President's Message

Have you seen all the City of Houston work going on throughout Westbury? New sanitary sewer lines to bring the size of our lines to code are going in all over Westbury. Willowbend has been asphalted. The Hillcroft bridge is being repaired. Storm drain inlets are being cleaned and repaired. Outfalls into the Willow Waterhole Bayou are being repaired and/or replaced. You can read the details in this month's Crier. HISD is also hard at work on both Westbury High School and Parker Elementary. Harris County Flood Control has done some work on a segment of the Braewick Ditch that was not included in the last contracted work and is looking into additional work. The Willow Waterhole Project is moving towards completion. We appreciate all that is being done now, and we look forward to all of our infrastructure repairs and replacements that will be coming to us in the not too distant future.

What can you do? Continue to call 311 when your storm drains aren't functioning correctly. Call 311 when you have a sewer backup in your house. Call 311 to report potholes or street panels that need replacing.

Summer is upon us and our lawns are looking good. You will read on page 22 about yard care. Grass is growing rapidly and yards need to be kept mowed. We receive many complaints from people who see lawn services just blowing the clippings into the street. Please tell your lawn crew not to do that because it clogs our storm drains. In the past, we used a broom to clean; it was quieter and cleaner and better for our storm drains!

Crime picks up during the summer. Kids

are out of school and some choose mischief to alleviate their boredom. When you are away on vacation, make sure your house is secure. If you have paid your WAP Constable dues, request a vacation watch. Stop your newspaper delivery, but ask a neighbor to operate as a backup because we have had reports that placing a hold does not always work. Meet your neighbors, and get to know them and exchange contact information.

June brought some fun events to Westbury. The *Great Day Houston Pack* Your Bag Challenge at the Willow Waterhole was great fun. (see page 9) The third annual Tomato Tasting was held at the Westbury Community Garden. The PIFF (Plant It Forward Farm) farm stand had its grand opening. Isn't it amazing that we have fresh organic produce grown right here in Westbury! It can't get much fresher or closer to home than that. If you are an Anthony Bourdain fan, he visited one of the PIFF farms (sadly not ours) and, when his show on Houston airs, you can be proud to know that we in Westbury are not only eating fresher, but supporting these refugee farmers. The garden is going through the master plan process and I hope some of you interested in gardening or design will join in on the master plan. (page 20)



House Values Continue to Increase in Westbury

Housing values continue to increase in Westbury, and we note that housing values are rising faster in Westbury than in nearby communities. We are pleased, but not surprised, that house values continue to rise in Westbury. We are conveniently located to major employment centers like downtown, the Med Center, and the Galleria. In the absence of zoning, all our homes are protected by deed restrictions, including requirements that every lot must be at least a certain minimum size.

Our residential streets look attractive because Westbury has many mature, large trees and residents over the years have added beautiful landscaping, beyond the basic minimum you see in new subdivisions. Furthermore, our homeowners continue to look to the future and plant more trees.

Also, our homes are solidly built, constructed at a time when a 2 by 4 was really 2" by 4". Rather than tearing down a home, investors find that they can remodel an existing home with modern updates and make a nice profit. We have many residents who have chosen to live here in Westbury for decades, and it is not unusual for people who grew up in Westbury to move back to Westbury, if they move back to Houston.

Remodeling your home? Adding On?
Do you know your deed restrictions?
Did you know that the Westbury Civic Club can look over your proposed plans for free before you start construction? We want to avoid deed restriction violations before they happen. Did you know that Westbury 2, Westbury 3, and Westbury 5 have a 25 foot rear setback for the main structure? Did you know that there is a minimum percentage of brick that must be on your home? Did you know that you can't build in front of your building line?

We want to help you! We want you to find out about possible violations before it costs you money and time. Several homeowners in the past couple years have had to tear down and/or modify their construction due to deed restriction violations. The City of Houston does not review deed restrictions when issuing permits. They require a signed affidavit acknowledging that the plans comply with your deed restrictions. This holds YOU, the homeowner, accountable for knowing and complying with your deed restrictions. We are here to help you. Call the Westbury Civic Club Office at 713-723-5437. WAIC June 2016 Board Notes


Flooding and Infrastructure: Detailed discussion about stormwater drainage work being done in Westbury by Public Works for the Westbury Local Drainage Project.

