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President's Message

The 2016 Annual Meeting for the Westbury Civic Club was an awesome event. I loved looking out and seeing old friends. Judge Phyllis Frye, who served on the board for 9 years, before becoming a judge, was joined by Wally Davenport a past-president from the 1980s. Martha Kinn, a past-treasurer, and Duane Coombs, a longtime volunteer from Westbury South, were also at the meeting to name a few. Attendees included brand new residents, long-time residents, and many first-timers. I moved into Westbury in December of 1979 and attended my first WCC meeting in 2000. I'm not sure I've been home much since then!

As I prepared for the Annual Meeting I read the purpose of the WCC in our bylaws and I asked myself, how are we doing? 60 years into this process, is this still a viable message? "The purposes of the Westbury Civic Club are to improve the appearance of the Westbury area and promote the civic, cultural, educational, health and general welfare of the residents of the Westbury and Parkwest subdivisions".

Improve the appearance of the Westbury area: It's a big neighborhood. Many of our commercial properties could take a bit (a LOT) more pride in their appearance. A handful of our residential properties are problematic with overgrown yards, heavy trash violations, visible storage of junk, junk cars and all those things that drive us, as neighbors, nuts. Please help get these properties cleaned up by calling in violations to 311 and passing the Service Request numbers to the WCC office by email. Take a picture and send us an address. Don't assume someone else has reported a problem. I am always shocked when someone says this house has been like this for two years. We are working hard to get the thorny problems resolved through the city, county, management district and sometimes even HPD. Our common greenspaces get much attention from volunteers every year. You will read on page 23 that the Westbury Civic Club will receive the **Distinguished** Neiahborhood Award at the Mavor's

luncheon in November. Every one of you shares in this award!

Promote the civic welfare: The Board of the WCC works to have a good relationship with our elected city officials and with the different city departments. On pages 12-13 you will see that our strategy must be working as we had the Mayor, three council members and staff members, a City department director, a judge, and a candidate for Congress at the Annual Meeting. We work closely with our council district as well as with many of the city departments. On page 6 you will see Cindy Chapman meeting the mayor in HIS office

Promote educational welfare: We devote time to our schools. One way in which we do this is by making available a page or two each month in the *Crier*. At our Annual Meeting, our HISD Trustee, the Chief school officer and the WHS principal were on hand. The WHS PTO is also

selling those great "I Westbury" signs. The state of our neighborhood schools is a big factor in our property values as well as our educational choices. Members of the WCC serve on several official HISD committees that benefit our Westbury schools.

Promote health and general welfare:

Public safety is so important to our health and general well-being. At the annual meeting, we had an HPD captain and a Chief, an HFD Chief, and our Pct. 5 constables. The WCC works closely with both Pct. 5 and the Westbury HPD storefront. On the flooding front, we have spent literally hundreds and hundreds of hours researching, advocating and working toward real solutions to mitigate the structural flooding which afflicted some Westbury homes in 2015 and 2016.

Promote the cultural welfare: We support the Willow Waterhole Greenspace and the Westbury Community Garden. Both of these are great social spaces. I hope many of you were able to attend one of the many events at these fine neighborhood jewels. Read about the Willow Waterhole on page 20.

So, I'd say the WCC is doing a fairly good job of meeting its stated purpose. We could always use more money, more members, more volunteers, and more people with a passion to make a difference. All you have to do is look around to see the good works being done by the dozens and dozens of volunteers who give their time, talent, and treasure to make Westbury a place we are proud to call home.

Please join us on October 15 as we celebrate our 60th Anniversary.

If you are an original resident, I hope you will come and visit with the newcomers. Share YOUR history with them. 

Neighborhood Partnerships

Hillcroft **Expansion** Controversy

A successful letter writing campaign, bolstered with both hard copy and electronic petitions,



has definitely served notice to Public Works that a proposed project to expand Hillcroft into a 6 lane roadway, while making needed street improvements, is an UNPOPULAR idea. At the WCC Annual Meeting in September, Mayor Sylvester Turner was well aware of the agitation in Westbury and surrounding communities regarding the proposed changes to Hillcroft. Mayor Turner said it is important "to preserve communities and neighborhoods" and that he had talked to Public Works and "the Hillcroft expansion was not going to happen".

