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President's Message

It's early to start a list of things I'm thankful for, but that is how I am feeling this month. I am thankful to live in Houston; and while we'd like a lot more money spent on amenities in Westbury, the alternative to living in a fiscally responsible city is Detroit, which is bankrupt. You will read in the Crier about our Three Minutes with the Mayor, which is a pretty awesome thing; the mayor of the 4th largest city in the United States is willing to spend a Saturday morning making herself available to residents.

Last week Cindy Chapman and I had a great meeting at the WCC office with District K. Our CM Larry Green, Donald Perkins, his chief of staff, and Barbra Hite our constituent representative were present. The Braes Oaks Management District was also in attendance and we thank Executive Director. David Hawes, and Richard Rodriguez, Director of Services, for their time and commitment. We are so lucky to have these talented individuals working with us and for us on the Renaissance of Southwest Houston. We discussed

(what we are calling) the proposed Westbury Flood Protection Plan, which we hope will alleviate the flooding issues we saw in April. In addition to drainage, we talked about parks, streets, deed restrictions, economic development and libraries.

I am thankful for the City Parks department. Its workers make such a difference in our neighborhood. They mow our esplanades and partner with us on tree plantings and other beautification projects. Westbury Park is getting a major renovation. We have several volunteers for the Hager Park committee and are working on what can be done to improve that park; the two biggest problems are litter and graffiti. What do you think about having a splash pad at Hager? If you walk this park, why not take a trash bag along; keeping a park clean goes a long way to stopping litter. We have several residents who walk our esplanades and pick up trash. It takes all of us working together to make a difference.

Street and drainage issues are tougher. Keep calling in

the potholes to 311. Remember it is the squeaky wheel that gets the grease. You might remember reading about the Hummingbird ditch being de-silted; that hasn't happened vet, but Harris County Flood Control has expanded that job to include work on the Braewick ditch and the Willow Waterhole Bayou. This is a step in the right direction. Thanks to all who sent their flooding pictures and stories in from the April flood; if you haven't, please do so as we are completing our data.

Economic development? The Westbury Centerette has recently been sold, but we do not know what the new owner plans. The Braes Oaks Management District is working on Economic Development as is SW Houston 2000 (which is our featured community partner this month). Members of the WCC and residents of Westbury participate with these organizations. There is always room for more volunteers in not only the WCC, but with many of our community partners. Find your passion and make a difference in Westbury!

Three Minutes with the Mayor

The WCC recently took advantage of an opportunity to speak with Mayor Annise Parker via the "Three Minutes with the Mayor" program, which allows citizens to briefly speak with the mayor on a Saturday morning at a convenient location. Cindy Chapman, Becky Edmondson, and Marcia Hartman enjoyed this unique opportunity to speak with Mayor Parker directly and

openly. We thanked the Mayor for bringing singlestream recycling bins to all homes in Westbury. We noted that the Department of Neighborhoods and the Police Department have resolved several long-term problem properties in Westbury and are actively working on other long-term problems. We thanked her for her support of neighborhoods. Becky quickly summarized Westbury's "green initiatives" - recycling, planting trees, the community garden, and future plans for the garden. We brought the three most recent Westbury Crier newsletters, which are good tools to show off accomplishments in the Westbury

community.

We brought a basket of veggies, herbs, and flowers from the Westbury Community Garden, plus a fact sheet about the garden. The basket was a perfect visual display of beautiful, healthy organic food with colorful native flowers plus great-smelling herbs, and it served as a decorative centerpiece on the table when other citizens spoke with the mayor after we finished.

We told Mayor Parker that we are seriously interested in obtaining the seven acres on which the Westbury Community Garden sits and the WCC had hired a

reputable appraiser to appraise the property. She knows we have been in discussions with the Houston Parks Board (a non-profit organization which works to develop new greenspaces and improve existing greenspaces) about the property. She knows that the appraised value is a

sum that we believe is attainable via active and aggressive fundraising.

housing in this part of town, then there are many old or shoddy apartment buildings waiting to be torn down an d then rebuilt.

It was a good visit, and what an incredible opportunity we had to sit down face-to-face with the Mayor of the 4th largest city in the United States and speak about anything.

> What else did we do that morning on behalf of Westbury? We met other neighborhood leaders from District K who were waiting for their turn to speak with the mayor at the Stimler- Blue Ridge library branch and discussed issues we have in common. Since our Meyer Library branch will be replaced in the near future, we took a long time touring the Stimler - Blue Ridge library and talking with the librarians. One of the librarians lives at Westbury Gardens townhomes here in Westbury! We then went exploring to see what amenities were provided at

several Houston or joint Houston/Ft Bend County parks to our south. We scoped out a new Senior Community Center that is under construction near Christa McAuliffe Middle School / Willowridge High School. We drove around and tried to figure out exactly where HPD will be building the new HPD station that will replace the Beechnut station. We marveled at the amount of dirt that has already been removed by the Harris County Flood Control District at Willow Waterhole on the east side of S. Post Oak.

