COVID-19 Cases Increasing in Houston

Cases of COVID-19 have been rapidly increasing in Houston. Over 10,000 new cases have been reported since the last *Crier*. It is important to follow local orders and advice from trusted sources such as the Texas Medical Center (TMC). The TMC publishes updated data and charts everyday with number of cases, tests performed, hospital occupancy and more. Visit their website at www.tmc.edu/coronavirus-updates/

On June 25, the TMC made a rare public statement, asking all Houstonians to do their part in helping to slow the spread of COVID-19: by staying home when possible, maintaining a social distance of at least six feet, washing hands regularly, wearing a face covering, and if sick, getting tested and self-quarantining. We all need to do our part to slow the spread.

Harris County, along with many other surrounding counties and cities, has issued a face covering order for businesses through June 30. The order is expected to be extended if the

NEW Trash Bin Fee on this Month's Water Bill

Starting this month, many Houstonians, including Westbury residents will see a new \$1.14 fee on their City water bill. On May 13, Houston City Council approved a new monthly fee for garbage bins provided by the City. This "lease fee" is \$0.57 per month per cart. The intent of the fee is to provide funds to keep enough containers in stock, maintenance of existing bins, and personnel to provide pickup services. Trash fees are always a hot topic in Houston. The vote was pushed back twice. District K Councilmember Martha Castex-Tatum voted against the new lease fee.

A Message from the Westbury Civic Club President

Infections and hospitalizations related to COVID-19 continue to increase in Houston. As a community, we have faced other challenges over the years and we will face this challenge the same way - by taking care of ourselves and by helping our neighbors as best we can. The leaders of the Texas Medical Center have issued an urgent plea for individuals to take action to help reduce the spread of COVID-19: practice social distancing, wear a mask in public, and wash hands more frequently. These small actions of kindness can help us keep our families and our neighbors safer here in Westbury. More information about COVID-19 is on page 1 and 8.

On June 6, I attended a candlelight vigil hosted at Westbury United Methodist Church in memory of George Floyd, a native Houstonian who died a horrific death in Minneapolis. I thank Westbury UMC for organizing this candlelight vigil, a community event which was exceedingly moving and which provided a way for people to express their hopes and sorrows and concerns about racism.

Houston is now the most diverse city in all of the USA. District K is one of the most diverse city council districts in Houston. and our own community of Westbury is one of the most diverse areas within District K.

The Westbury Community Garden this month amended their bylaws with a Non-Discrimination Policy, to have a specific policy on the topic. I have reviewed the WCC bylaws and policies and

discovered that the WCC does not have a specific policy on the topic. I will ask the board to consider adopting a Non-Discrimination Policy, as many corporations have done to convey their vision.

I have been asked whether the deed restrictions for Westbury have any of the discriminatory language found in older Houston deed restrictions. Fortunately, even though Westbury was developed in the 1950s and 1960s, none of our sets of deed restrictions have discriminatory language. I also received a concern regarding wording (thugs) we used in the June newsletter to describe criminals, wording that I am now more aware is an emotionally charged term that can have racial connotations.

I want to thank our newsletter delivery team, the Westbury High School baseball team and their parents, for resuming delivery of our monthly newsletter. The May newsletter was delivered by WCC board volunteers due to COVID-19 social isolation rules. These WHS teenagers delivered our monthly newsletter during an emotionally charged time and some may have been nervous walking up to front spitting out watermelon seeds. Have fun doorsteps to thousands of Westbury homes. We gratefully appreciate the work that these WHS students do. Delivering the newsletter helps bring funds to the WHS baseball program, and this work is mutually beneficial to the school and to our community. Please greet them with friendly smiles and thanks!

I will close by discussing law enforcement and the community policing done by our Precinct 5 Constables. On page 14, you will see some of the Accountable Policing steps that Precinct 5 Constable Ted Heap's office follows. If you have a concern or a complaint about Precinct 5, please let us know and also let them know. You can submit your concerns to them at https:// constablepct5.com/index.php/contact-us/

We frequently tell our residents to report "suspicious behavior" to the Constables. I am a gray-haired lady who drives a Subaru. I have often driven my car slowly around and around Westbury streets in loops, making notes or taking photos, and then driving slowly in loops again. While often seeing the same people outside. All of that could be considered suspicious behavior, yet to my knowledge, no one has ever called to report me for suspicious behavior. Criminals can come in all ages and races.