Later during the Annual Meeting, District K CM Larry Green said it was a priority for him to amend the regional MTFP (Major Thoroughfare and Freeway Plan) to re-classify Hillcroft, so that it would no longer be designated as a 6 lane road designed "for higher rates of speeds".

We thank the many local residents who spoke up during meetings or who wrote a letter or signed a petition on this topic. The WCC worked with other area civic organizations to oppose expanding Hillcroft to 6 lanes and will continue to monitor the situation for other local road projects. And, we want to thank our elected officials for recognizing that 6 lane roads are not friendly to neighborhoods or school children.

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Westbury Super Neighborhood Takes Part in Meeting with Mayor

A "Super Neighborhood" is a geographical area determined by the city. The Westbury area has been a recognized Super Neighborhood council organization since 2005, after realizing the many benefits from visits to the nearby Brays Oaks Super Neighborhood. The Westbury Super Neighborhood (SN) meets concurrently with the monthly WAIC meeting on the 3rd Wednesday each month. The Westbury SN is also active in the Super Neighborhood Alliance (SNA). As "a picture is worth a

thousand words", here is a photo of Cindy Chapman, co-president of the Westbury SN. visiting the Mayor in his office with the Super Neighborhood Alliance.



District K Chief of Staff Donald Perkins hosted a meeting in September for the residents who live in the nearby Willow Meadows/Willowbend area to learn more about Super Neighborhoods. 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IMPORTANT: Confusing HISD Item on Nov. Ballot

HISD Ballot Item Featured in Chronicle

Here is a summary of what the *Houston Chronicle* had to say about the HISD "ReCapture" measure that is on the November ballot.

"...be warned - it is a trick question. The ballot is really asking whether HISD should submit itself to state recapture and send \$162 million in local property tax dollars to Austin. The correct answer is "NO," or "AGAINST. If this misleading ballot provision passes, HISD will not only be required to send \$162 million in local property tax dollars to the state next year. The district will also likely face higher annual payments for the foreseeable future under the state's broken school finance system."

"...in reality, the system robs from the poor and gives to legislators so that they don't have to raise state taxes. There's no guarantee that poor schools will receive a single extra dime if HISD pays up. How does this work? Simply put, the state keeps two bank accounts: one for general revenue and one for the recaptured Robin Hood sums. Every dollar that the state pays from Robin Hood frees up general revenue money that the state otherwise would have to spend to help poor schools. So instead of giving extra money to needy districts, any HISD money will essentially be spent on highways, border security or some other appropriation besides education."

"...By voting no, Houstonians will keep their money and instead authorize the commissioner of education to detach \$18 billion worth of commercial property from HISD and assign it to other school districts. This has never happened before, and such a radical move would give the Legislature an opportunity to rectify the situation. A "no" vote won't end the problem. However, it will give the Legislature the entire 2017 session to fix school finance in Texas and keep local taxpayer dollars in our HISD schools."



Confusing Item about HISD on the November Ballot ("ReCapture")

Westbury is known for having among the highest voting rates in the City, so it

is important that voters in Westbury consider carefully the complicated issue of school funding in Texas and how this affects our local public schools in the Houston Independent School District (HISD). The ballot item is worded in a confusing manner, so please review and understand the issue, so that you aren't trying to figure out how to vote when you get in the voting booth!

Here is how the topic will be worded on the ballot, "Authorizing the board of trustees of Houston Independent School District to purchase attendance credits from the state with local tax revenues". Voters will be asked to vote either FOR or AGAINST(NO).

Background: HISD serves a huge number of urban students who are impoverished, or have limited English skills, or need assistance to reach their potential. Over 75% of HISD students are disadvantaged. Yet, amazingly, the not-so-brilliant State of Texas has determined that HISD has become too wealthy ("property rich", since schools are funded by property taxes) and will be subject to "recapture" (also known as the state "Robin Hood" funding plan which takes funding away from "wealthy" school districts).

