President's Message

September is "Emergency Preparedness Month". This issue will focus on our neighborhood's security and safety with articles answering these questions. Are you and your family prepared for an emergency? It makes emergencies a little less stressful when you already have a plan. Will you host or attend a National Night Out party? Knowing your neighbors is one of the best ways to "take a bite out of crime". Why does the Westbury Civic Club contract with Precinct 5? I can't imagine living in a neighborhood that didn't offer the extra peace of mind of having contracted peace officers patrolling my streets, being within minutes of my location, and working to get criminals off our streets.

Thank you to those who answered August's call to please pay the dues for the WCC and Constable Service. Thankfully, enough residents believe that having the Precinct 5 deputies patrolling our streets who can respond within minutes, who we can call with our possible silly suspicions, are important and a vital service that a GOOD neighborhood offers. For over 30 years, Pct. 5 has patrolled our streets. New signs advertising that we are patrolled by Pct. 5 will be installed in January throughout Westbury, after the new Constable is elected. Constable Phil Camus is retiring after many years of service.

Your WCC has been very busy this past month with several new challenges. The first is the threat that Hillcroft could be widened from 4 to 6 lanes; yes, that plan has again cropped back up. You can read about it on page 20 and participate in a

petition drive on www.change.org Within the first 24 hours, about 500 concerned residents had already signed the petition and many left important comments.

Occurring simultaneously was the city release of a Draft Action Plan and a public hearing held to discuss what the city wants to do with \$66 million of Flood Relief money coming in from the federal government (Housing and Urban Development) due to the Memorial and Halloween day floods that plagued Westbury and Meyerland as well as three other areas in Houston. The WCC was hard at work trying to insure that the Westbury homes in harm's way could be helped. Research, meetings, and more went into both of these issues. Cindy Chapman and I met in the Civic Club office with Steve Costello, the City's new Chief Resiliency Officer, to discuss our flood mitigation concerns. It was nice to meet in our office, with our various WCC awards P.S. Our big anniversary celebration will hanging on the walls. Without a viable

Civic Club representing Westbury over the past 60 years, we wouldn't be the neighborhood we are today. I may be holding the flag now, but 36 Presidents came before me and I know there is someone waiting in the wings to succeed me.

Due to the date of our annual meeting and the events at the Willow Waterhole the weekend of September 17, we decided to move the WCC 60th anniversary celebration to October 15. After a hot summer, I hope all of you are looking

forward to events around Westbury during our pleasant fall months. A fishing tournament at the Willow Waterhole looks interesting and fun. The Harvest Moon and Movie event promises to be fun for the whole family.

I would like to invite all of you to the WCC annual meeting, which will be on September 21 at 6PM at Westbury Baptist Church. This is the 60th Annual Meeting of the WCC, and we will have a special seating section for any original residents who can attend. If you are lucky enough to have an original resident on your street, why don't you volunteer to drive them to the meeting. The Westbury Area Patrol constable deputies will be there. Our District K Council Member Larry Green will be there. And we have a special guest speaker this year, Mayor Sylvester Turner!

- Hillcroft expansion threat explained. Motion made and passed: The WCC supports Hillcroft as a four lane major thoroughfare (T4 Classification) through the residential sections from Bissonnet south to US 90A (Main).
- Explanation of the COH Action plan for 2015 Flood Recovery; 2 motions made and passed: 1. The WCC supports additional detention in the D-140 watershed to reduce structural flooding in Westbury along the Willow Waterhole Bayou (D-112) and the Braewick ditches (D-140-05-01 and D-140-05-02) where over 400 homes experienced structural flooding in 2015. 2. The WCC supports local drainage projects along the Willow Waterhole Bayou and Braewick ditches.



