A Message from the Westbury Civic Club President

I want to thank the volunteers who are serving on the Westbury Civic Club board for the next twelve months. These volunteers care deeply about Westbury and devote their free time to attend meetings, take training classes, write letters, plan activities, or do the nitty-gritty work of making an organization like the Westbury Civic Club (WCC) work. Unlike many property owner associations, the WCC is self-managed and operates with a part-time employee and volunteer workers. I also want to thank the WCC board members who have decided to step down from the board this year. Thank you for your service on the board! The Westbury Civic Club is celebrating its 65th anniversary this year and it takes all of us working together to keep this neighborhood great.

I hope you found the WCC Annual Meeting, held on September 22, to be informative. A recording of the meeting is available online on the WestburyHouston Facebook page. Sgt. Derkowski gave a Public Safety Update on behalf of the Precinct 5 Constables. Most of the meeting was devoted to a discussion by District K Councilmember Martha Castex-Tatum about issues and city projects related to our Westbury neighborhood, followed by a question and answer session. Library News


A new library is coming to Westbury! The new library will be located on Belrose at the site of the old post office. The new library will be a large, regional library for District K and Southwest Houston.

Construction of the site is slated to begin in 2022 with completion in 2023. The new name for the library will be the Shannon Walker Regional Library. More about this on page 9.

The Westbury Civic Club started a Library Action Committee that has been meeting every 2 weeks for several months. The committee is made up of Westbury residents. One of the main concerns highlighted by the Committee is cut through traffic in the neighborhood to get to the new library. The library will have access from Belrose and Chimney Rock. The concern is the high amount of traffic down Atwell or other Westbury 3 streets to get to Belrose. Belrose is only accessible from other neighborhood streets, it does not connect to any major street. One possible solution the committee is suggesting is that that official address for the library be Chimney Rock, not Belrose. This will make it easier for Houston residents to find the new library, as Chimney Rock is a major throughfare. We are hopeful this will eliminate some neighborhood cut through traffic. Many people using mapping apps. These apps would direct people to enter from Chimney Rock if that is the address, not Belrose, so most non-Westbury residents will be directed to that entrance when trying to find the new library.

The committee is trying to set a meeting with the City of Houston to discuss traffic concerns.

Trash, yard waste, recycling, and heavy trash are picked up by the City of Houston.

Regular Household Trash

Pick-up is EVERY Thursday. Regular household trash goes into the black trash can.

Yard Waste

Pick-up is EVERY week either on Thursday or Saturday or any day the City decides to come by. Yard Waste MUST be placed in the correct City bio-degradable bags.



Recycling in Westbury

All of Westbury recycles on Schedule A. Recycling is every other week. Recycling goes into the green trash can.

Why Support the WCC?

Westbury is a unique neighborhood. While all 5,000 homes in our Westbury neighborhood have active deed restrictions, only 463 have mandatory assessments. This means the Westbury Civic Club heavily relies on voluntary financial contributions from residents.

Westbury has historically had strong voluntary support because residents understood the great benefits of the WCC and our programs. The past several years' contributions to the Westbury Civic Club and to the Westbury Area Patrol have been down. By working together, we can meet the challenges head on and keep our neighborhood the jewel that it is. We all want a safe, flood free neighborhood with great schools and nice neighbors.

The total amount for the **2021 Voluntary Dues is \$360**. That is less than a dollar a day! The Westbury Civic Club dues are \$60 for the year. The WCC suggests a contribution of \$300 for the Westbury Area Patrol (a paid contract with Precinct 5 Constables).

WCC Leaders Attend District K Workshop

More than 50 community leaders from across District K attended an informative workshop in September to learn about changes made by the Texas legislature that will affect civic clubs, HOAs, and similar property owner associations. The workshop was organized by District K Councilmember Martha Castex-Tatum. As she noted, "We have to know the law in order to protect and enhance the value of our communities."

The Westbury Civic Club must follow our governing documents (for example – bylaws and deed restrictions), but we must also follow the state laws in the Texas Property Codes. The Texas legislature made several amendments in 2021. Some of the property code amendments only apply if there are mandatory assessments (Parkwest 1 and Parkwest 2), and some changes apply to every home in Westbury.

Five people associated with the Westbury Civic Club attended the workshop. CM Martha Castex-Tatum noted that "it's my goal to bring quality programming to our community so our leaders are successful and our communities continue to thrive."

