
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Hurricane Season is Not Over

It is still hurricane season and September is historically the most active hurricane month for Texas. Being prepared and knowing what to do are key. There is no need to panic if you are prepared and have a plan. Pages 9-11 contain many helpful articles about storm prep, flood insurance, weather resources, and more.

It has been over a decade since the Galveston-Houston region has experienced a true hurricane. Yes, Harvey was a hurricane when it made landfall in Rockport, TX, but it

was a tropical storm when it arrived in Houston, so wind was not our issue. The damage from a direct hit of a hurricane is very different than Harvey flooding. Hurricanes in Houston are typically major wind events that can cause long power outages.

Hurricane Ike in September 2008, made landfall in Galveston as a Cat 2 storm with 110mph wind (only 1 mph off a Cat 3). Wind measured at Hobby Airport was sustained 75mph with gusts to 80. Most of Houston saw sustained winds of 60mph and there were widespread power outages that lasted weeks. Westbury homes didn't have power for an average 2-3 weeks. There was no known flooding in Westbury homes during Hurricane Ike. Hurricanes hit hard and move out fast. It is important to not use Harvey as your comparison for hurricanes in Houston.

We live in a huge city close to the coast so there is different advice for certain areas. It is important to know where you live. Westbury is NOT in an evacuation zone. A long-time hurricane saying is "Run from the surge, hide from the wind". This means that the average Westbury homeowner should remain at home, inside sheltered in place, during the event. See page 11 for tips on what to do if a hurricane is coming.

Preparing for a storm that may or may not come can be very stressful. Some people might even be skeptical about preparing as we had a miss with Hurricane Laura, but this was a very narrow miss. Too many times storms shift and predicted tracks change.

Hurricane Ike was originally forecast to make landfall further South towards Corpus Christi. It was only 2 days before landfall that it became clear that Galveston-Houston were in for a direct hit.

When there is an active storm in the Gulf of Mexico, especially during August and September, you should always pay close attention to a trusted weather source on what is happening with the storm. Page 10 has a list of weather sources. If in doubt, go straight to the National Hurricane Center website, www.nhc.noaa.gov.

Flooding is still a concern with hurricanes. Any time it rains in Houston, we are concerned about flooding. Hurricanes can bring localized flash flooding with heavy rains bands so streets could flood. Properties that regularly flood during high rain events

A Message from the Westbury Civic Club President

2020 has already been quite the year and we still have 4 more months. There have been disappointments, many challenges, and some bright spots. As I am writing this, the Houston region narrowly missed a hit by Hurricane Laura. September is the peak month of the hurricane season in Texas. Please pay careful attention to weather forecasts and update your preparations and supplies. Helpful resources are on pages 1, 9-11.

A challenge facing our community is our 2020 funding for our Westbury Area Patrol by the Harris County Precinct 5 Constables and the WCC office. We are behind in our fundraising for 2020 although we still must pay for rent and utilities and for our security patrol. It is a hard time to ask for money, and I understand that some of you might not be able contribute at this time. But if you can, we could use your support. We all want to keep Westbury a desirable and safe place to live. If you have already contributed, we thank you. If you have been meaning to send that check or send that payment online, but haven't gotten around to doing it yet, then TODAY is a good day to take action. A partial contribution is better than zero. Can you imagine what it would be like here in Westbury if we had to drop our security patrol service? HPD has an important role in fighting crime, but they are shorthanded, so they must respond to the highest priority calls first. As a result, they don't do neighborhood patrols and the wait time for lower priority calls can be long (or perhaps never get a response).

Crime was unusually high in June, but was low in July. Don't you think the criminals noticed that Precinct 5 sent supplemental patrols to Westbury in July in response to the high crime in June?

