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CALL TO ACTION: HISD Board Is Considering Not Expanding WHS Campus as Promised

The HISD 2012 bond included funds to improve the Westbury High School (WHS) campus, including new buildings, building renovation, and campus expansion. The expansion is in real danger of not happening. Please read pages 6 and 7 for more info.



Over the years, HISD has acquired 2 of 4 apartment complexes on the east side of WHS, both by eminent domain. The most recent land acquisition in 2010 was the farthest of the 4 complexes from the school. This left the remaining property to be acquired "book-ended" by land owned by HISD. See photo on page 7. As part of the 2012 bond election, HISD promised to acquire the remaining 2 pieces of property and allocated about \$11 million for acquisition, demolition, and other costs to expand the WHS campus to the size of a modern, suburban campus. Now, HISD is trying to wriggle out of their promise!

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President's Message

This past month I have been reminded time and again what a unique and amazing neighborhood we have. A delegation of students, parents, and community volunteers attended the November HISD board meeting to advocate on behalf of Westbury High School (WHS). As part of the preparation, Cindy Chapman put together a 16 page timeline of the last 30 years of community involvement to improve Westbury High School (WHS) and the area surrounding it (read it on the WCC website under Hot Topics). It is amazing to see the amount of work done over the last three decades. When I was asked to make a November presentation to the Super Neighborhood Alliance about the Westbury Super Neighborhood (SN), I compared the land use map from 2000 to the 2014 land use map; it is clear that many positive changes have occurred near WHS. On page 6 & 7 you will read about our efforts to ask HISD to honor the commitments made in the 2012 bond to improve WHS and to purchase two more properties to complete a promised WHS campus expansion. The acquisition of the remaining two properties to expand the campus for a regional sports facility along with the new building will help brighten the future for WHS becoming a neighborhood school of choice.

The Willow Waterhole continues to delight me. It is an incredible gift to not only our area but to Houston to have this 300 acre park space with so much diversity and potential. Earlier this month, I made a presentation to Super Neighborhood 36, our neighbors to the west, regarding the potential for Willow

Waterhole to become a city "signature park", along with Hermann and Memorial parks. The Willow Waterhole has something for everyone whether it is birding, walking, communing with nature, or attending a fun family event.

The idea of the Westbury Community Garden (WCG) was born just five years ago and was a culmination of five years of prior green projects in the neighborhood. I took the Urban Harvest class "How to Start a Community Garden" in 2004 from Westbury's own Gary Edmondson (friend, but no relation) and realized we needed to build a sense of community. To that end, the Working on Westbury (WOW) campaign began in October of 2004 with WOW walks and storm drain marking projects, esplanade projects, and tree plantings. Volunteers in Westbury have continued a series of green projects since that time. As a result, the Westbury Community Garden was built with a thriving community of gardeners, been enlarged, been rescued from being demolished for a low income housing project, and just celebrated a fall festival of thanks. See page 16 & 17 to learn more about the celebration held to thank everyone who worked so hard to ensure the success and continuation of the garden.

Living in Westbury offers many ways to have fun and enjoy the companionship of community: the Westbury Community Garage Sales, tree plantings, trash clean-ups, Movies and Music in the Park at Willow Waterhole. Recent Halloween traditions include a costume contest at the October movie shown at Willow Waterhole and a new Halloween parade

at Westbury Park. In December many participate in the Yard-of-the-Month holiday decorations contest or enjoy one of Westbury's unique traditions like the "Deck the Halls of Burlinghall" parade, which will be held on December 13. Also on December 13, Westbury High School invites the community to a new family Winter Festival, see page 12.

And speaking of events, you can read on page 8 about the 50th reunion of my 1965 Parker class. You may have read about it in the SW News or the Chronicle. For me, serving on the Parker PAT team and thinking about the new school while delving into the history from 1965 was an interesting juxtaposition. One of my classmates, Cindy McKim Campbell's dad was an architect on the original school. It was quite moving for all of us to walk the halls one last time, and I appreciated how warmly Parker welcomed us back.

