- → Candidates may submit a statement, up to 100 words in length.
- → All candidates must include contact information including address, phone number, email, etc.

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A Message from the Westbury Civic Club President

I have been in a reflective mood lately. Attending a funeral tends to have that impact, and this month I attended the funeral of Dabney Kennedy, a long-time community advocate and a former President of the Westbury Civic Club. Two former WCC Presidents, Edith Smith and Becky Edmondson, joined me after the funeral service as we reminisced about Dabney and discussed Westbury issues. Dabney took time to mentor others and was noted for his quiet style of communicating, finding consensus, and looking to the future. If you enjoy visiting Willow Waterhole, Dabney was a key advocate who helped guide and convince the Harris County Flood Control District and others that the project could be much more than a big hole in the ground surrounded by a fence, and so Willow Waterhole ended up being the model for subsequent county flood control projects. Dabney was looking ahead to the potentials of the future.

As we talk about the future, I want to explain that the Westbury Civic Club is self-managed. That means that we don't hire a management company to run the business of the Westbury Civic Club. We are "powered" by a part-time office worker, our board of Directors, and volunteers. One of the challenges is doing the day-to-day work while also considering the future needs of our neighborhood. Looking to Westbury's future, how do we protect what we love about our

neighborhood while also adapting to today's world? Our deed restrictions are hard to read and were written in the 1950s and 1960s. A lot has changed over the past 60 or so years, and it is vital to update our deed restrictions for the times. We have about 5,000 homes and likely there are 5,000 opinions about what might need to be updated in the deed restrictions. A Town Hall meeting about deed restrictions was held in June and more meetings and surveys will be held in the coming months. Together, as a neighborhood, we will work out a consensus and find a balance for updates that a majority of our homeowners are willing to approve. I invite and encourage you to participate in the process. I thank all of you who attended the June Townhall meeting about Deed Restrictions; you had great questions and comments. We appreciate your feedback about the presentation slides.

Our neighborhood has a lot of good news happening these days. Our friends at the Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy have recently announced several major gifts that will be used to add amenities at Willow Waterhole. At the June Westbury Civic Club meeting, we heard from engineers working for Harris County and for the City of Houston who are studying ways to reduce flooding. We got our first look at the revised city plans for a street reconstruction project that will rebuild streets/sidewalks and

improve the street stormwater detention system in an area of Westbury 4 roughly bounded by Chimney Rock, Ludington, Landsdowne and West Airport. That city project is still in design and is pending final design and approval of construction funds, but it is getting closer to fruition.

I try to keep in mind that good things that are happening all the time, because sometimes it doesn't feel that way, does it? I don't want to sugarcoat that everything is perfect here in Westbury. It is not. But I have seen many times where neighbors have helped neighbors. I have seen many times where neighbors have worked together to make things better. Pick up that piece of trash. Smile and wave at your neighbor. Send some money to support the WCC Constable or the WCC operating expenses. Be part of the change that you want to see.

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
"This is a story about four people named Everybody, Somebody, Anybody, and Nobody. There was an important job to be done and Everybody was asked to do it.

All About Trash

Trash, yard waste, recycling, and heavy trash are picked up by the City of Houston.

Regular Household Trash

Pick-up is EVERY Thursday. Regular household trash goes into the black trash can.

Yard Waste

Pick-up is EVERY week either on Thursday or Saturday or any day the City decides to come by. Yard Waste MUST be placed in the correct City bio-degradable bags.

Recycle

Recycling in Westbury

All of Westbury recycles on Schedule A. Recycling is every other week. Recycling goes into the green trash can.

Why Support the WCC?

Westbury is a unique neighborhood. While all 5,000 homes in our Westbury neighborhood have active deed restrictions, only 463 have mandatory assessments. This means the Westbury Civic Club heavily relies on voluntary financial contributions from residents.

Westbury has historically had strong voluntary support because residents understood the great benefits of the WCC and our programs. The past several years' contributions to the Westbury Civic Club and to the Westbury Area Patrol have been down. By working together, we can meet the challenges head on and keep our neighborhood the jewel that it is. We all want a safe, flood free neighborhood with great schools and nice neighbors.

The total amount for the **2022 Voluntary Dues is \$365**. That is well worth a dollar a day! The Westbury Civic Club dues are \$60 for the year. The WCC suggests a contribution of \$305 for the Westbury Area Patrol (a paid contract with Precinct 5 Constables).