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Flooding in Westbury

Steve Costello Speaks to Brays Bayou Association

The Brays Bayou Association (BBA) is a citizen-led organization that seeks to reduce flooding in the Brays Bayou watershed. The August meeting speaker was Steve Costello, the City of Houston "Chief Resiliency Officer," better known as the "Flood Czar". A packed

room heard Costello describe the goals of this new position and what has taken place in the first 90 days of his tenure in this one man department. District K Councilmember Larry Green and District J Councilmember Mike Laster were at the meeting to listen to Costello and also to hear the concerns of their constituents.

The top immediate goal is to complete the federal "Project Brays" quickly by reducing the projected completion date, which is years behind schedule. The challenge is that Harris County Flood Control Department (HCFCD) pays half and the federal

government pays half; however, the federal government does not pay its money upfront. Instead, the federal government waits to reimburse its half of the cost after the work scope has been completed, and even worse, the federal reimbursement payments are often not timely. The Harris County Flood Control District (HCFCD) is currently owed over \$70 million in reimbursement from the federal government. Finding a creative way to help HCFCD fund current projects, while waiting for federal reimbursement, is a priority for the city, since many of those who flood along Brays Bayou are city residents.

When "Project Brays" is complete, there will still be about 1,600 homes in harm's way in the Brays watershed, according to experts. Steve Costello and the city will continue to focus on these homes that will still be in risk by identifying and funding projects to reduce structural flooding as much as possible.

Westbury Flooding

Cindy Chapman and Becky Edmondson, both representing the Westbury Super Neighborhood, had an opportunity to sit down with "Flood Czar" Steve Costello for a meeting to look at the specific flooding issues facing Westbury. "We appreciate the time that Steve took to sit down with us and to look at maps and to discuss ways to mitigate the flooding in Westbury," said Chapman. Edmondson echoed those sentiments and added, "You couldn't ask for a more responsive and accessible City government than the one we have right now. Their time, attention and genuine interest in our issues is most appreciated."

Do I Have to Mow THAT part too??? Did you know that city ordinance requires you to maintain not only your own lot but adjacent property?

City of Houston Municipal Code Section 10-451.10 describes yard maintenance responsibilities. In simplified terms,

- Residents are responsible for maintaining your entire yard within your property boundaries.
- Residents are also responsible for maintaining your yard out to the curbline of the street adjacent to your yard (for example, if your house is on a corner, then maintain out to the curb for both your front and side streets)
- If an adjacent property does not have a curbline (for example, a drainage easement or alley), then residents are responsible for maintaining the adjacent property for 14 feet beyond their property line.

This is why homeowners are responsible for maintaining the area between the sidewalk and the street. While we do not have alleys we do have adjacent easements. A big thank you to all who mow a portion of the utility easements that abut their back or side yards.

Disaster Recovery Federal Funds for 2015 Floods

The City of Houston hosted a public hearing on August 18 to accept public input on their "Action Plan for Disaster Recovery - 2015 Flood Events". The City of Houston will apply for \$66,560,000 in federal funds, related to the declared 2015 federal disasters in Houston from major flooding events. The funds are intended for disaster recovery and reduction.

Houston residents were invited to comment on the draft action plan and to attend the public hearing. Westbury had over 400 homes flood in 2015 (flooding events happened on Memorial Day and on Halloween in 2015). Therefore, it was important for voices from Westbury to participate in the process.

Attending the meeting on behalf of the Westbury area were Becky Edmondson, President of the Westbury Civic Club and co-president of the Westbury Super Neighborhood, and Richard Rodriguez, the BOMD Executive Director. There were about 25 to 30 people who registered to speak at the hearing. Both Rodriguez and Edmondson spoke and their comments are part of the public hearing. District K Councilmember Larry Green asked residents from the Brays neighborhoods to stand and about a half dozen stood, including Westbury resident, Lisa Placke. Another hearing will take place, and then

the City will submit their application in early September 2016 for the federal funds.

