Summer Enrichment Program at the Platou Center

The City of Houston offers a 10-week day-camp style Summer Enrichment Program (SEP) for youth ages 6 - 13. SEP is available at all 54 city community centers, including the Platou Center right here in Westbury. The program runs from Monday, June 3 to August 9. Program activities include: crafts, nutrition, fun fitness, track and field, soccer, swimming, nature exploration, computer literacy programs, recycling awareness, kayaking, bird watching, fishing and hiking excursions and youth entrepreneur experiences. Parents are required to attend a program orientation at their registered community center. Transportation to and from community center is the parents responsibility. Student to staff ratio is 1 to 25 with qualified professional recreation staff. The cost is \$30.00 per child per week. Online registration is available at www. houstonparks.org click on the SEP registration link. (NOTE: Any scheduled field trip costs are not a part of the registration fee).







Are Your Kids Pool Proof?

It seems that there has been a drowning or near drowning every weekend this summer. These rules bear repeating. Water is a great way to beat the heat, but summer is also when children are most likely to drown. Drowning is a leading cause of accidental death for kids under the age of five and toddlers are especially at risk. Drowning can happen in almost any amount of water, indoors or outdoors.

- Never leave a child unsupervised around water, inside or outside of the house. It only takes a few minutes for a child to drown.
- Never leave children alone around with water whether it is in a pool, wading pool, drainage ditch, etc.
- Constantly watch children who are swimming or playing in water. They need an adult or certified lifeguard watching and within reach.
- Secure access to swimming pools. Use fences, self-closing and latching gates, and water surface alarms.
- Completely remove pool covers when the pool is in use.
- Store water toys away from the water when not in use so they don't attract a small child.
- Don't assume young children will use good judgment and caution around water.
- Be ready for emergencies. Keep emergency telephone numbers handy and learn CPR.
- Find out if your child's friends or neighbors have home pools.
- And Last buT NOT LEAST, TEACH YOUR CHILD TO SWIM.

Weather Wary in Westbury

Does rain make you nervous? Are you unsure on the weather forecasts? Does listening to the news weather reports make you panic? You are not alone. Houston weather over the past couple years has made us all very wary, if not scared, of storms.



Houston gets rain. The trick is to know where and how much. There are many good websites and apps available that can help guide you before rain events or during them. One good piece of advice is to look for warnings and alerts from the actual source, for example the National Hurricane Center. This is not a complete list but just one meant to help guide you and add to your storm preparations.

Harris County Flood Warning System www.harriscountyfws.org

This website is extremely helpful <u>during</u> a rain event. It shows real time bayou levels and rainfall amounts at gages that have been installed along the bayous. **Gage 445** is located in Westbury on the Willow Waterhole Bayou at the Landsdowne bridge. Gage 440 is located on Brays Bayou at S. Rice. A new tool just introduced is the ability to sign up for Flood Alerts by gage. Another tool available on the website is a Flood Inundation real time map that can help residents make critical decisions regarding life and property during events. If you are ever curious about the rainfall amounts and rate, you can also look up historical data.

National Hurricane Center www.nhc.noaa.qoy

If there is a chance of a named storm or there is a current named storm, the National Hurricane Center is your go-to source. During an active named storm, there will be multiple updates issued along with many different maps. These include the wind probability, the storm track cone, storm surge, tides, and many more.

Hype-free Weather Forecast www.spacecityweather.com

This website is dedicated to covering Houston weather news and forecasting with accuracy and without hype. Space City Weather was founded in October 2015. This website isn't about making money or getting "hits", it is truly about providing residents and business owners a quality forecast to make informed decisions. Eric Berger and Matt Lanza provide the best forecast for Houston weather. You can also follow them on Facebook.

When it Rains in Houston

If you would like to understand Houston's flooding problem, there is a 15 minute film produced back in 1979 that is as timely today as it was 39 years ago. The film is part of the Texas Archive of the Moving Image.



This film, narrated by actor Carle Bensen, presents Houstonians with a comprehensive look at their city's flood control infrastructure, put in place to deal with the heavy rains typical to the area. Due to natural factors such as a flat, low-lying topography and high clay content in the soil, as well as rapid urbanization, Houston has a history of flooding, and flood control projects, dating back as far as 1908. The film educates viewers about flood control systems in place, discussing strengths and weaknesses of the flood drain, storm sewer, bayou, channel, and pond system. It also recounts the physical and economic damage caused by flooding in the 1970s, the consequence of failure to continue to implement flood control improvements. In the end, the film is a plea to get back to the plan, urging the public to take action by voting on bond and tax allocations for drainage projects, and contacting their public officials to support the issues. Start storing extras like food and water, a little at a time, so that you have enough to last at least a week or two at home without electricity or a way to get supplies.