District K Gateway Reception and Sunset Parade

If you love the colored lights at City Hall and on several bridges over Hwy 59, then wait until you drive down to South Main(Hwy 90A) between Hiram Clarke, South Post Oak, Chimney Rock, Hillcroft, and Fondren. These 5 underpasses now feature multi-colored, changeable lighting and brightly painted beams and columns, thus bringing a more distinctive flair to these gateways into the Five Corners Improvement District. The intersections also received landscaping, signage, and safety improvements. Since Hwy 90A is the boundary between the Five Corners District and Westbury, we are able to enjoy the benefits of this very visible 1.1 million dollar beautification effort on our southern border.

How were these improvements funded? In 2017, District K Council Member Larry Green participated in a signing of a Tri-Party Agreement, along with the Chairs of the Five Corners Management District, TIRZ 25, and TIRZ 9. The three entities agreed to work together, and with District K, on economic development projects in the Five Corners Hiram-Clarke area. Projects could include addressing needed infrastructure such as sidewalks and streetscape enhancements, parks and greenspace improvements, public art, and more.

On June 10, the gateway improvements were celebrated with a reception and parade. Hundreds of District K residents gathered to enjoy a reception that featured line dancing, entertainment, speeches, and more. As the sun set, the celebration continued with a parade to view the new colorful lighting.

Councilmember Castex-Tatum said: "I love this work and our community. We will keep working to ensure our community is one we can all be proud of. Keep shining, District K!"

Weather Wary in Westbury

Does rain make you nervous? Are you unsure on the weather forecasts? Does listening to the news weather reports make you panic? You are not alone. Houston weather over the past couple years has made us all very wary, if not scared, of storms.



Houston gets rain. The trick is to know where and how much. There are many good websites and apps available that can help guide you before rain events or during them. One good piece of advice is to look for warnings and alerts from the actual source, for example the National Hurricane Center. This is not a complete list but just one meant to help guide you and add to your storm preparations.

Harris County Flood Warning System www.harriscountyfws.org

This website is extremely helpful <u>during</u> a rain event. It shows real time bayou levels and rainfall amounts at gages that have been installed along the bayous. **Gage 445** is located in Westbury on the Willow Waterhole Bayou at the Landsdowne bridge. Gage 440 is located on Brays Bayou at S. Rice. A new tool just introduced is the ability to sign up for Flood Alerts by gage. Another tool available on the website is a Flood Inundation real time map that can help residents make critical decisions regarding life and property during events. If you are ever curious about the rainfall amounts and rate, you can also look up historical data.

National Hurricane Center www.nhc.noaa.gov

If there is a chance of a named storm or there is a current named storm, the National Hurricane Center is your go-to source. During an active named storm, there will be multiple updates issued along with many different maps. These include the wind probability, the storm track cone, storm surge, tides, and many more.

Hype-free Weather Forecast www.spacecityweather.com

This website is dedicated to covering Houston weather news and forecasting with accuracy and without hype. Space City Weather was founded in October 2015. This website isn't about making money or getting "hits", it is truly about providing residents and business owners a quality forecast to make informed decisions. Eric Berger and Matt Lanza provide the best forecast for Houston weather. You can also follow them on Facebook.

Sign Up for Power Outage Alerts

A helpful alert service about Centerpoint power outages is Power Alert Service (PAS) which can notify you, friends and family of a power outage, its restoration progress, and when the electricity comes back on.

Thanks to upgrades, you can send alerts to up to five texts, five emails and five phone numbers.

Do You Have Flood Insurance?


While the majority of Westbury is not in the 100 or 500 year flood plains, floods can happen anywhere given the right circumstances. Anywhere it can rain, it can flood. There is no such thing as a no flood zone. Only 15% of the structures that flooded during Harvey had flood insurance. Did you know the record for rainfall in a 24-hour period is held in nearby Alvin, Texas? 44 inches! The good news is that, if you are not in a flood plain, then you can buy peace of mind for just a few hundred dollars a year.

The Harris County Flood Control District advises that EVERY HOME in Harris County should have flood insurance, whether or not you live in a mapped flood plain. The current flood plain maps do not fully warn where flooding might occur. Homeowner's policies do not include flood coverage, and, because no insurance company wanted to write an unprofitable line of business, the federal government stepped in. In 1968, Congress created the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), which offers flood insurance to homeowners, renters, and business owners.