Parking is available at St. John's Presbyterian or in the surrounding neighborhood.

Booth spaces are on sale for individual Westbury residents*. Cash or check only. You must be a paid current member of the Westbury Civic Club to purchase a booth. This means you must have paid your 2021 WCC membership dues of \$60. If you have not paid your dues, you must do so at the same time that you purchase your booth space. The booth price for individual Westbury residents will be \$20-\$25.

Booths will go on sale to non-residents, groups, and non-profit organizations on October 5, if space permits, on a first

for non-residents and groups is \$80-85.

District K Martha Castex Tatum Featured at Annual Meeting

The Westbury Civic Club (WCC) was honored to have Martha Castex-Tatum as our Guest Speaker for the September WCC Annual Meeting. She represents District K on Houston City Council, so she is the elected official for most residents of Westbury. She is also the Vice-Mayor Pro Tem (VMPT) for the City of Houston, which is an important position meaning she can preside at meetings on behalf of the Mayor when he is not available to attend. The September WCC meeting was held via Zoom video and was broadcast live on the WCC Facebook page. A video of the meeting is currently available on the WCC Facebook page. Council Member Martha Castex-Tatum started by congratulating the Westbury Civic Club for its 65th Anniversary this year. She then provided updates on a variety of topics.

New Library

CM Castex-Tatum thanked everyone who served on the library naming committee, and noted that the committee helped narrow the names from about 300 suggestions down to 5 finalists, which were then voted on by the public. The future library to be built in Westbury will be named after astronaut Dr. Shannon Walker, who grew up in Westbury and attended Westbury area schools. There will be an outdoor reading area named in memory of Donald Perkins, the first chief of staff for District K. The start date for the library construction has been pushed back to 2022, with completion anticipated in 2023.

Gateways at Highway 90A (South Main)

Five intersections along South Main have been painted bright colors and will have special lighting.

Railroad crossing at Hillcroft

The concrete has been replaced at the railroad tracks where they cross Hillcroft at S. Main.

Willow Waterhole

District K has committed \$150,000 to pave the Dryad driveway with asphalt, in association with the Brays Oaks Management District. Completion is anticipated by the end of October, depending on the cooperation of the weather.

Swales in Westbury

Harris County Flood Control District has purchased 7 lots located along the Willow Waterhole Bayou in Westbury to be greenspace and used for drainage projects. The lots currently have swales on them to help water drain during high rain events. Eventually these lots will be used for the City drainage projects coming to Westbury. However, HCFCD is currently responsible for maintenance of the lots, so contact HCFCD for maintenance issues.

Bellfort. * City has purchased the Spring Village Apartments (at Ludington and Chimney Rock) for future park/detention, but residents are still being relocated. * Sidewalks are responsibility of homeowner, but there is a bit of money available for sidewalk improvements for accessibility reasons.

Hager Park


Funds were approved in the 2017 Parks Bond for Hager Park at \$493,000, but it is in the 2026 budget. There was discussion about how to move up this project.

Trash

Solid Waste has a new app to help people know when they should put out trash. There is a lot of trash throughout the District and CM Castex-Tatum has her awesome HOT Team, which cleans up problem areas and reports problems. She encourages everyone to pick up 185 pieces of litter to help celebrate the 185th birthday of Houston. There has been less dumping around donation boxes since she helped spearhead an ordinance regulating donation boxes.

Weather Wary in Westbury

Does rain make you nervous? Are you unsure on the weather forecasts? Does listening to the news weather reports make you panic? You are not alone. Houston weather over the past couple years has made us all very wary, if not scared, of storms.



Houston gets rain. The trick is to know where and how much. There are many good websites and apps available that can help guide you before rain events or during them. One good piece of advice is to look for warnings and alerts from the actual source, for example the National Hurricane Center. This is not a complete list but just one meant to help guide you and add to your storm preparations.

Harris County Flood Warning System www.harriscountyfws.org

This website is extremely helpful <u>during</u> a rain event. It shows real time bayou levels and rainfall amounts at gages that have been installed along the bayous. **Gage 445** is located in Westbury on the Willow Waterhole Bayou at the Landsdowne bridge. Gage 440 is located on Brays Bayou at S. Rice. A new tool just introduced is the ability to sign up for Flood Alerts by gage. Another tool available on the website is a Flood Inundation real time map that can help residents make critical decisions regarding life and property during events. If you are ever curious about the rainfall amounts and rate, you can also look up historical data.

