Deck the Halls Parade December 15, 5PM

This year marks the 20th anniversary of the "Deck the Halls" Parade and Toy Drive. This parade is not organized by the Westbury Civic Club, but the parade information is printed in the *Crier* as it has become a Westbury neighborhood tradition.

The parade theme this year is "Celebrating Life's Magical Moments". All of the participants will be real people sharing their real moments, like a birthday, baby shower, quinceañera, bar mitzvah, graduation, engagement, wedding, promotion, pet adoption, retirement, and more. Watch a REAL WEDDING as Risa and Rudy say their vows on the route! Be a guest at all kinds of parties, like pizza, skating, pajama, Halloween, solar eclipse, costume, dinner, beach, and many others!

The Houston Pride Band will lead the parade, and will be joined by community organizations, local businesses, churches, schools, scouts, sports teams, and neighborhood favorites. Wave to District K Council Member Martha Castex-Tatum, Westbury Civic Club President Cindy Chapman, and past President Becky Edmondson! The parade will be followed by an art car procession made up of cars from the Houston Art Car Klub.

The parade organizers encourage neighbors on the route to throw holiday parties the night of the parade. They will be looking for the biggest and most original themes in yards on the route and will award prizes. The organizers collect toys for children, who would otherwise receive no gifts, and donations can be picked up if requested, or collected on the route. A Message from the Westbury Civic Club President

December is a month of religious holidays and celebrations. Schools are out and many of us are traveling to visit family or are receiving family members and guests. This is a time of year of good food, family, and fun. The WCC Yard of the Month program in December focuses on Holiday Decorations and Lights, and the judging will be held on the weekend of December 15. The Annual "Deck the Halls" parade will be held on December 15, and is a privately organized parade open to the community. These holiday activities help make Westbury a great place to live.

You will read elsewhere in this newsletter about the Fall White Elephant Community Garage Sale that was held in late October, and about the Keep Houston Beautiful awards received by the Westbury Civic Club and by several of our community partners. We have a lot to brag about here in Westbury.

Although we have much to be thankful for in Westbury, we also have many challenges that face our community and the Westbury Civic Club. Our income for the WCC Operations and the WCC Westbury Area Patrol (WAP) has been adversely affected by the multiple flood events over the past three years. The Westbury Area Patrol is the most expensive program operated by the Westbury Civic Club, and the cushion of savings for WAP, which had been slowly accumulated over the years, has now been spent down. For 2019, we will need to raise ALL of the needed funds for WAP and I strongly advise that we raise more than the bare minimum for WAP. Why? The WAP security patrol is primarily paid with VOLUNTARY contributions from Westbury residents, thus we are now at greater risk of future financial disruptions without the financial cushion we have had in past years. Early in the year, the WCC signs a contract for our security patrol,

which means that the WCC has a contractual obligation to pay for bills for our security patrol.

Our peer neighboring communities of Meyerland, Maplewood South/North, Marilyn Estates, and Barkley Square hire security patrols and use the same provider that Westbury hires - officers from Constable Precinct 5. Our constable patrol officers are licensed law enforcement officers and can arrest criminals. The security patrols work together and provide backup manpower to each other. But, we are the only neighborhood in our local network of Precinct 5 constable patrols which does NOT have mandatory assessments for all of our homes. Thus, it has always been much harder for Westbury to pay for our security patrol officers. We need your help to pay for our WAP security patrol with Constable Precinct 5!

Most residents of Westbury have voluntary payments, not mandatory assessments, including me. It is vital that those of us with voluntary payments make the extra effort to support our community with our dollars. In particular, I would like to ask our voluntary members to make the extra effort to pay in December or in early 2019. Paying early helps us all because then the WCC has to spend less money and effort soliciting funds. Paying early also helps us know whether we will be able to afford our 4 constables for 2019. I am paying for 2019 early and I ask you to join me. See page xx for more info. You

If you are a recent homeowner with mandatory assessments, please be aware that typically your mortgage company does not collect funds to pay your mandatory assessment bill, and that YOU are obligated to make sure that your mandatory assessment bill is paid. If you are not sure, please call the WCC office. If you are behind on paying your mandatory assessments, please contact the WCC office to establish a payment plan.

