A Message from the Westbury Civic Club President

Though Houston's summer temperatures will continue to soar for a while, it's back to school time. This means school zone rules will be enforced and there will be more traffic on our streets. In this *Crier*, you'll read about the two new traffic speed trailers that HPD has and will use around the Southwest division. When the Captain asked me where to place them, I said, "really everywhere...Willowbend, Hillcroft, W. Bellfort, Chimney Rock...We have speeding concerns throughout the neighborhood".

Many of us do not have children who attend HISD schools, but ALL of us as property owners pay HISD a big chunk of tax money. Of the annual property tax bill you pay, almost 50% goes to HISD while only about 23% goes to the City. Both HISD Trustee positions that represent Westbury, V and IX, are on the ballot this November. Watch for an opportunity to hear from the candidates. It does matter who represents us. I hear people ask, "What the City does with my tax dollars?" I think we really ought to be asking the bigger question: "What does HISD do with our tax dollars?" Come hear Trustee Wanda Adams, HISD School Board President, speak at the WCC Annual Meeting on September 27. Trustee Adams helped secure additional bond money for Westbury High School for a much needed Fine Arts Wing.

Cindy Chapman, Marcia Hartman, and I were invited to the Westbury High School "Back to School Bash" and it was really gratifying to see the good things happening at the school. Principal

Monaghan and her staff have taken Westbury High School off the improvement required list and even earned it a distinction star. You could feel the difference as hundreds of students, and faculty, and administrators enjoyed one another's company. The feeder elementary and middle schools were on hand and they, too, were excited about the upcoming school year. If you have some free time, I would strongly urge you to volunteer in one of our public schools.

The Civic Club's Annual Meeting will be September 27. A Meet & Greet at 6PM and speakers starting at 7PM in the Westbury Baptist Game Room. Please mark your calendars and spend a few hours in support of your neighborhood. Many of those who represent us will be there. Let's show them that Westbury cares. There will be food and door prizes! Thanks to all the returning board members and to the new ones that have stepped up. 2018 is going to be a great year!

One exciting thing this past month was two neighboring SuperNeighborhoods have organized. Twelve years ago Westbury became a recognized Super Neighborhood thanks to help from Donald Perkins and the ladies from the Brays Oaks Super Neighborhood: Barbra Hite, Elaine Gaskamp, Ruth Hurst, and Marcy Williams. I like to think Westbury paid that debt forward by encouraging the Greater Meyerland and Near Southwest SuperNeighborhoods to activate their boards. There is strength in numbers and in multi-neighborhood efforts. We look

forward to working with our neighbors to give all of us the best quality of life possible here in Southwest Houston. Read more about SuperNeighborhoods on page 13.

I think Public Safety tops everyone's quality of life list. It's why for over 30 years residents of Westbury have supported the Precinct 5 Patrol. Thanks to the Security Committee we had two great public safety forums last month. Lt. Hutter from Pct. 5 hosted a personal safety meeting. HPD's Stephen David gave the "HPD Active Shooter presentation". Both of these contained excellent information. The Westbury HPD storefront will again soon be staffed with a civilian. The WCC continues to work with the officers and Sergeant. The new Southwest police station is set to open in October. We will have more on this in the October Crier.

Having social spaces is also important to the quality of life in neighborhoods. Both the Westbury Community Garden and the Willow Waterhole continue to have events. These two green spaces have definitely changed the fabric of Westbury. Now if we could just do something with Westbury Square... What do you want to see there? 

Protecting Hillcroft as 4-Lane Road in Westbury 2017 MTFP Amendment APPROVED

The Westbury Civic Club is pleased to announce that the amendment, created by District K CM Larry Green to the MTFP (Major Thoroughfare and Freeway Plan), to permanently change Hillcroft through Westbury from a 6-lane designation to a 4-lane designation was approved by the Houston Planning Commission in August.

The threat of Hillcroft being expanded to 6-lanes is not new to long time Westbury residents. It resurfaced most recently last fall. The proposed widening was front page news in the 2016 September Crier. The idea had already been defeated years earlier, but came back like a horror film monster. We needed a solution to protect our neighborhood's roadways, esplanades and residences. The 2017 MTFP Amendment is our solution.

A huge thank you to everyone who wrote letters and signed our petition at change.org. Can you imagine what it would have been like for those 200 homes whose driveways enter directly on Hillcroft? Can you imagine a 6-lane major thoroughfare instead of our nice wide green esplanades? You will have a chance to thank Larry Green and his staff at the annual meeting. And you will have a chance to hear about plans for a linear park on Hillcroft. Check out the photos to the right for some ideas.

West Airport Waterline Project Delay

Here is an update direct from District K.