National Hurricane Center www.nhc.noaa.gov

If there is a chance of a named storm or there is a current named storm, the National Hurricane Center is your go-to source. During an active named storm, there will be multiple updates issued along with many different maps. These include the wind probability, the storm track cone, storm surge, tides, and many more.

Hype-free Weather Forecast www.spacecityweather.com

This website is dedicated to covering Houston weather news and forecasting with accuracy and without hype. Space City Weather was founded in October 2015. This website isn't about making money or getting "hits", it is truly about providing residents and business owners a quality forecast to make informed decisions. Eric Berger and Matt Lanza provide the best forecast for Houston weather. You can also follow them on Facebook.

Sign Up for Alerts from the City

Sometimes it is easy to become complacent with weather alerts, but emails, texts, and phone calls from the City Alert System can be extremely helpful. Timely information during emergencies is important. AlertHouston delivers critical information to Houston residents regarding current conditions, expected impacts, and protective actions to keep themselves and their loved ones safe.

Flood Gage Warning Alerts

The regional Flood Warning System measures rainfall and monitors water levels in bayous, creeks, and rivers on a real-time basis to inform area residents of potential flooding conditions. This system relies on a network of 250 gage stations that have been strategically placed throughout a Harris and surrounding counties. Westbury has one of these gages located on the Willow Waterhole Bayou (#445). This information is available at

www.harriscountyfws.org.
You can now sign up for alerts on a specific gages near your
home or work. You can receive default rainfall and water

level alerts or create custom water alerts.

The Willow Waterhole Bayou at Landsdowne rises quickly and it's imperative to surrounding homeowners to know what is happening. It is important to remember that this gage will likely stay at a certain level (approximately 51-52ft) when flood waters are going over the weirs downstream into the Willow Waterhole detention basins.

Westbury Flood Gage Explained

Westbury has a flood gage located on the Willow Waterhole Bayou at Landsdowne (gage 445). Once the Willow Waterhole Bayou reaches a certain level, the water will overflow the weirs into the basins at the Willow Waterhole complex. The Westbury flood gage (which is upstream of the basins) will read steady at this point, typically around 51.2-51.5 ft. It is also at this same level, that the flood control system will show that flooding is possible in Westbury and the news will start reporting it as such. While this is technically true and flooding can happen anywhere, it is important to remember that we have the basins downstream. Watch the gage levels to really know. If the gage holds steady, it is likely water is flowing into the basins, not homes. If the gage were to start rising again, flooding would be very likely in Westbury homes. The unknown factor is how full the basins are or will get once it starts raining. There is no gage or camera at the basins.

The gage in Westbury is set to only update when there is a change in water level. If we are in the middle of a rain event and the gage stops updating, while at the level of 51.2-51.5 ft, it is likely that the water is overflowing the weirs downstream.

Hurricane Nicholas Hits Texas


Hurricane Nicholas made landfall as a Category 1 hurricane on the Texas mid-coast on September 14 and blew through Houston as a Tropical Storm. Fortunately, our side of town received much less rainfall than some weather forecasts had anticipated. The biggest issue in Westbury was the wind. Wind gusts caused tree limbs to fall and many power outages occurred in the Westbury area. Most of

the Westbury power outages lasted less than a day but some homeowners were out for over 40 hours. The heaviest rainfalls happened closer to the coast and east of the Houston area. There was no reports of home flooding in Westbury. While the Atlantic hurricane season isn't over until November, typically in Texas, we do not see major storms after September.

However, always keep an eye on the tropics and listen to trusted weather sources (see column to the left).







Storm Debris from Hurricane Nicholas

In the past, when storm debris is extensive across the City, the Solid Waste Department has had special collection for the storm debris. However, in September, storm damage from Hurricane Nicholas varied widely across the city. The city only collected storm debris for homeowners who CALLED 311 to report that they had storm debris at the curb to be collected. For those who did not see the alert to call 311, storm debris will be collected on the usual Heavy Trash day which is scheduled for the 2nd Thursday, on October 14. You can put your tree and junk waste at the curb on the weekend before Thursday, October 14.