As you shop for a flood policy, you may be confused, as many are, about whether the policy is through FEMA or an insurance company. In 1983, the Write Your Own (WYO) Program began and is a cooperative undertaking between the private insurance industry and FEMA. The WYO Program allows participating property and casualty insurance companies to write and service the Standard Flood Insurance Policy in their own names. The companies receive an expense allowance (approx. 30% of premium) for policies written and claims processed, while the federal government retains responsibility for underwriting losses. The WYO Program operates as part of the NFIP and is subject to its rules and regulations.

If you don't have flood insurance, ask your insurance agent for a quote. Make sure that you check the coverages and understand EXACTLY what you are purchasing. If you don't have an insurance agent, then look for one online at the FEMA site. Put in your address and it will give you a local agent. https://www.floodsmart.gov/flood-insurance-provider

PLEASE NOTE— You cannot purchase flood insurance when a named storm is in the Gulf of Mexico. Once purchased, there is a 30 day waiting period before coverage takes effect.

Sign Up for Alerts from The City



Sometimes it is easy to become complacent with weather alerts, but emails, texts, and phone calls sent from the City Alert System can be extremely helpful. If you haven't signed up to receive City alerts, you may do so with AlertHouston. Timely information during emergencies is important. AlertHouston delivers critical information to Houston residents regarding current conditions, expected impacts, and protective actions to keep themselves and their loved ones safe.

These alerts are issued by City of Houston Office of Emergency Management (OEM). Messages are issued for citywide and neighborhood level emergencies. They are sent through email and social media (Facebook, Twitter and Nextdoor). You must opt-in to receive these alerts.

Register for emergency alerts through email, text message, voice call, or mobile app push notification. You may download the Everbridge app free of charge from the Apple or Andoid app store. Most alerts are geo-targeted; subscribers with loved ones around the city may register up to five physical addresses per contact record.

When it Rains in Houston

If you would like to understand Houston's flooding problem, there is a 15 minute film produced back in 1979 that is as timely today as it was 41 years ago. The film is part of the Texas Archive of the Moving Image.



This film, narrated by

actor Carle Bensen, presents Houstonians with a comprehensive look at their city's flood control infrastructure, put in place to deal with the heavy rains typical to the area. Due to natural factors such as a flat, low-lying topography and high clay content in the soil, as well as rapid urbanization, Houston has a history of flooding, and flood control projects, dating back as far as 1908. The film educates viewers about flood control systems in place, discussing strengths and weaknesses of the flood drain, storm sewer, bayou, channel, and pond system. It also recounts the physical and economic damage caused by flooding in the 1970s. the consequence of failure to continue to implement flood control improvements. In the end, the film is a plea to get back to the plan, urging the public to take action by voting on bond and tax allocations for drainage projects, and contacting their public officials to support the issues. Sign up for Flood Gage Warning Alerts


The regional Flood Warning System measures rainfall and monitors water levels in bayous, creeks, and rivers on a real-time basis to inform area residents of potential flooding conditions. This system relies on a network of 250 gage stations that have been strategically placed throughout a Harris and surrounding

counties. Westbury has one of these gages located on the Willow Waterhole Bayou (#445). This information is available at

www.harriscountyfws.org.

You can now sign up for alerts on a specific gages near your home or work. You can receive default rainfall and water level alerts or create custom water alerts.

The Willow Waterhole Bayou at Landsdowne rises quickly and it's imperative for surrounding homeowners to know what is happening. It is important to remember that this gage will likely stay at a certain level (approximately 51-52ft) when flood waters are going over the weirs downstream at the Willow Waterhole detention basins.

Westbury Flood Gage Explained

Westbury has a flood gage located on the Willow Waterhole Bayou at Landsdowne (gage 445). The gage can be accessed here, https://www.harriscountyfws.org/GageDetail/Index/445.

Once the Willow Waterhole Bayou reaches a certain level, the water will overflow the weirs into the basins at the Willow Waterhole complex. The Westbury flood gage (which is upstream of the basins) will read steady at this point, typically around 51.2-51.5ft. It is also at this same level, that the flood control system will show that flooding is possible in Westbury and the news will start reporting it as such. While this is technically true and flooding can happen anywhere, it is important to remember that we have the basins downstream. Watch the gage levels to really know. If the gage holds steady, it is likely water is flowing into the basins not homes. If the gage were to start rising again, flooding would be very likely in Westbury homes. The unknown factor is how full the basins are or will get once it starts raining. There is no gage or camera at the basins.