Discussion about a possible community website with Maplewood and Meyerland. The board **approved** a motion to support investigating a website to promote single-family residential homes in this area, provided that the Westbury name is included in name and the logo.

Request for a covered METRO bus stop at W. Bellfort at Burdine has been approved, but implementation time is not yet known.

Motion **Approved** to: Contribute up to \$75 for supplies to refurbish and provide a protective sealant for the remaining (approx. 14) historic Westbury street markers.

South Post Oak: District K and City Legal are considering revising ordinances/signs to reduce panhandling. District K is considering funding HPD overtime for an HPD officer to periodically visit certain problem intersections, and several commercial properties plan to install security cameras near these intersections. Hillcroft Street Bridge Rehabilitation

Reconstruction of the two southbound lanes of the Hillcroft Street Bridge, between Ludington Drive and Burlinghall Drive over the Willow Waterhole Bayou, began in May. The project is expected to be completed this summer. This approximately \$122,000 project is designed to improve the overall road surface and safety of the bridge. This project is funded through ReBuild Houston - the voter-approved pay-as-you-go plan to rebuild and maintain the City's aging drainage and street infrastructure, without incurring new debt.

Reports of the bridge sagging were made to the city in September of 2015. We had hoped that the Hillcroft bridge could be completely replaced as it is on the Texas Department of Transportation's list for replacement in 2020. However, the City deemed that this repair work would work in the interim. We had concerns about the overall safety of the bridge and we were told "the bridge has been determined to be safe to travel on at the POSTED speed limit and safe for vehicles 15,000 pounds or less".



Willowbend Overlay Project Update

The WCC received a phone call and an email from the city of Houston project manager with an update regarding the Willowbend street overlay project. The remaining unfinished strip of street roadway, that was left unpaved near Atwell & Willowbend, will be completed soon. There is a problem with the stormwater sewer piping underneath the street. The plan to correct the storm sewer pipe under Willowbend has been received and is ready to be constructed. Depending on the weather, the work may be completed before this Crier is delivered. The City is also evaluating several driveway issues along Willowbend caused by the overlay. If you have a problem, please call and report it to 311.

Willow Waterhole on Great Day Houston

City Of Houston Working on Flooding Issues In Westbury

Onsite Meeting with Drainage Engineers

On the afternoon of May 20, 2016, Cindy Chapman and Jennifer Edmondson, from the Westbury Civic Club, along with several Westbury residents, met with engineers for a field survey of conditions along Ludington and Cartegena and Landsdowne near the Willow Waterhole Bayou. Three engineers were from Halff Associates and have been assigned by the City to investigate and identify short-term solutions to improve drainage in the areas which have been hit hardest by flooding. The other engineer was with Brown and Gay Engineers, which has been hired by the City to look at longer-term solutions in the area.

Residents described how flooding begins from the street drainage system, sometimes while the bayou is still well

within its banks. Some "outfall pipes" were observed to be partially collapsed, which obstructs the flow to the bayou. The "Outfall pipes" are the portion of the storm drain system that is at the end, that actually allows the water to flow into the Willow Waterhole Bayou. Also, residents showed a picture of a damaged underground street drainage pipe that had not been repaired by a road crew and was repaved over. It was also discussed that Cartegena and Ludington are lower than the banks of the bayou and the bridge over the bayou.

The City has been working hard on solutions to help alleviate some of the flooding in Westbury. There is NOT one answer. There are multiple factors at play. The result of this meeting was getting four outfall pipes along this area included in a Local Drainage Project. The City has been in constant contact with the

Westbury Civic Club since the meeting on May 20. This project timeline should occur quickly. A sticking point is that these outfall pipes run in between homes, so homeowners must sign an affidavit for Right of Entry. The City is hopeful that we are looking at months, not years!

This project will NOT fix ALL the flooding problems, but we are hopeful that this project, along with others, will alleviate flooding for the great majority of Westbury residents who experienced flooding over the past years.