July is a traditional time of enjoying the summer, celebrating Independence Day, and feasting on summer fun foods. I am looking forward to some great BBQ and and be safe. Mask up!


The City of Houston announced that the City public pools and splashpads would NOT be opening in 2020 due to COVID-19.

Pick-up is EVERY week either on Thursday or Saturday or any day the City decides to come by. Yard Waste MUST be placed in the correct City bio-degradable bags.

Westbury Community Garden By-law Amendment *Adding a Non-Discrimination Policy*

The Westbury Community Garden requested to amend their by-laws to include a non-discrimination policy. The garden's by-laws require that all changes must be approved by vote of both the Westbury Civic Club board and the Westbury Area Improvement Corporation (WAIC). Neither the WCC nor the WAIC boards met in June. However both organizations held an electronic vote and approved the changes to the garden by-laws. The garden is diverse and inclusive; this just puts their actions into print.

Non-Discrimination Policy: Westbury Community Garden does not and shall not discriminate based on race, color, religion (creed), gender, gender expression, age, national origin (ancestry), disability, marital status, sexual orientation, or military status, in any of its activities or operations.



Why Pay your Westbury Civic Club Dues?

The Westbury Civic Club (WCC) works on: reducing neighborhood blight, enforcing deed restrictions, improving economic development, and advocating for our fair share of the City's budget. We hold two semi-annual White Elephant Sales and host neighborhood events such as Keep Westbury Beautiful Day. We publish the award-winning Westbury Crier monthly. The WCC has one employee who works closely with our City Council Office and city departments to ensure timely responses to residents' complaints, like Solid Waste problems. We also continue to work diligently with the City and the County to find real solutions to flooding along Willow Waterhole Bayou. The WCC is a strong advocate for the City to continue on schedule with storm drain reconstruction projects in Westbury with ReBuild Houston. This project was to start in 2020 but was delayed due to Harvey. Please pay your Westbury Civic Club dues of \$50.

Why Support the Westbury Area Patrol?

The largest program and biggest expenditure for the WCC is for the Westbury Area Patrol (WAP). The WCC has had a contract with Harris County Precinct 5 deputies since 1984. The WAP offers 24 hour coverage, vacation watches, home security checks, and alarm monitoring. The program provides high visibility, rapid response to emergency and non-emergency calls. Daily patrolling enables the deputies assigned to Westbury to become familiar with the neighborhood, thereby alerting them to "out of the ordinary" situations and ability to respond better and faster. WAP officers were instrumental in catching young criminals in Westbury South who were attacking and robbing elderly residents last year. Harris County Pct. 5 has a dedicated investigative unit that can be available if needed. The WCC has had to lower the number of deputies from 4 to 3 in 2019, and we could be in danger of losing the program if participation in this important program does not improve. Crime is increasing in Houston during this Covid-19 time, it is imperative that we keep our Constable patrol strong and active. Please support the Westbury Area Patrol, \$285.

Why Support the WCC?

Westbury is a unique neighborhood. While all 5,000 homes in our Westbury neighborhood have active deed restrictions, only 463 have mandatory assessments. This means the Westbury Civic Club heavily relies on voluntary financial contributions from residents.

Westbury has historically had strong voluntary support because residents understood the great benefits of the WCC and our programs. However, contributions to the Westbury Civic Club and to the Westbury Area Patrol were down in 2019. By working together, we can meet the challenges head on and keep our neighborhood the jewel that it is.

The total amount for the **2020 Voluntary Dues** is \$335. That is less than a dollar a day! The Westbury Civic Club dues are \$50 for the year. The WCC suggests a contribution of \$285 for the Westbury Area Patrol (a paid contract with Precinct 5 Constables).


Homes purchased in Parkwest 1 after Jan. 1, 1993 and Parkwest 2 after Jan 1, 1994 have mandatory assessments.

