There was a recent article in the Houston Chronicle about response times for the Houston Police Department. For Westbury, which is in HPD beat 15E20, the chart said, "Slowest 25%, regardless of call volume for priority 1 calls." This means that our area has a longer than average response times from HPD. When minutes count, having Pct. 5 patrolling in the neighborhood matters. Pct. 5 response time is much quicker than HPD.



Westbury is a unique neighborhood with the majority of the 5,000 homes having voluntary dues. Only about 450 homes in Parkwest 1 and Parkwest 2 have Mandatory Assessments. The active participation of volunteers and yearly dues contributions help the Westbury Civic Club achieve our goal and remain active in the City of Houston. The total voluntary dues requested for 2023 is \$375. This includes the WCC Dues and Westbury Area Patrol.

PLEASE NOTE: All homes are subject to the deed restrictions whether the dues are paid or not. All sections of Westbury and Parkwest have ACTIVE deed restrictions.

Westbury Civic Club Dues - \$60

The WCC has been vital in keeping Westbury a desirable neighborhood over the past 60 years. The WCC helps maintain 7 miles of esplanades, issues the Westbury Crier monthly newsletter, enforces deed restrictions, provides community events and acts as a very important liaison with the City of Houston while advocating for Westbury. In a City the size of Houston, it is important to make sure you have someone representing you and your neighborhood. The WCC has done a good job of maintaining Westbury for over 60 years. Your contribution helps covers everything needed to operate and maintain the services we provide, this includes office rent, utilities, insurance, postage, printing, legal and professional fees, salary, etc. The WCC has one employee and all other work is done by Westbury board member volunteers, this allows us to keep our costs lower.

Westbury Area Constable Patrol - \$315

The WCC has a contract with Harris County, Precinct 5, Contract Deputy Program to patrol Westbury and provide 24-hour response. This program is referred to as the Westbury Area Patrol (WAP). The WAP currently consists of three Constables (2 Deputies and 1 Sergeant) that are assigned patrol Westbury daily. The Contract Deputy Program is designed so that even when a Westbury deputy is unavailable, the next closest Pct. 5 Constable will be dispatched. Several of our bordering neighborhoods (Meyerland, Maplewood, and Marilyn Estates) also participate in the Pct. 5 Contract Deputy Program, so deputies are typically nearby at all times.

The Harris County Pct. 5 Constables are certified peace officers, licensed by the State of Texas to enforce the laws of the State of Texas. The deputies are uniformed, armed and drive distinctively marked, emergency equipped, law enforcement vehicles. The Constables provide high visibility, rapid response to emergency and non-emergency calls, vacation watches, alarm monitoring, and home security checks. The WCC gets regular crime reports from our Sergeant to ensure that the WCC is kept up to date with crimes in our area.

2023 MANDATORY ASSESSMENTS

2023 Mandatory Assessments - \$267.35

Owners in Parkwest 1 and Parkwest 2 revised their deed restrictions in 1993 & 1994 to include Mandatory Assessments.

- → Properties in Parkwest 1 that have a new owner of record after the January 1, 1993, are subject to the Mandatory Assessment clause.
- → Properties in Parkwest 2 that have a new owner of record after the January 1, 1994, are subject to the Mandatory Assessment clause.

The Mandatory Assessments are due annually on February 1. The 2023 Mandatory Assessments are \$267.35. The WCC has launched our NEW online owner portal. This now makes it easy to view, track, and make payments online. The invoices for Mandatory homes have been mailed to the address on record. If you did not receive your invoice, please sign up for your new online owner portal (use the handy QR code to the left) to view a copy or email westburycc@sbcglobal.net. If you have past due assessments and would like to set up a payment plan, please email the WCC office at westburycc@sbcglobal.net.

TIRZ 20 Projects to Benefit Westbury Area

About a year ago, TIRZ 20 was approved by City Council to expand its boundaries to include specific locations in the Brays Oaks Management District, which includes the Westbury area. A TIRZ is a Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone. It focuses capital investment in specific areas with a goal to improve the area. The TIRZ does not include any single-family residential homes located here in Westbury.

