Support the Westbury Constables

Westbury is patrolled by Harris County Precinct 5 Constables. They patrol all of Westbury because the Westbury Civic Club (WCC) has a contract with Harris County Precinct 5. This is the largest and most important expense of the WCC. In today's world with crime increasing, it is extremely important to maintain this vital service. The quick response time of the Constables, the intimate knowledge of our neighborhood and residents, and their special units and programs make this an invaluable asset to our neighborhood and community. Nearby neighborhoods (Maplewood SN, Meyerland, Barkley Square) also contract with Precinct 5 and their deputies are available for calls in Westbury, if our deputies are busy.

Westbury contracts for two deputies and one sergeant to patrol our neighborhood. Sgt. Derkowski attends the monthly WCC board meetings and makes a report about crimes and crime trends in Westbury. He is very responsive to resident concerns and questions. Sgt. Derkowski emails the WCC office about crimes and incidents in Westbury and provides updates to major issues. He has attended all our drive-thru events and even

helped with delivering water after the Winter Storm. Sgt. Derkowski has been in Westbury for 3.5 years. We are very lucky to have Sergeant Derkowski in the Westbury contract.

Westbury relies on voluntary support of residents like you to pay for this much needed service. The requested amount per home is \$300 for the Constable program. If you have not paid yet for 2021, please consider paying

Did you know that we pay \$22,167 every month for the services of our Precinct 5 Constables? The contract with Precinct 5 is As the season of Thanks rolls on and you our biggest expense every month! In these unusual times, public safety has to remain

these vital services provided by the Constables so that Westbury continues to be a desirable and safe community.

Perhaps some of you are cynical about the "ask" for funds from the Westbury Civic Club. The need is very real. As of the October 2021 WCC meeting date, we have only collected about 75% of the funds to pay for the Constables and the WCC operating costs. We still need to raise money to cover the costs to run the WCC office (rent, salary, utilities, etc.) and to pay the Constables. Last year we needed to dip into the Operating Reserves of the WCC (accumulated over many years) to pay our 2020 expenses. The cost of our Constable Patrol increased in March of 2021 and may increase again in 2022. The financial challenges of the WCC are very real. Fortunately, we had money in our reserves to be able to pay our bills, but we cannot continue spending more money than we bring in.


The Library Has a Name! Shannon Walker Neighborhood Library

Our new library that is coming to Westbury officially has a name! The Dr. Shannon Walker Neighborhood Library will be located on Belrose at the site of the old post office. More about this name on page 9. The new library will be a large, regional library for District K and Southwest Houston. Construction of the site is slated to begin in 2022 with completion in 2023.

The Westbury Civic Club started a Library Action Committee that has been meeting every 2 weeks for several months. The committee is made up of Westbury residents. One of the main concerns highlighted by the Committee is cut through traffic in the neighborhood to get to the new library. The library will have access from Belrose and Chimney Rock. The concern is the high amount of traffic down Atwell or other Westbury 3 streets to get to Belrose. Belrose is only accessible from other neighborhood streets, it does not connect to any major street. One possible solution the committee is suggesting is that that official address for the library be Chimney Rock, not Belrose. This will make it easier for Houston residents to find the new library, as Chimney Rock is a major throughfare. We are hopeful this will eliminate some neighborhood cut through traffic. Many people use mapping apps. These apps would direct people to enter from Chimney Rock, if that is the address, not Belrose, so most non-Westbury residents will be directed to that entrance when trying to find the new library.

The committee is trying to set a meeting with the City of Houston to discuss traffic concerns.

All About Trash

Trash, yard waste, recycling, and heavy trash are picked up by the City of Houston.

Regular Household Trash

Pick-up is EVERY Thursday. Regular household trash goes into the black trash can.

Yard Waste

Pick-up is EVERY week either on Thursday or Saturday or any day the City decides to come by. Yard Waste MUST be placed in the correct City bio-degradable bags.