Westbury Drainage Infrastructure Action Plan
Announced by Department of Public Works and Engineering

The Westbury Community Engagement meeting on Thursday, April 21, 2016, provided the Department of Public Works and Engineering (PWE) with great information about the neighborhood. Public engagement with Westbury residents on long term solutions resulted in the residents helping PWE to understand areas needing immediate attention that would not have been known through just a field visit. PWE is reviewing ways to quickly provide a localized project to help mitigate some of the flooding in Westbury. Based on this community input, the study focus will include the length of Willow Waterhole Bayou that traverses Westbury. Using engineers already under contract with PWE, we expect to identify minor improvements or modifications to existing drainage infrastructure and then implement appropriate solutions in an expedited manner.

A team of PWE consultants and engineers will walk-through the area this week to identify potential short-term actions to be taken in Westbury. Harris County Flood Control is also planning similar assessments of their drainage infrastructure serving this neighborhood. Boots on the ground experience is invaluable to PWE teams as we seek solutions.

Westbury storm sewer inspection and cleaning is ongoing to ensure that all storm sewer capacity within the subdivision is available. A few locations were recently found in need of minor maintenance work which is being scheduled. City of Houston Public Works in Westbury

The City of Houston Public Works and Engineering Dept. is hard at work in Westbury. You have read the articles here in the Crier about the City sending out crews to find short term solutions to flooding. Here is the rest of the story:

First, how is the water supposed to flow? Rainwater will flow down a street until it gets to a drain inlet. These "drain inlets" will be located at a low point in the road near a curb. The water will flow down into the drain inlet and then into the piping underneath the street (sometimes called the "storm sewer" piping). After the water is under the street, then the water needs to get into a bayou/ditch to carry the water away (In Westbury, this path is usually via Willow Waterhole Bayou to Brays Bayou and then to Galveston Bay). An "outfall pipe" is the pipe that takes that underground storm sewer water and then pours it into the local bayou/ditch.

Who controls and maintains what? The City of Houston owns and maintains the streets, the drain inlets, the underground storm sewer piping, and the "outfall pipes". The Harris County Flood Control District owns and maintains the Willow Waterhole Bayou.

What did the crews find that could be fixed for a short-term solution

for flooding? Multiple "outfall pipes" were found to be damaged or collapsed. Work to repair/replace those "outfall pipes" is being planned, and this work will be

completed soon. In addition, a storm sewer line at the corner of Cartagena and Landsdowne had separated underneath the street, and repair crews have already been busy making repairs. Additionally, some "outfall pipes" were found to be submerged, so the City has reported the situation to the County so that the ditch or bayou can be desilted.

We cannot thank the City of Houston's new administration enough for their prompt response and their commitment to mitigating our flooding woes. Yes, our

ReBuild Houston projects are long overdue, but progress is being made.

"Houston needs conscientious, regional land-use management and drainage infrastructure planning. The Houston way — 'growth at any cost, deal with the consequences later' - has worked magnificently to build a great city, but the consequences have been ignored at great and growing cost. Now that we are "world-class," it is past time to put Houston on a more sustainable path." From an email by Bruce Nichols, who lives in an area prone to flooding.

Culberson Addresses Meyerland Concerns over Frequent Flooding

During a lively meeting at Pershing Middle School the evening of June 6, U. S. Rep. John Culberson put forward his ideas about how to deal with flooding issues in Harris County. After an introduction, in which he decried the inefficiency of multiple layers of government, he urged voters to contact their county commissioners and demand that Harris County take direct action on the issues. His view was that the City needs to get out of street and road construction, and instead pay the county to take care of it. "Circumvent the system" he suggested, and he promoted "thinking outside the box" as a way to come up with new ideas. He said that TIRZ (Tax Incentive Reinvestment Zones) could generate creative ways to handle flooding/drainage issues, as they have already proven in the Memorial City area. Suggestions such as pumping excess water back into aquifers (to help combat subsidence) were put forward by Culberson as examples of new ways to think about the problem.

Angry residents participated actively in a Q&A session with Culberson, stating that:

- They felt all the money for flood and drainage retrofitting was going to the Texas Medical Center, and not to their hard-hit neighborhoods.
- They were frustrated that no one seemed to be taking responsibility. "It's like one big shell game out there", said one resident.
- Several objected to West University paying the City of Houston for capacity rights in the Poorfarm Ditch (which drains parts of Meyerland), allowing West U. to push water into a drainage ditch which then overflowed and flooded homes in Meyerland.

Hurricane Season is here

Hurricane Season starts June 1st and runs through November 30th. It's important to be prepared. Here are a few reminders.