The Westbury Civic Club Annual Meeting and Elections will be held on Sept 16. A guest speaker will be Vice-Mayor ProTem, District K City Councilmember Martha Castex-Tatum, who represents most of Westbury. Due to COVID, this meeting will be held online. More info about the Annual Meeting and Elections is on page 6. I thank the new and returning board members who will be serving for the upcoming term. Two long-serving board members are stepping down from the WCC board this year: Virginia Livingston and Robert Montgomery-Ellis. Virginia has been a font of knowledge on green issues, is an original member of the Westbury Community Garden and has been a vigilant member of the board. Robert has been leading the Yard of the Month program and is notable for helping to post our large Westbury Community Garage Sale banner at recent White Elephant Sale events.

Some bright spots in our community are the ongoing efforts to make our corner of the world a better place. District K, the City of Houston, and the Harris County Flood Control District continue to seek ways to reduce the risk of flooding in Westbury and in Southwest Houston. Many of you have been making more use of the Willow Waterhole Greenway

during COVID, so take a look at our feature stories about WW in this edition. The hard-working folks at the Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy (WWGC) have started a membership drive. I am a member and encourage you to join also. More information is on page 19. Your membership will keep you updated with news from WWGC and will help pay for future improvements. Another long-time community partner, the Westbury Area Improvement Corporation (WAIC), has updated their website and is actively fundraising for projects to improve the Westbury area. More information about the WAIC is on page 15 and on their website (westbury37waic.org). Both of these fine non-profits are based right here in Westbury.

I will close by mentioning that the COVID impact on schools is ever-changing. Some students are already in class and others will start after Labor Day. Some students will be studying at home and others will be in school. Please pay attention to school zone signs and be watchful for students. Due to COVID, more people are at home during the day and are walking or running or biking, so this is another reason to drive carefully. One of the most common complaints is about speeding on our local streets. SLOW DOWN!

- → WCC board approved a motion to spend up to \$750 on a new domain and website host to replace the outdated unsupported current website.


→ Mever Library on W. Bellfort CLOSED Indefinitely: Replacement will be in Westbury



Regular Household Trash

Pick-up is EVERY Thursday. Regular household trash goes into the black trash can.

Yard Waste

Pick-up is EVERY week either on Thursday or Saturday or any day the City decides to come by. Yard Waste MUST be placed in the correct City bio-degradable bags.



Recycling in Westbury

All of Westbury recycles on Schedule A. Recycling is every other week. Recycling goes into the green trash can.

Why Pay your Westbury Civic Club Dues?

The Westbury Civic Club (WCC) works on: reducing neighborhood blight, enforcing deed restrictions, improving economic development, and advocating for our fair share of the City's budget. We hold two semi-annual White Elephant Sales and host neighborhood events such as Keep Westbury Beautiful Day. We publish the award-winning Westbury Crier monthly. The WCC has one employee who works closely with our City Council Office and city departments to ensure timely responses to residents' complaints, like Solid Waste problems. We also continue to work diligently with the City and the County to find real solutions to flooding along Willow Waterhole Bayou. The WCC is a strong advocate for the City to continue on schedule with storm drain reconstruction projects in Westbury with ReBuild Houston. This project was to start in 2020 but was delayed due to Harvey. Please pay your Westbury Civic Club dues of \$50.

Why Support the Westbury Area Patrol?

The largest program and biggest expenditure for the WCC is for the Westbury Area Patrol (WAP). The WCC has had a contract with Harris County Precinct 5 deputies since 1984. The WAP offers 24 hour coverage, vacation watches, home security checks, and alarm monitoring. The program provides high visibility, rapid response to emergency and non-emergency calls. Daily patrolling enables the deputies assigned to Westbury to become familiar with the neighborhood, thereby alerting them to "out of the ordinary" situations and ability to respond better and faster. WAP officers were instrumental in catching young criminals in Westbury South who were attacking and robbing elderly residents last year. Harris County Pct. 5 has a dedicated investigative unit that can be available if needed. The WCC has had to lower the number of deputies from 4 to 3 in 2019, and we could be in danger of losing the program if participation in this important program does not improve. Crime is increasing in Houston during this Covid-19 time, it is imperative that we keep our Constable patrol strong and active. Please support the Westbury Area Patrol, \$285.