Sign Up for Power Outage Alerts

A helpful alert service about Centerpoint power outages is Power Alert Service (PAS) which can notify you, friends and family of a power outage, its restoration progress, and when the electricity comes back on. Thanks to recent upgrades, you can send alerts to up to five text, five emails and five phone numbers. https://www.centerpointenergy.com

Sign Up for Alerts from The City



Sometimes it is easy to become complacent with weather alerts, but emails, texts, and phone calls sent from the City Alert System definitely were accurate this time. If you haven't signed up to receive City alerts, you may do so with AlertHouston. Timely information during emergencies is important. AlertHouston delivers critical information to Houston residents regarding current conditions, expected impacts, and protective actions to keep themselves and their loved ones safe.

These alerts are issued by City of Houston Office of Emergency Management (OEM). Messages are issued for citywide and neighborhood level emergencies. They are sent through email and social media (Facebook, Twitter and Nextdoor). You must opt-in to receive these alerts.

Register for emergency alerts through email, text message, voice call, or mobile app push notification. You may download the Everbridge app free of charge from the Apple or Andoid app store. Most alerts are geo-targeted; subscribers with loved ones around the city may register up to five physical addresses per contact record.

Sign up for Flood Gage Warning Alerts


The regional Flood Warning System measures rainfall and monitors water levels in bayous, creeks, and rivers on a real-time basis to inform area residents of potential flooding conditions. This system relies on a network of 250 gage stations that have been strategically placed throughout a Harris and surrounding

counties. Westbury has one of these gages located on the Willow Waterhole Bayou (#445). This information is available at www.harriscountyfws.org.

You can now sign up for alerts on a specific gages near your home or work. You can receive default rainfall and water level alerts or create custom water alerts.

The Willow Waterhole Bayou at Landsdowne rises quickly and it's imperative to surrounding homeowners to know what is happening. It is important to remember that this gage will likely stay at a certain level (approximately 51-52ft) when flood waters are going over the weirs downstream at the Willow Waterhole detention basins.

Westbury Community Members Tour Area Libraries

A hot topic right now is the new Westbury library. The City of Houston recently purchased the "old post office" property on Belrose in Westbury for the site of a new library. A new library is very exciting. Libraries are not just places to check out books anymore. Houston Public Library Director Rhea Lawson and her Executive team hosted District K CM Member Martha Castex-Tatum and several Westbury SuperNeighborhood residents on a tour of three of Houston's 21st century libraries. They saw many possibilities for our new library. Read on this page and the next to see what exciting things are at each of these libraries.

The Westbury group started the tour with a stop at the Belrose site. Although the site looks a little rough right now but the building is quite large, and the site has ample room for parking. It is not known at this time whether the old building can be preserved or converted to usable space, but the architects plan to investigate that possibility.

After touring the three libraries with the City, the Westbury team made one last stop at the newly re-opened McGovern- Stella Link Library to see their renovated space. It was open and airy. As the plans for the new library progress the District K office will host a community meeting for all District K residents to discuss and get community input. We encourage everyone to visit Scenic Woods Regional Library (which houses the only full TechLink site), Robinson-Westchase Library (which has a large square-footage), and Young Neighborhood Library (which has an open concept). We look forward to your feedback during the public comment period for this project. After all this time without a library, it is very exciting to imagine some of these wonderful elements coming here to Westbury!

Judson W. Robinson Jr. **Westchase Neighborhood Library**

The Judson W. Robinson Jr. Westchase Neighborhood library features a soaring, open entryway, with beautiful, natural light throughout. The building was remodeled from an existing structure, giving the Westbury team an inspiring example of the kind of transformation that is possible with an older building. Many of the windows looked out onto colorful landscaping, with a trail on one side. The library offers tablets that visitors can use within the space, and much of the main entrance contains shelves, filled with books ready and waiting for patrons to pick up.

Alice McKean Young Library

The Alice McKean Young Library is in southeast Houston. The library features lots of artistic elements: three large bird sculptures greet visitors outside, while a whimsical mosaic wallpaper brightens the children's section. The library includes communal spaces for visitors to use computers or their own laptops, as well as a large, private room for community meetings and presentations. There was even a space for Teens only.



Scenic Woods Regional Library

The Scenic Woods Regional Library located in the northeastern part of Houston. Much of the original library space was converted to accommodate an innovative Tech Link area. This area is complete with video and music recording spaces, 3D printers, embroidery machines, and more. The section is staffed with knowledgeable personnel who are able to assist visitors with all the computers and equipment. The furnishings in the section are modern and colorful, and the focus seems to be on helping community members to learn new skills, start a personal business, or just have fun. The whole team enjoyed creating a music video, playing instruments together, and marveling at all the crafts that could be made throughout the room.