All in all it was a spectacular Saturday!



Unfortunately, the land we lease for the garden is owned by the Houston Housing Authority (HHA), which is an independent organization rather than a city department. But our hope is that she sees the benefits in retaining this land as greenspace, as it has been for more than 30 years, and that adding more apartment units in an area that already has ample units available is unnecessary and wasteful of our federal tax dollars. There are hundreds of vacant. low-income units in the complex adjacent to the garden and there are thousands of vacant apartment units available throughout the Brays Oaks Management District. If the HHA seeks to improve low and moderate income





District K Meeting

District K Councilmember Larry Green visited the WCC office on July 19 with his Chief of Staff Donald Perkins and our Constituent Liaison Barbara Hite in a meeting with WCC President Becky Edmondson and Director of Community Relations Cindy Chapman.

Parks: We discussed our community center, each of our 3 public city parks, plus our 4th "park" (the 7 acres we are leasing from the HHA for the Westbury Community Garden), focusing on current issues and future needs. There was an extensive discussion about Hager Park. We are now recruiting volunteers to serve on a Hager Park committee, and two people have already joined the team. Contact the WCC office if you want to volunteer on the Hager Park Committee.

Transportation: TxDOT will be adding lights and median barriers along South Main. Also, some Westbury streets east of Chimney Rock that have had too many layers of asphalt laid over the years will be scraped down to grade and then overlaid with asphalt. This will improve stormwater capacity of the streets and will make it easier to back out of driveways.

Deed Restrictions: As we have mentioned in prior newsletters, the city earlier this year revised the development ordinance to allow higher density on lots outside Loop 610. At the time, we and other neighborhoods expressed concerns that many homes in Houston either do not have deed restrictions protecting



land use or the deed restrictions have vulnerabilities. We applaud CM Larry Green's staff for reviewing every set of deed restrictions in District K that were sent to them to examine them for specific vulnerabilities. Only one other city councilmember beside CM Larry Green has attempted to do this. The results have been provided to the Planning Department and each neighborhood will soon meet individually with a City Planner to review options to patch the vulnerabilities. Only a few neighborhoods had deed restrictions sufficient to meet all the vulnerabilities reviewed. To fix our vulnerabilities, Westbury deed restrictions will need to be amended. In July, the WCC board authorized hiring an attorney to review legal issues, including amending our

deed restrictions.

Flood Protection: We discussed flood protection issues and where homes flooded in April when 6-8 inches of rain fell in a short period of time. The WCC is preparing a packet of information for the city and county to document observations and data. To help get this issue the attention it needs from the city and county, we are now calling this the Westbury Flood Protection Plan.

We feel so fortunate to have such talented people working for us at District K. **CM Larry Green** tackles problems with the intention to solve

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Water, Water, Water

Save Money on your Water & Sewer Bill

It is almost painful to open the monthly city water bill and see the combined water, sewer, and drainage fees. **The city water and sewer fees went up by 8.9% this year** (3.6% due to the increase in city population + inflation from last year, and the other 5.3% because the original rate increase in 2010 is being implemented over several years instead of all at once). The bill for May 2013 reflected a full month of the rate adjustment enacted in April 2013. For example, the cost of 5,000 gallons of water in May was \$26 and the related cost of sewer was about \$30, with a total cost of \$56 dollars, not including the separate drainage fee which is based upon the amount of impervious surface on your property.

Reducing your water usage saves you money on both water and sewer fees because the sewer fee is based on your water usage.

The city says the annual rate adjustment of your water & sewer fees is intended to cover cost increases to provide safe, clean drinking water and to collect and treat wastewater. This fee includes operational costs as well as the costs involved in the repair and replacement of portions of the System's aging infrastructure.

The City of Houston offers a FREE service to monitor your daily water consumption. The Consumption Awareness Program (CAP) provides consumers with several tools to help better manage their monthly water usage and bill. This program includes weekly customized usage reports, weekly projected bill estimates, and alerts/notifications for high usage. You can sign up for this great program thru your online water account. One resident received a email warning for high water usage that ended up being caused by a faulty sprinkler timer.

Here are some other tips to help you conserve water in your garden. Much of Texas continues to suffer severe drought conditions, so wise use of water saves both money and a precious resource.



