Constable Program at Risk: More MONEY is URGENTLY Needed

The Westbury Area Patrol (WAP) has helped keep crime down in Westbury for the last 36 years. In 2014, due to the size of our neighborhood, Harris County required us to have a minimum of 4 deputies in our contract. Although this improved our coverage, it also significantly increased our annual cost. The Westbury Civic Club used approximately \$34,500 from the Patrol savings account in both 2014 and 2015 to cover the shortage. We cannot keep doing this year after year. Too few residents are paying for this vital service!

WE NEED AN ADDITIONAL 400 PAYING MEMBERS to support our neighborhood security patrol. If you have already paid, we thank you. Please ask your neighbors to join, if they have not. If you haven't paid, now is the time to do so. All of us are reaping the benefits of having these officers drive through our streets and providing fast response when called.

We have 5,000 homes in Westbury, and if some sections of Westbury are not contributing their fair portion, then the board must decide whether those areas may lose the benefit of the patrol all together. We will be doing an audit in September of each section's participation. If the security of your home and family matters to you, then please make a contribution to the WAP patrol NOW. If you can't pay the full amount of \$285 now, send a donation or divide your contribution over several months. Every dollar helps! It's a matter of neighborhood safety!



Want to be Better Informed about Drainage Issues and Project Brays?

The Brays Bayou Association (BBA) meets the third Monday of each month and their meetings are publicized in the *Crier*. Eric Dargan, Deputy Director of the Streets and Drainage department of the City of Houston Public Works Department, was the speaker at the June 2016 meeting.



This department is responsible for the maintenance and repair of our streets and drainage system. For streets, they do the milling and overlay work like we have seen on many Westbury streets, such as the recent work on Willowbend. They do about 150 miles of streets each year. They also do concrete panel repair, which we have had done on Hillcroft and on some other Westbury streets.

This department is also responsible for repairing potholes. If you recall, Mayor Sylvester Turner placed an emphasis on pothole repairs when he took office in January of this year. As many as 250 calls per day were received by 311 requesting pothole repairs at the beginning of 2016, but now repair requests are down to about 22 calls a day. They expect to repair 60,000 potholes this year.

On the drainage side, this is the department that comes out to check to make sure the storm outlets are draining properly. They are also responsible for the repair and maintenance of the outfall pipes from our storm sewers into the Harris County bayous. If the streets or drainage system need more than repairs or maintenance, then these items are transferred to the Engineering, Construction, and Design division of Public Works as Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) or Rebuild Houston projects.

The August meeting's speaker will be **Steve Costello, the new COH "Flood Czar",** and former Councilmember. Costello will discuss his responsibilities and what the job will entail. The August meeting will be on August 15 at 7:30PM at The Gathering Place, 5310 S. Willow.

New Brays Oak District Board Chair

Westbury is located in the Brays Oaks Management District (BOMD). After serving 12 years on the BOMD board, and 3 years as chairman, Fred Meyers resigned at the July 19, 2016 BOMD board meeting. We thank Fred for his years of service and leadership to the community. Crime is lower and the area looks much better.

We congratulate Ralph Rieger for being elected by the board as new Chair. Ralph is a familiar face in Westbury. He is a resident of Maplewood and owns a small business (Reiger CPA) on Chimney Rock right here in Westbury. Ralph is also President of the Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy, which is an important non-profit organization in the Westbury area. Ralph is also a member of the board of the non-profit Westbury Area Improvement Corporation and a member of Rotary.



City Of Houston Working on Flooding Issues In Westbury

Despite these hot dry days of summer, flooding is still a hot topic for Houstonians. The "Citizen Solutions to Houston Flooding" group hosted a meeting on July 11 at the Jewish Comunity Center with Prof. Phil Bedient of the Rice University SSPEED (Storm) Center with a talk "Urban Flooding- A Disaster in the Making." Dr. Bedient said that the Houston area is naturally prone to flooding due to its dense soils, flat topography, and high rainfall. He noted that the Brays Bayou watershed is now heavily developed with impervious surfaces, and that Sugar Land and The Woodlands require more greenspace and more on-site detention than Houston and Harris County. He notes that the Houston/Harris County area is the only place in the country that he is aware of where responsibility for stormwater drainage is divided between different entities (city does streets and outfalls, and the county does the bayous).

How does replacing bridges along Brays Bayou help? Some will be replaced with higher bridges that will not obstruct the flow and others will be improved by reducing the piers that obstruct flow. Water backs up and gets higher behind obstructions like bridges. In particular, the 288 bridge is very low over Brays Bayou.