The 2020 Mandatory Assessments of \$246.75 were due 2/1/2020. Invoices have been mailed out.

Payment plans can be set up for homes that have a past due balance. Please contact the WCC Office at 713-723-5437.

The WCC does NOT receive payments from escrow accounts or any other source. If you receive a Mandatory Assessment bill, it was due by 2-1-2020.

An attorney will be contacted for accounts past due.



All About Face Coverings

Many grocery stores and gas stations are now carrying the basic surgical masks. They have been seen at Meyerland HEB. Retailers are starting to sell cloth masks, for example Old Navy has adult and children sizes available. If you prefer local, check out Chic Tailor at Braeswood and Chimney Rock. There are several Westbury residents that are making masks as well, just need to ask your neighbors or check Facebook.

The best mask offering protection from COVID-19 is the N95 but authorities ask that those be reserved for first responders. So that leave the surgical masks and cloth, either store bought or homemade. There are many debates around the effectiveness of these types. However, it is the belief of the CDC and the Texas Medical Center that they still help slow the spread if we all wear them and do our part.

Cloth masks come in a variety of styles and layers. Look for masks that offer at least two layers of protection and preferably with a filter opening. Filters can be surgical masks or coffee filters, amongst other items. Elastic around the ears or tying around the back of the head are the most common types. Cloth mask should be washed regularly.

Consider having at least 3-5 masks per person in your household. More are likely needed as schools and businesses reopen, 2-3 daily depending on your level of exposure.

COVID-19 Testing Sites near Westbury

*This is meant to be a helpful tool and is not a complete list of locations. These locations might change. Please check with each site before going. These are mostly free testing sites but some might bill your insurance. You will need to verify with each site.

There are many places to get a COVID-19 test. You can go to a public drive thru site such as Butler Stadium or go to partner locations such as CVS or Walmart. Hospitals and some doctors offices also test for COVID-19. There are also private labs and testing events that pop up each day sponsored by local politicians or entities. Almost all require advance appointments to be made via phone or website.

All About Deed Restrictions & Nuisances

Westbury is a Deed Restricted Neighborhood

ALL homes in Westbury have active deed restrictions. There are over 30 sets for the 9 sections and 5,000 homes in Westbury. Why do we have deed restrictions? To protect and maintain our neighborhood for the benefit of all residents. The City of Houston does not have any zoning or rules on where commercial business can be located. Deed restrictions help maintain our neighborhood as a neighborhood. All lots in Westbury must be residential usage.

When you bought your home, you should have received a copy of your deed restrictions. Certified copies of the deed restrictions can be obtained at the County Clerk office downtown for a fee. The WCC office has copies of the deed restrictions by section online at

www.westburycrier.com. You will need to know your legal address to know which set applies to you. An easy way to find your legal address is to look up your property on Harris County Appraisal District (HCAD) website, www.hcad.org.

Sick of Solicitors at your Door?

Westbury has been plagued with door to door sales solicitation for months now. Companies know people are home and they are sending their sales force out. These guys are trained to make you say YES, even when you want to say NO!

What can you do?

- → Do not open the door.
- → Through the door, tell them you are NOT interested. Tell them to leave your property.
- → If they persist, tell them you are in quarantine!

Seriously, if NO ONE buys from them they will go elsewhere. Help Westbury get a reputation of being a "hard to sell to" neighborhood.

Front Yard Parking is NOT Allowed in Westbury

It is a violation of city ordinance to park any vehicle on the front or side yard of a residential property in Westbury.

Sec. 28-303. Parking of vehicles prohibited in certain residential areas

It shall be an offense for any person to park or to cause, suffer or permit the parking of a vehicle or equipment on any surface that is not an improved surface as defined in this article, within any front or side yard of a single-family residence in a residential area subject to this section.

After hearing numerous complaints about vehicles parked on the grass, in 2009, the City of Houston enacted an ordinance to allow communities to opt-in to an ordinance to regulate the practice of vehicles parked in the front or side yard. City Council noted that parking vehicles on the front or side yard has "a negative effect on the aesthetics of singlefamily residential areas affected by such practices and the property values of residences in those affected areas". The Westbury Civic Club applied to the program, public notices were made as required, and a hearing was conducted. In November 2009, the Prohibited Yard-Parking ordinance went into effect in all parts of Westbury.