Commercial Property Updates

Buzzy Bee Gas Station/Car Wash/Convenience Store at West Bellfort/Chimney Rock - If you have been driving on W. Bellfort near the intersection of Chimney Rock, you have probably noticed that earth moving equipment has been very busy this past month. Many years ago, this vacant lot had housed an Exxon gas station, a laundry mat, plus several small retail centers. The buildings had become dilapidated and were eventually demolished. There had been interest a few years ago in placing a fitness center on the site, and then there had been some discussion of a small grocery store. Neither of those concepts or other ideas were ever implemented, and now the usage of the site is coming full circle with a gas station being built again. This new commercial development is a land lease, and the owner of the land still owns the part of the site that faces Chimney Rock. We have heard that the restaurant associated with the gas station will be a Sonic.

Dick's Sporting Goods - After months of speculation, a sign has been recently been posted that Dick's Sporting Goods is remodeling the former Bed Bath and Beyond space at Meyerland Plaza on Beechnut. There is not a sporting goods store in our area, so many families are very happy that this sporting goods store will be opening nearby to Westbury.

Bucky's (Not the well-known Texas Buccee's!) - A Bucky's sign has been posted for a while at a vacant lot located on the corner of South Post Oak at South Willow. We have heard the project is delayed and perhaps is being re-evaluated because convenience store chain, Casey's General Stores, purchased Buchanan Energy, the owner of Bucky's Convenience Stores, in May 2021. Bucky's had operated convenience stores in Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, Nebraska and Texas.

Spark Gas Station at West Airport/Hillcroft - the existing gas station at this corner has been in the process of being remodeled for a while. The convenience store is being expanded, and a new canopy and gas pumps have been built. New landscaping has been planted recently, so the store looks like it will be opening soon.






Brays Oaks Livable Center Study Public Comments Welcome

Q: We are looking to buy a home in Westbury, but want to make sure it has deed restrictions and we are confused about the information.

A. EVERY home in EVERY section of Westbury is protected by actively enforced Deed Restrictions. Some homes have voluntary dues and some have mandatory assessments. The Deed Restrictions are always active, whether or not dues or assessments have been paid. If you purchase a home in the Parkwest 1 or Parkwest 2 sections of Westbury, then you would have mandatory assessments to pay every year. All other homes in Westbury have voluntary dues. There is NO such thing as "grandfathered" in any section other than Parkwest 1 and 2. ALL homes have ACTIVE deed restrictions, despite your support of the Westbury Civic Club and whether or not you pay the WCC Dues.

Q: I am trying to refinance my home. Can you provide a statement of account?

A: Yes! Just email the WCC office at westburycc@sbcglobal.net. We can easily provide this documentation.

HISD "Listen and Learn" Event at WHS

New HISD Superintendent Millard House II was in Westbury in September as part of his "Listen and Learn" tour throughout the nine Trustee districts of the Houston Independent School District. Those in the audience in the Westbury High School (WHS) auditorium included parents, teachers, and concerned members of the public, including 3 members of the WCC Board, Cindy Chapman, Becky Edmondson, and Marcia Hartman.

Supt. House briefly spoke about his history as an educator. As a dyslexic, he mentioned he is a living witness that children with learning disabilities can succeed when they get the help that they need in school. He said that he has 3 initial

critical priorities for HISD, and the audience was invited to vote by texting from their phone with their preferred ways to implement these 3 priorities.

- * We will provide an exceptional classroom education in every neighborhood.
- * We will meet unique learning needs through quality special education services.
- * We will lead with accountability, energy, and integrity at every level of the district.

After his initial comments, HISD Supt. House invited those in the audience to make comments. On behalf of the Westbury Civic Club and the Westbury community, Becky Edmondson and Cindy Chapman both spoke, noting that there is a disparity in our community between the education experience in the two elementary schools located in our community - Parker Elementary and Anderson Elementary. They mentioned concerns about the lack of a functioning library at Anderson Elementary and requested that the school to be included in the next HISD bond program to get a new school building. Bill Burhans, a Westbury resident and President of the Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy, expressed concern about crime in the area of Willow Waterhole and Westbury High School and brought crime statistics data. He reminded Supt. House that HISD had promised in the previous bond to purchase the apartments located between the WHS baseball complex and WHS, but HISD then






Paving of Dryad Drive