The gage in Westbury is set to only update when there is a change in water level. If we are in the middle of a rain event and the gage stops updating, while at a level of 51.2-51.5ft, it is likely the water is overflowing the weirs downstream.

Hurricane Preparation Tips

No one likes to hear that there is a possible direct hit of a major hurricane coming, but it is the reality of living so close to the coast. Knowing what to do and having a plan is extremely helpful. There is a chance every year that our storm will come, we just hope not. If a major hurricane is predicted to hit Houston, you need to prepare for the wind and rain during the storm itself and for the aftermath of no power for 2-3 weeks.

Should I stay or should I go now? The first decision ultimately is when to stay and at what point, if ever, do you leave. A longtime hurricane saying is "run from the surge, hide from the wind". If you are medically dependent on electricity and do not have a generator, you need to have a plan for a place to stay during and after the storm. Most residents can stay in their Westbury homes during a major hurricane. You hunker down and prepare for the wind (discussed to the right). Houston residents do not need to be on the roadways as those will be needed for coastal evacuations. The question is: do you stay in your home with no power after the storm, or do you leave town at that point? This decision will help with how you plan for buying food, water, gas, charcoal, etc. Some needs are for the storm itself and others are for the aftermath of no electricity for weeks.

The two lists on this page were created by Westbury residents and are meant to be a helpful guide. There are official hurricane prep lists available on all the major news channels websites, which are also helpful tools to help plan. Be prepared and be safe.



Long-term Hurricane Preparation Tips

- → Keep your trees trimmed. Wind is the biggest threat to Westbury in a major hurricane. Keeping your branches off your home, garage, fences, and power line is important.
- → Buy a portable gas generator. It is easy to get a generator when there isn't a storm aimed straight at us. They quickly become hot items. Plan ahead.
- → Measure your windows and have plywood stored in the garage to place over your windows when needed. Some new windows are hurricane strength but the original Westbury home windows are not.
- → Make a hurricane prep box containing flashlights, batteries, battery operated radio, candle, lighters, matches, etc., so it's already on hand.
- → Save a stash of empty water bottles to fill up for your freezer to make ice or cold water.
- → Copy important documents, place in sealable plastic bag, ready to take with you quickly.

- ☐ Buy gas for your generator if you have one. Fill up any extra tanks.
- ☐ Get extra cash.
- ☐ Make sure to have at least 2 weeks worth of all medicines. Get prescriptions filled if needed.
- ☐ Secure all items outside that can blow in the wind. Move patio furniture inside garage. Move potted plants to secure location. Secure or place your grills inside.
- ☐ Don't forget the kids items. Take off swings from swing set. Flip, disassemble, secure trampolines as they can fly. Lay basketball goals down on sides. Move all toys and bikes inside.
- ☐ Move your trash cans to your garage or secure them very well to a tree or post. Duct tape the lids shut.
- ☐ For major storms, put plywood over your windows. It is not recommended to tape your windows, as this can cause more dangerous shards of glass than if it were to break naturally.
- ☐ Freeze bottles of water to make ice that will extend life of your freezer or refrigerator. Make as many as possible as they can be used in an ice chest as well.
- ☐ Have flashlights and batteries. Buy extra batteries if needed. Having a battery operated lantern for main room or head flashlights for each person are handy. Kids might enjoy glow sticks.
- ☐ Have candles or oil lamps ready
- ☐ Get matches or lighters for candles, grill, or your gas stove.
- ☐ Have a battery operated radio so you can listen to alerts. Some new models have charging ports and special NOAA channel.
- ☐ Buy at least one week's worth of non-perishable foods. Suggested items include peanut butter crackers, bread, muffins, fruit with longer shelf life such as apples and oranges, snack bars, granola, beef jerky, trail mixes, applesauce, fruit cups and canned goods.
- ☐ Ensure you have enough pet food and supplies such as kitty litter for at least 2 weeks.
- ☐ Buy charcoal or propane for your grill so you can cook outside if power goes out.
- ☐ Get extra water. (And wine!)
- ☐ Charge all devices and keep fully charged until power goes out. You can sit in your car later for some AC and charge your phone.
- ☐ Do all laundry. Wash sheets. Start with clean slate to minimize problems with heat and sweat.
- Wash all dishes.
- ☐ Fill bathtub or large buckets with water. If there is no City water available, you can use the stored water in your toilet to flush.
- ☐ Have a secure place in your house already planned and ready with a blanket and pillow and radio/phone. Ideally away from any windows. In many Westbury homes, that is likely your hallway, even if it has no doors, you can shut the individual bedroom doors that have windows so hallway is more secure.
- ☐ If you have kids, have them help with preparations and explain why you are preparing. It helps with anxiety to have a plan and be a part of it. Have them grab a book and a lovey if they have one.
- ☐ Clean storm drains and gutters in front of your home.