How are violations handled? Report yard-parking violations to the HPD officers at the Southwest HPD Station at 832-394-0400. Photographs of violations are accepted to help document the problem. It is helpful to record the license plate and make/model of the offending vehicle. Also, please be aware that quirks in the ordinance mean that some practices that appear to be yard-parking violations are not enforceable.

Updating Westbury Deed Restrictions

Deed Restriction Revision Action Group Formed

UPDATE—Thank you to all the residents who reached out about joining the Revision Action Group. The group will meet via Zoom in July/August to get started. Look in future *Criers* for more information.

Westbury's deed restrictions are old and need to be updated. While they are still active and still have validity, they are slowing losing their original meaning in today's legal climate. There are many reasons to update the deed restrictions. It is no longer 1958. How people live and use their homes is different in 2020. While it is nice that no one can hang a visible clothes line in their front yard, I am sure the residents of Westbury 5 East of Hillcroft would like the option to build a 2 story home. They are the ONLY section that cannot. With home elevations and new home construction on the rise, a better set of deed restrictions and guidelines are needed.

The Westbury Civic Club worked with residents in Parkwest 1 and 2 in the 1990s and successfully updated and modernized their deed restrictions with changes such as allowing two story homes, three car garages, and mandatory assessments. This process can be long and frustrating. Later deed restrictions revisions over the years have stalled, failed, and fizzled out.

It is time to seriously think of Westbury's future. 2020 is the time to move Westbury forward and update our aging deed restrictions. The first step is to get a group of active residents who are dedicated to seeing the process all the way through. This group will first meet to get their bearings, then start to break down the choices of how to tackle a massive deed restrictions revision for 5,000 homes. Even Parkwest 1 and 2 need to be updated, despite the changes made in the 90s. We will do surveys, in the *Crier* and online, and hold several public meetings to get feedback from residents.

The Backyard Naturalist—All About Hummingbirds

Did you know there are 360 species of hummingbirds in the world today, living primarily in Central and South America? About 12 species make their way into the United States. Here in Houston, our most frequent backyard visitor is the Ruby Throated Hummingbird, or sometimes the Black-Chinned Hummingbird or the Rufous Hummingbird. They migrate up from Central America starting in March to breed and return back home in September and October. You may see more birds in September when they are on the move, but they will be here all summer. The migration of 450 miles can be over the open waters of the Gulf or over land along the coast. The birds usually travel the same path each year of their normal 12 year life span, so a hummingbird you see in your yard this year could be the same one who visited last year.

Hummingbirds are known nectar drinkers, but did you know that a hummingbird's main diet consists of small insects like aphids, gnats, and small spiders? They eat insects for protein and minerals, so you can attract them with plants that attract small insects. It is important to not use pesticides, because hummingbirds eat insects and need spider webs to build their nests. Fruit flies are a perfect size insect for hummingbirds to eat, so you can even try putting out overripe fruit. Hummingbirds are attracted to the colors red and yellow, so red tubular flowers on native plants like Red Sage, Firecracker Plant, Texas Star hibiscus, Esperanza, and Turks Cap, all available at nurseries, are perfect plants for hummingbirds. Hummingbirds consume about 1/2 their body weight a day and feed as often as every ten minutes. With a heart rate of 1200 beats per minute and their wings flapping 50 to 200 times per second, it's no wonder they need a lot of fuel

If you want to hang a hummingbird feeder, the sugar water should be changed at least twice a week. Boil water or use hot tap water and dissolve 4 parts of hot water to 1 part white sugar, and let the solution cool before filling the feeder. That's it, no dye, no additives. If you hang more than one feeder they should not be visible to each other, as these little birds are highly territorial and will try to claim both feeders.

