City Purchasing Multiple Sites for **Drainage Near Westbury**

The Westbury Civic Club is excited to announce that the City of Houston is purchasing the old Shell research facility on Gasmer next to the Willow Waterhole basins. This 28-Acre site will be used for additional detention and for the Levitt Pavilion. At the Westbury Annual Meeting in September, Mayor Turner said that the City will finalize the purchase in October after the environmental study.

District J City Council Member Mike Laster announced that the City of Houston is purchasing the site of the old Boardwalk Apartments off Fondren and Brays Bayou. This site will be used for additional drainage.

A Message from the Westbury Civic Club President

The 2019 Annual WCC Meeting was an amazing event, full of energy, and notable for a public announcement by Mayor Sylvester Turner that will propel Westbury into becoming a new city-wide destination.

The civic club always provides food and raffles off door prizes at our Annual Meeting, but this year we added a fun new photo op! It was enjoyable to watch people smiling while taking a photo with our new "I Westbury" frame, and amusing to watch friends cram their heads together for group photos! It looks like a new tradition has started. Thanks to our crafty office manager, Jennifer Edmondson, for creating this fun frame! We can use this at future events. We asked people to raise their hands to indicate when they moved to Westbury. THREE people at the meeting have lived in Westbury since the 1960s! Duane Coombs moved here as an adult, while Vicki Davison and Lisa Placke were children. It is wonderful that Westbury continues to be a community which attracts new residents while retaining long-time residents.

It has long been frustrating to me and many others that our residential community is fine, but our commercial and public places are sometimes not. Too often these places are shabby or lack those special amenities that make a place amazing. How do we get from where we are to where we want to be? Behind the scenes, many folks have been advocating (or, more accurately, nagging) to bring back the basics, plus add special amenities to the Westbury area.

An amazing opportunity arose when Shell made a decision to shut down its research

facility on Gasmer and then later decided that they would sell this 28-acre property. The Shell site adjoins the Willow Waterhole Greenway, next to the area where the Annual Music Fest is held. Would it be possible, somehow, for these 28 acres to be purchased for a public purpose, to improve the Willow Waterhole amenities? How could the money be obtained? How could Shell be convinced to sell this site? Many creative minds collaborated to figure out how to make this dream possible. At the Westbury Civic Club Annual Meeting, Mayor Turner was proud to publicly announce that the City will sign a contract to acquire the 28-acre Shell Research facility in late October, pending the completion of the environmental review. About 15 acres will be used for much needed additional stormwater detention, and the remaining 13 acres will be used as the site for the new Levitt Houston music pavilion (more details on page 13). The relocation of the future Levitt Houston pavilion will also allow more detention to be added near S. Post Oak. Many thanks to Mayor Sylvester Turner, CM Martha Castex-Tatum, Recovery Czar Steve Costello, Harris County Flood Control District, Houston Public Works, Brays Oaks Management District, and everyone who helped make this creative deal possible. More greenspace, more detention, and more flood mitigation make this a great project for Westbury and for our surrounding neighborhoods in District K.

Let's continue the momentum in Westbury to enhance our places and events. Take advantage of the cooler fall weather to get outside and explore our community. The Fall Westbury White Elephant Garage Sale will be held on the morning of Saturday, October 26 (page 8)

at Westbury United Methodist Church parking lot. Later that day, "Halloween in the Park" with a Trunk or Treat and costume contest will be held at the Willow Waterhole Schwartz Gazebo, see page 22 for more details. Have you noticed that a new Farmer's Market is being held every weekend morning in the parking lot of the old HEB on S. Braeswood at Chimney Rock? See page 19.

