Hip hip hooray! This month's Crier is full of good news. The best news? The Westbury Community Garden has been saved. After two years of uncertainty, the garden, its gardeners and the community can now breathe a sigh of relief. Our District K Councilmember Larry Green called it "a triumphant victory for the Westbury Community and District K". Our thanks go out to all those who gave of their time, their talent and their money to ensure the continuation of this very important community asset. I had the pleasure of speaking before City Council last month to thank them for supporting Westbury and our community garden. The people are truly the city here in Houston! We will soon be contacting our financial donors to announce the good news and to let them know options for their donations. You can read more about the garden's good news on page 9.

In the September 2012 Westbury Crier, there was also an article about the upcoming HISD bond and what it could mean to Westbury High school. The bond passed, Westbury was

allotted monies and a committee met with architects in August to start the planning process for the Westbury improvements. Under the heading of good news is the new principal, Jason Catchings, and Westbury High School becoming an AP campus. We've secured the garden, now we will work diligently to ensure that Westbury HS becomes the high school our community deserves.

It's been two years since we had a neighborhood general survey. I created a new survey using Survey Monkey and I hope many of you will go online and take a few minutes to answer less than 20 questions. Updates on the Westbury Centerette, Westbury Square and the Metro 90A rail line will be on the agenda, too. And if all that isn't enough, you will meet your new Westbury Civic Club board for 2015!

Westbury Civic Club Policy: Garage Sales

For many years the Westbury Civic Club has had a policy that garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like are not permitted in Westbury. This long-standing policy has been announced in the monthly newsletter many times. In August, the board of directors of the Westbury Civic Club reviewed and approved a policy document regarding these sales to formalize the wording. (See policy in box to the right)

You will notice that the policy focuses on the deed restriction aspect of garage sales – nuisances (parking violations, traffic obstructions, and illegal advertising) and non-residential use of property. Many hundreds of homes in Westbury face major thoroughfares. This poses particular challenges related to parking and traffic if garage sales are conducted. In other Houston neighborhoods, it is sometimes common for homes on major thoroughfares to be used for ongoing sales; indeed, those highly visible homes are sometimes sought after by those who want to run a retail sales business from their home or yard. Over the years the WCC has shut down people selling Easter baskets, Mother's Day flowers, appliances, and other sales from highly visible Westbury yards. The City Legal Department has helped shut down certain garage sale businesses in Westbury.

Both the city and the state have rules which make it illegal to post signs on public right-of-way. These illegal signs are considered to be trash and visual blight. The city, the Brays Oaks Management District, and volunteers in Westbury all collect illegal signs. On Saturday, August 23, WCC volunteers collected more than 25 illegal signs related to garage or estate sales on one of the hottest days of the summer.

Another important consideration regarding garage sales is Crime Prevention. A garage sale allows passersby to know whether you have children and the approximate age of your children. If residents open their garage doors for shade during a garage sale, then they allow passersby to see what is stored in the garage: tools, exercise equipment, and other valuable items. An estate sale or garage sale allows visitors to leisurely examine your security systems and those of those of your neighbors.

Reserve your space for the Fall White **Elephant Sale starting on September 10.**

Don't violate the deed restrictions or be a nuisance to your neighbors. Consider taking part in the next White Elephant Sale on Saturday, October 25. Details are on the next page.



WCC POLICY

Garage Sales, Estate Sales, Yard Sales, and Moving Sales, etc.

Westbury Civic Club Policy: Garage Sales, Estate Sales, Yard Sales, Moving Sales

Purpose: The intent of this policy is to clearly convey the Westbury Civic Club restriction on garage sales, estate sales, yard sales or any other independent action of the kind.

Definition: Garage, Estate, Yard or Moving Sale: The sale of personal property in, at, or upon any residential lot or home. This includes, with limitation, sales of personal property from the garage, driveway, yard, patio or house area of such premises.

Policy: Garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like are not permitted in Westbury.

All sections of Westbury and Parkwest have deed restrictions that state "no noxious or offensive trade or activity shall be carried on upon any lot nor shall anything be done thereon which may be or become an annoyance or nuisance to the neighborhood". Garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like draw substantial traffic and contribute to: hindering the flow of traffic on major thoroughfares; impeding access to homes by emergency vehicles or residents due to parking congestion; parking violations on city streets or esplanades; parking violations from vehicles parked on front yards; and, parking violations from blocking public right-of-way on sidewalks. Furthermore, advertising materials for garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like contribute to: visual blight, trash along public streets, and violations of the city sign ordinance. The Westbury Civic Club considers garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like to be "an annoyance or nuisance to the neighborhood".