Flood Control Advocacy

Flooding is always a hot topic in Houston and Westbury is no stranger to flooding. While it has been several years since our last major flood, the fear and worry every time it rains never ends. Westbury has several areas that are prone to repetitive flooding along the Willow Waterhole Bayou (D-112). The Westbury Civic Club has been advocating for over 50 years for flood control relief in Westbury. With the creation of the Willow Waterhole Detention Basins and the overflow weirs, Westbury has seen some flood relief but more is needed. There are several factors that cause Westbury homes to flood. The Willow Waterhole Bayou does not have enough capacity and the dam in Westbury that doesn't function properly, both of these factors make the bayou rise rapidly. Our City storm drains and outfall pipes are aging and inadequate-sized. In 2015, the City put Westbury on the 5-year CIP plan for a large multi phase Storm Drain Reconstruction project. It will take both Harris County Flood Control (who handles the bayou) and the City (who handles the storm drains and outfall pipes) working together to help alleviate flooding in Westbury.


During the June 15 Westbury Civic Club meeting, representatives on behalf of the Harris County Flood Control District (HCFCD) and the City of Houston Public Works Department provided status updates on studies to identify ways reduce flood damage in the general Westbury area.

HCFCD Study on the Fondren Diversion Channel

HCFCD is doing a Feasibility Study of the "Fondren Diversion Channel", which is also called D-140. See map of the study area. This area is immediately West of Westbury. Storm water is supposed to flow into Brays Bayou via the big manmade Fondren Diversion Channel. The diversion channel was dug decades ago and back then, most of the surrounding land was undeveloped, a big portion being the Fondren Ranch which had the Willow Waterhole Bayou flowing through it as a natural tributary of Brays Bayou.

It was recognized that storm water would need to be handled when the Fondren Ranch land was developed. This was when the natural route of the Willow Waterhole Bayou (in the area upstream of Westbury) was modified to create straight line channels and the diversion channel was dug to route the stormwater directly into Brays Bayou, instead of sending it down the Willow Waterhole Bayou (which also flows into Brays Bayou downstream of Westbury). The work in the Fondren area has always been an issue for Westbury. Homes flooded the 1970s and water coming from Fondren area was blamed. In response, an earthen dam was installed in the Willow Waterhole Bayou (Located at edge of Westbury in Parkwest 3). The dam is meant to force the normal flow of water to make it go to the Fondren Diversion Channel. However, when it rains too much, the water overflows the dam and flows into Westbury streets and back into our part of the bayou.

During the HCFCD Feasibility Study of the D-140 watershed, the engineers are creating mathematical models of how and where the water flows under various conditions. They compare their results to historical information and then adjust the models accordingly. As they get deeper



Harris County voters approved a bond for some project funding for improvements in the D-140 system. After this study is completed, then the next step would be to identify which projects will get action. NOT all projects identified in the study will get selected. It is our hope that Westbury and our dam are identified as a project and then chosen and funded accordingly. It is all a long process, but this study is an important part.

City of Houston Storm Drain Reconstruction Project

Our Westbury streets and storm drains were designed in the late 1950s and early 1960s. If it were installed today, our storm drains would be much larger and outfall pipes would be positioned differently. Ideally when it rains, the rainwater is supposed to flow from our yards into the city street, and down to the stormwater drains, typically located at corners or other low spots in the street. It then flows through pipes to the bayou. In certain storms when the rate of rainfall is high, the storm drains are unable to keep up due to their small size and bad positioning.

The City of Houston Public Works Department is in the preliminary design phase for a street and drainage reconstruction project called Westbury Sub-Project One (SP1). Sub-project 1 is roughly bounded by Chimney Rock, Landsdowne, West Airport, and the Willow Waterhole Bayou. The reconstruction project is for new storm drains, streets, sidewalks and more.