There is one more "new" place over at Willow Waterhole that is close to my heart. The small pavilion near S. Willow (across the street from The Gathering Place) is being enhanced to honor Scouts who have completed service projects over at Willow Waterhole (including one of my sons) and will also honor community leader Dabney Kennedy. Dabney has a long history as a leader in the Boy Scouts of America organization. Dabney is also a friend and mentor, and is a past-President of the Westbury Civic Club and a past-President of the non-profit Westbury Area Improvement Corporation. Some have been asking how they can honor our friend Dabney with a contribution. Donations can be mailed to: Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy, 11415 Chimney Rock, Houston TX 77035. Meyer Library News


→ Meyer Library CLOSED Indefinitely







Unlike many states, Texas requires voters to be registered to vote at least 30 days BEFORE an election. The last day to register to vote is OCTOBER 7 to be able to vote on the final day of voting on Election Day, November 5.

What is Needed to Vote in Person?

The State of Texas requires voters to have an acceptable form of identification to be able to vote in person. There are 7 acceptable forms of Identification, including a Texas Driver's License and a US passport. Go to HarrisVotes.org for more information.

Where Do You Vote on Election Day?

Anywhere! A NEW program initiated by Harris County Clerk, Diane Trautman, will allow any eligible voter in Harris County to vote at ANY county polling place in Harris County, including at your local precincts. The priority is convenience for the voter. This means that on Election Day (Tuesday, November 5), voters can vote near where they work, live, or go to school in Harris County and not just at their local precinct.

2019 Westbury Annual Meeting

Tropical Storm Imelda caused a one week postponement, but didn't dampen the enthusiasm of the crowd who turned out for the September 2019 Annual Meeting of the Westbury Civic Club. A standing room only crowd of over 200 people enjoyed a meet and greet complete with food from Chick Fil A and a new I Love Westbury frame!

The WCC welcomed Houston **Mayor Sylvester Turner** to the Annual Meeting. After singing a rousing rendition of Happy

Birthday to Mayor Turner, the topic quickly turned to flooding. Mayor Turner said, "Last week (Tropical Storm Imelda) reminds us that we must always be diligent as residents of Houston." He then provided updates on multiple projects that are in the works for alleviating flooding in our area.

The highlight of the evening, which generated a standing ovation, was the

Mayor's announcement that the City is about to was close on purchasing the 28-acre Shell property adjacent to the Willow Waterhole. Read more about this exciting announcement on page 13. More greenspace, more detention, and more flood mitigation make this a great project for Westbury and for our surrounding neighborhoods in District K. In addition to this 28 acres, the Mayor announced more acreage adjacent to the Fondren Diversion Channel that should be purchased in the next few months. Both of these projects will help mitigate flooding along the Willow Waterhole Bayou (WWB). The Westbury Civic Club has been seriously advocating for additional detention and improvements along the WWB since 2013.

District K Council Member Martha Castex-Tatum
appounced that the library

announced that the library project is moving along. The new District K library will be on Belrose, at the old Post Office site. The property has been purchased and an architect is reviewing options. She mentioned touring existing libraries to look for features to incorporate into the new one.



District K is staying on top of Public Works to get the Quiet Zone reinstated along the railroad track. After the upgrades are completed, the Federal Railroad Administration will have to re-examine the crossings and decide it if it is safe again.

She reiterated her commitment to make District K the cleanest district in the city. The District K Hot Team which is paid for



from her Council Service budget is working to clean up the area by making regular sweeps of known illegal dumping sites. These illegal dumpers are becoming more and more bold with dumping occurring regularly on West Bellfort. After seeing over 100 yellow "bandit" signs pop up one Saturday morning in District K, and realizing the thousands of dollars spent each month removing this blight, she is working to rid our esplanades and right of ways of these illegal signs.

Wanda Adams, HISD District 9 Trustee, brought the good news that her district had no F rated schools per the latest TEA ratings. Westbury HS was only 1 point away from getting a B rating. She introduced Westbury HS Principal Susan Monaghan who gave an update on WHS progress. The new

Fine Arts wing is scheduled to be ready by the first of the year. Once that is done

that will complete the work from the last HISD bond.