Why Support the WCC?

Westbury is a unique neighborhood. While all 5,000 homes in our Westbury neighborhood have active deed restrictions, only 463 have mandatory assessments. This means the Westbury Civic Club heavily relies on voluntary financial contributions from residents.

Westbury has historically had strong voluntary support because residents understood the great benefits of the WCC and our programs. However, contributions to the Westbury Civic Club and to the Westbury Area Patrol are down in 2020. By working together, we can meet the challenges head on and keep our neighborhood the jewel that it is.

The total amount for the **2020 Voluntary Dues** is \$335. That is less than a dollar a day! The Westbury Civic Club dues are \$50 for the year. The WCC suggests a contribution of \$285 for the Westbury Area Patrol (a paid contract with Precinct 5 Constables).

The WCC board continues to look at other ways to make paying the dues easier and more convenient.

Homes purchased in Parkwest 1 after Jan. 1, 1993 and Parkwest 2 after Jan 1, 1994 have mandatory assessments.

The 2020 Mandatory Assessments of \$246.75 were due 2/1/2020. Invoices have been mailed out.

Payment plans can be set up for homes that have a past due balance. Please contact the WCC Office at 713-723-5437.

The WCC does NOT receive payments from escrow accounts or any other source. If you receive a Mandatory Assessment bill, it was due by 2-1-2020.

An attorney will be contacted for accounts past due.

All About Deed Restrictions & Nuisances

Westbury is a Deed Restricted Neighborhood

ALL homes in Westbury have active deed restrictions. There are over 30 sets for the 9 sections and 5,000 homes in Westbury. Why do we have deed restrictions? To protect and maintain our neighborhood for the benefit of all residents. The City of Houston does not have any zoning or rules on where commercial business can be located. Deed restrictions help maintain our neighborhood as a neighborhood. All lots in Westbury must be residential usage.

When you bought your home, you should have received a copy of your deed restrictions. Certified copies of the deed restrictions can be obtained at the County Clerk office downtown for a fee. The WCC office has copies of the deed restrictions by section online at

www.westburycrier.com. You will need to know your legal address to know which set applies to you. An easy way to find your legal address is to look up your property on Harris County Appraisal District (HCAD) website, www.hcad.org.

Report Nuisances like long grass/weeds and visible trash directly to the City of Houston at 311. You can call 311 or email at 311Dhoustontx.gov. Send your SR Number to the WCC office at westburyccDsbcglobal.net

Updating Westbury Deed Restrictions

Deed Restriction Revision Action Group Formed

UPDATE—Thank you to all the residents who reached out about joining the Revision Action Group. The group will meet via Zoom in September to get started. Look in future *Criers* for more information.

Westbury's deed restrictions are old and need to be updated. While they are still active and still have validity, they are slowing losing their original meaning in today's legal climate. There are many reasons to update the deed restrictions. It is no longer 1958. How people live and use their homes is different in 2020. While it is nice that no one can hang a visible clothes line in their front yard, I am sure the residents of Westbury 5 East of Hillcroft would like the option to build a 2 story home. They are the ONLY section that cannot. With home elevations and new home construction on the rise, a better set of deed restrictions and guidelines are needed.

The Westbury Civic Club worked with residents in Parkwest 1 and 2 in the 1990s and successfully updated and modernized their deed restrictions with changes such as allowing two story homes, three car garages, and mandatory assessments. This process can be long and frustrating. Later deed restrictions revisions over the years have stalled, failed, and fizzled out.

It is time to seriously think of Westbury's future. 2020 is the time to move Westbury forward and update our aging deed restrictions. The first step is to get a group of active residents who are dedicated to seeing the process all the way through. This group will first meet to get their bearings, then start to break down the choices of how to tackle a massive deed restrictions revision for 5,000 homes. Even Parkwest 1 and 2 need to be updated, despite the changes made in the 90s. We will do surveys, in the *Crier* and online, and hold several public meetings to get feedback from residents.



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Do You Have Flood Insurance?