"It came to our attention last week from the City of Houston Public Works Dept. that this waterline project has hit a few snags that took a significant amount of time to correct. However, the council office has been assured that the assigned contractor's issues have been resolved and the work is progressing. Regrettably, the original completion date was April 2017. The revised date has been pushed back to late this Fall and it will take a couple of months to fully complete this project.

The District K office sincerely apologizes for the inconveniences you and your Westbury neighbors are experiencing with this delayed project. Rest assured, CM Green is committed to coordinate with the PWE Dept. to move this infrastructure rehabilitation job along with haste. Note that the assigned contractor is responsible for maintaining the esplanades, sidewalks, curbs, and street back to its original state before the project began."

Barbara Hite from the District K office will continue to monitor this waterline project to its completion.

Brays Bayou Association Flood Forum

September 19, 7:30PM **Willow Meadows Baptist Church**

Steve Costello, Chief Resilience Officer, sometimes referred to as the Flood Czar for the City of Houston, and Russ Poppe, Executive Director of the Harris County Flood Control District, will discuss how the city, county and other entities work together towards achieving the goal of reducing the risk of flooding in the Brays Bayou Watershed. They will address the misconceptions regarding the coordination between the city/county and the effects one project might have on another. There will be updates on Project Brays and possible future flood risk reduction opportunities for SW Houston.

There will also be additional information regarding the impact and forecast for the Real Estate market; the status of elevation grants in Meyerland and conditional flood plain maps and insurance rates. There will be a question and answer session.

This event was previously scheduled for June but had to be cancelled due to Tropical Storm Cindy. If you have any concerns or doubts about flooding or drainage issues, this is the opportunity to have them addressed!

Meeting is hosted by the Brays Bayou Association and the communities of the Brays Bayou watershed. The meeting will be held on September 19 at 7:30 PM. Location is Willow Meadows Baptist Church at 4300 W Bellfort.

All positions this year for the WCC Board are UNCONTESTED. As a result, in accordance with the WCC bylaws, no ballot needs to be mailed and no vote needs to be taken. Those persons in uncontested races are considered elected on the date of the Annual WCC meeting. The names of candidates are listed to the left.

Any remaining vacancies on the board will be filled by vote of the WCC Board, from qualified members who express interest in published vacancies, at the next regular board meeting (October 2017 or hereafter).

Garage Sales in Westbury...Explained

For many years the Westbury Civic Club has had a policy that garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like are not permitted in Westbury. This long-standing policy has been announced in the monthly newsletter many times. In 2014, the board of directors of the Westbury Civic Club reviewed and approved a policy document regarding these sales to formalize the wording. (See policy in box to the right)

You will notice that the policy focuses on the deed restriction aspect of garage sales – nuisances (parking violations, traffic obstructions, and illegal advertising) and non-residential use of property. Many hundreds of homes in Westbury face major thoroughfares. This poses particular challenges related to parking and traffic if garage sales are conducted. In other Houston neighborhoods, it is sometimes common for homes on major thoroughfares to be used for ongoing sales; indeed, those highly visible homes are sometimes sought after by those who want to run a retail sales business from their home or yard. Over the years the WCC has shut down people selling Easter baskets, Mother's Day flowers, appliances, and other sales from highly visible Westbury yards. The City Legal Department has helped shut down certain garage sale businesses in Westbury.

Both the city and the state have rules which make it illegal to post signs on public right-of-way. These illegal signs are considered to be trash and visual blight. The city, the Brays Oaks Management District, and volunteers in Westbury all collect illegal signs. Last month WCC volunteers collected more than 30 illegal signs related to garage or estate sales.

Another important consideration regarding garage sales is Crime Prevention. A garage sale allows passersby to know whether you have children and the approximate age of your children. If residents open their garage doors for shade during a garage sale, then they allow passersby to see what is stored in the garage: tools, exercise equipment, and other valuable items. An estate sale or garage sale allows visitors to leisurely examine your security systems and those of those of your neighbors.

Reserve your space for the 2017 Fall White Elephant Sale, starting on September 19.

Don't violate the deed restrictions or be a nuisance to your neighbors. Consider taking part in the next White Elephant Sale on Saturday, October 28.

WCC POLICY

Garage Sales, Estate Sales, Yard Sales, and Moving Sales, etc.

Westbury Civic Club Policy: Garage Sales, Estate Sales, Yard Sales, Moving Sales

Purpose: The intent of this policy is to clearly convey the Westbury Civic Club restriction on garage sales, estate sales, yard sales or any other independent action of the kind.

Definition: Garage, Estate, Yard or Moving Sale: The sale of personal property in, at, or upon any residential lot or home. This includes, with limitation, sales of personal property from the garage, driveway, yard, patio or house area of such premises.

Policy: Garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like are not permitted in Westbury.