All sections of Westbury and Parkwest have deed restrictions that state the lots are to be used for single family or family residential purposes. The Westbury Civic Club considers garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like to be commercial use of residential property.

Do You Need to Have a Garage Sale?

Westbury White Elephant Community Garage Sale is October 25

The Westbury Civic Club (WCC) provides that you purchase your booth space. fall and spring community garage sale events to our members. The Fall White Elephant Sale will be on Saturday, October 25, from 8AM to Noon at Westbury United Methodist Church. The rain date is November 1.

Booth space will go on sale at 8AM on Wednesday, September 10, for individual Westbury residents

ONLY*. The WCC office will be open early at 8AM on September 10 only and close at 2PM. The office will also be open from 5-7PM on September 10 for booth space purchase. Booths may be purchased during normal office hours of 9:30AM to 2:30PM starting on September 11.

You must be a paid current member of the Westbury Civic Club to purchase a booth. This means you must have paid your 2014 WCC membership dues of \$40. If you have not paid your 2014 dues, you may do so at the same time

The booth price for individual Westbury residents will be \$20-\$25. Booths will go on sale to non-residents and non-profit organizations on October 10 if space permits on a first come, first serve basis. The booth price for nonresidents and groups is \$60-65.

The Westbury White Elephant Sale allows residents the opportunity to sell unwanted household items at a highly visible central location with security provided. The WCC provides location, security, bathrooms and publicity for the sale. The Civic Club does NOT provide tables, chairs or shade.

Garage, Estate, yard, moving sales, etc. are not permitted at Westbury residences. See the previous page for the Westbury Garage Sale Policy.

Plan on having a booth at the **Westbury White Elephant Sale!**

*Due to limited space and increased interest by homeowners, only individual homeowners may purchase booth space in September. Non-residents and ALL non-profit organizations and groups (including Westbury resident run) must wait until October 10. Violators of this policy may not be allowed to participate in the current and/or future White Elephant Sales. All non-profit organizations and groups must register under their organization name. No individual may purchase a booth for a group or organization unless doing so under that organization's name.



Our thanks go out to all those who gave of their time, their talent and their money to ensure the continuation of this very important community asset.

The September 2012 Westbury Crier was full of information about the impending crisis with the Houston Housing Authority (HHA) planning to build a 250 unit low income housing complex. In July of 2014, the HHA board voted that the seven acre tract of land "could be put to better use for the public benefit of the community by a transfer to the City of Houston." Later in the same month, Houston City Council approved an ordinance to create a fund to be used for the Houston Housing Authority and the City of Houston to exchange and transfer real property between them.

Upon conveyance of the property, the purchase price that would normally be paid at the closing will instead be credited to a separate credit account established at the City. The Westbury Community Garden parcel is the first transaction. There are still a few more steps involved as the Brays Oaks Management District (BOMD) will lease the property from the city and then the Westbury Area Improvement Corporation (WAIC) will enter into a long term agreement with the BOMD to manage the property and operate the garden.

Council Member Green worked diligently on our behalf. For the past several months, that work was behind the scenes with the City's Economic Development Office and the Parks and Recreation Department on a strategy regarding the acquisition of the land. In addition to Larry Green, we thank all the city council members (esp. Christie, Costello and Bradford) who supported us, State Rep. Borris Miles, Congressman Al Green; David Hawes of the Brays Oaks Management District, the Houston Parks Board, Leadership Houston, Urban Harvest and last but not least Mayor Parker and her staff. Mayor Parker's support of neighborhood initiatives, sustainability and green spaces was crucial.

Good news like this deserves to be celebrated, so we are planning a Celebration of Thanks this fall. In the spring of 2015 we will celebrate the 5th birthday of the Westbury Community Garden. We deeply appreciate the optimism and good cheer displayed by our gardeners and volunteers while the future of the garden site was in discussions. They continued to plant crops, nurture orchards, and to share their knowledge with others. They never gave up hope that the garden would be saved, because they believed that it was worthy of being saved. We will soon be contacting our financial donors to announce the good news and to let them know options for their donations.



WHERE IS THE GARDEN?

The Westbury Community Garden is located at 12581 Dunlap near Hillcroft and South Main (US 90A) in zip code 77035. The intersection of Greencraig and Hillcroft is the intersection closest to the railroad tracks at South Main.