Recycling in Westbury

All of Westbury recycles on Schedule A. Recycling is every other week. Recycling goes into the green trash can.

Why Support the WCC?

Westbury is a unique neighborhood. While all 5,000 homes in our Westbury neighborhood have active deed restrictions, only 463 have mandatory assessments. This means the Westbury Civic Club heavily relies on voluntary financial contributions from residents.

Westbury has historically had strong voluntary support because residents understood the great benefits of the WCC and our programs. The past several years' contributions to the Westbury Civic Club and to the Westbury Area Patrol have been down. By working together, we can meet the challenges head on and keep our neighborhood the jewel that it is. We all want a safe, flood free neighborhood with great schools and nice neighbors.

The total amount for the **2021 Voluntary Dues is \$360**. That is less than a dollar a day! The Westbury Civic Club dues are \$60 for the year. The WCC suggests a contribution of \$300 for the Westbury Area Patrol (a paid contract with Precinct 5 Constables).






Re-Districting Political Boundaries Based on the 2020 Census Data

Every decade, political boundaries are adjusted to account for changes in population growth and other factors. Some of the changes will affect which political districts Westbury residents vote in next year. The redistricting maps for US Congress and the Texas state legislature were approved by the Texas legislature and have been signed by Governor Abbott, but litigation is anticipated.

In the Texas legislature, currently Westbury residents are represented in the Texas Senate by Senator Joan Huffman (District 17) or Senator Borris Miles (District 13). The new redistricting map indicates that in the next election, Westbury voters will be voting either in District 13 or in District 15 (incumbent is Senator Whitmire). See map below.



Proposed Texas Legislature District Map

Currently Westbury residents are represented in the Texas House by Representative Ann Johnson (District 134) or Representative Shawn Thierry (District 146). In the future, a small number of Westbury homes on the north side of Willowbend will be in District 134, most homes will be in District 146, and some will be in District 131 (incumbent is Representative Alma Allen). See map on the top right.

At this time Westbury residents are represented in US Congress by either US Representative Lizzie Fletcher (District 7) or US Representative Al Green (District 9). The new redistricting map indicates that ALL Westbury residents would vote in US House District 9 in the next Congressional election.


Redistricting is still in progress at the County level at press time. Currently Westbury residents are represented by Commissioner Rodney Ellis for Precinct One on Harris County Commissioners Court. In some proposed map versions, Westbury will be moved and in others Westbury will remain in Precinct One. There are 4 Precincts total. See map to right for one of the versions.

Solid Waste Department Answers Westbury Questions

During the October Westbury Civic Club monthly meeting, Alyce Coffey from the COH Solid Waste Department answered several questions from Westbury board members.

What is the correct way to handle the caps on plastic bottles being recycled?

The tops should be removed before putting the plastic bottles in the recycle bin.

Is there a limit on how much heavy trash (Junk Waste or Tree Waste) can be placed out for monthly heavy trash collection?

Yes, there is a maximum limit. No more than 8 cubic yards (about the size of a minivan) of Junk Waste or Tree Waste may be placed at the curb for collection. The city might not remove the heavy trash if there is too much placed at the curb. Additionally, if authorized items placed for collection are mixed with unauthorized items, department personnel are not obligated to sort the materials and may refuse the entire load.

Does the Solid Waste Department notify you if there is a problem with your heavy trash that causes the load to be ineligible to be collected?

No, the Solid Waste Dept. does NOT notify you if you have too much volume or the wrong type of material placed for collection or any other issue that causes the load to be rejected by the city for collection.



New Westbury Library Name Announced Dr. Shannon Walker Neighborhood Library

The Houston City Council has approved naming the new library in Westbury, "Dr. Shannon Walker Neighborhood Library." The new library is named after NASA Astronaut, Dr. Shannon Walker, who grew up in the Westbury area and attended Westbury schools.