Watering Tips for Houston Heat

It's that time of year again – make sure your trees stay healthy during the hot summer months by watering regularly. Here are a few fast tips for summer watering:

- Water in the morning or at night to avoid losing water to evaporation.
- Use a soil soaker or hose to water instead of a sprinkler. This will help water soak slowly and deeply into the soil, reaching the tree's roots.
- Water only when needed. If it rains 1 inch or more in a week, you won't need to water.
- Mulch around trees and shrubs to retain moisture.
- Weed around your plants to reduce competition for water.
- Water trees growing in full sun more often than those growing in partial shade.
- Avoid fertilizing in the summer, as this increases a plant's need for water.
- Watch out when leaves turn lighter green or yellow; this may be a sign of overwatering! (Water oaks leaves may turn yellow if the soil is too alkaline for the tree to absorb certain minerals.)







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By-Laws and Policy Changes

By-Laws & Policies -Update for September Annual Meeting

During July, the WCC By-Laws Committee prepared draft revisions to the by-laws for review by the WCC Board. The proposed revisions were not finalized by the deadline for the August newsletter; however, the final proposed wording will be printed in the September newsletter and will be provided online prior to the September General Meeting. The board also is reviewing the need to institute certain policies required by state law, as well as policies which the state authorizes us to establish, and other policies which document current practices. Here is a summary of proposed revisions, as of our print deadline.

Proposed Policies:

- 1. A policy about open meetings will be implemented as a companion to requirements in the by-laws.
- 2. In accordance with state law, the WCC will implement a Payment Plan Policy, a Records Retention Policy, and a Record Production and Copying Policy. The WCC will also implement a policy to document that Westbury has opted in to a city ordinance regulating Yard Parking.
- 3. The State sometimes regulates how subdivisions can restrict certain activities. The board is considering whether it would be helpful to our residents and future board members to document these items as policies.

The board wants to carefully consider the topic of policies to avoid overly detailed policies or too many policies. The WCC board and office are also considering whether practices exist which should be documented as policy. The board may opt to discuss these at the September meeting to get feedback and then vote on them at a later time.

By-Laws (Proposed Changes as of deadline):

- 1. Open Meetings Add New Section 8.14 to add a requirement to hold open meetings, as required by state law. Create a companion policy with more details about open meetings.
- 2. Meeting Notices Revise section 8.1 to clarify that meeting notices for both regular *and special* meetings are to be published in the Official Publication. Add alternate means of notification allowed by state law mail, email, or website or other internet media.
- 3. Elections & Nominations Change date nominations are due from 1st Thursday to the 2nd Thursday in August. Change month to publish call for nominations from July to August. The board is also considering adding some section director positions.
- 4. Budget Change timing to publish an interim spending report from June to July, so that a half-year report of spending can be published in the newsletter
- 5. Publications Delete references to specific names for our publication or website.



- 6. Amendments to ByLaws—Change deadline to propose by-law amendments from the 1st Thursday to 2nd Thursday, which will match the revised deadline for nominations.
- 7. Special Provisions Replace Section 16.1 with 3 new items intended to provide the WCC board with better flexibility related to current and future greenspaces or other projects. One proposed provision says that the board may improve, beautify and maintain various types of greenspaces and public areas (activities which we have been doing for years). The second proposed provision lists a number of verbs related to real or personal property that the WCC would be authorized to do, for example: acquire, lease, operate, maintain, sell, convey, transfer, dedicate for public use, etc. The third proposed provision would allow the WCC to borrow money, if the board recommends such action.

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

Noisy Animal Complaints

The WCC office frequently receives complaints about animal noise and barking dogs. Director Cindy Chapman attended a presentation in July by HPD Sgt. Mike Hill regarding the revised city noise ordinance. HPD now has created specific codes to identify types of noise complaints made, including animal noise complaints. In addition, HPD has created codes to define how the responding officer closed the complaint – for example, no sound heard by officer. These codes will better help HPD track noise problems.

These tips were suggested when making noise complaints.

- 1. Call the HPD Non-Emergency number at 713-884-3131.
- 2. Request an officer who has been trained in Noise Complaints since patrol officers may not be as experienced in the details.
- 3. When complaining about animal noise, it is advised to have at least two different neighbors (with different addresses) to make a complaint and provide testimony.

New City Ordinance & Library Information

Boardinghouses – New Regulations to Protect Elderly and Disabled

A new city ordinance regulating boardinghouses "group homes" is scheduled to be approved by city council in July. The city defines a boarding house as providing lodging to three or more unrelated people who are elderly or disabled, and which provides light housework or meals or transportation or help self-administering medicines or other services (but does not provide personal care services). At the worst locations, the city has uncovered illegal restraints, abuse, neglect, fraud, and diversion of Social Security and food stamp benefits. You may have seen a case recently reported in the news where four elderly homeless men were discovered locked in a Houston garage with minimal food and facilities in exchange for their social security checks. The men were rescued after a concerned neighbor called police. The new city ordinance will require boardinghouses in the city to register the name and contact information for both owner and operator, to perform criminal background checks, to maintain certain records about their clients and operations, and be required to open their doors for inspections and investigations.