We are delighted to note that two TIRZ 20 projects are proposed for the 2024 budget that could eventually provide great benefit for Westbury business and residential community. The first project is the "Gasmer Site Redevelopment", which refers to the former Shell research center on Gasmer next to Willow Waterhole. The site was sold by Shell to the City of Houston. Part of the Gasmer site will be used for additional stormwater detention for city drainage projects.

The second project is a study called the Brays Oaks Area Study, which is intended to study an area to our west for future drainage/ stormwater and mobility projects. Part of the flooding and drainage problems in Westbury is caused by excess stormwater from upstream of our area flowing "downhill" into our area. The City of Houston and the Harris County Flood Control District have already been working on designing drainage/stormwater projects, both in Westbury and upstream of us, so we welcome any possible future TIRZ projects that will benefit the Westbury area. These projects can be very slow to move from concept to engineering design to construction.



City of Houston Propositions

The following City propositions are amendments to the City Charter and will be voted on by ALL voters that live in the City of Houston. Please check www.harrisvotes.com for more information.

Proposition A Currently, the City Charter only allows the Mayor to set the agenda for City Council meetings. Proposition A proposes to allow an item to be placed on the agenda if at least 3 members of City Council request it.

Ballot wording— Shall the City Charter of the City of Houston be amended to enable three or more council members, by written request, to have item(s) placed on the agenda of a regular city council meeting and to have such item(s) considered by council?

Proposition B Proposition B proposes to change the City Charter in an attempt to compel the local regional planning board H-GAC to give more representation to Houston and Harris County.

Ballot wording—Shall the City Charter of the City of Houston be amended: to require that membership by the City of Houston in a Council of Government or Metropolitan Planning Organization shall be contingent on the votes of the governing board for such council or organization being apportioned proportionately on the basis of population, notwithstanding statutory voting members, and that members representing local governments shall have at least 90 percent of the total votes; and to require the City of Houston to withdraw its membership from any non-compliant Council of Government or Metropolitan Planning Organization if the voting system is not corrected within 60 days of the effective date of adoption of this charter provision?

More about Proposition B—

Houston is a member of a 13-county regional planning organization called the Houston-Galveston Area Council (H-GAC). For example, H-GAC decides how to distribute state and federal funds in the region and makes decisions on regional transportation issues, among its various planning responsibilities. The current structure of H-GAC voting membership does not reflect the large populations of Houston or Harris County. Even though many Houston residents suffered severe flood damage from Hurricane Harvey, Houston received 2% of the local federal mitigation funding. Prop B is on the ballot after a petition drive by a group of citizens who are seeking a way to compel H-GAC to consider population in its voting structure. Since Houston and Harris County have the largest populations in the region, changing the voting structure of H-GAC could provide more influence by Houston and Harris County when H-GAC is making decisions. The group that did the petition drive notes that "Houston and Harris County make up 57% of the population represented on the H-GAC's board of directors, yet the city and county combined only have 11% of the voting power." It is not clear what steps H-GAC will take if Houston voters approve this proposition.


VOTING FAQS

- * **Identification** Voters must bring approved forms of identification to vote.
- * What is prohibited? No wireless devices. No photographs. No electioneering within 100 feet of the doors (for example, you should not wear campaign materials inside the polling place)
- * Where can you vote? At any designated polling location anywhere in Harris County, during early voting and during the general election. Check www.harrisvotes.org for polling locations and sample ballot.



State of Texas Propositions

There are 14 propositions on the ballot for amendments to the State of Texas Constitution. All voters in Texas will be voting on these propositions. These funds are from the budget surplus.



ranching, timber production, horticulture, and wildlife management."