Vote For or Against? When you read these choices, you will see that BOTH voting options have bad consequences for students in HISD. The Houston Chronicle advises to vote NO / AGAINST in November 2016, in the hopes that the state legislature will be forced to take action during the 2017 Texas legislative session.

Explanation from HISD on Ballot Choices (Information taken from the HISD website)

FOR

- ⇒ If voters approve the measure, HISD will begin paying \$162 million next spring. The state will use this payment to fund public education in Texas.
- ⇒ If approved, the district will continue to make annual recapture payments for the foreseeable future. Voter approval will no longer be required for HISD to send an estimated \$257 million in 2017-18; \$308 million in 2018-19; and \$386 million in 2019-20. That's over \$1 billion going from HISD to the state in the coming years.

AGAINST

- ⇒ If voters don't approve the measure, HISD would then be subject to detachment of about \$18 billion worth of commercial property next July starting with the most valuable.
- ⇒ The Texas Education Agency will detach a portion of HISD's commercial property and reassign it to other school districts in Texas, where it will be taxed at those districts' rates. Those districts would likely impose taxes at a higher rate than HISD. HISD would lose that revenue from the business community, and the local share would possibly increase.





Department of Neighborhoods

District K hosted a "Neighborhood 101" workshop featuring Director TaKasha Francis from the City Department of Neighborhoods (DON). This workshop was attended by WCC board members: Becky Edmondson, Cindy Chapman, Marcia Hartman, Virginia Livingston, and Donna Strom. The Department of Neighborhoods is dedicated to improving the quality of life in Houston neighborhoods through the delivery of services, innovative programs and strong community partnerships. The department serves as a centralized resource for the resolution of neighborhood concerns, and aids citizen access to city services, information and referrals.

Director Francis said that DON has been asked by Mayor Turner to "be responsive" as its first priority, because that is what residents expect. She pledged that DON will strive for service and excellence. She noted that there have been problems with the 311 database and the 311 mobile app and that DON is trying to figure out the problems to fix them. She said that all complaints should first be made to 311 to get a Service Request (SR) number, and

she recommended that an additional step be taken to contact District K with the problem and SR number. We suggest you also call the WCC Office with this information.

The Inspections group is the division which works closely with neighborhoods regarding quality of life issues. Inspectors respond to the following issues: overgrown and weedy lots, dangerous vacant buildings, illegal dumping and trash accumulation, junk motor vehicles, materials and appliances stored in public view, graffiti, nuisances on private property (as specified in city ordinances), and signs illegally placed on

city property and right of way.



Director Francis warned that the city is going to start cracking down on trash violators. Deputy Assistant Director Reggie Harris leads the Inspections group and warned that "the game has changed" and



that CITATIONS will be issued for violations. It is up to the resident to understand the correct times to put out regular trash and heavy trash and to understand the trash rules. The goal is for rules to be enforced consistently across the city and that DON inspectors will help communities stay clean because "the bar has been raised" with higher expectations.

Westbury has junk waste pickup just SIX times a year on the second Thursday of the even numbered months. Tree Waste is picked up on odd months. Trash may be put on the curb at 6PM the Friday before our Thursday pickup. Call 311 or use the 311 app to report heavy trash violations.

Neighbors 4Neighbors Network Expands to Include 77035

We are pleased to announce that the Neighbors4Neighbors Network, a non-sectarian community service program of Jewish Family Service, aimed at helping older adults remain in their own homes as they age, has expanded its boundaries to include Zip Codes 77035 and 77025 in addition to 77096. This means ALL of Westbury!

N4NN is a one-stop resource to help seniors resolve the every day challenges of remaining in their own homes as they grow older -- from finding volunteers to do light maintenance to finding professionals for the larger issues, to connecting members to volunteers who will visit or make check-up calls, to hosting monthly lunches with speakers, a discussion group and special events to connecting members with transportation to medical appointments or grocery shopping to networking with new friends.

Membership is open to anyone age 50 or older, regardless of religious affiliation, who lives in the three zip codes and who is capable of making key decision about their own lives, lives in a residence that presents no known threats to health or safety and is self-sufficient in meeting personal care needs, either through self-care or arrangements with a personal caregiver.

Annual dues (which also can be made in semi-annual or quarterly payments) are \$300 for a household or \$175 for an individual.