Because they are here to breed they will need material for their nests. Their little thimble sized nests are constructed in 6-10 days and made with plant down and bud scales. Native green milkweed provides nesting material as well as food for the Monarch caterpillars. The nest is all held together and adhered to a shaded twig with spider silk and then decorated with lichen and moss. The two little eggs are about the size of a tic tac, and will incubate for about two weeks and spend up to three weeks in the nest. They will then hang around all summer before migrating south for the winter

The Gulf Coast Observatory (www.gcbo.org) in Lake Jackson hosts a bird banding every third Saturday. In September they host an Xtreme Hummingbird Xtravangaza where you can hold a hummingbird in your hand!

Weirs "Spillovers" on the Willow Waterhole Bayou

One of the biggest conversations in Houston these days is flooding. Every rain storm brings more worries. While Westbury saw no home flooding in 2019, we did have many flooded neighborhood streets and stalled cars. These storms also brought the Willow Waterhole Bayou at Landsdowne out of its' banks.

After 5 floods since 2013, residents who live near the Willow Waterhole Bayou in Westbury at Landsdowne know how the bayou operates when it starts to rain. The WCC monitors the gage levels online and also know how this bayou has historically acted. This all changed in 2018.

Several rain events last year alarmed area residents as the gage seemed to stop reporting the level accurately; it stayed stationary even though it was still pouring outside. This happened again in June 2020. No homes flooded in Westbury.

Harris County Flood Control District (HCFCD) attended the July 2018 WCC Board meeting to explain the changes to the bayou and the resulting effect on the gage. The WCC's understanding is that the weirs "become active" when the water reaches approximately 52.5 ft at the weir. Upstream, at Landsdowne, where the gage is located, the elevation is one foot higher. This means that the bayou will reach the top of bank or very close at Landsdowne before water will overtop the weirs downstream at the detention basins. This is how it is designed to work. This is when we expect to see the Landsdowne gage stabilize and hold at a certain level between 53.5 and 54.5ft (top of bank is 54.20 ft.).


The "Spillover" weirs along the bayou are now complete and seem to be operating as they were intended. WCC board members Jennifer and Becky Edmondson often visit the site after heavy rains. A video of one such visit is posted on the Westbury Houston Facebook page and at www.westburycrier.com. The rain on May 7, 2019 saw the bayou plateau for 34 mins, at 54.28 ft, which was technically over the bank at Landsdowne. The rain 2 days later, on May 9, saw the bayou crest at 53.50. Each of these rain events saw rapid rainfall in a very short period and that is hard for our old infrastructure to handle. On May 7, we had a total of 5 inches of rain, BUT 3.24 inches of that fell in one hour. From 6:35-6:45, 0.68 inches of rain fell. Nothing is designed to hold that rate of rain. This is why our neighborhood streets flooded so quickly, even in areas "that never flood." The May 9 rain total was 3.20 but 1.6 inches fell in only 30 minutes. In one 5 minute period that night, 0.44" fell.

These 4 photos show some of the features at the Willow Waterhole Bayou and detention basins. Photo 1 shows the new large culverts that are bringing the Bankside/Hummingbird bayou water from the Chimney Rock intersection to the Willow Waterhole Bayou. This photo also shows one of the weirs into the detention basin as well as the emergency/ secondary spillover that will allow water to overflow and re-enter the channel on other side of the "control structure" that is seen circled in red in photo 2. The control structure restricts the flow of water in the bayou. As the water level rises in the channel, water will flow over the weirs and into the detention basins. Photo 3 shows the 2nd weir which is located along the Willow Waterhole Bayou directly behind the homes on Gaymoor in Westbury. This weir is located before the other one to the West. The basins are now all connected. One of the new connections is seen in Photo 4.











Weather Wary in Westbury

Does rain make you nervous? Are you unsure on the weather forecasts? Does listening to the news weather reports make you panic? You are not alone. Houston weather over the past couple years has made us all very wary, if not scared, of storms.



Houston gets rain. The trick is to know where and how much. There are many good websites and apps available that can help guide you before rain events or during them. One good piece of advice is to look for warnings and alerts from the actual source, for example the National Hurricane Center. This is not a complete list but just one meant to help guide you and add to your storm preparations.