In preparation for the public hearing, the non-profit Westbury Area Improvement Corporation (WAIC), the Westbury Civic Club (WCC), and the Westbury Super Neighborhood each approved unanimous motions regarding the proposed Action Plan: (simplified version) to support additional detention along the Fondren diversion channel to help mitigate flooding along the "Braewick Ditch" and the "Willow Waterhole Bayou". Another benefit of this proposed detention is that it would keep more water out of Brays Bayou, thus alleviating the flooding in Meyerland and other subdivisions downstream along Brays Bayou. Additionally, the WCC passed one other resolution: to fund storm water drainage projects in Westbury to replace the outfalls to the Willow Waterhole Bayou and to replace the aging, inadequate, and collapsed storm drains in Westbury.



BOMD Infrastructure Committee


The Brays Oaks Management District (BOMD) has recently formed an Infrastructure Committee, which is using engineering consultants to study flooding issues in the area. The BOMD study has evaluated possible detention areas that would mitigate Westbury, Brays Oaks and Meyerland flooding. The engineering studies will be used to bolster funding requests for specific projects in the Federal Disaster Recover 2015 funds application.

Westbury is included in the Brays Oaks Management District boundaries. Westbury resident Cindy Chapman serves on the board of the BOMD.

WCC Policy on Garage Sales, Estate Sales, Yard Sales, etc.

For many years the Westbury Civic Club has had a policy that garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like are not permitted in Westbury. This long-standing policy has been announced in the monthly newsletter many times. In 2014, the board of directors of the Westbury Civic Club reviewed and approved a policy document regarding these sales to formalize the wording. (See policy in box to the right)

You will notice that the policy focuses on the deed restriction aspect of garage sales – nuisances (parking violations, traffic obstructions, and illegal advertising) and non-residential use of property. Many hundreds of homes in Westbury face major thoroughfares. This poses particular challenges related to parking and traffic if garage sales are conducted. In other Houston neighborhoods, it is sometimes common for homes on major thoroughfares to be used for ongoing sales; indeed, those highly visible homes are sometimes sought after by those who want to run a retail sales business from their home or yard. Over the years the WCC has shut down people selling Easter baskets, Mother's Day flowers, appliances, and other sales from highly visible Westbury yards. The City Legal Department has helped shut down certain garage sale businesses in Westbury.

Both the city and the state have rules which make it illegal to post signs on public right-of-way. These illegal signs are considered to be trash and visual blight. The city, the Brays Oaks Management District, and volunteers in Westbury all collect illegal signs. Last month WCC volunteers collected more than 30 illegal signs related to garage or estate sales.

Another important consideration regarding garage sales is Crime Prevention. A garage sale allows passersby to know whether you have children and the approximate age of your children. If residents open their garage doors for shade during a garage sale, then they allow passers by to see what is stored in the garage: tools, exercise equipment, and other valuable items. An estate sale or garage sale allows visitors to leisurely examine your security systems and those of those of your neighbors.

Reserve your space for the Fall White Elephant Sale, starting on September 14.

Don't violate the deed restrictions or be a nuisance to your neighbors. Consider taking part in the next White Elephant Sale on Saturday, November 5. Details are on the next page.



WCC POLICY

Garage Sales, Estate Sales, Yard Sales, and Moving Sales, etc.

Westbury Civic Club Policy: Garage Sales, Estate Sales, Yard Sales, Moving Sales

Purpose: The intent of this policy is to clearly convey the Westbury Civic Club restriction on garage sales, estate sales, yard sales or any other independent action of the kind.

Definition: Garage, Estate, Yard or Moving Sale: The sale of personal property in, at, or upon any residential lot or home. This includes, with limitation, sales of personal property from the garage, driveway, yard, patio or house area of such premises.

Policy: Garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like are not permitted in Westbury.