- 1) Make an Emergency Plan: Every family should have an emergency plan that details where they will go in the event of an emergency. Only those residents, who either live in an evacuation zone, or who use a medical device which requires electricity to sustain their life, should evacuate ahead of a storm. Westbury is NOT in an evacuation zone. However, with all of our trees, the loss of electricity is rated as medium to high risk by the Office of Emergency Management (OEM). Natural gas generators, installed at your home or having a free standing gasoline generator, can give you peace of mind.
- 2) Have an Emergency Supply Kit: Houston residents should have what they need to be on their own for **5-7 days** following a storm. This includes food, water, medications and individual needs such as medical devices or pet supplies or sanitary supplies. Also, remember that ATMs or debit/credit cards may not work while communication lines are damaged, so cash may be helpful. It may take 5-7+ days before grocery stores or gas stations re-open. During Hurricane Ike in 2008, some Westbury homes went 10-14 days before electric power was available.
- **3) Be Informed:** Know where to get updated information. This includes local television and radio, as well as websites like: houstontx.gov/emergency; hurricanes.gov; or weather.gov/
- **4) Know your Neighbors:** During disasters, having a community around you that can help is essential to making it through. Meet your neighbors, and build a plan that includes sharing resources, such as generators, chainsaws and tools to prepare for, and respond to a hurricane. For those of us who were here during Hurricane lke, this neighborliness was evident all over Westbury.

Message from the WCC Security Director

The bad guys were busy in May. There were 47 incidents, with half the crime in single family homes, the other half in apartments, businesses and public areas. There was an upswing in thefts. Theft without burglary is another way of saying, "you left your property in plain view and unlocked". It could be in an unlocked car, the back of a truck or trailer, or an unlocked garage door. It attracts bad guys like standing water attracts mosquitoes.

A Westbury Security Committee meets monthly to try to help find solutions to crime and help the neighborhood. One of the things that the committee is looking at, is group purchases of burglar resistant door hardware.

The sad news for May, however, was that there was a home invasion and a Westbury resident was murdered. The good news is that there was an arrest and the alleged perpetrator has been charged with Capital Murder and is off the streets. Due to privacy concerns and the impending trial no further details are available.

Teen Police Academy

In 2015, the Harris County Constable's Office Pct. 5 launched the Citizens Police Academy. The program was designed to bridge the gap that can sometimes exist between law enforcement and the community we serve by giving participants a behind the scenes look at our department and law enforcement in general.

Participants were presented with a perspective from the deputy patrolling the streets, and given the opportunity to experience firsthand what it takes to be a peace officer in today's world. In short the academy provided a forum to promote understanding and communication between our department and those we are sworn to protect and serve.

In 2016, the program has been expanded to include a Teen Police Academy. The goal remains the same, to promote understanding and communication between our department and teens so that by working together we can overcome challenges faced by both. Seats are limited and fill up quickly so apply as soon as possible. The academy begins July 11, 2016 and runs one night a week for 6 weeks. Graduation for this class will be Thursday night, 8-18 from 7pm-9pm. For more information go to http://www.constablepct5.com/teen-police-academy/

Conditions on South Post Oak

On April 2016, Council Member Green coordinated a community stakeholder meeting at Salem Lutheran Church to discuss the aggressive panhandling concerns at the West Bellfort/ South Post Oak Rd. intersection. The stakeholders in attendance included the nearby civic associations of Willow Meadows, Willowbend, Westbury, Meyerland, and Pct. 287

Civic Association as well as representatives from the Houston Police Dept., METRO Police, and the Coalition for the Homeless.

Over the past year, the District K office has received a number of phone calls and e-mails regarding this citywide issue. Council Member Green says "I am committed to working with the community stakeholders of the West Bellfort/ South Post Oak Rd. area to combat this concern."

Houston police can ONLY enforce the laws and TxDOT can only enforce ordinances the City has enacted. "We are working diligently to strengthen the ordinance. Our goal is to address the verbiage in the ordinance, then our police officers will have the ability to enforce the law and get approval from the City Legal Department", states Council Member Green.

The city cannot install signage such as "no camping", "no littering", "no



soliciting" if there are no City of Houston ordinances that say you can't do those things. Also, the Texas Supreme Court has determined that certain activities are protected by the US Constitution, so a sign or ordinance has to be carefully worded in order to protect the legal rights we all enjoy under the US Constitution.