As 2014 comes to a close I have to say it's been a good year! Our community garden was saved, Westbury area projects took home four awards from Keep Houston Beautiful, and our neighborhood remains in demand with homes selling quickly at often record prices. The WAP patrol has helped keep crime down. WCC dues statements will be mailed soon and I hope all of you will do your part to help keep Westbury going strong and safe. We did not collect enough dues in 2014 to cover the WAP patrol cost, but, thanks to a reserve, we were able to pay for the security contract this year. More financial support for WAP will be needed in 2015.

Wishing all of you the joys of this holiday season!

Call to Action—Westbury High School

Is HISD Keeping or Breaking Promises Made to Westbury?

Last year, only 1859 of 4335 students (43%) zoned to Westbury High School (WHS) opted to attend WHS. That means 57% of the students zoned to WHS chose to go elsewhere. We were advised that the HISD Board of Trustees would be discussing the 2012 bond project scope for Westbury High School in closed session on November 13. We created a petition to collect evidence for HISD that the area fully supports implementing the FULL scope of improvements at WHS that were promised to the community in the 2012 bond package – including spending \$11.2 million expanding the campus size and providing HISD athletic facilities on the new property.

HISD has an opportunity to create an incredible 21st century school at WHS with a regional athletic facility having access to the miles of trails at the nearby 300-acre Willow Waterhole Nature Reserve. HISD has put in place an accomplished and passionate principal at WHS and is improving the academic and career offerings. Overcoming perceptions of safety issues, coupled with creating an appealing campus, is paramount to pushing Westbury High School to the next level to become a school of choice for HISD students.

HISD has already bought 2 of the 4 properties via eminent domain, including the property that is the farthest from the WHS campus. The properties shown in RED on page 7 have already been acquired. Now is the time to finish what has been started and fulfill the promises made in 2012 and earlier by HISD. Completing the promised property acquisitions will bring the WHS campus up to the acreage size that newer HISD and suburban schools are sited on, and will prevent WHS from becoming landlocked like Bellaire and Lamar. It will also make the campus more visually appealing, reduce safety concerns, and allow the WHS campus to adjoin a research center operated by a major corporation.

HISD must be held to their promises to our community. See box below for an excerpt from the December 2013 *Crier* about the land acquisition.

Great News! On November 14, the Trustees of the Houston Independent School District (HISD) voted to give "Authority to finalize negotiations for purchase and approval of resolutions for the initiation of eminent domain procedures, if necessary, for the acquisition of property to expand the **Westbury High School** site".

The property is to be used for a public purpose, including "additional grounds for public school building(s) and appurtenances or additions thereto, playgrounds, athletic fields, green space, and/or parks in connection therewith".

Do not let HISD go back on their promises to Westbury High School and our community.

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50th Reunion of Parker Elementary 1965

50 Year Reunion Parker Elementary

Have you ever run across an old class picture and wondered whatever happened to so and so? Well, Tom Todd did more than wonder what had happened to his classmates from Parker Elementary Class of 1965. Tom began tracking down former classmates, 31 boys and girls who were hand-picked in the 4th grade to be in an academically able class thru 6th grade to compete with the Russians in science and math. Emails began circulating among the found friends who had not seen one another for decades and, before long, all remaining 29 former classmates had been found.

The desire for reunion was kindled, not just by the curiosity to find each other, but also by the desire to find and thank our sixth grade teacher, Mrs. Marks. We wanted to thank her for teaching us to accept hard work as part of a journey that leads to magical places; for preparing us to be orators when we thought we could not be; and for teaching us to learn from, lean on, and laugh with our classmates. Those were the lessons of a lifetime. In planning a reunion, we were also honoring her memory.

The early November Reunion began with the 29 classmates reuniting for a brown bag lunch at Westbury Park, then a tour of the school and an assembly with current third graders. The Class of 1965 had assembled a time capsule from the 60s, as none was discovered during the school's 50th anniversary celebration. We presented the items to the current third graders, who will be fifth graders when the new school is dedicated, and helped them think about what might go into their time capsule. In our time capsule were a 45rpm record, the November 22, 1963,

special edition of the Houston Chronicle covering JFK's assassination, diaper pins, fountain pens, Civil War Battle cards issued in 1964 to commemorate the centennial of the Civil War, ticket stubs from the Beatles first Houston performance in 1965, and our favorite book from Mrs. Marks'class, A Wrinkle in Time.