All sections of Westbury and Parkwest have deed restrictions that state "no noxious or offensive trade or activity shall be carried on upon any lot nor shall anything be done thereon which may be or become an annoyance or nuisance to the neighborhood". Garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like draw substantial traffic and contribute to: hindering the flow of traffic on major thoroughfares; impeding access to homes by emergency vehicles or residents due to parking congestion; parking violations on city streets or esplanades; parking violations from vehicles parked on front yards; and, parking violations from blocking public right-of-way on sidewalks. Furthermore, advertising materials for garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like contribute to: visual blight, trash along public streets, and violations of the city sign ordinance. The Westbury Civic Club considers garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like to be "an annoyance or nuisance to the neighborhood".

All sections of Westbury and Parkwest have deed restrictions that state the lots are to be used for single family or family residential purposes. The Westbury Civic Club considers garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like to be commercial use of residential property.

Shell Gasmer Research Facility Questions

On July 17, 2016 the Houston Chronicle published a front-page feature article about reactive chemicals in the Houston area and mentioned the Shell Gasmer facility. James Menotti, Site Manager of the Shell Gasmer facility, has answered the questions that the WCC asked. Basically, the answer is - the chemical that was mentioned in the article is NOT used at the Shell site now.

Here is the pertinent information in the Houston Chronicle article: "The Shell Gasmer Prototype Facility, less than 2,000 feet from Westbury High and adjacent to Willow Waterhole Park, houses up to 50,000 pounds of potassium nitrate, used in fertilizers and a key part of black gunpowder. When combined with a reducing agent, it can explode. Like cumene peroxide, it can explode if it's heated or shocked. But, potassium nitrate didn't make the EPA's list. Shell Gasmer, like most other facilities, didn't respond to questions about its safety precautions."

Here is the Response from Shell Gasmer \implies Site Manager, James Menotti.

"Shell Gasmer Prototype Facility commonly conducts pilot-scale research, development, test and evaluation work for oil and gas technologies. At times various chemicals are acquired and disposed of as part of regular business

and Department of Homeland Security (DHS). Environmental Protection Agency and additional Shell standard safety protocols are followed for tests, projects and experiments. There is currently no potassium nitrate onsite.

Shell Gasmer has a strict dedication to safety of people and the environment throughout its operations and remains committed to an honest and open dialogue with its neighbors."

Here are his answers to several questions that the WCC relayed from area residents.

- Is it used at the Shall Gasmer facility? We do not have these chemicals on site anymore.
- What do they process there? Processes are limited to small pilot plant testing, These tests are conducted for experimental analysis, not to create any useable products.
- What do they store there? Shell Gasmer is not a storage facility.
- ⇒ Is that place abandoned? It looks vacant. No, it is an active facility.
- Did they replace it with something similar, but a different name? No.

Crime in Westbury

A break-in occurred in Westbury on a Friday afternoon in August at about 1 PM. The thieves kicked in the back door. The home had an alarm that worked. The alarm company called HPD. The alarm certificate had expired and HPD did not respond until the homeowner made it home about 20 minutes later and called to report the break-in. An hour later HPD arrived.

The thieves took the usual things that they can carry away. Laptops, Play Stations, jewelry and whatever else they find quickly rifling through likely treasure filled drawers. HPD says if you have serial numbers or if your items are etched, they can check with pawn shops.

Here are a few takeaways:

- If you have an alarm, be sure your City of Houston alarm certificate is up to date.
- If you have an alarm and participate in the Westbury Area Patrol (pay money to support the Constables), have your alarm company call the Constables before they call HPD
- Record serial numbers. Have your belongings etched with numbers. This FREE service is available through our Pct. 5 Constable Service.
- Be sure your electronic devices are set so that they can be located if stolen.

September is National Preparedness Month: Are you prepared?

What if your home intruder alarm suddenly sounds in the middle of the night? What if you come home and find a break-in? Do you have the phone numbers you need handy? Are these numbers programmed in your phone? In your family's phones? If you have an alarm do the people in your home know how to hit the panic button?