Options to help the areas near Brays Bayou that flood? Create new detention lakes upstream (west) of problem areas.

Buy out homes. Increase available detention by using pumps (to allow deeper lakes) instead of gravity flow. New Orleans and Florida both use pumped storage. Use flood walls with sump pumps to protect individual houses.

On July 13, The Center for Houston Future hosted a panel discussion in it's summer salon series "RISING WATER - Dealing with Floods." The three takeaways from this panel, according to the Houston Business Journal, were:

 protect prairieland in the suburbs
 make infrastructure improvements
 encourage individual homeowners to hold more rainwater on their property.

The Brays Oaks Management District (BOMD) Infrastructure Committee met on July 14 to discuss and evaluate the Brays Bayou watershed within the BOMD boundaries. The BOMD has transformed the area by focusing on Public Safety and Environmental and Urban Design issues for these past 10 years. Now, due to the extensive flooding concerns in the Brays watershed, they are again providing leadership and innovation to tackle this problem. The engineer making the presentation noted that this area faces 4 challenges: Subsidence (ground is sinking),

Capacity in the Drainage Channels, Amount of Detention available upstream of problem areas, and old Stormwater drainage sewers that are under-sized based on current designs. The engineer emphasized that it is vital to report problems to 311 because the city prioritizes sewer and drainage projects based on problems reported via 311. This first meeting looked at a variety of items: increasing the detention during the Fondren Road reconstruction project; looking at additional areas of detention; and at subsidence rates.

Representatives from The Westbury Civic Club and Westbury Area Improvement Corporation attend as many of these meetings as possible. Mitigating flooding is a priority of the Westbury Super Neighborhood. On the next page you will find a letter from Mayor Turner on some immediate drainage repairs that are taking place along the Willow Waterhole Bayou. Westbury appreciates this ongoing work and looks forward to the ReBuild projects that are pending. A current local drainage project is underway in Westbury 3 and 4. The map to the left shows which outfalls are being replaced. The picture above is of the work occurring at Willow Waterhole Bayou at Landsdowne.

Letter from the Mayor to Westbury Residents

Re: Westbury Drainage Repairs

Dear Westbury Residents:

I am writing to update you on Public Works and Engineering (PWE) activities related to drainage problems discussed at the April 21, 2016 public engagement meeting in Westbury. Following the meeting, PWE maintenance staff began inspection of drainage systems that outfall to Willow Waterhole Bayou. The complaint of drainage problems came from residents who live along Willow Waterhole Bayou and experience excessive street ponding when the Harris County Flood Control District (HCFCD) channel is not overtopping its banks. PWE engineering staff reached out to Westbury Civic Club representatives, Becky Edmondson and Glenn Robichau, to coordinate a site visit that took place on May 20, 2016. The site visit included members of the community and PWE staff from planning, engineering and maintenance. The storm sewer outfalls for Westbury are located along side lot lines between homes. This type of outfall is notorious for surprise collapses, and resulting drainage problems, because the outfalls are typically hidden behind fences and not accessible for regular maintenance.

The inspection revealed four (4) collapsed outfalls and various other age issues impacting the performance of the drainage system. As a first step, PWE immediately proceeded to develop a plan to expedite design and repair of the outfalls to Willow Waterhole Bayou. Repair plans for the outfall location at Cartegena and Cerritos were transferred to construction on June 6, 2016. There have been some minor issues with acquiring all right-of-entry documents from residents at the other three (3) collapsed outfall locations. Jennifer and Becky Edmondson, of the Westbury Civic Club, readily volunteered to assist the City by contacting the homeowners to explain the need for access. The remaining three (3) repair plans were transferred to construction on June 17, 2016. The construction contractor has mobilized at Cartegena and Cerritos - each location will require approximately 1.5 weeks to complete. All four outfalls should be completed by early August 2016, depending on weather.

PWE is currently inspecting the drainage systems that outfall into the following HCFCD channels (identified by adjacent street): Braewick, Bankside, Atwell (South of Bankside) and Chimney Rock (South of West Bellfort). Data from these inspections started coming in last week. Some minor repairs have been identified due to age issues, but nothing as significant as the four (4) collapsed outfalls to Willow Waterhole Bayou. At the current rate of inspection, I anticipate all field data by the end of June 2016. The additional repair work will be prioritized and move to engineering in early July 2016 with repairs made by October 2016, depending on weather.

