### **Town Hall Meeting**

State Representative Shawn Thierry hosted a Post-Hurricane Harvey Town Hall meeting on October 7, 2017. Over 350 homeowners attended to get the most up to date information on current flood control projects and watersheds. Other topics covered were how to apply for grant programs, how to raise your house, buyout programs, how (or whether) to get an SBA loan, national flood insurance payouts, and more. The forum was hosted at Willow Meadows Baptist Church. Senator Borris L. Miles participated and lent his leadership and strong support. Carl Ahrendt, our Hydrologist, opened the workshop with an excellent power point on stormwater engineering & drainage. Experts & officials from Harris County Flood Control District, City of Houston Housing & Community Development, FEMA, NFIP, and SBA were on hand to answer questions. Each of they answered all of our questions to the very best of their ability. Rep Thier-

ry said "Many families are still trying to find solutions that will work best for them in terms of rebuilding or relocating, however, this week my goal was to assemble all of them in one room to answer questions related solely to housing issues after Harvey and it happened!"



#### **City Property Tax Rate Lowered**

Despite Mayor Turner asking to keep the rate steady, City Council voted in mid-October to reduce our property tax rate. City Council voted to decrease the 2018 tax rate from 58.642 cents to 58.421 cents per \$100 of assessed property value. This means that on a home valued at \$200,000, an owner would pay about \$4 less in taxes on that property.

City Council Member At-Large, Mike Knox, introduced the alternate lower tax rate. City Council voted 15-2 to reduce the City's property tax rate. The only no votes were by Mayor Turner and Mayor Pro-tem Ellen Cohen.

From At-Large Council Member Mike Knox email:

I was recently reminded by one of my Council colleagues, that among our responsibilities on Council is to speak up for those who cannot speak for themselves. So often, it seems, government forgets those who pay the bills – the taxpayers.

Today was a victory for Houston taxpayers. I am proud of my City Council colleagues for joining me this morning in support of my proposal to reduce the City's property tax rate to \$0.58421 per \$100 valuation, the lowest property tax rate in decades.

The voice of Houston taxpayers was heard loud and clear in City Hall this morning. We will not exceed the voter imposed property tax revenue cap.



#### **KEEP STORM DRAINS CLEAN & CLEAR**

**Newspapers** - Please pick these up and recycle them. No, you didn't ask for them, but now they are on your property. Like them or not, they are your problem and require you to dispose of them. They accumulate in people's yards, and in the gutters blocking proper water flow.

**Storm drain inlet** - Remove any debris including newspapers, twigs and leaves from the grates. All these items impede the flow of storm water.

**Leaves** - Please keep the curb line in front of your house free of leaves by raking and bagging them weekly. Leaves are falling!

If you have a yard crew that does your landscaping and yardwork, please ask them to not blow debris down the street or into the storm drain inlets.

## Flood Forum hosted by the Brays Bayou Association

Third time was a charm! It was a packed house at Willow Meadows Baptist Church for the long-awaited, twice postponed Brays Bayou Association (BBA) Flood Forum. Charles Goforth, President of the BBA, made opening remarks and gave some interesting statistics about the Brays Bayou watershed. With over 750,000 residents, the Brays Bayou watershed is larger than the cities of Denver or Boston. Within this watershed are all of Houston's major universities, the Houston Medical Center, and the NRG stadium complex. It is important not only to Houston but the Nation.



The first speaker was Executive Director of Harris County Flood Control District (HCFCD), Russ Poppe. His presentation contained some interesting Harvey facts, as seen in the box below.

Steve Costello, Chief Resiliency Officer for the City of Houston and often referred to as the "Flood Czar" for the city, talked about the commitment of ALL parties to find and fund flooding solutions; the City, the County, the State, and the Federal government. He said there were three parts to Harvey Recovery by the city: Housing, Recovery, and Resiliency (which is planning for the future and is his area of responsibility).

Gary Zika, Project Manager of Project Brays for HCFCD brought the crowd up to date on the progress of Project Brays. The following information was given by HCFCD regarding work in our area. Also see map below or at www.projectbrays.com.