Westbury tour member Katherine Wingfield had this to say. "As a mother of young children (3 and 6), I was particularly interested in the ways that

young children could use the libraries we visited. I also wanted to see how these libraries and spaces welcomed children and how their layouts and facilities would encourage or discourage children and their parents from spending time at the library.

One thing that stood out for me was how open the children's sections were at all the libraries we visited. While the sections for teens and adults were more private, more secluded, the sections for children were less enclosed. With two small children, I actually thought this might create some challenges for me. I would prefer a more defined entrance to the children's section that would not allow a child to wander away so quickly into the rest of the library. I also thought the libraries could use more comfortable seating for both children AND adults. One of the members of the Houston Public Library team commented that it was so difficult to find durable kid furniture, saying that adults sit in the kid chairs and break them. With nothing but kid furniture in the sections, though, adults have nowhere else to sit. A comfy place for adults to sit might encourage parents to sit and read together with their children. Other small amenities, like bathroom step stools, would also be a great way to show young visitors that they are welcome. In spite of the physical accommodations, perhaps the biggest thing that would draw me and my children into the library would be exciting programming: story times, craft hours, puppet shows, science demonstrations, and more. Those programs are, apparently, determined at a local branch level and will be something to continue to advocate for when our library opens."





HPD PIP Meeting on Preparedness

Ready for Anything: Your Family, Your Plan, Your Safety

Brett Shyrock, of the Harris County office of Homeland Security & Emergency Management, was the speaker at the May HPD PIP meeting. He had lots of statistics and advice on how to prepare for disasters. Hurricane season began June 1 and peaks in September. Last year there were 5 named storms and 8 major hurricanes. The 2019 prediction is for 9-15 named storms, 4-8 hurricanes and 2-4 major hurricanes. But it only takes one storm to wreak havoc.

Four fundamentals: Get a kit. Make a plan. Stay informed. Be involved.

- → Keep your vehicle's tank full in hurricane system. Don't go below half tank.
- → Remember your needs change year to year.
- → Make copies of your important documents and email them to yourself or store on a flash drive so that they are somewhere you can access them.
- → Download the Ready Harris app
- → Subscribe to AlertHouston to receive up to date info
- → Preparing Your Home: Hurricane winds can cause trees & branches to fall, so before hurricane season, trim or remove damaged trees & limbs to keep you and your property safe. Secure loose rain gutters & downspouts and clear any clogged areas or debris to prevent water damage to your property.
- → Purchase a portable generator or install a generator for use during power outages. Remember to keep generators and other alternate power/heat sources outside, at least 20 feet away from windows and doors and protected from moisture; and NEVER try to power the house wiring by plugging a generator into a wall outlet.
- → If your health is dependent upon electric service, call and register with 211. NOTE: You must re-register every year. Call 2-1-1 and let them know that you want to register for STEAR (State of Texas Emergency Assistance Registry). Registration is VOLUNTARY. Required information is: Name, address, phone number, and primary language. Additional questions include: Emergency contact info., caregiver info., pets, & transportation assistance for home evacuation, communication barriers, disability or functional or medical Needs. This is for planning not evacuation.

Address Numbers: Are you Numbers Visible? ne bit of news we hear repeatedly from first responders is how

hear repeatedly from first responders is how many homes in Westbury do not have their house numbers clearly visible. When seconds count, any delay could be catastrophic.

Vacation Watch

Going on a Summer Vacation? Leaving for a week long getaway? Well, if you pay your Westbury Area Patrol dues, make sure you request a vacation watch by the Constables. This is a great service that is included in our contract. A deputy will check out your property at least once a day to make sure it is secured and nothing suspicious is going on.



WCC Budget Explained

The 2019 Westbury Civic Club budget and year to date finances are to the left. Thank you to all the many residents who have sent in their 2019 Dues and Assessments. The WCC office has entered in all payments received through May 31. As you can see, we are still slightly behind in our donations this year. Please consider donating to the WCC and to the Westbury Area Patrol.

The primary concern for this year has been the Westbury Area Patrol **Constable** program. So far we collected \$192,159 in donations specifically for the Constable program. The total cost for 2019 contract is \$246,600. This year we had to reduce the number of deputies patrolling Westbury. It is recommended that a neighborhood our size should have six to eight deputies, but we have only three. In the past several years, we have had a shortage of donations but used money in the security savings account. There is no longer any money in this account. We would like to slowly build this account back up and add another deputy back to our patrol service. If you have not paid your 2019 Dues and WAP, please consider doing so today. The form is on page 7.

The **Crier printing and delivery** costs are projected to be completely covered by the advertising this year. We have added several new advertisers and continue to do so each month.

The Westbury Civic Club has hired a 2nd part time employee. We hope this additional office support will help expedite our response time to resident requests as well as keep the office better staffed.