"Naming the library after Dr. Walker is fitting for a number of reasons. Her roots run deep in the District K Westbury community. The naming of a library is important to defining its personality and character," said District K Councilmember Martha Castex-Tatum. Dr. Walker is a native Houstonian who attended



District K's Parker Elementary, Johnston Middle School (now known as Meyerland Middle School) and Westbury High School. Dr. Walker earned her Bachelor of Arts Degree in Physics, a Master of Science, and Doctorate of Philosophy in Space Physics from Rice University.

This accomplishment could not have been achieved without the help of the Library Naming Committee (LNC) and Houston Public Library Executive Director, Dr. Rhea Lawson. There was a high level of community interest and engagement. The process began in February 2021, when an 8-member Library Naming Committee (LNC) reviewed more than 300 name submissions from District K residents. The LNC narrowed the list down to the top five name submissions. In June 2021, polls were open for a city-wide vote from the top 5 submissions. Naming the library after Dr. Shannon Walker was the most popular choice. Per the protocol to name a library building, the Houston Public Library staff and the Houston Public Library Foundation (HPLF) unanimously passed a resolution to name the new library the Dr. Shannon Walker Neighborhood Library. Then the vote by Houston City Council was the final step to approve the name.

The new library in Westbury will start construction in 2022 with completion in 2023. Look for more updates in future *Criers*.


Buzzy Bee Convenience Store and Gas Station

5310 W Bellfort

Mr. Nick Momin, from the Buzzy Bee Convenience store, which is currently under construction at the corner of Moonlight and West Bellfort (located at 5310 W. Bellfort), spoke at the October board meeting of the Westbury Area Improvement Corporation (WAIC). He said the complex will have a 7,200 SF building consisting of a convenience store with a deli plus a 1,800 SF Sonic with a drive-thru window. On the west side of the property, closest to Auto Zone, there will be a drive-thru automated car wash. In front the convenience store will be eight gasoline pumps with Shell gas.

The stormwater detention implemented for this site is an underground vault connected to the storm sewer on West Bellfort. The property has been elevated, causing flooding concerns from nearby residents, but the property meets the city guidelines for detention, according to the engineering plans submitted.

Buzzy Bee also owns the convenience store on the corner of Chimney Rock and West Airport. It is a large investment to build one of these stores, and we appreciate their willingness to work with us to make this a good experience for everyone in Westbury. They will be planting 200 shrubs and 40 trees to enhance the property. We will be working with them on having good lighting, as we did at the community garden when a convenience store was built nearby.




Increased traffic on the adjacent residential streets is a concern, and we will be watching this and reaching out to the City's traffic management department.

Singh Mart #4 Convenience Store and Gas Station 5410 W. Bellfort

A Singh Mart convenience store with 6 gasoline pumps is in the initial phase of construction at 5410 W Bellfort, across the road from the entrance to the Home Deport. Permits for this project were pulled at the end of May. This is unrestricted commercial property that does not have any deed restrictions. The WCC cannot control or dictate what is done with this property.

In mid-October the grassy lot of 5410 West Bellfort was fenced in and construction equipment appeared. The Westbury Civic Club Manager noticed that fill dirt was being brought onto the property and site elevation was



occurring. Photos were sent to the District K Councilmember Martha Castex-Tatum to ask about the fill dirt and plans for the site. Here is the response that Public Works sent to CM Martha Castex-Tatum. "Our Flood Management Office (FMO) conducted an onsite field investigation and have determined that the customer has violated the FMO permit by introducing filled material/dirt on site without first performing mitigation cut per City of Houston Flood Plain permit requirements. FMO has red tagged the site and have placed hard holds in the system. The customer has a pre-construction meeting scheduled for 10/25/2021 and FMO will be reaching out to the inspector assigned to the area and informing him on the situation and letting them know that FMO attendance will be required at pre-construction meeting."

The Westbury Civic Club greatly appreciates the prompt response and action by District K CM Martha Castex-Tatum and the Public Works Department when the WCC asked about the Fill Dirt being brought onto the property. The WCC and the Westbury Area Improvement Association are reaching out to the site developer. There are several Singh Marts which have been built in the Houston area and we want to work with them to make this a nice addition to the neighborhood.