"N4NN has made all the difference for me," says member Clara Welsh, who lives in Zip Code 77035. "My kids were pressing me to move to a senior living facility. I like being independent. I don't want to have to do something when someone else tells me to. And I like the people I've met at N4NN." N4NN just installed a replacement phone for Ms. Welsh.

Flooding in Westbury Concerns Brays Bayou Association (BBA)

The speaker for the September 2016 BBA meeting was Michael Turco, General Manager of the Houston-Galveston Subsidence District. Subsidence in Houston is primarily caused by the

withdrawal of groundwater, followed by compaction of the clay soils found in the Houston area.

Subsidence was first observed in the Houston area in coastal




areas in the 1920s, and some subdivisions built in Baytown in the 1940s and 50s were underwater in the 1970s. The Houston Galveston Subsidence district was created in 1975 and initially was focused east of Hwy 288. In 1985, the district expanded to include more of the Houston area. The district uses "disincentive fees" to greatly increase the cost of water in order to encourage regulations about how much groundwater can be withdrawn. Coastal areas (Zone 1) can only withdraw up to 10% groundwater total. Westbury is in Subsidence Zone 2, where up to 20% groundwater withdrawal is allowed. Many of the new developments in Houston area are in Zone 3, where up to 70% groundwater is currently allowed, although by year 2035 the usage must be reduced down to 20% usage of groundwater. Most of the subsidence in the southwest area of Houston happened prior to 1990, although they do not have sufficient tools to identify where very localized subsidence may be happening.

Brays Oaks Mgt. District Committees


His speech ended with a rousing rendition of "Happy Birthday" sung by the audience, in honor of his upcoming birthday.

thank our great and generous donors for making this a fun end to a wonderful meeting!





Greater Post Oak/West Bellfort Neighborhood Coalition

The Greater West Bellfort/South Post Oak Coalition met again to finalize the plans for the petition to create a Civility Ordinance zone in District K. Signing the petition will kick off in October. The aggressive panhandling and trash situation at South Post Oak at W. Bellfort has made this ordinance necessary. It does not criminalize being homeless, it just restricts the hours that people can sleep or sit on our city sidewalks. People will still be allowed to sleep there during night time hours. Since 2002, the civility ordinance has been enacted to include the Central Business District, Midtown, Old Sixth Ward, Avondale and Greater Hyde Park. The East Downtown Management District area, known as EaDo, was added most recently in 2011. Northside has recently taken their petition to City Hall. We hope to follow soon.

What You Can Do to Help Combat Aggressive Panhandling

- ❖ Do NOT give money directly to those panhandling on the street.
- Give to organizations like SEARCH, www.searchhomeless.org/ or www.homelesshouston.org/, to ensure your money goes to those that need help and not to professional panhandlers.
- Report aggressive behavior and drug use to the Houston Police Department non-emergency line at 713-884-3131.
- Contact 311 to report littering and damage to city property.
- Sign the petition to create a zone that would prohibit sleeping on the street during daytime hours. We will begin to collect signatures for this petition in October of 2016.
- Attend public session at City Hall to raise awareness among our elected officials of the issue of aggressive panhandling (Date TBD).
- Join your local civic association to help in their efforts to beautify the esplanades and make them locations that are not conducive to aggressive panhandling.

Thank you for helping our community combat aggressive panhandlers that destroy our neighborhoods and for helping to assist those that are truly in need of food, shelter, healthcare and basic needs.

A special note to those who give to the panhandlers:

For many of us, it's hard to look away. It's hard to sit in the comfort of our air-conditioned cars on our way to the store or to work or to play and see the suffering and/or addiction that drives people to stand on our corners and beg. We are a charitable group of folks out here. Some say they wouldn't be out there if they didn't need something. That's true, but if they are truly homeless, what they really need is a safe place to live where they are not preyed upon or victimized. They need REAL assistance to get their lives back on track. Giving them money doesn't give them what they truly need. It may buy them a bag of kush, a rock of crack, or a bottle of comfort...but it doesn't help them.