WHS Parent Engagement
Director Jeri Brown received
a big round of applause for
going the extra mile so that a
WHS drop-out could re-enroll
at school with plans to graduate

Weather Wary in Westbury

Does rain make you nervous? Are you unsure on the weather forecasts? Does listening to the news weather reports make you panic? You are not alone. Houston weather over the past couple years has made us all very wary, if not scared, of storms. Houston gets rain. The trick is to know where and how much. There are many good websites and apps available that can help guide you before rain events or during them. This is not a complete list but just one meant to help guide you and add to your storm preparations.

Harris County Flood Warning System www.harriscountyfws.org

This website is extremely helpful <u>during</u> a rain event. It shows real time bayou levels and rainfall amounts at gages that have been installed along the bayous. **Gage 445** is located in Westbury on the Willow Waterhole Bayou at the Landsdowne bridge. Gage 440 is located on Brays Bayou at S. Rice. A new tool just introduced is the ability to sign up for Flood Alerts by gage.

National Hurricane Center - www.nhc.noaa.gov

If there is a chance of a named storm or there is a current named storm, the National Hurricane Center is your go-to source. During an active named storm, there will be multiple updates issued along with many different maps. These include the wind probability, the storm track cone, storm surge, tides, and many more.

Hype-free Weather Forecast www.spacecityweather.com

This website is dedicated to covering Houston weather news and forecasting with accuracy and without hype. Space City Weather was founded in October 2015. This website isn't about making money or getting "hits", it is truly about providing residents and business owners a quality forecast to make informed decisions. Eric Berger and Matt Lanza provide the best forecast for Houston weather. You can also follow them on Facebook.

HCFCD Answers Questions

The WCC asked HCFCD how the detention basins performed during the rains and also about some properties in Westbury that Harris County has recently approved to purchase for flood risk reduction purposes. To clarify some of the terms used in the response, the City of Houston (COH) handles street drainage and HCFCD handles bayou drainage. Major city drainage improvements are often done as part of a Capital Improvement Project (CIP).

The Willow Waterhole Bayou (WWB) reached close to the top of the bank. How did the weirs downstream function? (As a bit of background, flood gage #445 is located in Westbury where the Landsdowne Bridge crosses the WWB. The elevation of this gage is normally about 2 feet higher than the elevation of the overflow "weir" at the detention lakes. There is not a gage at the weir. If the channel level gets high enough, the system is designed so that water will start flowing over the weir and into the detention basins).

We went out there this morning and it looked like the basins acted as designed. The rapid flood waters raised 8.93 feet in 2 hours and 22 minutes. The elevation of the weir is 50'. There is about a 2 foot difference in natural ground elevation from the weir to Landsdowne Drive. Once the water elevation hits around 52' at Landsdowne Drive, it enters the basin we believe. On inspection today it looked like there was about 1 to 2 feet of flow going over the weir at its high point. The restrictor whose function is to slow the water down so it backs up and goes over the weir structure was clear from obstruction.

We heard at the Brays Bayou Association meeting that the County has identified several properties in Westbury to purchase. Could we get a brief technical explanation of the purpose of the properties that will be acquired for excess overflow, for our newsletter? The COH is working with HCFCD to acquire properties in the area that will assist in the COH installing street inlets, channel outfalls and emergency over flows to Willow Waterhole Bayou. This is part of the COH overall CIP program. The acquired properties are all voluntary purchases whose owners have shown interest in selling their property. Newer design standards required developments to be designed with more inlets, outfalls, emergency overflows, and detention. These properties will be used to update the drainage design on the existing conditions to be closer to newer standards. This will reduce the risk of flooding, increase drainage and detention.

How are the city and HCFCD working together?

The COH and HCFCD are working together via inter-local agreements. We are also working together to locate and design additional detention along Willow Waterhole bayou to facilitate additional detention. The COH and HCFCD are working together to maximize the outflow of the drainage from the subdivisions with offsetting detention to have zero impact on the existing water surface elevation in Willow Waterhole Bayou.