While the majority of Westbury is NOT in the 100 or 500 year flood plains, floods can happen anywhere given the right circumstances. Only 15% of the structures that flooded during Harvey had flood insurance. Did you know the record for rainfall in a 24 hour period is held in nearby Alvin, Texas? 44 inches! The good news is that if you are not in a flood plain, then you can buy peace of mind for just a few hundred dollars a year.

The Harris County Flood Control District advises that EVERY HOME in Harris County should have flood insurance, whether or not you live in a mapped flood plain. The current flood plain maps do not fully warn where flooding might occur. Homeowner's policies do not include flood coverage, and because no insurance company wanted to write an unprofitable line of business, the federal government stepped in. In 1968, Congress created the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), which offers flood insurance to homeowners, renters, and business owners.

As you shop for a flood policy, you may be confused, as many are, about whether the policy is through FEMA or an insurance company. In 1983, the Write Your Own (WYO) Program began and is a cooperative undertaking between the private insurance industry and FEMA. The WYO Program allows participating property and casualty insurance companies to write and service the Standard Flood Insurance Policy in their own names. The companies receive an expense allowance (approx. 30% of premium) for policies written and claims processed, while the federal government retains responsibility for underwriting losses. The WYO Program operates as part of the NFIP and is subject to its rules and regulations.

If you don't have flood insurance, ask your insurance agent for a quote. Make sure that you check the coverages and understand EXACTLY what you are purchasing. If you don't have an insurance agent, then look for one online at the FEMA site. Put in your address and it will give you a local agent. https://www.floodsmart.gov/floodsmart

PLEASE NOTE— You cannot purchase flood insurance when a named storm in the Gulf of Mexico. Once purchased, there is a 30 day waiting period before coverage takes effect.

residents taking action! Thank you to these wonderful neighbors for clearing their drain. If you are interested in adopting your storm drain, check out below or go to houstonadoptadrain.com. It is important to keep the storm drains clear of debris, so that water can flow properly during any rainstorm.

Name That Drain! Contest

Adopt-a-Drain is a city program allowing Houstonians to "adopt" and maintain stormwater drains near their homes or businesses. This program began in 2018 here in Westbury.

Adopters clear areas around the drains from leaves and debris, especially before storms. This volunteer effort helps reduce neighborhood flooding and saves tax dollars spent on maintenance.

A fun feature of the program involves participants personalizing and naming their adopted drains. The naming contest will overlap with the third anniversary of Hurricane Harvey and highlights one of the most effective ways for Houstonians to help with flood mitigation and resiliency in their own neighborhoods. To date, 1,456 drains have been adopted with 105,827 drains currently available.

Weather Wary in Westbury

Does rain make you nervous? Are you unsure on the weather forecasts? Does listening to the news weather reports make you panic? You are not alone. Houston weather over the past couple years has made us all very wary, if not scared, of storms.



Houston gets rain. The trick is to know where and how much. There are many good websites and apps available that can help guide you before rain events or during them. One good piece of advice is to look for warnings and alerts from the actual source, for example the National Hurricane Center. This is not a complete list but just one meant to help guide you and add to your storm preparations.

Harris County Flood Warning System www.harriscountyfws.org

This website is extremely helpful <u>during</u> a rain event. It shows real time bayou levels and rainfall amounts at gages that have been installed along the bayous. **Gage 445** is located in Westbury on the Willow Waterhole Bayou at the Landsdowne bridge. Gage 440 is located on Brays Bayou at S. Rice. A new tool just introduced is the ability to sign up for Flood Alerts by gage. Another tool available on the website is a Flood Inundation real time map that can help residents make critical decisions regarding life and property during events. If you are ever curious about the rainfall amounts and rate, you can also look up historical data.

National Hurricane Center www.nhc.noaa.gov

If there is a chance of a named storm or there is a current named storm, the National Hurricane Center is your go-to source. During an active named storm, there will be multiple updates issued along with many different maps. These include the wind probability, the storm track cone, storm surge, tides, and many more.