- → Channel Section: Buffalo Speedway to South Rice— Work started July 24, 2017. Estimated completion—3rd Quarter 2018 Estimated cost—\$11.3 million
- → Control Structure connecting Willow Waterhole— Work started June 19, 2017. Estimated Completion—3rd Quarter 2018 Estimated Cost—\$11.7 million
- → Forest Hill & Buffalo Spwy Bridges—
  Estimated Start Date—2nd Quarter 2018
  Estimated Completion—2nd Quarter 2019
  Estimated Cost—\$7 million
- → Channel Section S. Rice to Fondren —
  Estimated Start Date 3rd Quarter 2018
  Estimated Completion 3rd Quarter 2019
  Estimated Cost \$12 million

#### Q & A from Westbury residents

Several Westbury residents asked questions. A Westbury resident noted that 3 small ditches/bayous all converge behind her home and that she has flooded 4 times in 4 years. When is Westbury going to get some attention?


The City of Houston is currently working on several projects in the area including a large storm drain reconstruction project to start in 2021. In addition, the City has just obtained permission to use HUD funds to create a new detention pond near the Fondren Detention Ditch, which will help the Westbury area. Upstream detention is needed.

Will there be any buyouts in Westbury? If there are buyouts, how long will they take because homeowners can't wait years and years? – There is a possibility, if additional funding is obtained, that this could happen, but there are no promises. If additional buyouts are funded, the county has formulated a plan to make the process last no more than 12 months. Currently, the county has received interest from over 33K residents who are interested in buyouts. They want to stop the cycle of flooding – but it will take funding. The likelihood of a buyout in Westbury is low.

The Westbury Civic Club would like to thank the Brays Bayou Association for the tireless effort to host this meeting! It is important to get correct information to as many people as we can.

### Hurricane Harvey Came to Westbury

One Westbury Resident's Personal Story

My husband and I have been Westbury residents since 1977 and have seen lots of Hurricanes and Tropical storms roll in, but Harvey was definitely one for the record books. I have always had my stash of emergency supplies and faithfully go to the Hurricane/Emergency Workshop each June at the GRB. Over the years, I learned about how to make our family safe in the event of all types of emergencies. Once I heard Hurricane Harvey was coming, I assembled all of the emergency supplies and waited.

On Friday, August 25th, we didn't have much rain. The rain started in earnest on Saturday, and continued for days. We stayed in touch with our family members. Water never passed our sidewalk so we knew we were safe. My husband's mother, who has lived in Meyerland for over 44 years, and had NEVER flooded, was not so lucky. In the wee hours of Sunday, August 27th, we got an emergency call that water started entering her house. Our son was with her and kept her calm. He kept calling us giving us updates on the water. Unfortunately, we were flooded in and not able to get out of the driveway. At daylight, our son reported it was about 6-8 inches in the entire house and his grandmother wanted to climb into the attic or walk out..... of course we knew she could do neither with a walker or wheelchair, so told them to call 211, 311, 911, & the coast guard, we did the same.

This is when the real stress set in. We needed help for two of our family members immediately, 211 did not answer at all. 311 said they were busy and to leave a call back number and they would return our call within 45 minutes. I did get through to 911 and asked them to rescue my 86-year-old mother-in-law, but they said they did not know when they could, but would add her to the list. Then the phone rings.....it's 311. I explained they needed to rescue my mother-in-law. They asked what her zip code was. I told them 77096. Her reply, "Oh, she's not in an evacuation zone" What?!?! She is 86, and needs assistance and has 8" of water in her home. "I'll transfer you to my supervisor"... click... she hung up and the line went dead. I tried calling back to 311 but could not get it to pick up. Next, I called the Coast Guard. Talked to a wonderful man who took the information, address, name of my mother-in-law and said they would try to send help via helicopter

rescue. We waited... we didn't feel help would get to her anytime soon. There were just too many people needing help, and not enough resources.