Will the sites be owned by city or county? HCFCD would own the sites and the COH would have an easement.

City Purchasing Shell Property at Willow Waterhole for Detention & Levitt Pavilion Site

During the Westbury Civic Club Annual Meeting, Mayor Sylvester Turner announced that the City is acquiring the 28 acre vacant Shell Research facility on Gasmer. This will have a huge impact in the Westbury area.

The City will use the site for additional detention, plus 13 acres will be the location for a "Levitt Pavilion" performing venue in Houston. This property is next to the Willow Waterhole Greenway (See map). The City anticipates that purchase will close in late October.

If you are not sure why a Levitt Pavilion is an exciting project, do an internet search on Levitt Pavilions located across the country! The original Houston site for a Levitt Pavilion had been proposed on a 13 acre site near South Post Oak in the Westbury Super Neighborhood. However, this original



location was adversely affected by the uncertainty caused by a possible extension of the Fort Bend tollway along South Post Oak.

Levitt Pavilion Houston Chairman, Howard Sacks, had this to say about the acquisition of the Shell Research facility: "We now have the ideal location for Levitt Pavilion Houston! Next hurdle is to fundraise millions to build the Pavilion. This will require much effort and generosity as we have a limited time to get this done."

How will the acquisition of the Shell Research Facility reduce flooding risk? The Shell facility is 28 acres. More than half (15 acres) of the Shell site will be used for NEW detention in Westbury. Obtaining the Shell site also means that the original proposed 13 acre site of the Levitt Pavilion Houston near South Post Oak is now available and will be used for more detention. This means that 15 plus 13 adds up to 28 acres of land that will be available for NEW storm water detention. How does this help Westbury since most of Westbury is upstream of this new detention? It is our understanding that part of this detention can be used to offset modifications to the street drainage system in Westbury.

City Purchasing Land for Detention near Brays Bayou

CM Mike Laster of District J announced that the city plans to purchase the site of the former Boardwalk Apartments at 9100 Fondren, located near



Brays Bayou. The city intends to make the purchase using federal disaster relief funding. The site has endured repeated flooding from rain events over the past few years and the apartment complex was demolished after Hurricane Harvey. The city's Housing and Community Development Department will partner with Houston Public Works and the Harris County Flood Control District to convert the 7.73 acre site into greenspace and/or detention to help reduce the risk of future flooding in the area.

District K "HOT" Team at Work

The District K "HOT Team" is working diligently to make District K the cleanest district in the city. This program is being paid from CM Martha Castex –Tatum's district service funds and costs almost \$14,000 a month. This is a large amount of money to pick up the trash from illegal dumping and illegal "bandit" signs. The Brays Oaks Management District also pays a crew to pick up trash from our major streets and collects illegal "bandit" signs. Think of all the money being spent by these organizations to pick up trash that could be used for OTHER PROJECTS to make our communities better! We agree with CM Martha Castex-Tatum that it is important to change behaviors and to change the way that people think about trash. Together we can make our whole area look cleaner. We need to create a CLEAN STATE OF MIND. #CleanStateOfMind.

Illegal Dumping

If you see stuff that has been illegally dumped, call 311 and get a service request (SR) number. Send an email to MelvinHopkins@houstontx.gov with the SR number, location, and description. Melvin manages Field Operations for District K, including managing the District K HOT Team. Initially, 27 sites were

identified as sites of chronic illegal dumping and were visited frequently, sometimes daily. After two months of doing cleanups, while identifying and contacting culprits, 18 of those sites were clean during the last survey. This shows that dedicated effort can make a difference to reduce illegal dumping.



If you see someone dumping furniture

or other items illegally, take a picture of the vehicle and the person doing it, if you can do so safely. A video of the crime is even better evidence. Did you know that Crime Stoppers is now offering a reward for reporting the criminals who are doing illegal dumping? Then follow Step 1 to get an SR number and get the illegal trash cleaned up by the Hot Team.