Take Greencraig and follow it around the bend where it turns into Dunlap. The large blue roof of the June Hollingsworth Outdoor Learning Center, built by Leadership Houston, is readily visible.

Road Work In Westbury 1, 2 & 3

Certain streets in Westbury sections 1, 2 and 3 were resurfaced by the City of Houston this summer. The Westbury Civic Club has been in constant talks with the department heads that are overseeing the project. Due to the asphalt being laid directly into the storm drains, all storms drains on the streets that had an asphalt overplay replaced will be cleaned out by the City.

Overlay is not designed to improve or correct drainage issues; it is used to preserve and prolong the life of the road base and provide a smoother riding surface.

New Water Line Installation on Oasis

A new water supply line is being installed on the west side of Oasis Drive replacing the aging water line on the east side. The work is expected to be finished by December. City crews will replaced any sidewalks, driveway aprons, or yards that are damaged by the work.

This water line replacement project has long been needed on this street. Over 15 breaks occurred along this line in the past several years, including several major breaks. One of these breaks was pictured on the front page of the Houston Chronicle recently.

Crime/Security Update by WCC

Sergeant Hernandez of the Westbury Area Patrol Constable program reported at the August WCC Board meeting that crime was down in Westbury. According to Sgt. Hernandez, there had been no reported break-in/burglaries in the previous several weeks.

The Westbury Civic Club would like to remind everyone that Westbury is the 2nd largest neighborhood in Houston with over 5,000 single family homes and approximately 20,000 residents. Given these numbers and the fact that we live among hundreds of apartments and within the City of Houston, our crime is relatively low.

Social media sites such as NextDoor.com can help fight crime but please be aware that having all this information readily available makes it seem as though crime is happening all the time everywhere. There is no crime spree occurring in Westbury at this time. If there is a crime spree, then the Westbury Civic Club will notify residents via the *Westbury Crier*, WCC website and/or Westbury Houston Facebook page.

The Westbury Civic Club never publicizes the exact addresses of crimes, only the block number. This reporting is done to notify neighbors of crime on surrounding streets.

Thank You BOMD!

The August 2014 service report for the Brays Oaks Management District indicates that BOMD litter abatement crew collected trash along 138 miles of city right-of-way during July. During this time, they filled 79 bags of trash and collected 243 illegally posted "bandit signs". Since the beginning of the year they have collected more than 600 bags of trash and almost 2,000 bandit signs.

We appreciate the efforts of BOMD to help keep Westbury (and the rest of the district) clean and beautiful.



Seven Hundred Thirty Days of Silence

Austin put his education at Georgetown Law School on hold, first We do not want Austin to be forgotten. We fervently pray for to fulfill his sense of duty to serve his country, and again to pursue his calling as a journalist. Austin is proud to be the eldest brother, an uncle, an Eagle Scout, a Georgetown University graduate, a Marine Corps veteran, and a widely published freelancer. He respects loyalty, discipline, ambition, courage, and commitment. With his absence, a huge chunk of our life is missing. As his parents, we cannot give ourselves fully to the present because we remain suspended in the day Austin went missing, a day which is now 17,520 hours long.

As we relentlessly pray and work for Austin, we are continually unsettled by disturbing questions about his welfare. What does he eat? Does he see the sky? Is he alone? What challenges is he facing day-to-day? Does he know we are looking for him? How does he mark the time; does he know two years have



passed? In those two years, along with the significant dates on the calendar and the once-in-a-lifetime events dampened by Austin's absence, there are also the small daily moments - joys, challenges, blunders and blessings – which have not been shared and cannot be relived.

him. We continue to do everything we think of to bring our son safely home. We sincerely appreciate each person who has helped and supported us. Words cannot fully express the depth of our gratitude for every bit of every kind of help we have received. Please keep thinking of Austin, please keep searching, and please keep praying for his well-being and safe return.

To those holding Austin, we ask you to treat our son well and return him to us safely and soon. Austin is a man of good character, and his effort to tell the world about what is happening in Syria – from all perspectives – is honorable. We will not give up; we want to see our son safely home. May it be soon, according to God's will.





Houston General Plan

The City of Houston kicked off the process to create a "General Plan for Houston's Future" on July 31 at the United Way. Several hundred people were on hand to hear the vision intended for this historic, initial General Plan.

Mayor Annise Parker addressed the crowd and City Planning Director Patrick Walsh described the process. He encouraged everyone in attendance to get involved. It's estimated that one million people will move to Houston in the next 20 years and a total of 3.5 million people will move into the Greater Houston region. The Houston General Plan that will help guide future decision-making on everything from infrastructure and traffic to neighborhood preservation and access to health care.