All sections of Westbury and Parkwest have deed restrictions that state "no noxious or offensive trade or activity shall be carried on upon any lot nor shall anything be done thereon which may be or become an annoyance or nuisance to the neighborhood". Garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like draw substantial traffic and contribute to: hindering the flow of traffic on major thoroughfares; impeding access to homes by emergency vehicles or residents due to parking congestion; parking violations on city streets or esplanades; parking violations from vehicles parked on front yards; and, parking violations from blocking public right-of-way on sidewalks. Furthermore, advertising materials for garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like contribute to: visual blight, trash along public streets, and violations of the city sign ordinance. The Westbury Civic Club considers garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like to be "an annoyance or nuisance to the neighborhood".

All sections of Westbury and Parkwest have deed restrictions that state the lots are to be used for single family or family residential purposes. The Westbury Civic Club considers garage, estate, yard, moving sales and the like to be commercial use of residential property.



Greater Meyerland SN Forms What is a Super Neighborhood?

A "Super Neighborhood" is a geographical area determined by the city. The Westbury area has been a recognized Super Neighborhood council organization since 2005, after realizing the many benefits from visits to the nearby Brays Oaks Super Neighborhood. The Westbury Super Neighborhood (SN) meets concurrently with the monthly WAIC meeting on the 3rd Wednesday each month. The Westbury SN is also active in the Super Neighborhood Alliance (SNA), an alliance of all SN in Houston.

District K Chief of Staff Donald Perkins hosted a meeting in September of 2016 for the residents who live in the nearby Willow Meadows/Willowbend area to learn more about Super Neighborhoods. Westbury SN Co-Presidents Becky Edmondson and Cindy Chapman were asked to describe how the Westbury SN operates and were pleased to invite representatives to attend our Westbury SN meetings. One year later, SuperNeighborhood 38 has formed and will be known as the Near Southwest SuperNeighborhood. Now all of the SuperNeighborhoods in District K are active and recognized.

Also in 2016, the Jewish Community Center was working on ways to advocate for our areas of Meyerland and Westbury after the flooding of 2015. Cindy Chapman, Becky Edmondson and Jennifer Edmondson were part of a group that supported the formation of the Greater Meyerland Super Neighborhood. This SN 31 was recognized before City Council last month. The Greater Meyerland SN brings together the subdivisions of Meyerland, Maplewood, Maplewood NS, Shadowcrest, Marilyn Estates, Barkley Square and Barkley Circle.

All of the Southwest Houston SuperNeighborhoods are looking forward to working together, as we did on the aggressive panhandling issue on the South Post Corridor.

Active Shooter Presentation

As part of the "Stay Safe Westbury' outreach, Stephen Daniel, senior community liaison of the Houston Police Department presented his 1.5 hour active shooter presentation.

How would you defend yourself against an active shooter? Run-Hide-Fight

Run:

Have an escape route and plan in mind. Leave your belongings behind. Evacuate regardless of whether others agree to follow. Help others escape, if possible. Do not attempt to move wounded people. Prevent others from entering an area where the active shooter may be. Keep your hands visible. Call 911 when you are safe.

Hide:

Hide in an area out of the shooter's view. Lock the door or block the entry to your hiding place. Silence your cell phone (including the vibrate mode) and remain quiet.

Fight:

Fight as a last resort and only when your life is in imminent danger. Attempt to incapacitate the shooter. Commit to your actions...your life depends on it.

When Law Enforcement Arrives:

Remain calm and follow instructions. Put down any items in your hands (i.e., bags, jackets). Raise hands and spread fingers. Keep hands visible at all times. Avoid quick movements toward officers such as holding on to them for safety. Avoid pointing, screaming or yelling. Do not stop to ask officers for help or direction when evacuating.

Information to provide to 911 operators:

Location of the active shooter
Number of shooters
Physical description of shooters
Number and type of weapons in possession of shooters
Number of potential victims at the location

Additional Safety Instructions:

The first officers to arrive at the scene will not stop to help injured persons.

Expect rescue teams to follow the initial officers. These rescue teams will treat and remove the injured.

Once you have reached a safe location, you will likely be held in that area by law enforcement until the situation is under control, and all witnesses have been identified and questioned. Do not leave the area until law enforcement authorities have instructed you to do so.

Texas Legislature Update

The Texas Legislative Special Session ended in August. Both Westbury's State Senator Miles and our State Representative Thierry helped ensure a better outcome for pregnant mothers in Texas, which has the highest maternal mortality rate in the nation. Senator Borris Miles was very proud to help pass good legislation regarding maternal mortality out of both chambers.

Democratic state Rep. Shawn Thierry sponsored a bill in the House that would extend funding for the state's Maternal Mortality and Morbidity Task Force, a group formed in 2013, so it could continue its work until 2026. The bill passed in the House.