"What's the difference between a police officer, a sheriff, and a constable?" The short answer is the uniform. The State of Texas makes no distinction between them. In fact, when defining who is a peace officer the state identifies sheriffs, constables, marshals, and police officers in that order. Besides organizational structure and some added duties, such as maintaining the county jail and serving court orders, there is no difference between them.

A longer answer is that the sheriff's department works in unincorporated parts of the county, not in the city limits. All three of these peace officers have arrest powers. unlike many private security guards.

Westbury Area Patrol Pct 5 Constables

Why did Westbury choose the Constable Patrol program? Back in 1980 when crime was on the rise and HPD response times were going up, neighborhoods began looking at ways to make the neighborhood safer. Parkwest 2 had the first contract for one deputy. The rest of Westbury saw the benefits and the program was expanded to include all of Westbury. Currently, Precinct 5 maintains 49 contracts, made up of 103 contracting neighborhoods and businesses. Our neighbors in Maplewood South/North, Meyerland and Marilyn Estates all contract with Precinct 5. Another advantage of this program is that criminals don't know where our neighborhood boundaries are and travel freely though our single family residential streets. With Pct. 5 patrolling in our adjoining neighborhoods, the sharing of criminal activity information has resulted in many arrests. Today, almost every desirable subdivision in Houston has a patrol service of some type. To the west of us, Constable Pct. 7 patrols the neighborhoods of the Fondren area. Pct. 1 patrols Braeswood Place and the museum area neighborhoods.

What do we get? The Precinct 5 Contract Patrol Program is designed to provide a highly visible, pro-active, crime prevention patrol function. The main objectives of this program are crime prevention and immediate police services to citizens in need.

How is this different from traditional police services? Typically, law enforcement agencies do not concentrate patrol efforts in a single area, units are spread out over larger districts. When a call for service comes in, the responding officer could very well be a considerable distance away. The officer may or may not be familiar with the area, more than likely has never met the complainant, and after completing the call will return to patrolling a district, often having no further connection to the call or complainant. In Westbury we have three assigned deputies and a sergeant (total number of contracted constable patrol officers is 4 for Westbury), who with few exceptions, such as assisting with nearby calls when needed, remain in our assigned contract area for their entire shift. This type of patrol offers several benefits that traditional patrols most often cannot match.

How does the Westbury Civic Club pay for the Precinct 5 constable contract?

Through monies collected from the residents of Westbury. All monies paid for the Constable service are used only for that program. The cost for the 4 officers in our contract for 2016 is \$316,925. We made a plea last month, as we do almost every August, as a reminder to residents to pay their dues. We thank those who answered the call. We have collected \$254,288 through June of 2016 and July and August brought in approximately another \$30,000. We will be fine this year due to our savings. In the years that we dropped from 4 to 3 deputies, we collected monies for about 3 and half deputies. Now that we are back to 4 deputies we are still collecting at that little-less-than-4 rate. However, to be good financial stewards of the security funds, it is desirable to raise enough money each year to be able to pay for that year's security costs. However, if we have to keep dipping into our security reserve funds to pay for the constable program, then eventually we will not have a reserve fund.



The WCC dues of \$50.00 go towards: greenspace (including a monthly maintenance contract for mowing and plantings); rent for the office and associated expenses of having an office space; deed restriction enforcement and legal fees, paying a part-time employee; some activities and programs; and insurance. Lastly, the advertising in the *Crier* pays for all the costs associated with the newsletter (printing, distribution, and the labor of the WCC Office Manager who puts the *Crier* together).

Parker Elementary School 2012 Bond Project Advisory Team (PAT) Meeting

The 32nd meeting of the Bond Project Advisory Team (PAT) for Parker Elementary met in August 2016. The purpose of the meeting was to review the status of the project and the finish boards for the project. Mr. Patrick Bridges, the project manager for Patriot Contracting, LLC, the general contractor constructing the new school, was introduced to the team.