If you can spare just one hour per week around lunch time, you can make a difference in a Westbury High School student's life. The benefits are far-reaching and deeply rewarding to your student and to you as well. Be a mentor and make a difference.

Objective

The object of the program is to expose the student to a more productive way of life. The goal is to ensure that every "at risk" student at Westbury High School will have the opportunity to participate and to have a personal mentor. Recruitment is a continuous process so that the supply of mentors will adequately meet the student's needs.

Mission

Mentor of Hope's mission is to provide "at risk" high school students with a program of hope, direction, and encouragement. To achieve these goals, they supply each student with a trained mentor to assist them in setting and achieving goals, including graduation, to develop skills necessary to pursue higher education or a trade, and to support them as they face the many difficulties of life. Ultimately, these efforts are directed at realizing the potential of each student. The program serves "at risk" students attending Westbury HS by bringing in volunteer mentors and speakers from the community to meet with and encourage students.

History

This is a tried and true program created in 1998 when a senior teacher recognized a need for student counseling to help with domestic crisis, substance abuse, peer pressures, truancy, and other issues hindering a student's performance at school. 2018 Property Taxes: Where Does the Money Go?

The Harris County Tax Assessor-Collector, Ann Harris Bennett, has mailed the 2018 Property Tax statements. As always, this generates a lot of discussion, especially for those whose tax bill is not escrowed. First, the good news is that there was no tax increase in the rate. What could have increased or decreased for many was the appraised value. With a homestead exemption this value can only be raised by a maximum of 10% per year. For transparency, the tax statement shows the last five years valuations and tax.

According to HAR.com the median appraised value for the 3406 homes in Westbury Sections 1 – 5 is \$219,762, which is up from \$208,021 in 2017. The median sold price per square foot is \$159.92. Currently there are 80 homes for sale in Westbury with an average list price of \$310,815 up from \$300,000 in 2017.

For Westbury South's 572 homes, median appraised value in 2016 was \$127,541 up from \$115,941 in 2017. The median sold price per square foot is \$115.93. There are currently 3 homes for sale with an average list of \$235,000, down from \$254,760. You cannot buy a home in any part of Westbury under \$200,000.

For Parkwest's 955 homes, the median appraised value was \$277,753, up from \$256,538 in 2017. The median sold price per square foot is \$143.15. There are currently 39 homes for sale with an average list price of \$327,148, up from \$302,204 in 2017.

Doing a spot check through Westbury, many homes had the full 10% increase in valuation; others were less than the 10%; a few went down and some stayed the same. For homes with just a homestead exemption: a \$200,000 house with \$20,000 increase saw a tax increase of a little under \$400; a \$300,000 house with a \$30,000 increase saw a tax of increase about \$600. One of the complaints about the property tax is the inequity of the valuations. Those that protest every year have the lowest valuations; those that don't protest have the highest. And before you start complaining and asking what does the City of Houston do with ALL that money you send the, be sure and check out your bill and see who actually gets your money. For an average Westbury appraised home of 203,000, 43% goes to HISD, 24.8% to the City and 17.8% to the County.

2018 ELECTION RESULTS

Continuing our proud tradition of great civic engagement, our Westbury residents once again voted at high participation levels during the 2018 Election of federal and state and county elections. Westbury is so large that we spread across nine Houston precincts. Six of our precincts exceeded 60% voting, and one of those precincts exceeded 70% voting. By comparison, the city average was about 53 percent voting participating. One precinct was similar to the citywide rate. The two lowest voting precincts predominantly serve apartment dwellers, but voting rates were still much higher than typical for a midterm election.