Classmates also created a mosaic to give to the school with the help of renowned Houston artist,

Reginald Adams. We were the third sixth grade class to create a mosaic: the first mosaic, in 1959, created the Cynthia Ann Parker story; the second, in 1975, honored the country's bicentennial; and now ours, 50 years later, celebrated Parker Elementary's early years. Parker Elementary administrators were kind enough to reopen the school for us on Saturday

and Mrs. Marks' family joined us as we reminisced. We posed on the Parker stage to recreate our school picture from 50 years before – a new cherished photo. All of us felt that having Mrs. Marks as our sixth grade teacher had helped shape the adults we had become.

We classmates can't really explain why we had so much fun reconnecting 50 years later. Maybe it was all of those shared experiences from the sixties and the memories of spending day after day together for three years. It was a different time. Parker had 2,400 kids in 1964 (compared to 800 today); we rode our bikes or walked to school. There was no air conditioning. Senora Creasey, our Spanish teacher, had 26 classes and 950

students and still offered summer enrichment classes.

We were together in the cafeteria when President John F. Kennedy was assassinated in 1963; we had bomb drills, thanks to the fear of Russian attacks; we all received doses of the polio vaccine on sugar cubes in the cafeteria; we were together when President Lyndon Baines Johnson signed the Civil Rights Act in 1964. Despite all the changes, the one constant looking back over 50 years, is that Parker Elementary has consistently had wonderful teachers and administrators who have competently and lovingly educated several generations of Westbury children.

Fondren International Baccalaureate World Magnet School is now accepting magnet applications for the 2015-2016 school year. The Magnet application deadline is December 19.

Fondren Middle School is a fully authorized International Baccalaureate World Magnet School. This program encourages all learners to understand and embrace the connections between traditional subjects and the real world. 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


Westbury Commercial Property

Westbury Centerette Variance Hearing Update

The "Westbury Centerette" property is a collection of vacant and boarded up buildings near the northeast corner of West Bellfort and Chimney Rock. A developer, Samantha Fitness, hopes to build an LA Fitness center on the site with both ground and garage parking. The developer asked the city for a variance to allow them to maintain the original 10-foot setback on the Chimney Rock side, since the standard setback on a city thoroughfare is now 25 feet. The developer proposes to use the standard 25-foot setback for West Bellfort and standard 10-foot setback for Moonlight. The boards of the Westbury Civic Club and the Westbury Area Improvement Corporation, after discussing the proposed conditions and landscaping plans, approved resolutions to not oppose the variance request.

The City of Houston Planning Commission approved the variance request, with certain conditions that the developer has agreed to meet, if the site is developed, including: new sidewalks on Moonlight, West Bellfort, and Chimney Rock; bike racks, security lighting, conduct traffic studies, and provide screening trees along Moonlight and Chimney Rock. Draft landscaping plans are shown.

Several porch package thefts have occurred in Westbury in the past 2 months. As holidays approach, the thieves will be looking for easy targets. Do not be one!

Shopping: Be aware of your surroundings. Make sure to park in well lit areas. Do not carry large amounts of cash. Do not wear large amounts of expensive jewelry. Consider shopping during the day or with a friend. Be aware of strangers approaching you with questions to distract you.

Visible Presents/gifts: Large displays of presents/gifts should not be visible thru your front windows.

Scams/Suspicious Person(s): One common scam in our area involves someone coming to your door asking about trimming your trees. They get you to take them out back while someone else, unbeknownst to you, is robbing you. Call WAP at 281-463-6666 for any suspicious vehicles or people. One way criminals screen the neighborhood and homes is by going door to door with fake solicitations or by knocking to see if the homeowner is home. 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
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"Klean It Up, Green It Up"

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





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Deed Restrictions and More

House Numbers

Also, take a look at your house number today. Do you have house numbers on your house and are the numbers readily visible from the street? Did you know that the city requires EVERY home to have a visible house number, so that emergency vehicles can respond quickly to the correct address. A house number painted on the curb is helpful, but it can be obscured by a parked car. The ordinance says a house number should be placed either on the primary door or within 18 inches from that door. If your house was built before 1979, then the numbers have to be at least 2" tall. If your house was built between 1979 and 2010, then the numbers have to be at least 3" tall. If your house was built after January 2010, then the numbers should be at least 4" tall.