Bandit Signs

What are "Bandit Signs"? These are signs advertising businesses that have been posted illegally on public property. You might see them nailed high on telephone poles, or attached to street signs or street lights, or stuck in the ground on an esplanade, or located between the sidewalk and the street. These companies do their advertising by illegally posting "bandit signs". Be careful around these signs since these signs are typically located in places with a high volume of traffic. Every month HUNDREDS of these illegal bandit signs are removed from our streets in District K.

- → Try to take a picture of the illegal bandit sign and the phone number of the business. Send the photo of the illegal bandit sign and its location to District K.
- → If you can safely remove the signs, please do so. Otherwise, more signs will start showing up. They are trash and can be removed.
- → You can call the number on the sign and ask them to stop illegally posting their signs.

District K "Neighborhood 101" Workshop

CM Martha Castex-Tatum hosts regular Neighborhood 101 workshops that are open to all District K residents. The September workshop featured a panel of city employees from different departments, including: Legal, Planning, Public Works, and Solid Waste. Also on hand were all of the District K staff. We encourage you to come to these meetings, and meet the people who can help you navigate city services. Attending this month from Westbury were Cindy Chapman, Becky Edmondson and Steve Goldberg.



Railroad Quiet Zone Update

Train horns continue to blare along the two train tracks at South Main/US90A. Why? Our railroad "Quiet Zone" has been temporarily halted, after an inspection found that these railroad crossings do not comply with current safety standards for a Quiet Zone. Until the crossings are upgraded by the CITY, the train horns are required to blast every time a train crosses through the intersections. Residents who live near the train tracks are frustrated and sleep-deprived because these two train tracks are busy day and night.

Houston Public Works (PW) has revised the signage on Hillcroft for vehicles approaching the railroad crossings. PW now needs to modify the road curbing near the tracks.

At the WCC Annual Meeting, District K CM Martha Castex-Tatum announced that PW has told her that it will be completing the work in late September. Then the next step will be for an inspector from the Federal Railroad Admin (FRA) to inspect the crossings to decide whether the train horns are still needed for safety reasons.

Deadline For Actual Harvey Repairs

Houston homeowners have until **Dec. 31, 2019** to make home repairs that could be eligible for reimbursement under the federal Harvey Homeowner Assistance Program (HoAP).

The deadline is set by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The deadline is for the actual repairs to be completed; homeowners can still apply for reimbursement after December 31 for work completed before that date. "If you've been putting off repairs of damage caused by Hurricane Harvey, now is the time to make them so that you may be eligible to have federal funds cover some of your costs," said Houston Mayor Sylvester Turner.

The maximum amount of reimbursement depends on homeowners' income:

- → Below 80% Area Median Income (AMI): 100% of eligible expenses, up to \$80,000
- → 81 -120% AMI: 50% of eligible expenses, up to \$40,000
- → Above 120% AMI: 25% of eligible expense, up to \$20,000

All homeowners impacted by Hurricane Harvey should take the Harvey Recovery Survey at recovery.houstontx.gov or by phone at 832-393-0550. Almost 20,000 residents have taken the Harvey Recovery Survey. As a result, about 5,000 homeowners have been invited to apply to HoAP and are working on an application or have completed their submission.

Almost \$150 million is still available for reimbursements.

Westbury Leader Quoted in Houston Chronicle

Current Westbury Area Improvement Corporation President and Past WCC President Becky Edmondson was in the news after Tropical Storm Imelda caused flooding in Houston. Here is the part of the article in the Houston Chronicle on September 19 where Becky is mentioned:

By 1:30 p.m., Becky Edmondson, a civic leader in the southwest Houston neighborhood of Westbury, was finishing an update to post on the club's Facebook page. She checked the online flood gage at nearby Willow Waterhole: Just shy of 54 feet. "Harris County says 'flooding likely' at 54.25," Edmondson said. "Historically it's taken until about 55 before homes flood." She sighed, recalling that this is the sixth straight year Westbury has struggled with flooding.