We live approximately 1 mile from my mother-in-law. My husband did attempt to drive down to our family, but water was over the hood of our car. I then told my husband the neighbor across the street had a pickup truck. Maybe we could get close enough to our family members to where he could walk down to them with our air mattress, putting mom on the air mattress, and keeping her out of the water. My husband agreed and we walked over to our wonderful neighbor, Lou, and he said, "Let's go get her". He never even hesitated. My husband and Lou attempted to drive down in his pickup truck, but again, water was over the hood of his truck. They returned and my husband was blowing up the air mattress, so Lou decided to go scout out the road first by bicycle... good idea Lou! Lou came back and said, "There are some guys down at Parker (ES) with boats helping flooded out neighbors and they are waiting for us." My husband and Lou loaded the air mattress into the back of the pickup and off they went.

When Lou and my husband got to Parker Elementary, Bentley Goodman had a boat in his vehicle. Another neighbor, Travis Baker was there also. The three of them walked the boat to my mother-in-law's house. As they approached my mother-in -law's house, the water was chest deep. When they arrived at her house, her nextdoor neighbor was out with his canoe, trying to help. Bentley worked with my mother-in-law to get her into his boat. My husband, Travis, Bentley and our son, walked my mother-in-law (who was in the boat) to Westbury United Methodist Church. There, the water had started to recede, and another Good Samaritan drove her and my son to our house. Bentley, Travis, and my husband walked the empty boat back to Bentley's truck. Another Good Samaritan was driving my husband home, when they encountered a woman and two small children who were trying to walk to her mother's home about two blocks away. They stopped and gave them a lift. My mother-in-law and son arrived at our house safely about 1:45pm on Sunday.

We discovered that we had several guardian angels that day looking over my son and mother-in-law, namely, Bentley Goodman, Lou Guerrero, and Travis Baker. I wish we knew the names of the other Good Samaritans who helped, all Westbury residents. I am

not sure if they realized how important they will be for the rest of our lives, but God brought them into our lives at the perfect time. Before this disaster, we had only known one of these angels. These guys deserve a medal, but they will always have our family's appreciation for all that they had done. They were there and willing to help their neighbors, whom they had never met.

We kept close track of the rain, and we had a total of 32 inches at our house. During Tropical Storm Allison, we only had 22" of rain.

Moral of this story... do not look for the city, county, or state to help in times of need. It is important that we look toward our friends, family, and neighbors, even if we have never met them before. We learned you have to help one another, be prepared, have a plan, go to the free Hurricane/Emergency Workshop each year to know what to do in an emergency. I have learned so much every year I go. Most importantly, MAKE AN EMERGENCY SUPPLY KIT.

#### **FEMA Deadline Extended**


The deadline to apply for federal disaster assistance after Hurricane Harvey has been extended until November 24 for residents of 41 counties in Texas, including Harris.

The extension also applies to small business owners who can apply for low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration. Call 800-659-2955 for more information about that process.



#### WCC Proposed 2018 Budget

The Westbury Civic Club (WCC) Budget Committee is working on the 2018 budget. The budget will be published in the Crier newsletter once it is approved at the upcoming November 2017 board meeting. This year's proposed budget will be similar to last year's budget.

The WCC operates on a calendar year budget. We estimate our income for the coming year (based on prior history), and then we budget proposed expenditures based on the predicted income.

Our biggest expense is the Westbury Area Patrol (WAP) security control contract with the Precinct 5 constable office. The WAP Patrol cost will increase 3% next year to \$316,925 for 4 patrol officers who are assigned specifically for Westbury at various times of day and night. For the past two years, we have been required to have a minimum of 4 patrol officers in our contract with Precinct 5. We have 3 deputies plus 1 sergeant who patrols and oversees.

The Greenspace Committee is evaluating its service contract with our landscape company. At this time, the proposed 2018 budget for our Greenspaces is \$42,600, but this may change as more information is obtained. The remaining proposed General Expense budget for the Westbury Civic Club is anticipated to be \$142,500. The General Expense category includes all the items that go into operating the Civic Club: printing and distribution of the *Crier*, operating an office and staffing it, insurance, professional fees (financial reviews, legal expenses), doing projects and programs, and deed restriction enforcement. Advertising in the monthly news-letter offsets the printing costs.

