my "15 minutes" in the spotlight, and I am very content with what I have done and will still do to make this a better world for us all."





**Vicki Eldridge** is the new section director for Westbury 4W. She has resided in Westbury over 30 years. Vicki was drawn here by Westbury's proximity to the Medical Center, where she worked, and also by the "small town" atmosphere in Westbury. Her hobbies and volunteer work have included animal assisted therapy, teaching English as a second language, and church-affiliated work following Hurricanes Katrina and Ike. She sees Westbury as potentially growing with younger families, updated housing, and as a commuter connection to the growing Ft. Bend area.



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## Hot Topic: New City Drainage Fee

#### **Q & A about the New City of Houston Drainage Fee**

First the good news: The city has decided that homeowners will not be charged a drainage fee on the first 1,000 square feet of impervious surface located at their property. As a result, your revised drainage fee will now be lower than that indicated on the initial estimate mailed to your home.

#### How do I double check that the city calculated my amount of impervious surface correctly?

Go to the website <a href="www.rebuildhouston.org">www.rebuildhouston.org</a> and you can see how satellite imagery was used to estimate the impervious surfaces. The site also has a measuring tool to help you calculate the dimensions. During business hours, a chat feature is available if you have problems using the site tools.

#### What if I don't have access to a computer?

Call 713-371-1111 if you don't have a computer or if you have problems using the website.

#### What if I think the city calculation is wrong or there are other problems?

Promptly either call or use the website to submit a "Request for Verification and Correction". If using the computer website, you can upload up to five supporting documents. Make sure that you pay your bill, even if you disagree with the calculation, because you will receive a credit on future bills for your overpayments. In some cases, an inspector may need to come to your property to review the situation.

What if I have gone through the Request for Verification process and I still disagree with the city results? Appeals will be reviewed by an Independent Hearing Examiner, but the appeal must be requested within 15 days of receiving the verification request back from the city.

When will the bills which include the new drainage fees begin? Bills will go out in early July 2011.

#### What are some common problems?

Since satellite imagery was used, shadows due to the sun position may make your home look larger than it really is. Sometimes the program did not correctly detect boundaries when a home bordered a bayou.

#### What about credits for rainwater collection systems?

The ordinance allows the director to implement credits; however, those refinements will be added in the future.

#### Help - I am having problems getting my issues resolved!

Please let the WCC know if you have experienced problems with the Request for Verification and Correction process.

#### **Protect your Property and Trees from Drought**

Texas and Houston are in an extended drought. If you are new to Houston, our soil is made of clay that dramatically expands or contracts depending upon water content. Such movement can damage your house foundation. Slow and deep watering around your foundation will reduce damage.

Trees, even those which are wellestablished, are suffering from the severe lack of water during the drought. If you wait until you see signs that your trees are in distress, then they are already in danger. Stressed trees will be more brittle and likely to drop limbs, plus they will be more susceptible to insect damage, or they may even slowly die. Protect your trees by watering your trees slowly and deeply. A watering schedule that is a dequate to maintain a lawn will not maintain a tree. A rule of thumb during a drought is to give small, one-year old trees 28 gallons of water per week, two-year olds 56 gallons a week and three year olds 112 gallons.

Immediately report leaks in city water lines to 311. Water breaks are common during dry weather and the city is already experiencing hundreds of leaks across the city and contributing to lower water pressure. Pay attention to city watering suggestions. Voluntary watering guidelines were implemented in June due to low water pressure across Houston.

## **Getting to Know Westbury Esplandes**

The initial impression given to visitors of our Westbury neighborhood come from our esplanades (rhymes with Everglades), otherwise known as road medians. Westbury is blessed to have over seven linear miles of esplanades, most of which are far broader than typical for Houston. Although the city mows our esplanades, the Westbury Civic Club works to make them special and our Greenspace Beautification Committee has won awards for its efforts. Many of the trees were planted by the WCC and we continue to plant trees. The roses and flowers and most of the other plantings on our esplanades were purchased by and continue to be maintained by the WCC. We have a longer term vision to create trails along the broader esplanades in Westbury.

Recently the WCC has worked to refresh and revitalize the gardens surrounding our subdivision marker signs and we have received two city matching grants (one for \$3,000 and the other for \$4,082) during the past three years. The signs were power-washed, plantings, which had obscured the signs, were replaced with decorative stones, and new flowers and shrubs were planted. Although the new plantings were selected to eventually become drought-resistant, this year's record-breaking drought has been hard on the plants as they have struggled to become established. The WCC has been paying a contractor to do weekly watering of the young



plants during the drought, and volunteers have been hauling water to do hand-watering up to three times per week. Let's give a big Westbury THANKS to Karen Schubert, Donna and Tony Robert, and Emily and Ron Smith for their watering efforts to save our new plants. Please contact the WCC office if you would like to help water our plants.

We have been very fortunate that another partner, Trees for Houston, had agreed last fall to water new trees on our esplanades if we arranged for the trees to be planted and mulched. Trees for Houston is watering our new trees weekly, but they are struggling to find

enough money to pay for the many trees they are watering across Houston in this drought.

According to Trees for Houston, "The current drought conditions - the worst in half a century - have dramatically increased the demand for Trees for Houston's watering and maintenance services. We hope you will consider supporting Trees for Houston's watering efforts as we embark on a long, hot summer. It costs \$75 to water one tree for one year". 

Most gardeners are coming to the garden early before it gets too hot, or later in the day once temperatures cool down some. We continue to have a productive, great-looking garden.



## Commercial Businesses operating out of Westbury Homes

All Westbury homes are protected by deed restrictions which limit how the property may be used. One requirement is your property is to be used for residential purposes. The City of Houston Legal Department enforces this deed restriction (and others). Recent violators handled by the city involved: an auto repair business, a landscaping business, and vehicles defined as commercial (tow truck, ambulance, delivery truck, etc) parked on residential property. Violators can be fined and may incur expenses for legal representation in court.



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
