#### Willow Waterhole Conservancy Receives \$2 Million from Kinder Foundation

During the 2021 MusicFEST, Mayor Sylvester Turner announced that the Kinder Foundation will be donating \$2 million to the Willow Waterhole Conservancy for park improvements, along with another \$2 million available in matching funds. This is very exciting news!



Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy

The first \$2 million from the Kinder Foundation will go towards trail construction and amenities at Willow, Triangle, Scout, and Dog Lakes, as well as a neighborhood connection to Chimney Rock Road. This is especially exciting for Westbury as we would have easy access. If the matching funds are obtained, there could be more parking, a pier, amenities in the native prairie preserve area, and an outdoor classroom. "Willow Waterhole is truly a diamond in the rough that is poised to transform the quality of life of Houstonians in the southwest area of the city," said Nancy Kinder, president of Kinder Foundation. "We admire the grit and determination of the conservancy's leaders and volunteers for what they already have accomplished. The WCC hosted several I Love Westbury events in the WCC parking lot that were focused on our Constable patrol program. Also, the WCC celebrated our annual Neighborhood Night Out (NNO) event in the WCC parking lot rather than our usual Westbury tradition of encouraging block parties. (NNO is a nationwide activity intended to encourage neighbors to meet each other and to bridge connections with law enforcement.) The WCC resumed hosting our traditional White Elephant Sale, our big community garage sale event, at the parking lot of Westbury United Methodist this fall.

All Westbury Civic Club community activities during 2021 were held outdoors and our board meetings were held online and broadcast live on Facebook. In January, we intend to start conducting our monthly WCC Board Meetings in person; we are thankful to Westbury Baptist Church for hosting us again for our monthly WCC board meetings.

I am thankful to the board of the Westbury Civic Club for their efforts making Westbury a better place to live. A big special thank you to Jennifer Edmondson, the sole paid employee of the Westbury Civic Club, for serving a huge neighborhood of 5,000 homes while also producing an award-winning monthly newsletter.

#### **WCC Board Notes - November 2021**

- → The November Westbury Civic Club board meeting was held via Zoom and streamed live on Facebook.
- → Guest Speaker HISD Trustee Sue Diegaard reviewed the past year more stability in the district and board hired new Superintendent Millard House.
- → Guest Speaker Bill Burhans provided details about a 2 million dollar donation from the Kinder Foundation to the Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy, plus matching funds up to \$2million. See pages 1 and 19.
- → Budget Committee recommendations were reviewed, chaired by Treasurer Becky Edmondson. Draft budget is on page 7, and the final budget will be voted on in January. The board approved a motion to increase the recommended voluntary dues from \$360 to \$365, an increase of \$5, for next year. The board also approved a motion to create a committee to review WCC operations, to be chaired by Lindsey Pollock.
- → The board approved a motion to not meet in December. The next WCC board meeting will be on January 19, 2022.


#### The Library Has a Name! Shannon Walker Neighborhood Library

Our new library that is coming to Westbury officially has a name! The Dr. Shannon Walker Neighborhood Library will be located on Belrose at the site of the old post office. The new library will be a large, regional library for District K and Southwest Houston. Construction of the site is slated to begin in 2022 with completion in 2023.

The Westbury Civic Club started a Library Action Committee that has been meeting every 2 weeks for several months. The committee is made up of Westbury residents. One of the main concerns highlighted by the Committee is cut through traffic in the neighborhood to get to the new library. The library will have access from Belrose and Chimney Rock. The concern is the high amount of traffic down Atwell or other Westbury Section 3 streets to get to Belrose. Belrose is only accessible from other neighborhood streets, it does not connect to any major street. One possible solution the committee is suggesting is that that official address for the library be Chimney Rock, not Belrose. This will make it easier for Houston residents to find the new library, as Chimney Rock is a major throughfare. We are hopeful this will eliminate some neighborhood cut through traffic. Many people use mapping apps. These apps would direct people to enter from Chimney Rock, if that is the address, not Belrose, so most non-Westbury residents will be directed to that entrance when trying to find the new library.

The committee is trying to set a meeting with the City of Houston to discuss traffic concerns.