One of the rules that the City must follow is that they are not allowed more water to flow into the Willow Waterhole Bayou than is currently flowing into it, unless there is either larger capacity in the bayou or detention. The City purchased the Springfield Village apartment complex located at the corner of Ludinton and Chimney Rock for detention. This new detention basin would be used to hold any additional water that would occur from building new, larger-capacity street drainage in Sub-project 1. The new detention cannot be built until the remaining residents have been relocated and the buildings torn down. The scope of SP1 includes new stormwater drainage under the street and new streets. Once the preliminary study has been completed, then more funding will be needed to do the detailed engineering and to construct the improvements.





Westbury Town Hall Meeting Deed Restriction Revision

On June 23, the Westbury Civic Club held our first meeting on Deed Restriction Revision. Updating our deed restrictions, while a very long, detailed process, it is necessary for Westbury to remain a desired neighborhood in the City of Houston.

It was a full room to hear our WCC Office Manager, Jennifer Edmondson, give a detailed presentation on what deed restrictions are, why they are important, and why we need to update them in Westbury. This was the first of a series of meetings and surveys to get public input, which is a very important step in the process.

The Westbury Civic Club has reached out to our attorney to help get a better understanding as to what the process will look like and how they recommend we proceed. Our attorney assisted Meyerland in their most recent deed restriction updates.

Westbury has 5,000 homes that are divided into 9 sections with over 30 sets of deed restrictions. The civic club would like to preserve the original intent of the deed restrictions while updating to allow for larger homes and garages, meet the current legal standards and to be able to enforce the deed restrictions better.

The deed restrictions likely be amended on a section by section basis. If you live in Westbury 5 or Parkwest 3, be on the lookout for surveys coming to your mailbox soon.

We plan to have an update at the next WCC board meeting in August and have more Town Hall Meetings after school starts in the Fall.

Catalytic Converter Thefts

Houston City Council approved new rules that crack down on the sale of catalytic converters within city limits. The new ordinance requires more paperwork when someone attempts to sell a catalytic converter. Sellers will now be required to report the make and model of the car, a vehicle identification number, and a copy of the vehicle's title. It also requires the same paperwork if a business, such as an auto repair shop, seeks to sell catalytic converters to other businesses, like scrap metal buyers. In the same vote, council members made it a Class C misdemeanor— the equivalent of a traffic ticket—for an individual or business to possess a catalytic converter that has been cut

However, these thefts are continuing. They are occurring overnight and into the early morning hour, both from vehicles parked on the street as well is in driveways. Trucks, which are higher off the ground, are at greater risk and also Toyota Priuses.

What can you do? Park in your garage, if possible. Install motion sensor lights on your driveway. There are also anti-theft devices available.

The Importance of Safely Storing Firearms

Guns are now the number one leading cause of death among children under 18 nationwide. Many of these tragic incidents are preventable. Safe firearm storage also keeps guns away from criminals, who would steal them and use them to hurt others.

As a community, our goal is to ensure our children stay safe by doing one simple thing, safely storing firearms. In Harris County, approximately 150 children are injured or killed by guns each year.

There are several ways to safely store your guns: a biometric safe, a lock box, or by using a cable lock. You can get a cable lock from the Houston Police Dept. or the Harris County District Attorney's office at no cost with no questions asked.

Firearms are stolen from vehicles regularly. Do not leave guns in the car overnight if they are not secured in a gun safe. Save a life, lock up your guns.

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

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New Traffic Markings on W. Bellfort

Let's Get the Lights Back On!

After an outage is submitted, CenterPoint Energy will then send you a follow-up email once the repair has been completed.

 Click the blue button to report the outage.
- → Locate the streetlight.

Locate the damaged streetlight by entering the address or streetlight number. Another way to locate the outage is by clicking the "Locate me" option using the icon.

- → Click the streetlight that is not working correctly. After you've identified the damaged streetlight, click on the pink circle, which will allow you to report the issue.
- → Enter information about the issue.

You will then be prompted to a drop-down menu with a list of options that allow customers to specify the streetlight issue. If the issue isn't shown on the list, please give a detailed description of the issue in the "Additional Info" box.

→ Interested in receiving confirmation receipts and repair updates?

Submit your information to receive a status update on the streetlight repair. Repairs typically happen within 72 hours of reporting.

Westbury Community Garden owes many thanks to Eagle Scout candidate, Case B., who chose WCG's "Gardening Within Reach" program for his Eagle project.