Then it moved to the Senate as Senate Bill 17 to extend and expand the work of the Maternal Mortality and Morbidity Task Force. He added an amendment to this bill to address the second leading cause of maternal deaths, i.e. drug overdoses, especially those related to the opioid crisis. This amendment will give doctors substance abuse screening tools and resources to better identify at-risk pregnant women. The governor signed this bill into law near the end of the special session.

Several homeowners in the past couple years have had to tear down and/or modify their construction due to deed restriction violations. The City of Houston does not review deed restrictions when issuing permits. They require a signed affidavit acknowledging that the plans comply with your deed restrictions. WARNINGS FOR ALL PET OWNERS

City of Houston ordinances require that dogs and cats be on leash if they are outside of your fenced backyard. "Dogs running loose" is a common complaint received by the WCC office. Some neighbors allow their dogs to roam freely and simply open their doors to allow their dogs to roam. Other neighbors allow their dogs to be unleashed when they are outside. People, as well as other animals, have been attacked by loose dogs. Unleashed dogs can cause dog aggression when a leashed dog is nearby and feels threatened. Please, do not allow your dogs run loose.

Also, it is the responsibility of a dog owner to pick up the dog feces for disposal. To allow a dog to leave droppings around the neighborhood is unsanitary, unsightly, and rude.

But, what about cats? Does it really hurt anything if you have an outside cat? Cats hunt birds and small reptiles. The real danger of running loose is to your cat. Cats in the street are at risk of being struck by vehicles. Loose dogs, as well as coyotes and other wildlife, have been killing cats for years. Lately there has been an uptick of cats reported mauled and killed. A resident in Meyerland caught a coyote on camera mauling their cat to death. Residents in Westbury 1 have found a number of dead cats in recent months.

Be a good friend to our furry friends and keep them inside and out of harm's way.

What to Do about Coyotes

If a coyote is in your neighborhood, relax: Most coyotes avoid people. "Seeing a coyote out during the day is not a cause for alarm, especially in the spring and summer when they're looking for food for their pups," says Lynsey White Dasher, Humane Society of United States Director of humane wildlife conflict resolution.

If a coyote displays no fear of people, he's probably been fed. You can re-instill his fear by raising your arms and yelling to drive him away. This is called hazing. Coyotes may mistake small, unattended pets as prey or attack large dogs they view as threats to territory or dens. To keep

your animals safe, take two simple steps:

Watch your pets. Keep cats indoors, and never leave small dogs outside unsupervised or let your dog out of your yard off leash.

Secure food sources. Store garbage in wildlife-proof containers and feed pets indoors.

Keeping Westbury Beautiful: The Green Team

Westbury is lucky to have many volunteers dedicated to checking ou greenspaces and esplanades looking nice. The Green Team is busy at work.

Esplanade Brigade Forming

Steve Goldberg (reach him at sgoldberg124@comcast.net) has formed a volunteer esplanade brigade to keep an eye on and pick up litter on our esplanades. Not all of our esplanades have a walker or overseer so, if you walk near an esplanade, live near an esplanade, have ever driven by an esplanade and said "why doesn't someone pick that up", contact Steve if you'd like to be on the team.

Hillcroft Esplanade

Have you seen the ugly brown areas on Hillcroft? A Westbury resident, Hazel Potvin, contacted the city about the brown grass and damaged trees. Jed Aplaca, who is in charge of the spraying for Houston Parks and Rec Department (HPARD), explained that due to the lack of staff to maintain esplanades, the city is using an herbicide that kills bahia grass and King Ranch bluestem (KRBS), but not bermuda

grass. The WCC complained that esplanades that the WCC is maintaining were also sprayed with herbicide by the city in error. We have asked HPARD not to spray herbicides on Westbury esplanades, especially not the ones that the WCC has adopted for full maintenance.

With the recent rains, we should be seeing the grass on the esplanades recovering. The tree branches that were hit with the spray were not intentionally targeted and the herbicide will not kill the trees. Jed has contacted the Forestry Department to do some trimming of our damaged trees.

Litter

The city de-litters the esplanades before they mow so, if they are mowing less frequently, then that is

one of the reasons we are seeing more litter.

And speaking of litter, Becky
Edmondson, the District K Council
representative for the Clean City
Commission (Keep Houston
Beautiful), recently participated in
the 2017 Houston Litter survey.
Three teams of representatives drove
through set areas of the city to
observe litter, graffiti, junk vehicles
and bandit signs. Becky had this to

say, "You can really tell what a difference the Brays Oaks Management District (BOMD) and the Sharpstown Management District have made throughout the area. With a dedicated weekly crew to pick up litter and bandit signs the whole area looked better than in the past." Cindy Chapman reported that the BOMD had picked up 3,200 pounds of trash during the month of July, and a total of 21,750 pounds of trash so far for 2017. The BOMD litter abatement team also has collected 2,075 signs illegally posted on city right of way so far this year.