Hype-free Weather Forecast www.spacecityweather.com

This website is dedicated to covering Houston weather news and forecasting with accuracy and without hype. Space City Weather was founded in October 2015. This website isn't about making money or getting "hits", it is truly about providing residents and business owners a quality forecast to make informed decisions. Eric Berger and Matt Lanza provide the best forecast for Houston weather. You can also follow them on Facebook.

Sign Up for Power Outage Alerts

A helpful alert service about Centerpoint power outages is Power Alert Service (PAS) which can notify you, friends and family of a power outage, its restoration progress, and when the electricity comes back on.

Thanks to upgrades, you can send alerts to up to five text, five emails and five phone numbers.

Flood Gage Warning Alerts

The regional Flood Warning System measures rainfall and monitors water levels in bayous, creeks, and rivers on a real-time basis to inform area residents of potential flooding conditions. This system relies on a network of 250 gage stations that have been strategically placed throughout a Harris and surrounding counties. Westbury has one of

these gages located on the Willow Waterhole Bayou (#445). This information is available at www.harriscountyfws.org.

You can now sign up for alerts on a specific gages near your home or work. You can receive default rainfall and water level alerts or create custom water alerts.

The Willow Waterhole Bayou at Landsdowne rises quickly and it's imperative to surrounding homeowners to know what is happening. It is important to remember that this gage will likely stay at a certain level approximately 51-52ft) when flood

waters are going over the weirs downstream at the Willow Waterhole detention basins.

Sign Up for Alerts from The City



Sometimes it is easy to become complacent with weather alerts, but emails, texts, and phone calls sent from the City Alert System can help in rain events. If you haven't signed up to receive City alerts, you may do so with AlertHouston. Timely information during emergencies is important AlertHouston delivers critical information to Houstonians regarding current conditions, expected impacts, and protective actions to keep themselves and their loved ones safe.

These alerts are issued by City of Houston Office of Emergency Management (OEM). Messages are issued for citywide and neighborhood level emergencies. They are sent through email and social media (Facebook, Twitter and Nextdoor). You must opt-in to receive these alerts.

Register for emergency alerts through email, text message, voice call, or mobile app push notification. .Most alerts are geo-targeted; subscribers with loved ones around the city may register up to five physical addresses per contact record.

Hurricane Preparation Tips

No one likes to hear that there is a possible direct hit of a major hurricane coming, but it is the reality of living so close to the coast. Knowing what to do and having a plan is extremely helpful. There is a chance every year that our storm will come, we just hope not. If a major hurricane is predicted to hit Houston, you need to prepare for the wind and rain during the storm itself and for the aftermath of no power for 2-3 weeks.

Should I stay or should I go now? The first decision ultimately is when to stay and at what point, if ever, do you leave. A longtime hurricane saying is "run from the surge, hide from the wind". If you are medically dependent on electricity and do not have a generator, you need to have a plan for a place to stay during and after the storm. Most residents can stay in their Westbury homes during a major hurricane. You hunker down and prepare for the wind (discussed to the right). Houston residents do not need to be on the roadways as those will be needed for coastal evacuations. The question is: do you stay in your home with no power after the storm, or do you leave town at that point? This decision will help with how you plan for buying food, water, gas, charcoal, etc. Some needs are for the storm itself and others are for the aftermath of no electricity for weeks.

The two lists on this page were created by Westbury residents and are meant to be a helpful guide. There are official hurricane prep lists available on all the major news channels websites, which are also helpful tools to help plan. Be prepared and be safe.



Long-term Hurricane Preparation Tips

- → Keep your trees trimmed. Wind is the biggest threat to Westbury in a major hurricane. Keeping your branches off your home, garage, fences, and power line is important.
- → Buy a portable gas generator. It is easy to get a generator when there isn't a storm aimed straight at us. They quickly become hot items. Plan ahead.
- → Measure your windows and have plywood stored in the garage to place over your windows when needed. Some new windows are hurricane strength but the original Westbury home windows are not.
- → Make a hurricane prep box containing flashlights, batteries, battery operated radio, candle, lighters, matches, etc., so it's already on hand.
- → Save a stash of empty water bottles to fill up for your freezer to make ice or cold water.
- → Copy important documents, place in sealable plastic bag, ready to take with you quickly.