#### **Regular Household Trash**

Pick-up is EVERY Thursday. Regular household trash goes into the black trash can.

#### **Yard Waste**

Pick-up is EVERY week either on Thursday or Saturday or any day the City decides to come by. Yard Waste MUST be placed in the correct City bio-degradable bags.



#### **Recycling in Westbury**

All of Westbury recycles on Schedule A. Recycling is every other week. Recycling goes into the green trash can.

#### hy Support the WCC?

Westbury is a unique neighborhood. While all 5,000 homes in our Westbury neighborhood have active deed restrictions, only 463 have mandatory assessments. This means the Westbury Civic Club heavily relies on voluntary financial contributions from residents.

Westbury has historically had strong voluntary support because residents understood the great benefits of the WCC and our programs. The past several years' contributions to the Westbury Civic Club and to the Westbury Area Patrol have been down. By working together, we can meet the challenges head on and keep our neighborhood the jewel that it is. We all want a safe, flood free neighborhood with great schools and nice neighbors.

The total amount for the **2022 Voluntary Dues is \$365**. That is well worth a dollar a day! The Westbury Civic Club dues are \$60 for the year. The WCC suggests a contribution of \$305 for the Westbury Area Patrol (a paid contract with Precinct 5 Constables).



### Mayor's Proud Partner Awards 2021

For over 20 years, Keep Houston Beautiful has helped Keep Westbury Beautiful. Westbury has participated in the annual Keep Houston Beautiful (KHB) day in April working in our parks and on our esplanades for many years. Each year KHB hosts an award luncheon for the Mayor's Proud Partner Awards.

The Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy (WWGC) won one of the seven Proud Partner Awards for the "Naturescapes" at the Willow Waterhole. Accepting the award on behalf of the WWGC was President Bill Burhans and the sculptor, James Phillips.

Over the years, Westbury has worked with KHB on different projects. In 2005, Westbury applied for and received a grant from KHB through Waste Management and hosted 3 workdays on Hillcroft planting over 100 trees, removing the invasive Chinese Tallow, fertilizing 400 trees, creating a rain garden and a demonstration mulch trail. In 2010, the Westbury Community Garden received a grant of \$10,000 from Scotts' Miracle Gro thought KHB, which helped it spring to life. Five years ago, Westbury resident, Becky Edmondson, became a commissioner on the Houston Clean City Commission which operates as Keep Houston Beautiful. She has nominated several Westbury projects for Mayor's Proud Partner awards over the years, including this year's award participant, the Willow Waterhole.

The award ceremony was held at the beautiful Julia Idelson Library in downtown Houston. Westbury was well represented with a full table to celebrate. Representing the Westbury Civic Club Jennifer Edmondson; Westbury Area Improvement Corp VP David Roschke; the Westbury Community Garden VP Debbie Gordon; the WWGC President Bill Burhans, Brett Byers, Donna and Tony Robert; Levitt Pavilion Houston President Howard Sacks.

#### Holiday Shopping Safety Tips

The Houston Police Department has some tips to protect yourself, family, and property this holiday season.

#### While Shopping

- \*Stay alert to your surroundings and the people around you.
- \*Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.
- \*Watch purchases while eating in food courts.
- \*Educate your children about what to do if they are lost.

#### In parking lots

- \*Park in a high visibility area and check for lighting if you leave during the day.
- \*Before shopping, lock all your valuables in the trunk prior to parking in the parking lot.
- \*Ask the Security Officer to escort you to your vehicle if you are uncomfortable.
- \*Walk briskly, confidently, and directly through the parking lot.
- \*Have your car keys, ready in hand, before leaving the store.
- \*Watch for people who may be following you.

#### **Request a Vacation Watch**

Going on a vacation? Well, if you pay your Westbury Area Patrol dues, make sure you request a vacation watch by the Constables. This is a great service that is included in our contract. A deputy will check out your property at least once a day to make sure it is secured and nothing suspicious is going on.

#### **FAQs for Westbury Area Patrol** Constables

#### Who do you call when you discover a break in or property damage?

Sometimes there is confusion about when to call HPD and when to call the Precinct 5 Constables (Westbury Area Patrol). In case of emergency, always call 911.