#### **Thank You Joe Niles**

It is with great sadness that we say good-bye to Joe Niles and his family. After flooding for the 2nd time in less than 27 months, they have decided to move. Joe joined the WCC Board in October 2011 and has hardly ever missed a meeting. He has been instrumental in getting attention to his section and the flooding concerns that he and his neighbors have. He was a great voice for Parkwest 3. We will all miss Joe! Thank you for all your hard work and many hours volunteering with the Civic Club.



This is a State and City Election. The ballot includes seven propositions for the State of Texas for amendments to the State Constitution, five City of Houston Bond Propositions, Houston Community College Trustees, and HISD Trustees.

### City of Houston Bond Propositions

PROPOSITION A The issuance of \$1,010,000,000 pension obligation bonds for the purpose of funding a portion of the unfunded liability of the City with respect to the Houston Police Officers' Pension System and the Houston Municipal Employees Pension System as contemplated by the pension reform plan contained in Senate Bill 2190 (adopted in the 85th (2017) Texas Legislature, Regular Session), and the levying of taxes sufficient for the payment thereof and interest thereon.

PROPOSITION B The issuance of \$159,000,000 public safety improvement bonds for the acquisition, construction, rehabilitation and equipment of public safety permanent improvements for the police and fire departments and the levying of taxes sufficient for the payment thereof and interest thereon.

PROPOSITION C The issuance of \$104,000,000 park improvement bonds for the conservation, improvement, acquisition, construction and equipment of neighborhood parks, recreational facilities and bayous, including such green spaces along all bayous to create an integrated system of bayou walking, running and bicycle trails to enhance, preserve and protect the health of citizens, water quality, natural habitat and native wildlife and the levying of taxes sufficient for the payment thereof and interest thereon.

PROPOSITION D The issuance of \$109,000,000 public facility improvement bonds for the acquisition, construction, rehabilitation, remediation and equipment of permanent improvements that support public health and wellness, sanitation and other essential governmental and general services of the City and the levying of taxes sufficient for the payment thereof and interest thereon.

PROPOSITION E The issuance of \$123,000,000 library improvement bonds for the acquisition, construction, rehabilitation and equipment of the public library system and the levying of taxes sufficient for the payment thereof and interest thereon.

Constable patrol program, the Westbury Area Patrol, to the tune of over \$300,000 a year.
This puts a patrol car on our Westbury streets EVERY DAY. We are a big neighborhood and it is important that you call in anything you see that is suspicious to 281-463-6666.

The areas that saw houses flood are being targeted by burglars who believe these homes are empty. If you are on one of these streets, keep your eyes open for suspicious people and suspicious vehicles. Watch for kids walking down Ludington and other nearby streets who think a vacant home might make a great place to sneak into for some fun or mischief.

The area around Anderson Elementary and Hager Park has seen increased criminal activity. A Westbury High School student was robbed by gunpoint of his laptop in broad daylight as he walked to school. Thankfully, the culprit was caught and arrested as he walked down West Airport with the stolen goods. Three teenaged thugs stole a cell phone, it was recovered and they, too, were arrested. Be sure your electronic items can be pinged for location and that you have the serial number of your laptop.

If you live near Hager Park and see a gathering of kids after school, why not just call Pct. 5 and ask for a car to be dispatched? If they are up to no good, they will disperse. Students know fighting on campus will get them suspended, so they might meet at Hager or other nearby parks for activities not allowed on campus.

There were close to 15 kids standing around Hager Park before the cell phone theft. Help keep Westbury safe by reporting ANYTHING you see that seems concerning. You are not interrupting anything or keeping the Pct. 5 Constables from doing something "more" important. Rates for the program are increasing for 2018 and we need everyone to pay their fair share.

Several homeowners in the past couple years have had to tear down and/or modify their construction due to deed restriction violations. The City of Houston does not review deed restrictions when issuing permits. They require a signed affidavit acknowledging that the plans comply with your deed restrictions. 