Proposition A regarding ReBuild Houston fees passed, which will continue the fees so that revenues are dedicated to flooding, drainage, and street improvements.

Proposition B regarding a petition by the Firefighters to increase salaries based on the salaries for the Houston Police Dept. passed. At the time of print, financial consequences are not fully known. However, Mayor Sylvester Turner has indicated that layoffs are anticipated after Thanksgiving. Additionally, creditors have reduced the financial rating for the City.

County Elected Positions

There was a surge of Democratic officeholders elected to county offices, including elected judiciary. The new Harris County Judge, the top executive for Harris County, will be Lina Hildago, who defeated incumbent Ed Emmett in a tight race.

State Elected Positions

In the Westbury area, incumbents prevailed for the Texas State Legislature: Texas Representatives Sarah Davis and Shawn Thierry, and Texas Senators Joan Huffman and Borris Miles.






Rice University Flood Research Meeting

A group of researchers from Rice University met with Cindy Chapman, WCC President, and Jennifer Edmondson, WCC Director of Infrastructure, to discuss possible research topics related to Westbury. We took a tour of the flood detention lakes built by the Harris County Flood Control District along Willow Waterhole Bayou and some of the



streets impacted by flooding during Hurricane Harvey. The participants from Rice University were: Albert Pope, Professor in Architecture; Dominic Boyer, Professor in Anthropology; and Mark Vardy, Post Doctoral Fellow.









Weirs"Spillovers" on the Willow Waterhole Bayou

These 4 photos show some of the new features at the Willow Waterhole Bayou and detention basins. Photo 1 shows the new large culverts that are bringing the Bankside/Hummingbird bayou water from the Chimney Rock intersection to the Willow Waterhole Bayou. This photo also shows one of the weirs into the detention basin as well as the emergency/ secondary spillover that will allow water to overflow and re-entered the channel on other side of the "control structure" that is seen circled in red in photo 3. The control structure restricts the flow of water in the bayou. As water level rises in the channel, water will flow over the weirs and into the detention basins. Photo 2 shows the 2nd weir which is located along the Willow Waterhole Bayou directly behind the homes on Gaymoor in Westbury. This weir is located before the other one. The basins are now all connected. One of the new connections is seen in Photo 4.

Halloween Rain In Westbury Flooded Streets and Cars

It seems Houston has a thing for big rain events on holidays. This past Halloween was no exception. The Westbury area saw a very heavy rainfall in a short period of time right at school dismissal time on October 31, 2018. The downpour started at 3:20 and was done by 4:20 but the damage was done. Over 2.5 inches of rain fell in 35 mins and in a 5 minute span, 0.4 inches of rain fell. That is nearly an half an inch of rain in FIVE MINUTES. Our streets cannot handle this amount of water this quickly, nor are they designed to. As a result, almost all the streets in Westbury and the surrounding neighborhoods of Maplewood and Meyerland were flooded and impassable. Streets that normally (not even in Harvey) do not hold water, where covered over the curbs.

The WCC office received multiple reports of cars driving though yards to avoid high water in the streets. Please do NOT drive on the lawns. If you are stuck in flooded streets, pull into a driveway to wait it out. Several homeowners have sent the WCC videos of cars and some homeowners have been successful reporting it to the police. There were flooded cars on some streets but the WCC office did not receive any reports of structural flooding with this rain event. If your home flooded during this rain, please call the office to let us know.

During the rain, all eyes were on the flood gage at the Willow Waterhole bayou and Landsdowne. The gage was not working during the storm and was not updating the correct water level of the bayou. The WCC received reports and photos of the water going over the weirs at the detention basins (see picture below). This area appeared to function correctly with a high amount of water runoff going over the weir.

The HCFCD has since adjusted the bayou level indicator for the Willow Waterhole Bayou at Landsdowne and fixed the error. The gage should report accurately in the next rainfall.