Becky Edmondson, co-president of the Westbury Super Neighborhood, attended

as a Stakeholder. We will keep you informed as the process continues. **Process:** The Planning and Development Department will lead the effort to create a general plan, overseen by the Planning Commission, City Council and the Mayor's office. The Planning Department will enlist input from the City's various community sectors including representatives from



businesses, neighborhoods, arts and culture, major institutions and various governing agencies.

The General Planning process will run through the spring of 2015. During this time, the public, professional organizations, community groups and public agencies will have an opportunity to provide input on how the City should develop. There will be opportunities for the public to provide input throughout the project via the project web site and at key milestones.

Once complete, the General Plan will provide for a collective Vision Statement that represents the community's view of its future. It will clearly articulate goals, priorities, and policies upon which to make decisions. The General Plan will be housed online as an interactive web site allowing it to be accessible to all.



WAIC / SN #37/ Update on Southern Crushed Concrete

WAIC: Westbury Area Improvement Corporation

The nonprofit WAIC monthly meeting was held on August 20, 2014.

<u>Southern Crushed Concrete</u>
<u>Environmental Permit Application</u>
The WAIC board APPROVED the resolution shown in the box. Letters will be sent to the Texas Commission of Environmental Quality.

<u>US90A Rail Line</u> – The board APPROVED a motion to "Support going forward with a US90A rail line Environmental Impact Study". The WAIC will send reps to an upcoming METRO board meeting.

Westbury Community Garden – The WAIC will soon be the garden operator instead of the WCC. A motion was APPROVED to purchase a general liability insurance policy. The Fundraising Committee met to discuss issues related to the funds which had been raised to acquire the property.

<u>Parker Elementary</u> – Principal Lori Frodine brought a site plan and discussed the replat request. A variance hearing will be held on Sept 4.

Westbury High School – New Principal Jason Catchings gave an update on WHS conditions. The 9th graders are moving to the main building and the seniors will be in the temporaries. A meeting was held to interview architects for the new school construction. The WAIC board is concerned that HISD is waffling on its promises in 2012 to build a regional athletic facility at WHS.

"Westbury Centerette" Property Replat — The owner of the vacant buildings at the "Westbury Centerette" property near Chimney Rock and West Bellfort submitted a replat request. After obtaining a copy of the proposed site plan, several issues of concern were identified. A 2-week deferral of the replat request was granted so that concerns could be discussed with the property owner.

TCEQ Public Meeting for Southern Crushed Concrete Air Permit Application

Southern Crushed Concrete applied for a permit through the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) to allow concrete batching at its Gasmer location. State Representative Borris Miles facilitated a community meeting by the TCEQ last month at Westbury High School.

Over 200 Wesbtury area residents attended the TCEQ public hearing in which the majority in attendance were in opposition to the permit. Concerns expressed at the public hearing focused on the concrete dust and particulate matter from the batching plant that will negatively affect the public health of nearby residents and possible environmental impacts of dust and water runoff into the adjoining Willow Waterhole.

The public comment deadline was August 25. At press time, the outcome of the request for a contested hearing is unknown. Summer Enrichment Program at Platou Community Center

Nature and Art Summer Enrichment Program

The Friends of Chimney Rock Park and members of the Willow Waterhole Park Conservancy teamed up for a second year to present a Nature Study Program to the 40 children ages 6 to 13 enrolled in the Houston Parks Department Summer Enrichment Program at the Platou Community Center.








WHS - New Emphasis in Advanced Placement (AP) Classes

RePlat for Parker Elementary Land

The Houston Independent School District has made a request to replat the site where Parker Elementary is situated. Currently the school is located on two tracts of land at the intersection of Willowbend and Atwell: one is about 6 acres and the other is about 2.3 acres. See drawing below.

The proposal is to replat all of tract BB and part of AA with a purpose to combine the two tracts to create a single tract reserved for school and related purposes called "HISD Parker Elementary". Additionally, the replat proposal asks to reduce the "Building Line" along Willowbend from the existing 35 feet to 25 feet.

The city will send written notice to all owners of property within 250 feet of the boundary line of the plat and all parcels along or across any street or roadway. The hearing will be held on Sept 4 at 2:30 PM at the City Council Chamber, City Hall Annex. Contact the city Planning Department at 713.837.7701 for additional information.