Case and his crew of fellow scouts, leaders, friends, and family worked hard on dismantling the single row of cinder blocks in bed E7 and E8 and re-building those beds into two-tiered gardens. The lower section is 20" high, perfect for sitting on the border while gardening. The tall section is 34" high – somewhere between table height and counter height – a nice height for standing to plant and weed, while still being able to reach the center of the bed. Each bed had 5 yards of soil added by wheelbarrows and buckets.

Not only did Case plan and execute the build, he raised funds to cover materials for the project as well. He took his fundraising efforts to the next level when he presented his project plans to Johnny Carrabba of Carrabba's Original Family of Restaurants, and obtained a check for the entire \$1200 cost. Westbury Community Garden is grateful to Johnny Carrabba for the generous donation and to Case for giving a convincing project presentation in obtaining the donation and all his hard work.

In Memoriam Dabney Kennedy (1936-2022)

It is with great sadness that we report that a legendary leader in our community, Dabney Kennedy, has passed away. Dabney served as President of the Westbury Civic Club from 1996-1999. He also served as President of the Westbury Area Improvement Corporation and won many awards and accolades for his public service. Dabney spent countless hours working to reduce the threat of flooding in and around Houston, especially in southwest Houston. He helped lead a partnership with the Harris County Flood Control District that led to the development of the 290-acre Willow Waterhole stormwater detention site. He served as an officer for the Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy for over 20 years.



The City of Houston recognized his many volunteer efforts with the naming of the Dabney Kennedy Scout Pavilion at Willow Waterhole, which also paid tribute to his lifetime of work in Scouting. Dabney was honored by some of the highest awards in Scouting - the Silver Buffalo Award in 2021, and he is one of only five recipients of the Order of the Arrow's Lifetime Achievement Award.

Dabney and his wife, Peggy, bought their Westbury home on West Bellfort in the early 1960s and raised two sons. Dabney had a passion for life and for improving things wherever he found himself, whether it was in Scouting, at work, or in his neighborhood. Westbury is a better neighborhood thanks to Dabney Kennedy.



Water Wisely Stage One Drought

Houston has declared a Stage One drought. The restrictions are currently voluntary. The City is asking homeowners to use water wisely to help conserve water. More information is available on the city Public Works website.

- 1. Water at night (between 7PM and 5AM) so less water evaporates while watering.
- 2. Water two days per week. If your house address is an EVEN number, water on Sunday and Thursday. If your house address is an ODD number, water on Wednesday and Saturday.
- 3. Repair water leaks, including dripping faucets and running toilets.
- 4. Make sure that sprinkler systems are not spraying into the street or storm drains.

If you observe water leaks in the city easements, please report them to 311 so that the City can prioritize them for repair. During drought conditions, there may be an increased number of city water leaks as the ground shifts.

WWGC Receives Major Grants

We are very pleased to spread the word that the Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy (WWGC) has recently been awarded 2 major grants by the Brown Foundation and the Cullen Foundation. Thus far, the capital campaign has raised \$9.1 million of its \$12 million goal.

The capital campaign will fund construction of 8 miles of trails around the Willow Waterhole lakes, additional parking, construction of a pier, purchasing additional acreage, and developing a 15-acre native coastal prairie preserve where endangered plants have been identified. Neighborhood connections will also be added to the Greenway hike and bike system via easements. Construction on the trails will begin this summer. This project will completely transform the area and make it a destination for all Houstonians and visitors to our city.

As part of a \$12 million capital campaign to improve the Willow Waterhole, The Brown Foundation, Inc. awarded a \$1.5 million grant to the WWGC on May 20, 2022. The grant will be matched by the Kinder Foundation as part of its lead gift to the campaign. In November 2021, the Kinder Foundation committed \$2 million to improvements with an additional \$2 million on a dollar-for-dollar match basis. Harris County Pct. 1 Commissioner's Office has also allocated \$2.5 million for construction of Willow Waterhole trails.

The Cullen Foundation awarded a \$1 million grant to the WWGC on June 9, 2022. The grant will be used to support Discover Your Greenway: The Campaign to Support Willow Waterhole Greenspace. "We are grateful to The Cullen Foundation Board of Directors for this incredible gift to Willow Waterhole. We are proud that several representatives of The Cullen Foundation toured Willow Waterhole and we were able to share the beauty and potential of the area with them. The Cullen Foundations support will help us transform this space for all Houstonians," said Bill Burhans, President of the Conservancy.

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