#### New Parker ES on track to open in January

Parker Elementary School will have a new look for 2018, as construction on the new building inches closer to its scheduled December completion.

Exterior brick and roof installations are nearly complete, and steel framing is underway, as is the installation of insulation and dry wall. In addition, building heating and cooling systems are being tested and crews are painting the cafeteria's exterior.



"I'm extremely anxious, but very excited," Parker Principal Lori Frodine said. "We've been planning for our new school for several years, so it's wonderful to see it come together. We can't wait to move in."

Parker Elementary is being rebuilt as part of HISD's voter approved 2012 Bond Program. The \$33 million project calls for a new fine arts magnet school that will accommodate about 850 students.

Plans call for a 500-seat auditorium with collapsible bleacherstyle seating, band, orchestra, vocal, and multipurpose rooms, and flexible learning spaces. The two-story, 113,000 square foot building will house pre-k thru 2nd grades on the ground level and third through fifth grades on the 2nd floor. The new cafeteria also includes a separate seating area for parents visiting their children for lunch.

Parker staff members are scheduled to begin moving into the new building over winter break in advance of the school's January opening. The contractor has increased the number of crews working at the site to ensure the school is completed on time by the end of the year.

# Trunk or Treat at the Willow Waterhole

For several years, the Willow Waterhole Greenspace (WWGC) has hosted a Halloween event. After Hurricane Harvey the WWGC decided that due to the destruction in Southwest Houston a different type of Halloween event should be held. Working with the Brays Oaks Management District, UpArt Studio proposed a Trunk or Treat event.

This fun, creative event held on October 21 was well attended by young families. Close to 300 participants enjoyed games, bounce houses, candy from the trunks of cars and a costume contest.











#### Sod Webworm Control

Are sod webworms devouring your grass? Sod webworms are small caterpillars that eat grasses. The University of Florida notes that "Excessive fertilizing is a leading cause" of outbreaks and advises that keeping your grass healthy with proper fertilization, watering, and mowing can decrease problems with sod webworms.

Native Nurseries in Florida notes that if you over-fertilize, then you might as well post a sign on your yard that says "Sod Webworm Buffet". They mention that mowing grass too short can cause problems with webworms. They advise using Bt (Bacillus thurigiensis), which kills caterpillars but not other insects, and to spray at night if using a liquid.

The Texas A&M Extension Office makes the following recommendations:

The need for sod webworm control can be determined by close examination of the grass. If three to four sod webworm larvae are found within a 6-inch-square section of dying sod, then chemical treatment is recommended. Larvae are most active on cloudy days or at night.

Insecticides can be applied in either spray or granular form. Spray solutions can be applied with a garden hose sprayer or compressed air sprayer. Watering the lawn before application will aid penetration into the turf.

Granular insecticides are easier to use and generally provide more thorough coverage. This type of insecticide can be applied with a fertilizer spreader. Following application, the lawn should be watered for about an hour to wash the granules into the matted turf. Use insecticides containing acephate (Orthene®), bendiocarb (Dycarb® or Turcam®), carbaryl (Sevin®), or the microbial insectices Bacillus thuringiensis ssp. Kurstake (B.t.k.) and ssp. Aizawai (B.t.a).

Children and pets should be kept off treated turf until insecticide has been watered and turf has dried. Follow directions on insecticide labels and observe all safety precautions. Pesticides should be stored out of reach of children and pets.

#### Fall Yard Care Tips

- Reduce the amount you water the lawn significantly in the Fall. As a general rule, your lawn only needs water every 5-7 days. Overwatering in the Fall can lead to plant disease.
- → Mulch your garden, it reduces loss from evaporation and protects the soil and roots.
- → Avoid over-fertilizing the lawn.
- → Check your sprinkler system frequently for leaks.
- → Plant a Fall garden.
- → Plant lettuces as a border in your existing beds and enjoy fresh salads all season.
- → Fall is the best time to plant!