An officer has to witness a vagrant/panhandler actually in the street with the cars before they can take action. There is no law in Texas against loitering on public property. The police officer has to witness the person loitering on private property that is posted to not allow loitering. There is also a law against urinating in public, but the officer must witness that action. METRO will send out their police department to deal with people who take over the bus shelters and are not Metro bus patrons.

The District K office will continue to work on this initiative and keep the community apprised. "It's a dreadful problem and we are definitely working on this matter with the City's Legal Dept., HPD, METRO, the State of Texas, the Mayor's Office for the Homeless, and other outside agencies", said Larry Green.

JUST SAY NO

While SPO is not in Westbury, it is a gateway to our neighborhood and the Willow Waterhole. Many of us use it daily. The Civic boards of the adjoining neighborhoods (Westbury, Meyerland, Willow Meadows , Willowbend, Post Oak Manor and Precinct 287) all view this corridor as a gateway to our communities. The Brays Oaks Management District (BOMD) has the west side of SPO in its district from down to South Main. BOMD is actively working to address many of the SPO issues: vagrancy, panhandling, trash, unkempt commercial properties, Metro Bus shelters, and commercial properties that have been long-standing problems.

But there are things that YOU can do. We need to lay claim to SPO. We need to patronize the businesses -- long time area favorites like Annie's and Cue's. There are new Peruvian and Chinese restaurants. We need to JUST SAY NO to the panhandlers. I will remind everyone that just because you think nothing is being done, does not make it so! It takes a while, and sometimes a long while to get things done. Two thousand years later the saying that Rome wasn't built in a day still holds true! Representatives from District K attended the Willow Meadows Civic meeting in June, and plans are moving forward in several different areas. Another multi-neighborhood initiative meeting is planned for late June or early July. Panhandlers are on our corners because we pay them to stand there.

Remodeling your home? Adding On? Do you know your deed restrictions? Did you know that the Westbury Civic Club can look over your proposed plans for free before you start construction? We want to avoid deed restriction violations before they happen. Did you know that Westbury 2, Westbury 3, and Westbury 5 have a 25 foot rear setback for the main structure? Did you know that there is a minimum percentage of brick that must be on your home? Did you know that you can't build in front of your building line? We want to help you! We want you to find out about possible violations before it costs you money and time. Several homeowners in the past couple years have had to tear down and/or modify their construction due to deed restriction violations. The City of Houston does not review deed restrictions when issuing permits. They require a signed affidavit acknowledging that the plans comply with your deed restrictions. This holds YOU, the homeowner, accountable for knowing and complying with your deed restrictions. We are here to help you. All deed restrictions are available online at westburycrier.com.

Keep Storm Drains Clean & Clear

If you have a storm drain inlet in the street in front of your home, check it regularly. You should remove any debris including newspapers, twigs and leaves from the grates. Also, look inside and see if you have standing water. If your storm drain is full of water and if has NOT rained recently, report to 311 for storm drain cleaning and maintenance.

Please keep the curb line in front of your house free of leaves by raking and bagging them weekly. It is spring and the oak trees are dropping their leaves, and our storm sewers are filling up with them because some homeowners are not keeping their curbs clean. Remember if you use a yard service to tell them not to blow your leaves or debris out into the street. The debris should be bagged or composted. This will help get the storm water on its way more quickly. It is important for storm water to be able drain freely and as quickly as possible.

Westbury Community Garden Master Plan



On June 21, the first community forum for the Westbury Community Garden Master Plan was held at Disciples Methodist Church. The planning team from Asakura Robinson shared their initial observations of the site and wanted to hear from everyone who has an interest in the garden, the adjacent Plant It Forward Farm, the prairie restoration or anything else happening on the site. They wanted to know what was working and what was not; what the master plan should focus on. The event included a brief presentation, exhibits, and plenty of time for discussion.

The Westbury Community Garden is 6 years old. The 7-acre garden has won awards and brought visitors to Westbury who might otherwise never have visited this part of town. For those who may not remember, at one time this site was vacant land owned by the Houston Housing Authority (HHA) and it was temporarily leased to the Westbury Civic Club with the idea that volunteers could build a great community garden with a motto of "Growing Community Through

Gardening". After a lot of sweat and labor, the site soon had garden beds for individuals, a tree farm, urban farming by refugees, a butterfly garden, and a native prairie area. Then, the HHA decided that they wanted to build an apartment complex there and would demolish the garden.