"It's wearying," she said. "The most frustrating part of it is you're just sitting and watching the water rise." In the 10 minutes since she had last checked the flood gauge, it had risen once more, to 54.14 feet. "We do need solutions, and in the Westbury area we do have some projects pending, but we need to get them past pending," she said. "People can't continue to live like this. People are panicked." She paused, then added: "I used to love a rainy day."

Westbury Area Improvement Corp.

One focus of the WAIC is our neighborhood schools. We are passionate about our schools because a neighborhood thrives when schools thrive. Without a library or librarian at Anderson ES and no librarian at Westbury High School, the need for a City library is even more urgent.

Westbury Area Schools Anderson Elementary

Dr. Everett, the new principal of Anderson, talked about the needs at Anderson ES. Coming in with a "D" from the TEA was a troubling sign and one that he intends to correct and overcome. Cindy Chapman and Becky Edmondson met with both Dr. Everett and the School Improvement officer to discuss ways we as a community could help. A new PTO is forming and their first meeting is October 8 at 5PM. The WAIC volunteered to fundraise for Anderson for a library and to see where else we can help. Look for details in future *Criers* on how you can be a part of this important initiative.

Meyerland Middle School

Ambreen Ali, 6th grade Dean, from Meyerland MS, attended the September WAIC meeting. She asked that we help spread the word that, although the official name of the school, Meyerland Performing and Visual Arts Middle School, includes "Performing and Visual Arts", it is a full academic school where students can even earn high school credits. It is still a neighborhood school.

Westbury High School

Enrollment is at 2,402. It hosted a parent university. WHS will offer SAT testing for all seniors on campus at no cost. There will be an upcoming college fair with 60 colleges represented.

Westbury Community Garden

Two motions were passed to amend the bylaws of the Westbury Community Garden: By-laws format was improved so they could be referenced. Motion to codify historical organization documents in an order that is more organized. Passed unanimously. Article 8- Change for annual meeting, traditionally in February, to move back to November. Motion passed unanimously.

Overtime HPD Initiative


Discussion of hiring two officers for a four-hour shift. It can be a day that we suggest and can vary week to week and can focus on our priorities. It would be a Super Neighborhood initiative. Cost: \$440-500 per shift with a marked HPD unit and officers on duty. The Constable program only patrols homes, not commercial or multi-family. The Constables cannot enforce City ordinances. Sgt. Ortiz is taking the plan to his Captain. Brays Oaks Management District is doing a similar program that has been very successful targeting hotspots.

School Traffic Concerns

With our schools back in session please be mindful to take extra care around school zones and crosswalks, especially during drop off and pick up times. There is nothing more important to us or our residents than protecting our children.


Take a look at this diagram to refresh your memory about when and where you are required to stop for school buses. Drivers going in both directions must **STOP** for a school bus... unless the school bus is stopped on a road which has a divider /esplanade separating the lanes of traffic. Both Anderson Elementary and Parker Elementary are school bus "Hubs" for magnet students, resulting in more bus activity in our area in both the morning and afternoon.

We remind you to take caution when driving through school zones. Those strict speed limits are there for a reason and we have asked Pct. 5 to closely monitor traffic near Anderson ES, Parker ES, Meyerland Middle School, and Westbury HS to make sure our school kids are safe.

Put down your phone while driving near schools. It is illegal to text or talk on the phone while driving in school zones. Make sure to stop when school busses are loading and unloading.







Willowbend Woes

The speed limit on Willowbend is 30 MPH. In school zones, the max speed is 20 MPH! That double yellow line down the center of Willowbend means NO PASSING and NO U-TURNS. Every day drivers are doing 40 or 50 mph or faster on Willowbend. Sometimes these scofflaws are driving around law-abiding drivers. Parents dropping off and picking up their students make illegal u-turns.