Road Fixed at Hillcroft and S. Main Train Tracks


If you have driven across the railroad tracks at South Main at Hillcroft, then you know that vehicles passing over the railroad tracks had to creep slowly over the tracks due to large variation in surface heights at the crossing. The uneven road bed was disrupting traffic flow through the intersection, and some vehicles had been damaged.

District K CM Martha Castex-Tatum had been a strong advocate to convince the Union Pacific Railroad Company and TXDoT to expedite road bed repairs, rather than delaying the work for future intersection modifications. At long last, the construction work has been completed to repair the road bed at the railroad tracks at Hillcroft.

Project Brays Updates for Westbury and New Bridges

The flood construction work at the intersection of West Bellfort and Chimney Rock is now complete. That is good news for all motorists in Westbury!

The Harris County Flood Control District began coordinated construction November 19 to modify or replace three existing bridges over Brays Bayou with new higher, wider and/or longer spans that will improve the conveyance of stormwater along Brays Bayou in south central Harris County. Construction began November 19 with the closure of both the Buffalo Speedway and Ardmore Street bridges. The Buffalo Speedway, Ardmore Street and Stella Link bridges will be the 18th, 19th and 20th bridge modifications constructed by the Flood Control District as part of \$480 million Project Brays, a cooperative effort between the Flood Control District and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Project Brays includes the widening of 21 miles of Brays Bayou in 13 separate channel modification project segments, the modification of 32 bridges, and the construction of four stormwater detention basins with a combined capacity of 3.5 billion gallons. (A new bridge over Brays Bayou at Forest Hill Boulevard has been under construction since July 2018. The final segment of channel modifications as part of Project Brays, between Loop 610 and Fondren Road in the Meyerland area, also has been under construction since the summer of 2018.) In August 2018, Harris County Commissioners Court awarded two construction contracts to lowest qualified bidder, James Construction Group, for this latest bridge work - a \$6,625,343 contract for the Buffalo Speedway bridge, and a \$7,889,508 contract for the Stella Link Road and Ardmore Street bridges.

Construction of all three bridges will be coordinated to reduce traffic disruptions:

- Buffalo Speedway and Stella Link Road bridges will not be closed at the same time.
- All lanes of the Buffalo Speedway bridge are closed. Bridge work will last for approximately one year. The main detour through this area will be via Kirby Drive and Stella Link.
- All lanes of the Ardmore Street bridge also will be closed for approximately a year and a half. The main detour through this area will be via Scott Street and State Highway 288.
- Stella Link Road bridges will not be closed to traffic until the Buffalo Speedway bridge is reopened.
- All Stella Link Road traffic will be shifted to one of the Stella Link Road bridges while the other is under construction. Residents and motorists are encouraged to remain alert to changing conditions, and to pay attention to all posted lane closure and detour signs.

When Project Brays is complete, it is expected to provide a 1 percent (100-year) level of flood protection upstream (west) of the Sam Houston Tollway. In areas downstream (east) of the tollway, Project Brays will reduce the number structures at risk from a 1 percent (100-year) flood from 16,800 to 1,800. Hurricane Harvey Registry

The Hurricane Harvey Registry is a project that collects health, location, and exposure information from people affected by Hurricane Harvey. This project is led by Dr. Marie Lynn Miranda from Rice University. This project is funded by the Cullen Trust for Healthcare, the Environmental Defense Fund, and the National Institutes of Health. The Hurricane Harvey Registry surveys will collect health, location, and exposure information from Houston area residents and people who came to Houston during Hurricane Harvey. This information can help identify health trends and risks associated with Hurricane Harvey. The registry will also support planning for future natural disasters and policy making by city officials.


If you are 18 or older and lived in the Greater Houston area during Hurricane Harvey (August/September 2017) you can take the core survey. You can take the survey, whether you flooded or not. Therefore, anyone who lived in the Westbury area during Hurricane Harvey is eligible to take the brief, 10-minute survey. harveyregistry.rice.edu

How long will it take to complete this survey? After reading the consent form, it will take you about 10-15 minutes to complete the core survey.