Harris County Flood Warning System www.harriscountyfws.org

This website is extremely helpful <u>during</u> a rain event. It shows real time bayou levels and rainfall amounts at gages that have been installed along the bayous. **Gage 445** is located in Westbury on the Willow Waterhole Bayou at the Landsdowne bridge. Gage 440 is located on Brays Bayou at S. Rice. A new tool just introduced is the ability to sign up for Flood Alerts by gage. Another tool available on the website is a Flood Inundation real time map that can help residents make critical decisions regarding life and property during events. If you are ever curious about the rainfall amounts and rate, you can also look up historical data.

National Hurricane Center www.nhc.noaa.gov

If there is a chance of a named storm or there is a current named storm, the National Hurricane Center is your go-to source. During an active named storm, there will be multiple updates issued along with many different maps. These include the wind probability, the storm track cone, storm surge, tides, and many more.

Hype-free Weather Forecast www.spacecityweather.com

This website is dedicated to covering Houston weather news and forecasting with accuracy and without hype. Space City Weather was founded in October 2015. This website isn't about making money or getting "hits", it is truly about providing residents and business owners a quality forecast to make informed decisions. Do You Have Flood Insurance?


While the majority of Westbury is not in the 100 or 500 year flood plains, floods can happen anywhere given the right circumstances. Only 15% of the structures that flooded during Harvey had flood insurance. Did you know the record for rainfall in a 24 hour period is held in nearby Alvin, Texas? 44 inches! The good news is that if you are not in a flood plain, then you can buy peace of mind for just a few hundred dollars a year.

The Harris County Flood Control District advises that EVERY HOME in Harris County should have flood insurance, whether or not you live in a mapped flood plain. The current flood plain maps do not fully warn where flooding might occur. Homeowner's policies do not include flood coverage, and because no insurance company wanted to write an unprofitable line of business, the federal government stepped in. In 1968, Congress created the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), which offers flood insurance to homeowners, renters, and business owners.

As you shop for a flood policy, you may be confused, as many are, about whether the policy is through FEMA or an insurance company. In 1983, the Write Your Own (WYO) Program began and is a cooperative undertaking between the private insurance industry and FEMA. The WYO Program allows participating property and casualty insurance companies to write and service the Standard Flood Insurance Policy in their own names. The companies receive an expense allowance (approx. 30% of premium) for policies written and claims processed, while the federal government retains responsibility for underwriting losses. The WYO Program operates as part of the NFIP and is subject to its rules and regulations.

If you don't have flood insurance, ask your insurance agent for a quote. Make sure that you check the coverages and understand EXACTLY what you are purchasing. If you don't have an insurance agent, then look for one online at the FEMA site. Put in your address and it will give you a local agent. https://www.floodsmart.gov/floodsmart

PLEASE NOTE— You cannot purchase flood insurance when a named storm in the Gulf of Mexico. Once purchased, there is a 30 day waiting period before coverage takes effect.

Sometimes it is easy to become complacent with weather alerts, but emails, texts, and phone calls sent from the City Alert System can help in rain events. If you haven't signed up to receive City alerts, you may do so with AlertHouston. Timely information during emergencies is important. AlertHouston delivers critical information to Houston residents regarding current conditions, expected impacts, and protective actions to keep themselves and their loved ones safe.

These alerts are issued by City of Houston Office of Emergency Management (OEM). Messages are issued for citywide and neighborhood level emergencies. They are sent through email and social media (Facebook, Twitter and Nextdoor). You must opt-in to receive these alerts.

Register for emergency alerts through email, text message, voice call, or mobile app push notification. You may download the Everbridge app free of charge from the Apple or Andoid app store. Most alerts are geo-targeted; subscribers with loved ones around the city may register up to five physical addresses per contact record.

Sign up for Flood Gage Warning Alerts


The regional Flood Warning System measures rainfall and monitors water levels in bayous, creeks, and rivers on a real-time basis to inform area residents of potential flooding conditions. This system relies on a network of 250 gage stations that have been strategically placed throughout a Harris and surrounding

counties. Westbury has one of these gages located on the Willow Waterhole Bayou (#445). This information is available at

www.harriscountyfws.org

You can now sign up for alerts on a specific gages near your home or work. You can receive default rainfall and water level alerts or create custom water alerts.