Immediate Hurricane Preparation Tips

- ☐ Fill all vehicles with gas.
- ☐ Buy gas for your generator if you have one. Fill up any extra tanks.
- ☐ Get extra cash.
- ☐ Make sure to have at least 2 weeks worth of all medicines. Get prescriptions filled if needed.
- ☐ Secure all items outside that can blow in the wind. Move patio furniture inside garage. Move potted plants to secure location. Secure or place your grills inside.
- ☐ Don't forget the kids items. Take off swings from swing set. Flip, disassemble, secure trampolines as they can fly. Lay basketball goals down on sides. Move all toys and bikes inside.
- ☐ Move your trash cans to your garage or secure them very well to a tree or post. Duct tape the lids shut.
- ☐ For major storms, put plywood over your windows. It is not recommended to tape your windows, as this can cause more dangerous shards of glass than if it were to break naturally.
- ☐ Freeze bottles of water to make ice that will extend life of your freezer or refrigerator. Make as many as possible as they can be used in an ice chest as well.
- ☐ Have flashlights and batteries. Buy extra batteries if needed. Having a battery operated lantern for main room or head flashlights for each person are handy. Kids might enjoy glow sticks.
- ☐ Have candles or oil lamps ready
- ☐ Get matches or lighters for candles, grill, or your gas stove.
- ☐ Have a battery operated radio so you can listen to alerts. Some new models have charging ports and special NOAA channel.
- ☐ Buy at least one week's worth of non-perishable foods. Suggested items include peanut butter crackers, bread, muffins, fruit with longer shelf life such as apples and oranges, snack bars, granola, beef jerky, trail mixes, applesauce, fruit cups and canned goods.
- ☐ Ensure you have enough pet food and supplies such as kitty litter for at least 2 weeks.
- ☐ Buy charcoal or propane for your grill so you can cook outside if power goes out.
- ☐ Get extra water. (And wine!)
- ☐ Charge all devices and keep fully charged until power goes out. You can sit in your car later for some AC and charge your phone.
- ☐ Do all laundry. Wash sheets. Start with clean slate to minimize problems with heat and sweat.
- Wash all dishes.
- ☐ Fill bathtub or large buckets with water. If there is no City water available, you can use the stored water in your toilet to flush.
- ☐ Have a secure place in your house already planned and ready with a blanket and pillow and radio/phone. Ideally away from any windows. In many Westbury homes, that is likely your hallway, even if it has no doors, you can shut the individual bedroom doors that have windows so hallway is more secure.
- ☐ If you have kids, have them help with preparations and explain why you are preparing. It helps with anxiety to have a plan and be a part of it. Have them grab a book and a lovey if they have one.
- ☐ Clean storm drains and gutters in front of your home.

All About Scams

The Southwest PIP meeting this month was presented by the BBB and was all about scams.

Phone scams: Did you know that 60% of all calls to mobile phones are fraudulent? Do not press anything during these calls. If they offer you an opt out, do not press the number. Just hang up.

Computer scams: The most common computer scam is the Tech support Scam and Pop ups. Never give access to your computer to anyone that contacts you this way or over the phone. Don't click on pop ups. And do not give them your credit card information!

Election Scam: While many of these scams are aimed at older folks, youth are being targeted too.

"Congratulations you can vote. We can register you on the phone. Go get your social security number. Due to Covid voters are being registered over the phone". This is NOT TRUE: You CANNOT register to vote over the phone.

Don't take robo call political surveys that ask for ANY personal information. Do not contribute to campaigns in a robo call. Call the campaign offices directly.