At this time, we do not have a landscape company for our adopted esplanades. Some are being mowed by the Brays Oaks Management District, but we must take this over very soon. This budget line is for the anticipated cost.



Keep Neighborhoods Clean & Protect Local Waterways

Everyone knows that trash is no good for our bayous, rivers and Galveston Bay, but many people unwittingly contribute to water pollution because they do not understand that "natural" debris—leaves, grass clippings, fertilizer, and pet waste—becomes pollution when it hits the water. The water that flows into our storm drains flows UNTREATED to Galveston Bay.

What can you do?

- → Leaves and grass in your street are on the fast track to the bay. **Keep your curb line clean.**
- → Dog feces carries harmful bacteria. When the TV news talks about fecal chloroform number and warns about staying out of the water, this high fecal containment is from mammal excrement like dog poop.
 - Pick up after your pet. Scoop that poop!
- → Trash clogs drains and pipes, causing flooding. Don't throw your cigarette butts out the car window or empty your ash tray when you stop for a light. Don't Litter.
- → Fertilize your yard sparingly so the excess doesn't wash off and into our drains.
- → Do not pour toxic substances into the storm drains: no oil, no paint, no cooking grease, no chemicals.

Could the Fort Bend Parkway Toll Road be Extended up South Post Oak to Loop 610?

Harris County Commissioners Court approved an \$800,000 expenditure to answer that very question. Several months ago, Harris County Commissioners Court approved a study by Brown Gay Engineers (BGE) to study the feasibility of extending the Fort Bend Parkway along South Main and up South Post Oak Road to 610. First, BGE is collecting data and then they will host two public meetings. The first public meeting will be held sometime in August or September to get public input. A follow-up meeting will be held in November with their findings and recommendations.

This is not a new subject. Back in 2011 in an article was published in the Houston Chronicle on August 29, 2011: "A three-mile toll road linking the Fort Bend Parkway with Loop 610 West has been on the Harris County Toll Road Authority's books for 10 years, but it's unlikely to be built soon", officials say. "We haven't even considered doing it," Harris County Judge Ed Emmett said. "It's not something that anybody wants to do."

Then "We have no plans to move forward with it at all," Harris County Toll Road Authority spokesman Eric Hanson said. "We question its impact to that neighborhood, the entire three-mile stretch from 90 to 610. It's a long-established neighborhood."

Then Westbury Civic Club President Becky Edmondson said she didn't know if the association had ever taken an official position on the connector but she agrees with the decision not to pursue it. Loop "610 is already overcrowded," Edmondson said. "My personal feeling is that it would be a horrible thing."

Now it's been on the books for another 8 years and back in 2007 Senate Bill 792 gave Harris County Toll Road Authority (HCTRA) the right of first refusal on 6 projects, one of which is this project. Should HCTRA decide not to go forward, then it's possible Texas Department of Transportation could. This north extension is still listed on the 2040 Regional Transportation Plan of the Houston Galveston Area Council.

Jeff Peters, president of the Near Southwest Super Neighborhood, put together a meeting for the Super Neighborhood leaders and we were able to sit down with HCTRA and express our concerns about this project. There are pros and cons. But one thing that Cindy Chapman and Becky Edmondson came away from this meeting believing is that our concerns will be heard.

Greenbriar Dr. Bridge at Brays Bayou **Closed for 12 Months**

As part of Project Brays, the Greenbriar Dr. bridge at Brays Bayou will be replaced. The bridge will be raised, widened and lengthened to improve stormwater conveyance in this area. Project Brays is a multiyear, \$480 million cooperative effort between the Flood Control District and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Project Brays includes the widening of 21 miles of Brays Bayou in 12 separate channel modification project segments, four detention basins, and the modification or replacement of 32 bridges.



Major project components include demolishing the existing Greenbriar Dr. bridge and removing segments of existing Greenbriar Dr. pavement; constructing a new three-span bridge with approach road pavement; excavating approximately 14,400 cubic yards of material to widen the bayou; removing and replacing storm sewer systems; removing and replacing slope paving; adding wider 10-foot sidewalks; reconstruction of adjacent pedestrian trails, sidewalks and maintenance access ramps to current standards and to be ADA compliant.

The project will require complete closure of the Greenbriar Drive bridge for about 12 months during construction. Main detours through this area, which is southwest of the Texas Medical Center, would be via Main Street, Fannin Street, Kirby Drive and Old Spanish Trail. The Flood Control District's construction contractor will place traffic warning signs at both ends of the bridge at least two weeks in advance of the bridge closure.

Pedestrian trails will be closed from Main Street to Fannin Street along Brays Bayou for the duration of the construction. The main trail detours for pedestrian trails would be via Main Street to Pressler Street to Fannin Street.