Repair of the failed outfalls will greatly improve the current performance of the drainage system for more frequent, less intense rainfall events. However, the maintenance and repair of City of Houston storm sewers will not improve the current level of service of Willow Waterhole Bayou. We will continue to work with the Harris County Flood Control District and our congressional delegation to help finish Project Brays and increase the level of service of Willow Waterhole Bayou.

I thank each and every one of you for helping us accomplish this task at hand!

Message from the WCC Security Director

Each month the WCC Security director gets the crime reports for the preceding 30 days. He made an astonishing discovery when comparing July of 2015 to July of 2016. Single family home crimes are down 56% (12 compared to 27). Crime is down 40% compared to 65 crimes in 2015. Theft is down 23 from 41 in 2015. Westbury is making headway in the fight against crime.

More residents are picking up the phone and calling the Constable Dispatch when they see something suspicious. The advice to "see something, say something" is really making a difference. More residents are taking steps to protect their property by either putting their cars in the garage or by not leaving anything in the car. As more and more homeowners put up surveillance cameras, thieves will be more wary of where they choose to operate. Keep up the good work. Be alert, be aware, and watch out for one another.

We still need MORE funds to cover the costs of our Constable Patrol. We continue to fall short of being able to collect the full cost of that 4th deputy. Security is the biggest cost in the WCC budget each year. PLEASE send in your contribution TODAY.

Meeting with METRO

Sometimes things go wrong. How mistakes are handled makes all the difference. For several years, the non-profit Westbury Area Improvement Corporation (WAIC) has been asking for a bus shelter on the **North** side of West Bellfort at Burdine, where Westbury high school students wait for the afternoon bus. Unfortunately, Metro noted that there are also problems with the bus stop on the south side of West Bellfort and chose to start construction on the south side of West Bellfort - right up against a resident's front walkway!

However, METRO, after being contacted, quickly realized that this was not the desired spot for a bus shelter and returned the residential yard back to its original state.

The WCC and WAIC met with METRO on the NORTH side again to discuss the


possibility of a shelter. The request is currently being assessed. We appreciate METROs quick response repairing the wrong location!

We also discussed the continuing blight at this bus stop due to high grass and trash. The current bus stop is located on a drainage easement which normally gets mowed only a few times per year. METRO mows more often, but does not mow the entire area. During our discussions, the new ownership of the adjoining Westbury Square Apartments offered to start

maintaining the bus stop area; however, we also brought the Brays Oaks Management District (BOMD) into the discussions, and BOMD has agreed to pick up litter and to mow the area on an on-going basis.

During our site meetings with Metro we learned a lot about bus shelters. If METRO agrees to provide a new bus shelter near this location, then it will likely be moved. The current bus stops

(both on the south and north sides) do not comply with the American Disabilities Act (ADA), and any new bus shelter would require compliance with ADA. We looked at the existing crosswalks on both sides of Burdine, and it was apparent that less work would be needed on the east side of Burdine to comply with ADA. Also, the

existing north bus stop is next to two city drainage manholes, and Metro tries not to build shelters on top of city drainage lines. Furthermore, the management of the adjacent Westbury Square Apartments notes that their driveway is blocked by the bus at the current bus stop location, and they would prefer that any future shelter be located so that their driveway is not blocked by a waiting bus. As a result, if a new bus shelter is provided in the future, then it will likely be located in front of the apartment building, which will also provide nice shade for the shelter due to the mature oak trees.

Keep Storm Drains Clean & Clear

If you have a storm drain inlet in the street in front of your home, check it regularly. You should remove any debris including newspapers, twigs and leaves from the grates. Also, look inside and see if you have standing water. If your storm drain is full of water and if has NOT rained recently, report to 311 for storm drain cleaning and maintenance.

Please keep the curb line in front of your house free of leaves by raking and bagging them weekly. It is spring and the oak trees are dropping their leaves, and our storm sewers are filling up with them because some homeowners are not keeping their curbs clean. Remember if you use a yard service to tell them not to blow your leaves or debris out into the street. The debris should be bagged or composted. This will help get the storm water on its way more quickly. It is important for storm water to be able drain freely and as quickly as possible.

The Power of the Precinct Chair

If you have ever wondered what happens at the precinct level, both in the Republican and Democratic parties, then this year has been a good learning opportunity. First, what exactly is a Precinct Chair? A "precinct" is the smallest political subdivision in Texas. Texas counties are divided into precincts, and it is the responsibility of the Precinct Chair to contact, guide, and organize their party's voters in their precinct. A Precinct Chair is a publicly elected party official and is elected by precinct voters in their party primary.