- Prop 2 Allow cities or counties to reduce property taxes for child-care facilities.
- **Prop 3** "The constitutional amendment prohibiting the imposition of an individual wealth or net worth tax, including a tax on the difference between the assets and liabilities of an individual or family."
- **Prop 4** Reduce property taxes by school districts and the state would then send funds to school districts to offset this reduction in school property tax. Various other tax reforms.
- **Prop 5** Set-up a fund of \$3.4 billion to be used to support Texas research universities (not UT or Texas A&M since they have other funding sources). This would benefit Texas Tech, University of Houston, University of North Texas, & Texas State University.
- **Prop 6** Set-up a fund of \$1 billion for the Texas Water Development Board to support water projects across the state. Creates the New Water Supply for Texas Fund, the Statewide Water Public Awareness Account, and the Texas Water Fund to address critical water challenges across the state.
- **Prop 7** Create a \$5 billion fund to incentivize new power plants fueled by natural gas.
- **Prop 8** Create a \$1.5 billion Broadband Infrastructure Fund to expand internet availability across the State and improve telecommunications.
- **Prop 9** Provide a cost-of-living adjustments to some retired Texas teachers, who have not had an increase in almost 20 years.
- **Prop 10** Exempt certain equipment and medical products from taxation by counties or school districts.
- **Prop 11** Create the El Paso County Conservation and Reclamation District. Other counties and regions in Texas have similar districts, which tax local residents to support the creation and development of water services and other facilities.
- **Prop 12** Eliminate the Galveston County Treasurer's Office. If approved, other county officials would take over the duties of the treasurer. Only affects Galveston, but all of Texas votes on this proposition.
- **Prop 13** Increase the mandatory retirement period from 70-75 years old to 75-79 years old for justices and judges on appellate, district and criminal district courts.
- **Prop 14** Set-up a fund of about \$1 billion to purchase land to develop new state parks.

Harris County Hospital \$2.5 Billion Bond

Harris County voters will be asked to approve a bond for \$2.5 billion for the Harris County Hospital District, the pubic healthcare provider for the County. The Harris County Hospital District, also known as the Harris Health System, was founded on January 1, 1966 as a safety net hospital system to provide quality care to the residents of Harris County who lacked access to healthcare. For over 30 years, Ben Taub and LBJ Hospital have been the cornerstones of public healthcare in Harris County. But in that same time, the population of the County has nearly doubled.

If approved, the funds would:

- ◆Build a new hospital on the LBJ Hospital campus with Level 1 trauma center. This will become the first level 1 trauma center outside of the Texas Medical Center.
- •Renovate the existing LBJ Hospital for additional services such as mental healthcare.
- ◆Renovate and enhance Ben Taub Hospital to extend its lifespan by 10 years. Ben Taub is one of the only two major trauma centers in Houston.
- *Add new community health clinics and improve the existing clinics.

If the bond is approved, the average homeowner of \$300,000 property/home is looking at additional \$6 per month in taxes (\$72/year).



Westbury Loves National Night Out

National Night Out (NNO) is a national activity to encourage neighbors to get to know one another and meet law enforcement officers. This year, all across Westbury, neighbors hosted parties on their driveways, in their garages, and in their homes. October 3rd was a stormy day, but the sun came out and a rainbow appeared at 6PM, just in time for the parties to take place.

The Precinct 5 deputies were out and about visiting as many of the parties as they could. The Houston Police Department had officers from our Southwest station visiting parties. Commander Hassig delivered a certificate from Vice Mayor Pro Tem Martha Castex-Tatum to board member Maggie Donovan, who hosted an awesome party.

Jesus Zamora, community outreach for County Commissioner Lesley Briones, visited many parties and brought certificates of recognition "acknowledging their dedication to enhancing

the relationship between neighbors and law enforcement while fostering a sense of community" for the Pct. 5 Constable program.

National Night Out is a reminder of that Westbury is a great "neighborhood of neighbors". Members of the Westbury Civic Club delivered "I love Westbury" signs and stickers to as many NNO parties as they could. They found much genuine friendship, camaraderie, and great food! If Westbury neighborhood block parties had a motto, it would be "fun, friendship, and food!