Weather has been the biggest factor in the progress of the construction project. The building pad and pier foundations are complete. Work on the grade beams and under-slab utilities has started. Added rain will mean five days to dry out the building pad before large equipment can be put to work. The construction phase retention basin has been completed, and the storm connection to the street completed. The contractor's next goal is to get the bus lane paved, which will require about two weeks of dry weather to finish. The paving of the bus lane will allow concrete pumping equipment access to place the concrete slab.

Safety is the primary concern on the jobsite. The entire site is a hard hat zone and is not open to the public.

August 2017 is the expected completion and move in date!

Hillcroft Expansion

Hillcroft Expansion Back on the Books

A meeting was held on August 10, by concerned citizens that live in neighborhoods along HILLCROFT to discuss the Hillcroft Reconstruction Project (CIP#N-1000012). This project is to reconstruct Hillcroft and improve drainage between Beechnut and Bissonnet, 2 great and necessary improvements.

However, because the Major Thoroughfare and Freeway Plan (MTFP) that the City produces has Hillcroft classified as a principal thoroughfare (P-6) these improvements are being designed with Hillcroft being expanded to six (6) lanes.

Residents at the poorly attended Public Works July meeting were told this six lane expansion would eventually extend all the way to S. Main (Hwy 90) and even to Beltway 8. This news was the catalyst that over 400 trees and hundreds of shrubs brought together residents from Robindell/Braeburn Terrace, Meyerland, Maplewood, Maplewood South/North and Westbury to voice their concerns over this proposed principal thoroughfare through our residential neighborhoods. This expansion issue came up in 2004 and again in 2007 and then District C CM Anne Clutterbuck supported keeping Hillcroft a 4 lane thoroughfare. We were all surprised to be facing this issue yet again.

The good news is that we will all be working together to protect our neighborhoods quality of life.

Reasons for street reclassification

We believe Hillcroft should be reclassified from a Principal thoroughfare (6 lanes) to a Major thoroughfare (4 lanes).

*Six lanes are more dangerous. Vehicles will go faster and have more opportunities to change lanes. With a 50% increase in lanes (from four to six) it will be much more difficult to cross as a pedestrian, as a neighborhood bicyclist, or as a car trying to make a left turn out of a subdivision.

*Over 200 homes front Hillcroft and have driveways that exit into Hillcroft. There are 200 between Willowbend and South Main. Hillcroft is a residential street.

*Six lanes will travel even faster than the current 4. Speeding is already a problem. In the last 12 months in Westbury in the short stretch from W. Bellfort to Ludington there have been 4 traffic fatalities; 3 in two separate single car accidents and a pedestrian.

*Six lanes will be louder. These are residential neighborhoods. This is a concrete road. Concrete is LOUD, and you propose to increase it by 50%.

*Six lanes will destroy a beautiful esplanade through beautiful neighborhoods. At a minimum there are and flowers planted through the sweat equity, design work, and money from Westbury and its residents as well as through city matching grants. More than one project on Hillcroft has received a Keep Houston Beautiful award.

*Six lanes will add to our flooding woes by destroying our esplanades and removing trees. These neighborhoods all have severe flooding issues. Homes along Hillcroft experience structural flooding. Greenspace absorbs water and the hundreds of mature trees on our esplanades hold water. Adding more concrete and removing greenspace is a just bad idea.

*Six lanes aren't needed. The 4-lanes are currently adequate based on existing traffic volumes ranging between 15,000 and 17.000 Average Daily Traffic between Willowbend and South Main St. With the adoption of the Complete Streets Policy, the City says they no longer build roadway just based on the MTFP number-of-lanes classification. But here we are faced again with the six lane threat.



What is the Westbury Civic Club doing? As soon as we heard that expansion was planned, we emailed District K. They corresponded with Planning and hopefully

will ask for an amendment to the MTFP next year to reclassify Hillcroft through our residential neighborhood in K from a principal street to a major thoroughfare.