Road Rage Incident on West Bellfort

A shooting incident caused traffic on West Bellfort to be shut down for several hours, near Westbury United Methodist Church on October 13, to allow police to investigate. The vehicle that was shot at ended up parked in the median on West Bellfort in front of the church.

News reports indicate that a driver in a white Ford Transit van was driving erratically on West Bellfort. After the victim honked his horn, the suspect fired off 16 rounds and injured a passenger in the victim's pickup truck. Multiple bullets struck the victim's vehicle. The victims were lawncare workers.

We have heard from our Constables that the shooting happened closer to South Post Oak and did not happen in front of the church. Although the Houston Police Department were primary responders to this incident, the Constables provided some assistance with translation.



Request a Vacation Watch

Going on a vacation? Well, if you pay your Westbury Area Patrol dues, make sure you request a vacation watch by the Constables. This is a great service that is included in our contract. A deputy will check out your property at least once a day to make sure it is secured and nothing suspicious is going on.

FAQs for Westbury Area Patrol Constables

Who do you call when you discover a break in or property damage?

Sometimes there is confusion about when to call HPD and when to call the Precinct 5 Constables (Westbury Area Patrol). In case of emergency, always call 911.

For crimes or problems involving property, we suggest calling the **Precinct 5 Constables at 281.463.6666**, as there typically will be a better response time. The Precinct 5 Constables patrol in Westbury and also in the nearby neighborhoods of Maplewood South/North, Meyerland, Marilyn Estates, and Barkley Square. For example, if you discover your car, garage, or house has been broken into, then the Constables can do the report for you and they will also create a report number for HPD. This means that you only need to contact the Constables, not both HPD and the Constables. Additionally, the nearby neighborhoods to our north all have Precinct 5 patrol contracts, so crime information is shared among the local Constable contracts. Be sure and report crimes, even minor property crimes, as Precinct 5 Constables can allocate additional resources when hot spots pop up in the crime statistics.

How do I contact the Constables?

Call the Precinct 5 Constables Dispatcher at 281,463,6666. When you call dispatch, be sure they get the correct name and spelling of your street. Have them repeat it back to you. Many streets have similar sounding names. Be sure and tell them you are in the Westbury contract.

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

Westbury Little Leaguer Wins Astros Competition

Local Westbury resident and Westbury Little Leaguer Liam Sprinkle recently earned the title of the 2021 Astros Team Champion (7/8-year-old division) in the Major League Baseball Pitch Hit & Run Competition.

The Major League Baseball Pitch Hit & Run Competition is a national grassroots program that tests three of the most fundamental aspects of baseball: pitching, hitting and running. Participants compete in each of the three components and a total score is accumulated based on his/her performance.

The PITCH: Participant is tested throwing strikes to a designated Strike Zone target.

The HIT: Participant hits a ball off a stationary tee for distance and accuracy.

The RUN: Participant is timed, starting from second base. touching third then touching home plate.



Everyone must participate in a local competition to advance to the higher levels. The top three All-Around Champions advance to the Team Championships, which are held in all 30 Major League Baseball markets nationwide. The culmination occurs at the National Finals, which, this year, will be held at the 2021 World Series.

After competing in a local competition this summer, Liam advanced to the Astros Team Championship, which was held at Minute Maid Park on September 26th. Liam came in 1st place becoming one of only 30 children aged 7/8, across the nation to become eligible for the National Finals.

Liam plays locally for Westbury Little League and for the Westbury Young Guns, a 9U select baseball team.



Astros "Rally Nuns" Live in Westbury

Perhaps you saw them on the news or at the Astros playoff games - the Rally Nuns. Did you know they live right here in the Westbury Super Neighborhood?