City of Houston Municipal Code Section 10-451.10 describes yard maintenance responsibilities. In simplified terms, Residents are responsible for maintaining your entire yard within your property boundaries. Residents are also responsible for maintaining your yard out to the curbline of the street adjacent to your yard (for example, if your house is on a corner, then maintain out to the curb for both your front and side streets). If an adjacent property does not have a curbline (for example, a drainage easement), then residents are responsible for maintaining the adjacent property for 14 feet beyond their property line. This is why homeowners are responsible for maintaining the area between the sidewalk and the street. A big thank you to all who mow a portion of the easements.

Schwartz has been a voice of the community and represented Southwest Houston in many organizations and committees over the years. He has served as an example to and a mentor for many in our area. Master Plan Continues

A master plan requires much data gathering and research, but just as importantly, a master plan requires a huge amount of conversation and feedback to build consensus. The Master Plan for the Westbury Community Garden is being prepared by the team from

Asakura Robinson(AR), which is a planning, urban design, and landscape architecture firm that strengthens environments and positively impacts communities through innovation, engagement, stewardship, and an integrated design process

At the first public meeting held on June 21, the team obtained ideas and then prepared 3 preliminary concepts which were presented to the Garden Master Plan Steering Committee for comments. Those comments were then used to create a draft plan, which was presented during the second public meeting, held on September 20, 2016. The goal was to get more comments to refine the plan. Drainage and use of storm-water continue to be a major issue for the site. After a question and answer period about the draft design, participants were encouraged to put adhesive



notes on maps of the site to indicate what design items were positive or negative and also to discuss any additional concerns or comments on the site maps.

Let's Clean-up Westbury: Bandit Signs

Did you know it is ILLEGAL to place signs in a public right-of-way or place? The public right-of-way includes: esplanades, the space between a street and sidewalk, and city parks. People, who attach signs to poles or trees or who post signs at intersections, sidewalks, parks, or esplanades, aren't only creating eyesores in our neighborhood, they are also breaking the law. These types of signs are forbidden both by state law and by city ordinance. These signs are called "bandit signs" or "litter on a stick".

Residents who see what they suspect to be bandit signs should report them to the City of Houston Department of Neighborhoods by calling the 3-1-1 Houston Service Helpline or using the Houston 3-1-1 mobile app. Violators are subject to a fine between \$300 -\$500, can be taken to court, as well as have a warrant issued for their arrest for breaking Chapter 28 of Houston's code of ordinances.

How to Identify a Bandit Sign? Bandit signs are typically small and placed along public spaces as esplanades. These signs include political, real estate, developer, and garage sale signs, etc. and are placed upon a public street, public sidewalk, public right-of-way, public park, or on any public building or structure of any kind belonging to the city.

What can you do?

- 1. Call 311 and report the location of the sign. An inspector will be there within 48 hours. A city citation will be issued.
- 2. All signs posted on public right-of-way are considered to be trash; therefore, any bandit signs are allowed to be removed by anyone, the same as removing any other trash. In fact, Westbury volunteers, the city, and the Brays Oaks Management District often remove illegally placed "bandit signs".
- 3. During this active political season, please post political signs in YOUR yard between the sidewalk and your house.

Sod Web Worms Taking Over Westbury Yards

Does your yard have large patches of brown grass? Are there small moths flying as you walk across your lawn? It's more than likely sod web worms say lawn experts. It's been three decades since wet, hot and moist conditions created the perfect environment for the tropical web worm to thrive.

The sod webworms spend the winter several inches below the surface. During spring the larvae mature and transform into the adult moth stage. After mating the moths deposit eggs that hatch in one week. The young feed for one to weeks before transforming Into the pupal and adult stage. Two or three generations may be completed within a year. Our lawns are susceptible during the hot months of July and August.

Control measures: According to the Texas A &M cooperative extension office, if you find three to four sod webworm larvae within a six inch square of dying sod, then chemical treatment is recommended. Larvae are most active on cloudy days or at night. Spray or granular applications of insecticide will work. Recommended: insecticides containing acephate (Orthene), bendiocarb, (Dycarb or Turcam), carbaryl(Sevin) or the microbial insectices Bacillus thuringiensis ssp Kurstake and ssp. aizawai