Hillcroft is not a principal thoroughfare and for the most part the only people travelling on Hillcroft are people who live in or near here. For people further afield, Hillcroft will never be the easiest or preferred route to US59 or the Westpark Tollway or 610. We support Fondren and South Post Oak (SPO) as our principal north/ south thoroughfares.

We are also working closely with all the neighboring subdivisions to the north of us. Together we represent 10,000 single family homes that do not want to see our residential neighborhoods destroyed.

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Keeping Westbury Beautiful

Have you noticed how much trash and litter are on our city streets, freeways, esplanades, and parks?

Becky Edmondson attended and represented District K at the Houston Clean City Commission annual meeting for Keep Houston Beautiful. They talked trash, education, and beautification. She thanked her fellow Commissioner from Txdot for the cleanup on the 610 entrance from South Post Oak, and showed him a few recent pictures of the accumulating trash. He said he would report it. Trash on our roads and freeways is a continual problem all over the city. Millions of tax payers' dollars are spent cleaning up litter on our streets, esplanades, and parks.

What can we do to make a difference in this trashy problem? Maybe we can't fix some adults, but maybe we can fix the next generation. For those of you with kids, take them to a park with a sack and teach them what happens when you litter. Try "Take 5". It's a game a friend of mine plays where her kids grab 5 pieces of trash from the parks they visit as they leave.

Her kids no longer turn a blind eye to litter, and I'm pretty sure they will never grow up to be litterers!

What can you do when you see someone littering? I watched a woman throw a cup and then her fast food wrapper right out onto South Post Oak. Another woman on Hillcroft dropped the entire McDonald's bag out into the street! No need to confront these trashy folks. Txdot has a great app called Litterer. https:// itunes.apple.com/us/app/litterer/ id882082348. When you see litter thrown or flying out of a vehicle, intentionally or accidentally, take down the following information—license plate number, make and color of vehicle, date and time, location, who tossed the litter, and what was tossed---- right into the Report a Litterer app. TxDot compares the information through the Department of Motor Vehicles registration database, and when an exact match is located, they send the litterer a "Don't Mess with Texas" litterbag along with a letter reminding them to keep their trash off of our roads.

"What do you do to try to keep your corner of Houston a little cleaner or greener or more beautiful?" was a question posed on social media? "I take a bag when I walk my dog". "I take a bag when I walk." "I pick up bandit signs form the esplanades." "I

teach my children/ grandchildren by example."

Where would we be without all of you walking our streets, parks and even esplanades picking up trash? Living in a much trashier neighborhood! Thanks to all of you who Keep Westbury Beautiful and litter free!



Keep Storm Drains Clean & Clear

If you have a storm drain inlet in the street in front of your home, check it regularly. You should remove any debris including newspapers, twigs and leaves from the grates. Also, look inside and see if you have standing water. If your storm drain is full of water and if has NOT rained recently, report to 311 for storm drain cleaning and maintenance.

Please keep the curb line in front of your house free of leaves by raking and bagging them weekly. It is Fall and the trees will be loosing their leaves soon. Our storm sewers are filling up with them because some homeowners are not keeping their curbs clean. Remember if you use a yard service to tell them not to blow your leaves or debris out into the street. The debris should be bagged or composted. This will help get the storm water on its way more quickly. It is important for storm water to be able drain freely and as quickly as possible.



Glass recycling is available in Westbury, thanks to a partnership with the city of Houston's Solid Waste department and Strategic Materials. Strategic Materials (SMI) is working with industry partners and local communities to cover the cost of glass recycling drop off boxes at a total of ten locations throughout Houston with the goal of continuing to expand the program.

The container is in the parking lot of the Westbury United Methodist Church located at 5200 Willowbend. Access from Cedarhurst is always open. The gate on W. Bellfort is sometimes closed. Bring your CLEAN glass jars and bottles only (no lids or other materials, glass ONLY). The goal is to fill the container each week!

Eagle Scout Project at Willow Waterhole

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


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