The Willow Waterhole Bayou at Landsdowne rises quickly and it's imperative to surrounding homeowners to know what is happening. It is important to remember that this gage will likely stay at a certain level (approximately 51-52ft) when flood waters are going over the weirs downstream at the Willow Waterhole detention basins.

When it Rains in Houston If you would like to

understand Houston's flooding problem, there is a 15 minute film produced back in 1979 that is as timely today as it was 41 years ago. The film is part of the Texas Archive of the Moving Image.



This film, narrated by

actor Carle Bensen, presents Houstonians with a comprehensive look at their city's flood control infrastructure, put in place to deal with the heavy rains typical to the area. Due to natural factors such as a flat, low-lying topography and high clay content in the soil, as well as rapid urbanization, Houston has a history of flooding, and flood control projects, dating back as far as 1908. The film educates viewers about flood control systems in place, discussing strengths and weaknesses of the flood drain, storm sewer, bayou, channel, and pond system. It also recounts the physical and economic damage caused by flooding in the 1970s, the consequence of failure to continue to implement flood control improvements. In the end, the film is a plea to get back to the plan, urging the public to take action by voting on bond and tax allocations for drainage projects, and contacting their public officials to support the issues. Recent Crime in Westbury

On June 3, three male suspects were observed burglarizing vehicles in Westbury and fled on foot when spotted by Precinct 5 Constables. Only RAIN in the DRAIN!

As it rains in Westbury, water begins to build up along the street edges and gutters. It's here that it begins its long journey to the sea. The first destination on this journey is to the storm drain inlet on your street. Clearing the path to the storm drains is essential. Once it reaches the inlet, it flows into the storm drains and eventually ends up in one of the drainage ditches or Willow Waterhole Bayou, then off to Brays Bayou, then the Houston Ship Channel and ultimately to the Gulf of Mexico.

It's very important to prevent debris from blocking the flow of the water to the storm drain inlet. It is vital to keep the water flowing in the storm drain pipes under the streets.

Solid debris takes up space in the storm drain pipes making them less effective in transporting storm water to our ditches and bayous. Small sticks, leaves, newspapers, and other trash become wrapped together and could clog and slow the draining on your street. Our storm drains in Westbury are old. They are original to the neighborhood and should be treated with care. Only rain in the drain!!! Our trees are old and have huge roots that are bound to have popped through, combine this with leaves and other debris, and water just can't flow at the rate it should. If the rain is falling very rapidly (as it has many times in the past several years), our water on the streets needs to flow as fast as it can to the bayous.

Here are some things you can do to help.

- → Sweep & BAG your leaves out of the street.
- Ask your yard crew to NOT blow the leaves and grass clippings down the street or into the storm drains.
- Clean the storm drain inlet in front of your home
- → Pick up the newspapers that are thrown in your yard. Pick it up, read it or not, and throw it in your recycling.



Hillcroft Bridge Delayed Due to COVID-19

The scheduled bridge work and closure at Hillcroft and Brays Bayou has been delayed until after July 4 due to team members contracting COVID-19. The current start date is July 6. Expect delays.

The Greenbriar bridge over Brays Bayou has reopened!

New Detention Basin at Willow Waterhole

The S. Post Oak/ S. Willow detention basin is set to start construction very soon. Heavy excavation equipment is already on site. HCFCD was able to recently purchase this property from a developer that had wanted to build dense housing at the site but was met with much opposition from the surrounding neighborhoods due to repeat flooding and the property's proximity to the Willow Watehole Bayou.

What is that Huge Sign on Hillcroft?

If you have travelled North on Hillcroft from S. Main you may have noticed a giant new electronic sign installed in our esplanade. The WCC was shocked to see this sign. We were never notified or told anything about this. We have made several inquiries to the City regarding this sign as it seems very out of place in our residential neighborhood.



After some independent research, it appears the sign is

part of a widespread traffic program that includes installing 91 of these signs throughout the City. WCC leaders would like to know how and why Hillcroft was chosen and why we were not informed. The sign is obstructed by our trees in the esplanade and we want to ensure they are not cut down. We hope to have more information in next month's Crier.