No one knows how many boardinghouses (group homes) are operating in Houston or in Westbury. They are not regulated by the state. The police are aware of about 400 in town, but it is believed that there are many more. District K Councilmember Larry Green has asked all District K neighborhoods to identify known or suspected group homes and boardinghouses and provide the information to his staff. Be a concerned neighbor and help protect the elderly and disabled. If you know or suspect a home in Westbury is operating as a group home or boardinghouse, please call or email the WCC office with the property address and any other information you can provide about the owner or operator or clients. Houston Public Library – Did You Know?

Our Meyer branch library will be replaced with a new building in a new location, as approved by voters in the 2012 city bond election. The location and construction timing have yet to be determined.

Library cards are FREE for Texas residents. Apply in person. Adults need a photo ID. Children need a government ID or birth certificate or an immunization record. Library cards must be renewed in person every 3 years.

Library card users now need a PIN to use a self-check machine or to log in online.

The checkout period has been increased from 2 weeks to 3 weeks. Most items can be renewed once.

Save money by using the library to borrow books, movies, or music. You can borrow materials from any branch or main library and have it delivered to any branch you want. Your kids will LOVE having a huge library of materials to choose from.

The library now offers the ability to borrow downloadable ebooks, audiobooks, or digital videos via the Overdrive Digital Media Catalog. Ebooks and Audiobooks can be checked out for 14 days and videos for 7 days. Save money by borrowing these materials rather than buying. One avid Kindle user on the WCC board saved over \$30 in 2 weeks!

Your Houston library card can be linked to the Harris County library system, allowing you to check out books or ebooks from Harris County, too.

Your library card also allows access to specialized online collections such as genealogical records and online language courses

Visit your local library branch and get a library card.

Obtaining a city construction permit requires your written acknowledgment that the plans comply with vour deed restrictions.

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






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Single Stream Recycling 101

What Items can go in my new recycling cart?

Newspapers, Magazines, Catalogs, Phone Books, Cardboard (flattened), Aluminum and Tin cans (rinsed & drained), Plastic Containers #1-5 and #7 (rinsed & drained), and Glass Bottles & Jars (rinsed & drained)











What Items CANNOT go in my new recycling cart?

Plastic bags, trash bags, items with food on it such as pizza boxes or paper plates, Styrofoam packaging, grass clippings or tree branches. Motor oil cannot be placed inside cart. The City will pick it up when properly placed beside cart in closed screw top container.

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Where can I store my cart?

Out of sight! City of Houston ordinance states that all trash cans must be out of public view. This means you cannot put the cart in front of your garage or house or on your porch. The cans must be in the backyard, in the garage or placed behind something that blocks it such as plants or a trellis. The WCC is having a Hidden Trash Can contest, see page 19 for more details.

When can I put my recycling cart out?

Recycling carts can be placed on the curb starting at 6PM every other Wednesday. Pickup for all of Westbury is every other Thursday. The first pickup for the entire neighborhood was July 25. The next recycling date is August 8. Carts must be removed by 10PM on Thursday.

Where on the curb do I place my recycling cart?

The green recycling cart must be placed at least 3ft away from the regular black trash cart. If your cans are placed directly next to one another the trucks CANNOT pick them up with their claw.

- Pizza boxes and used plates will not be accepted by the recycling center due to possible contamination
- 2. Your recycling cart should be placed out of sight, just like your trash can.
- Glass bottles are accepted in the new recycling carts. They should be rinsed, drained, and empty.
- 4. Plastic bags cannot be placed in your recycling cart. The reason is the bags get caught in the sorting machinery. Styrofoam of any sort is NOT allowed in the recycling carts. All of your recycling can now be mixed together in the single cart.
- 5. Yard trimmings cannot be placed in your recycling cart. They should be placed in biodegradable bags approved by the City of Houston and placed at the curb for trash pickup.
- 6. Large boxes that won't fit in your cart are welcome in the recycling bins at the Platou Community Center located at 11655 Chimney Rock.
- 7. Your recycling cart is for collecting and holding your old phone books, magazines, newspapers, and cans and bottles between recycling days.

- 8. Trash cans must be least three feet apart and three feet from other objects (trees, bushes, fire hydrants) with the handles facing your home.
- Recycling carts out on the curb by 7AM the day of pickup.
- Yes, you can place old motor oil next to your recycling bin and the city will take it. The City will collect up to 3 one gallon screw top containers.
- The recycling program will not accept broken window panes or ceramic pieces do to possible contamination.
- 12. The recycling program accepts plastics that are labeled #1- 5 and #7. You can find these numbers on the bottom of your plastic containers.
- 13. Respecting our recycling program is just a good thing to do. Respecting your neighbors is a great thing to do!