"I have been a Westbury resident for 48 years. I have supported the civic club and the Constable program all those years.

With all the talk about the increase in crime I have been adding an extra \$1,000 for the Constable program the last couple of years. Not bragging just want to issue a challenge to see if there is enough interest.

If there are 100 residents in Westbury who are blessed enough to add \$1,000 to the constable program, Westbury could add an extra full-time officer. Your gift does not have to be \$1,000, it can be any amount designated to the program.

I realize this would not cure the crime problem, but it might result in quicker response and arrest. It is proven with more police presence criminals go where there is less police presence.

I just wonder if there is enough interest that we would be able to raise enough to hire another office to help make Westbury safer and more secure."

TCEQ Hearing Regarding Air Permit Near Willow Waterhole

At the request of Texas Senator Borris Miles, the TCEQ (Texas Commission for Environmental Quality) held a public meeting on September 28 regarding the air permit renewal of the Martin Marietta concrete crushing facility. This facility is located on Gasmer, and shares a fence line with the Westbury Lake section of Willow Waterhole. It is across the street from the Willow Lake section of Willow Waterhole. It is near churches, homes, schools, apartments, and the lakes of Willow Waterhole.

The first half of the meeting allowed anyone in the audience to come to the microphone and ask the TCEQ or Martin Marietta questions. For over 90 minutes, people from the audience asked questions. The

meeting room was filled with residents of Westbury and nearby neighborhoods. The WCC President Cindy Chapman, WCC VP Marcia Hartman, WCC Treasurer Becky Edmondson, and WCC Board Member Becky Pate were in attendance.



After the Q & A period, it was time for the meeting to be recorded and any comments made would be on the public record. Dozens of people approached the mic to have their say. The comment period was extended to allow for another day of written comments. Harris County Pollution Control wrote a letter to the TCEQ with their recommendations for abating some of the pollution.

Everyone who spoke had concerns about the air permit being renewed. Does a concrete crushing plant emitting 7 tons of pollution a year belong in our neighborhood adjacent to our park, our schools, and our homes? Probably not, but it has been there for decades and the permit is likely to be renewed. Houston does not have zoning to prohibit placement of an air polluting source so close to a public greenspace with trails and amenities.

Martin Marietta, which is a publicly traded large nationwide corporation, have expressed interest in working with the Willow Waterhole Conservancy and being a good neighbor to the local community.



New Trails and Improvements Coming Soon

You may have noticed that the Dryad entrance gate and parking lot at the Westbury Lake area of Willow Waterhole were closed part of the month in October. The closure was due to the construction of new sidewalks and trails near the parking lot. The closure took longer than anticipated due to rain. The great news is that the trail work over at Westbury Lake is scheduled to be finished in time for the popular MusicFest celebration on October 28. We thank Harris County Commissioner Rodney Ellis for constructing many miles of new trails around Westbury Lake, and for replacing the bad sections of sidewalk.



New Artwork Coming Soon

A new artwork installation, "Flowers for a Lady", is scheduled to be dedicated in October, located near the Schwartz Pavilion at Westbury Lake. The artist is Rosalinda Tora and the artwork was commissioned to honor Kathleen Tinsley Ownby. Kathleen grew up nearby in Willow Meadows, graduated from Westbury High School (WHS), has been active supporting WHS via the Friends of WHS Foundation, and has been an influential advocate on behalf of Willow Waterhole. The artwork recognizes her legacy to Houston parks and schools as longtime executive director of the School Park (SPARK) program. As a result of her efforts, there are now over 200 SPARK parks at schools in the greater Houston area. The artwork is a grouping of 3 pillars, topped with butterflies in flight to represent the transformation of parks in the city, and wrapped in colorful mosaics representing Ms. Ownby's love of flowers and nature.