After years of begging, pleading, raising money, and advocacy by the many friends and allies of the garden, Mayor Annise Parker agreed to have the city obtain the land from the HHA by a land swap. This was an incredible achievement! Then the details had to be worked out. The city owns the land, with the Brays Oaks Management District as the operator, and the Westbury Community Garden runs the site as a project of the non-profit Westbury Area Improvement Corporation (WAIC). The WCC and the WAIC gave much thought as to whether the WCC or WAIC should operate the garden, and it was decided that the non-profit status of the WAIC would be beneficial when seeking grants in the future.

The HHA did not allow any permanent structures or building foundations to be built at the garden when it owned the land. The years of uncertainty that the garden might get demolished by the HHA also meant that drainage and infrastructure problems were deferred with



temporary fixes.

After the garden was safe from being demolished, garden leadership began looking at the garden's future. One goal was for changes and improvements to be thoughtfully planned and implemented. Another goal was to be a good steward of the land. After much discussion about these issues, the garden decided to solicit funds to pay for a Master Plan.

Furthermore, since drainage and infrastructure problems were the biggest needs, it was decided that it would be most prudent to do the second phase (engineering design and drawings) together with the master plan. The United Way Houston agreed with this approach and agreed to contribute for the first time ever toward a Master Plan. Then BOMD and District K Larry Green agreed to pay the rest of the cost.

Look for more opportunities in the future to have input into this very

- Among seven large slicing tomatoes, Bella Rosa took top honors, with Carmello and Carbon tying for second place.



Tips for Mosquito Control

It's that time of the year again! Now with the added threat of the Zika virus, mosquito control is even more important. Mosquitoes are not only annoying, but they can spread dangerous human illnesses: Dengue Fever, St. Louise Encephalitis, Chikungunya Virus, Malaria, Yellow Fever, West Nile Virus; and even Heartworms to dogs.

The best way to keep down the number of mosquitoes is not to let them breed. Mosquitoes can breed in a shallow tray, in a deep bucket, or old tires. Anywhere that water is left to stand or collect can result in mosquitoes. If you look in the standing water, you may see little wiggling things. Those are mosquito larvae (babies). Some examples of where water may be left standing include: pet water bowls, bird baths, low puddle areas, saggy gutters, and plant container saucers.



What can each of us do to reduce the numbers of mosquitoes?

- Get out in your yard and tip all those water collectors and leave them turned over to discourage mosquito larvae.
- Don't allow standing water in the saucer under a pot.
- Rinse and refresh bird baths and pet water bowls daily.
- If you collect rainwater to water your plants, be sure the container has a good screen cover to keep mosquitoe out of the water.
- If you have a decorative pond in your backyard, check it for mosquito larvae. There are small fish called Gambusia (Mosquito Fish) which should be added to your decorative pond to eat the mosquito larva.
- Mosquito dunks, available at hardware stores, can also be placed in one's backyard pond water, one per month during our warm months, to kill mosquito larvae.
- Keep gutters in good repair.
- Get rid of old tires.

Summer Yard Care Q&A

Summer is upon us and with all the rain our grass is really growing. Let's talk mowing.

Sweep or Blow? We receive regular complaints about lawn services blowing yard clippings into the street. Where do they end up? In our storm sewers. If you employ a lawn service, please tell them to NOT BLOW YOUR CLIPPINGS into the street.

How tall should your grass be? Grass over 9 inches is in violation of city ordinance and should be reported to 311. Remember to increase the height setting on your lawn mower. As the summer days get hotter lawns should not be cut too short.

Can I park on my grass? It is a violation of city ordinance to park any vehicle on the front or side yard of a residential property in Westbury. In November 2009, the Prohibited Yard-Parking ordinance went into effect in all parts of Westbury. How are violations handled? Report yard-parking violations to the officers at the Westbury HPD Storefront at 832-394-7520. Since the officers do not work on weekends or in the evenings, photographs of violations are accepted to help document the problem. It is helpful to record the license plate and make/model of the offending vehicle.