The Democratic Precinct Chairs have had a busy spring and summer. The death of County Commissioner El Franco Lee left a vacancy, not only to fill the current term but also for a space on the November 2016 election ballot. The Democratic Precinct Chairs who represent the voters in that district voted to determine who would have a place on the

ballot instead of EI Franco Lee. On June 25, State Senator Rodney Ellis won the Democratic nomination and will run unopposed in the general November election. He will represent all of Westbury after the election in November. As a result, Ellis had to withdraw from the November ballot in State Senate District 13, which includes part of Westbury. He will be replaced on the ballot by Borris Miles, who was chosen by the Democratic Precinct Chairs of that Senate district on July 16, 2016 to fill that spot on the ballot. Miles will also run unopposed in November.

Now the State Representative seat for House District 146 formerly held by Borris Miles on the ballot is open. These hard-working Precinct Chairs will have the duty to select the Democratic nominee to replace Miles on the November ballot.

These same Precinct Chairs also had to choose candidates for two new Harris County Courts.

We appreciate the hard-work, time, and effort that all of our Precinct Chairs contribute so that the political process works - here in Westbury and across the city and region.

Congratulations Art Pronin

Art Pronin, Westbury resident and president of the Meyerland Area Democrats, was elected at the Texas Democratic Convention to be the male representative from Senate District 17 to the Democratic National Convention. Westbury is blessed to have so many active participants in our political process on both sides of the aisle. We are home to voting precincts with some of the highest voting percentages in Houston.



Community Garden Master Plan Meeting



The first community meeting for the Westbury Community Garden Master Plan was held on June 21. The meeting location was changed on short notice to The Gathering Place on S. Willow due to air conditioning problems at the originally planned venue of Disciples Methodist. In addition to members of the garden and representatives from Westbury, the room was full with garden supporters, including: At-Large CM Mike Knox (who grew up in Westbury), District K Chief-of-Staff Donald Perkins, Veronica Hernandez and Conya Barrera from the Department of Neighborhoods, Richard Rodriguez and Elaine Gaskamp from the Brays Oaks

Management District, Marcy Williams from our neighboring Brays Oaks Super Neighborhood, Gordon Wingate from the Leadership Houston class which built the garden outdoor education pavilion, and Keiji Asakura from Keep Houston Beautiful.

Garden President Viriginia Livingston welcomed everyone to the meeting. Becky Edmondson acknowledged guests of honor in the audience and presented a history of the garden. Then Eric Leshinsky from Asakura-Robinson reviewed the master plan process. His company will be doing the planning and landscape architecture, while EHRA will be doing the civil engineering related to infrastructure and drainage and will prepare engineering documents. Asakura-Robinson will be looking at the landscape, land use, site ecology, community outreach, site programs, and available resources. A SITES certification will be sought for sustainable land design at the site. The SITES program is a new program, partly

developed by the Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center in Austin. So far, there is not a SITES certified location in Houston, so the Westbury Community Garden could be the first place certified in town.

The master plan process will take 5 to 6 months. The project is currently in the "site analysis" stage, and community engagement will be ongoing through the process.

After the overview, every table had a fun time drawing ideas for the garden using maps of the site and crayons. The idea was to encourage creativity and get people thinking about garden needs and possible ideas for the future. The folks from Asakura-Robinson collected all the ideas and will consolidate the ideas for discussion at the next meeting in September.



Garden members Kathy Elder, Wayne Slaikeu, Hazel Potvin, and Cindy Chapman met with Abi and Rebecca from Asakura-Robinson to gather pre-design data for the SITES certification. They gathered soil samples from across the 7 acre site, identified native and invasive plants, and discussed how the site connects to its surroundinas.



Kleaning up Westbury

South Post Oak Gateway

The South Post Oak (SPO) intersection at West Bellfort is not in Westbury, but it is a major gateway to our neighborhood. According to a 2015 traffic count study, about 100,000 cars pass through this intersection every day, and about 70,000 cars pass through the SPO /WIllowbend intersection. The trash situation generated by panhandlers and the trash accumulating on SPO where it joins 610 was overwhelmingly disgusting.

District K, after months of working on this situation, were able to get a massive cleanup of this area done at the end of June. The City of Houston Public Works Street department sent out crews to clean the underpass and the street. It looked amazing! Well, until you got to the "State Maintenance begins" sign, and then the trash was again atrocious. TXDOT (Texas Dept. of Transportation) may have the "Don't Mess with Texas" anti-littering campaign, but this part of Houston is a mess. Requests have been made to TXDOT to get this area cleaned up.