For crimes or problems involving property, we suggest calling the Precinct 5 Constables at 281.463.6666, as there typically will be a better response time. The Precinct 5 Constables patrol in Westbury and also in the nearby neighborhoods of Maplewood South/North, Meyerland, Marilyn Estates, and Barkley Square. For example, if you discover your car, garage, or house has been broken into, then the Constables can do the report for you and they will also create a report number for HPD. This means that you only need to contact the Constables, not both HPD and the Constables. Additionally, the nearby neighborhoods to our north all have Precinct 5 patrol contracts, so crime information is shared among the local Constable contracts. Be sure to report crimes, even minor property crimes, as Precinct 5 Constables can allocate additional resources when hot spots pop up in the crime statistics.

#### How do I contact the Constables?

Call the Precinct 5 Constables Dispatcher at 281,463,6666. When you call dispatch, be sure they get the correct name and spelling of your street. Have them repeat it back to you. Many streets have similar sounding names. Be sure to tell them you are in the Westbury contract.



Each year the Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy (WWGC) gives awards and this year's recipients were: District K and Martha Castex-Tatum for their support of the Willow Waterhole; the Houston Parks and Recreation team, that keeps the park looking good; and Interfaith Environmental Coalition, that hosts regular cleanups at the Greenway.

You can't have an event for thousands without a lot of pre-planning and then boots on the ground. The Willow Waterhole Planning committee did a great job of pulling all the pieces together. Setting up and taking down had excellent help from Nat'l Honor Society chapters from both Westbury HS and Bellaire HS, the Westbury Baseball team and the Westbury Gents.

# Kinder Foundation Gives 2 Million to the Willow Waterhole

The Kinder Foundation, a family foundation of Nancy and Rich Kinder, gave a \$2 million immediate gift with a promise to match an additional \$2 million in donations by others to the Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy. The Kinder Foundation's project priority is completing trails on all the lakes west of South Post Oak and north of Gasmer, a neighborhood trail connection to the Greenway from Chimney Rock/West Bellfort on utility easement, and the purchase of a 1-acre derelict property at Ricecrest/Gasmer. The matching 2 million that is available could be used for an array of different amenities such as a pier, an outdoor classroom, security enhancements, additional parking, dog park, restrooms, and the development of the Native Prairie preserve and lake east of South Post Oak.

#### The Neighborhood Connector

For those of us in Westbury who support trails, one of the exciting pieces is the "neighborhood connector" trail. A 10-foot paved trail will be placed on the pipeline/Harris County flood control easement that starts at West Bellfort and Chimney Rock and runs all the way to the Willow Waterhole Bayou. This will give easier access to the park for walkers and bike riders. The proposed dog park can also be accessed from this trail.

#### \$10 Million Capital Campaign

The WWGC has an ambitious \$10 Million Capital Campaign to make the Willow Waterhole amazing!

The 291 acre Willow Waterhole Greenspace is poised to become one of Houston's premiere park destinations! The ground breaking ceremony for this flood detention project was held in 2004 and construction continued through 2019! Reduce the Risk, Rediscover the Beauty was the tag line for Project Brays. While all of this flood control work was ongoing; the Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy was busy envisioning the "Beauty" part of the equation. There have been over 60 Eagle Scout projects; hundreds of tree plantings; two master plans; hundreds of bird surveys listing 203 species; fish stocking, prairie preservation and more. But now it's time to move forward in a big way with all of the big dollar items. The \$2 million from the Kinder Foundation is the start of the campaign.

# Harris County Precinct One Trail Improvements

Westbury Lake is the large lake adjacent to the Westbury Little League fields and accessed by Dryad. Through an Urban Grant from Texas Parks and Wildlife back in 2004 a trail was constructed around a portion of Westbury Lake. Now a new 3.5 mile trail around the whole Westbury Lake has been made possible by Harris County Precinct One.

"Parks and trails are essential for every community to improve peoples' health, build social connections and expand environmental safeguards. Precinct One is proud to help our partners improve amenities in southwest Houston by rebuilding and extending over 3.5 miles of trails around Westbury Lake in 2022," said Commissioner Rodney Ellis, Precinct One.