2020 Election

Election Day: Tuesday, November 3 Early Voting: October 13- October 30

Governor Abbot Extends Early Voting

Governor Greg Abbott issued a Proclamation on July 27 extending the early voting period for the November 3rd Election by nearly a week. Under this proclamation, early voting by personal appearance will begin on Tuesday, October 13, 2020, and continue through Friday, October 30, 2020. The proclamation also expands the period in which marked mail-in ballots may be delivered in person to the early voting clerk's office, allowing such delivery prior to as well as on Election Day.

Election Workers Needed in Harris County

The Harris County Clerk's Office is looking for election workers to staff more than 800 voting centers that will be open for the November 3, 2020 General Election. Election workers are also needed three weeks prior to the election to work at approximately 100 voting centers during the Early Voting period, October 13-30.

To serve as an election worker, you must be a registered voter in Harris County, have transportation to and from the polling location, and be able to attend training. Bilingual election workers are needed and encouraged to apply. Students 16 years of age and older can apply to work as student clerks. All of these positions are paid. If you are interested in becoming an election worker, Harrisvotes.org or call 713-755-6965.

Westbury resident Priscilla Bloomquist, a long-time election worker and current Precinct 0453 chair, had this

to say, "I am the Democratic Precinct Chair for Precinct 0453; that comprises all of Westbury South, part of Westbury 4, and most of the Willow Waterhole Greenspace. I have been your Presiding Election Judge and worked every local election for more than 25 years, in at least 16 different locations in and around our precinct. Those of you who have voted with me all these years know what fun it has been to find out where we are voting every year! But the scavenger hunt has come to a close. With county-wide voting centers now in place in Harris County, voters can vote anywhere in the county in which they reside. I still hope to see many of you at Westbury High School though.

To me, being an Election Worker is one of the most rewarding jobs you can do to serve your community. Especially this year, with all the pandemic precautions we must take, you will be thanked many times over for your service. You will be exhausted, but it's a good feeling knowing you did your part to help voters cast their ballots in this very important election."




WAIC Announces NEW website




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Honey Fundraiser Success

Valero Store Changes Lighting

When a new Valero convenience store and gas station was built on Hillcroft near the Westbury Community Store, the impact of the new lighting was immediately noticeable. It was bright, full of glare, and cast light far onto the garden site. The lighting situation was undesirable at the garden because of astronomical activities sometimes held at the garden at might, the glare was bright, and because the bright light could be detrimental to night-time pollinators.

After discussions, the Valero owner made an agreement with the gardeners. If the garden would purchase different lighting, then the Valero owner would pay an electrician to replace the light fixtures. These photos show the difference in the new lighting, as would be observed by the human eye. The new lighting provides better visibility at the building, has less glare, no longer casts light far onto the garden site, and uses about 1/3 of the electrical power wattage (electrical cost) than the original lighting did.

Congratulations to both the Valero owner and the gardeners for finding a win-win solution that benefited both of you. Sometimes the brightest light is not the best light for the situation.

A. Parking

Ample street parking is available at 11350 Ricecrest. There is handicap parking with Detention Capacity: 608,000,000 gallons ramp access to wide sidewalks.

B. Rafferty Memorial Oak



C. Arboretum Trail

A shady 300-foot crushed granite trail that weaves through a wetlands area



with more than 100 native plants and trees. Benches and plant/tree sign markers are located on the path.



A chimney swift tower habitat and bird information kiosk is connected by a crushed granite trail to the Rafferty Memorial Oak. This area is the site where members of Audubon Society convene monthly after bird surveys: species are tallied, and counts are displayed in the kiosk.

E. Dabney Kennedy Scout Pavilion

A nice small shaded pavilion that makes for a great resting places while out walking the Waterhole. There is a picnic table. The Pavilion is named in honor of Dabney Kennedy, a community leader and fifty-year resident of Westbury. It recognizes scouts who have completed their Eagle and Gold Award projects at the Willow Waterhole.

F. Pocket Prairie

A native prairie plant garden with sidewalks and benches throughout the area. The blooms change with the season and shows

the wide variety of native plants in Houston.