The Saint Catherine Convent, also known as the Provincial House, sits on ten acres of land at the corner of Ricecrest and Gasmer, that was once a baseball field. Today it is surrounded by the beautiful Willow Waterhole Greenspace. Visitors to the park can hear the church bells ringing. Built in 1987, with further additions over the years, Saint Catherine is the home of a hundred sisters who are still in formation, who serve as educators at the parochial schools or nurses with home health care agencies, and our retired sisters.

Their journey began after the fall of Saigon in 1975 when a group of Sisters were sent across the Pacific. They were welcomed into the then Diocese of Galveston-Houston and later formed the Dominican Sisters of Mary Immaculate Province. Here the Sisters flourished; they served the growing community of Vietnamese immigrants as catechists

and their presence and witness soon attracted young vocations. With a steady growth, the community has been recognized as a province of the Motherhouse, Dominican Sisters of St. Catherine, in Vietnam.

And, thanks to Mattress Mack, they were able to enjoy the Astros 2021 postseason. After attending the ALCS Game 1 with an Astros win, the Sisters become very popular and quickly gained the nickname, Rally Nuns. Mattress Mack brought them back from the ALCS Game 6 with Sister Mary Catherine throwing out the ceremonial first pitch before the game.

Q: Can I build another structure for living on my property?

A. NO. ALL sections of Westbury prohibit living in a detached structure such as garage, tiny home, shed, etc. This means no "mother-in -law" suites, no tiny homes, no garage apartments, etc. The deed restrictions are very clear on this aspect. All sections of Westbury allow for a single family home and a detached garage. The size of garage differs from section to section.

Q: Why can't the Meyer library on West Bellfort be rebuilt or refurbished on the current site?

A: The Meyer Library needed to be rebuilt due to age and water damage. When looking at the current site, it was determined that the property on W. Bellfort is too small for the size library that needed to be built. It took many years to find a good property for the new library. The property on Belrose is centrally located in Westbury and will be easily accessible by more of Westbury residents.

Beautification Day at Meyerland Middle School

On Saturday, October 9, the Meyerland Performing & Visual Arts Middle School (MPVA) community showed up in force on campus for a Beautification Day to tackle the overgrowth and neglected plants on their grounds. MPVA parents, students, PTO leaders, community members, teachers, National Junior Honors Society members and MPVA principal Auden Sarabia were in attendance.

Budget cuts at the district level have left many local PTOs needing to organize volunteers for their own beautification projects, as HISD maintenance is often stretched too thin to provide grounds maintenance work on all the campuses in the district. The MPVA volunteer group of over 30 people trimmed, weeded, replanted, sawed, and even power-washed for over three hours to transform the front of the school and two courtyards.



Additionally, a senior management team from Waste Management (pictured below) spent a morning to improve the area around the Arboretum: moved 20 cubic yards of mulch, pulled weeds, applied a water sealant to the trail footbridge and dug out the channel under the footbridge, cleared brush and plants damaged from the February freeze, and collected trash along Ricecrest.

New Paved Driveway and Parking Lot

The long wait is finally over! After years of anticipation, the Dryad driveway entrance to Willow Waterhole has been paved with an asphalt overlay. The timing was expedited to be ready in time for the October MusicFest event. The former rutted and pothole-ridden gravel driveway is no more. This improvement makes the Dryad entrance to Willow

Waterhole much easier to access and a thousand times more inviting. The work included a newly paved parking lot at the end by the gazebo. The project was funded by District K Councilmember Martha Castex-Tatum and the Brays Oaks Management District (BOMD), with project management overseen by BOMD.

CM Martha Castex-Tatum commented during mid-construction: "Today on my Sunday ride through the district I stopped by to see the construction progress on Dryad Dr., leading into the Willow Waterhole Greenway. If you have ever visited the WWG you know how rough the drive in and parking was with pot holes and dust flying everywhere. When I was elected 4 years ago, I committed to seeing the projects CM Green had on the books through. This is one of the final commitments he made to the district and I'm so happy to see our council district service dollars at work. We won't stop improving mobility in District K!"