Remodeling your home?

Adding On? Do you know your deed restrictions?

Did you know that the Westbury Civic Club can look over your proposed plans for free before you start construction? We want to avoid deed restriction violations before they happen. Did you know that Westbury 2, Westbury 3, and Westbury 5 have a 25 foot rear setback for the main structure? Did you know that there is a minimum percentage of brick that must be on your home? Did you know that you can't build in front of your building line? We want to help you! We want you to find out about possible violations before it costs you money and time. Several homeowners in the past couple years have had to tear down and/or modify their construction due to deed restriction violations.

The City of Houston does not review deed restrictions when issuing permits. They require a signed affidavit acknowledging that the plans comply with your deed restrictions. This holds YOU, the homeowner, accountable for knowing and complying with your deed restrictions. We are here to help you. All deed restrictions are available online at westburycrier.com.

Thank you City of Houston Solid Waste Department!

Recently, a Westbury resident's trash can was smashed by the trash truck. At 3:45PM on Thursday, the resident called the City at 311 to report the problem. The 311 operator was very courteous and gave the resident the service number and informed the resident that it could take up to 6 days to receive a new trash can and to please not use the old one and leave it on the curb for the City to pick up. Imagine the surprise when at 8:20AM the very next morning, the City of Houston was outside delivering a brand new trash can!

Sometimes the City can take forever to get something done, but it's nice to know that in the 4th largest city in the US, we have such prompt action from city services.


Southern Crushed Concrete – Update on Environmental Permit Request

Hearing moved to December 15. The hearing that was to be held on November 20 was pushed back to December 15. This is an alignment hearing where the judge decides which parties or groups will be allowed to participate in the contested hearing.

Southern Crushed Concrete (SCC) has a facility on Gasmer (near the Willow Waterhole Conservation Reserve and the convent) and has applied for an environmental permit to operate a concrete batch plant. "The proposed facility will emit the following air contaminants: particulate matter including (but not limited to) aggregate, cement, road dust, and particulate matter with diameters of 10 microns or less and 2.5 microns or less". A community meeting on this topic was held at Westbury High School in late July to express concerns and to request a contested hearing. On September 22, the applicant requested that the case be referred directly to The State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH) for a hearing. As we learn more information, we will keep you updated via the WCC Facebook page and NextDoor.

SOAH will conduct a case hearing on DECEMBER 15 at 10 AM at The Preserve at North Loop, 2020 North Loop West, Suite 111, Houston, TX, 77018.

WAIC: Westbury Area Improvement Corporation

The nonprofit WAIC monthly meeting was held on November 19. The WAIC board for 2015 was elected. The board voted to not hold a business meeting in December. The two primary topics of discussion this month were the issues regarding the campus expansion controversy (see articles on pages 1, 6-7) at Westbury High School (WHS) and pending environmental permit by Southern Crushed Concrete

WHS Campus Expansion Controversy —Despite the promises made by HISD to complete the land acquisition to expand the Westbury High School campus for athletic facilities, HISD now does not want to do the budgeted project. We discussed the strong community support at the HISD November hearing and at the online petition, and ways to continue to advocate for the campus expansion.

Southern Crushed Concrete (SCC): The upcoming December 2014 hearing about the SCC environmental permit application will be an "alignment" hearing, where the judge decides which parties or groups will be allowed to participate in the contested hearing about the permit application. It had been advised that groups which want to participate as an interested party at the hearings approve a formal resolution expressing that desire; therefore, the WAIC board approved several resolutions on the topic. See blue box on page 3.

In other business, the WAIC board approved a motion to participate as a Super Neighborhood at the Neighborhoods USA conference in Houston in the summer of 2015. WAIC President Cindy Chapman spoke at the variance hearing at the Planning Commission to relay that the WAIC board and SN did not oppose the variance request by Samantha Fitness. A Westbury Square Townhome resident spoke about his efforts to reduce traffic speeds and improve pedestrian safety in the area.