Can I save the responses and return later? No. If you navigate away from a survey while completing it, any answers will be lost.

How will my participation in the Hurricane Harvey Registry Core Survey help Houston? The information in the registry will help us understand the health impacts of Hurricane Harvey on the Greater Houston area. We will share reports with you that tell you what we are learning from the registry. The reports will also be shared with government officials to guide the response to Harvey and plan for Houston's future.

Why should I provide my address? One goal of this survey is to link environmental information with health information. An example is linking air pollution data to the address where you lived when Hurricane Harvey came to Houston. We cannot do this without residential address information.



How do you ensure that my personally identifiable information is stored safely? Your personally identifiable information (PII) is stored on servers that meet the requirements of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA).

Does the survey collect information about citizenship or immigration status? No.

Can a healthcare provider or insurance company access the data I provide for this survey? No. Only approved Hurricane Harvey Registry staff and affiliates can access your personally identifiable information. Only data that have been summarized will be made public.

Will anyone from the registry re-contact me? We will only re-contact you if you agree to be re-contacted. We will only re-contact you regarding new resources for those affected by Harvey or for additional survey questions.

Who can I contact if I have questions about the survey? You can send an email to HarveyRegistry@rice.edu. Though you should identify yourself in the email, please do not provide any personal health information.

Broken Recycling Cans

If the City trash truck takes or damages your trash cans, please report it to 311. After you get your service number, call the WCC office to let us know the SR number so we can help expedite your trash can issue. This has proven to be very successful method for most residents.

At the November WCC Board Meeting, City Solid Waste rep, Richard Nguyen, said the City will be receiving 25 NEW trash collection trucks. The new trucks will hopefully reduce the collection delays. The new trucks should be in service starting in January 2019. He also reported that a new shipment of trash cans just arrived so if you were missing a can to please re-report it so the City can get you a trash or recycling can.

Many residents called the office last month with their SR numbers for missing trash cans. Some have been calling the City since July! If you have reported a damaged or missing trash can to the City in the past several months but have not received a replacement can, please call 311 and re-report. Make sure to write down your Service Request (SR) number. Then call the WCC office with your SR number. Two residents called the day after our board meeting with their SR numbers and new trash cans were delivered that same day by Solid Waste Department! Please report all trash can problems to 311.

House Numbers

Take a look at your house numbers today. Do you have house numbers on your house and are the numbers readily visible from the street? Did you know that the city requires EVERY home to have a visible house number, so that emergency vehicles can respond quickly to the correct address. A house number painted on the curb is helpful, but it can be obscured by a parked car. The ordinance says a house number should be placed either on the primary door or within 18 inches from that door. If your house was built before 1979, then the numbers have to be at least 2" tall. If your house was built between 1979 and 2010, then the numbers have to be at least 3" tall. If your house was built after January 2010, then the numbers should be at least 4" tall.

Remodeling your home? Adding On? Do you know your deed restrictions? Did you know that the Westbury Civic Club can look over your proposed plans for free before you start construction? We want to avoid deed restriction violations before they happen. Did you know that Westbury 2, Westbury 3, and Westbury 5 have a 25 foot rear setback for the main structure? Did you know that there is a minimum percentage of brick that must be on your home? Did you know that you can't build in front of your building line?

We want to help you! We want you to find out about possible violations before it costs you money and time. Several homeowners in the past couple years have had to tear down and/or modify their construction due to deed restriction violations.

The City of Houston does not review deed restrictions when issuing permits. They require a signed affidavit acknowledging that the plans comply with your deed restrictions. This holds YOU, the homeowner, accountable for knowing and complying with your deed restrictions. We are here to help you. Call the Westbury Civic Club Office at 713-723-5437.