On Willowbend, from West Bellfort to Braewick, there are four schools nearby, affecting almost every intersecting street along Willowbend in Westbury. Meyerland MS affects Chimney Rock and Manhattan. Parker ES affects Atwell and Mullins. St. Thomas More and Westbury Christian School affect Hillcroft and Glenfield Court. And, once the new school is completed, Kolter ES will affect Cedarhurst and make it 5 schools affecting Willowbend. That adds up to thousands of students being dropped off and picked up every day along Willowbend.

The WCC is working closely with the City, the police, and Pct. 5 to find ways to calm the traffic on this very busy street.

Slow Down. Go the Speed Limit.

Anderson Elementary Needs Community Help & Support

Anderson Elementary School is an important part of our Westbury community, but it faces several challenges. Many nearby zoned houses are vacant and untended due to 2017 Harvey flooding. We think that more families than usual have moved out of the school zone last year, resulting in additional disruption at Anderson and lower attendance than usual. A first-time principal became principal shortly before the school year started.

We reached out to HISD Trustee Wanda Adams to express our concern about the challenges faced by the school, because the TEA ratings for the school fell to a D when ratings were released recently. This is not acceptable for Anderson Elementary.

Trustee Adams forwarded our concerns to HISD. As a result, Cindy Chapman and Becky Edmondson met with new school principal, Dr. Deshonta Everett, and with the School Support Officer, Tarrynce Robinson to discuss. This will be an ongoing process. Some action items that Becky and Cindy have identified where the Westbury community can help include:



- ♦ Dr. Everett is now on the email list for the monthly Westbury Area Improvement Corporation (WAIC) meetings and attended the September meeting to meet more Westbury area community leaders.
- ♦ He will be mentored by Cappy Selig, a resident of Westbury who is a retired principal from Parker Elementary and who consults for HISD on a part-time basis.
- ♦ The school does not have a PTO. The school will start a Parent Advisory Council and we promised to assist the school with community connections and publicity. The first PTO meeting will be on October 8 at 5PM. They have 32 parents interested.
- ♦ We were dismayed to learn that the school library has not been used in many years. We took a tour of the library and saw that the books on the shelves are old and disorganized. The school does not have a librarian. HISD agreed to bring in Library Services to evaluate the books. We agreed to help the

school library. Additionally, book donations for classrooms may be part of this project to improve access to books by students. This project is being developed.



* The SPARK playground at Anderson is old and needs to be replaced. The WAIC is consulting with SPARK to determine a path forward. As a community, we also want to push for improvements at the city park next door (Hager Park), which has been identified by the city as one of the parks most in need of upgrade.

The school is increasing the daily instructional time in math and English and will work to improve daily attendance. We will continue to work with Anderson Elementary to find ways to help and to advocate for the school.

Dedicated Leaders at WHS Make Education a Possibility for EVERY Student

Often the evening news seems to be filled with bad stories, but this past month Westbury High School was featured on Channel 13 for their commitment to every student. When students don't return to school in September, the WHS administration contacts them to see if they can be helped to return to school. One young woman told them she hadn't returned to complete her senior year because she had no one to look after her baby. She was told, "come to school and bring your baby".



Jeri Brown, the WHS Parent Engagement Director, immediately took over child care duties for a week while WHS looked for a suitable place for baby Derrick to spend his days while his mom finished her high school work. Derrick's mom is now on track to graduate in December.

But the story doesn't end there. Several other students, who had dropped out, have called WHS to find out how they, too, could return

to get their high school diplomas.

Many students have needs beyond the classroom that keep them from learning or achieving their full potential. HISD has a new program under the umbrella of "Wraparound Services". These specialists figure out how to obtain assistance for everything from housing, food, mental health services and more.
